INDEPENDENCE OF FINLAND THREATENED

REVOLT CAUSES A SERIOUS UPHEAVAL -- ONTARIO SUFFERS FROM BLIZZARD

REVOLUTION BREAKS OUT IN NEW FINNISH REPUBLIC

HELSINGFORS IN HANDS OF THE FINN RED GUARDS--FOREIGN CONSULS HAVE LEFT CITY--RUSSIAN SOLDIERS HELPING REVOLUTIONISTS--TO ENFORCE ORDER BOLSHIEVSKI SEND TROOPS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Stockholm, Jan. 29.—The long threatened revolution in Finland has commenced in the eastern provinces, according to advices reaching Haparanda. The Finnish Red Guards have occupied the railway station at Helsingfors. The foreign consuls have all left the capital. Fighting is reported to be in progress around Viborg, which lies near to the head of the Gulf of Finland, and not very far away from Cronstadt. The Red Guard is holding Rikilä and

other important railroad junctions. The Russian soldiers are aiding the Red Guards, of whom there are already a great number in Finland already. The Bolshevik government has promised to send more troops to Helsingfors to enforce "law and order." The Press Bureau in Helsingfors are commanded by the guns of the Russian warships in the hands of the Bolshevik sailors, and all telegraphic communication between Stockholm and Petrograd has been interrupted since Sunday.

LIBERAL RETURNED IN YUKON ELECTION

Dawson, Jan. 28.—Congdon, the Liberal, has been elected, defeating Dr. Thomson, the Conservative candidate, for the Yukon seat in the Dominion House. Early this afternoon Congdon was leading by 121 votes, and the results from the outside polls confirm his election to Ottawa.

In view of the above dispatch, it is being wondered whether it would be in order to say that the pro-German and the lower element predominates in the Yukon, as was alleged in Prince Rupert.

ANGLICAN CHURCH VESTRY MEETING

The annual vestry meeting of the Church of England was held last evening, when reports were presented and officers for the ensuing year elected. The different organizations gave encouraging accounts of their work during 1917. The three branches of the W. A. were highly commended for their successful efforts. It was largely due to them that the church was painted inside and out last summer, besides all that they did for interests outside the parish.

The Sunday School, under the superintendency of Mr. Cross, showed substantial increase in attendance, with recently an attendance of over 70, with 85 on the roll, while the Seal Cove School has an attendance of over 30 with 40 on the roll. The choir has carried on efficiently during the year, and great thanks are due to the capable organist, Miss Ellett, also to Mr. Melliar in his work of training.

CHEAP FISH WILL CREATE ITS MARKET

Vancouver, Jan. 28.—Mr. John Wallace, who reported to the Dominion food controller regarding the economical operation of the trawlers for a supply of cheap fish, further says:

"In helping to draw up the report to the food controller I did not intend that it should only be the government that should operate the trawler. What I insist is that the fish can be caught by the trawler cheaper than by any other method and can be placed on the cars f. o. b. Vancouver or Prince Rupert at a price that will enable them to retail at 2 pounds for 15 cents at Winnipeg, and that the government should, through the food controller's office herald their arrival by thorough newspaper publicity. The price and the fine quality of the fish will do the rest. It is said that fishermen are being paid 8 cents a pound for sole at the present time, but thousands of pounds of sole will be drawn up on every trip of the trawler and there need be no difference in price between sole thus caught or the flounders, sea bass, rock cod, etc.

The whole point of my contention regarding a cheap supply of fish is that, while there may be no market now, the market will be created when the price is brought down.

"The only way to make the market is to make the price attractive. Ground fish caught by trawler or any other method will not sell at 10 cents per pound until meats go a good deal higher than they are, but let the same ground fish be set before the local and prairie consumer at 2 pounds for 15 cents and I guarantee that the market will be found right there and then. I mean good fresh sole, flounder, etc., caught in deep water and served nice and fresh-frozen.

"To illustrate: last year the T. Eaton company of Winnipeg placed ten tons of lake herring on sale at 7 cents per pound and the whole ten tons were sold in five hours. Let some of the fine deep water British Columbia ground fish be given the same chance and see whether there is a market for them or not. At present, of course, there is no market for them, when it is admitted that they are not sold under 10 cents per pound on the prairies. The (Continued on Page four.)

AMUSEMENT PLACES TO BE ON HALF TIME

Rumored That Government Intends to Close All Picture Houses and Theatres Three Days a Week.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Jan. 29.—The rumor that the government intends to close all theatres and moving picture houses throughout Canada for three days every week for the purpose of conserving fuel has caused a flood of telegrams of protest to swamp post offices in Ottawa. It is believed that delegations have already been appointed to interview the war cabinet.

On enquiry at the Westholme Theatre regarding this rumor, it was found that the management there had received word yesterday that such was apparently the intention of the government, but for what reason was not disclosed. The Moving Picture House Association was taking the matter up, one of their arguments being that amusement was necessary, particularly at this time, to prevent morbidity.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

There was a full turnout of the aldermen last evening at the regular meeting of the City Council. The agenda for the meeting was a large one, but the items were mostly routine and detail ones. A letter was read from Mr. E. E. La Casse, thanking the council for being placed upon the literary committee, but owing to business preoccupations, Mr. La Casse could not undertake this.

The council then heard the report of the city solicitor regarding the house alleged to have been damaged by a tree, which, while growing upon city property, fell upon that house. The recommendation was that the city disclaim liability. The report was adopted.

Another report from the city solicitor was read regarding the claim for damages made by Mr. Chas. Heckar, through Messrs. Patmore & Fulton, for injuries received through falling off a sidewalk between Sixth and Seventh Avenues. The city solicitor recommended that this claim be repudiated, and he gave his grounds, too. His report was adopted.

Wark Channel Power.

Perhaps the most outstanding item of the evening's discussion was a report brought in by the public works committee to the effect that steps be taken to ascertain the flow of water, the capacity of the area available for a storage dam and reservoir, and the better routes for a transmission line from Wark Channel.

Ald. Dybbavn moved that this report be given effect to. The power question would be an acute one in the immediate future, and the alderman thought that now would be the best time to find out whether the Wark Channel power is worth holding, and if so, to get about developing it. This motion was seconded by Ald. Casey.

Ald. McRae pointed out that already the sum of \$4,420 had been paid to the provincial government and this sum was increasing year by year, and that what the city wanted to know was whether it were worth while making payments to the government year by year.

Mayor McClymont here informed the council that he had had a rough estimate made by an engineer as to the cost of this preliminary survey work. For the damsite, reservoirs and the water-flow, it was estimated that the information required could be procured for about \$2,000, while for the survey of the alternative transmission line routes it would cost about \$50 per mile, or \$2,500 in all, making a full total of \$4,500.

His worship pointed out that the city did not have a civil engineer in its employ. He considered that it might be a good thing to have one, and possibly one might be had who would be able to do this work in addition to the ordinary engineers work of the city. Although the present acting city engineer was accomplishing all that was desired of him satisfactorily, still, a civil engineer, experienced in land surveying, would be invaluable to the city in such projects as this. There was some more discussion regarding this project, and descriptions given. It seems that the valley in which this power lies is a cold place, where the ice lasts until well on in the spring. Sometimes even in the salt water the ice is so thick that small boats cannot get to the head of the channel. Finally, however, the report was adopted.

BLIZZARDS IN ONTARIO TIE UP ALL TRAFFIC

Entire Transportation Facilities Throughout the Province Demoralized by the Zero Weather.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Toronto, Jan. 29.—The entire transportation facilities throughout the province of Ontario have been demoralized since yesterday on account of the terrific below zero storms which have swept the country. Many trains are snowed up, and on account of the telegraphic communication also being interrupted, no word has been received of several. There is no freight moving at all. In Ottawa the temperature was eighteen below zero. Numerous of the small local railroad lines have suspended operation altogether.

This visitation is about the worst that has afflicted Ontario for many years. It is known that there has been extensive damage to property, but full details are awaited.

PLAIN BUSINESS

The matters which are due to come up this evening at the meeting of the Independent Boat Owners Association and the members of the city council are not things which are without reach, but are simply matters of plain business. Conducted as such, the problems which they present will be solved by businesslike methods. Half the trouble in this world would be avoided by going after things in the correct fashion. There is no doubt that there is enough trouble with the state of affairs from the fishermen's point of view right now, and they intend to set it right, if human effort can. And there is no reason to believe that it cannot.

One of the first things which they have to set about is the breaking up of the control which the cannerymen seem to possess over the government Fisheries Departments, both provincial and Dominion. It looks as if whatever the cannerymen say on the British Columbia coast goes. They seem to consider that they have the sole right to say what shall be done, or shall not be done with regard to salmon. And they have had things pretty much their own way, for a long time now. But the present cannerymen have to remember that there are other people interested in the salmon fisheries as well as they. In order to conserve the catches of fish for themselves, they would that no other cannery licences be issued for the next five years, so that they who have already waxed fat in this business might wax a little fatter. This notwithstanding the increasing demand for foodstuffs all over the world. This is not business. It is simple selfishness, which is never good business. Any business that is not founded upon justice is not good business, neither for those engaged in it, nor anyway else.

Were all the British Columbian waters fished equally, there would be supplies for many more canneries. In that case, the price per case might not be so large as it was last

year. But the cannerymen would not suffer. They would still have a reasonable profit, and the consumers of canned salmon would benefit.

There is no right reason in this world why some firms should have licences for waters in which they do not fish. They fish not themselves nor will they permit anyone else to fish. This is a state of things which will continue just so long as the people permit it. Privilege of any kind flourishes anywhere just for the same length of time. If those who are primarily interested in the fishing industry, and in equal rights for every fisherman to fish wherever the fish are, within proper bounds, make up their minds that it is time for the abolition of privilege in the fishing industry, well, there is only one thing that will happen, and that is the abolition of privilege, if they go about it in a businesslike way.

The same argument applies to the newer business of trawling. There are vast potentialities in this industry. There are all kinds of fish to be got. In fact, they are already gotten and being discarded—thrown away. The excuse is that there is no market. The market is there for the creating, just as the fish are there for the getting. Tell the people what you have to sell, and if the price is right they will buy it. Anyone who has once tasted sole or the deep sea flounder, would have it as soon as halibut any day. And even in Prince Rupert, how many people have tasted either?

The government wanted the people to subscribe to the Victory loan. They advertised. The people subscribed. If the government want the people to eat fish, let them advertise, and the people will do the rest. That's plain business, and results would be achieved at a tithe of the cost of advertising the Victory loan.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

(Continued From Page One.)

given permission to sell to Mr. H. S. Wallace a special-sized piece of lumber, when the matter of replanking that sidewalk between Sixth and Seventh Avenues, from Fulton to Taylor streets came up again. The board of works reported that this could only be done as a local improvement, and upon the receipt of a properly signed petition from the property owners being received, the matter would receive further consideration.

The Drydock Road.

A recommendation from the board of works was dealt with, which recommended that the city teams give assistance in the construction of this road by hauling cinders when they were not engaged in other city work, for a period not exceeding one week. Then came the report of the market clerk. His commission for the month of December was given as \$173, on a total turnover of \$2,318.55. This report afforded an opportunity for the discussion of cheaper fish. Mayor McClymont spoke of the quantity of fish which was culled from the catches landed here, as unfit for shipment about one-third of which his information showed was perfectly good. There were the small fish, which were rejected under the first and second classifications, and also other fish which were good enough for immediate consumption, but which would not stand carriage. There were also flounders, sole and red cod, which were fine fish, and in many homes preferable to halibut. Were these placed upon the city market at a reasonable price, he thought it would help to reduce the cost of living.

Ald. Kirkpatrick informed the council that she had had a great deal of experience in cooking fish and if it were not first-class fish, a first-class dish could not be expected. Ald. Dybhavn explained that the fish which was sold among the retailers in town was only the choicest of the first-class fish, and he did not see that fish which was refused classification could equal these. However, there was nothing done in the matter meantime.

Raising Pigs.

A report from the health committee came next which said that there was nothing to prevent the raising of pigs within the city limits, provided that the proper precautions were taken.

The warrant book for the month of December was presented, which brought from Ald. Casey the comparison that the police department

was costing as much as public works department. He again protested against the cost of operating the police department, which he said was out of all reason with the condition of the city. Ald. McMeekin bore this statement out and referred to two burglaries which had been effected within the last few days, about which nothing had been done. Mayor McClymont explained that no one would like better than himself to see one man being able to police the city, but it would not do. With one man on duty on an eight-hour shift required three men, and in addition, someone was required to be in the station. Ald. Casey suggested an automatic system which would obviate having half a dozen men hanging around the police station, discussing things with the city solicitor. Which was one on Mr. Peters, who enjoyed it. After the 1917 assessment roll being adopted for 1918, the council adjourned.

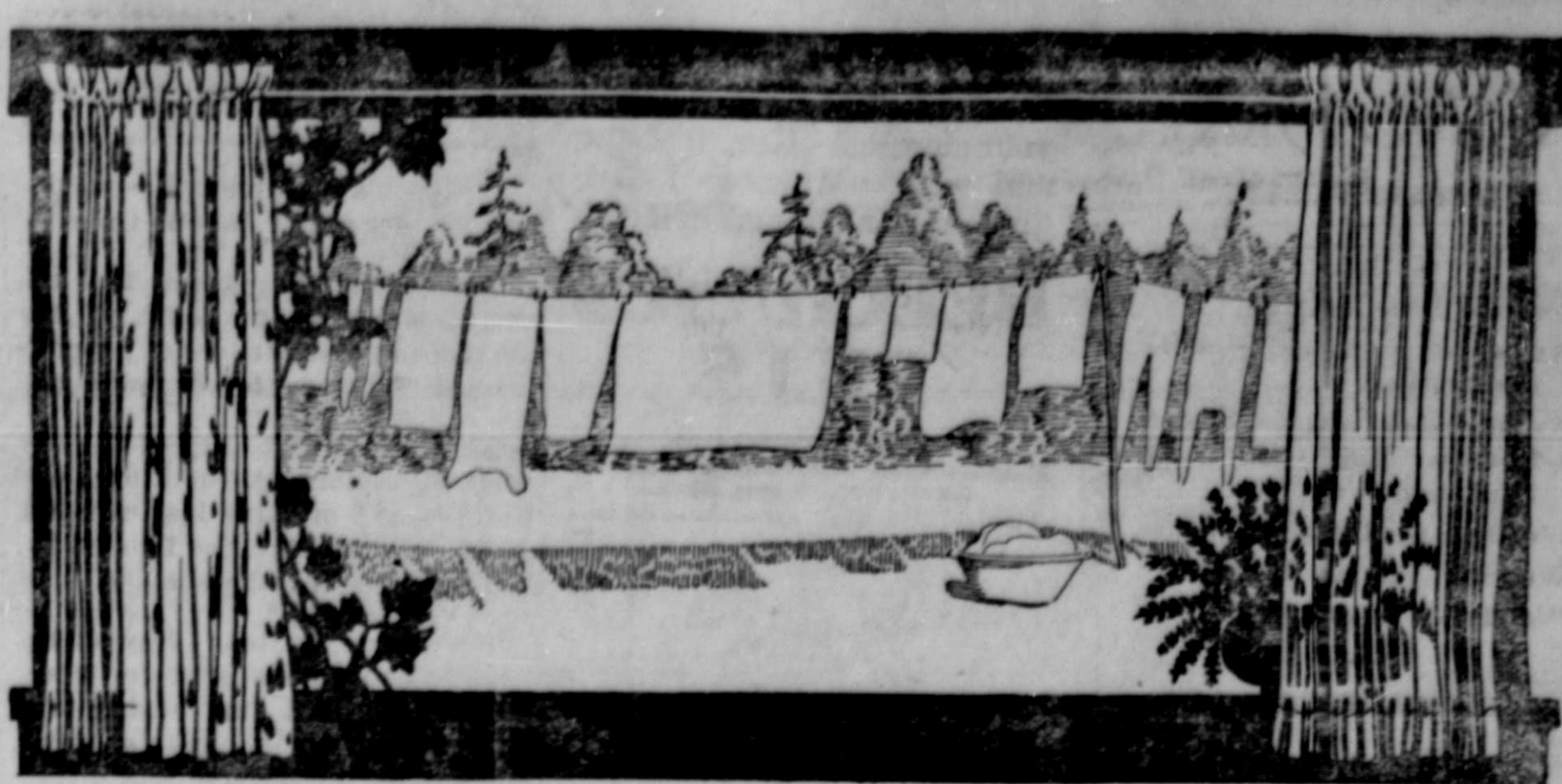

How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

The cost of meat is the heavy item in the food bill.

Poultry and Eggs will help take the place of meat.

The food that goes to the garbage pail from the average table will provide one-third the feed for a flock of 8 to 10 hens.

Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.

A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

price is the thing these times, first and last.

Hamar Greenwood, also a member of the British Columbia fish commission under the food controller, and who was concerned with the drawing up of the report referred to, made similar statements to those of Mr. Wallace.

"The whole thing is a matter of price," said he. "The fish must be got to the market at a price not over 2 pounds for 15 cents; at 10 cents per pound they are too dear when compared with meat. At a cheap price, combined with lots of advertising, I am sure that a market can be made that they will fill to perfection. As for the objections made to the trawler and the estimate that has been made of the costs of operation, they can be met with the fact that the estimate will have no standing once the trawler is in operation and the real costs are figured out, and it would be worth the while of the government to make the experiment."

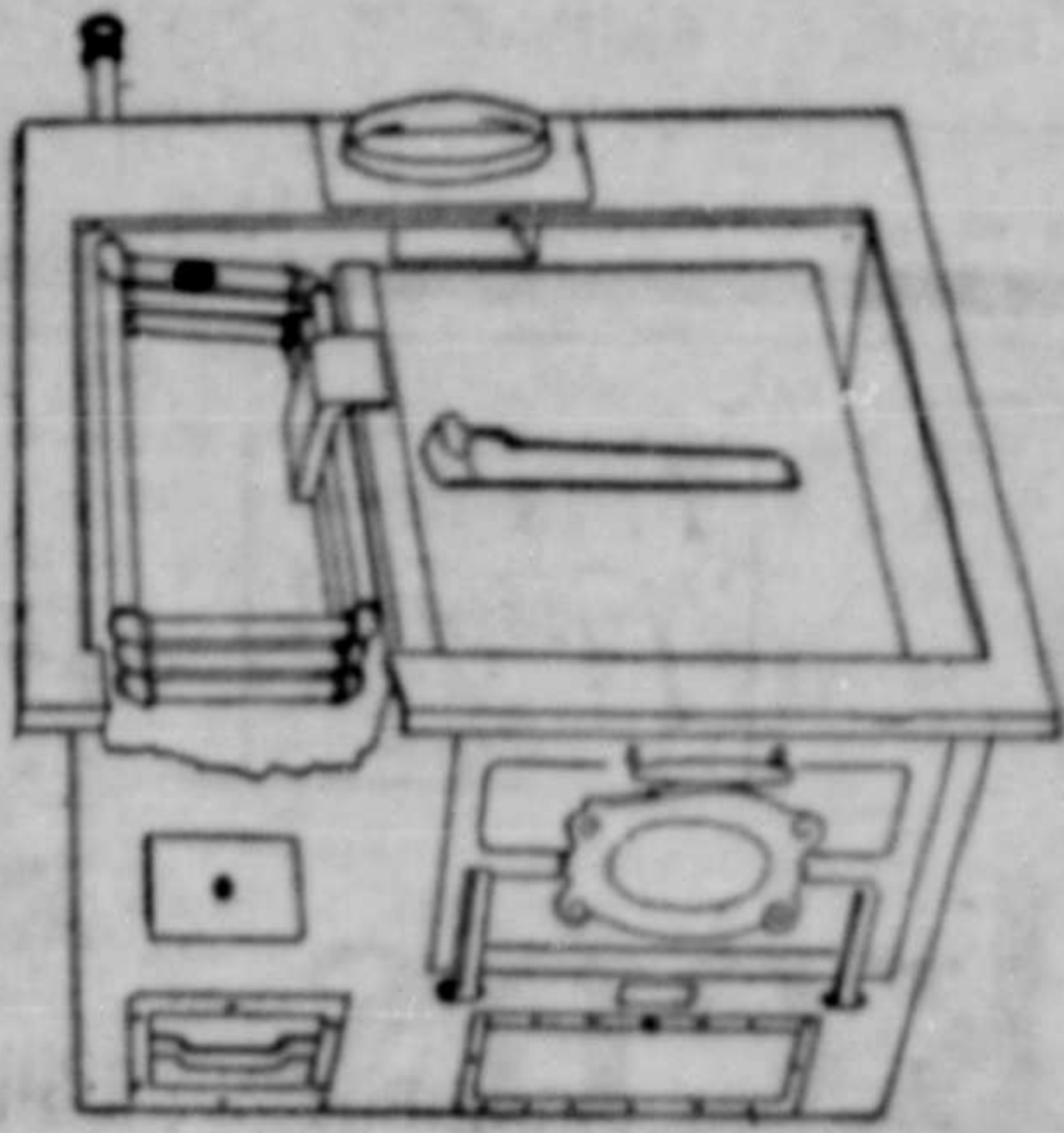
