GENERAL STRIKE THROUGHOUT GERMANY

ITALIAN TROOPS BREAK AUSTRO-GERMAN LINES -- RUSSIA TORN BY CIVIL WAR

OTHER AIR RAIDS ON LONDON BY GERMAN AEROPLANES

FIFTEEN ENEMY MACHINES CROSS COAST, BUT ONLY FIVE REACH THE CAPITAL, WHICH WAS RAIDED TWICE—OVER TWO HUNDRED KILLED AND INJURED—ONE OF ENEMY RAIDERS DESTROYED

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 30.—About fifteen German aeroplanes, of which four or five reached London, took part in the first of two raids on the city and district last night. It is officially announced that only one of the raiders engaged in the second attack penetrated very far into the city. One of the enemy machines was brought down, falling in flames for a distance of ten thousand feet through the air. All the three members of the crew of this luckless machine were burned to death.

Considerable damage was done

to various parts of London by the bombs dropped from the Hun raiders, and the casualties so far have amounted to forty-seven killed and one hundred and sixty-nine injured in this raid.

The enemy squadron was bombarded by the anti-aircraft guns, and also attacked by the British aviators, and their flight over the city was not of long duration. It was quite sufficient, however, to enable them to do considerable destruction.

GENERAL STRIKE IN GERMANY

London, Jan. 30.—Despatches received from both Holland and Switzerland describe the general strike which has broken out in Berlin and in other parts of Germany as being much more serious than the Berlin official dispatches indicate.

BRITISH AIRMEN CREATE PANIC IN MANNHEIM

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 30.—The British airmen who raided the city of Mannheim last Thursday night caused unparalleled terror in that city, according to Geneva dispatches contained in the London Daily Express, which quote travellers from Germany, one of them an injured German arriving at Basle. Despite the orders of the police, the terror-stricken people rushed out into the streets half clothed. The British raiders scored a direct hit upon the barracks in the city. After the raid, crowds assembled despite the efforts of the authorities, and shouted "Down with the war; give us peace."

THE WAR COUNCIL MEETS IN PARIS

Paris, Jan. 30.—Premier Lloyd George, Viscount Milner, members of the British War Cabinet, the Italian Premier, Prof. Orlando, and General Alferi, the Italian minister of war, arrived in Paris last evening from London for a plenary meeting of the Allies' supreme war council.

MORE SHIPS SUNK

London, Jan. 30.—The steamship Cork has been torpedoed with the loss of twelve lives. The remaining survivors were landed at a port in western England.

The Andania.

The Cunarder Andania, of which word was received yesterday of its being torpedoed but not sunk, went to the bottom in spite of all efforts to get her into port, according to information reaching the Associated Press today. The Andania was torpedoed off the Ulster coast on Sunday morning. Dispatches received from Belfast say that it is believed there were no deaths resulting in the explosion. She was a vessel of 13,405 tons and built in 1913. She made many trips between American and British ports.

FIGHTING NOW GENERAL IN ALL THE RUSSIAS

Disturbances are Rife Throughout Whole Country—Ukrainians Are Successful With Bolsheviks.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Stockholm, Jan. 30.—The progress of the revolutionists continues in Finland. Russian soldiers are openly aiding the Red Guards, and further reinforcements are coming forward from Petrograd. The Finnish minister in Petrograd has protested to the Workmen and Soldiers' Delegates against the interference of the Russians in Finnish domestic affairs. He received the reply that the Russian government by virtue of its principles, is in duty bound to support the proletariat in Finland in its battles against the Finnish Bourgeoisie.

Will Visit Allies.

London, Jan. 30.—The report that Trotsky, the Bolshevik foreign minister, and Kamenoff, are on their way back to Brest-Litovsk to resume the peace negotiations with the Central Powers, is denied by the semi-official Russian News Agency. The despatch sent out by the agency states that Kamenoff is going to Stockholm, London and Paris, with the object of informing the allied governments concerning the progress of the peace negotiations.

In the Ukraina.

Geneva, Jan. 30.—After three days' fighting, the troops of the Ukrainian Rada defeated the Bolshevik army, and have taken possession of the city of Lutsk. The fighting was extremely severe and the losses on both sides were heavy. Several battalions of the Red Guards and several regiments of the regular troops have been ordered to Bessarabia to reinforce the Bolshevik forces in the south.

In Siberia.

Harbin, Manchuria, January 30.—Twenty-two killed is the toll of dead as the result of the fighting at Tomsk, where the Bolsheviks broke up a meeting of the Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates. The dispatches state that the Bolsheviks wrecked the local assembly and that fighting and robbery is general.

FISHERY MATTERS FULLY DISCUSSED

Independent Boat Owners and Fishermen's Association Meet City Council.

In the city hall last evening, there was a meeting of the Independent Boat Owners and the Fishermen's Associations with members of the City Council to discuss matters pertinent to the fishing industry. His worship the mayor presided, and in a few words explained the object of the meeting and the reasons why it had been called.

The proposed trap for herring at Pearl Harbor was the first matter taken up. Ald. Dybhavn explained how the project, when put forward by an individual has been turned down by the Fisheries Department. The idea is to keep herring alive in Pearl Harbor until they are required for bait for the halibut fishermen, and thus relieve the shortage for several months in the year. There was quite a lot of discussion on the matter, and it was finally moved by Mr. G. W. Nickerson and seconded by Capt. Rorvik that the general idea be supported and endorsed, and that the fishery committee of the city council meet with the other organizations interested, and work out the details.

There were many suggestions and reflections offered re this project. There was some discussion as to how herring would keep for the space of thirty days in a trap. Capt. Rorvik thought that it should contain at least a thousand tons. Mr. Harry Lipsett told of what was done in this direction at other points on this northern coast, while Capt. Stoddard was of the opinion that the trap should be made portable, and capable of being removed from place to place wherever the fish were most plentiful. The urgency was impressed by Mr. G. W. Nickerson, as the spawning time was close at hand. The mayor, Ald. Casey and Mr. W. H. Montgomery were all for immediate action and the cutting off of red tape, and the getting down to business. That gill netting was the proper fashion to catch the herring was the opinion of Mr. W. Sims, whose opinion was backed by Mr. McAlenan. Mr. Robert Hannah spoke of the fish in Wark Channel.

Salmon Fishing.

With regard to the restrictions upon the salmon fishing areas, Mr. G. W. Nickerson read a telegram from Mr. J. A. Cunningham, of Vancouver, president of the B. C. ITALIANS ON THE OFFENSIVE BREAK ENEMY'S LINE IN NORTH

AUSTRO-GERMAN POSITIONS STORMED AND FIFTEEN HUNDRED PRISONERS CAPTURED—TWELVE ENEMY AEROPLANES ALSO TAKEN—REINFORCING COLUMNS BROKEN BY ARTILLERY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Jan. 30.—The Italian troops made a heavy attack yesterday on the northern mountain front and broke into the enemy lines. The War Office reports the reinforcements which the enemy was hurrying down the Nos and Campanula valleys were dispersed by the artillery fire of the

Italians and their allies. Twelve of the enemy aeroplanes were brought down. The Italians held the mastery of the air everywhere. More than fifteen hundred prisoners were captured by the Italian troops. They stormed the enemy positions on the heights east of the Asiago basin and broke through at several points, resisting violent counter attacks.

ONTARIO GOES RANCHING TO INCREASE SUPPLIES

Toronto, Jan. 29.—Millions of acres of waste land, suitable for ranching, are available in the province of Ontario, according to a survey just completed by the department of agriculture, and the government has decided to select an area, probably in Parry Sound, of 5,000 acres, where average conditions exist, for the purpose of establishing a combination sheep and cattle demonstration ranch. The idea is to encourage cattle and sheep ranching on a large scale, with a view to developing certain sections of Ontario and increasing the meat supply of the province. The government will carry out experiments in the growing of hay and fodder, in the matter of breeding and in determining the proper class and grade of cattle for the climate and general conditions.

THE FOOD CONTROLLER

There is one office more than another in this broad Dominion which at the present time, everyone desires to have properly administered and successfully, it is that of the food controller. Mr. H. B. Thomson, the British Columbian, who has been appointed thereto, in the place of Mr. Hanna, is a big man physically, and he has a chance to display his statue both mentally and intellectually in this new position. He has some job, and the sympathy of mostly everyone, even although in his official capacity he is the target for the shafts of the whole country.

Although Mr. Thomson has hitherto been politically a Conservative, his new position calls for radical action. If there be any virtue in the idea that partyism is dead at Ottawa, under the regime of the Union Government, Mr. Thomson has an opportunity of showing that even a Conservative can be radical when occasion demands. If the Conservatives would only stay radical now, what a fine place Canada would soon be.

CO-ORDINATION

It is said that the three most pressing problems before Canada at the present time are production, labor and transportation. There is really a fourth, which is distribution, but these four are only different phases of the one great thing which is Canada's duty to the world. That duty is to provide food for the other countries who have not sufficient, and in the meantime, also, the necessary war supplies for our allies. Production, labor, transportation and distribution are all interdependent upon one another. Anyone without the other three is useless, just as the three without the other one, are equally in vain. It resolves itself into a matter of national organization. And it is the duty of the government to do the organizing. This is the function of the executive of a nation as much as the organization of an industrial concern is the duty of the directorate, and not of the shareholders. Na-

tional organization implies executive control, compulsion and unity of effort. Which will never be accomplished by clinging to artificial precedent and ancient economic idols, regardless of the conditions to be met.

Production of foodstuffs is the prime necessity, while the production of war material is a close second. The producing of other things is subsidiary. The market is there for everything in these lines that can be produced. There is sufficient labor also, were it directed into the proper channels. Transportation and distribution must be regarded first from the viewpoint of the public interest, instead of as it is at present, for private profit, primarily. The first duty of the government is to have the available labor organized as it has its armies; take command of the production of the necessities of the hour, and of the transportation and distributive agencies, in the interests of the consuming public, and of the Dominion and the Empire. Then Canada would be upon a proper war basis.

OTHER VARIETIES

An advertising campaign among the Canadian people is being advocated to popularize the varieties of fish, which by the thousands of tons annually are being wasted in the Pacific waters. By this means, a market for these hitherto despised kinds would be created, much to the benefit of the fishermen, the British Columbia ports, and the people of the Dominion at large. This is not a new thing for a government to undertake. It has been successfully done before on two particular occasions in the United States. Some years ago there were shoals and shoals of a kind of fish which was not used commercially appearing from time to time on the Atlantic coast of the United States. It was called the tile fish. It had a high food value. The government took the matter up and by means of judicious advertising through the eastern states, created such a demand that the fishermen

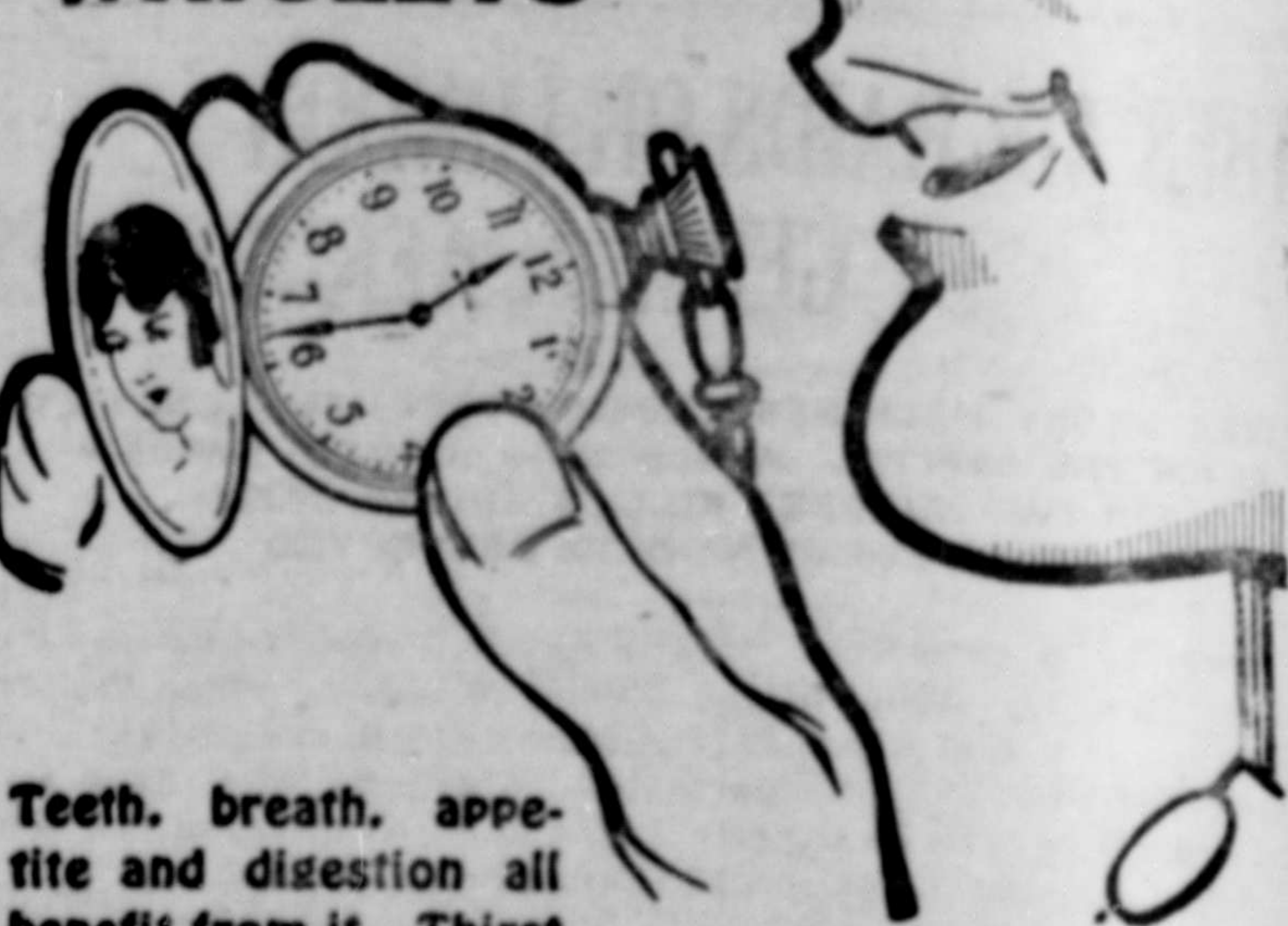

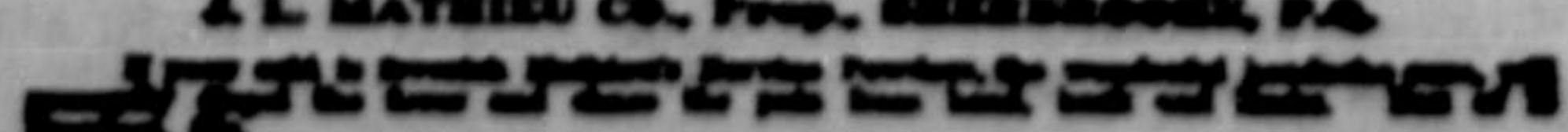

SCHWAB THINKS THAT THE SOONER THE BETTER

New York, Jan. 26.—Charles M. Schwab, president of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, declared in an address at a dinner here last night that the time is near at hand "when the men of the working class—the men without property—will control the destinies of the world."

"The Bolshevik sentiment must be taken into consideration," Mr. Schwab declared, "and in the very near future we must look to the worker for a solution of the great economic questions now being considered. I am not one to carelessly turn over my belongings for the uplift of the nation, but I am one who has come to the belief that the worker will rule and the sooner we realize it the better it will be for our country and the world at large."

Mr. Schwab's address was delivered at a dinner of the Alumni of Grammar School No. 40, of which he is a graduate. He said it was the first public dinner he had attended this winter and that he was present only because of his loyalty to the school.

CONSCRIPTION FOR FARMS AS FOR ARMY

Quebec, Jan. 28.—Conscription of men for work on the farms, on the same basis as men being conscripted for the army was the argument used by Hon. J. E. Caron, minister of agriculture, presiding at a meeting of the agricultural committee of the legislature last night to deal with the high cost of living.

"A delegation of labor men, the leaders of which were Narcisse Arcand, chairman of the Quebec executive of the Dominion Trades Congress, and M. Walsh, of Quebec, another member of the executive, objected to labor being conscripted for farms, claiming that it would not be fair to take men from \$5, \$6 and \$10 a day jobs to make them go on the land at \$1.10 daily.

"If it is fair to do so to get men for the army, then it should be fair to do it for the farms," said Mr. Caron.

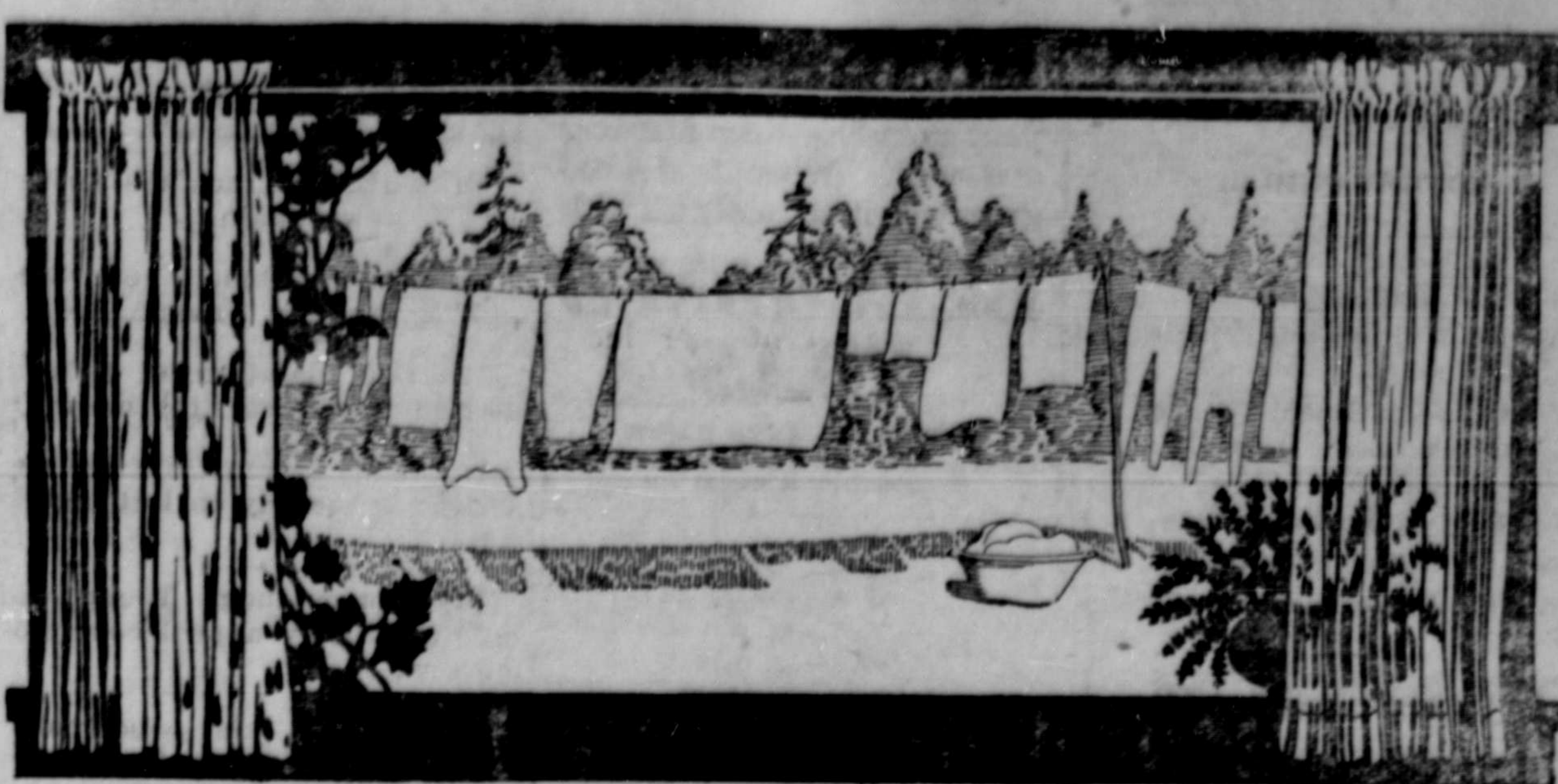

A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a brood hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

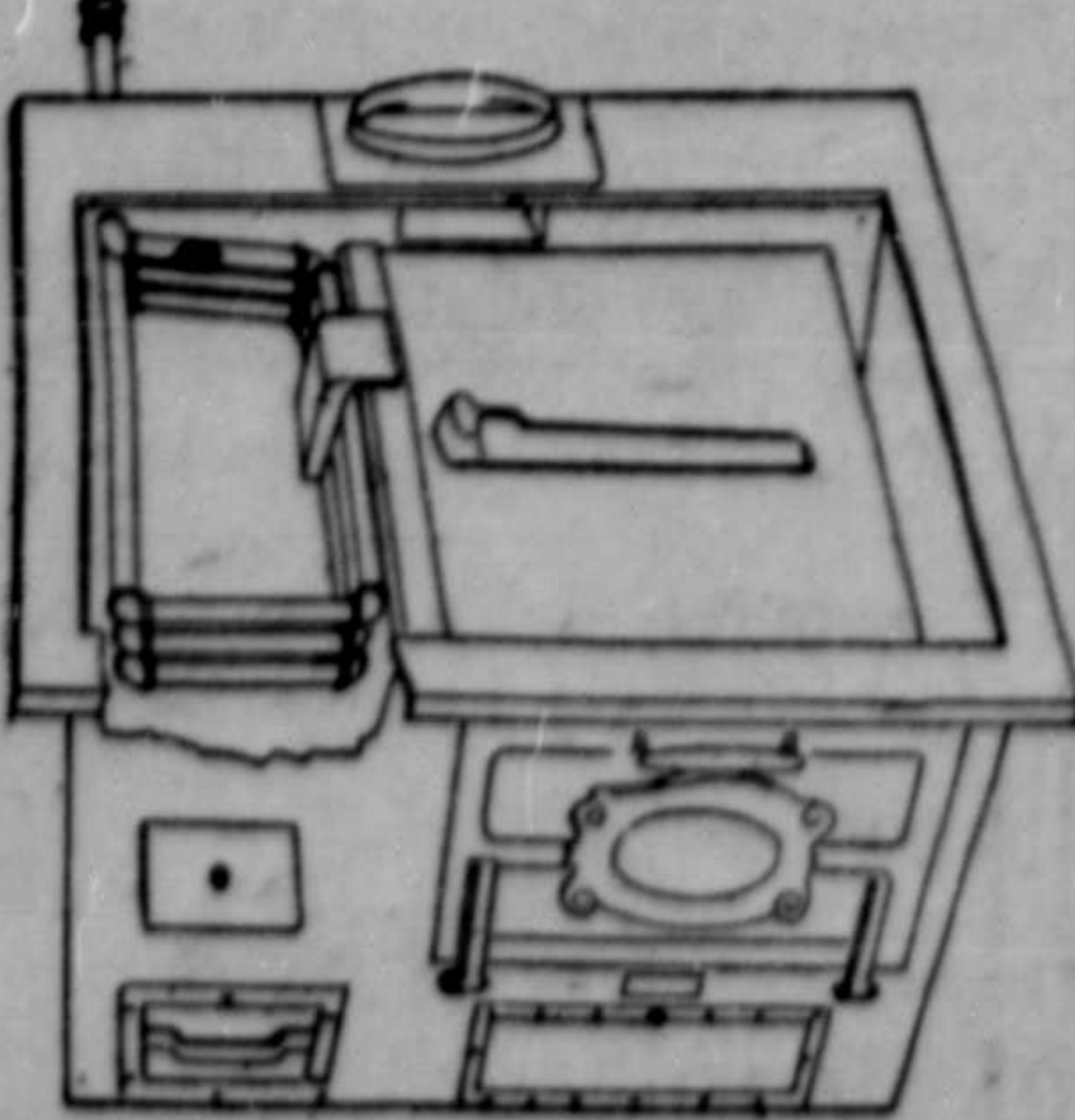
