STRIKE IN GERMANY IS BECOMING SERIOUS

ANOTHER AIR RAID ON ENGLAND--ITALIAN SUCCESS--BRITISH GUNBOAT SUNK

SWEEPING SUCCESS OF ITALIANS IN MOUNTAINS

AFTER THREE DAYS' FIERCE FIGHTING ITALIAN TROOPS REMAIN MASTERS OF THREE STRATEGIC HEIGHTS--GREAT CAPTURES OF PRISONERS, GUNS AND WAR MATERIAL IN ASIAGO

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, Jan. 31.—One of the most closely contested battles of the campaign has just drawn to a close after three days of hard and fierce fighting among the mountains to the west of the Brenta River. The Italian troops moved out to attack the Austro-German lines on the Asiago plateau, supported by a barrage from the allies' artillery, and have gained many sweeping successes. Three strategic heights, commanding the positions of the enemy remain in our hands, after a fierce struggle and hand to hand fighting. Important positions were also captured on Monte Caval Bella. The fighting has been of the bloodiest character, and hand grenades, bayonets and knives were the weapons which defeated the enemy finally. The Austro-Germans suffered

the most severe losses, two whole divisions of their picked troops being practically wiped out. They were caught in the open by the allied artillery barrage, which prevented their return, and the Italian troops made such excellent rifle practice on their front that there were very few of them left to be made captive. The prisoners total twenty-six hundred, including a hundred officers, of whom many belonged to German regiments. Six field guns and a hundred machine guns are also numbered among the booty, together with several thousand rifles and large quantities of ammunition.

This success by the Italian soldiers, in the face of very strongly held defensive positions, has once more shown to the world that as a fighter, the Italian soldier has the quality that makes for success.

STRIKES IN GERMANY ARE NOW GENERAL

Half a Million are out in Berlin And Numbers Increasing Hourly--Other Cities Are Affected.

London, Jan. 31.—Nearly half a million men are already out on strike in Berlin today and the number is hourly increasing, according to an Exchange telegram received from their Copenhagen correspondent. The movement is regarded as serious. The strikers are making demonstrations, which the police are powerless to prevent, and are crying "Give us food and peace." The distribution of foodstuffs in Berlin has again broken down and great misery and want exists among the poorer working classes. Demonstrations of the same nature are being made in the other provincial towns, and it is feared that the whole country will be at a standstill unless the strikers and the authorities can come to terms immediately.

GOVERNMENT STEAMERS FOR VANCOUVER

Four New Steel Steamers for the Canadian Government are to be Built by Wallace Shipyards.

Vancouver, Jan. 31.—Mr. H. E. Hodges, who is connected with the Wallace Shipyards, returned to Vancouver this morning from Washington and Ottawa. He brought with him word that the North Vancouver shipyards had secured orders for the building of four steel steamers for the Government of Canada. The work is to be started in May and the amount of money involved amounts to nearly \$5,000,000. The Wallace Shipyards is the first in Canada to announce the receipt of orders from the Dominion government, under the new shipbuilding programme, whereby the Government of Canada goes into the shipbuilding business. These four vessels are of the standardized type, and it is expected that there will be many other vessels built to the same design and specifications in different parts of the Dominion. This similarity makes for the economical construction of both hulls, engines and other fittings.

MANY OFFICIALS OF THE G. T. P. HEADING FOR PRINCE RUPERT

BOTH RAILROAD AND STEAMSHIP CO.'S HEADS VISIT CITY IN CONJUNCTION, AND IMPORTANT RESULTS EXPECTED. DEVELOPMENT OPERATIONS HOPED TO BE UNDERTAKEN THIS YEAR

The steamer Prince Rupert brought to town yesterday afternoon quite a number of the officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. Mr. G. A. McNichol, who had been south, returned to the city in their company. These gentlemen were Mr. J. S. Heaman, the chief engineer of the company; Mr. J. S. Armshaw, of the colonization department; Captain C. H. Nicholson, of the G. T. P. Steamship Co.; Mr. A. L. Brownlie, superintending engineer, while a special from the east is expected to arrive in town this afternoon bringing Mr. W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the G. T. P., accompanied by Mr. H. H. Hansard, the company's solicitor, Mr. H. Hewlett, of the telegraphs dept., and Mr. H. McCall, the general superintendent of Prince Rupert.

The coincidence of the arrival of these gentlemen in Prince Rupert is visiting the city today.

The traffic arising on the coast in an economical manner, and arrangements are presently under way for the further increase of their facilities. There are several pressing matters which will call for the attention of Mr. Hinton in connection with the development of Prince Rupert, as the terminus of the transcontinental railway and a deep sea port. It is understood that the necessity for these developments will arise in the very near future, and it is doubtless in this connection that Mr. Hinton is visiting the city today.

GREAT CONFLAGRATION OCCURS IN VIENNA

Amsterdam, Jan. 31.—One of the most destructive blazes which has ever occurred in the city of Vienna has just taken place, when the large grain warehouses and flour mills were burned to the ground. All the grain, flour and machinery has been destroyed, and as this constituted the main source of supply for the city and district, considerable hardship and suffering is bound to ensue, until other sources of supply, which are already scarce, may be located.

The fire is ascribed to the revolutionaries, who are suspected of incendiarism. The censor is still making himself evident and is permitting no information regarding the revolt in the city to be sent out of the country, nor yet any information as to the steps taken by the government to suppress it.

VICE-ADMIRAL STORY GOES TO HALIFAX

Ottawa, Jan. 31.—Vice-Admiral Story, commander at Esquimaux naval base, is to be brought east to replace Commander Martin, in command of the port of Halifax. Commander Martin, who has been in command at Halifax, will be transferred to Esquimaux.

CAMPAIGN TO SPEED UP FARM PRODUCTION

Toronto, Jan. 31.—A big campaign is likely to be inaugurated soon by the Ontario government for the speeding up of the production of the farms during the coming year. Recruiting stations are to be placed throughout the city, whereby men unable to serve at the front may serve at home by increasing the food production of the Dominion.

STORK'S MAJORITY CONFIRMED BY THE OFFICIAL COUNT

Yesterday was the day appointed by the returning officer for this district, Mr. John Flewin, for the counting of the ballots cast at the Dominion election on December 27th. The ballot boxes had been all returned from the widely scattered polling stations, and the counting yesterday confirmed the original count by the deputy returning officers at each poll. The total number of votes cast for Fred Stork numbered 2,043, while those for Colonel Peck were 1,519, giving to Fred Stork a majority of 524 votes. The number of spoiled ballots was 29.

This majority is large enough to show decisively the wishes of the greater number of the people resident in this parliamentary division, and as such, will command respect. Taking into consideration the number of soldiers' votes which were cast at the provincial election some sixteen months ago in the same territory, there is no reason to believe that the soldiers' vote in this election will affect Fred Stork's election to the Dominion House of Parliament.

SHIPPING LOSSES

London, Jan. 31.—The sinkings of British ships for the year up to and including week ending January 23, has been 1038 vessels, of which 763 were over sixteen hundred tons, and 270 under that figure. The joint losses of Italy and France have averaged three or four vessels weekly.

MAYOR TAKES ACTION RE FISHERY MATTERS

Following upon the meeting of the fishermen and those interested in the widening of the scope of the salmon fisheries, Mayor McClymont despatched the following telegrams this morning:

To Mr. A. A. Cunningham, Vancouver, B. C.,—"Prince Rupert citizens request your co-operation in having fishery regulations for District No. 2 amended to permit issue of salmon canning licences to all applicants, and that gas boats be permitted for use in gill netting salmon. Advise if delegation is going from Vancouver to Ottawa regarding fishery matters. Rupert may send delegation to co-operate."

A second telegram was also despatched to Premier Borden and to the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, worded as follows:

"At a public meeting of the citizens of Prince Rupert called for the purpose of considering fishery conditions in District No. 2, it was resolved that the government be requested, for the duration of the war, to eliminate all special fishery privileges, and to throw open all fishing grounds to the public, subject to such general regulations as are necessary to protect the fish. Meeting went on record as convinced that the fishery officials were too intimately connected with the salmon canning companies and requests that the inspectors be replaced by new officials with no local attachments, and further requests government to issue salmon canning licences to all applicants and to permit gas boats for fishing salmon with gill nets. Kindly advise when Fishery Advisory Board meets in Ottawa."

From the above it will be seen that his worship Mayor McClymont is fully alive to the necessities of the hour and is losing no time in getting after what is for the best interests of Prince Rupert and the fishing interests generally.

EMPEROR WILHELM FOR PEACE BY AGREEMENT

Rotterdam, Jan. 31.—The Emperor Wilhelm is in sympathy with the movement for peace by agreement, according to Professor Delbruck, of the University of Berlin.

OLD TIMER OF ATLIN FROZEN ON THE TRAIL

Mr. Herb Young, who has just lately returned from Atlin with the ballot boxes for the last election, brought with him the details of the death of Mr. Herb Brethour, one of the old timers of the Atlin country. Some time ago telegraphic information was received to this effect, but there were no particulars given. Mr. Brethour left Atlin, where he was engaged as superintendent of the hydraulic company's mining operations, to make Carcross, on the White Pass railroad, to get home to spend Christmas with his people in Victoria. He was travelling alone, and, there being no wind, was travelling without gloves.

After he had been on his way some time, however, the wind came up, which with the temperature 50 below, must have made the going pretty hard. He was found 4 miles from the Australian Camp, where the old Yukon trail and the Atlin trail meet, about a third of the distance from Carcross. Here there was a patch of glare ice, where he had evidently fallen. Unable to rise, he was frozen to death.

Herb Brethour was well known among the pioneers of northern British Columbia, and equally well liked, wherever he was known, and the many friends he had will regret to hear of his decease.

AGE LIMIT FOR OVERSEAS FIXED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Jan. 31.—Major-General Leckie, in military orders issued this morning, states the new age limit for the men going overseas. The orders are: "All men enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force, who are under eighteen, except as hereinafter specified, will be discharged. Action will be taken to have all the young soldiers examined by medical officers, and if any doubt exists as to their age, their birth certificates must be immediately procured before attestation. From this date, no men will be included in any overseas draft unless of eighteen years and six months."

DEVELOPMENT One of the matters which has been advocated for quite some time in this district, and even in other parts of the province is the closer control of the government of Canada over the disposal of the resources of the Dominion.

For instance, from two of the biggest producers on the British Columbia coast, a rough calculation shows that there are about four thousand tons of concentrates and blister copper sent out of this country per month.

When it is remembered that this four thousand tons comes from only two of the companies operating in B. C., it does not need much perspicacity to see that this refining could as well be done in the country of origin of the ore.

The situation with regard to Canadian nickel is a case in point. Even after the war had broken out the Germans were enabled to purchase manufactured and refined nickel which had been exported from Canada.

ed in its raw state for refining, it thereby passed out of the control of the Canadian government and was used against our own soldiers. Had it been refined in this country, the government could have known where the finished product went to and so controlled its disposal and prevented it getting into enemy hands.

The matter is one which calls for action in the near future. There is enough blister copper and concentrates produced in British Columbia, and even in Northern British Columbia at that to keep a refinery going.

HOW AUSTRALIA WILL LOOK AFTER SOLDIERS

New York, Jan. 26.—Methods adopted in Australia for the rehabilitation of returned soldiers were described by Crawford Vaughan, former Premier of South Australia, in an address at the Harvard Club today.

Soldiers' training farms have been established at which the men are given courses lasting from four to six months. They are paid \$1.50 a day for seven days a week, with double rations for a married man, single rations for single men and quarters.

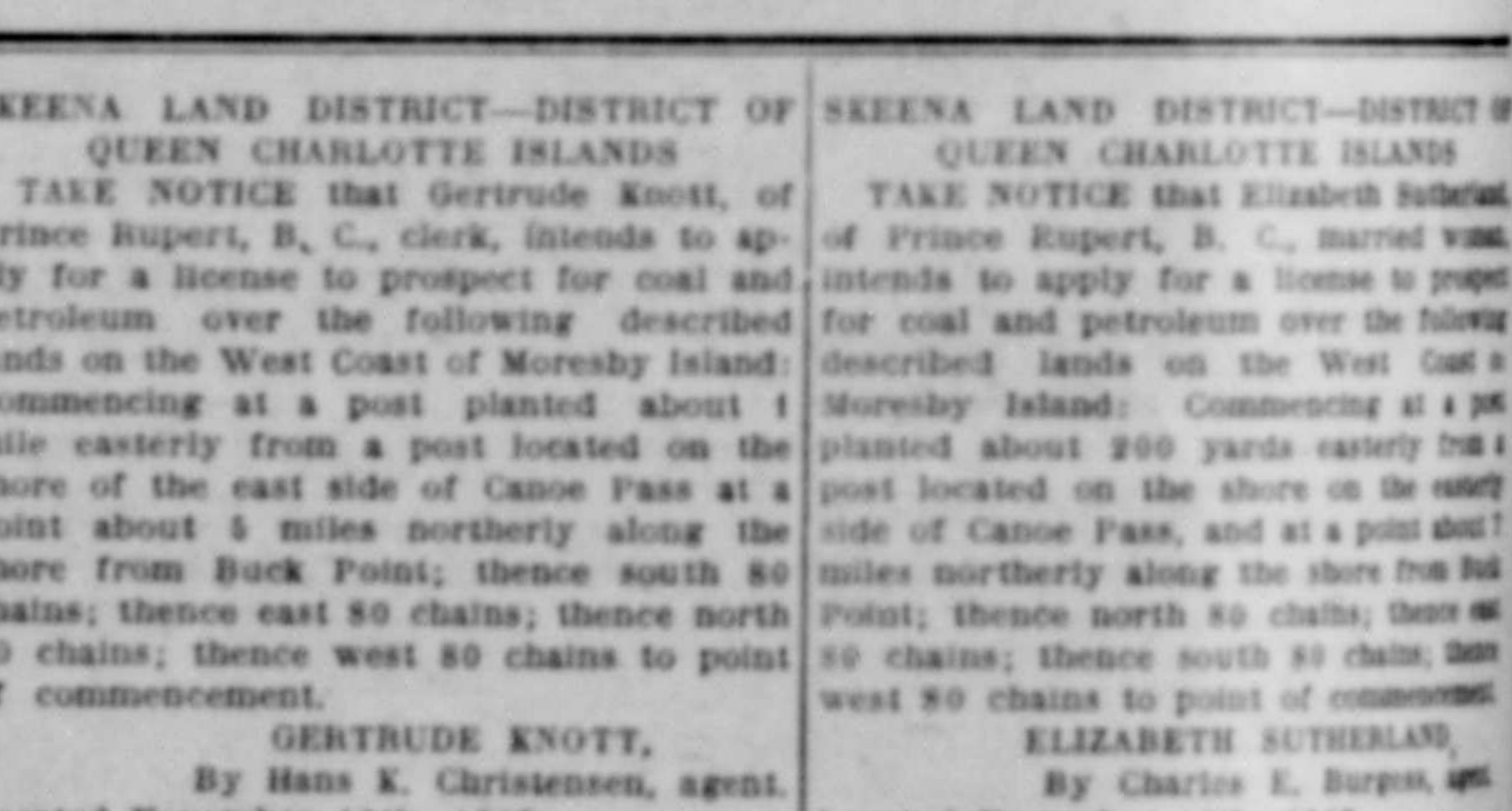

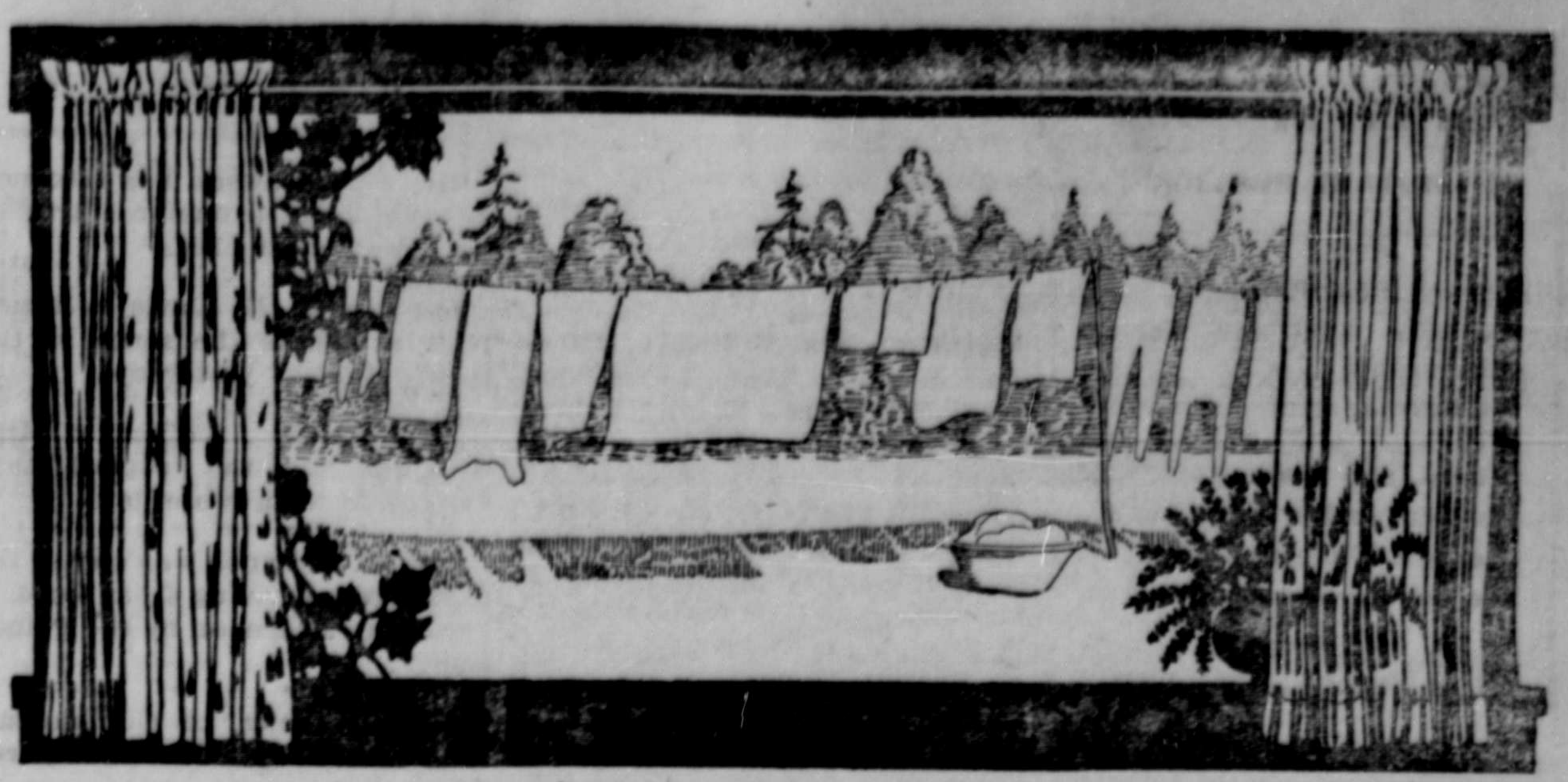

 The food that goes to the garbage pail from the average table will provide one-third the feed for a flock of 8 to 10 hens.
 Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.
 A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

How to go about it
 BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.
 CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.
 If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.
