## GERMAN ATTACKS ON FRENCH LINES REPULSED--NO NEWS FROM BRITISH FRONT

### THREE GERMAN ATTACKS ON FRENCH FRONT ARE REPULSED

HEAVY BOMBARDMENT IS MADE ON FRENCH LINES ON RIGHT BANK OF RIVER MEUSE, AND IN ALSACE—INFANTRY ATTACKS SUCCESSFULLY REPULSED—LARGE ENEMY LOSSES IN MEN AND MATERIAL

Paris, February 8.—A violent bombardment was opened yesterday upon the French positions on the right bank of the river Meuse and further south in Alsace. The German artillery fire reached to a greater pitch of intensity than has been apparent for weeks past, and following the preliminary bombardment, infantry attacks on a large scale were confidently expected by the French command. These developed in force at the north corner of the bois de Fosses, east of Samogneux, and on the French lines south of Hartmannswillerkopf. The first attack was easily met and broken up by the French seventy-fives, which did enormous execution in the advancing ranks of the enemy. A second attack followed and greater forces were thrown against the French positions, which was also repulsed after bloody fighting, while the third time the Germans advanced, they were met by a French counter-attack, and fierce encounters took place in the open.

The artillery barrage from each side effectually prevented reinforcements arriving with any promptitude, and the poils were successful in driving the Bosches back, thoroughly defeated. The Germans suffered enormous losses and the French troops made captures of large quantities of their war material. Many machine guns and trench mortars were taken from the German trenches, and the German prisoners captured were utilized in removing their own war material to the French lines.

North of Craonne, the enemy also attempted to attack the French advanced posts, but the skillful manner in which these were placed for enfilading fire rendered the enemy attempts abortive. The French casualties were small, while they were able to take severe toll of the enemy.

#### BOLSHEVIKI COMMANDER CAPTURED BY POLES

Amsterdam, Feb. 7.—A wireless dispatch received at Berlin from Kiev says the Poles have occupied Mohiliev, the Russian main headquarters, and have arrested Ensign Krylenko, the commander-in-chief of the Russian Bolsheviki forces, and his entire staff. The message adds that the Bolsheviki uprising at Kiev has been suppressed by the Ukrainians.

#### WIRE TROUBLE

#### VERSAILLES COUNCIL IS EMBRYO OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

London, Feb. 7.—The Chronicle's parliamentary correspondent writes:—

"Last week's conference at Paris demonstrated in a remarkable manner the value of the inter-allied council at Versailles. The fact that this council from its creation has been in almost continuous session, reviewing the military, naval and economic conditions materially ease the labors of the governmental chiefs of England, France and Italy when they met last week. Invaluable assistance was given by those experts and important decisions were facilitated as a result of a previous careful study. In short, the fruits of the work done at Versailles were so satisfactory that even some of those who originally viewed the constitution of this allied council with misgiving, now have been converted to belief in its indispensability. Lloyd George believes the Versailles conference is a league of nations in embryonic form.

#### SWISS LABOR UNIONS ASK DEMOBILIZATION

Paris, Feb. 7.—A dispatch from Geneva, Switzerland, to The Temps says that the Swiss Federal Council, at an extraordinary meeting at which General Ulrich Wille, Commander-in-Chief of the army, and his Chief of Staff were present, considered the ultimatum that had been issued to the Federal Council by the Swiss Federation of Labor, demanding demobilization of the Swiss army, beginning immediately and terminating not later than May 1.

The labor ultimatum also demands that deserters and recalcitrants, as well as men in the auxiliary services, shall be mustered out immediately and given their unpaid salaries.

The Federation of Labor unions adopted the resolution by a vote of 132 to 75, but the minority declared that the action was irregular.

#### CANADA AND U. S. MAKE LABOR AGREEMENT

Washington, Feb. 7.—Complete co-operation between Canada and the United States in the distribution of labor for war purposes was inaugurated today. The department of labor announced that by mutual agreement Canada will not import labor from this country without the consent of the United States, and American employers will not import Canadian labor without the consent of Canada.

#### MINING NEWS

The production of mineral from the Omineca district for 1917 has just been published, and shows that this district has more than held its position as a producer.

Development throughout the Hazelton district in particular during 1917 has been entirely satisfactory, and greatly in advance of former years.

The Rocher de Boule mine produced 1,058,943 lbs. of copper, being placed fourth in line of the big copper producers of B. C. Development at this mine during 1917 was up to former years and some very good ore located at the 4000-ft. level.

The Delta Copper Co., whose property adjoins the Rocher de Boule, will commence operations again in the near future. This company controls the Delta and Highland Boy groups on the south side of the Rocher de Boule mountain, and have done considerable development work on each of the properties. Several carloads of machinery have also been taken in and installed. The possibilities of this property are great and it is to be hoped that the company will be able to proceed with further development as soon as the snow goes.

The New Hazelton Gold and Cobalt Company's mine which is situated on the north side of the Rocher de Boule mountain, is showing up well. Their main tunnel is now in over 700 feet and in ore all the way. Some very high grade molybdenite was encountered near the face of the tunnel, and several car loads was mined and shipped to Ottawa for treatment.

The Comeau and Golden Wonder mines, situated on the north side of the Rocher de Boule mountain are developing properties that have the earmarks of producers. Considerable work has been done in each case and the results are highly satisfactory.

The Silver Standard Mining Co. operating the Silver Standard mine on Glen Mountain, about 7 miles from New Hazelton, produced during 1917 silver, 104,838 ozs.; lead, 287,673 lbs., and zinc, 236,184 lbs.

The developments at this mine have been very encouraging, and the company are now building a mill and concentrator, costing in the neighborhood of \$100,000. This new equipment will more than double the production at the Silver Standard mine. The company will also accept custom ore for treatment, and this should enable several silver-lead properties adjacent to the Silver Standard to commence operations.

The Harris Mines, Ltd., who own the American Boy property on Nine Mile mountain, are already shipping ore to the bunkers at the Silver Standard mill.

Mr. W. G. Norrie, the superintendent of the Silver Standard, is to be congratulated for taking the lead in the construction of their own mill. This appears to be the only solution of the difficulties met with in this field with regard to the high freight and smelting charges.

The new mill will be but three miles from New Hazelton. The business men there are wearing a smile these days, and it is to be hoped that it won't come off for some considerable time.

#### RE GAS BOATS AND SALMON FISHING

Following upon the action taken by the Independent Fishermen and Boat Owners' Association in order that owners of gas boats may be permitted to take part in salmon fishing, the following telegram has been received by Mr. G. W. Nickerson, the secretary of the Association, from the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

"Re motor boats, special commission reports evidence submitted both by fishermen and canneries directly concerned overwhelmingly against allowing introduction of motor boats at the present time in gill net areas, District No. 2. Action will be taken on recommendation shortly and those interested advised of decision."

In reply to this message, Mr. Nickerson telegraphed back to the Department as follows:

"Canneries against gas boats because they know it will break their monopoly in the north, as it has on the Fraser. Fishermen who are against it are those who are vassals of the canneries, and those whose only ambition is an apology for three meals per day and a place to sleep. If Rivers Inlet want to stay with antiquated methods, let them, but make the Skeena open to gas boats. Only sane reason against use of gas boats is question of injury to fish. You should consider no other argument. The uncertainty connected with your order in council permitting gas boats, has prevented fishermen making extensive preparations. Therefore, probably not more than fifty gas boats would take advantage of it on Skeena this year. Why not let it stand, and if this small number are found detrimental, the act could be repealed next season. It is not conceivable that your department will compel ambitious fishermen to stay with sail boats. We do not ask you to compel any man to use them."

It will be noticed that the government intend to take action upon the report of the Fisheries Commission shortly, and it would doubtless be for the good of the city of Prince Rupert that some representatives from this particular district were at hand, in Ottawa when this is being done. There is no saying how much longer the counting of the soldiers' vote will take, and until that is done, Prince Rupert has no member of parliament there to look after its interests.

This is an instance where direct representations ought to be made to the Department at Ottawa, by a deputation on the ground.

#### "PRINCE ALBERT" DUE WITH LADYSMITH COAL

Laden with three hundred and fifty tons of Ladysmith coal, and other merchandise, the "Prince Albert" is due tonight from the south. The Prince Rupert Coal Co. will once more be able to supply their customers with their accustomed firing material. The Ladysmith mines have been flooded for about a month past, which caused a restriction of supplies. The trouble at the mine, however, has now been overcome and the bright black diamonds from Vancouver Island are now plentiful.

#### TUSCANIA RAIDER SUNK BY BRITISH DESTROYER

Washington, February 8.—The total complement of the torpedoed "Tuscania" have been safely landed, with the exception of one hundred and one men, of whom no trace has been got. Several are known to have been killed by the explosion, when the big ship was torpedoed, while the remainder were drowned when the ship went down.

Satisfaction is expressed in Washington at an unofficial report that a British destroyer was successful in sinking the raider by a depth bomb. The dominant feeling throughout the United States, and in the army and navy is a desire to strike back.

#### COLONIAL EMPIRE IS STILL A GERMAN DREAM

London, Feb. 7.—One of the matters which is referred to consistently throughout Germany, and which was brought up at the peace conference at Brest-Litovsk was the desire which Germany has for the return of her colonies. The German government have started an educative campaign among the people on this question and lectures by prominent professors are being given simultaneously throughout Germany on this subject.

In choosing the Cameroons for his subject, one of Germany's notables, Professor Thorbecke, of Cologne, is most hopeful for the further spread of kultur among the natives at some future date.

"It is two years ago," said the lecturer, "since Cameroon, the last of our West African colonies, fell into British hands. There are many Germans who affect an air of resignation with regard to these matters, and pretend to find compensation for their losses in the happy establishment of firm relations between Central Europe and the East. But even admitting that these relations have been happily established, which is not by any means the case, it must be admitted that the Orient will never be able to supply us with the food and raw material we require and which hitherto we have drawn from our own and foreign tropical possessions." The lecturer pointed out that Cameroon and Togo at the outbreak of war were full of magnificent possibilities. He did not hesitate to say that had war not broken out West Africa would have become the brightest jewel in the German colonial crown. There is forest, savannahs, and steppe there which only require the careful hand of the German planter, cattle breeder, and lumberman to be turned into incredible treasure. It is impossible that the natives can do this. They can labor under careful German management, but that is all. Oil palms, cacao, tobacco, rubber, coffee, and many other products can be raised inexhaustively. In conclusion, the lecturer said that although the war had wrecked all the admirable beginnings which Germany had made in West Africa, and had wiped out the first early dawning of kultur among the natives, there still remains "the inestimable treasure of experience which we have gained, and which in future will assist us in establishing a greater and more powerful colonial empire."

#### HINDENBURG HOPES THE GERMAN PEOPLE WILL BELIEVE THIS

The Associated Press correspondent at The Hague writing on January 19th, says that travellers from Germany bring an account of a recent conference at Berlin at which Field Marshal von Hindenburg received the editors of thirty German newspapers, and discussed the food situation with them. The editors told von Hindenburg that by next May there would be no food in Germany.

"My reply is," said the field marshal, "that by next April I shall be in Paris."

#### PREPARATIONS MADE FOR U. S. AERIAL CORPS

London, Feb. 7.—The Press Association's special correspondent with the American army in France telegraphs:—

When the American air fighters begin arriving in large numbers they will find a corps of several thousand American air mechanics who have been trained in England, waiting to assemble the parts and repair the machines. Already many Air Service squadrons and aviation park repair squadrons are being sent to England, and when they are trained they will cross the Channel as they are needed. It is inadvisable to disclose the strength of the corps. It is sufficient that the Army Estimates have provided that more than enough efficient men shall be available at all times, as America's success in the air will depend primarily upon these men.

Extensive training quarters are being established. The Government at Washington has been asked to send to England 1300 bricklayers and carpenters and also hundreds of laborers for construction work at these training quarters. When they have finished their task they will be brought to France to complete other construction work.

RECONSTRUCTION

A glittering programme has been brought forth by a sub-committee of the Executive of the Labor party in Great Britain regarding social reconstruction. Taken altogether, reconstruction is hardly the proper term - for the report made by this subcommittee. It has more to do with recreation than reconstruction. A vast scheme has been submitted on behalf of the new social order, which it is proposed to have in place of the present condition of things.

The reason for the submission of this programme for the future appears to be that labor has been and is being defrauded of its rights, and that the fraud has gone so far, and has struck its roots so deep that nothing but a sweeping condition of State Socialism will remedy the evil.

The universal enforcement of the national minimum wage is the "first step in the scheme of reform." This must finally involve inevitably "the democratic control of industry" before and to make such minimum wage possible. This latter in its turn must lead to "a revolution in national finance," towards the final end, which is the "surplus wealth for the common good."

This is a very far-reaching scheme, and taken all round, would doubtless be very fine for the human race, once it is in operation. But it is to be feared that there will be considerable trouble and annoyance before this final state is achieved. The principle has been applied partly already. There are several public utilities which are already administered by the government, and by the municipalities, in many cases, with good effect. Were the same principle applied all round, to everything, this scheme would be in operation. It seems that it is not expecting too much either to see this put into effect in a much larger measure in the immediate future.

What is found to be a national necessity in time of war, such as government control of industry, cannot be a bad thing in time of peace. Production is co-ordinated, and the industries are viewed from a world-wide standpoint. In our modern civilization, there are many of the businesses which have brought to a high state of perfection through private enterprise. Many of these have become in effect public utilities, without which the people would be helpless. There are the means of communication, for instance, such as railroads and steamships, and in many other businesses, through mergers, competition has been reduced to a minimum, and certain firms have practically a monopoly in their own particular lines.

With the surplus wealth, which these "public utilities" produce year by year, utilized for the common good, instead of producing a future crop of millionaires, the British Labor man can see at hand the means for the putting of their scheme into operation, in order that the majority of the people would fare better. There are but few people who are unconscious of the inequalities which are existing at the present moment in our society, and still fewer who do not wish to see them removed as far as possible, and naturally it is left to the Labor party, who are the most conscious of these inequalities, to be the most anxious for their removal.

The expediency of their proceedings is being criticised severely, even the morality of their scheme, and even after that, the methods which they advocate for its carrying out will be the matter for much controversy. This of course is only to be expected. In this world objections are the easiest thing to find in connection with any proposal. Yet it must be said for the Labor party that they have the vision, and the idealism necessary for the period of reconstruction which will be so necessary after the war. And politics without idealism may be likened to a body without a soul.

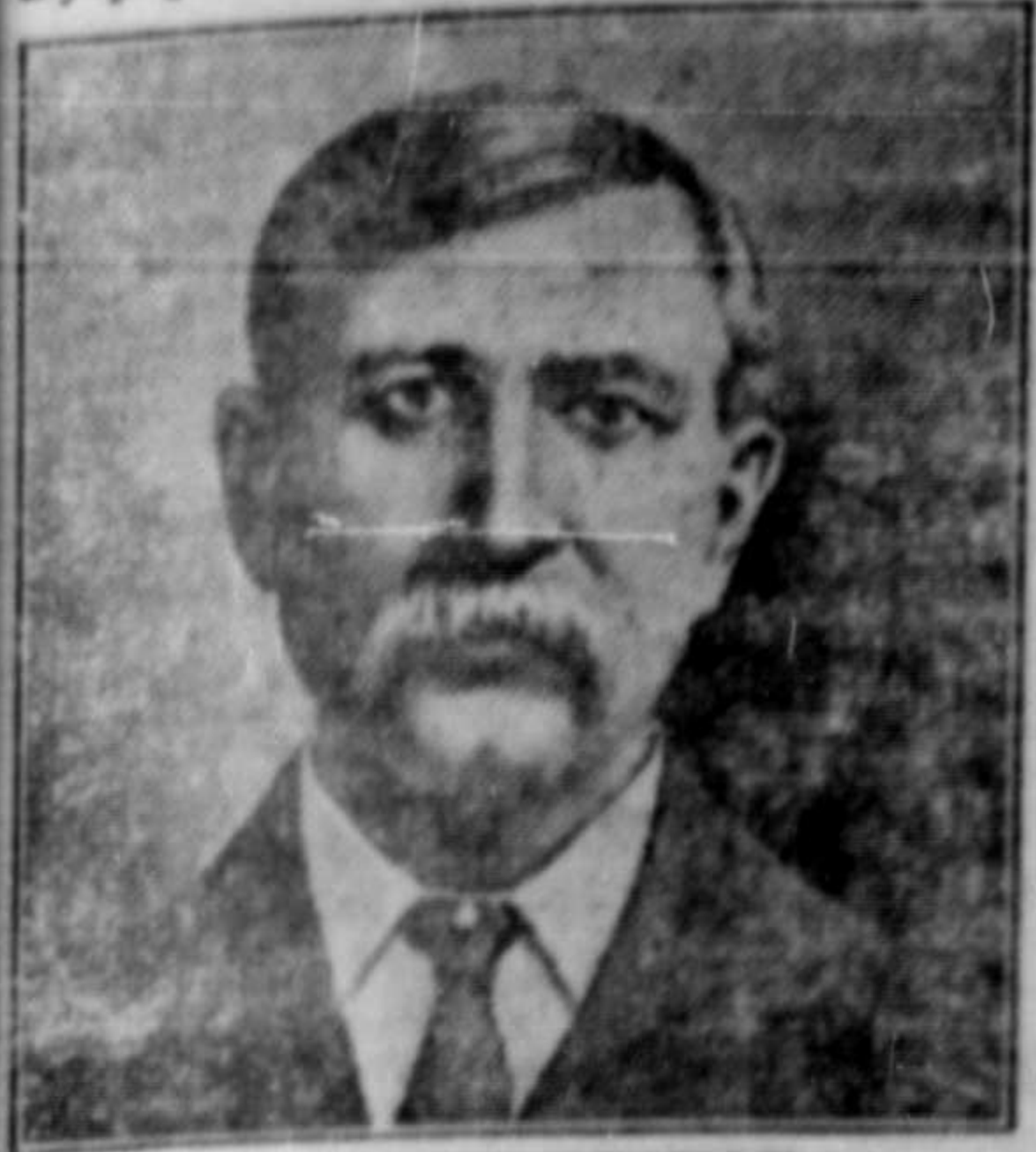

## STATES ARE PRODUCING ANTI-SUBMARINE BOATS

Washington, Feb. 7.—Production plans for the American navy's new anti-submarine craft contemplate the delivery of a finished boat every day when the cycle of production is complete. The first vessel has already been started in the fabricating shops of the Ford Motor Company at Detroit.

The design was worked out to reduce to a minimum the necessity of shaping plates. There are many flat surfaces to the vessel on that account, bent and curved plates having been avoided wherever possible.

The power will be furnished by geared turbines, and since stability and reliability were sought rather than freak performance, no effort has been made to go beyond a safe and conservative speed estimate.

Construction will go by stages. Materials that go into construction are fed into one end of the plant as rapidly as it is planned to produce the completed product at the other. The whole number of boats contracted for will be under construction simultaneously at one stage. The boats all will be fabricated at the Ford plant, progressing by stages until they are launched at Detroit, to be brought to the sea by way of the canal system and inland waterways. They will displace about 500 tons, which insures easy passage to the sea.

## TEST OF "GARABED"

Washington, February 6.—The Senate and House yesterday adopted the conference report on a resolution providing for a government test of the mysterious "Garabed" invention or discovery with its use guaranteed to the government during the war. T. K. Giragossian, of Boston, the inventor, says it will utilize free energy as motive power. The President did not sign a similar resolution passed at the last session.

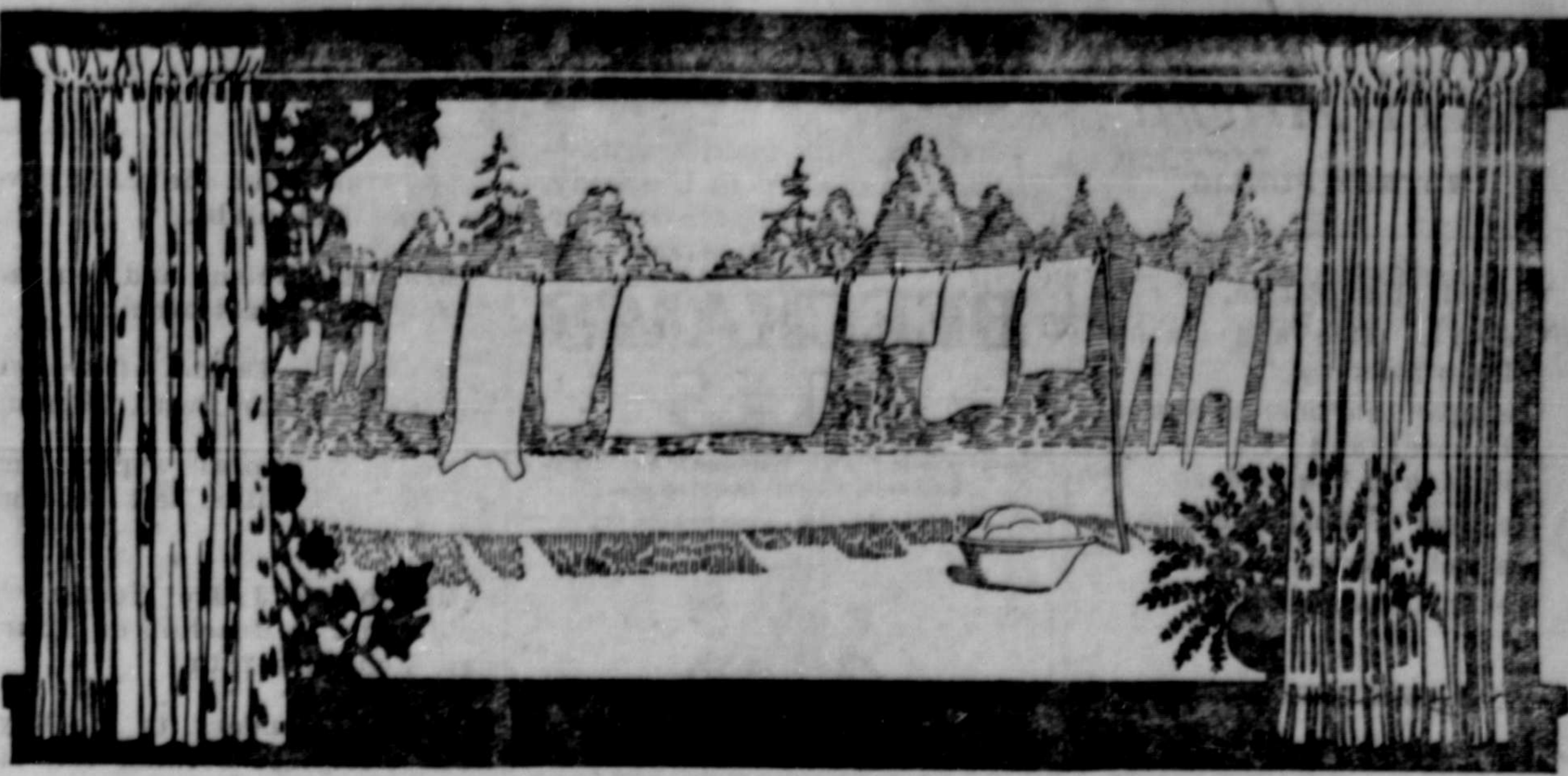

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

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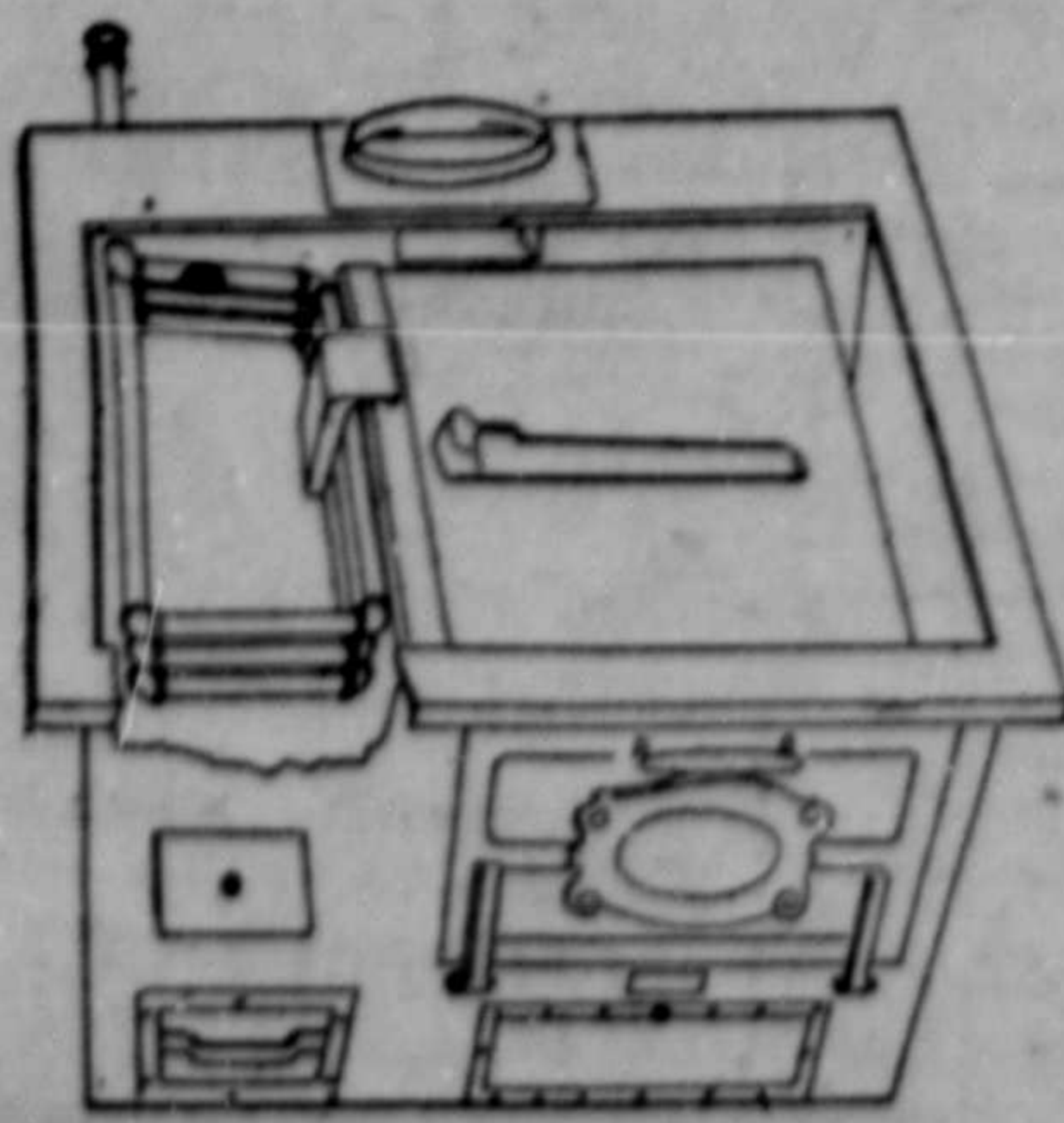
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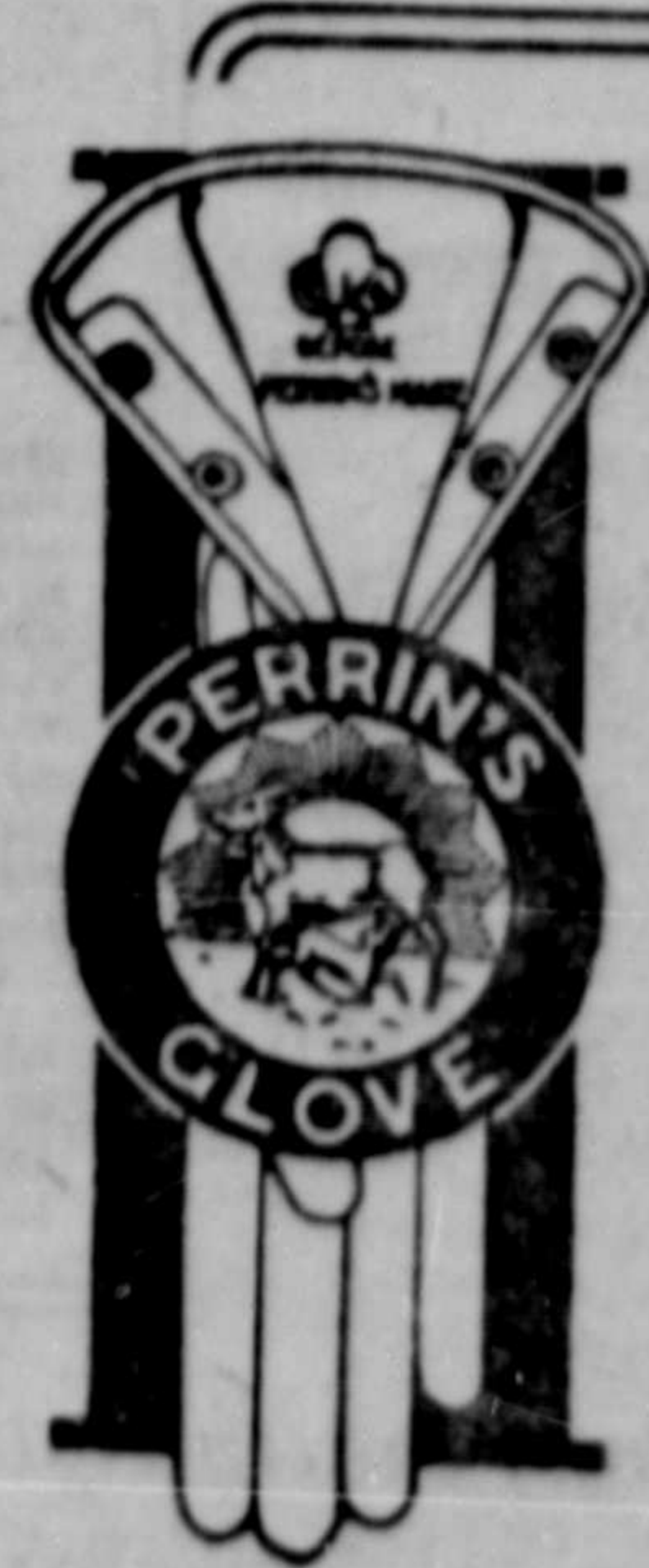
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
