PROVINCIAL HOUSE ADJOURNS FOR MONTH

PREMIER BREWSTER GOING TO OTTAWA --- MAY BE EMBARGO ON FISH EXPORTS

ADMIRAL JELLCOE SAYS THIS YEAR WILL KILL SUB. MENACE

FORMER CHIEF OF BRITAIN'S NAVAL STAFF MAKES CHARACTERISTIC CAUTIOUS SPEECH AND PLACES AUGUST AS DATE FOR END OF MENACE BY SEA—BELIEVES A BAD TIME COMING FIRST

London, February 11.—Admiral Jellicoe, former chief of the naval staff, speaking at Hull on Saturday said he was afraid "We are in for a bad time for a few months at by late summer—about August—I believe we will be able to say that the submarine menace is killed."

Admiral Jellicoe then continued: "I won't say before August, be-

cause I always notice that when we have an optimistic speech from the Premier, or any high official, it results in disaster about the next day. I have told the Premier often enough not to make optimistic speeches about the enemy submarines, because I usually found that we had to go over to the War Cabinet the next morning with a long list of losses."

SPY IS DISCOVERED WITH GOODS ON

(Special to The Daily News.)
An Atlantic Port, Feb. 11.—A German spy was reported last night to have been found among the first and second class passengers on the Dutch liner Nieu Amsterdam, who earlier in the day had been detained by federal agents for examination. After twelve thin sheets of paper covered with letters and code words had been found, the spy is said to have broken down and confessed to have been in the pay of Germany.

FOOD PROFITEERS TO BE PUNISHED IN U. S.

Washington, February 9.—The United States Food Administration announced tonight that definite action would be taken to punish dealers who increased the price to the consumer of various substitutes for wheat flour which must hereafter be used in the baking of Victory bread. It was stated officially that a number of complaints had been received against persons who were "taking advantage of the new wheat conservation programme to raise the prices."

To check this disloyal practice, the Food Administration announced that it would rescind the license of any licensee who did not give customers the benefit of fair and moderate prices, selling at no more than a reasonable profit above cost.

CANADA'S "DRY" LAWS WATCHED IN BRITAIN

London, Feb. 9.—The action of the new Canadian government in making the prohibition legislation of the various provinces "bone-dry" has provoked much favorable comment in this country. The control which the liquor trade has over Parliament is a matter for keen resentment to a large section of the people here, who take the uncompromising position that nothing but prohibition would prove a satisfactory solution of the serious problem which the operation of the traffic gives rise to in Great Britain during the present war. The rapid strides towards national prohibition made in Canada within the past three years have attracted widespread attention and been followed with the closest interest by the temperance forces of the motherland.

RECIPROCITY PRACTICED BY UNION GOVERNMENT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—Following upon a meeting of the Cabinet Council on Saturday night, it was stated that an order-in-council had been proposed, placing cattle on the free list, which would apply for the next twelve months. The order-in-council has not yet been signed by the Governor-General, and is, therefore, not officially passed.

It is significant of the soundness of the Liberal principles, for which Sir Wilfrid Laurier stood in 1911, although he was not returned to power then, that one by one the duties are being removed from many articles of trade between the two great North American nations. It is conceded here that it is only a matter of time until the free list embraces all traffic passing across the line, when reciprocity becomes an accomplished fact and Sir Wilfrid Laurier has the satisfaction of seeing his political opponents working out the details of his own policy, which they opposed so fiercely six years ago.

GENERAL RAILROAD STRIKE IN ARGENTINE

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 11.—A general railroad strike has been called through the Argentine today. Immediately upon quitting work, the strikers began wrecking the trains and burning the cars laden with wheat and other supplies.

PREMIER HAS BEEN CALLED TO OTTAWA

Owing to Sudden Call, Provincial House will Adjourn Today—All Provincial Premiers to Confer.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, February 9.—Owing to the necessity for the departure of Premier Brewster for the east, the provincial house is to adjourn on Monday until an early date in March, according to the plans made at present. This means that the work of this session, which it was expected, would get well under way on Monday, will be delayed. The premier has been called to Ottawa to attend a conference of provincial premiers.

MINING NOTES FROM THE OMINECA DISTRICT

At the annual meeting of the Delta Copper Co. held in Prince Rupert last week, the reports presented showed the company to be in excellent standing, with a mineral property which is regarded by every engineer who has examined it, to be most promising.

The property is fully equipped with camp and machinery and requires only a small amount of pipe and a short piece of tram on the west end to put it in working order. A great deal of development work has been done and a considerable tonnage of ore is all blocked out ready for mining. The property is fully equipped with roads and what ore has been shipped has given very satisfactory results.

Up to the present the company has devoted most of its attention financially to meeting property payments and have accomplished their purpose.

On the Higgins property on the old Babine trail, where J. B. Rowley has been operating since last September for the Exploration Department of the Goldfield Consolidated Co., the showings consist of several quartz veins varying in width from a few inches to several feet. The minerals carried are galena, zinc-blend and grey-copper, the latter carrying high silver values. Six or eight men have been employed all winter.

According to the preliminary report of the Department of Mines "There is a possibility of the revival of the old iron-sulphide property on the Eestall river, a branch of the Skeena. A number of tons were shipped to the Victoria Chemical Co. about fifteen years ago for the manufacture of sulphuric acid. It is controlled by Victoria interests and is, I understand, under bond to the Granby Co., which will diamond drill it in the spring to prove its copper content."

A recent issue of The Province under Hagin's column of mining news announced that the Cronin property in the Babines had been turned to New York parties for something like \$180,000. This property is one of the best silver-lead properties in this new country. A good deal of development has been done and a considerable tonnage blocked out of both shipping and milling ore. A new wagon road was built into it last summer by the government and if the new owners operate the property this spring it will be a good thing for the whole district.—The Omineca Herald.

THOUSANDS OF APPEALS YET TO BE DISPOSED OF

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—Fifty thousand appeals remain to be disposed of under the Military Service Act. There are now seventeen thousand young Canadians already in khaki, and it is expected that there will be twenty thousand of them by the end of this month. This is the result of the practical working out of the system of selective conscription. Fifteen per cent is the percentage of those absent without leave. It is confidently expected that by means of the system of recombining of exempted men, several thousand more recruits will be produced. Of the fifty thousand appeals, about thirty thousand of them are in the province of Quebec.

BUSINESS HAS TO FINANCE THE WAR

Advertising Expert Says Advertising is Necessary to Keep Business Going.

"Newspapers and street cars are our best mediums of advertising," declared Mr. T. A. Dewese, Director of Publicity of the Shredded Wheat Co. of Niagara Falls, N. Y., in addressing the Toronto Ad. Club lately. "We are burdened with magazines. We would be better, perhaps, if three-quarters of them went out of business. We in the States are entering upon intensive advertising. The drift in our country is toward the medium which covers our homes intensively—the newspapers. When a magazine wants to reach the people for possible subscribers it goes into the newspapers. What the magazine does ought to be a good thing for other advertisers to do."

Mr. Dewese said that it was a mistake in the States for people to talk of retrenching in business because of the war. He suggested that the motto should be "More Business Than Usual." "That is the war slogan that ought to be emblazoned here with the Union Jack." Business has to finance the war, and it can't be done out of savings. The only way business can do it is by going right on as in ordinary times.

Canada was no doubt wise to stop the waste of barley and other grains required for food. A little sanity and sense and a little less hectic hysteria is what we need. If business must go right on, advertising must go right on. Every dollar must be kept at work. He classed as criminal offences the hoarding of money, and the stopping of production. It is right and proper that everyone should save all that is possible, but regarding the cutting out of advertising as a saving is a false doctrine. Verb. sap.

EMBARGO MAY BE PLACED ON THE EXPORT OF FISH

Western Food Controller Has Already Refused Licence to Export Four Cars to United States.

Winnipeg, Feb. 11.—British Columbia may not be permitted to export fish in future to the United States, it was reported from the office of the Western Food Controller today. Licences for the export of four cars of fish intended for export into the United States were refused by Mr. E. A. Phillip, the western regulator of fish. This particular fish in question belonged to four different companies, located in Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

ARTILLERY ACTIVE ON ITALIAN FRONT

Rome, Feb. 11.—There was considerable artillery fire along the Italian mountain front over the week end, between the Brenta and Piave rivers. Italian aircraft carried out offensive raids near the Austrian lines, dropping tons of bombs.

THE NEW HALIFAX HAS NEW REGULATIONS

Halifax, February 9.—Drastic changes in the city's street traffic regulations have been passed by the Board of Control, and will now go before the City Council for approval.

The new regulations provide for people keeping to the right, instead of the left, and one-way traffic on certain congested streets. All classes of vehicles are subject to stringent laws. Even baby carriages are provided for, one rule being to the effect that baby carriages may not be wheeled two abreast on the sidewalk.

MILITARY ASSISTANCE IN FARMING OPERATIONS

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 9.—As an outcome of the recent conference held by Provincial representatives with Hon. T. A. Crerar, Minister of Agriculture, at Ottawa arrangements have been made for the creation of Leave of Absence Boards in each Province for the purpose of passing upon the release of soldiers, drafted under the Military Service Act, for participation in farm labor. The idea is for the men to assist in seeding operations, but they will be held under military discipline, and must engage in actual farming operations, returning to their depots when this work is finished.

COALS TO NEWCASTLE

When being loaded for one of her recent trips to the Queen Charlotte Islands, among the other freight which the steamer took from here was sawn lumber. Taking sawn lumber to the Queen Charlottes, where lumbering is the chief industry is anomalous. On a par with this is the Atlantic codfish and herring which are to be seen offered for sale in the stores of Prince Rupert. The futility of carrying coals to Newcastle is proverbial, and the bringing of fish to Prince Rupert is about as bad, or rather, ought to be. This is the more evident at the present time, when the energies of the railway companies are so much in demand.

If it pays the fish curers to send cured fish all this distance from the Atlantic seaboard, it ought surely to be a paying proposition to cure and salt these same varieties of fish right on the coast where they are consumed. Economically, there can be little justification for hauling food stuffs over three thousand miles for consumption at a point where it is possible for similar fish to be landed fresh. There is room for a very great extension of the fish curing industry right on this coast, which should mean a very great deal to the prosperity of the province.

STRINGS

One of the noticeable things about this part of the British Columbian coast is the manner in which former residents are always inclined to come back. This place, somehow or other, seems to have strings upon the majority of those who have once lived here. Whether this will remain a fact after the city becomes built up, with skyscrapers and multitudinous street car lines, with innumerable factories and shipyards and so forth and so on, as imagination has had for the last eight years or so, or otherwise remains a matter for the future to decide. Speaking lately with one who had been away for some time, and who had come back, the enquiry was put as to the reason which was

found to just because Rupert was Rupert. There is something potent in the attraction which this city holds for its citizens, whether temporarily sojourning elsewhere or not. While apparently inexplicable, it means a whole lot. It matters not that when here, the weather and Jupiter Pluvius particularly may be cursed at times, and sometimes, too, with vigor, still the attractiveness remains with Rupert's absent citizens.

QUEBEC

The French-Canadians in Quebec have been coming in for some rather severe criticism during the past few weeks over the resolution which was to have been and was introduced into the Quebec Provincial Parliament upon the subject of the withdrawal from confederation. As at first given out, all that could be understood from the dispatches received was that Quebec wanted to retire from her connection with the Dominion. And on that account, the citizens of Quebec had many hard things said about them.

It now transpires, however, that the resolution was a very different thing. It really meant that Quebec was willing to retire from her association with the other provinces, if they considered that Quebec's presence an obstacle to the unity and development of the Dominion. This resolution put the matter up to the other provinces, which is a very different thing from that suggested by the first dispatch from Quebec on this question.

THE REAL FACTS

send reinforcements to the boys in the trenches, seem to think that now the production of foodstuffs is the first duty of Canada, even more so than the despatch of further soldiers. One fact remains, that Canada cannot send her manhood to France, and at the same time utilize her every energy in the production of more wheat. Before the 17th of December, the Borden government could see nothing else for Canada to do than to send reinforcements to the front. The necessity was urgent. Anyone who called attention to the equally great, and perhaps more essential duty of producing more food was dubbed "traitor" and other equally generous appellations.

The urgency of the need of these reinforcements is apparently past, and the urgency now is for foodstuffs. The issue of compulsory military service was apparently wrong. It should have been compulsory agricultural service. And the latter service may prove yet to be the greater which Canada can render to the empire. If the need for food, however, proves, as it most likely will, and which was pertinently pointed out at the time, to be greater than the need for more soldiers, Sir Robert Borden will be shown to have been a poorer judge of the national necessity than a man in his position has any right to be.

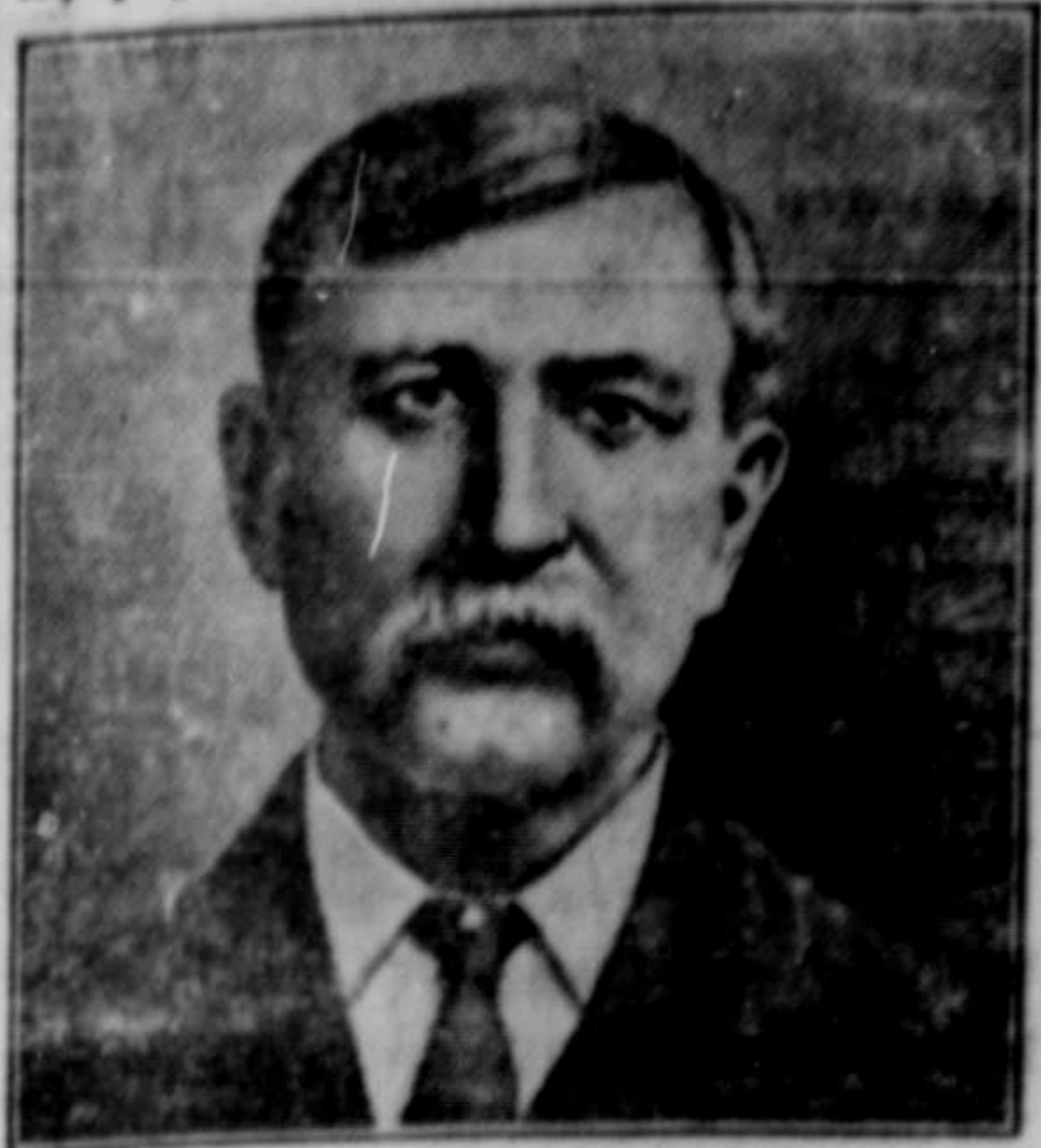

NORWEGIAN GOVERNMENT TAKES OVER WHALING

London.—Recently the Norwegian Government appointed a "Fat Committee" to consider the shortage of fats for domestic purposes and to suggest remedies. After a conference with experts the committee, according to reports in the Norwegian press, has reached the conclusion that in present circumstances the whaling industry must be carried on under State control. It is pointed out that all the Norwegian whaling vessels are now in the service of the State, protecting the country's neutrality, so that it is only the Government that can release ships for the use of the industry. On the other hand private firms would not engage in whaling unless they were given concessions and privileges extending over a number of years, and in any case they would demand high prices for the oil and other products. The Fat Committee estimates that under State working the whaling industry could produce 5000 tons of oil. The Provisioning Department, which is in agreement with the conclusions of the committee has, it is stated, already sent an expert to survey the coast and find suitable places for the establishment of State whaling stations, and several have already been chosen. Norway's normal consumption of foreign (imported) fat products for domestic purposes is estimated by the committee at 22,000 tons; all of which must now be produced at home, and in addition to this there is the large quantity required for industrial uses. It will be possible by exercising economy to reduce the consumption, but it is absolutely necessary to increase the home production. The country's production of fish oils (cod liver, herring, seal, and bottle-nose oil) is between 10,000 and 12,000 tons and this, it is thought, can be increased, especially in the case of herring oil. On the other hand there is not much prospect of developing the output of seed oils (rape, linseed, etc.). Thus the most promising field for covering the country's oil defects seems to be the whaling industry.

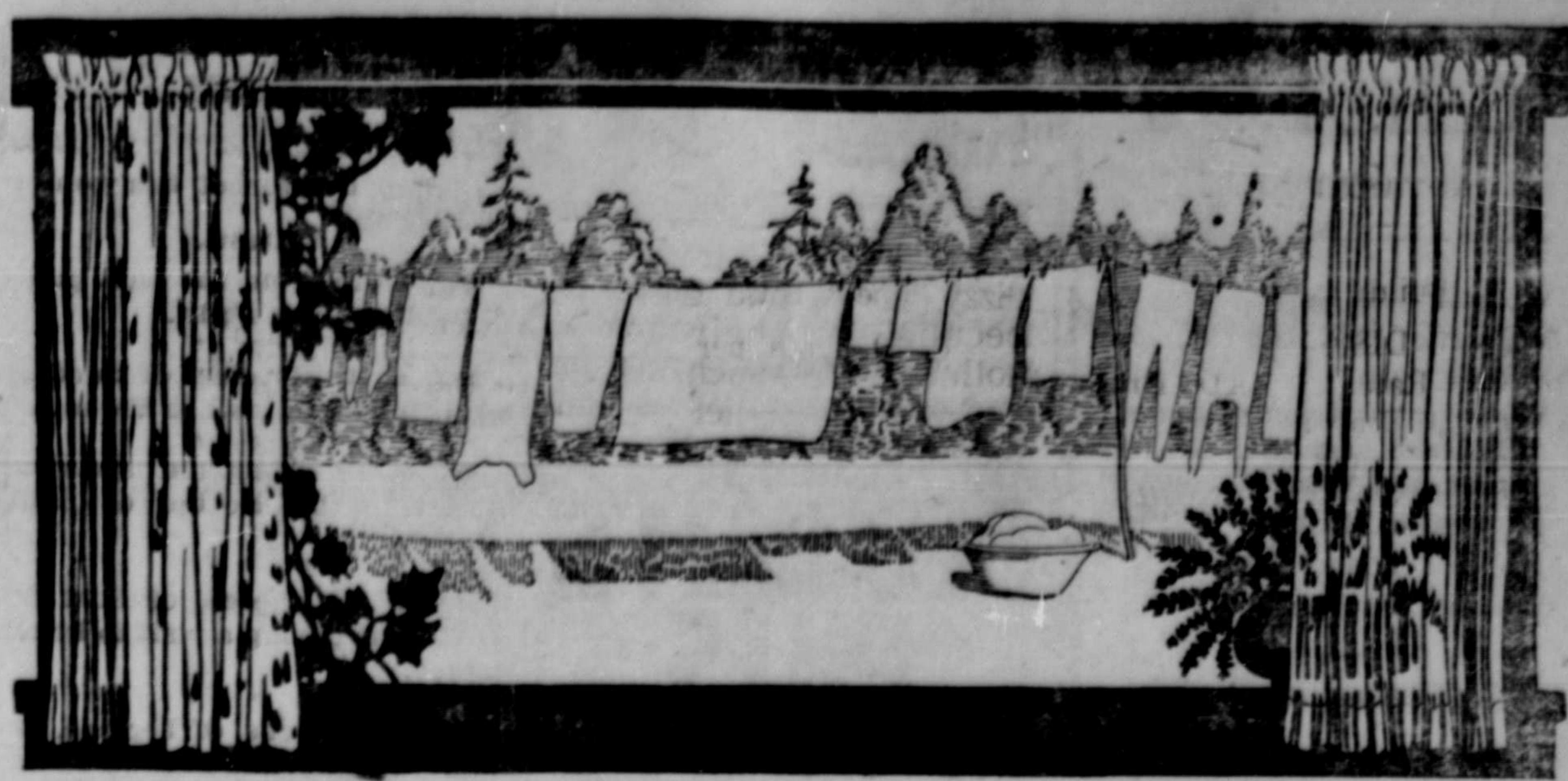

The cost of meat is the heavy item in the food bill.

Poultry and Eggs will help take the place of meat.

The food that goes to the garbage pail from the average table will provide one-third the feed for a flock of 8 to 10 hens.

Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.

A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

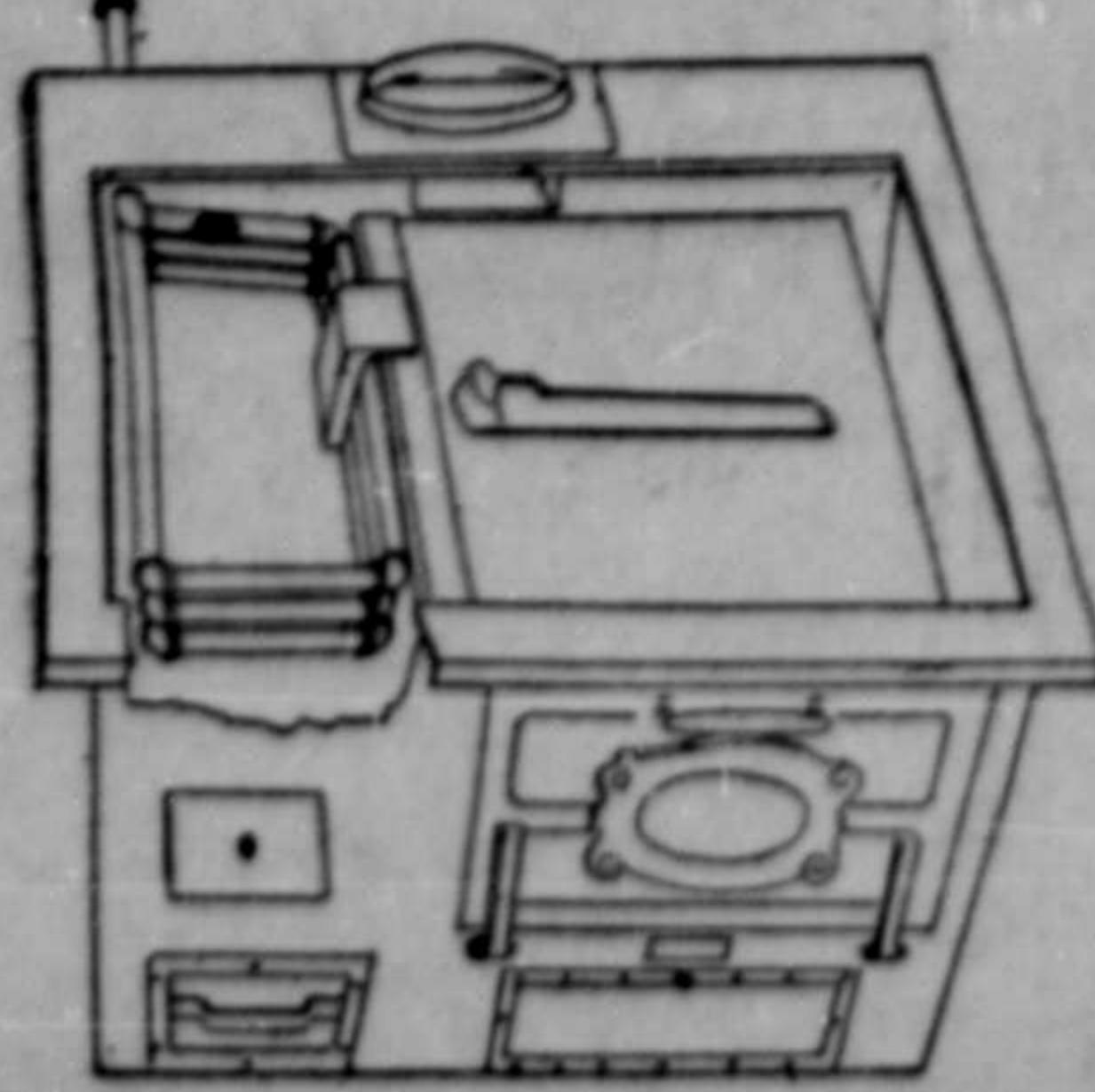
