## HUNS' PEACE TALK HAS NO PEACE MEANING

### LLOYD GEORGE DISAPPOINTED AT VAGUE STATEMENTS OF HUN DIPLOMATS

#### RUSSIA STOPS FIGHTING, BUT HAS SIGNED NO PEACE TREATY

**BOLSHEVIKI GOVERNMENT LEAVES CENTRAL EMPIRES AT WAR WITH NO ONE TO FIGHT WITH—CURIOUS SITUATION—BRITAIN WILL NOT RECOGNIZE PEACE PACT WITH THE UKRAINA**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, February 13.—Russia's withdrawal from the world war, officially confirmed today, has resulted in one of the most amazing and complex situations in the history of the world. Without observing any of the usual formalities, one of the biggest nations on the earth at the present time, represented by Trotsky for the Bolshevik government, has just backed off the field and left the Teutonic armies nothing to shoot at.

There has been no formal peace agreement, and Trotsky says there will not be any either. The Central powers are left in the ridiculous position of being at war with Russia, and with nobody to fight. What the result of this apparently queer situation will be is hard to say. There is evidently nothing in the shape of armed forces to prevent the German armies penetrating further into Russia, and helping themselves to whatever foodstuffs, merchandise or even territory they may want. Whether the Germans will quit making any further conquests at the expense of the Russian empire remains to be seen.

#### GREEK POPULATION CHEER FOR ALLIES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Feb. 13.—Great indignation was expressed at a mass meeting of forty thousand of the Greek population here, with the sedition incident at Lamia lately when Greek infantry regiments mutinied. The meeting demanded the general mobilization of the Greek army. Great crowds marched through the streets cheering for the allies.

#### SKINS OF FISHES MAKE FIRST CLASS LEATHER

St. John, N. B., February 12.—At the meeting of the International Fisheries Commission which is sitting here, Mr. Redfield, Secretary of Commerce in the United States, referred to the increase in the use of fish in the United States and predicted the time would come when fish would be sought for the purpose of tanning their skins into leather.

He exhibited several pieces of leather manufactured from shark skins. The leather was of various grades and quality. He also showed a tough hard leather, which was made from the skins of the greyfish, which was better known as the "dogfish." The business of tanning fish skins is a growing one.

#### KING GEORGE OPENS BRITISH PARLIAMENT

**In the Speech from the Throne, His Majesty Tells of Imperial War Cabinet Again Being Convened.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, February 13.—At the opening of Parliament today, His Majesty King George, in the speech from the Throne, intimated that the Imperial War Cabinet would be again convened to discuss matters of importance relating to the welfare of the Empire and that the representatives of the British Dominions across the seas had been summoned to a further session.

"The struggle in which we are engaged has reached a critical stage, demanding more than ever our united energies and resources," King George declared. "I have summoned representatives from my Dominions and my Indian Empire to a further session of the Imperial War Cabinet, in order that I may again receive their advice upon questions of moment, affecting the common interests of the Empire."

More than a year ago, the Colonial Premiers all met in London, in conference with the British War Cabinet, and the questions brought up in relation to the different parts of the Empire affecting the successful prosecution of the war were decided upon.

#### BRITAIN RECOGNIZES NO PEACE WITH UKRAINA

London, Feb. 13.—It was learned authoritatively here today that Great Britain will not recognize any peace between Germany and those delegates signing the pact of peace for the Ukraina.

#### GERMAN OFFENSIVE COMING THIS SPRING

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Feb. 13.—Major von Oiberg, of the German General Staff, speaking at the Colonial Society at Berlin, declared that Hindenburg would undertake a great general offensive this spring in the great endeavor to crush the forces of the allies, and so end the war by leaving Germany victorious.

#### ATTACKS UPON ALLIES' LINES ARE REPULSED

**Both French and Italian Troops Successfully Throw Back German and Austrian Attempts.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Feb. 13.—The Germans made an attempt at a raid in the region of Juvincourt yesterday, which was broken up by our fire, before it reached our lines. On the right bank of the Meuse, the enemy launched an attack in force on the Caurrières Wood front, which resulted in a spirited combat. The enemy was repulsed. His forces fled hurriedly, leaving their dead in our hands.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, Feb. 13.—The Austrians yesterday renewed their attack upon the northern front, west of the river Brenta, but they were held in check by the Italians. The Austrian columns were torn to pieces by the Italian artillery and the attacks were brought to a standstill. Very severe losses were inflicted, before the enemy finally decided to refrain from any further attack.

#### FRANCE CAN CAN FOR U. S. TROOPS

Paris, Feb. 12.—An agreement has been concluded between the French and American governments by which the canned fruit and vegetables required by the American Expeditionary Forces will be supplied by France. This action was taken after a joint investigation by experts of the United States Army Purchasing Board and French authorities showed that the normal fruit and vegetable crop in France was sufficient to supply both armies as well as all domestic needs.

The Americans will be required only to import sugar for preserving the fruit and tin plate for the manufacture of cans. These materials will be sold to the French Government, which will apportion them among private manufacturers.

The American Army Purchasing Board expects that by purchasing canned goods in France there will be a saving of 70 per cent. on the tonnage required for canned goods. The monthly canned food requirements for 25,000 men is estimated at 350 tons. Fifty tons of this represents sugar and tin plate, which will be imported, thus saving 300 tons of shipping space.

#### PARLIAMENT TO BE SUMMONED NEXT MONTH

**Immediately Result of Soldiers' Overseas Vote is Received New Parliament Will Be Called to Meet.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—The counting of the soldiers' vote cast in Canada will likely be completed by the middle of the next week. The ballots are being entered in the poll books, and this part of the proceedings should be completed in a few days. The actual counting should not take more than three or four days.

The accounting for the overseas vote is taking longer and the results from the votes cast in Europe will not be known until the end of this month. As soon as this result is known, the new parliament will be summoned to meet in Ottawa. There are rumors that the house will not be called to meet until after Easter, but it is understood that the government is very anxious to have Parliament meet at the earliest possible date, and the most likely date is March 21.

#### WAR LEGISLATION TO BE DISCUSSED

Washington, Feb. 13.—President Wilson will begin tomorrow a series of conferences with the leaders of Congress, both Republican and Democrat, touching upon all phases of the war legislation.

#### CANADIAN RAILWAY TROOPS IN ACTION

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—That Canadian Railway troops actually served in the front line for a period of 36 hours when the train on which they were returning to camp was cut off by advanced parties of the enemy, is revealed by a report issued from the Militia Department here. The report states: "Two companies of Canadian Railway troops had a novel and exciting experience when the train on which they were returning to camp was cut off, in the vicinity of Gouzeaucourt, by advanced parties of the enemy armed with machine guns. The driver and fireman were killed, and as the track was broken by shell fire, the train had to be stopped and abandoned. Several of the men became casualties through enemy machine gun fire. The battalion in question offered its services to the Army Commander for pioneer work and the offer was accepted. Eight platoons under the commanding officer in person actually served in the front line area for 36 hours."

#### CENTRAL POWERS DECLARATION HAS NO REAL PEACE MEANING

**PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE DISAPPOINTED WITH LACK OF SUBSTANCE IN STATEMENTS BY CZERNIN AND VON HERTLING—SUCH INDEFINITE WORDS LEAVES THE ALLIES NOTHING TO DO BUT FIGHT ON**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 13.—Commenting upon the recent speech by Count Czernin in reply to President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George told the House of Commons today that when it came to the real substance of the demands of the allies, Count Czernin was adamant. The premier said he had read with profound disappointment the replies given to President Wilson, and to the declarations of the British Government by von Hertling and Czernin.

The premier added that it was perfectly true that as regards the tone of the two speeches, there was a great deal of difference between them, and he wished he could believe that there was an equal difference in substance.

"There is no real peace meaning in either von Hertling's or Count Czernin's declarations. There is no word with regard to Belgium or Poland, or the rights of France or Italy. In the absence of anything definite, it is our duty to go on with the war."

#### LIVED FOR SIX DAYS ON MUSH AND PORCUPINE

Mr. William Lang, of this city, is a fisherman, who had the misfortune to lose his boat recently while coming down from the Portland Canal. He was cast away on one of the little uninhabited islands at the entrance to the canal and waited. There was nothing else to do. A bag of mush was all that he had been able to save from his boat when she sank, which together with a wandering porcupine, which he managed to kill, formed his sole diet for the space of six days. In order to vary it somewhat, he had mush and porcupine for breakfast, and porcupine and mush for lunch, and so on.

In due course, however, and after the wrecked man was tired of his restricted meals, he was picked up, and arrived here the other day. He hopes to be able to save his engine in his wrecked boat.

#### ICED CAKES ARE A WASTE OF SUGAR

Unofficial word comes from Ottawa that the Food Control authorities have been very pleased with the way some of the candy manufacturers have endeavored to meet the crisis, and have been using corn syrup, honey and other substitutes for sugar in the making of their sweets. But there are still a good many housewives who have not yet earned Government commendation, and whose iced-layer cakes still proclaim to the world that their makers are either rather stupid or very selfish.

We hear a good deal about "eggless and butterless" cakes, and the makers take much credit to themselves for war-time thrift. It would be much better if they would put eggs and butter in their cakes, and stop putting icing on them. Cakes made with good butter and eggs repay in food value the time and fire expended in making and cooking. An iced cake, lacking eggs and butter, wastes sugar, fire and time, as it adds very little to the bodily nourishment of the consumer.

Judging by the frequency with which iced cakes appear upon the tables of the average Canadian housewife, this iced cake would appear to be very popular. It cannot be said that it is popular for its own sake, and the very popularity of this easily made cake constitutes a reflection upon the housewife who never makes any other kind of cake. Fruit cakes and sultana cakes are much more nourishing, if a little more trouble.

#### BRITAIN DEMANDS RELEASE OF AIRMEN IMPRISONED BY HUNS

London, Feb. 12.—A Reuter dispatch confirms that Britain, through Holland, has informed Germany that unless the captured British airmen, Capt. Scholtz and Lieut. Wookey, who were sentenced to long imprisonment for distributing leaflets in Germany from the air, be released and treated as ordinary prisoners of war, Britain will be compelled to make reprisals and a month's notice will be given in accordance with the arrangements reached by Lord Newton's recent mission to The Hague.

Britain will not admit that the airmen, according to the German contention, committed a breach of international law, and points out that Austro-German airmen repeatedly dropped pamphlets in this manner.

#### NEWFOUNDLAND AND WASTE IN FISHERIES

London, Feb. 12.—Ex-Premier Morris of Newfoundland, addressing the Aldwych Club on the possibilities of Newfoundland's fishing industry, said that before the war their lobsters were all sold to Germany, where they were canned and exported to England, if not back to Newfoundland. The salmon fishery was capable of huge development, and it was possible to establish herring fisheries as valuable as cod. Certain fish were very appetizing, and were so abundant that one could hardly row through them. These were actually used as fertilizers. Moreton Frewen said that the waste of the ocean's resources was almost criminal, and it was a stigma upon the statesmen of the last half century that this harvest has been neglected.

## PEACE

The United States invite Austria-Hungary to discuss peace, Germany apparently makes peace with the Ukrainians, and says that whoever asks for peace will get it. Any nation that doesn't ask for peace of a victorious Germany will have peace thrust upon them anyway. And to prove this, Roumania gets an ultimatum that she had better start into peace negotiations within four days. Russia at the same time declares that the state of war in which she has been for the past three years and a half is now ended, and that there will be no longer strife between the Russ and the Hun, the Austrian, the German, the Bulgar and the Turk. Surrounded by a host of foes, Roumania may have no choice but to accept the peace she is able to get, at present.

Peace, of course, means the resumption of trade between these former enemies, and it may be expected that the Central Empires will have the whole of eastern Europe to draw upon for their much needed supplies of food for their already famishing population. The effect of this will be to make peace appear to be very much further away than it is at present. There is one thing certain and that is that the Central Powers cannot possibly impose their peace upon the allies of the west.

Reinvigorated by the success which they will obtain from Russia, chiefly in the way of food, and most probably also in the matter of the war material which the Russians now profess to have no use for, the Central Empires may be emboldened to make still further efforts to break through on the western front. Their ideas of conquest and of penetrating to the shores of the English Channel have not yet been given up. If they find any chance to get there, they certainly will do so.

## THESE REGULATIONS

Tonight in the Empress Theatre, the indignation felt in this part of the province with the handling of the fishery mat-

ters by the present government will be vented. That Prince Rupert is not getting a square deal by the recommendations of the government's Royal Commission is a fact which is hard to get over. If there is anybody whose opinion is worth anything upon this question, it is surely the Independent Fishermen's and Boat Owners' Association. They are the men who want to use their gas boats in the ordinary pursuit of their calling, and in the manner of catching fish, the men who do it ought surely to know as much and their opinion should carry as much weight as the men who only can fish after they are caught.

It seems like a piece of nonsense to have to send a delegation as far east as Ottawa to discuss matters pertaining to the British Columbian coast. What is required is an Advisory Board right here on the coast, where the fishing is done, to decide upon such matters. It may be all very well for the fisheries on the Atlantic coast to have to do with Ottawa. Their troubles are to a large extent passed. The industry there is established, and but few changes are necessary from year to year. Here upon the Pacific coast, however, conditions are different. The fishing here is only in its infancy, and as it develops from time to time, there are bound to be changes necessary, which can be appreciated much better by men acquainted with the conditions obtaining.

The sending of a Royal Commission may be all very well from the government's point of view, but it is the people here who are the most interested who should have the appointing of the personnel of that commission. Then it might be possible to get men appointed who would regard the matter from the proper point of view.

Quite a lot will depend upon the men who are selected to take the city's case to Ottawa. Their chief qualifications must be the capacity to fight for what they know to be right and to fight hard, and to win their point. There are men who can

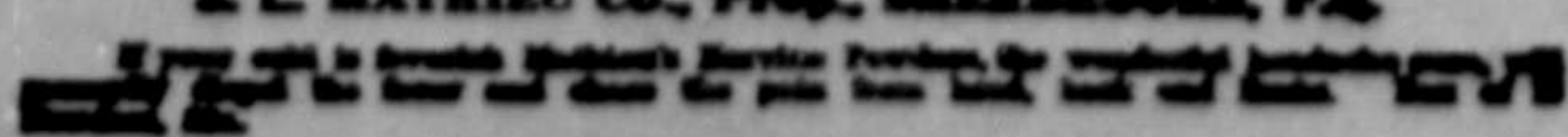

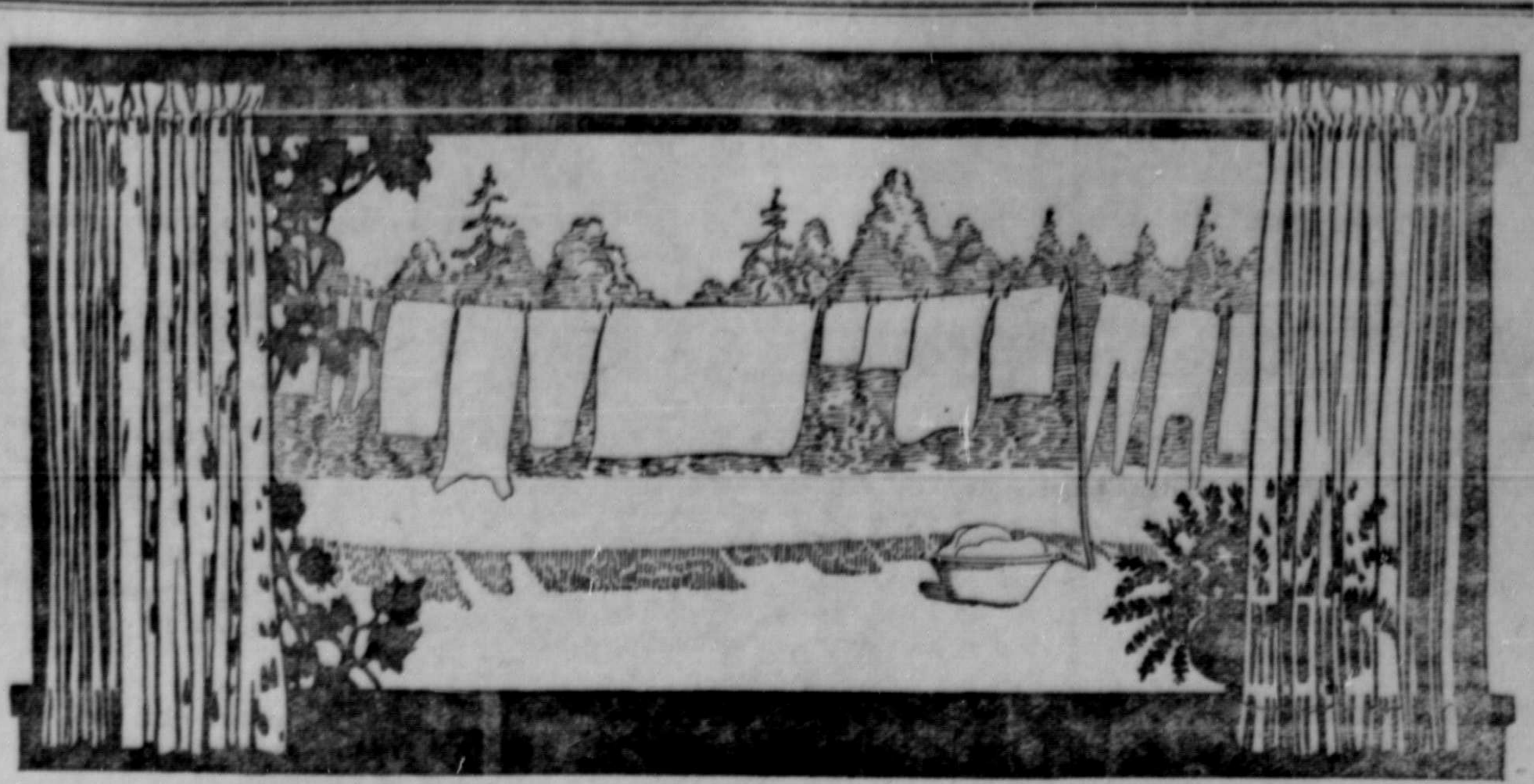

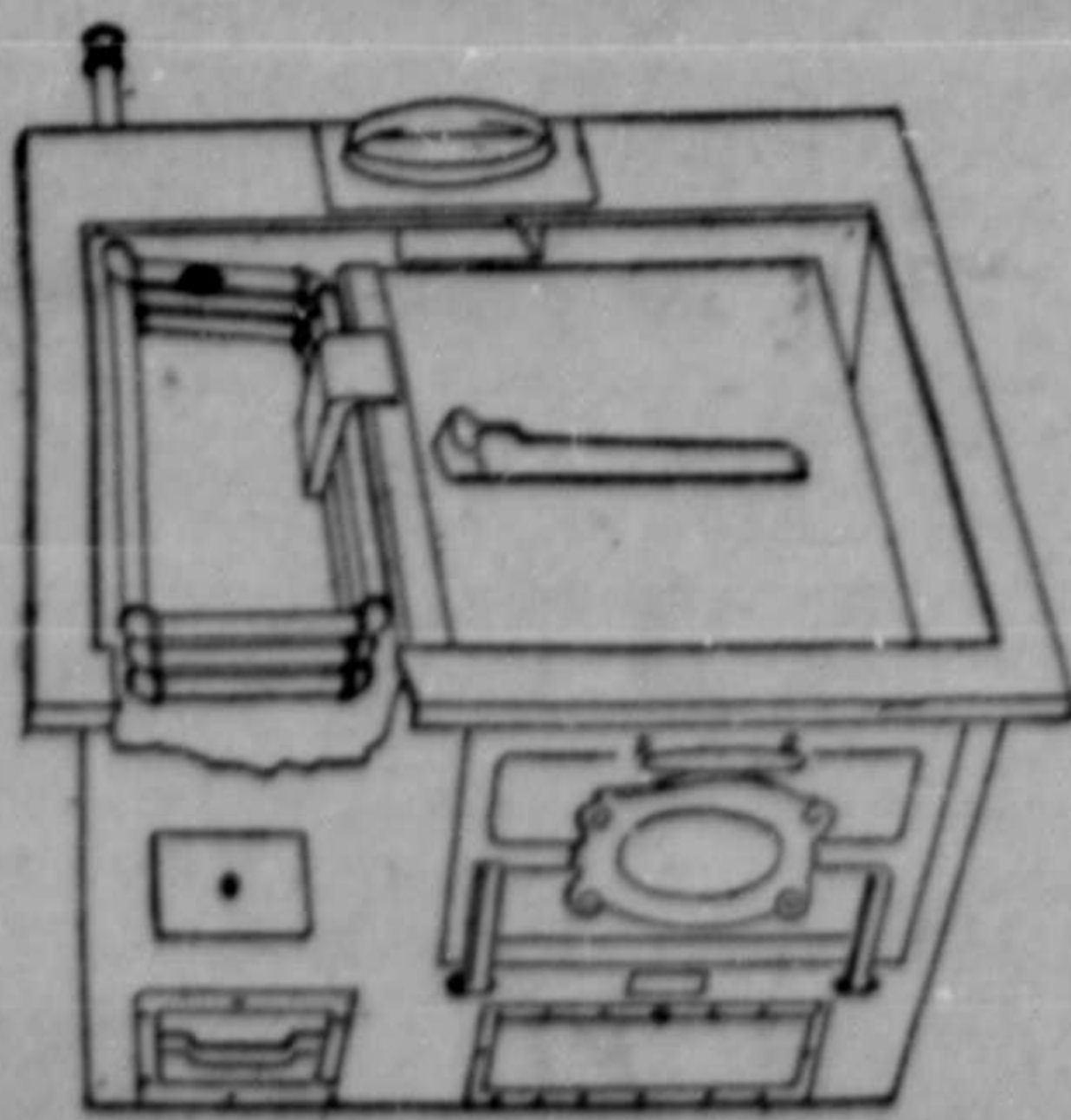
