## CANUKS AGAIN RAID GERMAN TRENCHES

### CAPTURE MACHINE GUNS AND PRISONERS--BOLO PASHA SENTENCED TO DEATH

#### MONTREAL NUNNERY FIRE CAUSES BIG DEATH LIST

THIRTY-EIGHT CHARRED BODIES OF CHILDREN ALREADY LOCATED--FEARS FOR INCREASING NUMBER OF DEAD--THOUSAND PERSONS MADE GOOD THEIR ESCAPE FROM BURNING BUILDING

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Montreal, Feb. 15.—The top story of the west wing of the Grey Nunnery, situated at the corner of Guy and Dorchester Streets in this city, caught fire and burned furiously before the blaze was brought under control. The nunnery at the time of the fire contained a great number of inmates, and a thousand of them have been accounted for, being safe. They consist of wounded and sick soldiers, nuns and nursing sisters,

together with aged and crippled men and women, who had found haven there.  
Already the charred dead bodies of thirty-eight children have been located and there are great fears that the list of dead will increase. The fire spread with great rapidity and the little ones had small chance in the blinding smoke of finding their way outside to safety. It is supposed that many of them would be suffocated in their cots by the smoke.

#### LITTLE GIRL BREAKS LEG WHILE COASTING

An unfortunate accident happened last evening between five and six o'clock on the slope near where Taylor Street joins Borden Street. A number of the little ones were enjoying great fun coasting down the hill from the Exhibition Building. There is not much traffic on this part of the city, and it affords a first-class run for sleighs.

There were quite a number of the little ones engaged in this pleasant sport last evening. A number of the little coasters were holding on to each other, making a train for the run downhill, but when rounding the curve at the junction of Taylor and Borden, Norma Rogers, who was at the end of the train, had the misfortune to hit the curb, breaking her leg near the ankle. She is about 10 years of age, and her parents live in the Summit Apts. The little one is getting on as well as can be expected.

#### NO DOUBT NOW THAT TUSCANIA WAS TORPEDOED

#### MORE RAIDS BY CANADIANS ON FRENCH FRONT

At Lens, German Trenches Raided By Canucks Without Loss--Prisoners and Machine Guns Captured.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, February 15.—Further raids have been carried out by the Canadian troops on the front in France successfully. Near Margicourt two raids were great surprises for the enemy, when many prisoners were captured and many dead left in the German trenches.  
At Lens, the German trenches were also successfully raided by the Canadians, who suffered no losses, while they brought back with them many prisoners. Severe casualties were inflicted upon the occupants of the enemy trenches, and several of their machine guns were brought across no man's land safely to the Canadian lines.  
**Airmen do Good Work.**

Paris, Feb. 15.—Between Feb. 1 and 10, the French aviators have been successful in bringing down twenty-eight German aeroplanes, on their portion of the front.

#### At Paschendale.

London, Feb. 15.—The Germans are still attacking our positions at Paschendale, where they were formerly ejected from the British advanced posts, which their first attack was partially successful. The German forces have suffered severe losses, and have been unable to make any impression upon the British line.

#### THE POLICE COMMISSION

At the police commission held yesterday afternoon, it was reported that the police court fines for the previous month amounted to \$20, which is the lowest amount on record. Gambling and breaches of the prohibition act were dealt with, and a letter from Mr. C. C. Perry with regard to the Indian women in town was referred to. It was decided that while an application from the patrolmen for an increase in wages could not be considered meantime they should have free telephones installed in their homes.

#### SUBMARINES SUNK THREE SHIPS FOR ONE BUILT LAST YEAR

JOINT PRODUCTION OF BRITISH AND UNITED STATES SHIPYARDS IN 1917 ONLY TOTALS ONE-THIRD OF TONNAGE SUNK BY ENEMY SUBMARINES--SPEEDING UP OF SHIPYARD PRODUCTION IN 1918

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Washington, February 15.—The ship tonnage sunk by submarines during the year 1917 was nearly three times as great as the total production in the United States and in Great Britain during that year. This was disclosed yesterday by Mr. Andrew Bonar Law, leader of the House of Commons, and Chancellor of the Exchequer, in the British Parliament. Great Britain produced only 1,163,474 tons of shipping last year, while the output in the United States

was some 901,223 tons, making a total combined tonnage of 2,064,697.

Against this total is to be placed the estimated six million tons known to have been sunk by the enemy submarines. Both United States and British officials expect a very different story for the year 1918, however. Both countries are speeding up their shipbuilding programmes, and the naval officials in the different countries have confidently predicted that the activities of the submarine will be curbed this summer.

#### FURTHER REINFORCEMENTS REQUIRED UNDER M. S. ACT

GOVERNMENT MAY CALL OUT OTHER CLASSES OF MEN AND EVERY EFFORT NOW BEING MADE TO INCREASE NUMBER OF CLASS ONE MEN AVAILABLE--WILL TAKE THOSE WHO CAN BEST BE SPARED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, Feb. 15.—Steps are to be taken at once to ensure additional reinforcements under the provisions of the Military Service Act. These have been under consideration for some time now, and are to be carried out immediately, it is understood. The government has not yet reached a decision as to the calling out of any further classes, or sub-classes. In the meantime, every effort is being made to increase the numbers of men available in class one.

Should it be decided to call out further men it is emphasized here that the aim would be to secure those who could be drafted without interfering with production of essentials, or causing undue domestic hardship.

Under the terms of the act the government is empowered to divide any class into sub-classes, but it is laid down that the sub-classes shall be called out in order of age, beginning with the youngest.

#### LLOYD GEORGE RETAINS THE CONFIDENCE OF COMMONS

MOTION PRACTICALLY OF NO CONFIDENCE REJECTED IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY, SHOWING THAT LLOYD GEORGE'S GOVERNMENT CAN STILL CARRY ON

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Feb. 15.—The Government last night successfully overcame the first obstacle threatening its existence, when an amendment proposed by Richard Holt, which the ministers had made into a question of confidence, was rejected by the House of Commons, by an overwhelming majority. Only twenty-eight members voted for the amendment.

The Holt amendment expressed regret that the continued military efforts is to be the only task of the government in the immediate future. It was supported mainly by pacifists. This event shows that however much dissatisfied members of the House may be with the government's conduct of the war, the Commons are in no mood yet to force a change of government, at this time.

#### GAS BOATS CAN STILL FISH SALMON ON THE SKEENA RIVER

AMENDMENTS OBTAINED BY PRINCE RUPERT'S DELEGATION LAST YEAR CONTINUE IN FORCE UNTIL FINAL REPORT OF ROYAL FISHERIES COMMISSION RECEIVED--ADVISORY BOARD WILL NOT MEET

#### SIR CECIL SPRING RICE, LATE AMBASSADOR TO U. S., DIES AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—Sir Cecil Spring Rice, former Ambassador from Great Britain to the United States, died this morning at the Government House, of heart failure.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has sent word to his worship Mayor McClymont regarding the demands made by the fishing population of this city for the throwing open of the present closed areas for fishing and for the permanent permission of gas boats upon the Skeena.  
The honorable minister points out that the Prince Rupert meeting was evidently under some misapprehension regarding the proposed regulations and the administration thereof, as he says, "regulations governing the fisheries are adopted only after prolonged and exacting study, with the view of giving the fisheries reasonable and essential protection with prevailing economic conditions."  
"The rapid development of the industry," the minister continues, "in British Columbia during the past few years has given rise to new problems, and these problems are now receiving my attention, with the hope that the proposed revised regulations will provide adequate and equitable provisions suitable for the present special and general conditions."  
"Until the final report of the Special Commission and other important information is before me, it is not advisable that special local conditions be dealt with apart from the consideration of a general and basic policy. Therefore you will appreciate that it is considered the better part of wisdom that no action be taken with regard to the representations contained in your letter, until I am in a position to deal with the problem as a whole."  
"With reference to your enquiry as to the date when the Advisory Board will meet in Ottawa, it is obvious from the above that such a meeting would not be advisable at the present time."

#### BOLO PASHA IS CONDEMNED AT TRIAL IN PARIS

Paris, Feb. 15.—Bolo Pasha, who has been accused of high treason by trafficking with the enemy and by receiving large sums of money from German sources, has been sentenced to death. His connection in high circles and his great wealth enabled him to carry out espionage for the enemy countries, without being suspected for a long time, until his association with M. Caillaux brought him under suspicion.

Darius Porchere, an accountant who was a co-defendant, was sentenced to three years' imprisonment. Cavilline, another co-defendant, who is under arrest in Italy at present, was also sentenced to death, although he is not at the moment within the jurisdiction of the court.

London, Feb. 15.—There were nineteen British merchantmen sunk by either mine or submarine during the past week. Of these, thirteen were vessels of sixteen hundred tons or more.

**ROUMANIA**

According to a dispatch yesterday, the little kingdom of Roumania has ignored the ultimatum presented by the German commander to start peace negotiations at once, and she had declared her intention of surviving or perishing with the allies. Surrounded on all sides by enemies, and with one-third of her territory free from the invader, this action on the part of the little kingdom may be regarded as nothing less than heroic.

The Roumanians are cut off entirely from any assistance from the allies. She can hardly hope for any assistance from her erstwhile friends the Russians, even if her immediate neighbors of that country are Ukrainians. They have accepted the peace which the Huns offered. Mackenzie with his armies of Bulgars, Turks, Austrians and Germans are pressing ever tighter against the little remaining country that the Roumanians may call their own.

While it is true that on the east they have the protection of the ramparts of the Carpathians, still on the other hand, their territory is open from the north and the south, with only swiftly flowing rivers as a barrier. Once her supplies of ammunition are exhausted, she will be unable to depend on further supplies from her friends. All that the Roumanians can then obtain will be what they can capture from their enemies.

That a little people of this kind, cut off and surrounded, should brave the combined weight of the Central Powers, with all their resources betokens a great spirit. All the more so as the Roumanians well know the penalty which the Germans will exact, if they can. They have the example of Belgium before their eyes. Yet, for their national honor, and in the face of the greatest adversity, they remain true to their pledge to their western allies.

They have thus set such an example to Russia, that wheth-

er they are hounded from the country that is theirs, or whether they are able to maintain themselves in their attitude of defiance to the German power, the name of Roumania will ring down through the years as a name well worth.

It matters not whether their efforts will be successful, or whether it will have any bearing upon the ultimate outcome of the war, the fact remains that in the face of the greatest odds, the Roumanian spirit was bold enough to take up this stand, justifies their claim to be directly descended from the ancient Romans. Throughout the war they have displayed the same indomitable spirit which made Rome the mistress of the then known world. All honor to them.

**STATESMANSHIP**

Lloyd George is at it again. He has put it up to the House of Commons, of which he is premier, that if they are not satisfied with what he tells them, they can get another premier. While no one knows better than he how to handle and appeal to the masses of the people, on this occasion Lloyd George will not tell—he refuses point blank—to tell all that transpired at the Versailles conference of the Supreme War Council. This attitude does not please quite a number of the critics, parliamentary and otherwise, in Britain. They consider that being a democratic people all that the government does should be made public. There is, of course, a time for everything. A time to tell, and a time to withhold.

The cry since the beginning of the war in Great Britain is that the government have consistently refused to take the people into its confidence. There is considerable ground for this complaint, too, as any government that takes the people into its confidence will be more able to retain that confidence which the people have in them. And there have been many things withheld, seemingly uselessly, from the British public, which apparently

When it is considered that new shipyards have had to be laid down, shops assembled, with their multitude of machines, and everything built from the grass roots up, in other parts of this coast, and at the same time, nothing done here, where there are machine shops, boiler shops and a foundry ready built, and with dry-dock accommodation as well, it may be realized that there has been good reason for wonder.

Let us hope that wonder about the continued idleness will cease, and be transferred to the activity which is due in this part of the world.

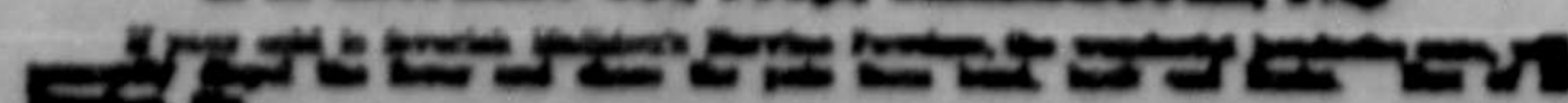

### ASSOCIATION OF NATIVE FISHERMEN IS GROWING

The Native Fishermen's Association in District No. 2, which extends from Rivers Inlet to the Naas, is in a flourishing condition. It is not generally known that the Indian fishermen have an association of their own, for the protection of their own interests, but the fact remains that it is growing fast, and promises to be a great factor in their social development. This association has been incorporated among the benevolent societies, and has now over five hundred members drawn from twenty-two villages and from the different bands on the coast. Mr. W. H. Pierce, of Port Essington, is the president and treasurer of this association, which includes in its membership both men and women engaged in the fishing industry.

The Indians have adopted the methods of the white man in regard to many things in their mode of life, in food, in dress and in manner of fishing. They have seen the white men organize for mutual protection of interests and in this also, they have followed suit.

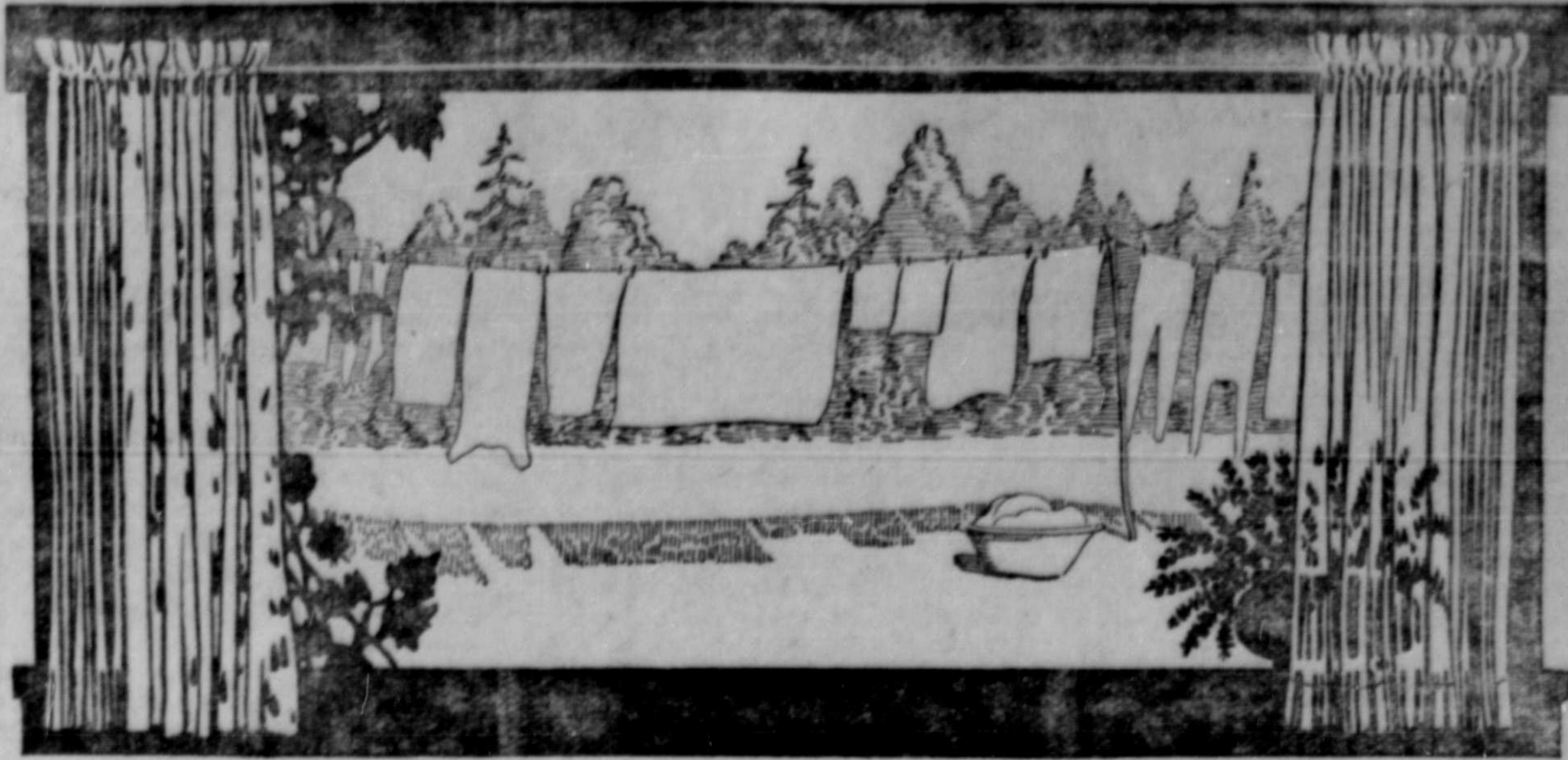

# Keep Chickens

They will help Keep you

The cost of meat is the heavy item in the food bill.

Poultry and Eggs will help take the place of meat.

The food that goes to the garbage pail from the average table will provide one-third the feed for a flock of 8 to 10 hens.

Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.

A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

### How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

FRENCH GIRL SUFFERS FOR HELPING SOLDIERS

Paris—A brave French girl named Mlle. Germaine Chaudrel, who lived with her family in a little village near Guise, in the Aisne Department, has just returned to France after two and a half years in captivity in German prisons.

The Paris Journal relates the very dramatic events in which she and her family took a glorious and leading part.

It was on October 20, 1914, that the region of Guise was invaded. M. Chaudrel and his family, composed of the girl Germaine, aged 15, and his son, aged 16, had remained in their little farm. On that morning, whilst in his fields, M. Chaudrel suddenly saw a British soldier come out from behind a hedge and approach him, followed a moment afterwards by ten others. These poor fellows had lost themselves, could not return to the French or British lines, and had been hiding for days in the country.

A neighbor, an old woman named Coby, took seven of the Tommies and the Chaudrel family the four others. They lived in cellars and everything went on all right up to December 24. They were about to celebrate Christmas in a very humble manner, when in the evening Mme. Coby's daughter noticed a group of German soldiers approaching the house.

**Betrayed by a Spy.**  
The girl rushed into the house, and while the Germans were entering the front garden she let the seven Tommies out by a back door, and took them to a little wooded field. The Germans visited the house, but found no soldiers.

M. Chaudrel then decided to take these seven men to his place with the others. They lived there for two months more, the girl Germaine and her brother keeping watch night and day.

On February 22, 1915, the tragedy took place. The Germans heard through a spy of the presence of these eleven soldiers in the poor farmer's house. In the afternoon they surrounded the farm and house. Germaine rushed to the attic where her proteges were. She was caught on the stairs by a German armed with a revolver.

"Where are the English?" he asked.  
"Look for them," replied the girl.

The Tommies knew the danger their little protectress was running. They opened the door and gave themselves up.

The house was burned, and a few days after the women were condemned by a court-martial; Mme. Chaudrel to four years in prison, her daughter to two and a half years, her son to three years, Mme. Coby to five years, and her daughter to one year.

In court the girl Germaine asked—"What about my father and the British soldiers?"  
A Hun answered—"I regret to say that they were all shot a few days ago. They all died bravely."

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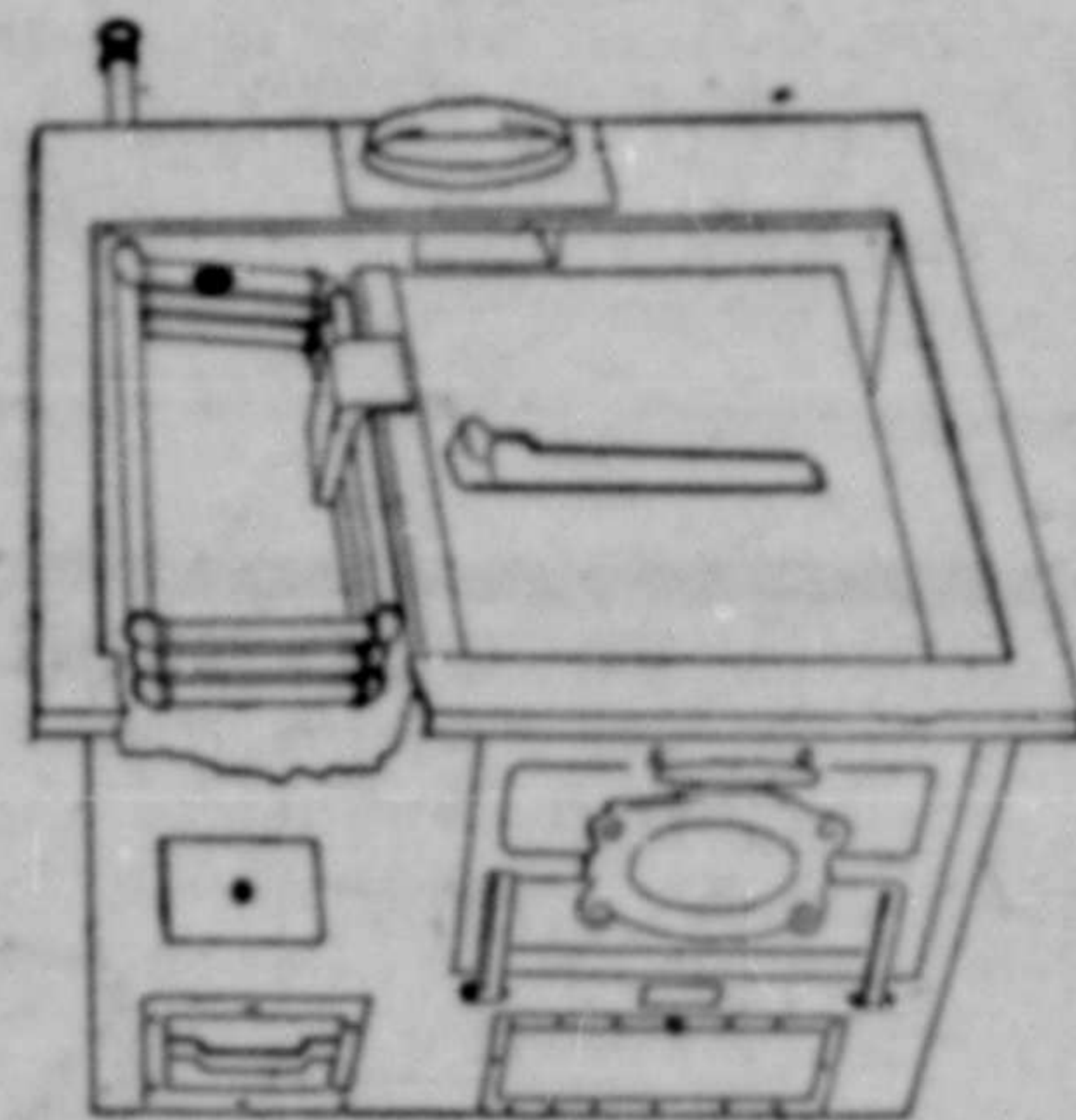
