## GERMAN DESTROYERS RAID DOVER STRAITS

### FRANCHISE FOR WOMEN--COMPULSORY REGISTRATION OF ALL MEN AND WOMEN

#### GOVERNMENT TO TAKE CENSUS OF AVAILABLE MANPOWER

FOLLOWING UPON CONFERENCE OF LABOR REPRESENTATIVES LATELY, COMPLETE AND COMPULSORY REGISTRATION AND INVENTORY OF MEN AND WOMEN OF THE DOMINION WILL BE TAKEN

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, February 16.—Subsequent to a sitting of the Cabinet Council, the government shortly before midnight yesterday, gave out the announcement as to its immediate policy in regard to labor. The government will not conscript men for farm labor, under the Military Service Act, but will take immediate steps to secure a registration and inventory of men and women of the Dominion.

This is the conclusion which was arrived at in the conference between the representatives of organized labor and the government a week or so ago, and is made on the basis of compulsory co-ordination of all available labor supply to meet war conditions and to fill the gaps made by the withdrawal of men for military service.

At this conference, the proposal was made by the government for the establishment of government

labor bureaux, replacing the individual employment agencies and insuring an adequate basis for co-ordination, supervision and direction of the labor supply to meet the nation-wide demand. The government has a comprehensive plan for the establishment of these labor bureaux. At Ottawa, under Federal control the central bureau will be established, to act as a sort of general clearing house of information directing the work of the provincially controlled bureaux.

The national registration scheme will be along the same lines as were adopted under the National Service registration scheme of a year ago, but the signing of the cards this time will be compulsory. Under this new scheme, the government will have under its command the essential information necessary as a basis for adopting measures to meet conditions as war developments and needs arise.

#### SUBMARINE CHASERS SUNK IN DOVER STRAIT

London, Feb. 16.—Eight British patrol craft, which were hunting for submarines in the Straits of Dover have been sunk by a raiding squadron of German torpedo destroyers. After having sunk these vessels, the flotilla of the enemy fast boats retired rapidly northward, before they could be engaged. The British vessels sunk consisted of seven steam drifters and one trawler.

**In Palestine.**  
The British forces yesterday made an advance of two miles on a front of six miles in a direction northeast of Jerusalem.

**Kiev Attacked.**  
London, Feb. 16.—A wireless from the premier of the Ukraine states that the Bolshevik troops holding Kiev are being attacked on all sides, and that their total defeat is considered inevitable.

#### "LINCOLN," SUBJECT OF ST. ANDREW'S LECTURE

The open meeting of the St. Andrew's Society held last evening in the club rooms was addressed by Mr. D. C. McRae, who took for his subject "Lincoln." There was a good attendance and the remarks of Mr. McRae were well received. Mr. McRae drew a parallel between the state of affairs existing at the time of the civil war, when the times brought forth the man, and with those of the present day, when war is again in the air. Just as the growth of slavery in the United States brought great tribulation to both the North and South, so is the growth of the German spirit of aggression and militarism bringing sorrow to all the nations of the earth today.

Mr. McRae was very happy in the drawing out of his conclusions and in his story of Abe Lincoln, who, like Pitt, might be termed the "Great Commoner."

Mr. Fred Stork also spoke shortly, after which a hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the lecturer for his most suggestive remarks.

#### RECORD PAYMENTS FOR CARLOADS OF WHEAT OVER LINE OF G. T. P.

There is keen competition among the grain shippers along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific in Western Canada for the honor of handling the record single carload of wheat. This distinction was claimed a few days ago for Mr. R. A. Aykroyd, who shipped a carload of No. 1 Northern from his farm a few miles north of Wainwright, Alberta, which brought \$3,571, after allowing for the deduction of freight charges.

This record did not stand long, another shipper having a carload which brought \$3,908, and even this figure has now been surpassed. Canadian Government car No. 26923, from Irma, Alberta, on the G. T. P. line carried 2,063 bushels of No. 2 wheat, amounting in value to \$4,195—a truly remarkable figure.

#### CRUEL TREATMENT OF SERBIAN AND ITALIAN PRISONERS

Prisoners of War are Subject to Terrible Conditions—Only One-third of Italians Will Survive.

Italian Army Headquarters, Feb. 15.—Exchanged Italian prisoners who have just arrived from Austrian concentration camps tell of almost unbelievable cruelties practised against prisoners, particularly Serbians, who are reported confined in cages and fed through bars like animals. An authoritative summary of the statements of these returned prisoners says:

"The treatment of the Serbians is even worse than that of the Italians, indicating that Austria intends to destroy the Serbians as a race. As a result of these conditions, there are up to now not less than 30,000 to 40,000 dead from starvation. They are permitted to receive no parcels and are unable to work because of weakness. They are put like animals in cages with wooden bars. Through these bars the keepers throw them scraps of uneatable bread, carrots and turnips as their sole sustenance. The mortality, already great, is increasing, as they are given no care and there are no doctors and no sanitation."

Concerning the Italians, the statement says they returned in rags, after suffering ill-treatment and exposure to cold while compelled to work on enemy trenches under the guard of Hungarians, who are declared to be particularly hostile to the Italians. They received a small loaf of bread daily for division among eight men. Conditions are so terrible, the report says, that they will result in not more than one-third of the Italian prisoners coming back alive.

#### PROVINCE OF B. C. HAS TWO MILLION DEFICIT

Victoria, Feb. 15.—The public accounts of British Columbia for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1917, brought down in the Legislature show a revenue of \$6,906,783, with an expenditure of \$9,079,317, a deficit of \$2,172,534. This compares favorably with the previous year's deficit of \$3,588,968. The largest item of revenue came from timber royalties and licenses, which totalled \$1,759,469. The personal property tax brought in the largest annual total in the history of the levy in the province, \$291,412.93 being received from this source.

#### UNITED STATES TROOPS TO USE POISON GAS

Great Gaseous Campaign to be Instituted in General Offensive Against Germany This Spring.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Feb. 16.—A great poison gas campaign is being planned as part of the United States offensive against the Germans, according to the testimony given before the House of Representatives appropriations committee. Immense quantities of shells full of deadly poison are now ready for shipment from the United States, and General Pershing's urgent request for the equipment of poison gas plants, both in the United States and in France has been granted by the House Appropriations Committee. These two plants will cost \$10,000,000.

It has been decided that there is only one way to fight the Germans successfully, and that is with their own weapons. They started the poison gas warfare, which at first took the French and British troops quite by surprise. Since that time, considerable progress has been made by the allies in producing a more deadly gas than the Germans have been able to manufacture, and with the extensive use of this weapon, which the Huns can have no objection to, it is hoped to assist the spring offensive greatly.

#### PROPRIETORS OF THE O. K. BATHS ARE BOTH CALLED UP

Old Timers, Both, Have Gone to do Their Bit for Their Country in Her Hour of Need.

Another of Prince Rupert's old timers left for the south today at his country's call in the person of Roi Barnes, the second of the proprietors of the popular O. K. Baths. Jack Judge left some time ago for the Willows Camp, and today Roi leaves for Hastings Park, to take up his military duties. Both of these boys are very well known in town and are deservedly popular. Sportsmen both, in the true sense of the word, they will be an acquisition to whichever battalion they are drafted.

During their temporary absence their business on Sixth Street will be looked after by Mr. William Burkin, a tonsorial artist of equal quality with his departed brothers who is commended by them to their many friends and customers. He will carry on the business until their return, which it is hoped, will not be long deferred. This is the only barber shop in town whose total staff has been called up for service.

Both Jack Judge and Roi Barnes are typical of the men who have made the name of Canadian to be feared among the German foe-men, and when they get over there they will be able worthily to uphold the name, and are the kind who will take chances to put the fear of death in the enemy.

#### GERMANS WILL RENEW WARFARE UNTIL PETROGRAD IS OCCUPIED

NORTHERN RUSSIA WILL BE INVADIED BY TEUTON TROOPS UNTIL RUSSIA IS ENTIRELY AT MERCY OF THE HUNS—TROTSKY'S PLAN OF NO WAR, BUT NO PEACE, REJECTED BY IMPERIAL HEADQUARTERS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 16.—Germany has resolved to renew her military activities against Northern Russia. This decision is said to have been reached at a conference held at the Imperial Headquarters when the "No war, but no peace" plan of Trotsky was rejected at this conference, according to the Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Express. The invasion of Northern Russian, it is said, will be continued at any rate, until Petrograd is occupied by German troops.

The Germans hope and expect that the demoralization of the Russians is so complete that they will have no difficulty in accomplishing this object, which they consider would place them in the position of being able to dictate to the whole of Russia. On the other hand, in certain quarters it is considered that it only requires

some action of this kind to solidify the Russian people once again when they will be able to once and for all show the German High Command that they will require no German assistance in settling their internal and domestic quarrels. While the fighting power of Russia at the present moment is dissolved, some strenuous action on the part of Germany (there is good hopes of believing, would crystallize the latent suspicion and hatred of Germany into effective fighting battalions.

#### TABBY'S PELT HAS A VALUE IN FUR MARKET

New York, Feb. 15.—The prices paid for beaver featured the closing day of the annual winter fur sale here. Not only did they show very sharp advances, but the best pelt brought the record figure of \$20.25. Wolves also were active and higher than at fall sales. The best skunk sold up to \$5.30. The skins of ordinary tabby cats brought as high as 88 cents each and will now be cut up into "fur" sets, chest protectors and what-not. Nutria brought up to \$1.34, and 55 cents was paid for the best squirrel.

The grand total for the sale was placed at \$3,250,000, estimates made before the sale began having been exceeded as a result of the sharp advances in many kinds of furs.

The next sale will be held here early in April.

#### SWISS RESERVES CALLED UP FOR REINFORCEMENTS

German-Swiss Border is Closed Tight by Huns—No News is Now Allowed to Pass Either in or Out.

Milan, Feb. 15.—The Rome government has received advice from Switzerland that the Central Empires have intimated that it is their intention of effecting shortly a total and rigorous closure of their respective frontiers along the Swiss border, and that this state of things will probably be maintained for a duration of several weeks.

Another semi-official communication received here from Berne states that since the developments in the general situation at home and abroad render necessary the reinforcements of the defences of the Swiss confines with reserves, the Bundesrath has summoned to arms for next Wednesday the 12th Infantry Brigade, with subsidiary forces.

#### BRITISH FLYER KILLED AT FORT WORTH

Fort Worth, Texas, Feb. 16.—Captain Vernon Vernon Castle, of the British Flying Corps, was killed this morning while flying west of Fort Worth. Castle, in trying to avoid a cadet, swerved his machine beyond his control, and fell, unable to right himself in time.

## PACIFIC FISHING

Encouraged by their success in the past, and apparently justified by the knowledge they have acquired through their explorations in the surrounding waters, the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company are again having their steam trawler got ready for sea. The vessel is at the present moment being overhauled and fitted up with her trawling gear, and will go out in a day or two after the ground fish, which are so numerous in these waters, and which up till last year, have never been fished commercially.

There is a steady and growing market for these flat fish, wherever they have been tried, and at the present moment, the ground work is being laid for a very extensive business. Anyone who has ever visited the great fishing ports of Great Britain could not fail to be impressed with the tremendous number of steam trawlers in commission there. At certain times, they can be counted by the hundred in the larger ports and it is a sight well worth seeing. To a large extent they fish for and catch the same varieties of fish as are available in the waters of the Pacific ocean, right here at our doors. The only difficulty which Prince Rupert has to contend with is that of distance from the markets.

In Great Britain the trains carrying fish have the right of way over even passengers, and they whiz from the northern ports with their supplies for the great London market at a speed averaging over sixty miles an hour, and at that there is hardly a port in Great Britain that is more than twelve hours away from London. Here in Canada, however, conditions are somewhat different. In the first place, the trains have not got the speed of sixty miles an hour, and the markets are very much further away. Distance and time are the great obstacles. As these ground fish do not carry so well, not having the same size as halibut, their logical market is the nearest one. This market is to be

found in the towns on the prairie in the provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and even in Manitoba.

There is no doubt of the increasing popularity of these varieties of fish, and as each new consumer becomes a regular buyer, as they are almost bound to do, with the ever-increasing scarcity and increasing high price of meat products, the increasing demand for these ground fish is bound to affect the number of trawlers operating on this coast.

Although there is but the one trawler operating at this present time, it has been proved that the finest fishing grounds in the world lie close by, and within a very short space of time trawlers operating out of Prince Rupert may become the rule, instead of being the exception as at present. There is no doubt that the halibut banks are being depleted of their supplies of fish—this is to be expected. And with the increasing popularity of these other varieties, the continuous demand for halibut, and only halibut, may not continue. The larger supplies of these other kinds is bound to affect the high price which has been obtained for the big fish.

With the most extensive and varied fisheries lying right contiguous to this port, and with handling facilities sufficient for the prompt dispatch of the catches, the time is not far distant when "fish specials" will thunder their way east daily carrying the silver harvest of the sea to the inland towns.

## STIRRING RECEPTION GIVEN SARDINIANS

Sons of Crimean Veterans Prove Worthy Sons of Their Fighting Sires.

Italian Headquarters in Northern Italy, Feb. 15.—The Sassari Brigade of young Sardinians, which distinguished itself by cutting its way up the Col di Rosso last Tuesday, came out of the trenches yesterday. It was an event which stirred the neighboring country, and the peasantry, with children and babies, came from fifty miles around to see these young heroes. The city was gay with flags, the walls were covered with posters, "Hail! Sassari heroes!" and children carried flowers to strew along the route of their march.

The brigade marched twenty miles from its trenches, and it was an inspiring sight as the boyish-looking soldiers came down the road. Their helmets and uniforms were still splashed with the mud of the big fight, but they marched proudly and appeared happy over the enthusiastic tribute.

## WARSHIPS WILL BE USED AS TRANSPORTS TO RETURN TROOPS

Toronto, Feb. 15.—That warships will be used to transport Canadian soldiers to Canada after the war was predicted by Third Vice-President D. B. Hanna in the course of his evidence in connection with the Canadian Northern Railway arbitration proceedings. The question, which had no relative bearing on the investigation, was asked by Sir William Meredith regarding the immigration outlook after the war.

"For the first few months after peace is declared," said Mr. Hanna "the greater part of the time will be devoted to bringing our own boys home. I think immediately afterwards there will be a large movement of immigrants from the British Isles. The C. N. R. is considering the problem, and it is quite probable that a programme will be drawn up to take care of the situation, in which the railways will ask the Government to co-ordinate in carrying out the proposed plans."

## KRUPP WORKS BOMB PROOF UNDER GROUND

New York, Feb. 15.—Important parts of the Krupp munitions works at Essen have been placed underground as a precaution against damage by allied air raids, according to F. C. Murdock, a representative of a Brooklyn electrical concern, who has been in Holland the past eighteen months, and who has just arrived here from overseas. He said reports from apparently reliable sources to that effect reached him while in Rotterdam. He added that deserters from the German ranks are continually coming over the border to Rotterdam.

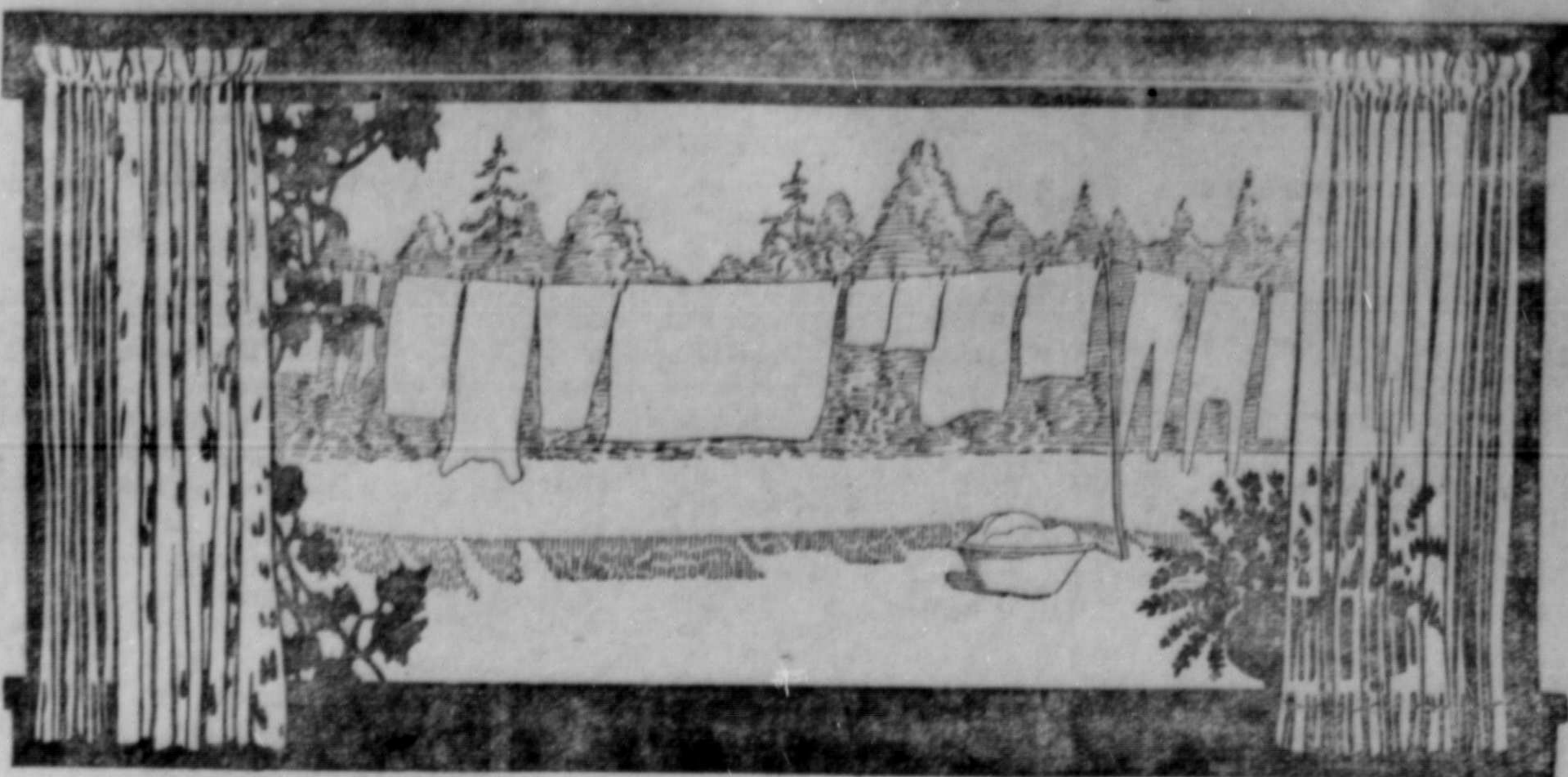

Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.

A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

## How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

**SEVENTY MILLION PROUD**  
IMPERIAL GERMANS  
HAVE NOWHERE TO GO

Lost German Colonies Must be Regained for Surplus Population, Who Will be Pariahs Elsewhere.

London—The German professors are still engaged in their task of educating the German public up to the necessity for their colonies being returned to Germany after the war. One of the latest and best known of the deponents of this doctrine is Dr. Lensch, the well known Majority Socialist, who, speaking at Chemnitz on the future of the German colonies, ridiculed the idea that they would remain in the hands of Britain. The only conceivable occurrences, he said, which could make it possible that Germany after the war would remain deprived of her overseas possessions would be such a series of Entente victories on land and sea and in the air as would break for all time the military might of Germany, and break as well the national heart of her people. And such victories are really absolutely inconceivable. The lecturer said:—"Before we agree to the surrender of our colonies we must be borne down on every frontier where we are now victorious. And what possibility is there of this? Is it thinkable that our Eastern frontier is even in danger? Is it thinkable that the German and Austrian armies will be driven in retreat across the Alps? Is it thinkable that even in the West, where the tide of battle surges to and fro, the enemy will be able to break through the steel barriers which Hindenburg has erected, and which the stout arms of our warriors defend?" The lecturer maintained that to wrench her colonies from Germany would be a national humiliation, for which there could be no equivalent in gain elsewhere. He proceeded:—"We are an Imperial nation, as Imperial as the Britons, French, Americans, Japanese. There will soon be 70,000,000 of us, all proud of our fatherland, all assured of a glorious destiny for the race, all looking forward to open roads leading to our own possessions, in which our brawny youth, our daring explorers, our well-equipped merchants will carry the German flag in an equality with the sons of other nations, and filled with the spirit of lofty enterprise and adventure. And, should the reconstruction of our industrial life bring with it delay and difficulty, it will be necessary to arrange for the emigration of thousands of our men. Where are they to go if we are deprived of our colonies? To Canada, the Cape, Australia, the United States? Never. They would be received and treated as pariahs in these countries. Let us be quite sure that we shall not lose our colonies, not because it would break our hearts to lose them, but because we can compel our enemies to yield them, and more besides. We may look forward with high assurance to a great German colonial empire."

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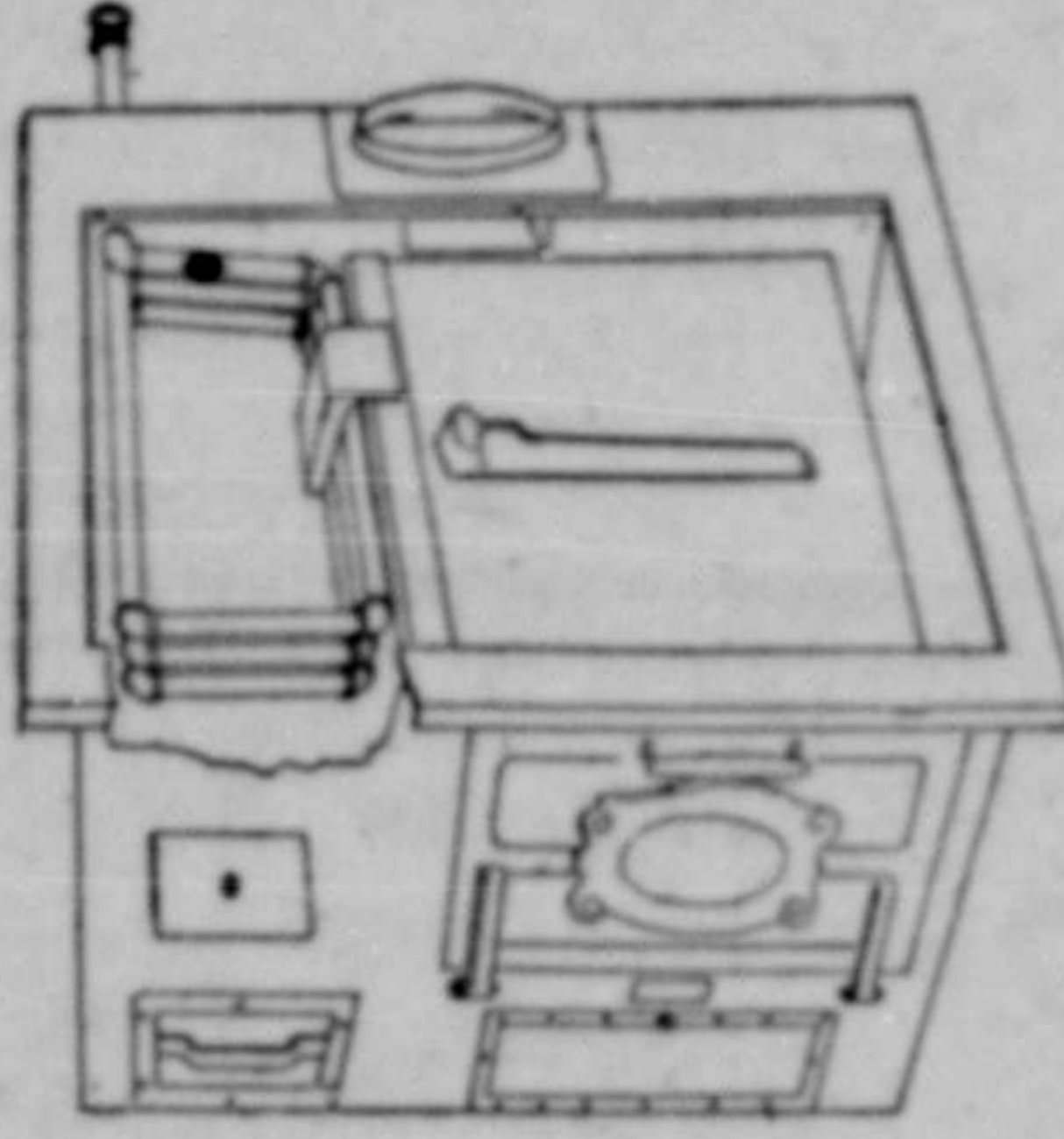
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
