## RUSSIA ACCEPTS GERMANY'S PEACE TERMS

### PRUSSAINS WILL ANNEX LARGE AREA OF TERRITORY AND A BIG INDEMNITY

#### BRITISH MAKE SUCCESSFUL RAIDS ON FLANDERS FRONT

RAID DESCRIBED AS "PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT" AND RESULTS IN HEAVY CASUALTIES FOR GERMANS. TWO OTHER RAIDS ALSO SUCCESSFUL—ANOTHER HUN AIR RAID ON LONDON FAILS.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 20.—An extensive raid was carried out by British troops last night on the Flanders front, in the southern sector of the Houthoist wood. There were no other successful raids, one in the region south of Lens, carried out by Canadian troops, and the other on the old Arras front in the region of Epehy. Prisoners were taken in all these raids. The Flanders raid a particularly important affair, resulting in heavy casualties for the Germans.

#### Fliers Active.

British naval airplanes on Sunday night dropped several tons of explosives on the docks at Zeebrugge, and immense columns of fire and smoke were seen ascending, after the British bombs had burst. Ten German aeroplanes were brought down on the same day by the British aviators and more were disabled, according to an official statement. The lines of Treves and Thionville were raided by British machines Monday, where considerable damage was also done to these places.

The supremacy of the air which the allied airmen have established on the Western front enables them to move about freely and in many cases unmolested except for anti-air craft gunfire from the Germans.

#### London Tried Again.

London, Feb. 20.—German planes took advantage of another moonlight night to attempt to drop more bombs on the city of London. Their attack on this occasion was a failure so far as the metropolis was concerned. The fire of the barrage guns on the outskirts of London was heavy for two hours. There were no casualties.

#### SKATING IS POPULAR AT THE SALT LAKES

Last Sunday there were many visitors across the harbour to the salt lakes on the chance of the ice being in condition for skating. At one time, there was quite a crowd indulging in this winter sport, and they all voted the ice to be first class. It was bearing practically all over.

#### OFFICIAL STATEMENT RE SALMON FISHERIES

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The following official statement with regard to the salmon fisheries of British Columbia has been handed out by the minister of the paval service:

"After a conference with his officials with regard to the regulations and policy to govern the salmon fisheries in district No. 2, British Columbia, during which the whole matter was thoroughly considered. Col. Ballantyne reached the following decisions:

1. That no licenses for salmon canneries in addition to those already authorized will be granted this year. It is recognized that if the privilege is thus restricted, those engaging in canning should be required to pay into the public treasury a fair proportion of their profits. As the system of accounting amongst the canners is so diversified it is important to determine what this should be, but during the present year a satisfactory system of accounting to be used by all canners will be worked out.

2. That as the runs of salmon and the conditions on the spawning ground do not warrant a greater amount of fishing than is now permitted, no licenses for additional fishing privileges will be authorized this year.

"These two decisions do not apply entirely to the Queen Charlotte Islands, where the conditions are different from those now existing on the mainland.

3. That as the evidence of the cannery managers, the canners and the fishermen submitted to the special commission which last year investigated the salmon fisheries of this district, was nearly unanimously opposed to the use of motor boats in salmon fishing operations, such boats will not be allowed this year.

4. That to enable proper arrangements to be made for the using of gill net licenses will be granted this year on a similar basis to last, but hereafter no attached licenses will be issued.

5. That rigid enforcement of the fishery regulations will be carried out and the protective force will be sufficiently enlarged to enable this to be done.

6. On his return to British Columbia in the next few days, the chief inspector will call together those applying for new licenses in different portions of the province where such may be safely granted, and each applicant will be required in the presence of the others, to show why he considers his application should be favored. Immediately following such investigation, a decision on the different applications will be reached by the chief inspector.

The minister made it clear to his officials that no political or other outside interference will be given any consideration."

#### CONSCRIPTION WILL NOT APPLY TO ALIEN LABOR

Government Finds it Impossible at Present to Make Labor Compulsory by any Alien Subjects.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The government has issued a statement regarding the proposals and demands that during recent months have been made upon to the effect that aliens and alien enemies resident in Canada should be conscripted for industrial and agricultural purposes or that they should be compelled to work for soldier's pay.

Reference is made to the conferences in January and it is stated "it was clearly demonstrated that conscript alien labor could not be utilized on the farms except in cases where the conscripts could work in large numbers under military discipline. To withdraw any large numbers of laborers from the existing supply of labor for this purpose would not relieve the situation, but rather aggravate it."

**Attitude of Labor.**  
"The attitude of organized labor was made perfectly clear; namely, unqualified opposition to any proposals for industrial conscription of either aliens or British citizens."

"If it is impracticable at present to adopt a special policy of compulsory service towards alien enemies, it is obvious that there would be even greater difficulty in discriminating against other aliens in Canada in respect of their employment in industry; and the government under existing circumstances deems it unwise to embark upon such a policy.

"The imperative and pressing needs of the country urgently demand that there shall be no idlers in Canada during the remainder of the war. Holy Writ declares that if a man will not work neither shall he eat. Those who deliberately and wantonly obstruct the national purpose by subordinating everything to indolent self-enjoyment and selfish indulgence may confidently anticipate that the authority vested in the government and parliament will be used for compelling them to take the part which every true citizen should freely and voluntarily fulfill. But the exercise of such power must be of general application.

7. #### TAG DAY FOR Y.M.C.A. REALISES \$340.00

The amount realized in the city last Saturday by the W.C.T.U. by a Tag Day, in aid of the Y.M.C.A. amounted in all to \$346.05. The few necessary expenses amounted to \$6.05 leaving the net amount of \$340 to be forwarded. The ladies of the Red Cross Society, and the I.O.D.E., as well as many of the young ladies of the city not belonging to these organizations, gave valuable assistance.

The Seal Cove end of the city was taken in charge by the Ladies of the Seal Cove Branch of the Red Cross, and they swelled the fund by \$25.00.

Mr. F. L. Buckley, of Vancouver, who is much interested in the lumber business in this part of the province, left last night by the Venture for Vancouver. Mr. Buckley visited Port Clements and Skeena City, where he is building sawmills. The Skeena City mill is expected to be in operation in about a month, and the large one at Port Clements in about ninety days.

#### SITTING TIGHT AND SAYING BUT LITTLE

On Monday evening at the meeting of the City Council, the matter of the fishery regulations was brought up by the mayor, when he caused to be read the reply from the Minister of Marine at Ottawa to the demands of the people of this district regarding the recommendations of the Royal Fisheries Commission.

The situation at the present moment is uncertain to say the least of it. At present, owing to the representations made to the Department at Ottawa by the delegation sent from here last year, it is permissible for gas boats to fish for salmon with gill nets in District No. 2, of which Prince Rupert is the centre. That is all right as far as it goes. But at the same time it has been made known that the Royal Commission which visited here after the Prince Rupert delegation got this amendment to the regulations in its preliminary report recommends that gas boats be not allowed so to fish.

What is the government going to do about it? That is what the fishermen want to know. They have to get their boats ready, and their nets secured, and they will have to start now. If, after everything is ready for fishing, the information comes that gas boats will not be permitted, they will be at a considerable outlay for nothing, and by that time it may not be possible for them to get fishing at all. It is not fair to the men who intend going fishing this season to be kept in doubt at this time of preparation.

The Hon. Minister apparently does not intend to do anything in the matter until the final report of the Royal Commission is in his hands, believing it to be the "better part of wisdom" to deal with the matter as a whole. He does not say when he expects to receive this report, or if he will deal with it immediately upon receipt, so Prince Rupert is left in the dark as to when to send its representatives to Ottawa to place their views before the Department.

More than that, the fishermen are uncertain what action to take for this coming season's fishing. Are they to get their gas boats ready in the belief that the existing amended regulations permitting them, will not be rescinded, until after this season's fishing? These preparations cannot be made in a day. What are the fishermen to do? The policy of the Department at Ottawa of sitting tight and saying little is not helping the Pacific coast any.

It would seem that the fishermen who are the people immediately concerned are entitled to some kind of a definite statement, either that the present regulations will continue for this coming season or not.

#### RUSSIA ACCEPTS PEACE ON TERMS PROPOSED BY GERMANY

CEDES POLAND, LITHUANIA, RIGA AND MOON ISLAND TO GERMANY AND TO PAY INDEMNITY OF EIGHT HUNDRED MILLION IN GOLD—"NO ANNEXATION AND NO INDEMNITY" FORMULA FORGOTTEN

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 20.—Russia now finds herself forced to accept a peace upon the terms proposed by Germany, according to an official Russian statement received here today. This statement was signed by Premier Lenine and Leon Trotsky, the Russian Foreign Minister. It protests against the German resumption of war and says that the council of the People's Commissaries is now forced to declare its readiness to sign a peace as dictated by the delegations of the quadruple alliance at Brest-Litovsk. The ministers admit that the terms imposed by the Prussians are hard, as they include the retention by Germany

of Poland, Lithuania, Riga and Moon Island, together with an indemnity of eight hundred million roubles, presumably in gold.

All the outcry which the Russian delegates made at the Brest-Litovsk conference, regarding the formula of no indemnities and no annexations which was supposed to be the basis upon which the Russians sat at the conference, and upon which question the Germans themselves were apparently divided, is now evidently forgotten by both parties.

Notwithstanding the readiness which the Russians evinced to sign the peace pact, the German forces are advancing into Russia on a four hundred mile front.

#### PRINCE GEORGE COMES OUT OF THE DRYDOCK

Looking spick and span after her overhaul at the drydock, the Prince George came in to the G. T. P. wharf yesterday afternoon. She will take up the run to the south tomorrow evening. There is one thing which this vessel displays all over her, and that is that in the matter of overhauling and fixing up steamers, the local drydock cannot be beat anywhere in the making of a good job. Just as the shipbuilders on the river Clyde are famous all over the world for that intangible elusive "something" more commonly known as 'Clyde finish' to the ships they produce, both in design and workmanship, the finish which the "Prince George" shows even outwardly is a credit to the town.

The "Prince Rupert" on account of the heavy traffic now passing to and from the coast points, such as Ocean Falls and Swanson Bay has been late in arriving here for the past few weeks. Today, she will be later than ever, and is not expected in until four o'clock. She will take up the run to Granby this evening, and on her return tomorrow, she will lie up for her overhaul, while the Prince George will make the regular trips to Vancouver and Victoria.

In the course of the evening, Mr. Holtby was presented with a watch by Mr. G. W. Nickerson in a most apt and graceful speech. Mr. Holtby is one of the old timers in Prince Rupert, having been here and connected with the G. T. P. since the early days, long before the construction of the line was completed. He will leave very many friends and acquaintances in town to regret his departure.

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**PEACE TERMS**

Coincident with the news of the further invasion of Russian territory comes the information that the Austrian government and the German government are at loggerheads. Austria is credited with wanting to leave the Russians alone. Since hostilities have been suspended, Austria would have this condition continue. Her people are protesting against further warfare on their eastern borders. They have had enough. They are war weary, perhaps more so than any other of the belligerents at the present moment. Whipping a dead horse does not appeal to the Austrian people, nor any more so, apparently, to the Austrian government.

What Germany hopes to gain immediately by the occupation of the Russian Baltic provinces is hard to see at present. They may capture Petrograd. They may take possession of the northern provinces which once were Russia, but of what use will it be? These provinces do not contain that which Germany is alleged to be in the greatest need of, which is food.

The great supplies of foodstuffs are carried by the southern provinces of Russia. For four years now, the tremendous crops of wheat and other cereals which are raised there had to be stored in the granaries of the farmers. The port of Odessa formerly was the outlet and all roads from the southern provinces lead there. This has been blocked since the Turks closed the Dardanelles nearly four years ago.

The trouble between Austria and Germany on this account may prove to be the forerunner of more serious divergencies of opinion. The great menace to the Austrians was Russia, but now that this is removed, this unwieldy composite Kingdom would fain cease fighting also. Austria, perhaps has had the least satisfaction of all the Central empires since the war began. Although her territory is at present free from the invader, both the Russians and the Italians penetrated through

the Austrian defences, and only the assistance from the German troops could have saved her. But even if Austria does agree with Germany, what can she do about it?

**FOOD PRODUCTION**

In a great many cities throughout the Dominion of Canada, active steps are being taken towards the utilisation of the vacant lots for the production of such foodstuffs as can be grown locally. It has been pointed out that "However pressing was the necessity of increased production which inspired last year's campaign, it was nothing like the urgency which calls for such activity this year. If there are any sceptics who think the food emergency has been overestimated and that "things will work out all right, anyway," they are destined to receive a severe shock later on. Some day they may find themselves on rations and that will be very uncomfortable, to say the least, although it is a brand of discomfort to which the people of Great Britain, France and Italy have been subjected for a considerable time, and which has been the lot of Belgium since the early weeks of the war. Just how far the Canadian people will have to put up with similar disabilities will depend upon the amount of food they produce. And every vacant lot under cultivation helps to solve what is going to be the greatest problem of the times."

Some little time ago, the president of the Port Arthur Board of Trade issued a statement of the results of the campaign launched there by the city council. Showed a total money value of \$26,527.50 had been raised in vegetables, turnips, beets, carrots, parsley, etc.

It has been proved that potatoes thrive in muskeg well, in addition to other vegetables. Prince Rupert is blessed with a superfluity of vacant lots. Every hill of potatoes raised here releases just so much for use elsewhere where spuds cannot be grown. It would seem

**HEALTHY CHILDREN IS FIRST NECESSITY**

Montreal, Feb. 15.—Le Pays of this city is exercised because of the medical examination of 177 students of Laval University having shown only 13 fit for military service overseas, flat feet having been the least serious of the defects among the rejected students. Le Pays says the cause of this state of affairs was ignorance on the part of the mothers of these students in the bringing up of children. "The time has come," says Le Pays, "for the clergy in this province to tell the mothers that the salvation of souls does not depend upon bringing a little being into the world every year, whose body goes to the cemetery and the soul to heaven, but that their duty is to give healthy children to their country."

Le Pays says the situation at Laval should be regarded "as a cry of alarm for the French race to awaken and avoid the disaster which is at hand."

HUNS CREATE DIVISION AMONG THE BELGIANS

Amsterdam, Feb. 16.—Les Nouvelles (Maastricht) reports that the Belgian government, having ordered the Belgian judges in the occupied territory to prosecute all activists guilty of having announced the fall of the king's government and of proclaiming autonomy in Flanders, the three presidents of the Brussels court of cassation placed under arrest Pierre Tock and Dr. August Borms, leaders of the activist movement.

The Germans immediately hastened to the palace of justice in Brussels and answered the presidents, at the same time releasing Borms and Tock. The news spread like wildfire and delegates representing Brussels societies met in the main square, where a demonstration of thousands of persons was being carried out. The police and soldiers charged and fired upon the crowds, several soldiers and civilians being killed or wounded.

The three magistrates were sent to Germany. Later the court of Cassation met and decided to resign in a body if the three magistrates were not released. All the Belgian tribunals have united and have decided to stick. The Belgian people, everywhere, according to this report, are in a state of extreme indignation against the Flemish inhabitants.

**FRENCH AEROPLANE GETS HUN SUBMARINE**

Paris, Feb. 16.—An encounter between two French hydro-airplanes and a German submarine in the English Channel recently probably resulted in the sinking of the U-boat after it had been bombed by the planes, according to an official announcement by the French admiralty.

The airplanes were on patrol duty over the channel when they discovered the submarine on the surface. They attacked it after manoeuvring so that the sun was at their backs and the submarine plunged but it did not disappear before the aviators had succeeded in dropping several bombs on or near the periscope.

While one airplane returned to the base for more bombs, the other kept watch and saw the submarine emerge after a few seconds with a list to port of 45 degrees. After attempting to right itself, the submarine again disappeared only to reappear a third time. Its instability, however, increased, and suddenly the observer saw the submarine list still further and sink, so that even the periscope could not be seen.

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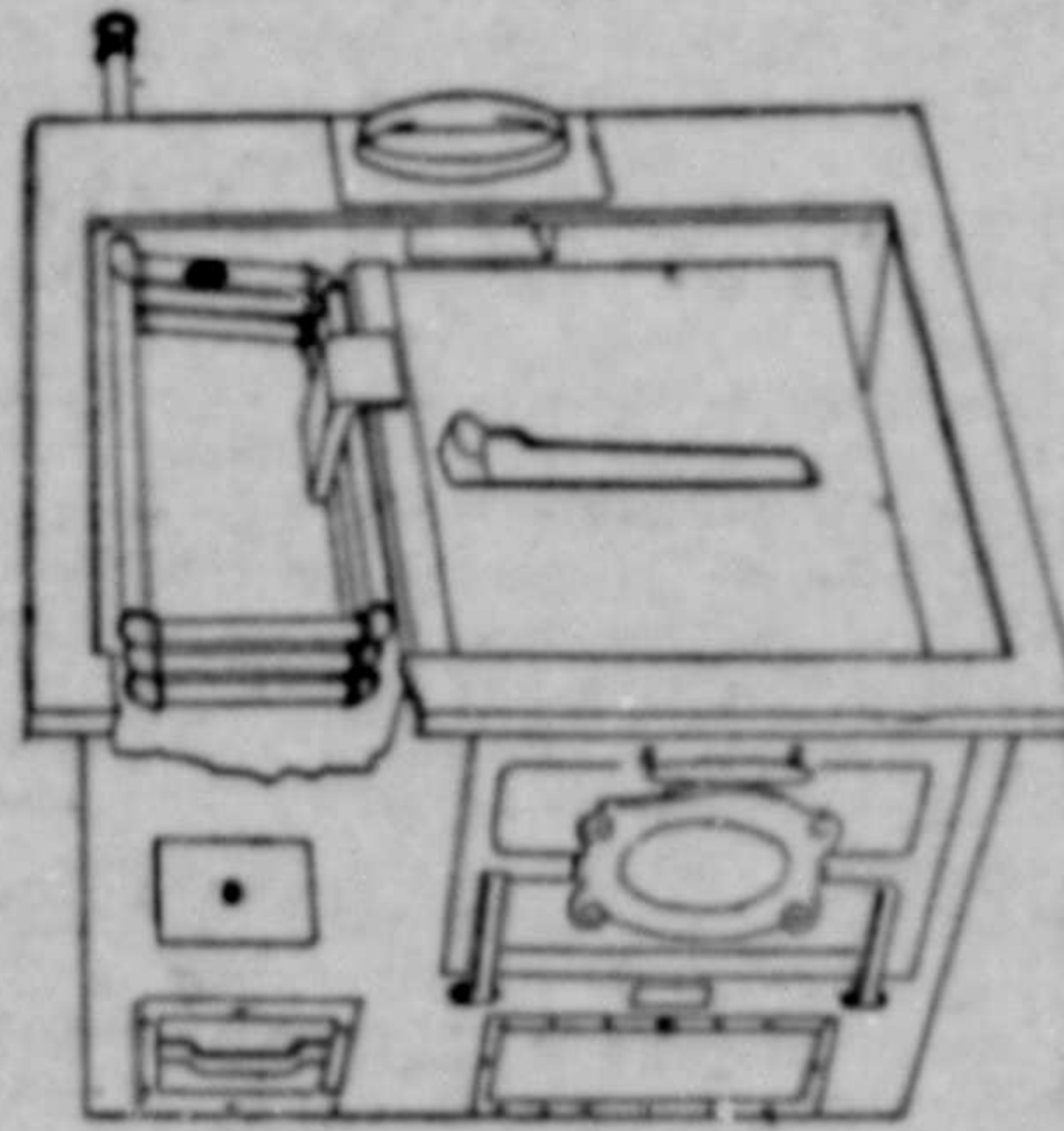
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
