JERICHO IS OCCUPIED BY BRITISH TROOPS

BRITISH LINE NOW STRETCHES FROM JAFFA TO THE JORDAN--STILL ADVANCING

GERMANS DEMAND OCCUPATION OF PETROGRAD AS GUARANTEE

ALSO WANT A THIRTY YEAR TRADE AGREEMENT.—RUSSIAN COMMISSIONERS DECREE "DEFENCE TO THE DEATH."—APPEAL TO SOLDIERS TO TEAR UP RAILROADS—TRENCHES BEING DUG.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 22.—Germany has demanded the occupation of Petrograd as a guarantee of good faith in the matter of its peace treaty with Russia, together with a thirty year peace agreement, according to a dispatch received here from Russia. Austrian and German troops are advancing in the north, and the Russian army has offered an armistice in the prevailing civil war on the condition of a free passage in any direction, and are now trying to reach Warsaw.

The German advance into Russia is not the march of a conqueror, for nowhere up to the present have they met with any serious opposition. Special dispatches from Petrograd indicate that the Russians are making their own arrangements in collecting immense quantities of war material, food and other valuable property. The Russian army is said to consist of only two divisions, one of infantry and one of cavalry.

"Defence to the Death"
London, Feb. 22.—A proclamation has been issued by the Russian commissioners, ordering "defence to the death" against the German invaders of Russian soil. The commissioners appeal to the soldiers to destroy the railways and stores of provisions rather than permit them to fall into German hands. The soldiers are also urged to compel the bourgeoisie to dig trenches under the penalty of death.

As Exchange Company's telegram from Petrograd says that the evacuation of Finland has been ordered by the Commissioners.

The Peace Proposals
Amsterdam, Feb. 22.—A Russian courier, carrying the peace proposals of the Russian government has arrived in Berlin. The German newspapers declare that the re-opening of the negotiations with Russia cannot be expected for some time.

Socialists Warned.
Amsterdam, Feb. 22.—The Austrian socialists have convoked mass meetings throughout Austria in support of the demand for direct peace negotiations being opened with the United States, by the Austrian government. The Emperor Karl has warned the socialist leaders that he will prosecute the Reichsrath and govern the country by absolute methods if a majority is not secured for the provincial government.

RUSSIA WILL AGAIN BECOME A MONARCHY

Veteran Russian General Diagnoses Trouble in Russia and Declares Monarchy Will Cure It.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, Feb. 22.—The Berlin Tageblatt's correspondent, Leonard Adelt, telegraphing from the Austrian War Press Headquarters, says concerning Russia's withdrawal from the war:

"Long before Trotsky's declaration of peace the Russian demobilization had begun. On the Ukrainian-Roumanian border region we encountered the Eighteenth Corps of the Eighth Russian Army under General Sytin, who made the last effort to break through the Roumanian front, but was repulsed there and crossed the Austrian frontier near Radautz.

"Sytin, who is a grizzled veteran, said to me: 'Russia is very sick. Like a bear which has had a hard whack on the head, she has lost much blood. But she is only stunned, and will soon recover. Russia soon will have another Monarchical Government. Believe me, that is what Russia is longing for.'

"As for Lenin and Trotsky, I like them personally. It is very interesting to talk with them about big world problems in front of a cozy fire; but you cannot do anything with them in the practical affairs of life. The best thing the Bolsheviks have done is the abolition of secret diplomacy, which was responsible for the war.

"It is by no mere chance the Ukraine was the first territory to make peace. The Ukraine is most strongly anti-Bolshevik, and the movement will soon assume still more tangible shape."

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE OVER AND OPERATE P.G.E.

PASSENGER AND FREIGHT SERVICE WILL BE RESUMED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.—FOLEY, WELCH AND STEWART WILL PAY \$1,100,000 TO BE RELEASED FROM THEIR OBLIGATIONS TO FINISH.

Victoria, Feb. 23.—The Provincial Government of British Columbia has taken over the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company, and passenger and freight service on this line will be resumed as soon as it is possible.

In the meantime, all litigation will be dropped against the company and its officials. Messrs. Foley, Welch and Stewart will pay the government the sum of \$1,100,000 to secure release from the personal covenants of the members of the firm who agreed jointly and severally to see to the completion of the line.

The further construction of the road, it is expected will be pushed forward with all possible speed, just as soon as the government is in a position to do this. The further extension right north into the Peace River country is the immediate objective, which will tap one of the richest agricultural parts of the province. The set-

REPUTATION OF HUNS IN ITALY REMAINS SAME

Vandalism, Violence, Pillage and Brutality Characterize Germans in Italy as Elsewhere.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Feb. 22.—The Austro-German invaders in Northern Italy daily are resorting to increasing acts of vandalism, violence, pillage and brutality, according to the statements of prisoners captured by the Italians, a Havas despatch from Rome says. Officers as well as soldiers are participating.

Udine has been pillaged and stores and buildings destroyed wantonly by intoxicated troops. The rivalry in stealing, it is said, has been so great that fights have broken out between the various groups of the Central powers. In Udine these fights resulted in the death of fourteen Germans and three Bosnians. There were also bloody conflicts at Polocattaro between the Germans and Austrians.

Women and children, it is added, have been stripped of their clothing, which has been sent to Germany, while foodstuffs, wherever found, also are sent away by officers. The city of Trigesimo has been pillaged of leather and copper and the church bells there have been taken away. Italian prisoners working on roads for the Austro-Germans are reported to be underfed and forced to subsist on the carcasses of horses.

NO NATIONALISATION FOR C. P. R. PURCHASE PROPOSED FOR G. T. P.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—The Government has decided against the complete nationalization of the Canadian Pacific Railway. This seems certain, but it is believed that the government will announce that it proposes to open negotiations with the Grand Trunk and the Grand Trunk Pacific for the purpose of purchasing these roads.

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BRITISH MOUNTED TROOPS HAVE CAPTURED JERICHO

FURTHER PROGRESS MADE IN PALESTINE WITH SLIGHT LOSSES—ON WESTERN FRONT, BRITISH LINES NOW EXTEND FROM NORTH SEA TO THE RIVER OISE—READY FOR OFFENSIVE.

PRINCIPAL BRADY ON CANADA'S DESTINY

At the meeting of the Sons of Canada held last evening an address was delivered by Principal Brady upon the subject of "Canada's Destiny." There was a good attendance, and the president of the society, Mr. Stanley E. Parker, was in the chair. The subject chosen by Mr. Brady was one on which he was particularly happy in his remarks. In opening he referred to the suitability of the subject matter coming before such a society as the Sons of Canada, representing as they do, the people of the country concerned.

Destined as it most assuredly is, to be one of the great countries of the world, and her people to be one of the great peoples, in the meantime and in the immediate future, Canada will have many serious problems to solve, and the manner in which this done will mean a great deal to the happiness of the coming generations. There was the racial problem, which is a problem even now. As the outcome of the war, this problem may become accentuated to a great degree as there is hardly any doubt but that Canada will receive a great influx of population from all the European countries, where families have been torn up by their roots from all that held them stationary through many generations past. All will depend upon the manner in which these incomers are assimilated or otherwise; whether they are absorbed and become Canadians, outwardly and in spirit, or remain aloof, retaining their foreign characteristics.

The good and proper government of these heterogeneous races constituted a problem, which was worthy of the greatest consideration.

The press and several other points were also dealt with by Mr. Brady, and all were sorry when his address concluded.

SALARIES FOR FOOD BOARD OFFICIALS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—Appropriations for the new Food Board, headed by Mr. H. B. Thomson, provided for a salary schedule for the principal officials of \$20,000. In view of the fact that the board is established on a more or less permanent basis, the Government has now provided a salary for Mr. Thomson, who came to Ottawa last Autumn as Hon. W.J. Hanna's chief adviser, and gave his services without remuneration. His salary will be \$7,000 per annum. The salaries of the chiefs of branches and other experts connected with the board will grade from \$5,000 down.

SERBIAN PRISONERS RETURN VIA SIBERIA

(Special to The Daily News.)

Pekin, Feb. 22.—Two thousand Serbian prisoners of war, captured by the Russians from the Austrians, who had compelled them to fight, have been released from prison camps in Siberia. They are now at Mukden on their way to Dalny and Japan, where they will be returned to Europe by way of America.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 22.—Australian mounted troops, consisting of cavalry and camel corps, have entered Jericho. They arrived at 8.20 yesterday morning, establishing themselves on a line between Jericho and Wadi Aija, according to official dispatch received from General Allenby today. Jericho lies about twelve miles east of Jerusalem, near the mouth of the valley of the river Jordan, where it falls into the Dead Sea. It is pleasantly situated on the high ground forming the west side of the valley.

North and Northwest of Jerusalem, the British advanced positions were extended slightly and rendered secure against any surprise attack by the enemy, which is one of his favorite forms of attack. During the fighting of Wednesday, the losses suffered by the British troops were very slight while a large toll was taken of the Turks. Notwithstanding the good fighting material composing the Turkish forces opposing the British in Palestine, their morale is now much lower than it was some months ago. According to some of the prisoners taken, the troops are aware that they are fighting a losing battle and have lost all hope for ultimate success. But not withstanding this, they are determined to fight to the end.

The Western Front

With the British Armies in the field, Feb. 22.—The British lines on the Western front today extends from the vicinity of the North sea to the neighborhood of the Oise river. General Haig's forces have thus extended their holdings through the taking over of considerable sectors held by the French troops south of St. Quentin. Except for the French sector near the coast, and the Belgian Sector, the British now occupy the entire front from the coast to the Oise.

Airmen Active.

Zurich, Feb. 23.—Five entente allied airmen bombarded the city of Innsbruck in the Austrian Tyrol. The railway station was destroyed. Direct hits were also made on the large barracks, which burst into flame, and two new munition factories were blown up, as a result of the bombs dropped.

PERSHING TO OBTAIN SUPPLIES FROM SPAIN

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Feb. 23.—An economic agreement with Spain, under which General Pershing will get mules, army blankets, and other materials in that country in return for cotton, oil and other commodities from the United States, was signed yesterday in Madrid.

This will enable the United States troops at present in France and coming, to obtain supplies necessary quicker than waiting them coming overseas, besides releasing shipping for other equally urgent material.

SPRING AND OPTIMISM.

There are undoubted signs, in addition to the calendar, showing that the winter is about past, and that the "gentlest season of the year" is about to be upon us. With the word Spring is intimately associated the other word "offensive" as well as other strenuous ideas.

That there will be a Spring offensive on the Western front no one doubts. According to the press dispatches from overseas, the offensive which is expected over there is a German one, but while that is the one which is chiefly discussed, it is safe to say that it will not be the only one. The allies will be on the offensive too, which will have to continue until the Huns are driven over the border into their own country.

Never before have such preparations been made for the great spring drive. Last year the position of the allies was considered to be better than ever, and this year it is even more so. Notwithstanding the reverses which the allies have had to put up with, in Italy, and the lying down of Russia, the decision is alleged to rest on the Western front, and it is there that the fate of Germany will be decided.

There is an atmosphere of determination and optimism noticeable throughout the allied countries, and which is reflected by the press. Even in Canada, although it lies as far away from the scene of the hostilities as is possible perhaps, there seems to be a feeling of satisfaction permeating the people that the utmost is being done to bring the war to a successful conclusion.

From the little information which is being permitted to percolate through from the places where things are happening, and are going to happen, the same feeling is evinced. There is a quiet feeling of confidence, which is most reassuring. It is not that the fighting will be any easier than heretofore. It may be very possibly be that the fighting will be of a much more desperate nature, and causing many more casualties.

But with it all, it is a disagreeable job that has got to be done, and done now. The time is past for half measures, and Canada today knows what war really means, to a much greater extent than at any time during the past three years.

As the co-ordination of the fighting forces in Europe has been found to be absolutely necessary, so it is being found to be equally necessary the co-ordination of the means of production of war materials, and which is of more importance, of food stuffs. With the diversion of so many of the men of Canada, which has never been overpopulated, into the fighting ranks, in certain quarters, there is already a scarcity of labor, even for the essential industries. It is certain that men cannot be fighting and producing food at the same time. Yet both have to be done, simultaneously. It is necessary, and is safe to say that it will be done, too.

CHAOS.

With the German armies advancing through the Russian provinces on a four hundred and fifty mile front, and the German fleet in the gulf of Finland, where thousands of soldiers are being landed a scant two hundred miles from Petrograd, her erstwhile leaders reported to be in flight, and the whole country disorganized with murder, blood and rapine everywhere, Russia would seem to be a fairly bad way. The scenes of nearly a hundred and fifty years ago enacted during the first French revolution are being enacted over again. What the outcome will be, who can tell?

Will the Russian brook the domination of the Hun, and be content to surrender their country, possibly the most self-contained country in Europe, with its vast resources, to the despoiling hands of the Prussian? Or will the entry of foreign troops have a unifying effect upon the people. Will they forget their petty and domestic quarrels and unite together for the destruction of their enemy, as they did to



Napoleon, and on other occasions previous to that?

The Russians had little use for the German prior to 1914, and little has happened since that time to make them alter their opinions. Anyway, the idea of a modern Russia being a fief of Prussia cannot be acceptable to the other nations of Europe. The Mittel Europa dream of the Kaisers was disturbing enough, but with the addition of Russia, it becomes unthinkable.

Possibly this invasion of Russia may be the best medicine that the Russians could have at the present moment. And if the invaders stay there long enough, it may be that their fate will be the same as that accorded to other armies invading the same regions, as recorded in history.

SIMPLIFIED SPELLING OF ENGLISH LANGUAGE

The Educational Conference, sitting in London recently formed the subject of one of the discussions upon educational questions relating to the younger generation. It is quite significant that the matter really has at length reached the stage of discussion by the authorities. In Great Britain there are so many matters taken for granted that they are never even discussed in public, and that a simplified system of spelling was quite out of the question has been the accepted idea for a long time.

In some of the elementary schools experiments of the system had been sanctioned by the Educational Board, and as usual, Scotland and Dundee at that, had led the way with these experiments.

One of the members of the board has been an advocate of simplified spelling of the King's English for over forty years, because he held that the present

SIMPLIFIED SPELLING OF ENGLISH LANGUAGE

(Continued from Page two.)

system is incorrect, and obstructive to the progress of education. There is no doubt that the tender minds of the young scholars would possibly be the more receptive of the things that did matter if they did not have to be loaded up with such details as to which comes first, when an E and an I come together. This is often quite beyond their comprehension, even in after life. Incidentally, one of the members told of his always using phonetic spelling upon his cheques, and not one of them had yet been refused.

There is no doubt that orthography is troublesome at times, and they who would like to see it simplified are in the majority. English "as she is spoke" is a composite language, and in its formation great respect has apparently been shown for its derivatives. Needless unsounded letters are included in many words, and are of no utility other than to show the etymology.

Phonetic spelling, of course, would have to be standardized, which cannot be said of the English language at the present time. Even Canadians of this generation cannot distinguish any difference between the words "fir" and "fur," although the vowel sounds are altogether different, and in certain parts of the Empire, and in one country particularly, where English is spoken purely, even the proletariat would make this distinction clearly. Then there is the "aitch." In a wheat country like this Dominion, how many people ever recognize this letter when they meet it in the word. The majority don't. They cut it dead, in pronunciation. In England, and in London particularly, they make up for eliding it by putting it in where it is not wanted. "Am and hegs" for instance, while often the V and W is considered to be interchangeable. The speech of Sam Weller, Senr., is still very much alive.

Before phonetic spelling, it would seem as if there were a demand for a higher standard of pronunciation, and correctness of speech, after which the reform of the written word would be easy.

ANOTHER FISHERIES COMMISSION COMING

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—A memorandum dealing with the International Fisheries Commission which sat recently in Boston, Gloucester, Mass. and St. John, N. B. has been issued by the naval Dept. here. The sittings were held primarily for the purpose of obtaining the views of those engaged actually in the industry. The questions mainly under consideration were: allowing adequate and equal privileges to the fishing vessels of either country in the ports of the other, and the protection of the lobster fisheries.

The sittings have been adjourned on the Atlantic coast, and the commission will next meet in Seattle on April 24. It is expected the Commissioners will visit the important fishing centres on the Pacific coast, and then come back to Ottawa, where they will complete their work and draw up their recommendations.

The Canadian members of the Commission are: Chief Justice J. D. Hazen, and Messrs. G. J. Desbarrats, Deputy minister of naval affairs, and William A. Found, Canadian Superintendent of Fisheries. The members representing the United States are: Secretary of Commerce, William C. Redfield, Assistant Secretary Edwin F. Sweet, and Dr. Hugh M. Smith, chief of the bureau of Fisheries.

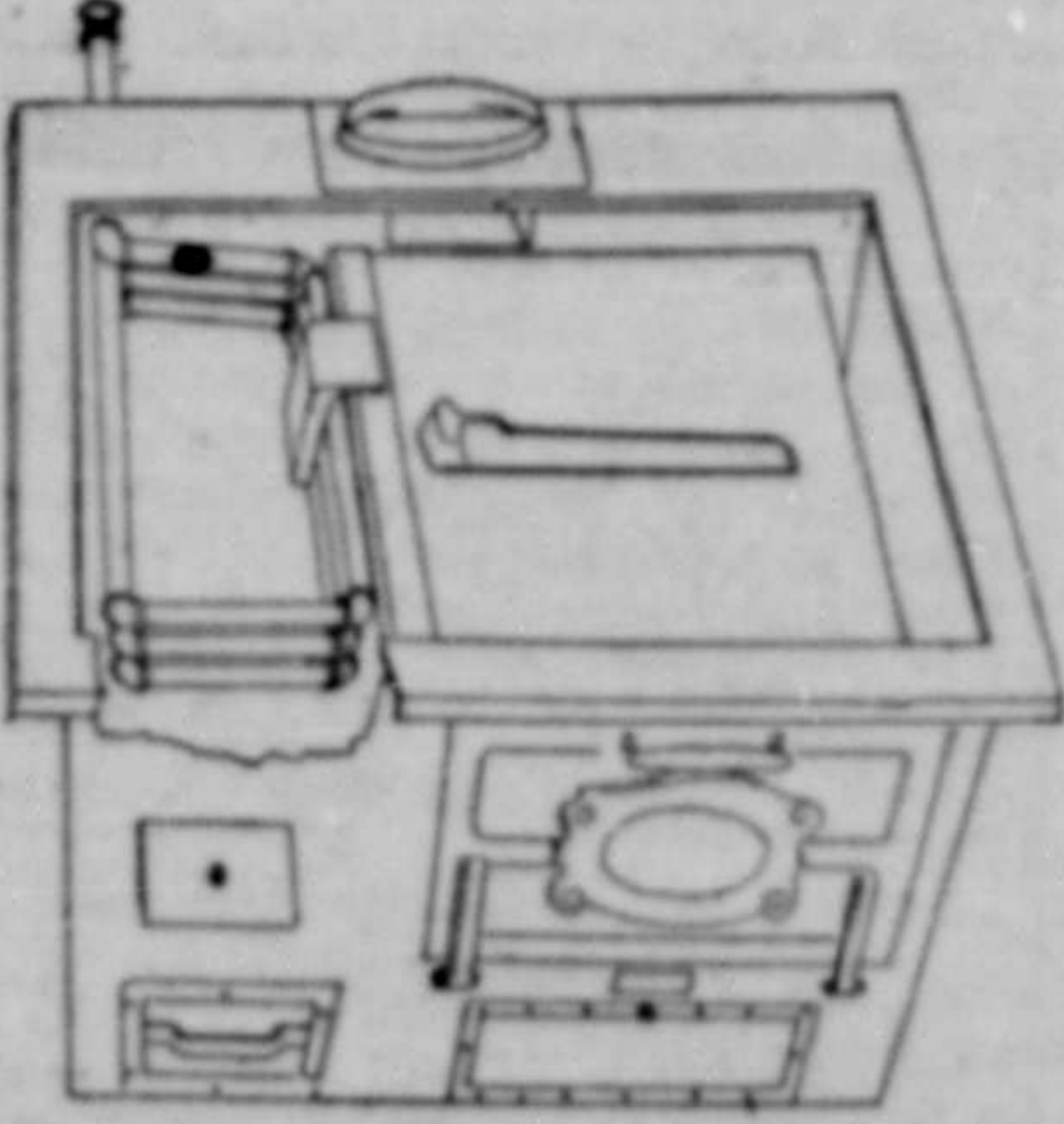
