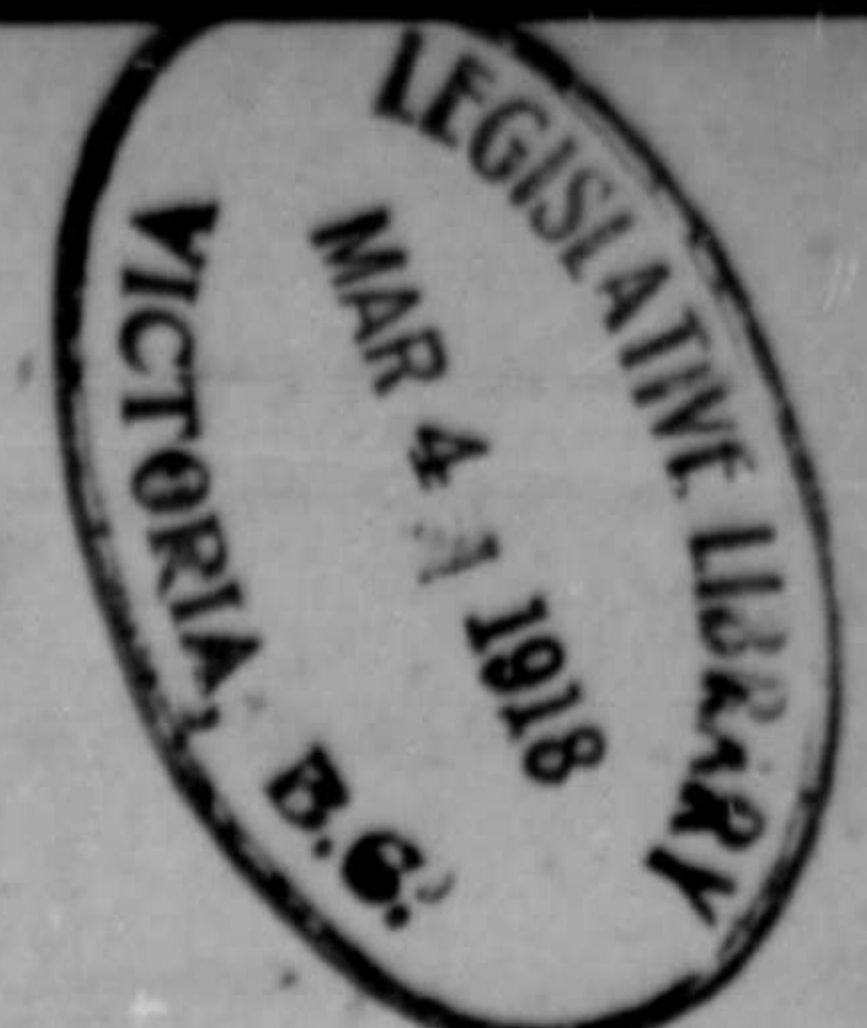

SOLDIERS' VOTE ADDS TO UNION MAJORITY

SKEENA DIVISION'S OPINION OVERRIDDEN BY OVERSEAS VOTE -- NO DETAILS

FINAL RESULT OF VOTES CAST IN DOMINION ELECTION

OFFICIAL STATEMENT ISSUED BY W. F. CONNOR, GENERAL RETURNING OFFICER, AFTER SOLDIERS' VOTE IN CANADA, FRANCE AND UNITED STATES IS RECEIVED.— UNION MAJORITY INCREASED.

LIBERAL MAJORITY IN SKEENA UPSET.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Feb. 26.—The official Soldiers' and Naval vote taken in France, in Canada, and in the United States was announced today by W. F. Connor, the general returning officer. The majority of the Union Government in Parliament has been increased to sixty members, as the result of the total vote being counted. The standing of the government and opposition by provinces is as follows:

The seats which have changed from opposition to Government column are Cape Breton and Richmond, where Kyte and Carroll are defeated; Cumberland, where ex-speaker Rhodes is elected over Hance Logan; Hants, where Harrell's majority has been wiped out, and Picou, where McGregor has defeated McKay, all in Nova Scotia. South Essex, Ontario, where Drien the government candidate has defeated Aitken, Liberal; West Edmonton, where Brigadier General Griesbach has defeated the Hon. Frank Oliver; and Skeena where Capt. Col. Peck is elected over Fred Stork, the Liberal Candidate.

The Hon. Mr. Blondin requires slightly over 1,600 votes to overcome his successful opponent's lead, while it would take 1,500 more to elect the Hon. Mr. Sevington. The Hon. F. H. Doherty has increased his majority in St. Ann's by over 1,000.

In regard to the Yukon and Nelson constituencies, the point has been raised that the soldiers' vote cannot be legally counted, because nomination day occurred after the soldiers' vote was taken. It is understood that an order-in-council will be passed providing that the general returning officer shall report the vote to the clerk of the Crown in Chancery, without making any declaration that the matter shall be referred to the election committee of the House.

GERMAN GUARDSHIP HITS GERMAN MINE

Calgary, Alberta, Feb. 26. This morning it was reported that Premier Brewster passed a good night, and was resting easily.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

There was a very quiet meeting of the City Council last evening. Everything seemed subdued, somehow or other, notwithstanding the new kalsomining, and the smell of the new varnish. All the aldermen were out, and the mayor was in his customary place.

The first thing to come up was a letter from the W. C. T. U. asking that the curfew bell really be rung at 8.30 p.m. so that the little ones would know when it was time to go home. Alderman McMeekin moved that this letter be referred to the Utilities committee to arrange for the fire bell being rung. This was seconded by Alderman Kirkpatrick, who thought it necessary. Alderman Dybhavn pointed out that when this same matter had been brought up some years ago, the fire chief had objected, as it was liable to mislead the people in case of fire. Alderman Casey, however, overruled this objection by pointing out that in other cities it was the custom to use the Fire Bell for this purpose and instances of Rosslund, where the fire bell had been used for the past twenty years.

The report of the Fire Chief was received and filed, and the resignation of Mr. Peter Lorenson, the City Engineer and Assessor, was extended for two days, to enable the assessment roll to be legally completed. Telephones for the police Constables homes next came up, when the report of the Utilities committee recommend that these be charged against the Police Department.

Bicycles, lamps, and sidewalks next took up some time, and a new bylaw covering this will come up later. Tenders for printing were opened, after which the applications for the position of City Engineer and Assessor were also dealt with.

There were two applications for the position, these being Mr. F. S. Clements, and Mr. P. A. Jenns. Both are old timers here, having been connected with Prince Rupert since the early days. On a ballot being taken of the council, Mr. Clements was elected by seven votes to two. Mr. Clements, who comes from New Brunswick, is a MacGill man, and has practiced land surveying and engineering in British Columbia for the last eighteen years.

This being all the business, the council adjourned before nine o'clock.

ROUMANIA IS COMPELLED TO DISCUSS PEACE

Informal Negotiations Begun Yesterday.—Bulgaria to Annex Territory.—Trade Agreements.

London, Feb. 26.—Informal peace negotiations were begun yesterday between the Central powers plenipotentiaries and the Roumanian government. The terms offered by the Central powers are said to include territorial acquisitions for Bulgaria in the shape of the Dubruja, or that part of Roumania territory adjacent to the Black Sea.
Economic preference for the Central Empires for a long number of years is also stipulated for, together with the turning over of all the British concessions, such as oil lands and wells, etc., heretofore developed by British capital, to the disposal of the German government.

LINER WRECKED NEAR CAPE RACE WITH LOSS OF MANY LIVES

London, Feb. 26.—General Brujevitch has been appointed successor to Ensign Krylenko as Commander in chief of the Russian armies. Brujevitch, according to the message, has been proclaimed Dictator and has ordered the Russian troops to fight to the last.

GERMAN ARMY APPROACHING TO PETROGRAD

Russian Resistance Overcome.—Reval Occupied.—Pskoff Captured.—Petrograd Under Martial Law.

Berlin, Feb. 26.—The German forces have occupied the city of Reval on the Gulf of Finland, after overcoming the Russian resistance. The German divisions have also captured Pskoff, one hundred and sixty miles from Petrograd.

CYCLISTS MUST NOT USE THE SIDEWALKS

It was brought out at the Council meeting last night that the City Police, under the Street Regulations Bylaw have the power to prohibit the riding of bicycles on the sidewalks. But in the meantime, there is no City Bylaw making it compulsory that each cyclist carry a light and a warning bell. The City Solicitor, however, was instructed last evening to draft a bylaw covering this matter.

This has been brought up at this time by the imminence of accident on more than one occasion through cyclists riding in the dark and approaching pedestrians with out warning. Specific cases were mentioned, by Alderman Kirkpatrick.

Alderman Dybhavn admitted that it was dangerous, but he asked, where else are te bicycles to be ridden? He referred presumably to the unbicycle-like condition of certain of the main thoroughfares. Alderman Dybhavn moved accordingly that the city solicitor draft another bylaw covering this matter.

As the outcome of tremendous business expansion, created largely by the unprecedented tourist traffic to the coast, the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company, it is understood, has under consideration the acquirement of a large steel steamship of similar tonnage and accommodation to that of the company's splendid three-funneled steamships now plying in the British Columbia coastal service.

The G. T. P. Company realizes that, in order to adequately take care of the ever increasing coast-wise passenger and freight business, more especially in view of the remarkable development of the Alaska Tourist trade, which has assumed such proportions in the past two seasons, another first-class steamship is necessary to provide for the needs of the Northern British Columbia and Alaska routes, and at the same time permit the expansion of the service.

Alive to Situation.
It is understood that inquiries have already been instituted with a view to opening negotiations that may eventually lead to the acquisition by the Company of a steamship of approximately 3,000 tons gross register.

After Alaska Business.
It is no secret that the G. T. P. proposes to go right after the Alaska tourist business, which it has so successfully developed during the past few years. There is no gainsaying the fact that the Company's boats, the Prince Rupert and the Prince George, have become very popular in the Alaska trade since the Company first decided to invade that territory. Last season the G. T. TIME TO MOVE.

With the construction of the new "Hindenburg line" or rather a continuation of the present one to the south as far as Metz, in the Province of Lorraine, it is being said that the Germans will be evacuating the St. Mihiel salient, which they have retained for such a long time. As the French front line swings east and then south around the city of Verdun, it comes west again, causing the Verdun front to form a large salient sticking well into the German line. The southern line of this Verdun salient, at the same time forms the northern line of the St. Mihiel salient sticking well into the French line. This salient has been a source of considerable trouble to the French command for some considerable time. The Germans have taken such advantage of the natural strength of the position as to make it invulnerable for frontal attack even with artillery preparation. The French have proved this for themselves. The recent attacks successfully made by the French in this region have, however, been applied in the same manner which the Germans like so well to use themselves. This consists in breaking through the salient at or near its base, necessitating the evacuating of the apex to prevent the capture of the troops holding it. It was strategy of this nature which caused the retreat of the Grand Duke Nicholas from the Warsaw front at the last great Russian retreat.

The new German line is said to be with the city of Metz for its base, and will probably lie along the line of the Vosges mountain forming the boundary at present between France and Lorraine. Notwithstanding that the new line is heavily fortified, it will avail the Huns about as much as did Vimy, and Paschendaele. They are beat, and they know it. It is only a matter of time now cleaning them up.

CO-OPERATION.

One of the most important matters dealt with at the

cent conference of the Provincial Premiers was that of increased food production. Everything possible in every way is recommended to be done to increase the available supplies of food locally throughout Canada so that greater quantities may be available for export. The allied countries need more food and the increasing numbers of troops in France and the other fronts need more. Every garden patch bearing crops will help. Every vacant lot cultivated will help them further.

To help the farmers, hundreds of tractors have been purchased at cost in the United States, and will be supplied duty free to have increased areas of land broken and prepared for seeding. The need is urgent, and it ought to appeal to every community in the Dominion.

There are many necessities which must be imported into this country, but there is sufficient ground suitable to raise many crops, such as potatoes, etc. within the city limits, which might be utilized in this manner. It is true that muskies requires some preparation, chiefly draining, but good crops of spuds have been raised even the first year, in many places. There is opportunity for quite a deal of communal activity in this direction right now, and never a more pressing need.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The advance across the Judean hills from Jerusalem to Jericho is likened to climbing interminable mountains of soap. In the rainy weather, the mounted troops would doubtless get into some lather. But nothing to the lathering they will give the Turks, when they get them.

The British Air Service, "which is largely manned by Canadians" has been doing good service. The airmen have eight seven Hun planes to their credit in four days, which is going some. Whatever these Canadians tackle, they seem to make a success of it.

man Government that it is only "neighbourly consideration" that prompts it to send its divisions of troops into Russia collecting provisions and war material is significant of the friendly state of mind with which the Germans regard Russia. Neighbourly consideration doubtless also prompted Germany to send her troops into Belgium nearly four years ago.

The adjourned Provincial Parliament was to meet today in Victoria upon the arrival of Premier Brewster. The premier's unfortunate illness at Calgary will however, prevent him being present. The business of the province, however, must go on.

GERMANY'S SECOND HAND NAVAL FLEET

Britain has always led in naval matters. Even the Germans, with the much vaunted initiative, had to come to us for the first serious naval lesson. Germany's initial fleet was composed of secondhand ships of the British navy.

Among these were the thirty-six gun frigate Thetis, the Rover, the Mosquito, the Niobe and the Renown. The latter two are still in use. The Niobe has been converted into a training ship for naval cadets, while the Renown is a gunnery ship in Wilhelmshaven.

It is an interesting fact that the Kaiser himself received his first naval training on a British ship. This ship was the little frigate Royal Luise, which was presented to the then King of Prussia by William IV. of England.

Victoria, Feb. 25.—A board of officers with Major L. Bullock-Webster as president has been appointed by the General Officer Commanding this district for the purpose of inspecting and reporting upon the condition of a quantity of canned beef considered as being unfit for human consumption and making recommendations as to its disposal. Seattle, Feb. 26.—Seattle salmon packers received notice that the Federal Food Administration yesterday had commandeered all the unsold Northwest salmon pack.

The order came from Washington and stated that the Government desires 400,000 cases of salmon, local salmon packers asserted. They added it was impossible to estimate the number of unsold cases stored away in the warehouses along the coast. The unsold cases stored in Alaska are included in the order, it is believed here.

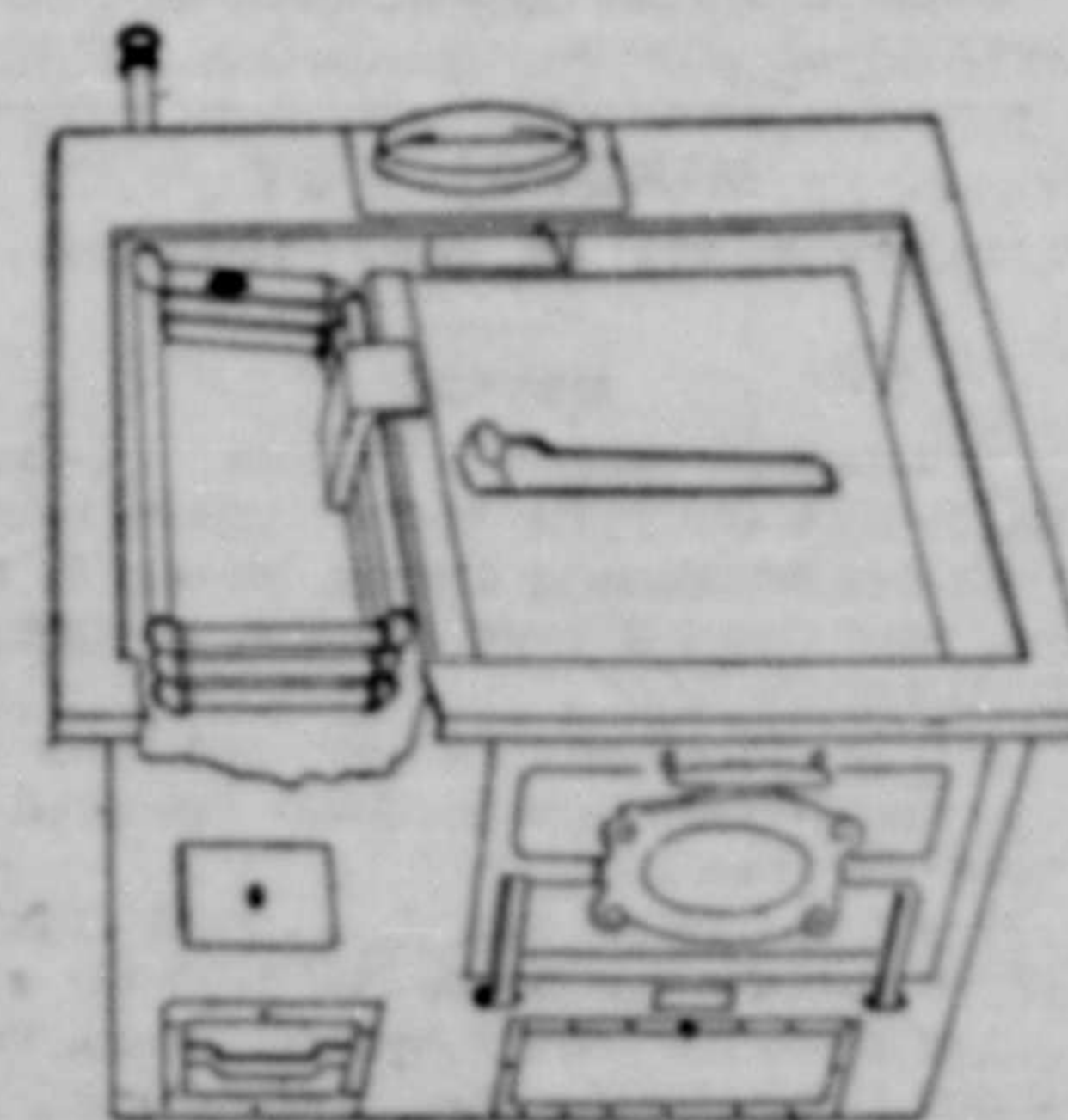
