

## RUSS ARMY QUILTS BUT, WORKERS WON'T

### TIRED OF FIGHTING AND RESIGNED TO CAPTURE--WORKMEN MAY DEFEND CITY

#### RUSSIAN SOLDIERS REFUSE TO FIGHT IN DEFENCE OF THE CITY OF PETROGRAD

RUSSIAN SOLDIERS REFUSE TO FIGHT IN DEFENCE OF THE CITY OF PETROGRAD. RUSSIAN WORKMEN MAY, HOWEVER RESIST.—COSSACKS ARE PURSUED BY BOLSHEVIKS.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Feb. 28.—If the special dispatches from Petrograd accurately the situation here, the Germans are lightly and little difficulty in occupying the city with trained troops. Russian soldiers quite frankly refuse to fight and say: "We have had enough of fighting. If the Germans come, let them take us." There is a stiffer attitude among the workmen, from whom, if at all

resistance to the Germans must come. **Cossacks Retire.** A dispatch says that Borisoff, sixty miles north east of Minsk, has been captured by the Germans and that Orsha, and Smolensk, north east of Minsk, are being evacuated. Fighting at Rostov, on the Don, ceased on Monday night. The Cossacks retired, and are being pursued by the Bolshevik forces.

#### ADMIRAL EVANS TAKES GROUND IN SEYMOUR NARROW

Yesterday morning, as the G. T. "Prince Rupert" was proceeding north, she came abreast of the Admiral Evans, one of the Admiral line of steamers plying between United States ports and Alaska, fast aground about two miles on this side of the Seymour Narrows. The vessel appeared to be resting easily, and informed the "Rupert" that the American freighter "La Touche" was already on the way to her assistance. There being no immediate danger, the "Prince Rupert" did not lose any time, being already behind schedule? The "La Touche" was seen standing by later evidence transferring the passengers to the "Admiral Evans." The extent of damage sustained to the United States vessel has not been ascertained.

#### WANT GOVERNMENT TO CONTROL ALL FACTORIES AND CONSCRIPT LABOR

Vancouver, Feb. 27.—Government control of factories and their output and concurrently therewith conscription and allotment of labor, are advocated in a report of the special committee of the B. C. Manufacturers' Association submitted at the annual meeting of the Association here. This committee comprises George G. Bushby, chairman; E. S. Baynes, J. J. Coughlan, John Hanbury and George Giles.

The recommendations of the committee were adopted, it being decided to hold the whole report over to the next month's meeting. This action followed a protest by Mayor Gale against the adoption of the recommendation for conscription of labor. While believing the Government ought to take over the factories, he did not believe the time had arrived when the Manufacturers' Association should take upon itself a recommendation that labor should be conscripted.

**Alien Labor.** The committee was appointed to report not only on the conscription of labor and the use of alien labor, but on the subject of a Gov-

ernment labour beraea. With regard to alien labor, the committee suggested the immediate conscription of foreign labor of enemy origin, but that such laborers should be put to work at the same pay as received by Canadian soldiers—\$1.10 per day. The committee, in regard to alien labor, pointed out that the state of affairs existing in some industries, particularly mining, where aliens were in control of the situation and worked when they pleased and demanded a high rate of pay. The committee believes that the formation of labor bureaus throughout the country would be a step in the right direction. It is maintained in the report that many lines of industry face a labor shortage which is growing more acute as the industrial activity increases

Today's official despatches say the Germans were halted by the French fire. **Massing at Verdun** Paris, Feb. 28.—The Germans are massing troops in front of Verdun. Yesterday, French airmen dropped numerous bombs in Ghent. Two enemy planes were brought down.

#### ANOTHER BRITISH HOSPITAL SHIP SUNK

Glenart Castle Sent Below in the British Channel London, Feb. 28.—The British hospital ship Glenart Castle was sunk yesterday in the Bristol channel, it is announced officially. There were no patients on board, as the ship was out-bound. Survivors of the crew were landed by an American torpedo boat.

Victoria, Feb. 28.—After a two weeks' adjournment the second session of the fourteenth parliament of British Columbia resumed yesterday afternoon. Hon. John Oliver, Acting Premier, made fitting references to Hon. Mr. Brewster's illness, as

did also Mr. W. J. Bowser, who expressed his regret that the Government was to be without its leader. He would, he said, do all he could expedite matters, but he would still point out what he called the "short-comings" of the government.

#### UNITED STATES INTERCEPT MORE GERMAN DIPLOMATIC PLOT CORRESPONDENCE

GERMANS FINANCED HINDU SCHEMERS TO RAISE TROUBLE IN INDIA AGAINST BRITISH RULE.—PLANS FOR GOVERNMENT INDEPENDENT OF BRITISH INFLUENCE. PROMINENT NAMES GIVEN.

(Special to The Daily News.) San Francisco, Feb. 28.—Further German plots for the purpose of raising internal trouble with the allies has been unearthed by the United States Secret Service. Diplomatic correspondence has been intercepted, showing how the German machinations carried a band of Hindu plotters into private audiences with ministers and responsible statesmen. The Hindu plotters have been financed lavishly in order to maintain their propaganda of India for the Indians. The names of Sir Rabindranath

Tragore, two Japanese ex-premiers, and noted Chinese statesmen are mentioned in the intercepted correspondence. The intention of the plotters was, and still is to establish an independent government in India, and to throw off the British rule. The German government has helped in this matter, not particularly for the ulterior motive of seeing India independent, but more for the immediate purpose of raising rebellion at the present time, and so diverting the attention of Britain from the war in Europe, and dividing her efforts.

#### BORDEN AND WILSON MEET AT WASHINGTON

Washington, Feb. 28.—Sir Robert Borden was presented to President Wilson today by Lord Reading. The Premier is here conferring with the officials of the British and Canadian war missions.

#### AMERICAN NAVAL TUG FOUNDERS

Thirty Men of the Cherokee Lose Their Lives on the Atlantic Coast Washington, Feb. 28.—Thirty men probably lost their lives when the United States naval tug Cherokee foundered off the Atlantic coast yesterday, Secretary Daniels announced today. The bodies of four have already reached Philadelphia.

#### LAWLESS ACTS IN CLARE COUNTY

Troops Sent to Assist the Police—Reported Resignation of Secretary for Ireland London, Feb. 28.—Much prominence is given the situation in Ireland by the morning newspapers, with the official announcement that troops have been sent to assist the police in the County of Clare. Various acts of lawlessness are reported. The position of Mr H. E. Duke, Chief Secretary for Ireland, is the chief subject for many rumors. It is reported he has resigned.

#### BRITISH AIRMEN BOMB ENEMY AERODROMES

London, Feb. 27.—Twelve hundred bombs were dropped by the British aviators upon the enemy aerodromes south of the city of Ghent, well behind the German lines in Flanders. Hostile billets, east of Quentin were also heavily bombed and considerable destruction to the enemy establishments is known to have been done.

#### Countershelling.

Paris, Feb. 27.—The French batteries violently countershelled the enemy artillery in sectors, Hill 304, Le Mort Homme, Beaumont, and Chambrettes.

A GERMAN PEACE.

The terms upon which Germany expects to remain at peace with Russia makes interesting reading. It is the most interesting in this respect, that it shows something of the terms which the Germans would like to impose upon the Western Allies, if she had the chance. Russia has to give up everything that her erstwhile German friends ask, which is not little either. In addition to this, she has to help Turkey in every way in her power to secure the orderly return of her old frontiers, thereby putting Armenia once more in the power of the Turk to wreak further horrors upon this ancient people. And Russia has to pay.

Were Russia a thoroughly conquered nation, bound and helpless, overrun and absolutely in the grasp of a conqueror, the terms thus imposed could hardly be more severe. The helpless condition in which the largest nation in Europe now finds itself is apparently so patent to the Germans that the actual conquering and over-running of that country is not necessary.

Germany proposes to annex Russian territory nearly as large as Great Britain, and also to make the Russian Government pay "civil damages" as well as an indemnity for the support of war prisoners. The Russian armies are to be demobilized at once, the Russian warships to be disarmed and kept in port, and one of the greatest pleasures of the whole schedule of terms is that any warships of the entente now in Russian waters, are to be regarded as Russian ships. Then Russia is to agree to the free export of ore into Germany and to tie herself to Germany with a trade treaty, making that country the most favored.

It is one thing, however, for the German government to make such a treaty with the Russians, when the Russians cannot help themselves. It is quite another thing, however, for that treaty to remain in force after the final peace terms are signed. That Germany will

be permitted to make free with and to extend her borders over Russian territory is unlikely. In matters of this kind, the other nations have something to say.

There have been many speculations as to what kind of peace terms the Germans would impose upon the entente, were they victorious. These, however, are more or less in vain. A victorious Germany is the last thing to think about while there is a fighting man left. On the other hand, there are also many speculations as to the peace terms which will be imposed upon Germany and the Central powers by the allies when they are successful, as they must be, finally. The general principles have already been outlined, but has to how these will be applied remains to be seen.

THE OFFENSIVE.

The increasing pressure which the French troops are applying to the German line is being taken to mean the commencement of the offensive by the allies. The tactics employed denote a different kind of strategy from that adopted last year, being a series of terrific raids upon the German trenches, after an intense preliminary bombardment. This time, instead of pressing forward and making any attempt to capture the German positions, the French troops are apparently content to return to their own lines, after doing all the damage they can, and taking all the prisoners they can get, and incidentally, killing as many Germans as possible at the same time. The intention, apparently is to menace the whole line simultaneously, in an effort to tempt the Germans to come on with their offensive or else retire from their broken positions.

Under such conditions, life in the German front line trenches must be distinctly unenviable. Between bombardments and fierce raids at unexpected moments, the German soldiers must find it a hard matter of keeping their courage up and maintaining any de-



## TRADE PENETRATION OF SIBERIA ALREADY BY GERMAN FIRMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Harbin, Manchuria, Feb. 27.—German goods already have reappeared far east of Irkutsk, according to information received here. German merchants are active in Harbin and the Bolsheviks are arming released German prisoners to guard the Siberian Railway and facilitate the movement of traffic.

A British mining engineer named Piper, who has arrived here from Krasgoyarsk, says the Bolsheviks have seized the gold mines there and that Austro-German prisoners are working them. The Austro-Germans have plenty of money and are purchasing permits to allow them to circulate freely in Siberia. The Germans are taking charge of electric power stations, railways and depots. Quantities of raw materials are being supplied to Germany from the district. Most of the Germans are said to speak Russian.

Piper declares that unless the Allies take immediate steps to send supplies and raw materials in Siberia the intellectual and peasant classes will throw themselves into the hands of the Germans. Goods are being sold at pre-war prices by the Germans, who also are securing contracts and concessions as well as carrying on propaganda work.


