## DEATH OF PREMIER BREWSTER AT CALGARY

### AFTER WEEK OF SUFFERING WITH PNEUMONIA, PREMIER OF B.C. PASSES AWAY

#### ALLIED MINISTERS LEAVE PETROGRAD; SITUATION IS RAPIDLY BECOMING WORSE

ULTIMATUM HANDED RUSSIAN BOLSHEVICS BY GERMANY GIVING THEM THREE DAYS TO COME TO TERMS—GERMAN ADVANCE RESUMED BY THREE COLUMNS OF TROOPS—UKRAINE INVADED.

London, March 2.—Taken as an indication that the situation is rapidly becoming worse in Russia, the British and French Ministers along with the United States Consul have left Petrograd. Nothing but the most meagre news has arrived from the Russian capital for the last twenty four hours. The Germans continue their advance.

##### Ultimatum is Given.

London, March 2.—An ultimatum has been handed to the Russian Bolsheviki government in Petrograd by the German command on the Eastern front, who has given the Russians but three days in which to sign the peace treaty demanded by the Teutons.

The German advance into Russia has been resumed. There are apparently three columns of Germans advancing into Russia. One is near Luga, which is midway between Pskoff, and Petrograd, on'y some eighty miles away from the capital. Another is said to be at Pskoff, which is midway between Pskoff and Vitebsk, while the third is at Sebezh, eighty miles east of Pskoff.

##### Ukraine Invaded.

London, March 2.—Austrian troops have begun to advance into the territory of the Ukraine. This movement, it is stated, is in response to an appeal from the Ukrainian Rada, probably due to the operations of the Bolsheviki there. Von Seydler, the Austrian premier, said last week that Austria was not participating in the invasion of Russia, also adding that Austria was at peace with the Ukraine as well.

#### PARLIAMENT WILL BE CALLED FOR MARCH 20

Ottawa, March 1.—It is understood that the Cabinet has decided to summon Parliament for March 20th, now that the results of the Soldiers' vote has been received by cable. The order calling Parliament together cannot be issued until the members are officially gazetted, and they cannot be gazetted until the returns are all made to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery. If the Government waits until the returns are mailed, Parliament will be delayed indefinitely and arrangements will be made to summon the House on the strength of the cable report of the result of the overseas vote.

#### JAPAN IS ASKED TO TAKE ACTION AGAINST HUNS

Allies Request Japan's Assistance to Block Hun Drive on Russia and to Protect allied Interests.

London, March 2.—The allies have requested Japan to block the Hun drive. The protection of the interests of the Entente in Russia, and rescue of the quantities of supplies of war material sent into that country to assist in arming them against the Germans, is the motive. This intervention in Russian affairs on the part of Japan is not to be regarded as an act of hostility against the Bolsheviki, but an act toward the throwing off of the German yoke. Washington, after lengthy official conferences, is still undecided.

For the first three years of the war, the allies lent every assistance they could to the Czar's government by providing arms and ammunition for her innumerable soldiers. Ship load after shipload chanced the submarine menace and were sent to Archangel on the White Sea. A new port was made further north which did not freeze up in winter and the allies also constructed a new railroad line to connect with the Russian system, to permit of a quick despatch of these supplies to the front. The ports of Vladivostok and Harbin in Siberia also received thousands of tons of war material for transportation to Europe, but the Russian bureaucracy took care that they never reached their destination. It is to save these huge quantities of supplies, which the Germans are sorely needing, that the intervention of Japan's military forces are now requested.

#### THE IRISH REPUBLIC SENDS AMBASSADOR TO UNITED STATES

Washington, March 1.—"The Irish Republic" is going to open an Embassy in Washington, with an Ambassador, and will fly the flag of the republic that was put down after a few days' battle in Dublin by the British two years ago. The establishing of the Embassy was made possible as the result of a meeting held here, in which \$2,000 was subscribed to maintain it, among the contributors being the Bolsheviki Club of New York, which gave \$10.00.

The Irish Ambassador will be Dr. Patrick McCartan. He stated that he would pay an official visit to President Wilson immediately on his arrival in Washington to establish the Embassy.



Calgary, March 2nd.—The Hon. W. C. Brewster, Premier of British Columbia passed away at 10.26 p.m. last night at the Holy Cross Hospital after a week's illness with pneumonia.

British Columbia has again to mourn the loss of one of her leading citizens in the person of the Hon. H. C. Brewster, premier of the province. It is but a few months since a former premier passed away, practically in his prime, and once again the shadow of death has clouded this land. Premier Brewster had gone to Ottawa to attend the conference of the Provincial Premiers of the Dominion, and on his way back to Victoria to attend the opening of parliament he developed pneumonia while on the train, whence he was removed at Calgary and taken to the Holy Cross Hospital there. From the daily bulletins issued, it was evident that his condition was serious, but with the best attention and skill, it was confidently expected that he would pull through. However, it was not to be, and the premier, a man beloved by all who came in contact with him, passed away last evening.

A man of wide sympathies, and large heart, the Hon. Mr. Brewster commanded the love of his friends, and the respect of his opponents in the political field. A plain man, and a true, his kindly disposition radiated friendliness, and his loss will be felt keenly by his personal friends, who were many and irrespective of party.

Premier Brewster was here last fall, when he made a trip through this central part of the province of B. C. to see for himself the aspect of the problems which confronted the government arising in this district. Coming from New Brunswick when he was a comparatively young man, practically his whole business life has been spent on the Pacific coast.

He sailed these waters in the early days, when there were but few people in the North, and since that time, has been interested in the cannery business on Vancouver Island. Mr. Brewster was a widower, and leaves one son, who is at the front, and three daughters.

#### AUSTRIA HOLDS HOLY SEE OF NO ACCOUNT

Malin, March 1.—Monsignor Pellizzio, Bishop of Padua, relates that during an hours talk he had with the Pope a few days ago his Holiness admitted regretfully that his protest against the aerial bombardment of undefended cities, which he caused the Papal Nuncio at Vienna to deliver personally into the hands of the Emperor Karl, had been utterly disregarded. More than this, up to the present time the Holy See has been denied all communications from the Bishops and clergy remaining in the Italian provinces under Austrian occupation, or any tidings whatsoever respecting the populations, although Austria boasted its determination to create for the Pope "a really free and independent position."

#### LIEUT. C. C. PURDY, R.N.A.S. IS REPORTED MISSING

As the mother of Mr. Purdy, late of the Bank of Commerce staff here, has recently been living in Chicago, although for years previous the family lived in Vancouver, it leaves little doubt as to the above being identified with the one so well and favorably known here.

Those who knew Mr. Purdy were not surprised when the war broke out, to hear he had joined the Royal Flying Corps. One of his mottoes was "efficiency" and he at once set about to make of himself the very best flying man possible. In due time he was put in charge of a hydroplane and had put in much useful and daring work over the North Sea and the English channel. #### PEACE WILL COME THIS SUMMER. GERMANS MUST CEASE FIGHTING IF OFFENSIVE UNSUCCESSFUL

CANDID STATEMENT OF GERMAN OFFICER CAPTURED ON FRENCH FRONT.—INTERNAL SITUATION OF THE CENTRAL EMPIRES VERY UNSATISFACTORY FOR CONTINUENCE OF WAR.

Paris, March 1.—A German officer who recently fell into the hands of the Allies has made some remarkable statements. First of all he confirmed the fact that the German Army was concentrating in France and Belgium to make a final effort to crush the opposing forces before the arrival of the Americans and owing to the internal situation in Germany, where dissension is beginning to manifest itself and where the people are suffering extraordinary privations which can hardly be prolonged. As to the campaign which is about to open and the motives which render it imperative, the officer vouchsafed the following opinion:

In the month of September last the morale of the German soldiers and civilians was far from brilliant. Over the Central Empires was sweeping a current of depression which gradually crept to the lofty directing spheres. Everyone was losing confidence in final victory and looking apprehensively towards the future. When Russia in the midst of the revolution gave a hint that she would accept a separate peace our Staff realised that there remained to them a road to safety, and by launching the whole of the liberated Imperial forces on the Western front they hoped a lucky blow might overwhelm the Allies before the entry of America massed on West. At once the order was given to mass at the chosen points men and guns before the British and French with all despatch and without delaying until the Allies were prepared to offer resistance. There were several reasons which actuated the Kaiser in undertaking this venture—above all the imperative necessity in which Germany finds itself of finishing a war which is ruining the two Empires. The Central Empires are in a grave situation from all standpoints. The passivity of the people has for some time seemed to be on the point of disappearing, and it is becoming absolutely essential for the Governments to re-awaken the idea of sacrifice, which is on the wave

#### UNITED STATES TROOPS REPEL GERMAN ATTACK

North of Toul, U.S. Lines attacked in Force.—Enemy effort fails completely—Many Casualties.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 2.—The United States troops repelled a strong German attack this morning on their line forming part of the salient north of Toul. The attack by the Huns was made in force, and they suffered many casualties before reaching the allied line. Dead Huns lie in heaps out of no man's land, while the defenders suffered many casualties also.

The attack was a complete failure, and only three German prisoners remained in the hands of the Americans.

There was a severe hand to hand struggle in the front line trenches, but the invaders were ejected, and few survived to regain the shelter of their own lines. Notwithstanding their losses, not one foot of the American line was given up. Among the casualties, was one captain who graduated from West point in 1917.

## THE ELECTION RESULTS.

One question is being freely asked round town and that is "How many votes of a majority would Fred Stork require to maintain his election against the votes of the soldiers?" There is considerable scepticism being voiced regarding the conduct of the Dominion election, taking it has a whole. And not being voiced locally, but in different parts of the Dominion. There is a large body of opinion here in town which is convinced, rightly or wrongly, that no matter how much of a majority had been gained for the Liberal Candidate here, the soldiers vote would just have turned out sufficient to beat it.

Election experiences of this kind are, if not common, at least numerous within the memory of this generation. There is matter for wonder to where all the soldiers who voted in the Skeena division came from. Taking into consideration those who have returned, and those who will vote no more, the numerical voting power of the remainder seems to be undiminished. Plugging, of course, is not unknown outside of Canada.

The criticism which was levelled against the War Times Election Act while it was in its progress through the House of Commons in Ottawa has been justified by events. It was a weapon which the old Borden administration armed itself with, which proved most effective. That it was neither a fair nor a honest measure was admitted, even by members of the party who brought it forward. It admitted the employment of methods comparable with those of the Bolsheviks in Petrograd. It might have been thought that Canada had attained to somewhat higher level in the conduct of her public affairs. Autocrats and tyrants usually go hand in hand, and the autocrats in Toronto and Ottawa who framed the late election have not shown themselves to be averse to tyranny when they arranged for so many of the soldiers votes being rejected.

There were so many jokers

legalised by the act of Parliament, that the ordinary voter even could see how it was possible for things to be done to the ballots. And there is still wonder where all the soldiers from the Skeena Divisions came from. The list of voters would be interesting.

## A PEOPLE IN ARMS.

By force of circumstances, the German advance through Russia in the direction of Petrograd, the capital, has stopped. The Germans cannot proceed further, and apparently Berlin is content that the onward march be stayed, in the meantime. According to the press dispatches received in London from Petrograd, the man in the street in Russia, the common people have taken up arms to repel the invader. Not, either, without some form of military discipline.

It is reported that the German invading force consists of only two divisions, one of cavalry and one of infantry. Whether this force will be strong enough to maintain itself in a hostile country, and maintain its communications in face of the ever growing antipathy of the Russians for things German, even peace, and that antipathy transposed into action may have a disastrous effect upon the little German army.

Napoleon once invaded Spain, about a hundred years ago, and he also invaded Russia. On both occasions, the whole peoples of these countries rose en masse to eject the invader. He was ejected too, both countries were torn by dissension internally, but for the time being, the old difference were forgotten in face of the common danger. History has a habit of repeating itself, and it is possible that some of the self inflicted wounds of the Russian may be healed within the near future.

## SOLDIERS' VOTE IN BRITAIN MAKES MORE CHANGES

Ottawa, March 1.—Cables telling result soldiers vote taken in England show that Government has gained Kings P. E. I. and one of the two seats in Queens. This increases the Government majority to 64. Word having been received that Dr. Thompson, ex-member for Yukon has received ninety overseas votes as against ten for Congdon. This, with the vote cast in North America gives Thompson a small majority.

As matter of legality, soldiers vote in the Yukon is to be settled by parliament. This seat in the foregoing calculation, has been left in the opposition column. If Dr. Thompson is considered as elected, the government majority is 66.

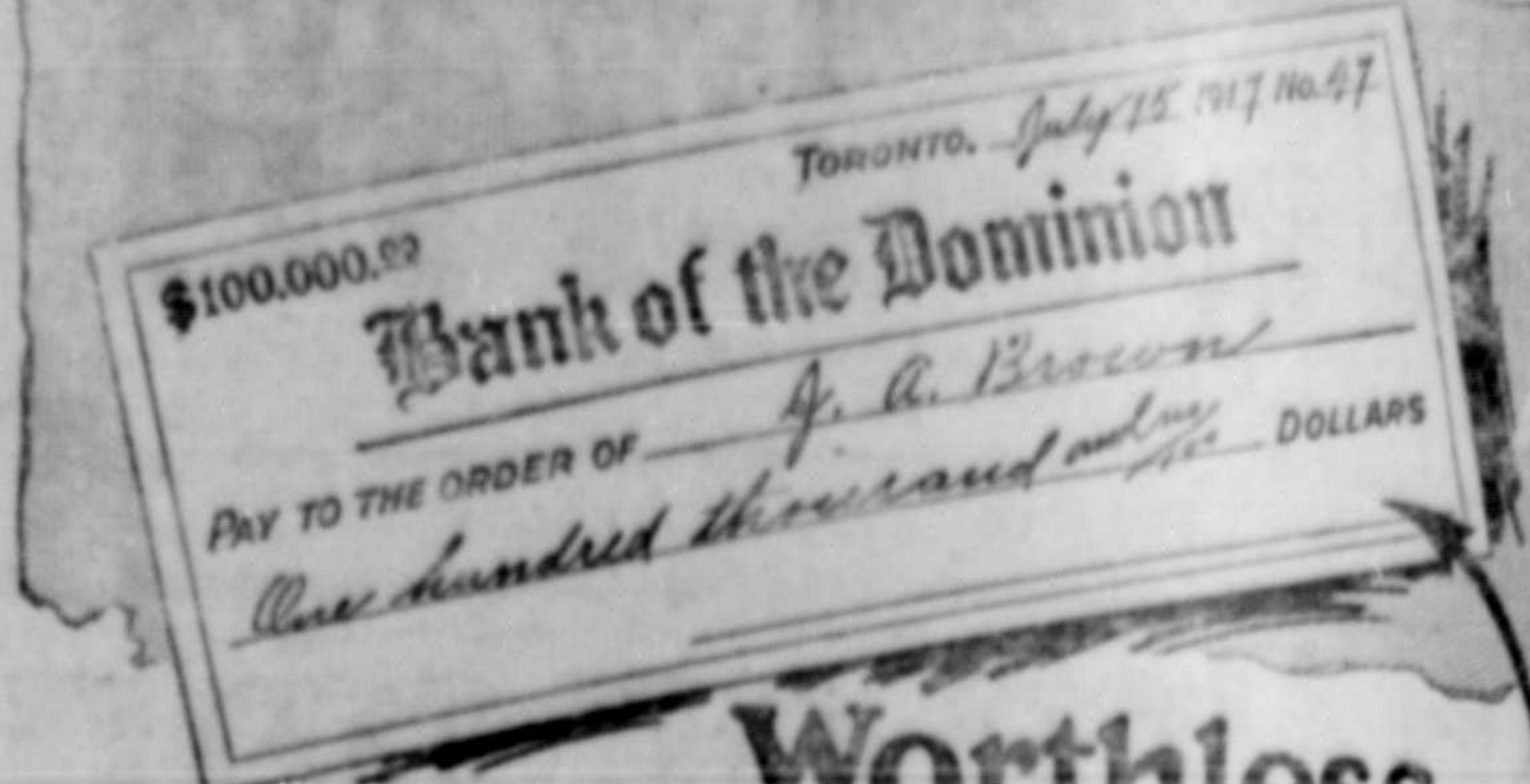

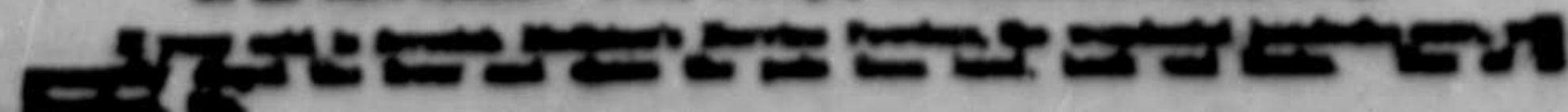

## THINKS HUNS WANT THE SWISS JUICE

New York, March 1.—A German drive through Switzerland to obtain the electric power if that country, much needed by the Germans, is predicted as a possibility by Will Irwin, author and war correspondent, who has just returned to the United States from the Western front.

"There is an attractive series of possibilities before von Hindenburg," declared Irwin. "My opinion is that he will strike to put France out of the war, although he may strike to obtain possession of the French ports. The drive may be made through Switzerland. The Germans need Switzerland's electric power as much as they need Belgium's resources at the beginning of the war, and Switzerland will be unable to put up any such splendid fight as did the Belgians."

## CHINESE TROOPS GOING TO FRANCE TO FIGHT

Washington, March 1.—Word has been received in Washington through official channels that Gen. Tuan Chi-Jui, Chinese War Commissioner, will command the Chinese divisions which are to be sent to France. These divisions will engage in the fighting, there already being several divisions of Chinese in France employed in work behind the lines.

Gen. Tuan was formerly Premier and he took the most prominent part in the defeat of the Royalists, who, several months ago, attempted to restore the Manchu dynasty and overthrow the Republic.

both with soldier and civilian, an idea which the hardships of daily life are not calculated to revive. In a word, the great effect of victory is wanted, and nothing less.

**Officers Unbend.**

For some time past, by order of their superiors, officers have been chatting more familiarly with the men generally, and announcing that a grand offensive is about to be undertaken against the British and the French, that the hostile armies will be defeated, thanks to the superiority of our forces, and that this will be the final battle. In a word, that the end of the war is coming before the summer time. Dissatisfied soldiers are arriving from the Eastern front and on all sides batteries of heavy artillery are massing. The High Command is doing all it can to revive the morale of past days, and to ensure that all may go to the assault with the certainty of completely crushing the foe. To this end there have been three weeks of preparation.

Our intervention will take place as soon as possible, and will be in evidence at several sectors. If we succeed in beating our adversaries in the West peace will come quickly, but it will be a German peace with annexations. If we experience a check like that at Verdun peace will certainly come, but a disastrous peace, for we shall have reached our maximum effort, and shall be obliged to cease fighting.

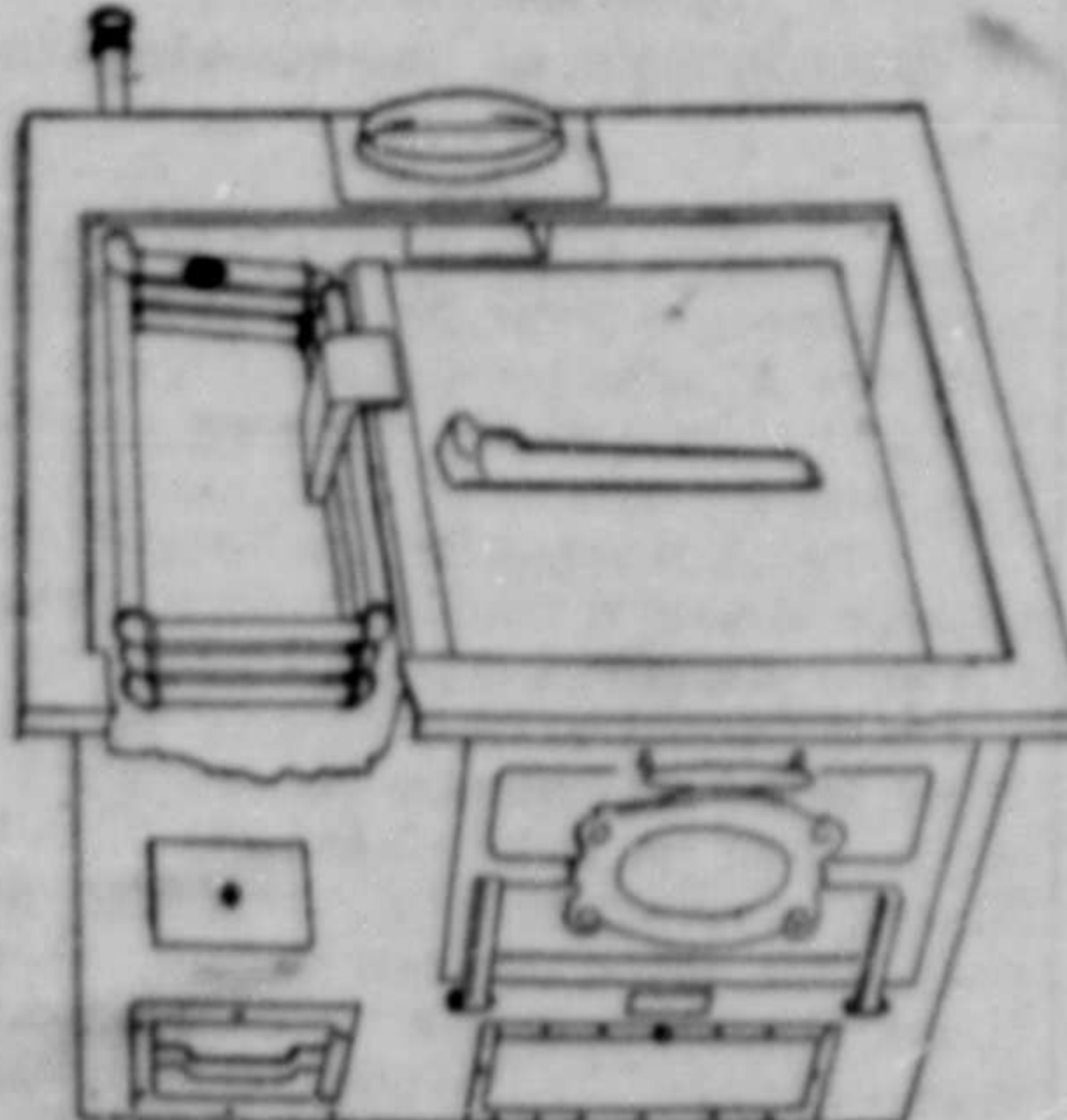
