GERMANS PROPOSE INVASION OF FINLAND

ROUMANIA REFUSES HUN PEACE TERMS -- CONTINUOUS RAIDS ON WEST FRONT

GERMANY WILL INVADE FINLAND TO RESTORE ORDER; SWEDEN PROTESTS

LAND ISLANDS IN BALTIC OCCUPIED BY GERMANS PRELIMINARY TO OCCUPATION OF FINLAND—RUSSIANS DESTROYING BRIDGES IN SIBERIA TO PREVENT ADVANCE OF JAPANESE.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 5.—Germany's occupation of the Åland Islands is only a preliminary to the occupation of Finland. Official dispatches to the Swedish legation today says that Germany has announced to the Stockholm foreign office here, her intention to occupy Finland, and that the government of Sweden has protested. Germany advised Sweden that it was necessary to temporarily occupy Finland to restore order. Sweden has also protested against the occupation of the Åland Islands. Since the Russians annexed Finland from Sweden, many years ago, Sweden has always since had hopes of recovering her former territory, in which large numbers of the Swedish people had settled, and she cannot view the occupation of her former territory by Germany with equanimity.

Destroy Communications.

Washington, March 5.—The Russians have begun destroying bridges on the trans-Siberian railway between Lake Baikal and the Chinese frontier, according to advices received here by the State department today. It is believed that the Russians are destroying the means of communication to prevent an expected advance of Japanese troops.

More Treaties.

London, March 5.—Supplementary treaties between the Central powers and the Bolsheviks were signed at Brest Litovsk, in addition to the main peace treaty, according to a telegram from Brest-Litovsk by way of Vienna and Amsterdam. No details are given.

Huns Kuge Captures.

Berlin, March 5.—By reason of the signing of the Peace treaty with Russia, says an official communication, "Military movements in Great Russia have ceased." The Germans in their advance through Russia have captured 800 officers, and 57,000 men, 2,400 guns, 5,000 machine guns, thousands of motor cars, 8,000 locomotives and thousands of railway trucks.

BRITAIN WILL RAISE ANOTHER WAR LOAN

London, March 5.—A War Bond campaign of a week, to raise £100,000,000 began yesterday with a rush. The two largest individual subscriptions were for £1,500,000 each. The Tanks have been visiting the different cities through the country, spending a week in each of the largest cities. The city of Glasgow topped the list with over £14,000,000 being subscribed for bonds in one week. The next highest was Birmingham with over £6,000,000.

WILL DEVELOPE THE COAL LANDS OF THE INTERIOR

The information contained in our issue of yesterday to the effect that things were beginning to move in the direction of the development of the coal lands of the interior appears to have very good foundation. While the information received from up river was general, and gave no details, other than the fact that there was the possibility of business being done, it also stated that Prince Rupert capital was interested.

Enquiry of the capitalists, one by one brought out the fact that there is to be something doing, and that coal trains passing daily between the Bulkley Valley and Prince Rupert with shipments of coal may be a matter of the not very distant future. There is no doubt that the coal is there, waiting to be won. In this particular instance there is a seven foot seam under which a tunnel has been driven for about fifty feet. This bed lies within easy access of the railroad, and the govern-

ment road passes this mine, which to a certain extent simplifies transportation to the railroad. The coal is of a good quality, and when the mine is developed and producing for more than the local demand, which is restricted by the small population up river meantime, the price in Prince Rupert should compare very favorably with the present cost of this commodity.

There is a very great deal to be said for the development of those resources that lie at our doors. The more coal mines, and those for other minerals, that can be got to produce in this district, the better it is going to be for all concerned. Instead of bringing coal from the south, it may well be that Prince Rupert will be sending coal away instead.

While this is but the start, it is known that there are many promising prospects for coal in this upper country, which with development, may keep this district supplied for years at a cheap rate.

BRITISH TROOPS MAKE INCESSANT RAIDS AND WORRY HUNS GREATLY

AUSTRALIANS ARE ACTIVE AROUND WARENTON AND INFLICT MANY CASUALTIES, CAPTURING PRISONERS—ENEMY ARTILLERY BOMBARDMENT HEAVY—ROUMANIA REFUSES PEACE TERMS.

Cecil CLAYTON IS MADE SEAPLANE INSTRUCTOR

Word has been received in town regarding the promotion of Cecil Clayton, son of Mr. Charles J. Clayton, and nephew of "Doc" Clayton, late of Prince Rupert. Cecil Clayton has many friends in town, who will be glad to hear that he has been mentioned in despatches, and received promotion lately. He has been on special patrol work around Great Britain lately, and the late C. C. Purdy, whose death was announced last week, had been one of his pilots.

Twice his seaplane was brought down, but on each occasion he was saved. One time, a German destroyer winged the plane and brought it down to the water when forty-two miles off shore. On this occasion, however, he managed to bring his machine home. The other occasion was when, only eighteen miles out to sea, quite far enough too, under the circumstances. This time, the crew were rescued by a patrol destroyer. Notwithstanding all the chances taken by the fighting seaplanes, they have got the upper hand of the Hun submarines, and the merry work of seeking out the underwater slayers goes on unceasingly. Cecil Clayton is now instructor to the United States Naval aviators in seaplane work in great Britain.

FORD TRACTORS WILL CULTIVATE PALESTINE

Mr. Alexander Sacks, M.A., Director of the Zionist Bureau of Canada, when in Toronto lately, had a thrilling story to tell of Jewish nationalism which is to be made possible and practical through the British capture of Jerusalem and the occupation of Palestine as one of the first beneficent results of the war for the smaller nations.

He said that a Jewish Commission is now on the high seas, under the auspices of the British Government, which will reach Palestine before the Passover and will there undertake the rehabilitation of the forty eight Jewish colonies, and will establish the first Jewish Administration there for 2,000 years, and will begin to arrange for the well ordered return of the Jews to the land of their heart's desire. The British Government has made a deposit in the Zionist Bank, which is to be reopened in Jerusalem, and a co-operative wheat scheme to feed the people and the army is being carried out jointly by the British Government and the Zionist organization.

Mr. Sacks had much that was interesting to say of the practical steps that had been taken and were to be taken to make neglected Palestine once more blossom as a rose. Zionist leaders estimate that upwards of half a million Jews will return to the old homeland during the next decade. The repatriates will go back with Ford tractors and modern farm machinery, with the most advanced agricultural methods.

London, March 5.—The raids by the British troops all along the line continue incessantly, much to the worry of the German commanders, as they are kept in a state of suspense as to when and where a raid will develop into an attack in force. Last night, a number of successful raids were carried out on widely different parts of the front. The Australian forces entered the German trenches near Warenton, and after killing at least fifty of the enemy, brought back eleven prisoners. The Australians also captured prisoners east of Messines, and south of Hollebeke. The casualties among the Australians and other British troops were light. Shortly after dawn this morning, the enemy's artillery developed considerable activity in the Lens sector, and a heavy bombardment resulted.

A Comparison.

London, March 5.—During the month of January, says an official statement, the Germans dropped 1,482 bombs in the areas occupied by the British troops in France. During the same period, British aviators dropped 7,653 bombs in the enemy areas. The Germans dropped only 224 bombs in the day time, while the British dropped 5,800 between sunrise and sunset.

Peace Terms Declined.

London, March 5.—A dispatch from Copenhagen says that King Ferdinand of Roumania has refused to accept the peace terms of the Central powers.

CITY WILL ENQUIRE RE CARNEGIE LIBRARY

At the meeting of the City council last evening, the matter of Prince Rupert obtaining a Carnegie Library was brought up by a report from the Board of Works. It was decided that the City Clerk communicate with the Carnegie Corporation, regarding this matter, and at the same time, communicate with the cities of Vancouver and Victoria regarding their experience.

The City Clerk pointed out that in 1913, there was a plebiscite taken on this same question, which was turned down. A fifty thousand dollar Library is granted on condition that ten per cent of this amount be expended annually upon the upkeep of the library. This added \$5,000 cast to the city would make an appreciable addition to the taxation of the city.

TORONTO MAYOR CRITICISES THE M. SERVICE ACT

Declares Little Result for the Millions Spent—Quarter of Amount Would Have Got More Men.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Toronto, March 5.—The dissatisfaction which is apparent throughout the country, caused by the working out of the Military Service Act or rather its not working out as was anticipated, was voiced here by Mayor Church, when he declared that "The Military Service Act is costing the country millions of dollars, and is not getting results. If the government had expended one quarter of the money on voluntary recruiting, they would have got more men."

Even those who were strong conscriptionists and voted for it are wondering when the hundred thousand men promised will be raised. It is admitted that this number of men would be under arms already and in training, had the voluntary system of recruiting been permitted to take its course, judging by the rate the recruits were coming in before the question of conscription was brought up at all. The pre-election cry for the necessity of more men, which was crushed down the throats of the people of Canada at that time is now stilled. Apparently, the government is now finding out that the necessity for more men no longer exists.

Entente Tokio Representatives Request that Eastern Ally Protect Allied Interests in Siberia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 5.—According to an announcement in the Daily Mail here, the British, French and Italian Ambassadors to the court of the Rising Sun were expected yesterday jointly request that Japan take all steps necessary to safe-guard the allied interests in Siberia.

This matter has been under discussion for sometime among the allied governments, as to whether Japan should be asked to lend her military assistance in defeating the plans of the Germans. The immediate action which is asked of Japan is the safeguarding of the tremendous quantities of munitions which are lying in the Siberian ports, awaiting transportation across the continent to Europe. Whether Japan will pursue her action into the interior of Siberia is not yet decided.

THE PROPER BASIS.

Among the speeches in parliament since the opening of the Provincial House has been noticeable the desire of the government to get down to business and to have every thing done for the increased productivity of this province of British Columbia. In the matter of agriculture particularly, the member for Chilliwack, Mr. Barrow, who was among the party of the late premier when he visited here last fall, was insistent for the necessity for co-operation on a much larger scale than heretofore. He had proofs, too, to back up his assertion of the feasibility, nay, actual necessity for this course of action being adopted through the land. In his own riding of Chilliwack, he showed how thorough co-operative methods production had been increased by nearly fifty per cent, and the same combination of farmers there hoped to make another fifty per cent increase there this coming season.

Provided the producer was protected from the "mercies" of the middleman. Mr. Barrow was convinced that there would be no falling down on the part of the man on the soil. In many cases, however, there was no co-operative movement among the producers. He mentioned cases where large crops had been raised, for which there was no market, and evaporators being idle while tons of produce went to waste. This state of affairs, is unfortunately true.

There is little to induce the farmer to raise crops if he cannot get a buyer at a satisfactory price. And in many cases, particularly in the southern and more developed portion of the province, the growers and farmers are at the mercy of the middleman. The farmers have proved their patriotism in many cases, by doing all they could to get the most out of the ground in this time of world shortage of food, while most of the benefit was reaped by the man who stepped in to buy his produce. It is all very well to argue the law of supply and demand, but it is known

that this law is subject to artificial alteration once in a while. Patriotism is not a thing that applies to the farmer alone, in the matter of producing food stuffs at this time. It is a thing which ought to apply all round, even unto the middleman seven times removed from the farmer.

FINED ONE DOLLAR.

Recently, a certain publication was banned by the Secretary of State in Canada, and among the first cases which we have noticed, came up in the Victoria Police Court last week, where a man was charged with being in possession of the forbidden book, after the censor had declared that it was not a fit and proper book for any man to possess at this time. Extenuating circumstances in this case enabled the accused to get off with a fine of one dollar.

Anyone who has read this book will agree that it is a religious book, a denominational book, and on a very controversial subject. But now that there is a Union Government in Canada, there is to be no more controversy. Freedom, as known in Britain is no longer in Canada. The autocracy at Ottawa, in the absence of a Religious Controller meantime, apparently do not want the existing beliefs interfered with or influenced by any new ideas.

Were this book seditious, it would be a different matter. Any seditious it contains is apparently not to be observed by the Censors in the United States where we understand the book is published, nor yet in Britain. But apparently it is seditious in Canada.

That the censor found it to be so, it is hard to believe. Yet he has said so. His action is law, and argument in the Police Court regarding this part of the matter is futile. Yet it would be interesting to know as to whose instigation the Government of Canada starts interfering with the religious beliefs, whether they are right or wrong, of the people of Canada, or any portion of them.

KAISER EXPECTS POLES TO BELIEVE THIS

London, March 2.—A Berlin telegram states that at the reception of the Regency Council today the Kaiser replied to an address presented by the Council. "It is a sincere joy to me to be able to greet you as the appointed representatives of the Polish State in my capital," he said. "I gather lively satisfaction from your words that you see in the act carried out by my exalted Allies and myself the fulfillment of the long cherished desire of the Polish people for the re-establishment of the independent Kingdom of Poland, and that you believe you will be best serving your Fatherland if, in common with the German Empire and the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy, you pursue the aims which guarantee the weal of humanity and the peaceable co-operation of peoples as against the calumnies of the enemy. I feel grateful that my unremitting efforts in a reign of nearly thirty years to be champion and protector of these principles will meet with deep sympathy on your part. May it be granted to you exalted and eminent gentlemen in successful labor to give the Polish State foundations which will guarantee its further peaceable development as an element of order, progress, and civilization. You may hereby be assured of the full support of myself and my government."—Reuter.

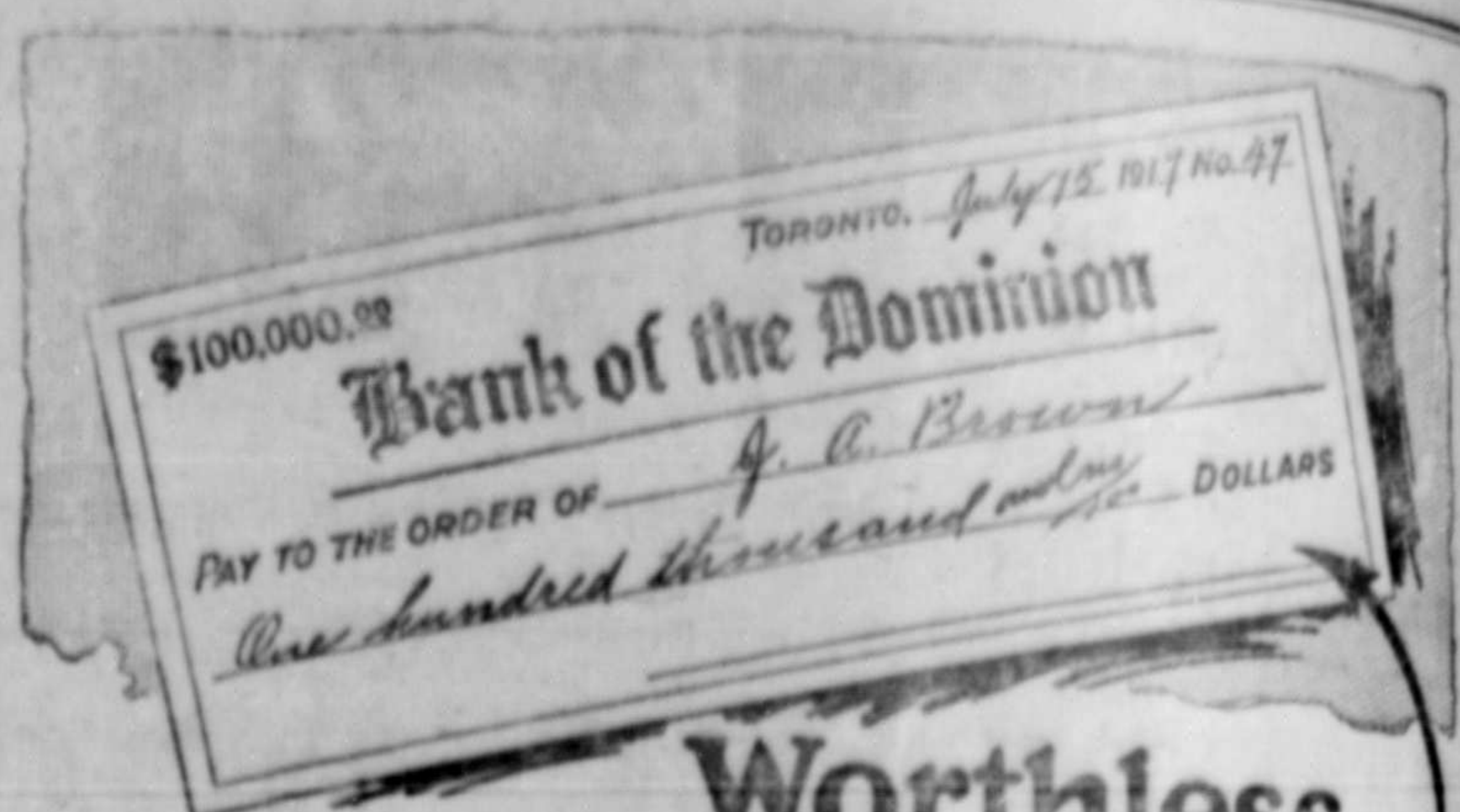

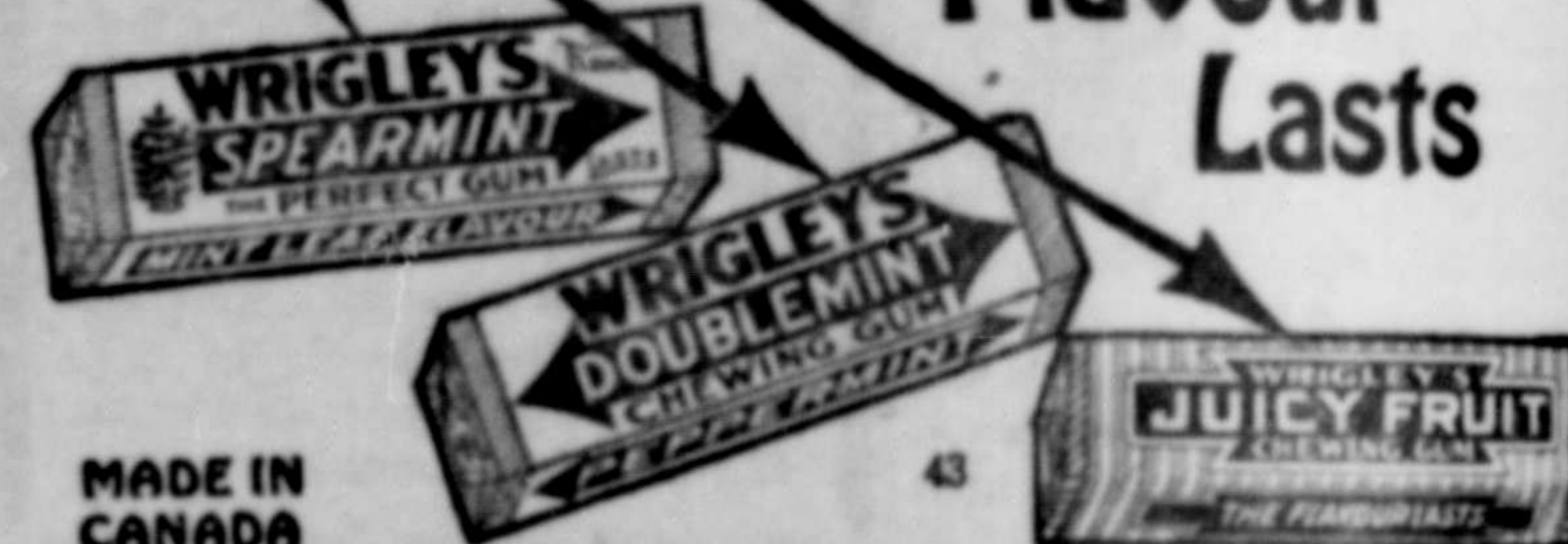

MESOPOTAMIA BENEFITS UNDER NEW CONDITIONS THROUGH BRITISH RULE

London, Feb. 1st.—(By mail)—When the British troops passed through Kut and pushed up the Tigris it was a complete ruin, the debris filled with fleas. The dogs had deserted the place and the cats had fallen on one another until every ruin held a head or a backbone. In the middle of April, says the Press Association's correspondent, a young political officer arrived, had all the rubbish cleared away, rebuilt the houses, reclaimed the doors which had been used for dugouts—for wood is valuable—erected an imposing colonnade bazaar along the river front, widened old streets and built new ones, repaired the mosques, the Turkish baths, the ice factory, and the flour mill, restored the water supply and converted the shoals and mud flats in the Tigris into gardens. Kut, though still partly in ruins, is a better and cleaner town, out of 6,000 inhabitants nearly 5,000 have returned and are very prosperous. There is a Townshend Road, Delamain Road, Melliss Road, and the names of brave regiments are recorded in Dorset Road, Norfolk Street, Mahratta Row, and the like until one comes to Plain Hai Street. Every association in the nomenclature of Kut is glorious to the memory of its defenders.

The cemetery in which so many Britons and Indians lie is at present a bare earth field. A brick wall has been built, and the graves are as clean cut and defined as in a home churchyard. Its sombre aspect will be changed when water is brought on to the land and the scrub palms are fertilised.

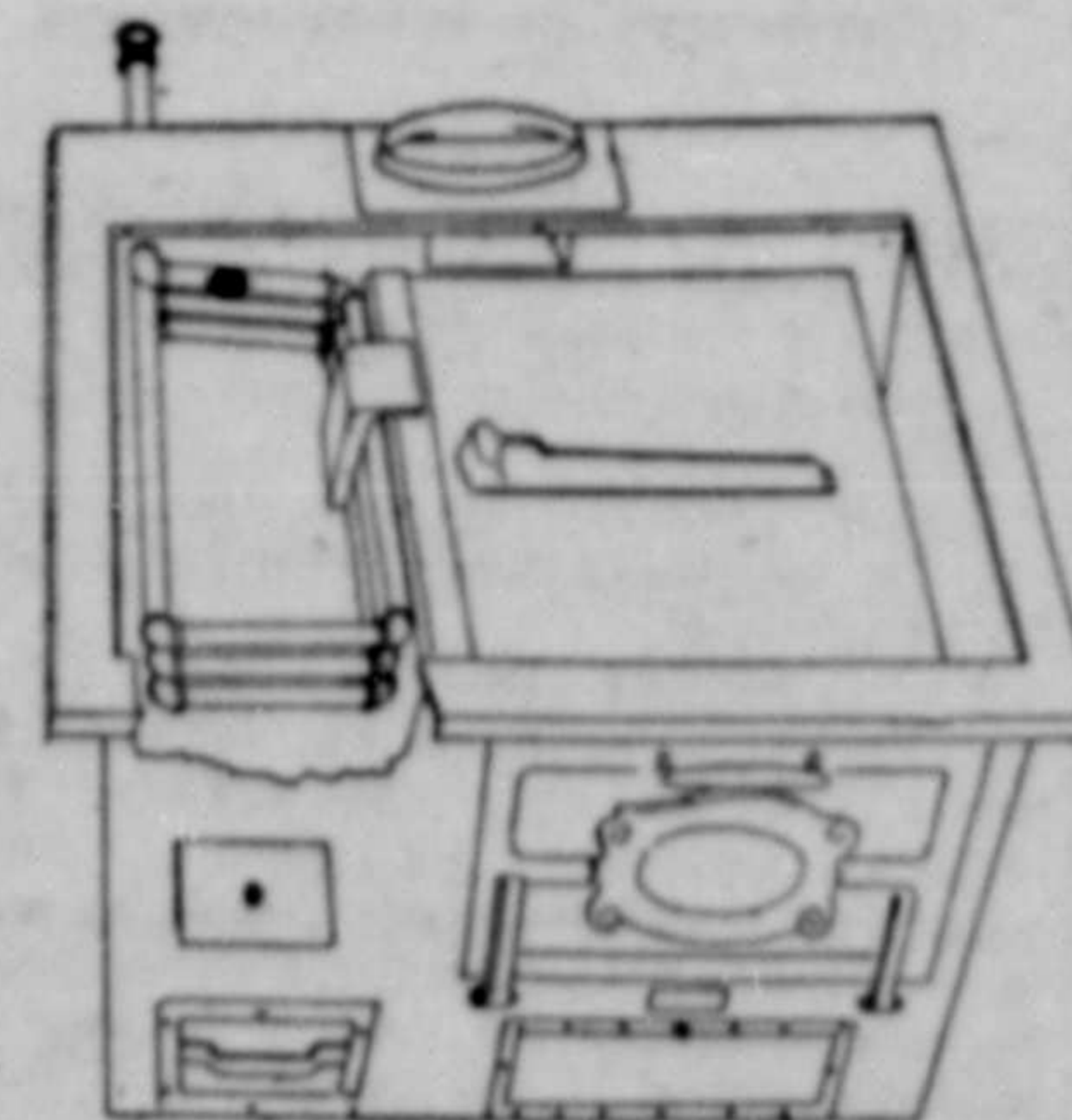
