RUSSIAN PEOPLE ENTHUSIASTIC TO FIGHT

DO NOT LIKE PEACE TERMS IMPOSED BY HUNS--HON. JOHN OLIVER FOR PREMIER

JAPAN'S INTERVENTION IN SIBERIA IS NOW ASSURED IN INTERESTS OF ALLIES

ALL ALLIED GOVERNMENTS, INCLUDING UNITED STATES AGREE UPON NECESSITY FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION TO PREVENT HUGE SUPPLIES IN SIBERIA FROM REACHING GERMAN HANDS.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 6.—The question of Japanese intervention in Siberia is understood to have been settled and that all the Allies as well as the United States have agreed to immediate action to safeguard the interests of the powers.

No Details.
Washington, March 6.—United States are now in agreement with Japan, Great Britain, and the other co-belligerents on the principal of action in Siberia but the details remain to be worked out.

The Outcome.
With the advent of armed Japanese forces in Siberia, where already there has been considerable peaceful penetration by Japanese settlers over a wide area, may have a very definite effect upon the final outcome of the war. It is not at all improbable that the troops of Japan may be fighting yet on the Eastern front in Europe.

The new Siberian Republic is known to be definitely against the Bolsheviki, who have made such a mess in Petrograd, and they have the entire control of Siberia unless in a few quarters of the vast country. Divisions of Chinese troops are already ready and only awaiting transportation to Europe. It is extremely probable that this force will be combined with the Japanese army, while there is enough equipment lying at Vladivostok and Harbin to equip all the forces of Siberia. Once in control of Siberia, it is but a short step to effect a junction with the forces of Cossacks who are still holding out against the Bolsheviki in southern Russia. The Japan-Chino-Siberia-Cossack combination will be a very strong one, strong enough to create a diversion on the Eastern front large enough to effect the strength of the German forces on the West.

TEN THOUSAND PEOPLE ATTEND FUNERAL OF LATE PREMIER

Victoria, March 6.—Amidst most impressive scenes, the funeral of the late Premier Brewster took place yesterday in Victoria. The cortege made its way through the streets to the last resting place, amid huge crowds, and ten thousand people paid their last respects to the memory of one of British Columbia's notable citizens.

All ordinary business was suspended in Victoria for the occasion and every flag flew at half mast.

The funeral services took place in the Baptist Church of which Premier Brewster had been a member and was attended by all the members of the Legislature. The late premier's only son Corporal Raymond Brewster is at present overseas with the 15th Battalion, and the chief mourners were his two brothers, Captain G. W. Brewster, of Vancouver, who was at his bedside at the time of his death, and Mr. J. H. Brewster, of the Seattle Post Intelligencer, Seattle.

APPLICATIONS FOR DISCHARGE FROM THE ARMY ARE REFUSED

Ottawa, March 6.—The three months furore for all the married men who left Canada with the original first contingent has been arranged. Applications for discharge from those who have already reached Canada are pouring in. The government has been obliged to refuse the requests owing to agreement reached with the Imperial War authorities.

London, March 6.—Addressing a meeting at Eastham last night Arthur Henderson, Secretary of the Labor Party, made a strong appeal for the abolition of secret diplomacy, for peace by conciliation and for a league of nations.

VIOLENT AIR RAID DAMAGES VENICE

Rome, March 5.—In the most violent raid on Italy since the war began fifty enemy aeroplanes dropped three hundred bombs on Venice, doing great damage to many famous structures. Two hospitals were struck. Casualties were one killed and several injured.

Grave damage was done to the Ducal palace, the Bridge of Sighs, the Church of St. John and St. Paul, and the Church of St. Simon as well as other treasures of Venice.

In response to the man's invitation to shoot, if she considered the waste of lead worth it, she considered the problem of taking the man's life, and thereby demonstrates that a girl even with a rifle in her hands is not always to be depended upon at a pinch.

GERMAN PEACE IS REGARDED AS SCRAP OF PAPER

Russian People Will Soon Decide Whether German Terms are Acceptable to Mass of People.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, March 6.—The Peace Treaty signed by the Bolsheviki government of Russia with the German representatives on that fateful Sunday at Brest-Litovsk is now regarded as only a scrap of paper. The highest enthusiasm for fighting is now prevalent through Petrograd and the surrounding districts. The executive council in Petrograd have called an extra ordinary session of the Soldiers, Peasants and Cossacks at Moscow for the twelfth of March, when it will be decided whether to accept or reject the terms of peace, which will be such a costly affair for Russia.

GERMAN SUBMARINES ARE SUNK NOW AS FAST AS BUILT SAYS SIR ERIC GEDDES

BRITISH AND UNITED STATES SUBMARINE CHASERS AND DESTROYERS ARE HOLDING UNDER WATER MENACE IN CHECK--EXAGGERATED CLAIMS OF SUCCESS MADE BY HUNS TO KEEP UP COURAGE.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 6.—"Great Britain and the United States are sinking the enemy submarines as fast as they can be built." Sir Eric Geddes, First Lord of the Admiralty told the House of Commons yesterday. "Germany is greatly exaggerating her successes, in one month as much as seventy per cent. There is no reason to alter my opinion that the menace is held but not yet mastered."

Meantime, although the allies

are able to destroy subs, allied shipping will not be safe until they are prevented from leaving German ports, on their voyages of destruction. It is admitted that the only way to master the menace to the shipping of the allied countries is to capture the German seaboard, and so leave them without a base of operations. So long as the depths of the sea cannot be successfully blockaded, as is the surface, the Germans will have opportunity to launch their deadly campaign of murder against the allies.

HON. JOHN OLIVER IS SPOKEN OF FOR THE PREMIERSHIP

Victoria, March 6.—There is considerable discussion among the members of the government side of the house as to who will be the new premier. It is not decided yet whether the Hon. John Oliver will continue in the position of acting premier, in which position he was placed by the late Premier Brewster and so finish the session, when a convention could be held for the selection of a new premier.

While the choice of the Hon. John Oliver as acting premier was made by the late Premier Brewster, it is most likely that the course which will be followed will be to continue him in his present position. He has proved him

self to be a man who knows what he wants, with the ability to get it, while his long experience of parliamentary procedure makes him peculiarly fitted for the post at this time.

His handling of the railroad situation with regard to the Pacific Great Eastern has brought forth praise all over the province, and his keen grasp of the situation enabled him to make the best of a bad job.

The Hon. Mr. Oliver has the confidence of his colleagues in the House, and of the people of the province and his long experience and undoubted capabilities make him the fitting man for the strenuous work which lies ahead.

SOME CHANGES IN THE CUSTOMS HOUSE STAFF

It is learned that Mr. Hugh Dunn, who has been for many years in the Customs House here, at Butedale. It is understood that Mr. Dunn will take over his new duties immediately, and will leave for Butedale next Monday. Mr. Jarvis McLeod, collector of Customs of this port, is at present in Ottawa.

Mr. Hugh Dunn has been with the department for many years now, having joined as a boy in Vancouver and was transferred here, when his parents moved north in the early days. Both he and Mrs. Dunn will be missed in Prince Rupert when they take their departure, which will be the first effect of the Union Government upon this city. The Department at Ottawa is evidently undertaking some new policy, as hitherto it has not been the custom to station senior and old experienced members of the Customs staff at small and unimportant points like Butedale.

Mrs. Dunn and family will take up their residence in Vancouver, while Mr. Dunn takes up his duties down the coast at Butedale.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have had charge of the hospital buildings for some years now, while the launch "Evelyn" which has been continuously in commission also belongs to the Station.

Dr. Cade has been the Quarantine Medical Officer since the departure of Dr. Tremayne for overseas, and it is probable that this position will be done away with too.

FORCES OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY RESTORING ORDER IN UKRAINE

Vienna, March 6.—Operations of the Austro-Hungary forces for the restoring of order and security in the Ukraine are taking their course, says an official statement.

Avalanche Hits Austrians.
Geneva, March 6.—The heaviest snowfall of the present winter in the Swiss Tyrolean Alps has occurred during the last 24 hours.

One avalanche cut an Austrian military train in two killing 26 officers and men.

U. S. Trenches Attacked.
Paris, March 6.—A German attack last night on the trenches held by American forces in Lorraine was repulsed. American patrols operating in the same region took a number of German prisoners.

FEDERATED LABOUR PARTY ORGANISES

Last evening in the Carpenter's Hall, the preliminary organization meeting for a local branch of the Federated Labour Party was held. The meeting had been called by Alderman Geo. B. Casey who briefly explained the objects to be attained by this organization. Quite a number of members were enrolled, and there were several speakers.

JOHN REDMUND UNDERWENT AN OPERATION

London, March 6.—John Redmond, leader of the Irish party in the House of Commons who underwent an operation last Saturday did not have a very good day but was somewhat easier last night.

RUSSIAN PEOPLE ARE AGAINST HUN PEACE

Vologda, Russia, March 5.—The interior of Russia, following the example of Moscow, declares strongly against a separate peace with Germany. Workmen's and Soldier's councils in many provincial centres are issuing mobilization orders proclaiming a fight to the finish in both of the revolutions.

London, March 5.—German forces are moving on the town of Bologoie, on the Moscow-Petrograd railway, which place is the chief freight centre for the feeding of Petrograd, says a dispatch from Petrograd under date of Friday, received by the Exchange Telegraph company. The Germans probably intend, the message adds, thus to cut off supplies from Petrograd and to compel the capital to capitulate to famine.

Large columns of German troops, the correspondent says, are marching toward Novosokolniki. Enemy forces have occupied the station of Kliastitsa in their movement in the direction of Petrograd.

GERMANS WILL HANG ALL THE RED GUARDS

When Town of Wolmar Captured, Two Hundred Persons Hanged Without Investigation by Germans.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 6.—A semi-official news agency dispatched from Petrograd quotes a Bolsheviki proclamation which says that when Germans entered Wolmar, Feb. 20 two hundred persons were arrested and hanged without investigation. The Germans have announced that all Bolsheviki Red Guards will be killed.

"Left" Reject Terms.
Petrograd, March 6.—At a conference of the Left Social revolutionaries a resolution was adopted rejecting the "conditions of peace which have been accepted by the majority of the Central executive committee," and calling on the proletariat to "defend Russia against the German-Imperialists."

Many Times Lost.
Washington, March 6.—Several thousands of lives were lost and millions of dollars worth of damage done in the city of Kiev, during the recent fighting between the Ukrainians and the Bolsheviki, according to delayed consular telegrams to the State Department received today.

CONSCRIPTION.

The recent pronunciation of the Mayor of Toronto on the manner in which the Military Service Act is falling down is significant of the trend of thought of many people throughout the Dominion.

The immediate necessity for conscription or compulsory service was impressed upon the people, to the total exclusion of all other considerations.

The facts as they are would seem to warrant the belief that the people of Canada have had one slipped over them again, by the astute coadjutors of Sir Robert Borden.

WAR LOANS.

After nearly four years of war, during which time she has expended enormous sums of money for the financing of her

own operations as well as those of her allies, Great Britain has started on Monday the raising of another £100,000,000. It is expected that this amount will be subscribed within a week.

The wealth of the people of Great Britain, obtained by their producing power, was never more noticeable than at this time, as is also their willingness to lend that which they have.

People have often said that the "old country" is played out. Since 1914, such has been disproved, and the manner in which the old country can produce the sinews of war shows that this is very far from being the case.

ZIONISM.

Already there are forty eight Jewish colonies settled in Palestine, and since the news of the capture of Jerusalem and all the land to the south of it by the British, the hope of the Jew for a resting place, a land that he can call his own, seems about to be realized.



of the world to the land promised to their forefathers thousands of years ago, which will show the working out of the prophecies contained in the Old Testament.

But the territory given in former years to the men of Judah does not include all Palestine, and the remainder of the country belongs by right to the descendants of the other ten sons of Jacob.

Already plans are outlined for the utilisation of the tremendous hydro electric power provided by the river Jordan and its tributaries. The river rises 900 feet above the sea and falls into the dead sea some 300 feet below the sea level.

There is sufficient hydraulic power for the use of the greater part of Palestine. With the introduction of the more modern methods of developing the resources of this little country, there are bound to be great changes in the land which has changed not for centuries.
