DEPORTATION OF BELGIANS CONTINUES

CHILDREN OF THIRTEEN ARE BEING TAKEN TO GERMANY—FACTORIES RUINED

GERMAN ADVANCE THROUGH RUSSIA CONTINUES ALTHO' HOSTILITIES SAID STOPPED

JAMBURG, A SCANT EIGHTY MILES FROM PETROGRAD CAPTURED BY GERMANS, WHO CONTINUE TO CLEAN UP THE COUNTRY OF ALL WAR SUPPLIES—PETROGRAD REMAINS ORDERLY AND CALM.

London, March 8.—The Germans have captured Jamburg, as well as the town of Narva, while the Russo-German offensive continues at the same time beyond Trebiand, in Asia Minor, according to the official agency dispatch received here today. This action, adds the statement, is taking place despite the official announcement of the German High Command that the hostilities against Russia have ceased.

Petrograd Orderly.
Petrograd, March 8.—The city of Petrograd remains calm and orderly, regardless of the presence of the German troops as near the city as Narva, and the evidence

on all sides of the removal of war supplies.

Says Revolution Stifled.

Petrograd, March 8.—To a gathering of the Workmen's and Soldier's delegates at Moscow on Monday, M. Prokrovsky, the leader of the second Peace delegation to Brest-Litovsk, explained the treaty with the Central powers.

Deeply moved, he begged those in sympathy with the democratic revolution not to deceive themselves. The new frontiers traced by Germany, he declared, constituted a ring of iron around revolutionary Russia. He insisted that the Germans were endeavouring to stifle the revolution, and that conquest was reduced to nothing by the economic demands of Berlin.

UNITED STATES WILL TAKE OVER ALL GERMAN INTERESTS

(Special to The Daily News)
Washington, March 8.—The United States will take over all German interests throughout the United States will be taken over by the government, the plan which has been brought before the attention of Congress by the Alien War Custodian, Mitchell Palmer. The bill was discussed yesterday and received the unanimous approval of Congress. It is realized that after the war, Germany cannot be permitted to maintain her outposts of "Kultur" in the United States, as she has hitherto, under the guise of commercial undertakings. It is known that the official custodian that the

plans laid by the German government for the after war period are far-reaching, and already in many of the basic industries, arrangements have been made by Germans through neutrals, unsuspecting or otherwise, which will be very advantageous for Germany, and correspondingly inimical to the United States. The holdings of the German interests, in lands, timber, real estate and other industries run to hundreds of millions, and as the outcome of this war, the Germans will find it increasingly hard to exploit the United States as they have done in the past.

HINDUS ATTACK MOSLEMS IN INDIA

London, March 7.—A cable from Calcutta reports that a special tribunal at Arrah, Bengal, has convicted 118 of the anti-Moslem rioters who attacked the village of Mauna. Eleven were sentenced to transportation for life, and the remainder to shorter terms for complicity. The "Judgment" says that the attack on Mauna is a grim and moving story. Mauna is an isolated Mohammedan village, surrounded by big Hindu villages. The Hindus distributed pamphlets inciting to the looting of the Mohammedans. Warned by faithful Hindu menials, the Mohammedans of Mauna erected barricades. A one hour battle ensued, during which a handful of Mohammedans, aided by Hindu menials, repeatedly repulsed the Hindu mob, which, however, eventually burst the barricades, swarmed into the village, and there were guilty of murder, rape, arson, sacrilege, and looting.

NEW PREMIER GETS HEARTY RECEPTION

Carries Through His First Session Late Premier's Desk Draped in Black and Kept Vacant.

Victoria, March 7.—Premier John Oliver carried through his first session in office yesterday afternoon. He was given a hearty reception from the House as he entered the Legislative Chamber. The new premier kept the desk which he had occupied as Minister of Agriculture, next to that of the late Premier Brewster, which will be held vacant, draped in black, for the remainder of the session.

INLAND REVENUE DEPT. IS TO BE ADDED TO CUSTOMS

Ottawa, March 8.—It is understood that in connection with the reorganization of the Cabinet made necessary by the defeat of Messrs. Blondin and Seigny, the government will add the department of Inland Revenue to the Customs Department, thus reducing the number of departments of

the government administration by one.

The bringing into force on April first of the War Time Prohibition Act will have a tendency to greatly reduce the importance of the Inland Revenue Department, and a decision to make it a sub-department of the Customs would occasion no surprise here.

CASUALTIES ARE FEWER ON WESTERN FRONT

General Lull Over Line with Intermittent and Local Raids. German Raiders Out Scouting.

London, March 6.—The lull in the fighting on the western front has caused a welcome falling off in the casualties among prominent British athletes although several well-known names appear in the latest list issued. The Rev. Harvey Staunton, chaplain to the forces, whose death on service is announced, was a famous cricketer and a member of the Notts County team in 1903-4-5.

A Heavy Raid.

London, March 8.—A heavy raid under the protection of an intense barrage fire from the German massed artillery, was directed against the British troops near Epehy last night. The raid was completely repulsed without loss to the British, either in casualties or prisoners taken.

Sharp Fighting near Lens.

London, March 8.—Sharp fighting in the vicinity of Lens is reported in the official communication issued here tonight. It says: "Under cover of considerable artillery bombardments, at dawn a hostile raiding party attacked our trenches west of Lens. The attack was completely repulsed after sharp fighting wherein we captured a few prisoners."

French Repulse Enemy.

Paris, March 8.—A German attack last night on the trenches held by American forces in Lorraine was repulsed, the French official statement issued today announced. American patrols operating in the same region, the statement adds, took a number of German prisoners.

German Report.

Berlin, March 7.—Increased fighting activity yesterday on the Lorraine front in Northern France and in the central Vosges region is reported in today's army headquarters announcement.

Norwegians Lose 726 Ships.

London, March 8.—From the outbreak of the war up to the end of February the losses of Norwegian vessels as a result of the war aggregated 726, of 1,066,821 tons. Seamen to the number of 902 perished in the disasters.

In addition 53 vessels with crews aggregating more than 700 are missing, and of these two-thirds are to be war losses. These figures were made public today by the Norwegian legation in London.

GERMAN PRISONERS TO INVADE CHINA

(Special to The Daily News)

Peking, March 8.—The governor of the province of Sin Kiang, western China, from which have come reports that Turks and Germans are stirring up the Mohammedans, telegraphs that large forces of Germans, originally taken prisoners are massing on the frontier, evidently intending an invasion of Sin Kiang. They are well armed and it is considered that the invasion of India is contemplated. The telegram adds that the people are panic-stricken and ask that rifles and ammunition be sent to the governor.

The province of Sin Kiang is generally designated at Chinese or eastern Turkestan. It is bounded on the north by Mongolia, on the west by Russia and on the southwest by Afghanistan and Northern India.

GERMANS ANNOYED BY JAPAN'S INTERVENING

(Special to The Daily News)

Amsterdam, March 8.—According to dispatches received here from Berlin, there is considerable unrest among the German people at the prospect of the intervention of Japan in the war from a military point of view. The German government have issued soothing statements that the pretext that Japan desires to secure herself against the German advance in Russia is absolutely ridiculous. It says that this event will either lead to an agreement with Russia and Germany against Japan, or else an agreement between Germany and Japan.

Guarded statements are also made by the Berlin press about the thousands of German prisoners in Siberia now being armed, and obtaining thousands of recruits among the Russians for the purpose of defeating any attempt of Japan to penetrate inland.

DEPORTATION OF BELGIAN POPULATION IS CONTINUED FACTORIES ARE DESTROYED

AGE LIMIT OF SLAVE LABOUR EXTENDED TO CHILDREN OF THIRTEEN YEARS—LOCAL RAILWAY AND STREET CAR RAILS BEING TAKEN UP AND SENT TO GERMANY—FACTORIES DYNAMITED.

Le Havre, March 8.—The spoilation of Belgium is still going on and the Hun masters of the country are still doing their best to break the spirit of the people. The engines, machines and foundations of the factories around Mons are being blown up by dynamite so that what the Germans have been unable to carry away to their own country will be worse than useless to the Belgian people and the allies when the Germans are forced to retire from the invaded provinces. They are also carrying off the rails from the street and local railway tracks for use in Germany, according to Belgians who have recently escaped from Belgium. The deportation of the inhabitants who still survive also

continues to take place regularly, and the age limit has been extended to take in children of as young as thirteen years.

Harrowing tales are told by the latest refugees to arrive here of the hardships and miseries being inflicted upon the Belgian people in the power of the Germans. The harsh treatment of the population of the occupied countries show no signs of being improved, and the iron hand of the Huns weighs heavy now as it did ever. There have been very few arrivals for some months back now, of the workers forced to go to Germany to work in the factories there for the Germans, and the very few who have been brought back are broken in body by the severe treatment meted out to them, but the spirit of the people remain.

BRITAIN MAKES IMMENSE LOANS TO HER ALLIES

British Chancellor Gives Starting Figures of National Finance During War. Lot of Money.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, March 8.—Great Britain's loans to her allies up to Feb. 9, totalled the immense amount of £1,264,000,000, was announced by Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer in the British Parliament, yesterday. Loans made to the Dominions reached to the sum of £180,000,000. According to the pronouncement of the Chancellor, the National Debt at the end of the financial year would not amount to more than £5,900,000,000.

The average daily expenditure from the beginning of the financial year up to February 9, Bonar Law set forth was £6,557,000. A vote of credit was moved by the Chancellor for £600,000,000, bring the total since the outbreak of the war up to £6,842,000,000. The British Treasury has sufficient funds on hand to carry it on for the remainder of the financial year

THE GERMAN REACTION.

The War prophet has long since ceased to have honor in his own or any other country. War, we have learned by this time, sets free vast elementary forces whose action is less susceptible of calculation than the behaviour of a reawakened volcano, and the most cautious and best informed of writers would hardly care to be confronted with the cold print of the predictions he had made since 1914. An example of the salutary power of experience has been the instinctive caution with which the press of the Allied countries has avoided the tempting new field for vaticination opened up by the German strikes. The latest reports have justified their caution; they may also tempt one to abandon it by drawing conclusions just the opposite to those in which one was inclined to indulge a few days ago. But we do not incur the responsibilities of the prophet by remarking that the hopes for the political regeneration of Germany which were based on the events of the last week must be abandoned in the meantime. The General Strike, on whose paralyzing effect the Marxists laid such stress, is impotent to overturn a settled government unless, as was the case in Russia, it is backed up by the army and accompanied by the seizure of all public property; and the uncertainty of its success in any circumstances is curiously illustrated by the recent assertion of the Bolshevik leaders that in order to save the Revolution it was necessary to deprive it of the power of self defence by abolishing military discipline and cashiering the officers.

In the minds of the German people—to whom nothing is so terrifying as social disorder and an urgent call on the individual will—the present plight of Russia must be a very powerful antidote to the "Russian infection" of democracy which the German government appear to dread. Famine and general misery were the causes of the German strikes; acuter famine and a deeper misery—

a misery unrelieved by political idealism and political courage—have apparently been the causes of their failure. And now Prussian Militarism presents us with a heroic picture of itself in the act of brushing aside the last stray bees of the insurgent hives, and turning from such petty things as futile strikes to the real Order of the Day—the bolstering up of the U-boat campaign, and the extraction of tonics for tired Teutons from the utterances of Allied statesmen. As was inevitable, fighting capital is made out of Lord Lansdowne's unfortunate soliloquy, and Sir Eric Geddes's statements as to the U-boats are replied to with the vague blusterings which in the land of Kant and Goethe seems nowadays to pass for both fact and argument. The rebellious serfs of Saxony and the Rhineland, herded back to their tasks, may console themselves for their humiliation by reading accounts of the new decoration for submarine crews and by their own interpretation of the "Frankfurter Zeitung's" assertion that the war must first be terminated before a coalition of nations takes place.

What has been has been, however. The strikes, though their extent may have been exaggerated, are a fact in German War history which the government may have yet to reckon with; and the dissolved Labor Council is an abandoned outwork which may be reoccupied. Events so far, it is true offer little encouragement to those who, accepting the postulate of a fixed national psychology, have turned for light to the history of the rising of 1848. "This is not riot, but revolution," Metternich was told by the insurgents who burst into the Palace at Vienna in March of that year. And "Revolution" was the term applied throughout Europe to the series of dramatic events that, beginning with the flight of Metternich, culminated in the donning of Revolutionary emblems by the despots of Austria and Prussia, and in their recognition of the self-elected Preliminary Parliament of



Frankfort. but in January, 1849, Frederick William IV. responded in high-Hollenzollernese to the Parliament's offer of the headship of Germany, and tossed back disdainfully a crown which "dishonored him unspeakably with its carrion odour of revolution." A few months later the "rump" of the Frankfort Parliament were evicted by a company of Wurtemberg soldiers; the era of Bismarck had begun. Are the fetters then fastened to be double-locked today, and to be laid on more of Europe? If the answer depended merely on the traditional "psychology" of Germany, the outlook would be dismal indeed. But the psychologies of the Allied Nations are also concerned, and the vigorous expression of them in the War will not only free Europe for ever from the Prussian menace, but in doing so will alter the psychology of the German people to the extent of impelling them to seize the birthright of free and honest government which they renounced seventy years ago for the sour potage of Prussianism.—G.H.

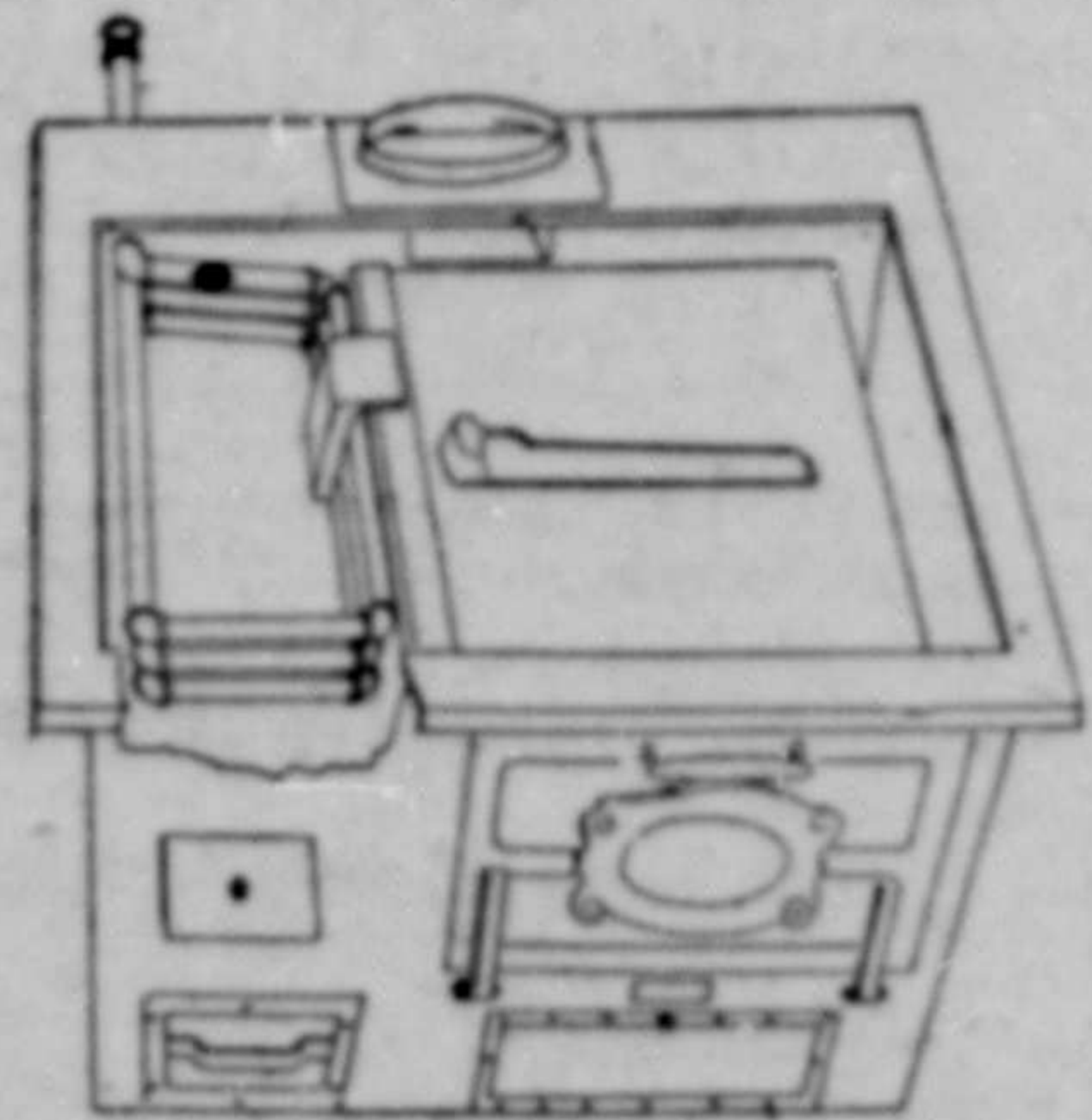
