GERMAN AEROPLANES RAID CITY OF PARIS

LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE IN VANCOUVER--HUN ATTACK REPULSED NEAR YPRES

STRONG ATTACK MADE BY HUNS NEAR YPRES. POSITIONS REGAINED BY COUNTER ATTACK

FIGHTING FIERCE WHILE IT LASTED AND ENEMY ATTACK FINALLY REPULSED SUCCESSFULLY--GREAT AERIAL ACTIVITY ON BOTH SIDES--TEN HUN PLANES DOWN AND TEN DISABLED.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 11.—British troops repulsed a German attack near Ypres on a front of nearly a mile on Friday evening. At only one point were the Germans able to penetrate the British lines, and counter attack drove them out again on Saturday night.

The official announcement says: East of Ypres yesterday evening, after considerable artillery preparation, through the day, and with a heavy bombardment covering their advance, the enemy attacked on nearly a mile front south of the Menin road, and north of Polderhoek Chateau. Despite the intense artillery fire, and the determination of their attack, they were repulsed everywhere, except in the neighborhood of Polderhoek. At that point, they succeeded in entering our advance posts on a front of a hundred yards. Severe fighting there on Saturday night resulted in the recapture of these positions.

Airmen Busy.
London, March 11.—There was weather yesterday and great aerial activity was noticeable on both sides. The enemy machines persistently attacked our bombers and artillery spotting machines. There were many dramatic fights in the air between the opposing fighters. Ten of the German machines were downed, and ten others disabled. Three of our machines are missing.

The Huns had apparently made a great concentration of their flyers along the British lines, and many more of their machines were in the air at once than they had for months.

U.S. Patrol Fight
With the American Army in France, March 9.—An American patrol of five men three nights out-fought an enemy patrol of seven. They met in No Man's Land and the Americans opened fire. The Germans replied and in three minutes there was a sharp skirmish. The enemy retreated, leaving two dead and two wounded Bavarians who were taken prisoners. The American patrol returned to its own line without having received a scratch. Officers report that despite the fact that the Germans fired many shells to prepare the way for a full-scale attack, not a single enemy got into position to carry it out, the American rifles, machine guns and automatic rifles stopping the Germans in their trenches.

CITY OF PARIS IS RAIDED BY GERMAN AEROPLANES

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, March 11.—German aviators raided the city of Paris last night. Early reports show that bombs were dropped with some loss of life and some property damage. Several squadrons of the enemy machines participated in this raid, converging upon the capital from different directions. They crossed the French lines successfully and reached the city one after the other. Large French air forces ascended simultaneously with the signal of "Alert," which was given at 8:30 p.m. While several houses were demolished, and some lives lost, the damage done was not excessive, the raiders being driven off before they had time to drop all their bombs in the inhabited areas.

RUSSIANS ALLEGE JAPANESE LANDED AT VLADIVOSTOK

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 11.—Details of an alleged landing of Japanese troops at Vladivostok in January are given in the Petrograd newspapers of January 10, which have just been received here. These newspapers state that the Japanese cruiser "Mikado" arrived on January 12, and was followed by two or more cruisers on January 14. Four thousand soldiers were landed, and a number of officers continue to arrive in Vladivostok daily.

Russians Will Co-operate.
Petrograd, March 11.—Prince Lvoff has informed the council of Soldiers and Workmen's delegates here that the ministers of the Revolutionaries in Russia have constituted a new Russian government in the Far East, and are awaiting the landing of Japanese troops in Vladivostok, in order to enter Siberian territory with them. The Soviet of Vladivostok is mobilizing all the forces it can raise for resistance, and is forming a Red Guard.

GERMANS CAPTURE THE ALAND ISLANDS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 11.—Two Russian transports were attacked and sunk by German destroyers after a fight, south of Aland Islands on Thursday.

Islands Captured.
Stockholm, Sweden, March 11.—Two thousand German troops have been disembarked on the Aland islands. Several other German transports are anchored at Eckerol, and the German flag is hoisted.

The Prussian press have opened a bitter campaign against the Scandinavians. Norway is scored for entering into the shipping agreement with the entente, and Sweden is said to be reaping the harvest of prudence.

Washington, March 11.—Germany, with the aid of Lenine, the Bolsheviki prime minister, is planning to bring about industrial revolution in the United States, Japan, France, Italy and Great Britain. The Germans have laid before the Bolsheviki leaders a proposition whereby Germany's agents, sailing in Russian ships, are to be landed in Japan, the United States and the British Asiatic colonies to do the work of agitators.

GERMAN AEROPLANES RAID LONDON ON MOONLESS NIGHT AURORA ASSISTS HUNS

EVERY AEROPLANE TURNED BACK EXCEPT ONE WHICH DROPPED BOMBS—ANTI-AIR-CRAFT-GUNFIRE PARTICULARLY ACCURATE—EFFECTIVE BARRAGE PUT UP—NORTHERN LIGHTS HELP HUNS.

PROHIBITION ACT WILL BE ENFORCED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, March 11.—The government has decided to stand by its announcement of last December, and all inter-provincial traffic in intoxicating liquor will be prohibited after April 1. Petition after petition has been made to the government to have the date extended on account of varying circumstances, but these considerations have been overruled.

There will also be an order dealing with the manufacture of liquor. It is understood that all manufacturers of alcoholic liquor will be prohibited from this business after April 30, except that which can be legally sold in any province.

BOLSHEVIKI GRAB SUPPLIES VALDIVOSTOK

Japanese and Chinese Troops are Moving into Russian Territory—Japan Will Act Quickly.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 9.—Japan and China are despatching troops into Asiatic Russia, the former into Siberia and the latter into Manchuria. Teintsin newspapers have announced, according to dispatch to The Evening News, received today. The dispatch added that General Tuan Chi Jui probably would be the Chinese supreme commander.

The Bolsheviki has seized a pier at Valdivostok containing munitions and other goods valued at one hundred rubles, according to advices received here today. The same dispatch declared the Bolsheviki threatened to requisition a foreign merchant ship for their use, and that allied warships in the harbor were prepared to land marines. None of the news yet has been confirmed.

Will Act Energetically.
Rome, March 9.—"The Government at Tokio will act energetically, but it is impossible to say in what way, it not being desired to have the enemy know anything of its plans," General Semba of the Japanese Army is quoted here as declaring in an interview regarding the situation in the Far East.

Japan's attitude, continued the General in the interview, depends upon the enemy's action—whether the Germans enter Petrograd, and should they do so, whether they will stop there, or invade, even without military action, the remainder of eastern Russia, under the pretext of re-establishing order and organizing supplies, and thus reach Siberia, Japan, the General declared, was ready for any eventuality.

London, March 9.—The text of the official report regarding last night's air raid is as follows:

"The latest police reports state that 11 were killed and 46 injured in last night's airplane raid. It is feared that six bodies are still buried in the wreckage of houses. All of the casualties occurred in London."

"Last night's air raid appears to have been carried out by seven or eight enemy airplanes, of which two reached London. The first two raiders approached the Isle of Thanet at about 10:55 p.m. and proceeded up the Thames estuary. Both were turned back before reaching London."

"Meanwhile the third raider came across the Essex coast at 11:20 p.m. and steered west. At 11:45 p.m. it was reported over east London. A few minutes later it dropped bombs on the southwestern and northwestern districts. At 11:50 p.m. the fourth raider, which had also come in across Essex, dropped bombs on the north of London and then proceeded south across the City, dropping its remaining bombs on the northern district between 12.20 and 12.30 a.m. The remaining enemy machines, all of which came across the Essex coast, were turned back before they reached London."

"A certain amount of damage was caused to residential property in London. Several houses have been demolished."

Did Not Depend on Moonlight
The raid demonstrated that German aviators no longer depend upon moonlight. It was the first time the enemy had attempted a night raid over London where there was no moon. The stars were out, and there was little wind.

Northern Lights Aid Enemy
There was a remarkable display of northern lights last night and it is believed by many that this furnished conditions under which the air raiders could work more effectively than under a clear starlit sky. Watchers on the Kent coast said that just before they heard the raiders approaching the whole northern sky became illuminated in bands of red and white lights which shone onto the sea with far more powerful effect than a full moon. Then, as if to accentuate the brightness by contrast, the skies to the southward, toward France and the English Channel grew what seemed to be pitch dark. Another feature of the raid was the strong breeze which most persons believe hindered the operations of the hostile airplanes. Those who watched from high points the spectacle of the searchlights and gun flashes wondered how the enemy could face the wind and cold.

NON-COMBATANT VICTIMS.

It is to be hoped that those misguided persons who go about seeking excuses for their country's enemies, or who urge the Allies to come to terms with the Prussian Minotaur, will ponder deeply over Mr. Bonar Law's statement that 14,120 British non-combatants have been killed by German submarines and aircraft. The majority of the victims have been merchant seamen, the men to whose quiet bravery the nation owes its immunity from privation, and the Allies their ability to continue the war. The others have been mainly women and children, done to death at sea or in their own homes. Mr. Bonar Law's figures bring painfully home to us the way in which the calculated brutality of Germany has extended the scope of war's destructiveness. The number of British non-combatants killed by the Germans, huge as it is, would be but a fraction of the number of Armenians, Syrians, Arabs, Poles, Serbians, Roumanians, and Tartars who have either been massacred wholesale or have perished of cold and hunger in their flight before invading armies. Since 1914 rather more than a fourth of the population of Serbia has perished, and it has been estimated that the number of non-combatants in Europe and Asia whose untimely deaths have been directly due to the war is at least as great as the number of men who have been killed or mortally wounded in the field. These appalling facts must surely deepen the determination of every right thinking human being to stamp out the evil power of Prussia, the power whose obstinacy in devilishness has been freshly instanced by the placing of British and French officer prisoners in areas subject to risks of air raids. Peace is but an idle dream so long as an official Germany remains apparently unconscious of its sins against humanity.

There is the East, the near East, the far East, the middle east, and so forth, which terms are applied to certain definite areas, chiefly in the continent of Asia. And the most recent events brought about by the war are drawing attention to a part of Asia. And the most recent ever heard nowadays. And that is the region lying immediately north of India. This is ostensibly a province of China, called Eastern Turkestan, and the governor there has reported that the Turco-Germans are very active among the tribes along the border of India.

The fact of so many German prisoners being taken to Siberia during the previous campaigns of the war is now apparently being taken advantage of by the German government. They are apparently free to come and go at their own free will and imprisonment has been reduced to exile.

Berlin is now boasting that Germany now has a free way through Persia and Afghanistan to India. The capacity for self-deception bulks largely in the Teuton phrenology. But the chance of creating a diversion and of raising an insurrection among the wild tribes of these primitive regions is just the thing that would appeal to the Hun. Not that it will affect the course of the war in any way in its final outcome, but just that it would occupy so much attention of Great Britain and give her more trouble.

Conditions in this part of the world are largely as they were when the world was young. Bokhara, Samarkand, Kashgar, Kashmir—the very names of these ancient places date away back to times when western civilization was unknown. Poets composed sonnets, theologians wrote treaties, and merchants bought and sold in these places before Rome was, but the day of their glory has departed. A forgotten part of the world, famous chiefly by imitations of their products, for a brief space it may be that the curtain of their isolation will be lifted, and the one half of the world will get a little insight into how this part of the other half lives.

ANECDOTES ABOUT SIR DOUGLAS HAIG

His relationships with the French General Staff have invariably been of the most cordial nature. Despite the sectional outcry for a Generalissimo to command both armies, French and British, Sir Douglas Haig has the confidence both of the French nation and the French Staff.

Joffre said of Haig that he was so full of military knowledge that he wondered how he had found time to learn French.

This saying being repeated to Sir Douglas he replied with one of the neatest compliments that has ever been paid to our Ally—

"It is impossible to acquire a military knowledge without a knowledge of French."

When the true history of the war is told it will be learned that Sir Douglas Haig has never refused unlimited scope to the likeliest of rivals. No man has ever been denied his chance by a fair, broad-minded Scotsman, who, when congratulated upon having promoted a man practically from the ranks to the position of brigadier-general, answered to the laughing charge that he was a democrat—

"I am so much of a democrat that I gave a Duke his chance."

He said on another occasion—

"The soldier fights best when led by gentlemen, and 'gentleman' is not a rank nor does it represent any particular station of life."

Ready to give every man and every officer his chance, he is as ready to punish the inefficient. A General who had made a blunder, not a very great one, but one which might easily have been fatal to the plan of attack, was summoned to General Headquarters. His explanation was listened to, and he was informed that he would leave for England by the next boat.

He was one of the truculent old school and was not content to accept his dismissal.

"Even a dog is allowed one bite," he said.

"It depends upon whom he bites," said Sir Douglas coldly, and the General went home.

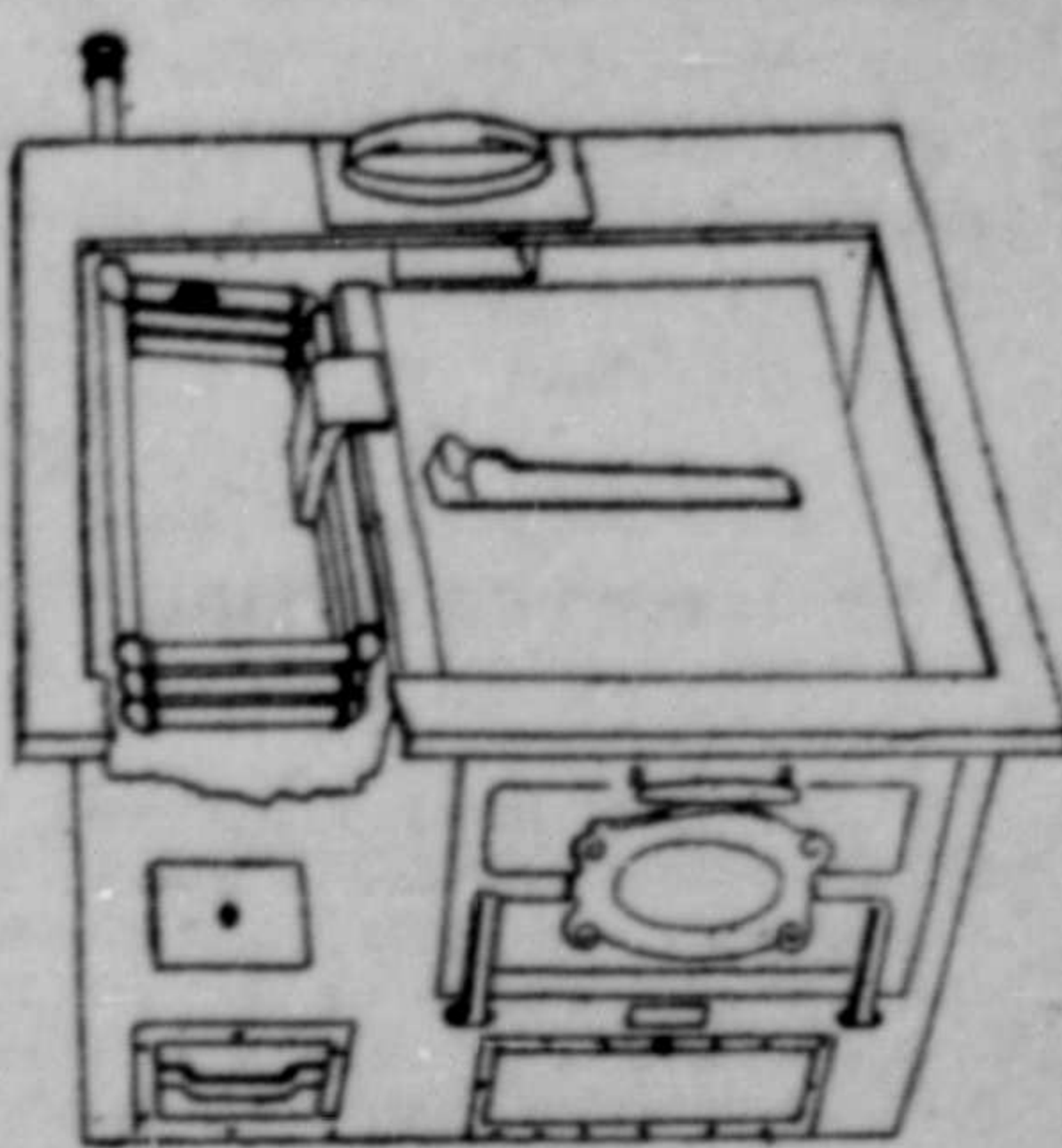

"THE FINISHED MYSTERY"

Statement of the International Bible Students' Association OF PRINCE RUPERT, B.C.

"Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we cannot but speak of the things which we have seen and heard."—Acts 19-20.

The history of the Christian Church from the time of the Apostles until these momentous days records an age-long struggle between light and darkness, truth and error, liberty and oppression; the culmination is at hand. The world appeared to be sweeping forward into a new era, where the ages of barbarism, slavery and cruelty were a thing of the past.

Yet now the roseate hues of early dawn have given place to the black thunder clouds of war and revolution, and the gaunt spectre of famine stalks through the earth. What is the meaning of this incredible catastrophe? What is happening? What new birth is presaged by the present agony of travail?

"Watchman, what of the night?"

"Watchman, what of the night?"

"The watchman said 'The Morning cometh, and also the night'."

—Isaiah, 21:12.

The new day is assured though for the present the horizon is darkened. The brief dark night foretold by the Scriptures is now upon us and all minds are groping in perplexity for the light. In such times of doubt and uncertainty one might well look to the inspired testimony of the Bible to find comfort and instruction. As Bible Students who have diligently sought to understand God's Word, not only have we received such comfort and instruction, but we have put forth every effort to make known to others the panacea for all earth's woes. In the language of Scripture, our message has long been: The Kingdom of Heaven is at Hand. This is the one hope held out by our Lord Himself, and promulgated by the

Apostles. It is the one hope which has inspired the Lord's footstep followers through the darkest hours of Christendom's history.

From time to time crucial episodes have arisen and crises have been passed which have cost the blood of martyrs. Who will say that their sacrifices have been in vain? Jesus was opposed by the scribes and pharisees of His own day and He paid for His fidelity to the truth with His life.

His Apostles, faithfully following in His steps, confronted with the same opposition, the established ecclesiasticism of their day.

As we trace the progress of the true Christian Church down the stream of time, we find the experience of every enlightened religious reformer identical with that of the Master.

A decadent churchianity, outgrown by the general enlightenment and spirit of the times, has always sought to hinder or obstruct the path of progress. Every attempt to break the shackles of ignorance, prejudice and superstition has aroused the animosity of those whose worldly interests and prestige were thereby jeopardized. The tortures of the inquisition and the social ostracism of more modern times are all evidences of the same spirit, antagonistic to social and religious reform. For long centuries the Bible, wrapped in the sackcloth and ashes of a dead language was beyond the understanding of the common people. The persecutions visited upon its translators, the penalties for possessing a copy of the same, and the public burning of confiscated copies within the very sight of edifices ostensibly erected to the One of whom the Bible speaks, all bear eloquent testimony of the same spirit of a great opposing enemy whose kingdom of darkness is threatened by every new ray of light.

The mystery of the Christian dispensation is now no longer a secret. What we thought was Christ's Kingdom has indeed proven to be Satan's stronghold in which the true church as sheep in the midst of wolves and wheat in the midst of tares has always existed. Satan's great master-scheme has been the counterfeiting of the promised Kingdom of Christ. As indicated by Scripture, he has posed as an angel of light and his servants as ministers of righteousness, but none-the-less it has been a kingdom of darkness and is now due to be overthrown.

Pastor Russell's last and posthumous work, "The Finished Mystery," now under the official ban of the

Canadian Censor, is a commentary on the little-understood books of Ezekiel and Revelation. It reveals a prophetic indictment of the great religious systems of Christendom, and is, we believe, the message now due.—Rev. 16:17.

Once again, as in every similar crisis of the past, the situation will demand the blood of the saints. They will not pose before men as such; but on the contrary, "If they have called the master of the house Beelzebub, how much more they of His household? It is enough for the servant that he be as his Master and the disciple as his Lord."

The message which Pastor Russell, the "angel" to the last and Laodicean stage of the Church, and we as members of the International Bible Students' Association, his co-workers, have sought to present free of all charge to the people of this and every civilized land by lectures, tract and moving pictures, has been the message of the true Kingdom of Christ, peace on earth, goodwill to all men. It has of necessity been accompanied by the proclamation of the downfall of all other kingdoms, with their religious, financial and social bulwarks. It has of necessity pointed out the false and erroneous teachings of the Dark Ages which still linger in the minds of many. As a consequence it has inevitably exposed the blindness of many who have been leading the blind.

GOD'S KINGDOM IS AT THE DOOR.

We would remind you of the message found in Acts, chapter 5, verses 38 and 39.

38. And now I say unto you, Refrain from these men, and let them alone: for if this counsel or this work be of men, it will come to nought:

39. But he it of God, ye cannot overthrow it: lest haply ye be found even to fight against God.

HUNS WANT AFRICA FOR NATIVE ARMIES AND RAW MATERIALS

General Smuts, in the course of his address to the Royal Geographical Society, London, a few days ago described at some length the campaign in East Africa in order to give his audience some idea of the character of the country. It was clear, he said, from their practice in East Africa that the Germans had decided to develop the country not as an ordinary colony; but as a tropical possession for the cultivation of tropical raw materials. The Germans systematically discouraged

white settlement, and realised perhaps better than most people that the value of tropical Africa lay not in any openings for white colonisation, but in a plantation system where white capital and black labour collaborated in order to establish an entirely different order of things. Germany's ultimate objective in Africa was the establishment of a great Central African Empire, comprising not only her colonies before the war, but also all the British, French, Belgian, and Portuguese possessions south of the Sahara and Lake Chad and north of the Zambesi river in South Africa. Towards this objective Germany was steadily marching, even before the war broke out, and she claimed that her lost African colonies should be returned to her at the end of the war as a starting point from which to resume the interrupted march, or rather, as appeared from Count Hertling's recent announcement, Germany claimed a reallocation of the world's colonies, so that she might have a share commensurate with her world position. This Central African block, the maps of which were now in course of preparation at the Colonial office in Berlin, was not only the first place to supply the economic requirements and raw materials of German industry, but in the second—and far more important—place to become the recruiting ground for vast native armies.
