## FURTHER GAINS IN PALESTINE BY BRITISH

### ACTIVITY ON WESTERN FRONT INCREASES--GERMAN AEROPLANES BOMB NAPLES

#### RAIDS BECOME REGULAR ON WESTERN FRONT BY THE ALLIES. NO BIG ACTIONS

UNITED STATES TROOPS, CO-OPERATING WITH FRENCH, PENETRATE TO GERMAN SECOND LINE--BLOW UP DUGOUTS AND MAKE IMPORTANT CAPTURES--ARTILLERY IS ACTIVE ON BOTH SIDES.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, March 12.—A successful raid in which several of the enemy were killed or taken prisoners, and two machine guns were captured, was carried out by the British last night south of St. Quentin. The official statement from the British War Office today, "A party of the enemy which approached our lines northwest of the Bassees was driven off by artillery and machine gun fire. There was considerable artillery activity on both sides, early this morning south east of Arras."  
**Americans Strafe Fritz.**  
With the American Army in France, March 12.—American troops, co-operating with the French, have carried out three raids opposite the American sector in Lorraine. Two of the raids were executed simultaneously last night. The Americans swept past the German first line and pene-

#### NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The meeting of the city council held last evening in the Council Chamber was a short one. All the councillors were out, and in their places, Mayor McClymont presiding. The first business was a report from the Board of Works, recommending that the approach to the Carpenters' Hall be constructed, in accordance with the request of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council. The matter of placing a light at the bend on Fraser Street, however was not agreed to.

There was also a recommendation that the water mains be extended from Third Avenue to First, so that in case of fire, the wholesale houses would have a proper supply of water. Then came the final readings of the new Bylaw for the regulation of bicycle and automobile traffic, during which "coasting" was properly defined by the city solicitor. After this was duly completed, at that moment the curfew bell rang.

**A Man on a Bike.**  
In connection with the new by-law, the city clerk read a letter which he had received that morning, from a lady living near Seal Cove. She told how a man on a bike had run into her on Eighth Avenue, near the Seal Cove School causing her step off the road into a puddle of mud about a foot deep. "I want to know" went on the letter "if a woman is obliged to step into a mudhole every time a man on a bicycle shouts 'track'." This is not the first time this has happened to me. During the last rainy spell I was knocked down, but I do not know whether this was the same man or not, nor do I know the man's name."

With reference to this letter, the city clerk pointed out that pedestrians had the first right to the road, and neither automobile, nor bicycle had the right of way over pedestrians. This is the law. The letter was filed.

In connection with the demand for a reading and sitting room for ladies, Alderman Casey made the suggestion that the private room presently used by Chief Vickers of the Police Department on the first floor of the City Hall, be used for this purpose. "Won't do at all" intimated the City Clerk. "The chief needs that room." However, his worship the mayor, intimated that from arrangements under way, the matter would be satisfactory arranged.

**The Steel Works**  
A letter was then read from Mr. E. H. Mortimer, commissioner of the Board of Trade, enclosing the proceedings of the joint committee of the Council and the Board of Trade with regard to the proposed Steel works for this coast. #### ALDERMAN CASEY ASKS A QUESTION

"I want to ask the city solicitor a question" said Alderman Casey towards the close of last night's meeting of the city council. "What were the conditions in the milk trial the other day to justify the imposing of a fine of \$1 on a man found guilty of selling milk below standard?"

The City solicitor explained that the Medical Health officer was satisfied with a conviction. The amount of the fine was immaterial, so long as a warning was given. In this case there was no question at all of the milk being diluted with added water. That was not suggested at all. The difficulty of feeding cattle through the winter in this district makes it equally difficult in keeping milk up to the standard. The law demands 3 per cent of butter fat, in this case there was 2.60.

This explanation was not considered satisfactory by Alderman Casey. "If pure milk falls below 3 per cent in butter fat" he exclaimed, "then it is being taken from cattle which should not be in any dairy herd. But why the minimum fine anyway? Just the other day, a man was soaked \$10 for slapping another man's face in the Reading Room—"He ought to have been soaked \$50" interjected the City Clerk—the working man gets the maximum, but in this case, the absolute minimum is imposed."

Alderman Kirkpatrick, speaking in the interests of the children and babies, insisted that the quality of milk be kept up to the standard, for the sake of the coming generation. There are other ways besides adding water to the milk, she said. The butter fat can be taken off.

Addressing the chair, the city clerk intimated that they had the matter in their hands. Make the Medical Health officer report on the dairies twice a week and publish his reports. That will meet the case.

Alderman McRae was of the opinion that the extra-ordinary conditions obtaining here, and the difficulties in feeding cattle throughout the winter was the matter responsible. Thereupon the incident closed.

#### TURKS FIGHT DESPERATELY AGAINST BRITISH ADVANCE NORTH FROM JERUSALEM

HIGH RIDGES ALONG JERUSALEM-NABULUS ROAD ARE CAPTURED WHEN BRITISH PROGRESS IS CONTINUED TWO MORE MILES--GREAT ASSISTANCE FROM AEROPLANES--FIERCE FIGHTING.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, March 12.—A dispatch received from General Allenby, who is conducting the operations in Palestine reports another advance by the British troops along the Jerusalem-Nabulus road. A general advance was ordered last Monday, and until Thursday steady progress was made. The British line was advanced, astride this road, and little opposition was encountered from the Turkish forces. Since last Thursday, however, when an advance of three miles was made on an eighteen mile front, fighting has been more severe, and strong opposition was encountered by the British, which held up their further progress. The latest dispatch how-

ever indicates that the advance has been resumed and that the high ridges, flanking this road through the mountains of Ephraim, have been cleared of the enemy. The Turkish forces made an obstinate resistance and fierce fighting took place before the enemy finally gave way. The British line was advanced for another two miles on a twelve mile front. The mountainous and broken nature of the terrain were particularly suitable for the tactics pursued by the Turks. Aeroplanes rendered great assistance to the British advance. Many bombs were dropped among the Turkish troops scattering their formations in many instances.

#### GOVERNMENT AGREES WITH TELEGRAPHISTS

Ottawa, March 12.—An agreement has been reached between the Department of Public Works and the Telegraph operators on Government owned lines. Three hundred and ninety-six operators in all will be affected by the new agreement which is to be incorporated in the rules an appendix. Generally speaking, the agreement lays down: First, the rate of promotion; Second, Uniform classification of pay under which operators west of Great Lakes get an average increase of 10 per cent. Third, Provision against discrimination. The increase in pay will total, \$25,000 per year on a pay list amounting to \$12,000.

#### BALTIC IS TO BECOME GERMAN PERMANENTLY

Action by Germany in Finland is Menace to Scandinavian Nations, Whom Hun Press Denounce.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, March 12.—The newest and a novel display of German policy has come in the form of a sudden broadside of denunciation of the Scandinavian countries by German newspapers and publicists like Count Reventlow. The articles accuse Scandinavian countries substantially of being accomplices of the Entente and warn them that they can expect no consideration from Germany. Germany's dealings with Finland so far, seem to be designed to make Finland a minor German Kingdom, with the Emperor's son, Prince Oscar, on the throne, and to make another Heligoland of the Aland Islands. This scheme is a direct blow against Sweden, and in less degree against Denmark and Norway, and is in line with the Emperor's boast that the Baltic Islands have been made permanently German.

#### GERMAN AIR RAID ON PARIS MADE BY SIXTY MACHINES

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, March 12.—The air raid which the Germans made upon the City of Paris was made by a very large number of aeroplanes. About sixty of the German machines took part in this expedition, which was composed of seven distinct squadrons. They succeeded in crossing the French lines, flying very high, at different parts of the front. They converged upon Paris, arriving there between nine and ten o'clock at night. Thanks to the intense artillery barrage, however, which was main-

tained by the French anti-aircraft guns, throughout the entire period of the raid, the greater number of the enemy machines were unable to reach their objective. Few bombs were dropped on the city the majority alighting in the suburbs where a number of buildings were demolished and set on fire. The number of the victims is not yet known.

#### NAPLES OBJECT OF AIR RAID BY HUN AVIATORS

Twenty Bombs Dropped in Residential District—Many Killed Austrians Fail to Cross Piave.

Rome, March 12.—Naples was attacked by enemy aviators this morning. Twenty bombs were dropped in a residential quarter. The victims included seven occupants of a hospital of the Little Sisters near Arcomirelli. Naples is three hundred miles south of the battle line.

Rome, March 12.—Austrian troops, which apparently were making an attempt to cross the river Piave were prevented from doing so yesterday by the batteries of artillery which sunk the rafts and boats in the river opposite Fagare.

#### SAYS UNITED STATES AT FULL STRENGTH IN 1920

Chicago, March 12.—The full power of the United States on the Western front will not be felt before the summer of 1919, Col. A. D. Kniskern, of the quartermaster's department of the United States army, declared in a speech before members of the Association of Commerce here. The turning point in the great war, he said, would come in 1920, and he explained the seeming slowness of the preparations of the United States by the statement that for every man carrying a rifle there must be forty men supplying him with food and munitions.

#### UNITED STATES ARMY IS SHIPPED PROMPTLY

Washington, March 12.—Troops and supplies for General Pershing's forces are now moving to France on schedule time, it is learned today on high authority. While figures may not be published, it was stated positively that transportation requirements of the army are being met by the Shipping Board, and the immediate situation as to ships was described as satisfactory.

It is felt strongly that the opening of major operations in what President Wilson has predicted will prove the decisive year of the great war will not be much longer delayed.

PROHIBITION.

Notwithstanding all that has been done in various quarters to obtain an extension of the time before the enforcing of the Prohibition Act affecting the whole Dominion, the government have not seen their way clear to make any alteration in their first proposals. So that after the end of this month it will be impossible to buy intoxicating liquor within the Dominion of Canada. While the provincial prohibition law was very well as far as it went, quite a number of people consider that it went just far enough. The bars were cut out, and the immediate temptation to indulge in a "snort" was removed. It was still permissible, however, to purchase supplies, and to keep a cellar, provided that such purchases were made without the province. To a certain extent, this law kept drinking and its effects through excess off the streets. But after this month, it will not be possible to make any purchases whatever, either within the province, or without. When the present supplies are exhausted, Canadians must perform *be teetotal*. When further supplies cannot be purchased, what else is there to do?

It has often been said that you cannot make people good by Act of Parliament. In this particular case, an Act of Parliament is going to make people teetotal, whether they like it or no.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

This week every person in Prince Rupert will have an opportunity of doing something to ensure that the dependents of the soldiers who have gone to fight for the Empire, do not suffer through the enforced absence of the breadwinner. The allowance which the government makes for the families of the country's soldiers is insufficient. It is admitted. The government have said that they cannot find the money, were they to take over the Patriotic Fund. Therefore it is left to the private generosity of the

individual to make good the deficiency of the government. The soldier who goes to fight has every reason to expect that those he leaves behind will not suffer. Put yourself in his place. What would you expect to be done for your dependents, were you called up?

That is the one way to look at this matter. The people of Canada have a duty to perform to the soldiers. This is it, that their dependents shall not lack the necessities of life. It is not right that this should be left to the goodwill of the individual. This is not only an individual duty, but it is left altogether to the voluntary goodwill of the people of the Dominion.

Much criticism has been levelled at the government for its declining to fulfill its function in this respect, and rightly so, too. But in the meantime, the money must be found for the soldiers wives and families. The cost of living is showing no signs of decreasing, and three years make a difference on the costs of a growing family. And at the same time, there are more soldiers under arms now than ever there were, so it may be expected that the demands upon the Patriotic Fund will continue to increase. This makes it all the more necessary for increased and continuous subscriptions from those who have not been called to fight.

The amount which Prince Rupert has set before her is not by any means excessive. Even although this part of Canada has not benefited financially to the same extent as other parts, in the shape of higher wages and munition activity, there is no doubt that the requirements of the Fund will be met by the people here, in accordance with their capabilities.

ARMENIANS SUFFER ATROCITIES AGAIN

The Hague, March 8.—Authentic information received here from Asia Minor direct states that the



entire Armenian male population of Samsun, thousands of whom were driven thre by the Turks, including children, has been massacred. This information was brought from Samsun by an official of one of the Central powers. The Turks are endeavoring to stir up the Georgians against the Armenians, and it is asserted that appalling massacres have taken place in Georgia also. This is considered a striking commentary of von Hertling's proposals for the future of Armenia.

RUSSIANS PLUNDER BRITISH EMBASSY

London, March 9.—The British Embassy was plundered by Russian troops, in command of a Colonel, immediately after the Embassy staff left Petrograd, according to a Petrograd dispatch received by way of Dusseldorf and Amsterdam. Another report says that the Russian troops broke into the Embassy while the British Charge was still there, and ignoring his protest burned some documents and confiscated others. The Charge it is understood, made a protest to Leon Trotsky, the Bolshevik Foreign Minister, who replied that the Government could not be held responsible for the outrage.

### ANECDOTES ABOUT SIR DOUGLAS HAIG

The huge army which we now maintain in France has little opportunity of becoming personally acquainted with its leader, but the faith which they have in his leadership is explained by a little story told by the head of one of the big base hospitals in France.

After the first battles of the Somme Sir Douglas paid a hurried visit to this hospital and chatted with the men. In the course of time he came to the bedside of a man from the Middlesex Regiment.

"Well how are you feeling now?"

"Much better, sir."

"Where were you hit?"

"Leg and head, sir. I was the second man down after we went over. Did you notice a man that got held up in the wire, sir? Well, that was me."

Sir Douglas laughed.

"I wasn't quite as near as all that," he said.

# "THE FINISHED MYSTERY"

## Statement of the International Bible Students' Association OF PRINCE RUPERT, B.C.

"Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we cannot but speak of the things which we have seen and heard."—Acts 19-20.

"Watchman, what of the night?"  
 "Watchman, what of the night?"  
 "The watchman said 'The Morning cometh, and also the night.'"  
 —Isaiah, 21:12.

The new day is assured though for the present the horizon is darkened. The brief dark night foretold by the Scriptures is now upon us and all minds are groping in perplexity for the light. In such times of doubt and uncertainty one might well look to the inspired testimony of the Bible to find comfort and instruction. As Bible Students who have diligently sought to understand God's Word, not only have we received such comfort and instruction, but we have put forth every effort to make known to others the panacea for all earth's woes. In the language of Scripture, our message has long been: The Kingdom of Heaven is at hand. This is the one hope held out by our Lord Himself, and promulgated by the

Apostles. It is the one hope which has inspired the Lord's footstep followers through the darkest hours of Christendom's history.

From time to time crucial episodes have arisen and crises have been passed which have cost the blood of martyrs. Who will say that their sacrifices have been in vain? Jesus was opposed by the scribes and pharisees of His own day, and He paid for His fidelity to the truth with His life.

His Apostles, faithfully following in His steps, confronted with the same opposition, the established ecclesiasticism of their day.

As we trace the progress of the true Christian Church down the stream of time, we find the experience of every enlightened religious reformer identical with that of the Master.

A decadent churchianity, outgrown by the general enlightenment and spirit of the times, has always sought to hinder or obstruct the path of progress. Every attempt to break the shackles of ignorance, prejudice and superstition has aroused the animosity of those whose worldly interests and prestige were thereby jeopardized. The tortures of the inquisition and the social ostracism of more modern times are all evidences of the same spirit, antagonistic to social and religious reform. For long centuries the Bible, wrapped in the sackcloth and ashes of a dead language was beyond the understanding of the common people. The persecutions visited upon its translators, the penalties for possessing a copy of the same, and the public burning of confiscated copies within the very sight of edifices ostensibly erected to the One of whom the Bible speaks, all bear eloquent testimony of the same spirit of a great opposing enemy whose kingdom of darkness is threatened by every new ray of light.

The mystery of the Christian dispensation is now no longer a secret. What we thought was Christ's Kingdom has indeed proven to be Satan's stronghold in which the true church as sheep in the midst of wolves and wheat in the midst of tares has always existed. Satan's great master-scheme has been the counterfeiting of the promised Kingdom of Christ. As indicated by Scripture, he has posed as an angel of light and his servants as ministers of righteousness, but none-the-less it has been a kingdom of darkness and is now due to be overthrown.

Pastor Russell's last and posthumous work, "The Finished Mystery," now under the official ban of the

Canadian Censor, is a commentary on the little-understood books of Ezekiel and Revelation. It reveals a prophetic indictment of the great religious systems of Christendom, and is, we believe, the message now due.—Rev. 16:17.

Once again, as in every similar crisis of the past, the situation will demand the blood of the saints. They will not pose before men as such; but on the contrary, "If they have called the master of the house Beelzebub, how much more they of His household? It is enough for the servant that he be as his Master and the disciple as his Lord."

The message which Pastor Russell, the "angel" to the last and Laodicean stage of the Church, and we as members of the International Bible Students' Association, his co-workers, have sought to present free of all charge to the people of this and every civilized land by lectures, tract and moving pictures, has been the message of the true Kingdom of Christ, peace on earth, goodwill to all men. It has of necessity been accompanied by the proclamation of the downfall of all other kingdoms, with their religious, financial and social bulwarks. It has of necessity pointed out the false and erroneous teachings of the Dark Ages which still linger in the minds of many. As a consequence it has inevitably exposed the blindness of many who have been leading the blind.

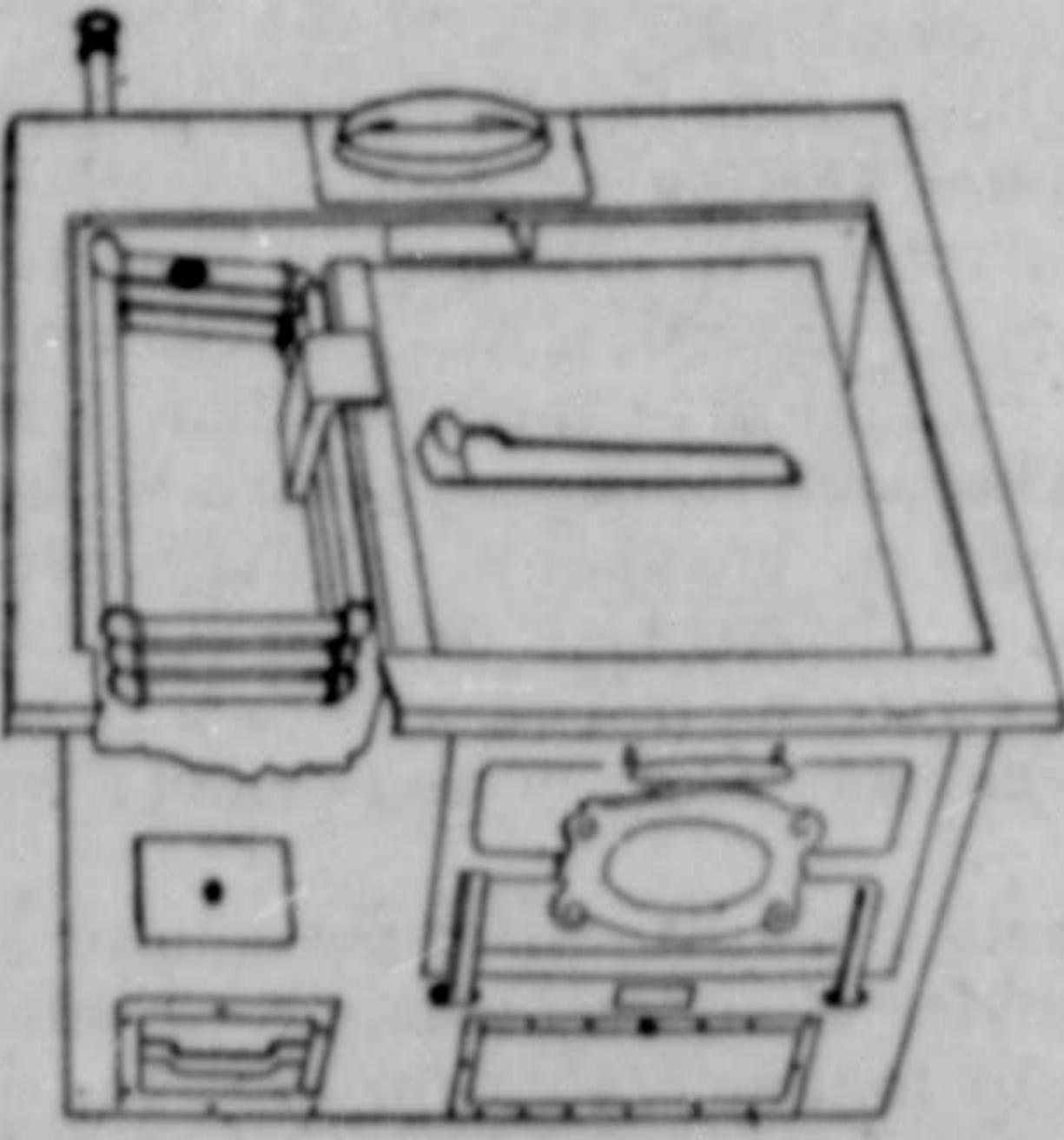
