#### IMPERIAL DEMOCRACY.

This expression, Imperial Democracy, may be taken by many to be contradiction of terms, or apparently so; in other words, a paradox. Yet, for the British people at large, it is not so, However democratic the British people may be regarding their own domestic affairs, they remain Imperialists, whether they will or no, with regard to their Empire.

The British idea of government of an empire is something new in the history of empires in this world. Never before was there one like this one, and this remark is made in all seriousness, and without any boastfulness. The apparent absence of any conscious plan or design in the expansion of the peoples of the British Isles to the uttermost parts of the earth has been subject for remark by many wondering students of nations.

The story of the evolution of the empire is a record of apparently casual, haphazard and in this time of stress, when a deliberate and determined attempt is being made to destroy it, this characteristic becomes pronounced when it is compared with the stedfast continental policy pursued by the makers of modern Germany, and to the scheming and blatant Imperialism of Kaiser Wilhelm II.

The extreme diversity of its units is one of the outstanding characteristics of this Imperial Democracy. It is made up of Dominions, Colonies, Commonwealths and Unions, each independent of, yet in close contact with the original United Kingdom, and the dependencies of its Crown. The idea of colonization among the Brione had not a deliberate one had not of the day. It has usually been a response to the craving for a more democratic existence and for freer political and religious institutions. or for greater economic opportunities than existed at the time in the mother country. In fact, the first and primary foundation of the Empire built up by the British people was

closely bound up with idealism. It was born of idealism, and in turn, it reinforced and expanded the ideals already in exist-

It is difficult to over emphasise the essentially democratic, character of the beginnings of colonization by the British race, and since that beginning, not no many hundred years ago either, taken on the whole, the liberty of the British colonists to manage their own affairs has been complete. In a recent number of the "United Empire" one writer says, with truth, "The history of our Empire is the pursuit of an ideal of communal life, with a tendency always towards freer institutions, and more democratic conditions. Men-and governments-have shrunk with dis like from the name of Empire in the sense of enforced deminion over other races, but that is what Empire is not, and seldom has been, to the British peoples. In recognition of this fact, the tendency of the time is to substitute the phrase"British Commonwealth" for the older term "British Empire." The measure of our Imperial Ideal is the measure in which the term commonwealth is applicable to existing conditions; in the States and dependencies under the sovereignty of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY King."




