GERMANS MAKING PROGRESS IN UKRAINA

CLEANING UP THE COUNTRY AS THEY GO—RAIDS CONTINUOUS ON WEST FRONT

BIG GUNS CONTINUE ACTIVE ON WESTERN FRONT. ALLIED RAIDS ARE SUCCESSFUL

Canadians at Lens uphold their reputation in trench fighting—Welsh, French and Belgium troops all similarly engaged and attain good results.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, March 18.—Along the Western front the artillery has been active during the past twenty-four hours. At Lens, the Canadians have conducted another successful raid; while the Welsh troops at Arras have been similarly engaged. In the Champagne region, the French have recovered trenches which have been held by the Germans since 1914.

The Germans made a surprise attack near Massiges, which turned out to be no surprise attack at all, as the allies were ready for it, and from the German point of view it was a lamentable failure. Violent artillery duels continued in the Verdun region, while Belgium, King Albert's forces have been raiding successfully.

In the Balkans. London, March 18.—A renewal of fighting is reported from Macedonia. In the neighborhood of Bitola, French detachments have taken possession of part of the German line, which had been captured. Along the Struma, British aviators have bombed the enemy positions.

Hun Planes Bagged. London, March 18.—Since March 16, the British have downed one hundred and eighteen German planes on the Western front. British losses in the same period were in comparison trifling.

UNITED STATES HAS ACQUIRED NEW WEAPON

Philadelphia, March 16.—The secret of an aerial torpedo, powerful in the wide range of destructive possibilities that it would blot out the city of Berlin in the face of the earth and in the German empire far and wide, with its own doomsday is now in the possession of the United States government, according to reports published here yesterday in the Public Ledger. The invention is a horror of the skies, and is the work of this city's Brigadier-General O. B. Barlow, of the signal service, who has approved his invention as feasible.

Without revealing the details of the aerial torpedo, the inventor says it has a range of between 400 and 500 miles.

JAPANESE TRAGEDY AT OCEAN FALLS

A tragic occurrence has been reported to the Provincial Police Department here from Ocean Falls, regarding a Japanese named Kawamura. This man has been missing since last Wednesday morning, when he was last seen about 5 a.m.

In the ordinary course of the business at Ocean Falls, a large tank of acid was emptied at the end of the week, and it was found a little bit of bone, and part of clothing, which is taken to be that of the missing man. It is supposed that he had accidentally fallen into the tank of acid, the action of which has practically dissolved his body.

Mr. John Conway, the coroner, left this morning by the Princess May for Ocean Falls, where he will hold an investigation into the circumstances.

DUTCH SHIPS WILL CARRY ALLIES FOOD

The Million Tons of Extra Shipping will carry a Large Quantity of Food to Europe.

Washington, March 16.—The Million tons of Dutch shipping about to be taken over by the United States and Great Britain by requisition if the Netherlands government voluntarily does not agree to turn them over, will be used chiefly, officials say today, for the transportation of food stuffs. Their use is expected to go far towards removing the danger of serious food shortages in the Allied countries.

Wheat from the Argentine and meat from the United States will be the principal commodities moved by the ships, many of which have laid idle while the allied peoples have been living on war rations. The shortage of wheat particularly has been a source of anxiety. Of wheat there is abundance and exports from this country will be doubled as soon as the ships are ready.

The ships will be pooled by the Allied governments in the common cause.

ELECTION METHODS TO BE CONDEMNED

The new parliament meets in Ottawa on Monday, March 18, for its first session. While nearly every newspaper in Canada is proclaiming the glad tidings that it is a Union Government, and thousands of devout and misguided citizens are giving thanks for the Union victory, a careful survey of the situation will perhaps cause some better understanding of the position in which Canada finds herself. The report of the chief Returning Officer shows that in the combined Civil and Military vote, cast, the Union Government received 1,022,109, and the Opposition 757,893. The significant thing about this is the volume of the Opposition vote. When the methods of the late election are reviewed, the travesty of the Elections Act, the unfair treatment of women, the blatant cry of "Traitor" and "Lower Element" applied to all and sundry who refused to swallow the Tory nostrum, added to the crusade of the newspapers of Canada, the miracle is how the Opposition succeeded in recording 757,893 votes. It is quite evident that a fair impartial vote taken in the country and overseas would retire this so-called Union Government. How many seats in the new Parliament have been swung into line by the same methods employed in Skeena? The Liberal-Labor candidate for Skeena received a majority of 524 of the home vote. There are less than 400 soldier votes which rightly and legally could be cast by soldiers from Skeena and could be counted in the election, but in order to elect a Union supporter, 1500 soldier votes were counted overseas for this riding of Skeena. This is apparently a fraud. The most ardent Union supporter cannot justify the application of fraud in the winning of this seat. A government supported by fraud is not for long.

The government of the day may select any title it cares to and may call itself a Union or any other kind of government, but this is at best sure and certain that no matter what methods were like in other parts of Canada, the Union Government is not the choice of the people of Skeena. GERMANS GATHER IN SWEDISH SHIPPING

GREAT NAVY YARDS AT NIKOLAIV IMMEDIATELY SEIZED BY GERMANS—ADVANCE IS CONTINUED UPON KHERSON—RUSSIAN NAVAL SHIPS GO TO CRIMEAN PORT OF SEBASTOPOL.

HUNS DISAGREE OVER ANNEXING BALTIC LANDS

Civil Government and Hun Military Leaders are at Loggerheads over Plans of General Staff.

(Special to The Daily News)

Washington, March 18.—Serious differences have arisen between the German civil government and the military leaders, the plan of the General staff to annex the Russian Baltic provinces. This is reported to be an official dispatch based upon the German newspaper reports, which was received here today from France. The General staff propose to remain in possession of the country in the meantime, having all the authority, while the civil government of Germany requires that the military forces be under the disposal, seeing that peace is now declared, and there is no need for further fighting in these particular districts.

Strikes in Austria.

Amsterdam, March 18.—Strikes are again in progress in Austria-Hungary, and the disaffection among the industrial population is spreading rapidly. All the workers in the twin cities of Budapest is assuming large proportions. All telegraphic communications have been suspended.

London, March 18.—The German advance throughout the territory of the Ukraina is being continued by the German forces, who are despatching everything in the shape of food stuffs, and munitions of war to Germany as fast as the railroad can operate. In both of these cities, the Germans suppressed the Soviets immediately, and have dealt ruthlessly with any of the local authorities who have dared to show any independence on action, without first obtaining the sanction of the German commanders.

The great naval yards at Nikolaiv were immediately occupied by the Hun forces, who started in to take a complete inventory of all the contents of the yards, including materials and machinery, tools etc. No Russians are allowed to enter the gates on the yards. It is expected that these well equipped yards will be removed to Germany as fast as the German railroads can supply the transportation.

The Russian naval ships, which were lying at Odessa, immediately sailed for Sebastopol, where they have now arrived, while the German forces are continuing the advance eastwards upon the town of Kherson, situated near the mouth of the Dneiper.

THE LEGISLATURE.

According to the press reports of the doings in the Provincial Parliament, this session promises to be replete with good reading for the electorate, if the slamming continues. The hon. leader of the opposition, Mr. Bowser, and the new Premier, were in the lists, and took a tilt at each other on several occasions. Indeed Mr. Bowser had quite a lot to say about quite a number of the representatives of the people on the government of the House. Needless to state, honest John did not let him off scatheless. He accused Mr. Bowser of having a total disregard for the truth. Many a man has been killed for less. "In the leader of the opposition, you have a man who is an open violator of the most sacred oath that can be administered to any man," declared the Premier.

Mr. Bowser has expressed a desire to learn how the Premier had acquired the title of "honest John," and Mr. Oliver in reply, intimated that there was no danger of such a title ever becoming attached to the leader of the opposition.

Mr. Hawthornthwaite, for Newcastle, gravely agreed with what both the speakers had said about each other, while in the course of the speech of Mr. Bowser, Mr. Manson, member for Omineca interjected "Bow-wow-wow," much to the former premier's indignation.

If the session continues as it has begun, there promises to be something doing besides the regular business of the province, which will tend to lighten the heavy labors of the legislators in Victoria, as well as the columns of the newspapers. It cannot be said, however, that personal attacks, such as made by Mr. Bowser, in any way tend to make for the upkeep of the dignity of the House. Neither, of course, do the replies made by indignant members. It was once said that the duty of the opposition was to oppose. That may be, and is true to but a certain extent. Members are returned to parliament, no matter of what party they belong to, to see that the business of the

province is conducted with despatch, and in a businesslike manner. Honest criticism from the opposition is the best thing that can be done for the country, by the opposition in Parliament, but a criticism that is dishonest ought to have no place in the deliberative chambers of the House in Victoria, or anywhere else.

There is a great deal of work to be done by Parliament for some considerable time coming, which will tax the resources of the House. The province was broke when the present government took office, and hard times are ahead. There is no one but will admit that the present time affords but a thankless task for whatever government might have been in power, but that the present government will rise to the occasion, there is no reason to doubt.

HISTORY UPSIDE DOWN.

In Rouen history seemed to have rolled backward. The city where the English burned Joan of Arc seemed almost as British today as Birmingham or Manchester. Acres of factory chimneys smoked busily beside the Seine; the river was full of British shipping—coal barges, transports, hospital ships, tramp steamers; and in the crowded city streets were thousands of tommies in khaki, Scotties in kilts or scandalous "shorts" of the same loud colored plaid as the kilts, Australians and New Zealanders, natty, public school-bred officers, Sikhs wearing khaki turbans, and scores of V. A. D.'s and other rose-cheeked British women in white or blue serge or the white muslin of the Red Cross nurse.

The Norman Conquest had been reversed, and the English had retaken Rouen. It was an impressive and noble example of the complete unity and power of the Allies.—Red Cross Magazine.

Following the removal of Mayor Mahon, four other socialists, members of the council are also objected to. In the platform for which Mayor Mahon stands comes a plank which reads: "The American did not want this war. They were plunged into this abyss by the treachery of the ruling class of the country—its demagogic agitators, its bought press, its sensational photoplays, its lying advertisements and other purchasable instruments of public expression."

GIGANTIC PROPOSAL TO RAISE MORE FOOD

Montreal, March 16.—Realizing that food for the allies is the first consideration, the building contractors of Eastern Canada have placed before the government a gigantic proposal for the cultivation of the idle western lands. Without depriving the farmer of any help, they propose to turn the idle men, machinery and capital into the building trade into cultivation; to break 500,000 acres this year for the 1919 crop, using 3,000 men, figuring the production next year at 10,000,000 bushels of wheat, with an increase in 1920, which, if capital is sufficiently forthcoming, can be trebled. The proposal is worked upon by the Montreal Builders' Exchange and meets with the approval of the Toronto and Ottawa exchanges, and is being seriously considered by the government. Builders are pressing for an immediate answer.

DIVIDING THE SPOILS.

Washington, March 16.—According to an official dispatch received from Copenhagen today and quoting from the National Tidende, Germany and Austria will divide equally until July 31, the amount of grain available in the Ukraine. During the early part of this period, Austria will have two-thirds and Germany one-third of all grain obtained. During the second half the proportion will be reversed.

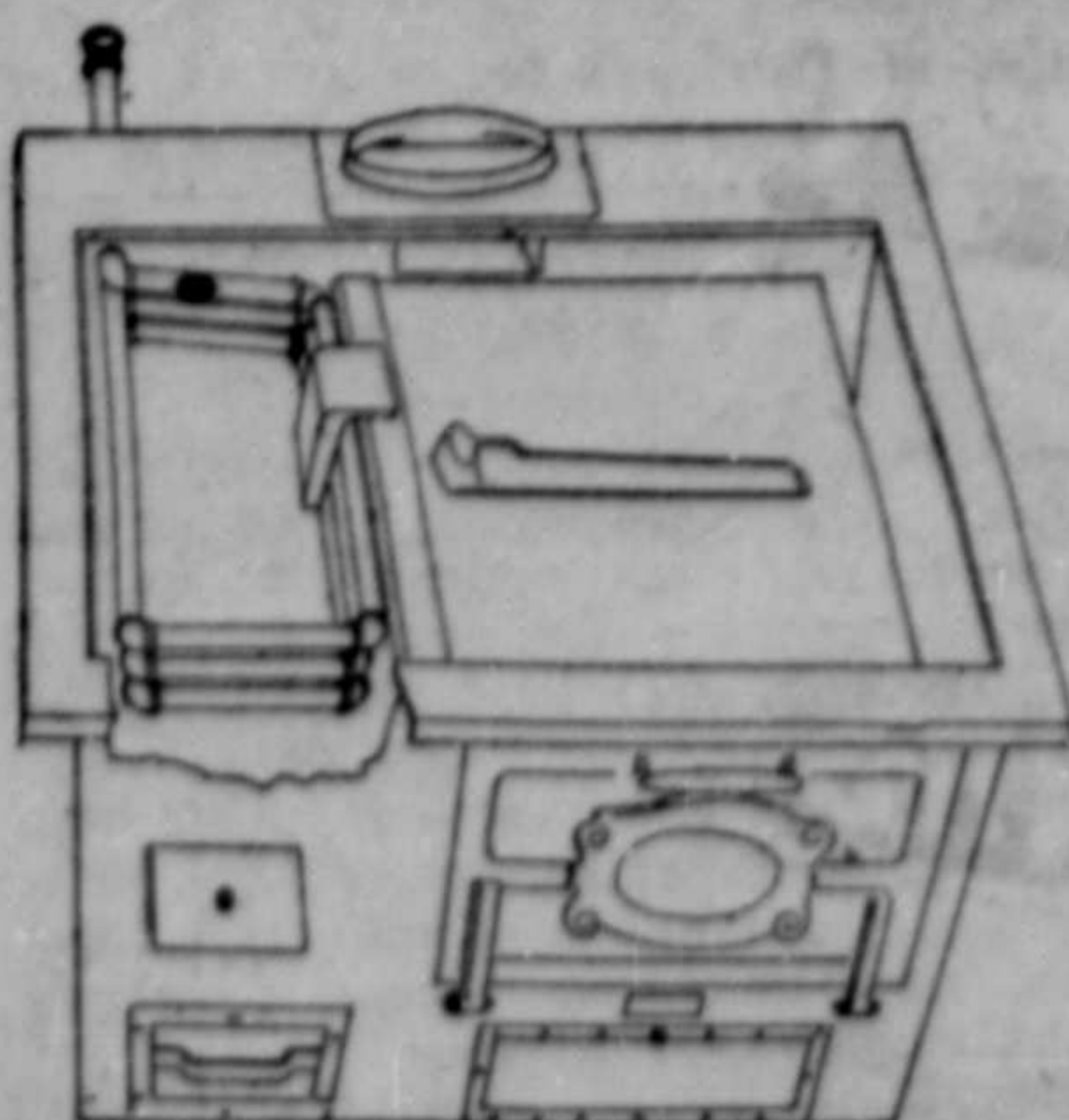

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The Dominion Income War Tax

Its Meaning and Application.

THE Dominion Income War Tax Act, passed at the last session of Parliament is now in force and all those liable to taxation under the provisions of the Act must file the required returns for the year 1917, on or before 31st March, 1918.

The Act provides that there shall be assessed, levied, and paid upon the 1917 income of every person residing or ordinarily resident in Canada, a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of unmarried persons and widows or widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$2000 in the case of all other persons.

Corporations and joint stock companies carrying on business in Canada, no matter how created or organized, shall pay the normal tax upon income over \$3000. The fiscal year of corporations and joint stock companies may be adopted if desired.

Your Immediate Obligation.—You are now required by law to fill out in triplicate, one or more of the five special forms enumerated below. Read the particulars about the forms provided, then note the form or forms that fit your case. Don't forget to make three copies. You keep one copy, and in the case of Forms T1 and T2, deliver two to the Inspector of Taxation for your district. In the case of Forms T3, T4 and T5, two copies must be filed with the Commissioner of Taxation at Ottawa.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED

Individuals.—Form T1 is for all individuals having the requisite income. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3, make no marks on page 4.

In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Partnerships as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must fill in Form T2, showing total income. Amount paid during the year to Patriotic and Canadian Red Cross Funds, and other approved war funds, should be shown under Exemptions and Deductions. A financial statement should also be attached. In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each Company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3, to state particulars of the distribution of income from estates they are handling. A separate form is required for each estate and total incomes must be given as well as distribution thereof.

Employers. On Form T4 employers shall make a list of the names of employees and amounts paid to each in salaries, bonuses, commission, or other remuneration wherever the combined sum of such remuneration for the calendar year 1917 amounted to \$1000 or more. This applies to all classes, regardless of number of such employees.

Corporations Listing Shareholders.—Corporations and Joint Stock Companies shall list on Form T5 Shareholders residing in Canada to whom Dividends were paid during the calendar year 1917, stating the amounts of dividends and bonuses paid to each.

Don't wait till the last minute. Get the necessary forms now, and make your information accurate and complete.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.
