PETROGRAD AWAITS OCCUPATION BY HUNS

MOSCOW, THE ANCIENT CAPITAL, THREATENED—BRITISH FLIERS SET RECORD

AERIAL ACTIVITY ON WEST FRONT BREAKS ALL RECORDS. BRITISH ARE TIRELESS

HUNDRED AND SEVEN GERMAN AEROPLANES BROUGHT DOWN THIS MONTH ALREADY BY DAYLIGHT FIGHTING—ALLIED RAIDS CONTINUE SUCCESSFUL AND BIG GUNS ROAR ALWAYS.

(Special to The Daily News.)
With the British Armies in France, March 21.—The aerial warfare on the Western front is proving to be record breaking. So far, this month, by daylight fighting, one hundred and seven of the enemy aeroplanes have been brought down. These include some thirty three which fell on St. Patrick's Day. Of these one hundred and two were reduced to kindling by the fall. Sixty-five of them were forced earthward by daylight control.

The amount of night flying is now developing is unprecedented. There is much mutual bombing taking place in the night watches. The British bombers seem to be positively tireless.

British Front.
London, March 21.—Raids were attempted by the enemy last night in the neighborhood of Faquis, and were successfully repulsed by the Portuguese troops. With the exception of some artillery fire in the Paschendaele sector, there is nothing further to report.

French Front.
Paris, March 21.—During a raid on the enemy lines in the neighborhood of Verdun, made on Monday, the French attacking troops discovered the German soldiers to be full of troops waiting to make a counter attack. The soldiers, with all their occupants were destroyed by bombs. A large number of trench mortars and machine guns were brought back to the French lines. Great confusion was done among the German forces, who were quite taken by surprise, and were in no position to do any damage to the Frenchmen.

American Front.
Paris, March 21.—The artillery was heavy on the right bank of the Meuse, in Lorraine, between Baden-villers, and at other points in Alsace.

In the Balkans.
Paris, March 21.—The official communiqué says: "On the Macedonian front, calm prevails."

Ottawa, March 19.—Dr. J. L. Chabot, M.P., of Ottawa, has definitely refused the offer of the Deputy Speakership of the House of Commons.
The office goes to a French-Canadian, and as Dr. Chabot is the only supporter of the Government of that nationality qualified for the position it was offered to him. A member of the Opposition may be named.

DUTCH SHIPS ARE TAKEN BY THE ALLIES

Great Britain and United States Take Over all Laid up Ships Belonging to Holland in Their Ports.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, March 21.—Seventy seven Dutch ships, aggregating six hundred thousand tons, which have been laid up in the United States ports for many months past, have been taken over today by the United States government. The British government at the same time, has taken possession of four hundred thousand tons of shipping formerly belonging to Holland as well.

The Dutch companies owning these vessels would prefer that their vessels lie up in harbor rather than risk them to the submarine menace. But as the Allies are very short of shipping to carry foodstuffs from American ports to Europe, and as these vessels are not necessary for the trade of Holland in the meantime, the allies have found it necessary that the ships be utilised to their fullest capacity. All the vessels will be engaged in the transportation of foodstuffs to European ports.
This great addition of a million tons of shipping to the allied merchant marine will help a great deal in removing the congestion at the Atlantic ports, where the wharves are still piled high with all kinds of freight for the allied countries in Europe.

UNITED STATES MAKES SECOND ARMY DRAFT

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, March 20.—Eight hundred thousand men are to be called to the colors gradually during the present year, under the second army draft, which begins on March 29.
An announcement by Provost Marshal-General Crowder of the number to be called was followed closely by an order for the mobilization of 95,000 men during the five-day period beginning March 29, some 15,000 of them to be assembled in the second draft. Eighty thousand will be men of the 687,000 not yet summoned into service.

WHERE BIG INCOMES PAY THE BIG TAXES

(Special to The Daily News.)
New York, March 21.—Of the \$3,000,000,000 which the Federal Government expects to derive this year from internal revenue sources, John D. Rockefeller will contribute about \$38,400,000, Henry C. Frick will pay the next largest income tax, \$11,600,000. The 29 wealthiest persons, after Mr. Rockefeller, will pay a total income tax of \$86,100,000.
The operation of the income tax, as well as the excess profits tax, has come as a great surprise to many, especially to the men whose incomes were increased by war activities last year. One of the most notable examples was discovered today, a case in which a man who made \$100,000 last year had to turn over to the Government in taxes \$63,000. Internal Revenue Collector Edwards stands by the estimate that \$500,000,000 will be collected from the Wall street district alone.

LEGISLATION COVERS DRAFTEES AS WELL

Victoria, B.C., March 21.—It is announced today that the government proposes to introduce legislation at this session, extending the provisions of all war relief legislation to draftees. At present they are covered only in the war relief legislation, dealing with miner's licenses, etc, and have not been given protection in regard to mortgages, and accounts, which so far only cover volunteers.

"MANSLAUGHTER" FOR COMMANDER WYATT

Halifax, March 21.—The Grand Jury has returned a true bill against Commander Wyatt, R.N., the chief examining officer at the time of the great explosion here, when so many people lost their lives, and a large portion of the city was demolished. He is charged with manslaughter.

VOTES FOR WOMEN & DAYLIGHT SAVING BILLS INTRODUCED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, March 20.—When the House of Commons met this afternoon, Sir Robert Borden, the premier, introduced a bill to give the franchise to women. The bill was read for the first time.

A Daylight Saving Bill, which was along the same lines as the one presented last session, was introduced by Sir George Foster, minister of Trade and Commerce. It was also read for the first time.

It was stated by Sir Robert Borden this afternoon that the Women's Franchise Bill will go into effect immediately, and all women affected will be enabled to vote in any by-elections held after the bill is passed. It is expected that both of these new measures will make quick progress through the House, as they are both practically non-contentious matters. No opposition is expected to the franchise being extended to the women, and while there may be some little objection to the daylight saving measure, everyone is much in accordance with the principle, that no serious objection is anticipated.

WILL TAKE THREE MONTHS TO SALVE "ADMIRAL EVANS"

Victoria, March 20.—That the ss. Salvor had made a good start on the saving of the ss. Admiral Evans, which was stranded on the coast of Alaska several days ago, and that the work is expected to be completed in ninety days, was the intelligence received by wire by Mr. Harry Bullen, managing-director of the B.C. Salvage Company. Divers started work on Friday on a survey of the damage done to the vessel and it is expected that a definite report will be available next week.
The stern of the Admiral Evans is in eleven fathoms of water, nothing but a few feet of her bow and a portion of her smoke stack showing above the water. She is lying a few hundred yards from the P. G. E. Harris Cannery, and although she is a bad wreck, she is not regarded as a total loss by any means.
Fifty four members of the crew of the wrecked steamer reached Seattle, coming from the north on the Princess Sophia. Captain Glasscock, who was in command of the vessel, Chief Engineer Godding, the second officer and the boatswain are standing by the wreck.

PETROGRAD AND MOSCOW AWAITING OCCUPATION BY THE TEUTON INVADERS

ONLY A MATTER OF HOURS UNTIL GERMANS ENTER PETROGRAD—NO RESISTANCE EXPECTED—ENVELOPING MOVEMENT AGAINST MOSCOW CAUSES SEAT OF GOVERNMENT MOVE TO SARATOFF.

HORSEMEAT WILL BE SOLD NOW IN OMAHA

(Special to The Daily News.)
Toronto, March 21.—A United States Government market report states that plans have been announced for the opening of retail shops for the sale of horse meat in Omaha and some other cities in that section by a recently organized company with headquarters now at Grand Island, Neb. The promoters of this enterprise have stated that only young unbroken stock will be used.

NEW COMPANY COLLECT FISH WASTE

A new company has been formed to take care of the waste and offal from the various fish plants at Prince Rupert and the Skeena. The company is the Fish Oil and Products Limited, and takes over the licenses and boats belonging to Captain C. R. Betts and the fish oil and fertilizer plant of Mr. Robert M. Thompson of Tacoma.

Captain Betts has been trying to get local people interested in this industry for over nine months but without success, until the present time, when fertilizer is so much in demand.
The company has applied for membership in the Manufacturers' Association of B. C., being another member from Prince Rupert, where it is the intention of the Association to form a branch under a vice-president.—Vancouver Province.

When it is recollected that up till the present, no use has been made commercially of all waste from the halibut and salmon fisheries in this district, some little idea may be obtained of the possibilities before this new company. Every salmon and halibut arriving here has to be headed, and the same thing happens at every cannery on the river. In the meantime, these heads are simply dumped—thrown away back into the sea where they came from. Whole scow loads of fish offal are towed out of Prince Rupert harbour regularly, and no attempt has hitherto been made to utilise this valuable matter.

So far as eating is concerned, epicures tell that of the halibut, there is no part equal to the cheek while salmon tips constitute the tastiest bite. Meantime these delicacies are thrown away as useless by the people of Prince Rupert, and district, as it does not pay in the meantime to make use of them commercially.

If Captain Betts can utilise what has hitherto been waste, besides doing a national service, he is also proving and pioneering in a new field of industry in this part of the province.

London, March 21.—The occupation of Petrograd by the Germans is only a matter of hours, according to the dispatches received from Petrograd by the morning papers here. The Russian capital is said to be assuming a waiting attitude and is not displaying the slightest sign of organized resistance.

The various reports received from Russia also indicate that the greatest anxiety is prevailing there over what appears to be an enveloping movement, which the Austro-German forces are carrying out against Moscow. There is considerable talk of moving the government to Saratoff, which is some four hundred and fifty miles south east of Moscow.

Fleet Captured.
The crews of the Russian Baltic fleet which was lying at Helsingfors are reported to have melted away, and the vessels are now in the possession of the Germans. They are now in control of practically the whole of Finland. Two cruisers are lying in the river Neva, demobilized, and everything of a moveable nature has been taken away by the crews before deserting their ship.

LESS SHIPPING IS AVAILABLE NOW THAN THEN

Allies Have Two and a half Million Tons Less now than in 1914, Despite all the Shipbuilding.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 21.—The total net losses of allied and neutral countries in shipping, from the beginning of the war till December 31st, 1917, was only eight per cent of the total tonnage, which was 33,000,000, according to the statement of Sir Eric Geddes, made in the House of Commons here today.

Sir Eric's statement is a frank admission that, despite the shipbuilding activities of the allies and the neutral countries, they have eight per cent, or more than two and a half million tons of shipping less now than they had at the commencement of the war.

MIGHT IS RIGHT?

A year ago Russia was one of the first powers in the world. Today it is one of the most tragic wrecks in history, and the enemy is salving from the ruins whatever may be of use to him in strengthening his power to hold the Russian people in serfdom and to carry on his campaign for the destruction of liberty throughout the world. Whatever may have been the motives of the Bolshevik leaders that is the result of their work, and it is with the result that the world has to do. The account against Czarism was no doubt a heavy one, but under the Czar, Russia was at least a country, capable of protecting the lives and property of its people from foreign invaders, and offering an opportunity for the evolution of a system of government democratic in its ideals and based upon principles of justice. The leaders in the original revolution seem to have had in mind the hope that they could hasten this process of evolution by upsetting the established order of things. Unfortunately they in turn were overthrown by the Bolsheviks, who sought to apply to the domestic affairs of Russia the principal that Germany is seeking to apply to the affairs of the world—the principal that "might is right." In Russia, as elsewhere, the people who work with their hands are in the majority. That, to all-important fact. They call the Bolshevik leaders, was the ed upon those who worked with their hands to exert their power in their own supposed interests, in defiance of every principle of justice and fair play toward members of other classes in the community. What horrors have occurred in the last twelve months in Russia there is no means of finding out, but it is improbable that the history of the French revolution contains any chapters as bloody as those that have been written in the annals of Russia during the past year. To have not been a member of the Bolsheviks a button half a mile or more away, seems, as far as can be learned, to have been the only offence necessary to invite robbery, in the sand. Great care has to be

outrage and murder. Having conjured the spirit of might in defiance of right, it is in the course of retributive justice that the Bolshevik leaders find themselves victims of the same spirit, at the hands of an organized and efficient enemy. The unfortunate part is that the innocent suffer with the guilty, and that the Russian people through the misleading of this faction, are now at the mercy of those who made Belgium the synonym for unspeakable atrocities. The moral surely is that right is still a vital principle in human affairs; that as between man and man and class and class there is such a thing as justice and consideration, and that these cannot be ignored without inviting penalties. A state is necessarily made up of many classes. Between these classes there frequently is friction, and diversity or antagonism of interest. The Russian disaster is a present day and an awful reminder that one class cannot set aside the principle of justice and raise itself to domination over the other elements in the nation without inviting misfortune upon all. The idea that "might makes right" cannot prevail, as between classes or nations, for it is a challenge to God and man.—Bulletin.

TO KILL HAIR SEALS WHOLESALE IN APRIL

New Westminster, March 20.—The work of killing hair seals wholesale in the Fraser river will be resumed by the Dominion Fisheries Department early in April. Fishes officers here are now completing their preparations and only waiting for the tides to be favorable for the work. The plan as adopted last season consists in mining a sandbar somewhere the mouth of the Fraser where the seals come out in hundreds to sun themselves. When conditions are right the whole bar is blown up by pressing a button half a mile or more away, which sends an electric current through the explosives planted necessary to invite robbery, in the sand. NEW EQUIPMENT FOR CANADIAN RAILROADS

Ottawa, March 20.—Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways, is arranging for new rolling stock, locomotives and rails for Canadian railways this year aggregating a total cost of approximately forty million dollars. In addition to the 100,000 tons of steel rails to be rolled by the Dominion Iron & Steel Co., and the rails secured in the United States, as announced yesterday, the Railway Department is ordering 7,500 new freight cars, 150 locomotives and several hundred new colonist sleepers and other passenger cars. The colonist sleepers will be required to accommodate the big movement of troops to be expected when the influx of returning soldiers really starts in. The freight cars will include a large number of coal cars to relieve the scarcity evident this winter. All the new equipment will be ordered on Government account, but deliveries will be allocated to all railways as needs require.

Prices submitted in the tenders received are very high as compared with pre-war prices. Box cars, for instance, now cost from \$2,600 to \$2,800 each, as compared with \$1,400 each before the outbreak of the war. Locomotives have increased in cost by 150 per cent., and now run at about \$60,000 each.

In an effort to reduce costs through pooling orders by the Government, officials of the Railway department are investigating costs of raw material and of manufacture, and arrangements may be made with the manufacturers or Governmental purchase of iron and steel supplies at minimum cost, through co-operation with the United States Government.

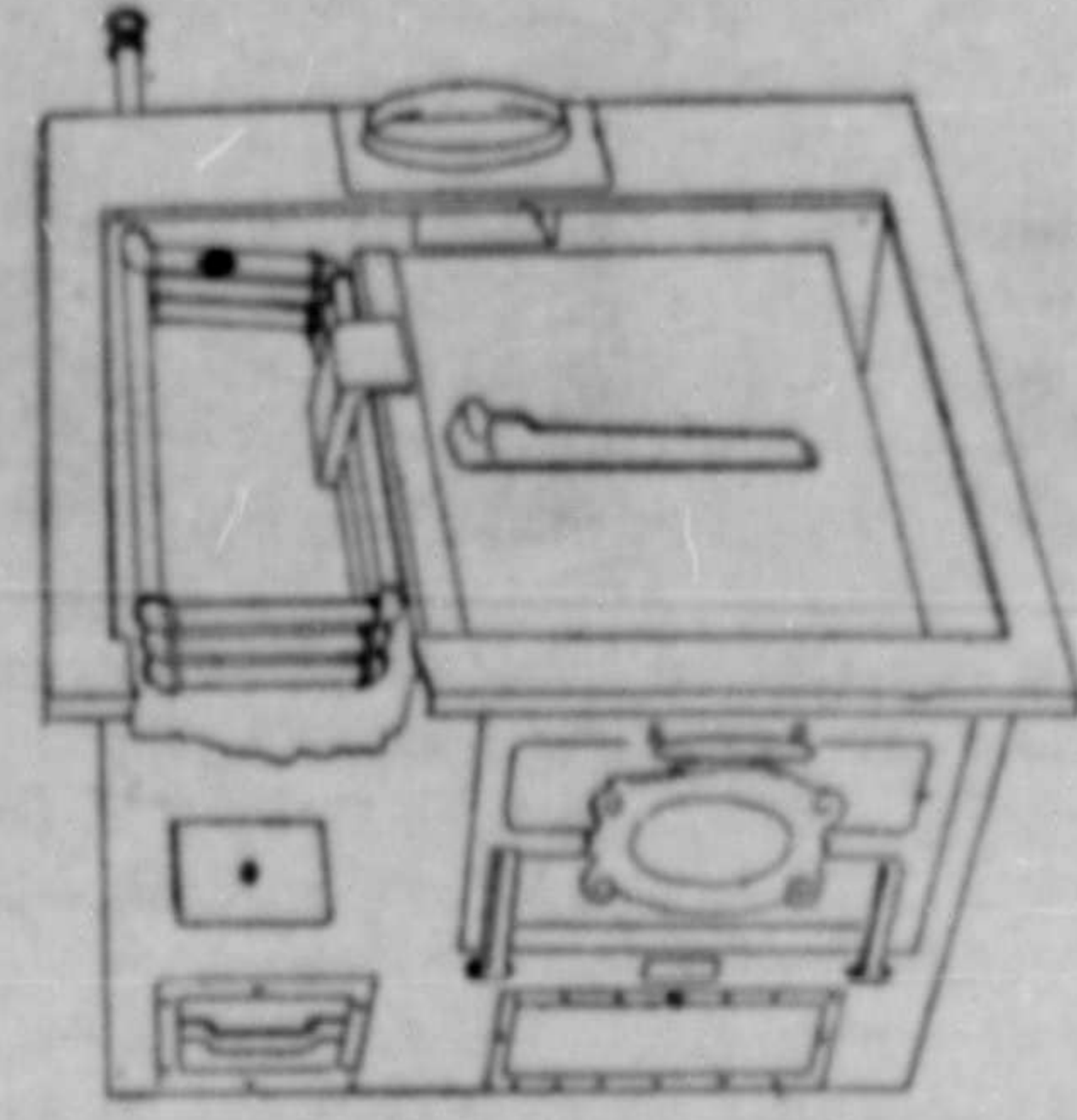

**The Dominion
Income War Tax
Its Meaning and Application.**

THE Dominion Income War Tax Act, passed at the last session of Parliament is now in force and all those liable to taxation under the provisions of the Act must file the required returns for the year 1917, on or before 31st March, 1918.

The Act provides that there shall be assessed, levied, and paid upon the 1917 income of every person residing or ordinarily resident in Canada, a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of unmarried persons and widows or widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons.

Corporations and joint stock companies carrying on business in Canada, no matter how created or organized, shall pay the normal tax upon income over \$3000. The fiscal year of corporations and joint stock companies may be adopted if desired.

Your Immediate Obligation.—You are now required by law to fill out in triplicate, one or more of the five special forms enumerated below. Read the particulars about the forms provided, then note the form or forms that fit your case. Don't forget to make three copies. You keep one copy, and in the case of Forms T1 and T2, deliver two to the Inspector of Taxation for your district. In the case of Forms T3, T4 and T5, two copies must be filed with the Commissioner of Taxation at Ottawa.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED

Individuals.—Form T1 is for all individuals having the requisite income. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3, make no marks on page 4.

In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Partnerships as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must fill in Form T2, showing total income. Amount paid during the year to Patriotic and Canadian Red Cross Funds, and other approved war funds, should be shown under Exemptions and Deductions. A financial statement should also be attached. In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each Company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3, to state particulars of the distribution of income from estates they are handling. A separate form is required for each estate and total incomes must be given as well as distribution thereof.

Employers. On Form T4 employers shall make a list of the names of employees and amounts paid to each in salaries, bonuses, commission, or other remuneration wherever the combined sum of such remuneration for the calendar year 1917 amounted to \$1000 or more. This applies to all classes, regardless of number of such employees.

Corporations Listing Shareholders.—Corporations and Joint Stock Companies shall list on Form T5, Shareholders residing in Canada to whom Dividends were paid during the calendar year 1917, stating the amounts of dividends and bonuses paid to each.

Don't wait till the last minute. Get the necessary forms now, and make your information accurate and complete.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.
