THE GREAT SPRING DRIVE IS NOW STARTED

HUNS START OFFENSIVE ON WESTERN FRONT

After Tremendous Bombardment with High Explosives and Gas Shells, German Attack is Launched on a Fifty Mile Front Against Allies--Massed attack Costly to Enemy

TREMENDOUS LOSSES SUFFERED BY ENEMY

Force Counter Attacks by British Infantry and Tanks Hurl Enemy Back from Dented British Line at Seven O'clock Last Night--Massed Battalions Make Fine Target for British

GERMAN ATTACK STARTED WITH LARGE FORCES
Divisions Were at First Thrown Against British Line and Many Others Since Arrived.

GERMAN ATTACK STARTED WITH LARGE FORCES

Divisions Were at First Thrown Against British Line and Many Others Since Arrived.

London, March 23.—Continued attacks were made on Friday almost the entire battle front by the German forces, and their attacks were made in great strength. At several points they made gains, while at others they were repulsed bloodily by the British counter attacks. The heavy losses continue to be very heavy, and every advance is being made at a great sacrifice.

German Claims.
Berlin, March 23.—The German troops in their initial attack against the British in France have captured sixteen thousand prisoners, along with two hundred guns.

The action took place off Dunkirk this morning.

Brilliant Counter Attack.

London, March 23.—After a most brilliant counter attack, which occurred at Deignis, when the British advanced with large masses of infantry, preceded by large numbers of tanks, the enemy were driven back at seven o'clock last night.

The eagerly awaited British official statement today which was expected to give further details of the tremendous fighting indicated in last night's reports, was read with great satisfaction, as it revealed that the enemy had been held, and had suffered great losses. If this turns out to be the great German offensive that has been predicted, and by means of which Hindenburg has boasted that he would be in Paris by April 1st, then the preliminary round appears to have gone in favor of the Entente allies, although, further heavy fighting is still to be expected.

Official Statement.

London, March 23.—The great battle on the western front continued till late last night. The British are holding the enemy. The official statement issued by the British War office is as follows:

"Fighting continued until late last night on the whole front between the rivers Oise and Seneze. Our troops continue to hold the enemy in their battle positions." "During the enemy's attack yesterday, his massed infantry offered

the British front line at points north of Lagnicourt and Louveral. Later it was reported that the enemy was advancing on the St. Quentin Ridge, on the edge of the Cambrai salient, and also through the Gauche wood in the same sector, and also through the brick fields near Croisille-sur-villers. The attacks were delivered in large masses, and the British extracted a heavy toll from the enemy as they advanced. The fighting has been extremely costly to the hostile troops. The tremendous concentration of men which the German High Command has made opposite the British front, however, enables him to throw battalion after battalion to the attack, so that notwithstanding the tremendous number of casualties his forces have suffered, there is no apparent diminution of the number of attackers. Several enemy divisions which have been especially trained for this great offensive have already been identified.

Official Statement.
London, March 22.—This morning's official statement said: "A heavy bombardment was opened by the enemy suddenly before dawn against our whole front from the neighbourhood of Vendeuille, south of St. Quentin to the river Scarpe."

"A successful raid was carried out last night in the region of St. Quentin. Thirteen prisoners and three machine guns were brought back by our troops. Prisoners were also taken in patrol encounters south east of Messines, and another successful raid was carried out by us to the south of the Houtholst wood."

French Front.

Paris, March 22.—There has been an intense and sustained bombardment of the sectors north and south east of Rheims, as well as on the Champagne front, according to the War office announcement today. Between the Caurrieres Wood and Bezonvaux, on the Verdun front, the Germans were driven back in violent hand to hand fighting. Lorraine, the Germans suffered a complete defeat in the region of Nomny, suffering heavy losses without any success.

Some Noise.

London, March 22.—The artillery action on the Western front could be distinctly heard at Dover, and at other towns on the south-east coast of England.

Naval Action.

London, March 22.—Two enemy destroyers and torpedo boats have been sunk by a force of British and French destroyers, according to the Admiralty announcement. One British destroyer was damaged, and the casualties were slight. There were no casualties among the French sailors.

BRITISH HOLD MORE PRISONERS THAN GERMANS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 21.—Replying to a parliamentary deputation which urged a general exchange of German and British prisoners under 45 years old, Premier David Lloyd George declined to give his consent to the proposals. He said that the plan would mean the exchange of 3,000 British prisoners against about 14,000 Germans held in British prison camps.

DRASTIC LAW FOR NEW YORK STATE IF BILL PASSES

Albany, N.Y., March 21.—All able-bodied males between 18 and 50 years of age will be required to be employed regularly in a useful occupation during the war with Germany, after proclamation by the governor to that effect, under the terms of a bill introduced in the legislature here by Senator Theodore Douglas Robinson. Habitual loitering in streets, pool-rooms, saloons, hotels, stores and depots would be interpreted as evidence of violation of the act.

French Front.

Paris, March 23.—The Germans are carrying out a heavy bombardment along several sectors of the front. Three infantry attacks near Hurlus were broken up by the French.

PARIS BEING BOMBARDED BY HUGE GERMAN HOWITZERS

SHELLS FALLING IN THE CAPITAL CITY AT FIFTEEN MINUTE INTERVALS SINCE EIGHT O'CLOCK THIS MORNING.—GUNS SITUATED SIXTY TWO MILES DISTANT—TEN PEOPLE KILLED.

BREAK IN POWER WIRES MAKES MUCH TROUBLE

The heavy snow fall which started in on Thursday evening, about eight o'clock, and which has continued intermittently since that time, besides being generally disagreeable and unexpected at this time of the year, has caused several breaks in the power wires from Shawatlans. The heavy weight of snow clinging to the overhead wires may be the cause of the trouble, and since shortly after noon yesterday till after 7 p.m. in the evening, there was no "juice" available in the city.

As a result our presses and linotype machinery had no motive power, and the Daily News was unable to issue as usual. The auxiliary steam plant was got into commission last evening, and was capable of only supplying part of the lighting necessary. Third Avenue was a dingy street last night.

Parties of linesmen were out all yesterday trying to locate the break, or whatever was the trouble but had not done so, up till this morning when the examination was resumed. The lines on the townsite were closely examined, without showing anything out of the usual, and the search was continued across Shawatlans passage. Here the going was very rough, the men were often wading through gullies up to the waist in the soft wet snow.

Superintendent Duncan was on the job until 3 o'clock this morning, and was out again by daylight continuing the search for the location of the trouble.

OFFICIAL FIGURES RE SHIPPING LOSSES

Washington, March 22.—Hitherto secret and correct figures of the British Admiralty on the submarine losses and world shipbuilding were made public here today by the British Embassy. They show that from both enemy action and marine risk on January 1, 1918, the allied and neutral shipping had lost since the war began 11,827,572 gross tons, while all the shipyards outside the Central powers had turned out 6,606,275 tons.

These figures, which have been so long withheld, are now made public. The memorandum of the Admiralty states that this is now done so that the figures will impress upon the people the necessity for united action in making good the losses imposed by the submarines, while at this time, they will not stimulate the enemy.

London, March 23.—The Germans are firing upon the city of Paris from a distance of sixty-two miles with a new gigantic gun. The shells have been falling into the city at fifteen minute intervals since eight o'clock this morning. Already ten people are reported killed and fifteen injured. No further reports of casualties have been received, nor of any destruction to property.

Only One Break.

London, March 23.—The enemy have pierced the British front at only one point on a fifteen mile front from Arras south. The battle continues with unabated fury. Berlin claims to have captured 25,000 prisoners, 300 guns and 400 machine guns. The British gunners are serving their guns wearing their gas masks. The City of Rheims has again been heavily shelled. It is calculated that altogether sixty German divisions have been engaged on the Western front.

Monitors in Action

London, March 23.—Ostend was bombarded yesterday afternoon by the British monitors with successful results. Prior to the bombardment, four of the enemy aeroplanes were destroyed by our naval squadrons.

While the British naval machines were spotting for the bombardment, they were attacked by the enemy aircraft, with the result that another of the enemy machines was destroyed.

At Heligoland.

British seaplanes were engaged in a reconnaissance in Heligoland bight and attacked the enemy mine sweepers with machine gun fire. There were no casualties on the British side. All our machines returned safely.

DAYLIGHT SAVING.

Sir George Foster is at it again. For the second year running he has introduced a bill into Parliament to enable people to deceive themselves into getting up in the morning an hour earlier, while all the while they think it is the usual time. Daylight saving is to be attempted in Canada.

There is no doubt that for a great many people this new regulation, if parliament approves—and there is little reason to think that they will not, seeing how successful the project has been in other countries—will be a great benefit. For one night, people will lose one hour's slumber. After that, things will be much as usual, only at noon, the sun will not be at its zenith.

Between the vernal and autumnal equinox, how is the ordinary individual to know the difference if all the clocks are altered. On the way to business each morning, the same people will be on the streets as usual. When noon comes round, even if it is only eleven o'clock according to the winter time, the desire for pabulum will be just as evident. An eight hour, or ten hour day will consist of the same number of minutes as ever it did.

What it will mean to the people who live in the cities, however, is that they will enjoy an hour's more sunshine per day than they did heretofore. In the mornings for instance, there are several hours of good daylight going to waste every day before the average individual completes the regular eight hours sleep. And in the evenings, in consequence, there are several hours spent by artificial light. The advantage of the extra hour in the morning has been appreciated in the several countries who have used it.

The farming community, of course, have something to say regarding this measure. The necessity for the saving of daylight does not require to be impressed upon this class of the community. Seeing the sunrise is no novelty to anyone en-

gaged in farm work, but in other countries they, too, have fallen into line. Talking about sunrise, one might wonder how many of Prince Rupert's population have witnessed this daily phenomenon, here. From the other side of the harbour, where North Prince Rupert will eventually be situated, it is a sight well worth seeing, when old Sol shows himself over the mountain top. And these early hours are well worth saving.

VOTES FOR WOMEN.

Among the first things which the new government, yelp! Union has done, since they met on Monday is to bring into the House of Commons at Ottawa, a bill to extend the franchise to women throughout the Dominion. This bill is expected to become law immediately, so that in any by-elections, the women's vote will have to be reckoned with.

Such an immediate necessity for the women having votes does not exist at this present day as it did some six months ago. If events take their ordinary course, the women of Canada as a whole will have no opportunity of exercising this privilege for the next five years,—and a whole lot can happen in that time. It would have been just as easy for the late Borden government to have introduced this bill before the close of the last session of Parliament, and placed at that time all the women of Canada on the same level, as regards voting power, as to discriminate against so many of the women of this Dominion by denying them the right to vote at the last election. But at that time, the late Borden government, which constitutes such a large portion of the present Borden government, apparently was afraid of the women of Canada. The women had then, and still have somewhat against them.

Now, however, when all the danger of their adverse vote is past for the next five years as they hope, the Borden Government is conceding that which at this time they could not well refuse, and that is at least to

bring the bill into Parliament. The women of Canada will doubtless consider themselves very much beholden to Sir Robert Borden and his new government, for they have not given that to the women, which is their right. Sure they did it. They are the champions of women's suffrage. And at the same time they will prefer to forget that they did not accede to the women's request at the time when they would have been in a position to use it immediately. But in keeping with the other provisions of the War Times Election Act, the Borden government deliberately kept from the women of Canada the right to express themselves at the polls last September. If the women of Canada are fit to vote intelligently, they were equally fit to vote at the general election three months ago. The perspicacity of women folks is not a thing that grows in three months, which makes them better fitted to vote in March than they would have been in December.

The gracious knight, Sir Robert, the ladies champion,—now—hopes that it will be all the same to them, seeing that they have got the vote anyway, or are going to get it, whether this took place before or after the election. It would make no difference to the women, he considered, whereas it might have made a whole lot of difference to him. It might well have been that the women did not love him so well in December as they might have done and through their agency, Sir Robert might be occupying a different chair in the House of Commons than he is now. So he took no chances.

Safety first is a good motto, which is lived up to by many politicians.

ONE CONCRETE SHIP TURNED OUT WEEKLY

Boston, Mass., March 21.—In connection with the launching on the Pacific coast of the first American built concrete ship, the Liberty Shipbuilding Company, which has headquarters here, announced yesterday that the keel for the first of a fleet of ten 3000-ton concrete ships for the government had been laid at its new plant in Brunswick, Ga.

The contracts call for the delivery of the first ship within three months, and the rest at the rate of one ship a week thereafter. He estimated the complete cost of each ship was \$375,000.

The ships are standardized. They are to be 260 feet long, 44.5 feet in breadth, drawing 22.5 feet of water and will be oil burners. The builders say that the ships will be lighter in proportion to their size than wooden ships and only weigh a little more than steel ships.

The Dominion Income War Tax Its Meaning and Application

THE Dominion Income War Tax Act, passed at the last session of Parliament is now in force and all those liable to taxation under the provisions of the Act must file the required returns for the year 1917, on or before 31st March, 1918.

The Act provides that there shall be assessed, levied, and paid upon the 1917 income of every person residing or ordinarily resident in Canada, a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of unmarried persons and widows or widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons.

Corporations and joint stock companies carrying on business in Canada, no matter how created or organized, shall pay the normal tax upon income over \$3000. The fiscal year of corporations and joint stock companies may be adopted if desired.

Your Immediate Obligation.—You are now required by law to fill out in triplicate, one or more of the five special forms enumerated below. Read the particulars about the forms provided, then note the form or forms that fit your case. Don't forget to make three copies. You keep one copy, and in the case of Forms T1 and T2, deliver two to the Inspector of Taxation for your district. In the case of Forms T3, T4 and T5, two copies must be filed with the Commissioner of Taxation at Ottawa.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED

Individuals.—Form T1 is for all individuals having the requisite income. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3, make no marks on page 4.

In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Partnerships as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must fill in Form T2, showing total income. Amount paid during the year to Patriotic and Canadian Red Cross Funds, and other approved war funds, should be shown under Exemptions and Deductions. A financial statement should also be attached. In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each Company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3, to state particulars of the distribution of income from estates they are handling. A separate form is required for each estate and total incomes must be given as well as distribution thereof.

Employers. On Form T4 employers shall make a list of the names of employees and amounts paid to each in salaries, bonuses, commission, or other remuneration wherever the combined sum of such remuneration for the calendar year 1917 amounted to \$1000 or more. This applies to all classes, regardless of number of such employees.

Corporations Listing Shareholders.—Corporations and Joint Stock Companies shall list on Form T5 Shareholders residing in Canada to whom Dividends were paid during the calendar year 1917, stating the amounts of dividends and bonuses paid to each.

Don't wait till the last minute. Get the necessary forms now, and make your information accurate and complete.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.
