THE GREAT BATTLE IS STILL IN PROGRESS

TREMENDOUS PRESSURE COMPELS BRITISH WITHDRAWAL FOR MANY MILES

BAPAUME CAPTURED BY GERMAN; MOST BITTER STRUGGLE

British Line Bent Back to Albert and Chaumes where it Holds, Protecting Amiens—French Driven Out of Noyon, and Germans Endeavouring to Break Through to Paris

BRITISH AVIATORS RAID GERMAN CITIES

Bring Down Forty-Five German Aeroplanes and Bomb Cologne, Mannheim, Metz and Other Places—Do Tremendous Damage—Railway Stations Blazing and Tracks Blown Up

(Special to The Daily News)
London, March 26.—Desperate fighting continued all day yesterday along the whole front, which now runs from Arras south to Albert and Chaumes. From thence south to the west of Noyon, the Germans are attacking the French troops strongly. Their objective evidently to break through west of Noyon, and make a dash for Paris by the route of the Oise valley. The British line has been bent back for several miles. Bapaume, Comblès, Peronne, Ham, and Noyon are all in the possession of the Germans, who are now very near to the positions they occupied more than a year ago. West and south west of Bapaume, the enemy has made gains though he is losing men at an enormous rate, and out of all proportion to the strategic advantages gained. Bapaume was lost to the British only after a most bitter struggle, according to the latest announcement.

Fresh Forces.
The Germans brought up strong fresh forces for the fight for Peronne and Bapaume, which places are the scenes of such tremendous fighting a year ago. Field-Marshal Haig reports that in spite of the gallant resistance put up by the British troops at these places, the great strength developed by the enemy forced them to give ground, in these sectors. The line now held by the British now stretches from Albert to Chaumes, and the enemy attacks on Bapaume have somewhat slackened. Further attacks in strength on this line will threaten the strategic centre of Amiens and will endanger the whole Allied front to the coast. From Chaumes south to the vicinity of Noyon, which the Germans have also captured, the Germans are continuing the attack on the French forces with uninterrupted vigor, with the obvious intention to break through the French line west of Noyon, which is situated on the River Oise, and advance in that direction upon Paris, which is but a bare sixty miles away. Hindenburg is reported in one of the Berlin newspapers to have remarked: "The day is over; we have begun to move; the first act is finished."

Defence Stiffening.
Latest.—British Headquarters

in France, March 26.—A correspondent wires: "There is reason to believe that important events will be recorded during the next few hours which may lead to the betterment of the positions of the armies which are stemming the German onslaught. The British and French defence is already stiffening, while the enemy losses have been so severe that reinforcements have been drawn from all parts of their front."

Great Aerial Attack.
As a complement to the hard fighting which is now in progress on the allied front in the West, a great aerial attack was made by the British machines to the territory along the Rhine. Forty-five German planes are reported to have been shot down by the British aviators at Cologne, Mannheim, Metz and elsewhere. The railway stations in each place are ablaze as a result of the tons of bombs which have been dropped. The railway tracks have been blown up, which will hamper the forwarding of supplies to the German fighting front. A large camp south east of Cambrai was also hit. Altogether forty five of the German machines were shot down, and twenty two disabled. Ten of the British machines are missing.

French Front.
Paris, March 26.—The French forces are engaged in severe fighting south of St. Quentin, around Moy. Although retiring slowly, they are carrying out strong counter attacks, and inflicting heavy losses upon the Germans.

Berlin Reports
Berlin, March 26.—Between the River Somme and the River Oise, it is officially announced that the Germans are fighting forward. Extremely hard fighting at Bapaume, and Peronne drove the British back to their old positions held by them between the Ancre and the Somme before the beginning of the Somme battle in 1916.

"By the Grace of God."
Amsterdam, March 26.—The German Press, says an official Berlin dispatch, has received the following telegram from Emperor Wilhelm II: "I am pleased to be able to tell you that, by the grace of God, the battle of Monchy, Cambrai, St. Quentin, and La Fere has been won. The Lord has gloriously aided. May he further help."

The Prisoners.
London, March 26.—The number of prisoners captured by the Germans now number over forty-five thousand and the guns over six hundred, according to the official German statement. The same statement adds that the French, British and American regiments which were brought from the south west for a counter at-

tack were thrown back upon Chauny at the same time that Ham and Peronne were taken.

Italian Front.
Washington, March 26.—The Austro-German forces are preparing for a great offensive on the Italian front, according to an official cable from Rome to the Embassy received here today.

SAWMILL COY. WANTS EXTENSION OF TIME ON POWER CONTRACT

Mr. E. F. Doby, manager of the Seal Cove Sawmill, addressed the City Council last evening upon the matter of the contract entered into with the city for the supply of power. The Prince Rupert Lumber Company had just received a bill for \$1,000, being the minimum charge for the first year of the contract, but owing to unforeseen circumstances, the company had been held back in their construction work, and so far had only used something like \$125.00 worth of power. Some correspondence had already taken place regarding this matter, and Mr. Doby would have liked that the City Council date this contract ahead, so that the Company might have a chance of using some of the power they were being charged for.

Owing to weather and business conditions, the mill completion was something like five or six months behind the time it was expected to take to complete. The cost was almost double, too. At first it was estimated to cost \$150,000, but before its completion it would be nearer \$300,000. In view of the unusual conditions, the company had made application to have their contract dated ahead these five or six months. They did not ask any rebate either in the price, or the amount of power, and the city would be out no real money.

After some little discussion, the matter was referred to the Utilities Committee to take the matter up with the Company.

LIEUT. C. C. PURDY FELL IN ACTION

The report of the death of Flight Lieut. C. C. Purdy, late of this city has been confirmed by one of his companions in the Corps, and some of the details of his death have reached this side. His friend, writing under date of February 25, 1918, says:

"We have had some exciting times lately. Ten days ago I went out in one of our large machines accompanied by C. C. Purdy in another, we were attacked by nine or ten Hun machines across 'the other side.' I am sorry to say that Purdy's machine was shot down in flames, and all the crew lost. I had been out with Purdy quite a few times, and he was a very keen pilot, and was well liked on the station; he will be greatly missed."

THE LIQUOR STOCKS AT THE POLICE STATION

"Who keeps the key of the cell in which the confiscated stocks of liquor are stored in the Police station, was the question interjected into the debate on the subject at the City Council meeting last evening, by Alderman Kirkpatrick. "Chief Vickers, he has locked the door, Chief Vickers keeps the key." Key might also rhyme with inventoree, which is also made by the chief. Alderman Casey opened the fire of questions last evening when he asked what is being done with this liquor stored in the Police station. The City Clerk gave the information that it was all locked up in the cells awaiting the decision of the Attorney-General as to its disposal. "Who keeps the key of the cell?" asked Alderman Kirkpatrick. "Is there an inventory taken?" persisted Alderman Casey? "When was the last inventory made?" enquired Alderman McRae.

Acting Mayor Dybhavn testified to the inventory which was made on the 5th of this month, being in the Mayor's office, thus allaying the suspicions of the Aldermen. The city has not the power to sell this valuable commodity, nor yet to destroy it, and if the Attorney-General defers his decision long enough, the ageing process should increase the value of the stock greatly.

THE NEW GERMAN LONG RANGE GUN MAY BOMBARD BRITAIN THE LONDON TIMES SAYS

(Special to The Daily News)
London, March 26.—The London Times advises the British people to take seriously the long range gun, possessed by the Germans which has already bombarded Paris. It adds: "We may be quite certain that our own inviolate shores will soon learn what the new gun can do."

The unexplained arrival of shells in Paris today regarded here as the greatest mystery of the war. British experts suggest the possibility of shells being propelled from Zeppelins at a great height, possibly from behind the German lines. The report of the monster gun having been located in the forest of St. Gobain, more than seventy six miles away from Paris has not been confirmed officially. The damage caused by the shells which fell in the city of Paris was very slight, each explosion making a hole only four feet in diameter, and of a depth of two feet.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

At a meeting of the City Council held last evening, the first business coming up was a report from the Finance Committee upon the question of paying the sum of \$300 to Mr. A. C. Garde, mining engineer, for the purpose of securing data regarding the resources of this vicinity, particularly with regards to iron deposits. Acting upon advice of the City Solicitor, the Committee were not certain they had the power to make this payment, and recommended that the Board of Trade refer the matter to the G.T.P.

This course of action was not satisfactory to Alderman Casey, and some little discussion ensued, both before and after the report was adopted.

The report from the City Treasurer for the last two months was read, regarding the different departments of the City, which reports were referred to the various committees. The report upon the Wark Channel power proposition was not complete, this being impossible on account of the weather.

Then came up the matter of the extension of the Watermain from Third Ave. to First. This is held pending until the Finance Committee can determine what amount of money is available for public works. After three Bylaws for the borrowing of \$30,000 were passed their second reading, Alderman McMeekin asked leave to introduce a Bylaw regarding the Telephone rates, and this Bylaw was read for the first time.

This being all the business on the agenda, and the curfew bell ringing at the same time, the councillors began to prepare to disperse: But

It was not to be, so early. Alderman Casey, not being satisfied with the opinion of the City Solicitor regarding the power of the city to pay that \$300 for data on the mineral resources of the district, moved that other legal opinion be taken on the subject. But the Council said him nay.

The question of the confiscated liquor stored in the cells of the Police Station was also touched upon. "What is being done with this booze?" "Who keeps the key of the cells?" "Is there an inventory taken?" These were some of the questions which were shot at the chair, displaying a thirst for knowledge on the part of the aldermen.

The Ladies reading and rest room question was also further discussed, and after Mr. Doby, of the Prince Rupert Lumber Company, had requested the council for the post dating of his contract with the city for power, so as the company might use some of what they were being charged with, the Council adjourned.

CAN THE CITY PAY FOR PROSPECTING?

When Alderman Casey challenged the opinion of the City Solicitor at last night's council meeting with regard to the legality of paying Mr. Garde to obtain data upon the mineral resources and particularly iron, in this district, City Solicitor Peters pointed out that the actions of the Municipality were governed by the Municipal Act. "The city might as well give a sum of money to any person to open up a prospect" said the solicitor. "The city council must take to municipal matters."

Alderman Casey was not satisfied. He wanted to know by what power the City pays \$600 per annum to the Board of Trade. The city can send deputations to Ottawa and pay for them, to enquire into the Fishery regulations, and in view of this, Alderman Casey could not take it that the city solicitor's opinion was the proper one. Accordingly he moved that the City Council take the opinion of Mr. Patmore, of Messrs. Patmore and Fulton, upon this matter, and his written opinion as to the legality of this matter be read at the next meeting of the council.

Alderman Casey also wanted to know whether the city solicitor gave his opinion according to law, or what he thought it would be. "My opinion is given according to my understanding of the law" returned the solicitor, with some asperity, "and the opinion of Mr. Patmore will not change my understanding of it."

On the motion of Alderman Casey being put to the meeting, it was lost by the casting vote of the chairman.

CONFIDENCE.

Now that the worst is known of Hindenburg's great attack on the Western front, and that that worst is not so bad as might have been expected, judging by the enormous weight of the attacking armies, people will feel the more confident, now that the uncertainty is somewhat removed. It is evident that the British forces have been compelled to give ground, but at a price which will prove to be too costly for Germany. Quite a dent appears to have been made in the line held by the British around Lagnicourt and Croisilles, which places already formed the apex of a salient sticking into the British front. It is south-west of these places that the enemy has penetrated furthest into the positions held formerly by the British forces, who have withdrawn fighting every inch of the way to their stronger defensive positions further west.

What has happened to the Cambrai salient, over which the last advance was made by the tanks, unheralded by any artillery preparation, not so very long ago, remains to be seen. Had the German attack at Hargicourt, and Ronsoy succeeded, this salient would be wiped out, and the defenders surrounded by the enemy. The dispatches however, make no mention of the enemy breaking through at these places to the south of the salient. In fact, very little information of a definite character has come through, and where the present British line is established has not yet been made public.

If the Germans capture thirty thousand prisoners as they claim, and such a large number of guns, the chances are that they were captured with part of the Cambrai salient. From German prisoners captured, it has been learned that the program of the German High Command was of a very much more ambitious character than has been carried out, and also that the defence proved to be very much more stubborn than even the

Germans had expected. The Germans will have a few more surprises before the campaign is completed, too.

It is not only in the attack that the British soldier excels, but in defence, he has proved himself to be a master fighter as well, and the toll he has taken from the enemy on this occasion may well give even Kaiser Wilhelm pause. If Germany can stand any more battles with such losses, she will have a much greater number of troops at her disposal than she has been credited with. There is a limit to what even Germany's forces can stand in the way of punishment and if her troops were dispirited previously, they will be none the more light hearted after this battle, even if they do retain a few miles of trenches.

However, Germany will hardly be permitted to retain even this, and no pressure which the Germans can place in the battle is greater than that which the allies are capable of. And in due course, they will find this out.

In 1870, Frederick William, King of Prussia, accompanied by Bismark, went with his troops under von Moltke, when they attacked the France of that day, and was eventually crowned as Emperor of Germany in the historic palace of Versailles. The present Kaiser with Hindenburg on this occasion is also accompanying his troops, and doubtless expects to be in Paris on April first with Hindenburg, when he may possibly want to be crowned Emperor of Europe. An idea of this kind is quite in keeping with the overweening conceit of the Hohenzollerns. But in the meantime, there are yet many German soldiers to be killed before that happens. If the rate of slaughter keeps up to the average of the first two days, it might seem as if the Kaiser will have scarce a bodyguard with which to flee the battlefield when his time comes.

The destruction of the enemy forces in the field is the immediate objective of the allies on the Western front, and notwithstanding their own losses,



they have made a long step towards their objective during the past few days.

OUT OF THE WEST.

The political progressivism of the West is beginning to influence Dominion policy in a measure which, we may be sure, is not lost upon the forces of reaction. The Prairie Provinces can take no little satisfaction from the fact that it is on the trail that they blazed that the Dominion is now treading—somewhat gingerly, it is true, but growing bolder with every step. They adopted prohibition and women suffrage when these subjects received scant courtesy in the Dominion Parliament. Now Parliament is adopting both. The Prairie Provinces also have made long strides in public ownership of public utilities, and their example before long will be followed by Ottawa in several directions. The West furthermore is the home of the low tariff movement, and Ottawa not only has adopted a large instalment of the rejected reciprocity agreement of 1911—also a Western production—but it has begun to knock the duties off agricultural implements. Ottawa has come to look to the West for initiative and boldness in dealing with its problems and usually finds both.—Victoria Times.

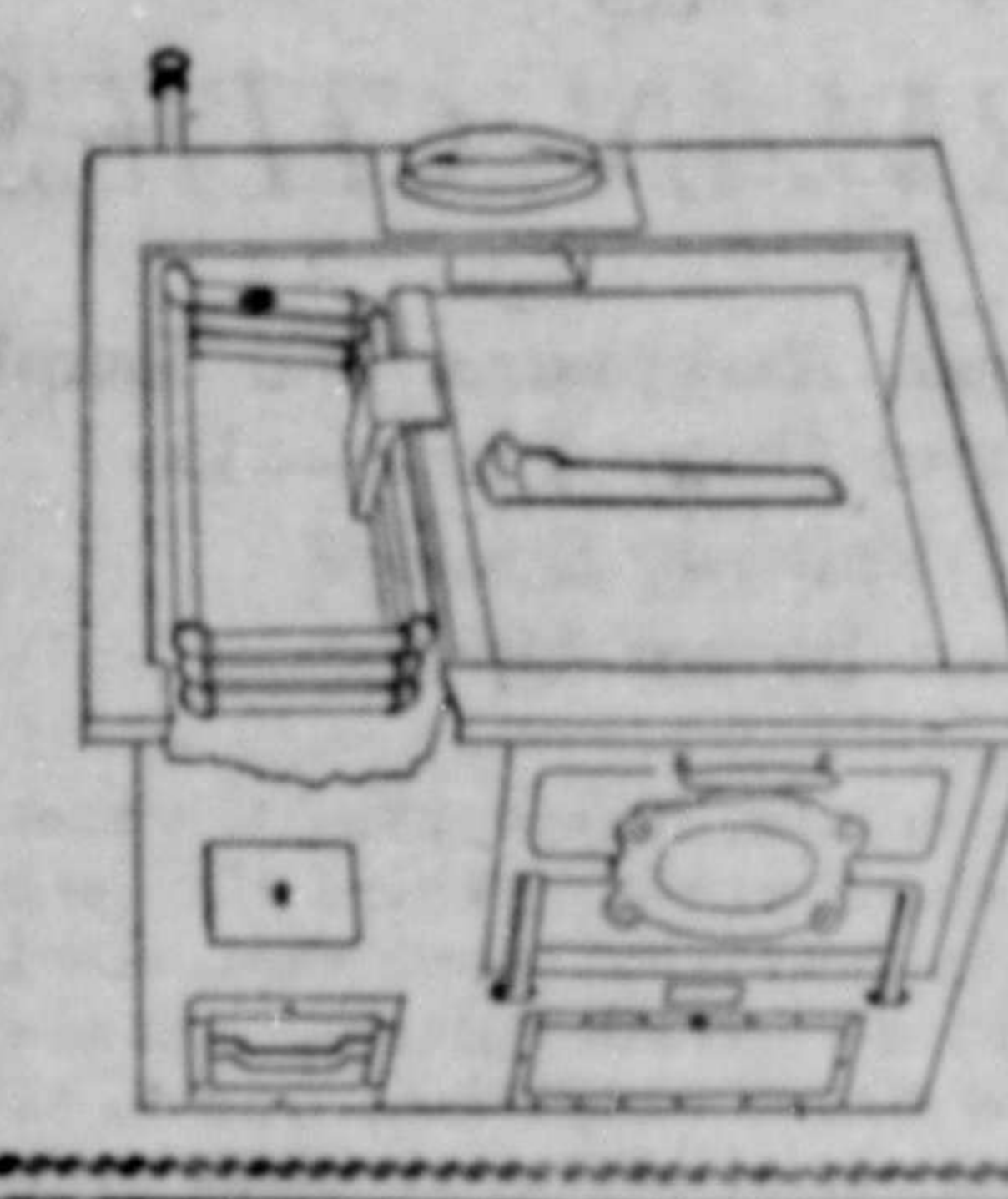

GERMANY LOOKS FOR A DECISION IN THIS BATTLE

London, March 22.—"We are entered on a decisive battle for general peace," says the Taegliche Rundschau of Berlin, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen, in announcing the commencement of the German offensive in the west, is received with great felicitation by the German people, who will follow it with feverish interest. The newspaper adds:

"A single combat between England and Germany which is to decide the war, our future position in the world, and whether the Anglo-Saxons shall continue to press their will on the world, opened today."

Amsterdam, March 20.—(Delayed)—Field Marshal von Hindenburg has telegraphed to the Posen provincial council as follows:

"God willing, we will also overcome the enemy in the west and clear the way to a general peace."

London, March 22.—Emperor William, Field Marshal von Hindenburg and General von Ludendorff have gone to the Western front to witness the German attack, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen.

INDIA MAKES GREAT PROGRESS DURING WAR

Delhi, India, March 21.—Sir William Meyer, presenting the annual financial statement to the Council, said that the present year closes with a surplus of five and three-quarter million pounds sterling, due to a favorable monsoon and record growth of railway receipts, counter-balanced by a considerable increase in military charges amounting to twenty nine million pounds sterling.

Drawing attention to the fact that the War had emphasized India's financial strength most remarkably, Sir William said no one could have imagined three years ago that the country would have been able, with moderate increase in taxation, to offer to his Majesty's Government, one hundred millions as a special war contribution over and above the additional charges which the war entailed on its own military budgets, and could borrow anything like as much as had been done, raising, for example, more than one-third of the one hundred million war contribution by direct loan in India during a single year, or that it should be found possible to meet, as had been done, the demands for war supplies to his Majesty's Government, and the immediate outlay these involved.

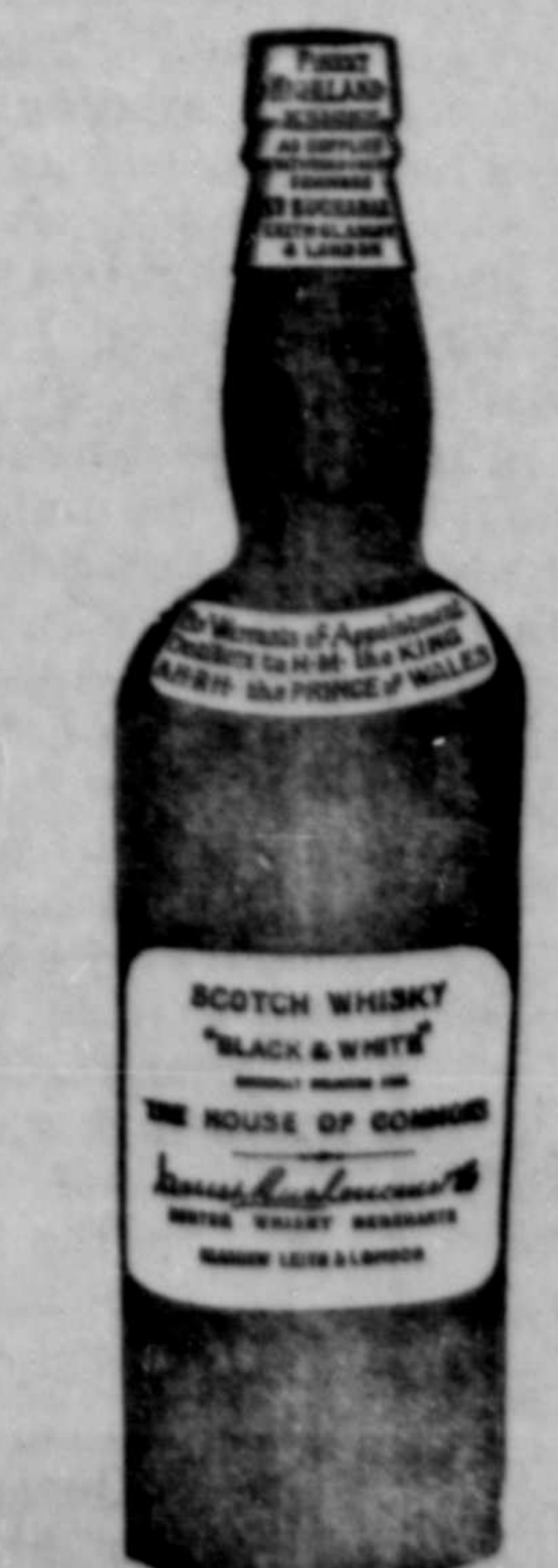

The Income War Tax Act

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Forms to obtain and Special Features to observe

Individuals—Get Form T 1 to give particulars of their own incomes. In stating Dividends received, give the amount from each Company, listing Canadian and foreign Companies separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4.

The following sample answers, (printed in italics) to questions asked on pages 2 and 3 of Form T 1, will help you to fill in correctly your copies of the Form.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Share-

holders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

In the case of Forms T1 and T2, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two, with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.
