GENERAL FOCH NOW IN SUPREME COMMAND

TAKES CONTROL OF WESTERN FRONT -- ENEMY THROWN BACK WITH BIG LOSS

BRITISH HAVE SITUATION WELL IN HAND. ENEMY THROWN BACK WITH GREAT LOSS

REPORTS GROUND GAINED NORTH OF RIVER SOMME AND POSITIONS HELD.—FREQUENT ENEMY ATTACKS REPULSED WITH HUGE CASUALTIES.—HEAVY FIGHTING.—FRENCH HOLD STEDFAST

(Special to The Daily News)

London, March 29.—Field Marshal Haig reports "North of the line, we have gained ground at several points and held positions. The enemy attacked frequently, but when he got through our outposts and French Reserves, he was thrown back with heavy losses. South of the Somme, heavy fighting took place. We withdrew a short distance from some of our advanced positions."

Germans Held Up.

Paris, March 29, (Official).—The attacks were made by the enemy in the region of Montdidier and Noyon, but the French troops in the villages they had taken yesterday, and retook Montdidier. British troops held the German thrust causing considerable losses of life to the enemy.

Counter Offensive at Once.

Washington, March 29.—The Washington Observer thinks that the United States forces will take part in the fighting when the counter offensive of the Allies is launched, which they expect at once.

General Bell, just back from the front, told the Washington Committee today that the British withdrawal was made on a pre-arrangement, and all is now over.

Well in Hand.

London, March 29.—A report from the British Headquarters in France indicates that the Allies are holding the extreme right. The latest report from the front indicates that the British situation is well in hand.

ENEMIES MAKE BATTLE

A GERMAN REVERSE

London, March 25.—Commenting on the results of the German offensive in France, the Daily News says:

"Assuming that the German losses are at least 150,000, the Allies have suffered a reverse, for they have not obtained a strategical success directly conducting to a battle while he has lost eight per cent. of his effectives without similarly lowering the morale of the Allies."

This matter is of the greatest importance for Germany, who at present is at the critical moment in the man-power pendulum swinging in favor of the Allies. The weakness at the Anglo-French front has yet disclosed and the enemy in the next days of the battle is more formidable than that already accomplished."

BUT WILHELM HIMSELF DISPLAYS NO CHANGE

Amsterdam, March 29.—The Volks Zeitung of Cologne says that according to General von Ludendorff, Emperor William has been deeply impressed by the terrible devastation in the battle area, remarking:

"How glad we should be that our country has been spared such terrible things. Why did we succeed in keeping the fighting beyond our frontiers? Because before the war we always urged the need of armaments. When mankind changes, these things also will change, but first mankind must begin to change."

BOLSHEVIKI ARMY BEING REORGANISED

Moscow, March 29.—Bolshevik troops, an official statement says, have been successful in fighting the Austrians in the southern Ukraine. The cities of Kherson, Nikolayev and Zmanka have been recaptured by the Russians.

The Bolshevik Ukrainian Rada, which fled from Kiev to Kharkov before the Germans, is now at Ekaterinoslav, where it has adopted resolutions refusing to endorse the peace treaty between Germany and Ukraine, unless the Central Powers withdraw all troops from the Ukraine. The Rada decided to oppose the Central Powers by means of armed forces, strikes and boycotts.

The Bolshevik organ Izvestia publishes an appeal signed by Leon Trotsky calling upon the people to co-operate in the organization of any army to defend the revolution, and announcing the coming publication of a decree for universal obligatory military service. All former officers are to be called to active service in the capacity of instructors under control of the national commissioners.

Washington, March 30.—The Food Controller today has ordered the suspension of meatless days for a period of thirty days, beginning today.

BELIEVES HUN DRIVE WILL BE SHORT LIVED

U. S. Major General Back from Front is Confident Wants Five Million Army and U.S. Speeded Up.

Washington, March 29.—Back from a visit to the Western front, Major General Leonard Wood, in a confidential statement before the Senate declared that Allied military opinion is unanimous that the German offensive will fail, and urged a great increase to 4,000,000 or 5,000,000 in America's army.

It was General Wood's opinion, according to his auditors, that the Germans on the Western front are now numerically superior, both on the ground and in the air, but that the Allies are in a better position. While confident that the German offensive will be halted before the enemy has gained any material objectives, Gen. Wood suggested that the offensive may change the warfare into a more open contest. For that reason he recommends the training of American forces for open warfare as well as for trench fighting.

In urging that the American war program of men, ships and munitions be speeded up, Gen. Wood said no American artillery or airplanes are yet available to Gen. Pershing's men and that, although 1,000 American aviators are ready they are without planes. Use of Liberty motors in bombing instead of fighting machines was recommended by General Wood.

Gen. Wood said that although the initial success of the Germans probably had been greater than expected, either by the Allies or the enemy, judging by the number of British guns reported captured, he and Allied Officers believed that the drive will be short-lived.

There is no possibility, he said, of the Germans attaining their apparent objective, the channel ports or threatening Paris.

ALLIES CONTINUE TO SLAUGHTER GERMANS

British Army Headquarters in France, March 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—The appalling slaughter of the attacking masses of the German troops has continued since the first days. All the prisoners have much the same story to tell of the great losses suffered. Undoubtedly the Germans expected some such result, and it is probable all their cards have not been played yet.

The resistance which has been offered by the Allied troops to the German advance constitutes one of the finest pages in the annals of the war. The gallant sacrifices which those hardy warriors made in covering the withdrawal and delaying the German advance undoubtedly will have an important effect on the final outcome of this greatest of all battles.

Continued to Attack.

The Germans last night continued their furious onslaught southward against the Allied defenses in the region of Montdidier and Noyon, having slowed down in their attempt to cut through the British line farther north, where such desperate resistance was offered.

Hard fighting occurred about the town of Albert. Large enemy forces pushed forward toward the place, but at last accounts the British were holding them doggedly at this possible gateway to Amiens.

The conflict in the sector around Montdidier and Noyon appears to be of great importance from the many indications that the German higher command is attempting to split the Allied front there and start a rolling up process either way.

U-BOAT LIMPED INTO SPANISH PORT AFTER SHIPS BATTERED HER

El Ferrol, Spain, March 29.—A four hundred ton German submarine has sought refuge in this port. The commander made an urgent request for admittance, declaring that his craft had been damaged severely in a fight with three ships. The submarine carries two eleven-centimetre guns and a crew of thirty. A Spanish warship has been sent out to guard her.

SHELL FROM LONG DISTANCE GUN STRIKES PARIS CHURCH

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 30.—Seventy-five persons were killed and ninety were injured when one of the long distance German shells struck a church in the region of Paris during the progress of Good Friday's services. The killed and injured consisted mostly of women and children. The very same church was struck last Sunday during the celebration of Mass, resulting in serious casualties.

The bombardment is continuous and although the projectiles are comparatively small, they can do a great deal of damage when they explode among a concourse of people. The Parisian newspapers are asking for immediate reprisals, while deploring the "useless barbarity" of this bombardment.

TURKS ORGANISE A WOMEN'S BATTALION

(Special to The Daily News)

Geneva, March 30.—Elaborate regulations are being drawn up for control of the battalions of young Turkish women, which the Turkish War Office, breaking all precedents in that country, recently decided to organize. A Constantinople dispatch says the War Ministry is prescribing minute measures to prevent the battalion from coming into contact with the soldiers. All the officers of the battalion will be women. It will perform work behind the lines.

GERMAN AGENTS SPREADING ALARM IN NORTH. FRANCE

London, March 29.—German agents are spreading alarmist reports among the civil population around the battle zone of Northern France, according to a dispatch from the Reuter correspondent at British Headquarters dated Monday. These persons are being dealt with summarily when caught. Concerning the fighting the correspondent says:

"The spirit and determination of the British troops is excellent. The enemy losses have been enormous. The situation in many places remains very confused which is natural in fighting that has assumed more of the character of a war movement than at any time since the days of the Marne."

RUSSIAN CRUISER DESTROYED BY MINE

London, March 30.—Dispatches received here through the Exchange Telegraph Company report that the Russian cruiser Admiral Makaroff, was sunk by a mine at the port Reval in the Gulf of Finland.

GERMANS MAKE MOST OF THEIR PROGRESS

Berlin, March 30, (Official).—On both sides of the river Scarpe, we have pierced the foremost positions held by the British, and we have taken several thousand prisoners. South of the Somme, we drove the British out of old positions from bravely defended villages. The British continued to make brave, but fruitless and costly counter attacks near Albert and north of Albert. The Germans re-attacked on the sector between the Somme and the Ancre.

GERMANS THROWN OUT OF ODESSA BY SOVIET

March 28.—After a bloody battle, in which the Russian naval forces took part, Odessa has been recaptured by the Soviet and the Ukrainian troops. While little information has been permitted to come through regarding the progress of the Austro-German forces invading southern Russia, owing to their being in control of the telegraph lines, their presence there and their treatment of the Ukrainian population has been much resented. The indiscriminate hanging of all who were not subservient to the German orders, all being classed together as Red Guards of the Bolsheviks, has caused serious trouble from the very first days of the German invasion.

MOVEMENT NOW IN CAUCASUS FOR WAR AGAINST THE TURKS

London, March 29.—There is a strong movement in progress in the Caucasus for a declaration of war against Turkey, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Moscow filed late Saturday.

Leading members of the Caucasus Diet are quoted as declaring the Nationalists will never agree to the passing of Caucasian districts into the hands of the Turks.

FOOD SUPPLIES.

The seriousness of the situation with regard to food supplies available for the allies from now on until this summer's harvest can be reaped has not in any way decreased. There is still a shortage in the visible supplies, which are necessary to carry civilization through one of the most critical times. If it is possible for the average individual to live on less of these commodities which are the scarcest, it is up to each individual personally to see that this is done. Wheat and meat are the scarcest, and wherever any other cereal can be substituted for wheat flour, or anything else for meat, this is one of the things which it is up to the people to do voluntarily.

So far as scarcity is concerned, there are few of the people of Western Canada at least, who have experienced this, so far. Supplies of most necessary commodities, even if high priced, are still plentiful. We have not known here, to have to be doing with twelve and a half ounces of meat per week, yet, and while voluntary rationing is already in vogue among a great number of the people of this Dominion, it is possible that the voluntary saving of these essential food-stuffs might be largely increased. There are very many articles of food which might very well take the place of these two, wheat and meat, which are the most easily transported across the ocean, and the more food-stuffs that are substituted for these, the more of them there will be for export to where they are so badly required.

TO BOMBARD LONDON.

The real intention of the Germans with respect to their new long distance gun has now been disclosed. The shells which were thrown upon Paris from such a distance were fired merely as a trial for the guns. And, when the Germans win through to the coast, as they are fully convinced they will, then they will set the gun to its real duty, which is to bombard London.

Having failed to intimidate

the British people with their air raids over the country, the Hun mind has conceived a new idea for doing some destruction. This seems to be the more pleasing to the Hun mind when such can be done when the other side cannot retaliate, in kind. Meantime, however, it seems as if the Germans will have to get themselves a gun which shoots very much further before they will be able to bombard London as they would like to do. They are now apparently as near to the coast as they will ever get.

TURN ABOUT.

Already the German press has commenced to prepare the German people for the offensive by the Franco-British forces, which they expect on the Western front. Doubtless the military masters of Germany know that this is inevitable. They have warned the people of the "powerful army of reserves" which the allies possess, and which up till now, they have not utilised in their defence against the German rush. The German newspapers have also intimated that the British in their withdrawal have saved their entire complement of heavy artillery.

It is doubtful whether this announcement will be pleasing to its German readers, as it shows that for all the quick advance made by Hindenburg's forces, his gains consist chiefly of territory, which had been previously evacuated by his own troops a year or so ago. The chief objective in an advance like which the Germans have just made is the destruction of the enemy forces, and this the Germans have failed to do.

What will happen when the allies, offensive is under way will be watched with extreme interest.

VETERANS DEMAND THAT ALIENS SERVE

Toronto, March 27.—"We did not fight to fatten aliens," was one of the slogans of 3,000 returned soldiers parading under the aus-



pieces of the Great War Veterans here, to demand the immediate conscription of aliens.

At a meeting in Massey Hall, the Vets made the demand of the Dominion Government that no Class 2 men be called out or furloughed men be sent back to France before friendly aliens are brought under the Military Service Act and alien enemies are conscripted for work of national necessity.

There were strong protests against their employment, particularly those of enemy origin, in munition factories at fancy wages, which were endorsed by Col. William Hendrie and Mayor Church. Furlough men and many crippled heroes participated in the procession to the hall.

A nation-wide agitation is planned.

20,000 BOYS ALREADY ARE SIGNED UP FOR FARM WORK

Ottawa, March 29.—An announcement is made by the Canada Food Board that as a result of the enrolment work for the Soldiers of the Soil, over 20,000 boys have been secured in Ontario and the four Western provinces. Enrolment will proceed in Quebec during the first week in April and in the Maritime provinces during the second week.

EQUAL PRIVILEGES EQUAL SACRIFICES

Canada's War Government could hardly have stopped at selective conscription of man power. Selective conscription of wealth, on the basis of ability to pay, was a corollary that sooner or later had to be adopted as an integral part of our war machine. And so the income war tax came into being. Like the law conscripting the man power of the nation, the income war tax is based on the axiom that equal privileges of citizenship demand equal sacrifices. And like the law conscripting the man-power of the nation, the income war tax is designed to bear least heavily on those least able to conform to its provisions and most heavily on those best able to bear the burden of its demands. Its fairness is at once its justification and its charter of success.

The income war tax provides that a levy be made on all incomes in excess of \$1,500, enjoyed by all unmarried persons or widows and widowers, without dependent children, and on all incomes in excess of \$3,000 enjoyed by all other persons, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. All those coming within the provisions of the act must file on or before the 31st March, all necessary information concerning their incomes for 1917 as detailed on forms provided for that purpose, which it is their present duty to obtain without loss of time. Penalties have been provided for non-fulfilment of the provisions of the Act. But the Canadian people are a unit in their determination to carry the war to a successful conclusion, and it is not anticipated that these will have to be invoked in the application of this most necessary measure.

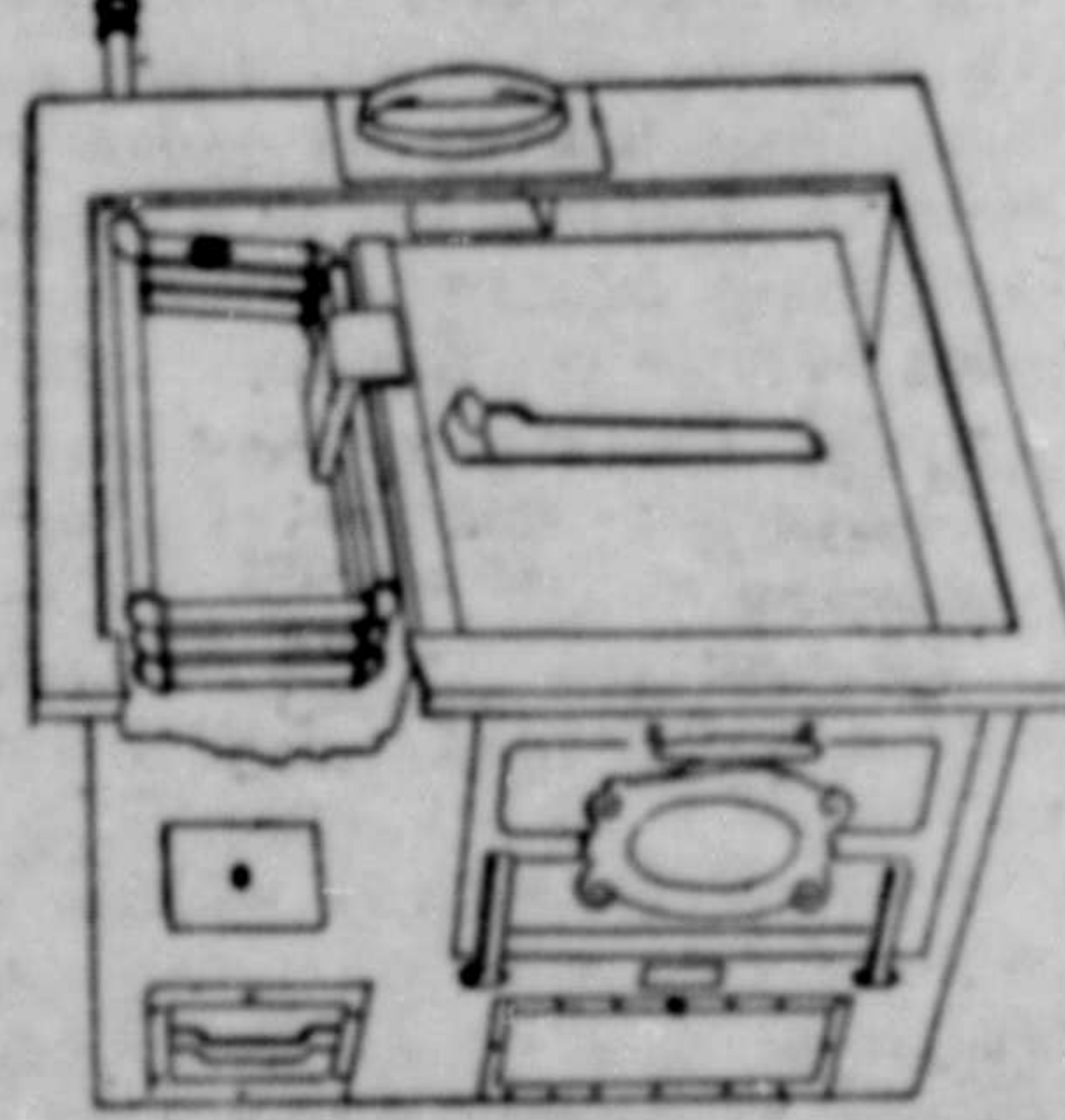

**The Income War Tax Act**

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Forms to obtain and Special Features to observe

Individuals—Get Form T 1 to give particulars of their own incomes. In stating Dividends received, give the amount from each Company, listing Canadian and foreign Companies separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4.

The following sample answers, (printed in italics) to questions asked on pages 2 and 3 of Form T 1, will help you to fill in correctly your copies of the Form.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Share-

holders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

In the case of Forms T1 and T2, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two, with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.
