GERMANS CAN GET NO FURTHER IN FRANCE

COUNTER ATTACKS BY ALLIES SUCCESSFUL, WHILE GERMAN ATTACKS FAIL

ALLIES TURN ON GERMANS AND EXACT TERRIBLE TOLL IN DEAD AND WOUNDED

GERMAN ATTACKS ARE REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSSES, WHILE ALLIES MAKE DISTINCT GAINS—CASUALTIES INFLICTED UPON GERMANS CONTINUE

(Special to The Daily News)
Paris, April 3.—French and British troops advanced last night between the Somme and Demuin, it is announced officially. Over the front between the Somme and the Oise the night was relatively calm. Heavy artillery fighting occurred at some points. In the region of the Colonne and at Ban De Sept the French made two successful raids of tank prisoners. At Chamettes a German attack on some trench posts was repulsed.

The Severe Blow.
French Headquarters, April 3.—The repulse of the German assault yesterday between Lassigny and Mont Diddier was the severest the enemy has suffered since the beginning of the offensive. The attack was conducted in a similar manner. Dense aggregations of men marched up to assault by battalions and literally died away under fire of the British 75's. Moreuil was recaptured by French and Canadian soldiers charging together. Reports sent back by the French leave no doubt but that the enemy suffered terribly and did not gain an inch of ground.

Americans In.
Washington, April 3.—The announcement from London that American units are to be brigaded with British and French organizations was interpreted by army officers here today as indicating that the United States government is ready to thrust aside all consideration of national pride in using American man power at the immediate disposal of the allies. The plan was decided on conferences between Secretary of War and Generals Bliss and Pershing and British and French officials.

Gun Positions Stormed.
British Army Headquarters, London, April 3.—The British stormed strongly-held German positions in a wood along the Luce River yesterday. When the enemy withdrew after sharp fighting, he left the ground strewn with his dead. The Germans shelled the wood heavily after it was occupied by the British and organized two counter attacks for the purpose of retaking it. Both were caught in the artillery barrage and broken.

Machine Guns Aaken.
London, April 3.—In the sector between the Ancre and Luce rivers yesterday the British took fifty prisoners. Thirteen machine guns were captured.

More Reactionary Stuff at Ottawa.
(Special to The Daily News)
Ottawa, April 1.—W. F. Kay, member for Mississquoi, Que., has given notice of the following resolution: "That it is of the greatest importance that all measures tending to increase agricultural production or for conserving agricultural labor should be taken by the government in the interests of the allies and of Canada's winning of the war, and that as a means to this end all exhibitions and fairs throughout the country should be prohibited for the present year."

Armenian Race in Danger Now of Being Wiped Out.
Boston, April 2.—The Armenian race is in peril of extinction through the threatened commission of atrocities by Turks and Tartars in the Caucasus, according to a cable received today by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. The message, forwarded through the State Department, was from Rev. Ernest Yarrow, of the Board's staff, who has been at the head of the large committee of American relief workers in and around Erivan, Russia.

Where Has All the Russian Wheat Gone?
Geneva, April 2.—The Austrian Government is obliged to send cereals to its troops in the Ukraine, according to information received from Cernowitz. Bread is especially needed, as the local supply is entirely exhausted. The Austrians forwarded one hundred carloads of wheat to the Ukraine.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The regular meeting of the City Council was held last evening. In the continued absence of Mayor McClymont, Alderman Dybhavn occupied the chair. The meeting was a short one, and was got through quickly.

The first business brought up was a communication from Mr. Jos. W. Ruthrie, of Clinton, B. C., who offered his lot in the city for cultivation. The lots are 1-14-12 and 6-28-5. The owner thus offering the free use of his lots for the production of foodstuffs, the city clerk will see to it that the most is made of the matter. If any of the aldermen had any ideas on the subject of cultivation of any of the other innumerable lots vacant in the city at the present moment, they did not give themselves away, and this occasion for discussing the matter in public was passed up.

There followed next a letter from the Women's Christian Temperance Union regarding the subject of the censorship of Moving Pictures. It was felt that the censorship was inadequate, and that the pictures of successful burglaries were proving an incentive to boys to indulge in incipient crime. The City Clerk intimated that the Mayor had already taken up this matter with the Attorney-General. Alderman Kirkpatrick proposed that the council take action in the matter. Upon the motion of Alderman McRae, the Finance Committee was appointed to deal with the matter.

The City Clerk, or it might have been the City Solicitor this time, informed the council that the censor used to be a lady. For reasons of their own, the government had made an alteration, and the man now filling the job was evidently more lax.

After the Board of Works had been empowered to purchase some lumber, the matter of road and poll taxes came up. Alderman Casey wanted those who paid the road tax to go on to the municipal voters roll automatically. He moved that the City Solicitor draft a resolution to be sent to the provincial government requesting that they grant legislation permitting persons paying road tax to the municipality going on the voters roll automatically.

This caused a clash between Alderman Gasey and either the City Clerk or the City Solicitor. It could hardly have been the City Clerk, for he wouldn't have dared to talk back to an alderman, and yet the city solicitor has no locus at an ordinary council meeting. However, it happened anyway, and Alderman Casey expressed his extreme disregard for the things which he thought the city solicitor considered to "sanctified and holy."

Then the money bylaws passed, enabling the city to borrow some \$30,000. Then followed the second reading of the Telephone rates Bylaw, and the Meter rates bylaw, after which the council passed a resolution requesting an explanation from Premier Sir Robert Borden of the statement credited to him that the wages of shipyard workers in this city exceed those paid in other cities on the coast. Then the new bylaw regarding the control of bicycles came up again. Someone else had been nearly run over through a cyclist not having a bell, so the police will carefully examine all bicycles after this, to make sure that they carry the regulation bell to give warning of their approach.

CANADA IS ASKED TO RAISE FRESH FORCES

(Special to The Daily News)

Ottawa, April 1.—The Duke of Devonshire, governor-general of Canada, has received the following cablegram from Premier Lloyd George:

"I have been inspired during the past week with the constant news of the dauntless courage with which the Dominion troops have withstood the desperate assaults of vastly more numerous German forces. This battle shows that the Empire has reason to be proud of all its sons. Our armies cannot have too many of these splendid men. As already announced we propose to ask parliament to authorize immediate measures for raising fresh forces. I would also urge the government of Canada to reinforce its heroic troops in the fullest manner possible, and with the smallest possible delay. The struggle is only in its opening stages and it is our business to see that our armies get the maximum measure of support that we can give them. Let no one think that what even the remotest of our dominions can now do can be too late. Before this campaign is finished the last man may count."

SETTLERS COMING TO INTERIOR VALLEYS

Victoria, April 2.—"There will be more settlers locate in Middle British Columbia during the next three years than ever before in the history of the province," said R. C. W. Lett, G. T. P. tourist and colonization agent, this morning in touching upon the important question of land settlement. The fertile valleys of the Bulkley and the Nechaco are attracting a great deal of attention and this year there will be a large movement to these districts from the prairies and also from the United States.

Twelve for Starter.

As an indication of the interest that is now being centred on British Columbia and the tremendous advantages offered for the development of mixed farming, Mr. Lett stated that before he left Winnipeg twelve whole families had completed arrangements to migrate to the Nechaco Valley where they intend to take up land and engage in mixed farming. The head of the G. T. P. colonization department is familiar with numerous instances of this kind as he is kept fully in touch with the situation by the many inquiries that are continuously passing through his hands.

Expects Great Things.

Mr. Lett expects great things from the land settlement scheme fathered by the Provincial Government and predicts that the community plan will mean the rapid development of large areas in the Province. All the settlers now coming into British Columbia from the prairie sections and the agricultural districts of the United States, he says, are well supplied with money and propose to operate on an extensive scale.

CITY COUNCIL TO ASK SIR ROBERT BORDEN FOR EXPLANATION

At the present moment a Royal Commission is to sit and investigate into the demand for the shipyard workers in the cities of Vancouver and Victoria for an increase of ten per cent in their wages. The shipbuilders say that they cannot pay it, and the Muniton Board refuse likewise. Yet in Seattle and in the yards of the United States, the rate of wages paid exceeds the ten per cent increase which the Vancouver and Victoria men ask for.

Having in mind the higher wages which are paid in the United States, Alderman Casey last evening moved a resolution that Sir Robert Borden be asked for an explanation of the statement credited to him in the press to the effect that because of the high wages demanded by these same Victoria workmen, one of His Majesty's ships had to be sent to the foreign port of Seattle for repairs, instead of being accommodated at Prince Rupert as heretofore.

His resolution was adopted and the City Clerk instructed to act accordingly.

On the face of it, the reasons given by Premier Borden look lame, the more so because, if we remember rightly, of the local men who were employed at the drydock here on the last occasion, some of them complained that they did not receive the regular scale of wages for the class of work they were doing.

So far as can be learned, the real facts of the case show that although the wages paid to the men who were brought up here on the last visit were according to the regular scale, in addition to this, their hotel bills were paid, and they received a bonus of several dollars per day as well, which naturally would swell the costs of the job. So far as can be learned, hotel accommodation and the bonus were offered to the men, they did not demand it, or if so, the fact has still to be made known. If the costs of the job are deliberately piled up on work coming to Prince Rupert, and needlessly at that, to blame high wage demands for mismanagement won't go down, coming from Sir Robert Borden or anyone else.

QUEBEC RIOTS CAUSE SEVERAL DEATHS

Quebec, April 3.—Quebec City is in a state of war, with dead, dying and wounded within her walls today, casualties of last night's battle between rioters and troops.

The exact casualty list was not known at an early hour this morning, although it is certain that five civilians are dead. The wounded were many and at least fifty prisoners were taken. The soldiers suffered as well as the civilians. The riots are believed to be caused by I. W. W. agitators, as a number of boys arrested have admitted they received money for their acts.

BRITISH SUCCESS IN MESOPOTAMIA IS CONTINUING

London, April 2.—The British column which recently won a striking victory on the front along the Euphrates Rivier, in Mesopotamia, putting out of action the entire Turkish force in the Hit area, has advanced to a point 83 miles beyond Hit, the war office announced. The number of prisoners have been increased to 5,000.

The statement concludes: "Full particulars of the captures have not been received, but they are of great importance. Large depots at Anah have fallen into our hands, containing quantities of ammunition, mine throwers, guns, etc."

TO RAISE FUNDS FOR Y.M.C.A. WORK

ONE REASON.

Among the gigantic saurians who disported themselves amid the steamy primeval forests that are now our coalfields, there was a kangaroo-shaped creature so large that he could have looked in at a first-storey window of a city tenement and at the same time blocked the whole traffic of the street with his body. This monster was of so lethargic a nature that if one had trodden on his tail it would have taken him several seconds to perceive the sensation and turn around to find out the cause. Owing to a too favorable environment, the bulk of his body had increased out of all proportions to the intensity of his nervous system; and in the course of time, when conditions grew harder, he perished of hunger, or fell an easy pray to smaller but more active rivals. That the natural history of this extinct monster may suggest some quite plausible reasons for the strange apathy of the Russian people with regard to the aggressive designs of Germany is pointed out by a contemporary Russia had a stern fight for national existence against the Mongol invaders, but since that time her vast gains of territory have been won mainly from weak or backward peoples. Her extension along the Baltic was due to the daemonic energy of Peter the Great, whose life was one long struggle with the apathy of his people; and the sheer bulk of Russia rendered her all but insensitive to the attacks of Japan. What explained her defeat in 1904 is the main cause of her defeat today. Neither then nor in the present war was the heart of Russia ever really seriously threatened. The peasant of Central Russia had only a very tepid interest in Japan's assaults on the far-distant "tail" of Russia on the Pacific. And even at present it is difficult for him to see any cause for alarm in an enemy line which at its nearest point is still some 500 miles distant from Moscow, and which hardly anywhere traverses territory which is Russian in the sense in

which the invaded territory of France is French. Russia's apparent indifference to the fate of the territories whose rights were discussed at Brest-Litovsk is more than regrettable—it is tragic. But it is not inexplicable. In view of Russia's history and the Russian temperament, it is unfortunately natural. Of the 180 millions who inhabit Russia only about half are racially Russian, and these are but sparsely represented in the occupied territories on the West. In Esthonia, which the Germans have hardly penetrated, only some 3 or 4 per cent. of the population are Russians. In Livonia and Courland the proportion is even less, and in Kovno the Russians and Poles together only make up 9 per cent. of the population. The vast majority of the inhabitants of these provinces are Estonians (of Finnish race), Letts, and Lithuanians; the predominant faiths are Lutheran in the North and Roman Catholics in the South; and Russian influence dates only from Peter the Great. Over most of these regions, too, the chief landowners are German or of German extraction, descendants of the pious "Knights of the Sword" who enslaved the native populations in the Middle Ages. In Russian Poland the Russians, always regarded as undesired aliens, number only 6 per cent. of the population. Even in Grodno, the province through which the centre of the German line runs, the non-Russian population is fully 45 per cent., and it is only in Volhynia that we find a region which is dominantly Russian and immemorably Slav. The Russian people, in fact, have conspicuously failed to respond to the Western impetus imparted by Peter the Great. The movement of population has been all the other way, into Siberia, the Russian Canada, which now contains an almost purely Russian population of nearly 10 millions. These considerations are far from consoling us for Russia's attitude. But they at least explain why the apathetic Rus-

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sian people, entrenched in imagined safety behind a row of States which have never been more than technically Russian, have abandoned their frontiers to German exploitation, and have not as yet displayed the spirit that Napoleon roused by his ill-starred march upon Holy Moscow.

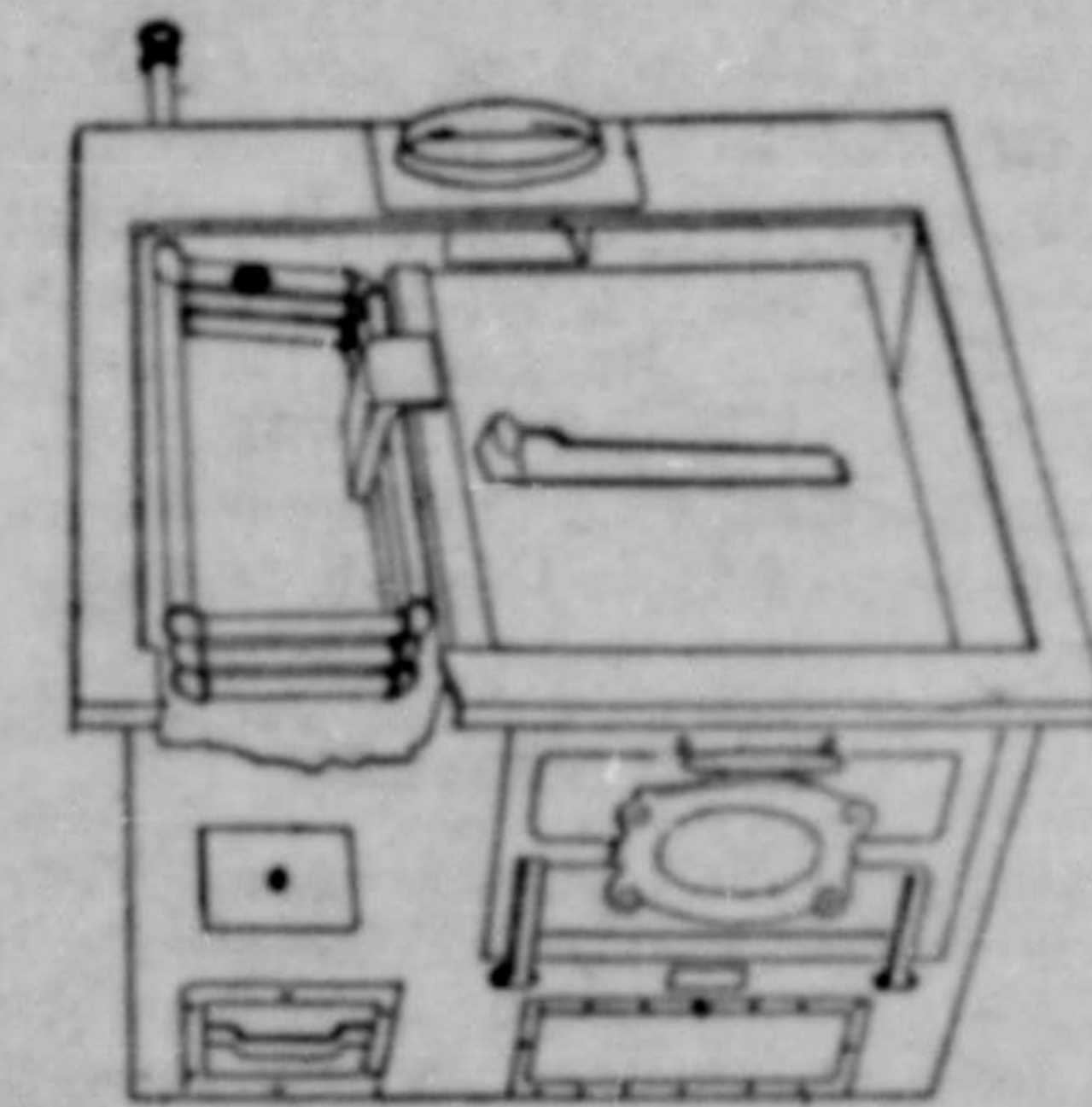
