Greece may be a backward country in some respects, but its judicial methods would during the last few days are seem worthy of consideration. with a view to imitation.

There is of course nothing extraordinary in the fact that two officers who were put ashore from a German submarine were captured and condemned to death. This is in itself merely one of the ordinary incidents of war.

What is notable is the remark, thrown in casually and apparently as a matter of little consequence, that "their lawyer also received the death sentence."

This is a modern adaptation of the mediaeval custom by which the seconds in a duel were also expected to cross rapiers, and to take the same chances as their principals.

The degenerate codes of nations further west do not expose lawyers to any worse risks than an occasional inability to collect their fees from impecunious clients.

Greece has the correct notion. If the jury's verdict were understood to include also the lawyer, the number of guilty men who escape might be materially reduced. The average jury would figure that a verdict which hanged both lawyer and client, must be at least LOGGING-AND LOGGING half right .- Sun.

GETTING THEM GOING

The announcement that the British Euphrates army, after its brilliant success at Hit, has reached a point over 150 miles up the river is of intense interest and suggests sensational military possibilities. These troops thus are within 200 miles of Aleppo, the northern gateway to Syria, and the junction point of the Hedjaz railroad supplying the Turkish forces confronting Allenby's troops in Palestine with the Bagdad railway route. Aleppo is the base of Turkish operations in Armenia, Palestine and Mesopotamia, and its capture by the British would seriously affect the enemy in those areas. For that reason, however, it is likely to be

strongly held and it may be that the British forces which have been advancing so rapidly not be necessary for the British to capture Aleppo to dislocate the plans of the Turks. A few miles beyond the point reached by them two days ago will bring them to the ancient caravan route which links Palestine with the Euphrates. passing through historic Tadmor in the Syrian desert. If British cavalry, operating from the Euphrates westward, could strike the Hedja railroad anywhere between Aleppo and Damascus the Turks in Palestine would be cut off from their main source of supply, while if Marshall's forces were strong enough to capture and hold Aleppo before the Turks could withdraw from Palestine into Asia Minor, Allenby's foe would be securely bottled up, for only through Aleppo, the neck of the bottle, could the Moslem troops in Palestine effect their escape. The Turks opposing Allenby in any case are likely to beat a precipitate retreat shortly, in which event we soon should hear of extensive advances by the British in Palestine.

A matter of considerable importance was brought up at the meeting of the Board of Trade at their last gathering. 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

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JEWISH SOLDIERS TRAIN IN ENGLAND

London, April 5 .- Announcement by the government that the Jewish regiment being recruited by the British army will fight in Palestine is considered as a visible evidence of the determination of the government to restore the Jews to Palestine.

The first contingent of the Jewish regiment which was formed a few months ago has left for the East. A few days ago these men marched through Cairo, Egypt. They were received enthusiastically and a large number of recruits were gained.

A large number of men for the regiment are in training in England, and the regiments' headquarters in London and training camp in West England are the centres of great interest to Jews and non-Jews. Recently the Jewish recruits marched through London and were given a civic reception by the Lord Mayor and by the municipal authorities of Stepney, a Jewish section.

DANGER OF WORLD FAMINE VERY REAL

London, April 5 .- Great Britain would face a much more severe food shortage, William Goode of the Food Ministry told the American Luncheon Club, if she would decide to make with Germany "a tired peace." He said:

"I chose the topic, 'Peace Without Plenty,' because of the widespread idea that with peace the scarcity of food would automatically disappear. Statisticians of the Ministry of Food have given me an estimate of the conditions likely to ensue upon the declaration of peace in the near future. I also sought the opinion of an eminent American authority, Professor Graham Lusk, who repre-Mineral sents the United States on the Portland Canal Mining Inter-Allied Council of Alimentaof tion, and also of other international experts. The conclusions arrived at by American, British and other authorities are practically identical."

Mr. Goode pointed out that even if Russia were able to feed herself there would be at the conclusion of peace 200,000,000 people in Europe clamoring for food.





Military Service Act

Important Announcement to All

EXEMPTED MEN

and to the Public Generally

N dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1 under the Military Service Act, it has occurred. as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption whose proper place is in the Army.

It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting. To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places.

Exemptions Granted on False Grounds

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded.

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Military Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted men. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in thei own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to leep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

Citizens Urged to Assist

In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country, but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.


