## CANADA'S TROOPS MAY BE ATTACKED NEXT

### EXPECTED BETWEEN ARRAS AND LENS -- LINE HAMPERS ENEMY MOVEMENTS

#### LULL CONTINUES ON THE BATTLEFRONT IN FRANCE

**GENERAL ACTION SUSPENDED AND FIGHTING CONTINUES IN SPOTS ONLY—ENEMY MAKES SLIGHT PROGRESS NEAR CONCHY WOOD—LARGE ATTACK EXPECTED BETWEEN ARRAS AND LENS**

(Special to The Daily News)  
Paris, April 9.—The announcement made by the War Office last night says: "During the course of the day the enemy pressure continued north of the Ailette river in the region of the lower Conchy forest, where the advanced sections of our troops resisted the advance of the enemy."  
**British Front.**  
With the British Army in France, April 9.—From eight o'clock last night until midnight the enemy heavily bombarded with gas shells the area between City St. Uille and La Basse canal in the Lens sector.

Japanese forces have been landed here from the ships for the purpose of policing the city. They continue to patrol the thoroughfares, and maintain order. No steps have yet been taken towards ejecting them by the Bolshevik authorities.

#### WILFUL WASTE BY POLICE COMMISSION

**"Save All You Can," Says Government, But Police Commission Pour High Priced Goods Down the Sewer.**

The rabid teetotalers in the city would have seen a sight to have gladdened their eyes, a sight, which at the same time would have made other people weep, yesterday afternoon at the City Police station, when the stocks of liquor confiscated before the coming into effect of the present prohibition act were destroyed. There were four casks of draught beer, which was spoiled anyway, so that didn't matter so much, but there were also thirty-three quart bottles of perfectly good Cascade beer, and seven bottles of other liquors broken and their contents run down the common sewer. Last month the value of these bottles might have been around thirty dollars or thereby, but had the value been thirteen hundred dollars, it would have been all the same.

According to the law, the Police Commission had no other alternative in disposing of this stuff, although in a short period of time, it will be irreplaceable, at any price. Which shows how foolish laws can be, even with a majority of lawyers composing parliament. Apart from the mere money value most of these bottles could have been utilized medicinally, advantageously, notwithstanding that certain intemperate people argue against the use of alcohol, even when prescribed by duly qualified medical men.

The fact remains that this commodity, which has a definite place in the order of things, and which Prince Rupert Hospital may have to purchase yet in the days to come, was deliberately wasted, according to law, which makes the waste all the worse, and had there been more, the more would have been wasted, while at the same time the government is telling all and sundry to save, save, save, and invest in Victory Bonds. #### THE MAYOR'S REPORT ON HIS VISIT SOUTH

At the close of the regular business of the council meeting last evening, Mayor McClymont told the Council of the results of his recent visit to Victoria. This chiefly referred to the taxation overduo on the property held by the government in this city. Many of the lots sold by the government had not been paid up, in full, and title still being vested in the Crown, the lots could not be sold for taxes. The mayor explained the bill at present before the house called the Municipal Proportional Allotment Bill, that, if it passes, will relieve this city considerably. Altogether it means that something like \$27,000 of taxation will be released, which would go a long way towards the construction of roads in the city. The present plank roads are in a bad state, and with this money expended upon permanent improvements, a considerable amount of temporary upkeep would be avoided.

Mayor McClymont had no hope of the city getting any waterfront this year, although he noticed that \$7,500 was in the estimates for constructing some sort of dockage for the fishing fleet. He did not know that the city had any rights upon Cow Bay either, which matter apparently lay between the government and the G. T. P. With regard to the question of the control of clubs, he did not consider it probable that the Municipal Act would be opened up this session either, so that the municipality could obtain further powers.

There was quite a long discussion arising out of the mayor's report. Ald. McRae, upon the question of waterfront, and Ald. Casey regarding Cow Bay were the principal speakers. Alderman McRae thought that Lot 6 in Block 29 was to have been reserved for the city, and he wondered what had come over the Hon. T. D. Pattullo. "Maybe they are afraid of the city's public wharf," suggested the mayor. "It is not the city they are worrying about, believe me," retorted Ald. McRae.

Ald. Casey moved that the city solicitor submit a report to the council stating whether the city has any rights on Cow Bay at all, to enable them to enter a protest against the filling up of the bay. Ald. Casey was also indignant at the fact that no authority apparently had any jurisdiction over clubs. While admitting that he was not at all tight-laced, and really liked a little elbow room himself, he did not like the idea of "tin horns" having it all their own way. Were Alderman Casey mayor, he would clean them up, or know the reason why.

#### TO HELP INCREASE IN FOOD PRODUCTION

The proposal which was brought before the City Council last evening to the effect that the city engage two men to operate the stump puller in the systematic clearing of lots, in order that the ground may thus be made available for increased production of foodstuffs would seem on the face of it to be only a reasonable one. Under the present system, a citizen may borrow the puller and have it drawn onto his lot, and it will probably take two weeks for him to do a day's work with it, owing to only the evenings being available for this kind of recreation. By the city charging the actual cost to the owners of the lots, and the work done about systematically, it would be economically done, and some definite development work done, without the city being one cent the loser.

Ald. Casey objected upon the ground that this would be all very well for the "leisured" classes, but it wouldn't do for the working class, which was a sample of Alderman Casey at his best, talking "through his hat." To point out a leisured class in Prince Rupert as against a working class will task a keener analyst than Alderman Casey.

Ald. Dybhavn also had objection to this scheme although he did not put them into words, and so the matter was postponed for a while, but at this time of the year it may mean the whole difference between an early crop and a late one.

It is about time that the city council woke up to the fact that there is a scarcity of foodstuffs throughout the world. They have been elected to act for the city in important matters, and it is up to them to take the lead. In other cities in British Columbia, the city council has arranged for the cultivation of all available vacant lots, but up till now, the Prince Rupert City Council have done nothing of the kind. They have been content to sit still, and when a definite proposal which would assist probably a number of the citizens, they sit on the fence for a while longer. Whoever refuses to assist in the production of food is equally guilty with the food waster, and deserves as well to be hanged.

#### K. P. CELEBRATE THEIR EIGHTH ANNIVERSARY

Last evening the St. Andrew's Hall presented a gay sight, when the Knights of Pythias entertained their ladies, and many other friends in celebrating the eighth anniversary of the society in Prince Rupert. The hall was testefully decorated, and the illuminated escutcheon of the Knights graced the walls. There were well over two hundred dancers present, and one and all enjoyed the proceedings to the utmost. Music was provided by the Westholme Orchestra, which was well up to the usual standard and the brightly lit hall showed off the gay gowns of the ladies to the best advantage.

Supper, which fulfilled all the requirements necessary, came on before midnight, after which dancing was resumed and kept up until the early hours of the morning. This anniversary celebration of the Knights of Pythias must be voted to be a distinct success and much credit devolves upon the Knights for their management of a most pleasant affair.

#### "ALL IS GOING WELL," SAYS FOCH. THE ALLIES MAY BE CONFIDENT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 9.—The memorable statement made by General Foch, the supreme commander of the Entente armies on the Western front, has been gladly received by the British press.

"All is going well. Look at the small advances made by the Boches, to call them by their real name, during the 27th, 28th, 29th and 30th of March. It is now long after the first of April, and it is clearly evident that the great tidal wave of the German army has been broken in spirit, because it met an obstacle. Now they are against an embankment and completely stopped.

The future will show the full measure of our success. We are

going to try to do better, and to get the upper hand of the Boche. I cannot say what will happen, but all is going well."

The getting of the upper hand of the Boche is apparently to be the next move of the allies, and the counter stroke which they have been preparing may be looked for, as indicated in the words of General Foch. Hindenburg has been unable to fulfill his boast that he would be in Paris by the first of April, although doubtless he did his best to get there. Foch on the other hand is not boasting of what he is going to do, but the quiet confidence of his statement is taken as being sufficient to show that the situation is well in hand.

#### DRASTIC MEASURES ARE THREATENED BY THE WAR VETERANS

Victoria, April 6.—A deputation of the members of the G. W. V. A. waited upon the Win the War League asking for its co-operation in a monster delegation to go to the Parliament Buildings to lay before the government the grievances which existed in the failure of the Dominion government to intern enemy aliens, and in the attitude of the Provincial government towards the returned soldier question. The chief spokesman of the deputation was Comrade A. R. Berry, who said that the immediate cause of the demonstration was the failure of the Dominion Government to enforce the Military Service Act properly, that class B men were being called out while there yet remained in the country large numbers of class A men. Almost as important was the attitude of Ottawa towards the enemy alien class. He cited cases in this city where Austrians were drawing \$6 a day while returned men were walking around looking for work, and said that the men now back from the fighting line had not come back to do nothing, but had come home prepared to fight a bigger battle than facing Germans, and if something was not done, and done quickly, "there was going to be trouble."

"If we men had not gone to fight the Germans might have won the war, you would no longer have savings and property, and the men who made your wealth secure are entitled to your consideration, therefore come with us and take part in this demonstration to secure from the Provincial Government a land scheme this session and from the Dominion Government the internment of alien enemies," were his closing words.

Comrade J. Taylor said that Greeks and other aliens were smoking cigars on the strength of good jobs while returned men were working as laborers. "We're fed up, and are going to take drastic action, and we want your aid in handling these conscientious objectors, enemy aliens and I. W. W.'s. That sort of people are going to get it in the neck, even if we have to do the work ourselves," was his contribution.

It was pointed out that every recommendation which the Win-the-War League had made to Ottawa up to now had been acted upon, and he felt that anything drastic should be deferred until the League had tried its hand, but the soldiers' delegates retorted that "they were tired of talking and writing, and the time had come to do something real."

#### NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The business upon the agenda for last night's meeting of the City Council promised a short session, but the natural loquacity of the councillors made it otherwise. First of all, there was a letter from Mr. E. H. Shockley asking permission to purchase or borrow from the city's stocks some six planks of 3 x 12 lumber in order to complete a fishing boat, other lumber on order not having arrived. It was proposed that this be left in the hands of the mayor with power to act. Before voting, Ald. Dybhavn intimated that he would like to see the same treatment given to such requests all round. A similar request had been made of the city engineer during the mayor's absence, and had been turned down.

Then came the resignation of Mr. L. Porter, sanitary inspector, and driver of the city auto truck. As Mr. Porter had no holidays for the past four years, he asked for two weeks wages in lieu, which was referred to the health committee.

A communication from the Board of Trade Commissioner, Mr. E. H. Mortimer, enclosing a government leaflet advocating having a "Rat field day" for the extermination of this pest. This was referred to the Board of Health to take whatever action they considered necessary.

A resolution sponsored by Ald. McRae and Kirkpatrick followed regarding the censorship of moving pictures, which it was considered, was not sufficiently par-

**THE SUPERCILIOUS GLANCE**

It is on record that an American observer who had been privileged to see that wonderful collection of troops from India the Dominions and the British Isles that held the line in Flanders, alluded to it as "your Imperial Circus." How much more wonderful would the scene appear to that same American if he were transported to the Tigris front, for there is found a medley of all races, Eastern and Western, and one can see the primitive transport methods of the days of Sennacherib side by side with the wonders of modern mechanical transport.

The stubborn East yields but slowly to the assault of Western methods. Climate, geographical conditions and centuries of tradition are all hostile to innovations, but the British army is adaptable and expert at turning all available natural resources to its aid. Where heavy motor lorries cannot pass grotesque processions of laden camels can make way, where camels are balked by rocky ground nimble caulkades of basket-laden donkeys can climb. Wherever the troops may be, the transport authorities contrive some methods of maintaining their service of supplies.

River transport is less romantic. The loads go aboard a shallow draught steamer, or are stowed in native boats, "bellum," which are towed behind the steamers. The progress is slow, the scenery uninteresting, and the heat intense, but such are the vagaries of the Mesopotamian rivers that the state of the stream is ever changing. New sand banks form where deep water was the day before, so groundings and the slow process of refloating, going astern and finding the right channel are frequent. Only the swift hospital launches have the right of way of the river; all other craft must submit to the commands of the various landing points where details have to be embarked or disembarked, stores landed or documents filled in. The whole business of trans-

port is no easy task, for the same loads and styles of packing will not suit the light gauge railway, the lorries and the camels or mules. Besides, nothing ever suits a camel or a camel driver, but the transport service is old and wise in experience of Indian and Egyptian campaigns. What each of these beasts will carry is laid down (a tradition in the old, old books of the British army) there is much talk, and in the end, the convoys move off across the deserts laden as they were in the days of Mahdism and Omdurman.

In Bagdad today, all kinds of transport rub shoulders in the narrow ways. Aeroplanes buzz overhead and little engines puff out along the railroad line. The West has brought new methods to the East, but still the Westerns cannot do without the older ways, and there is reason for the supercilious glance the camel casts upon the new machines.

**JUSTICE**

The Germans, trying to justify their wide ambitions, proclaim that they, as the highest race in the world, can understand the spirit of all other races. It is at least certain that they succeed in getting themselves heartily disliked by all the peoples, civilized or uncivilized, with whom they come in contact, and it is probable that their desire to impose German kultur wherever they can reach, is the chief secret of their failure to win confidence. The British, on the other hand, in dealing with the widest and most varied Empire that the world has ever seen have learned that Imperial Justice must interpret impartially all the laws and customs of the peoples subject to it. In Imperial Rome there was an appeal to Caesar from any part of the Empire; in the British Empire there is a similar power of appeal from local administration of justice to the King in Council. These appeals to the Crown and the laws applicable to them affect vast multitudes of people. They are de-

termined not only by English law as modified by local administration, but French law in Quebec and Mauritius, Dutch law in South Africa, Roman law, Canon law and civil laws, Hindu law of various schools, Mahomedan law, Buddhist law, and a multitude of laws and customs of various tribes and peoples that are to be found in no text-books.

German kultur, however, on the other hand, has to be imposed impartially upon all the territory subject to the German rule. What it has done for the subject races, however, is sufficient to prove its incompetence so far as mere justice is concerned. Based upon the fear of the German mailed fist, kultur, as expounded by modern Germany cannot be a thing that will last. The only justice it knows is that which will tend for the material welfare, not of the races it comes into contact with, but of Germany. It has no respect for either the laws nor the customs of the peoples in its territories, other than this and therein lies the root of the failure of Germany as a colonizing power.

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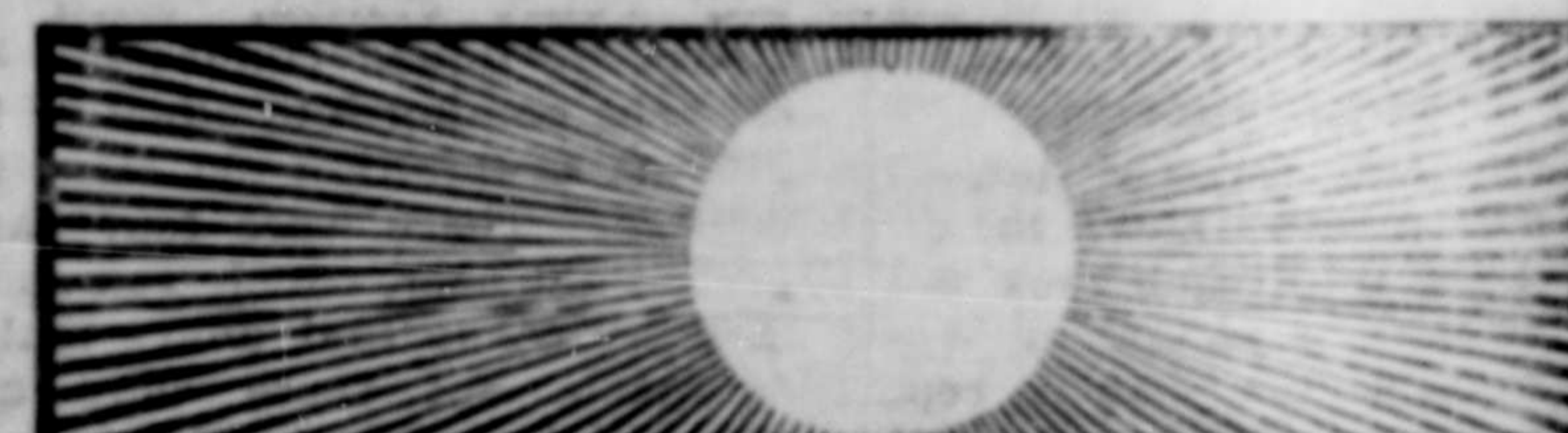

### FIGHTING IN THE FAR HIMALAYAS

London, April 6.—The forces in the Punjab, India, are successfully carrying punitive operations against the Marri tribesmen, who have been driven back into the hills, and now are carrying out only raiding exploits, says a communication issued by the India Office. The communication follows:

"Punitive operations against the Marris continue satisfactorily. With the advance of our troops in the Marri country, the Marris have retired further into the hills. They are offering no organized resistance, but are confining themselves to their traditional tactics of sending out isolated raiding parties to harry defenceless villages, loot bunnia (Hindu merchant shops) and lift camels and cattle.

"The most serious of their raids was an attack on a goods train near Babar Kach, in which one European and six Indians were killed and three Indians wounded. Under the gradual pressure of our troops, however, the tribes have begun to show distinct signs of contemplating surrender. Practically all sections of the Khotran tribe already have tendered their unconditional submission through their chief."

### \$30,000,000 WORTH OF LIQUOR IN ONTARIO

Toronto, April 8.—There is considerable agitation over the situation in which distillers and export warehousemen find themselves as a result of the "bone-dry" law. The statement has been made that there is about \$30,000,000 worth of liquor in Ontario, \$5,000,000 of which is held by the warehouses and the balance by the distilleries.

As there is no outlet for these goods now in warehouse, except that of returning them to the distilleries where they could be converted into alcohol for munitions purposes, the proposal is that the government take over the supply.

It was stated today by the Ontario license board that the new regulations covering native wines would prohibit advertising in the newspapers and solicitation by travellers.

ticular to prevent the demoralization of the young. His worship intimated that objection on this score was general, and would probably be brought to the notice of the provincial government.

In the interest of increased food production, and as the city was the owner of a stump puller, it was proposed that this weapon be utilized systematically in pulling all the citizens' stumps on their lots, on application being made, so that the ground thus cleared may be planted; the actual cost to be charged to the applicants. Ald. Casey was the chief objector to this, as the leisured classes, whoever they might be, might be benefitted somewhat as against the working class. It was a queer objection, but anyway the proposal was left over for a week.

After the telephone bylaw was

finally reconsidered, and the question of meter rents and light and power rates bylaw was discussed in committee. Ald. Casey's curiosity got the better of him again, and he had to ask the mayor for his report on his visit south, which his worship was going to do anyway. That led to the discussion of many things, such as the taxation of government property, Cow Bay, clubs, and waterfront for the city, which being one of Ald. McRae's pet projects, enabled him to get in a poke at the Minister of Lands. Ald. Casey had a jab, too, at the city solicitor, whom he called the "technical legal head" of the city, and it's the way such things are said that counts. So after these little pleasantries, the meeting adjourned.

## Military Service Act

### Important Announcement to All EXEMPTED MEN and to the Public Generally

**I**N dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1 under the Military Service Act, it has occurred, as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption whose proper place is in the Army.

It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting. To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places.

### Exemptions Granted on False Grounds

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded.

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Military Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted men. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

### Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in their own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to keep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

### Citizens Urged to Assist

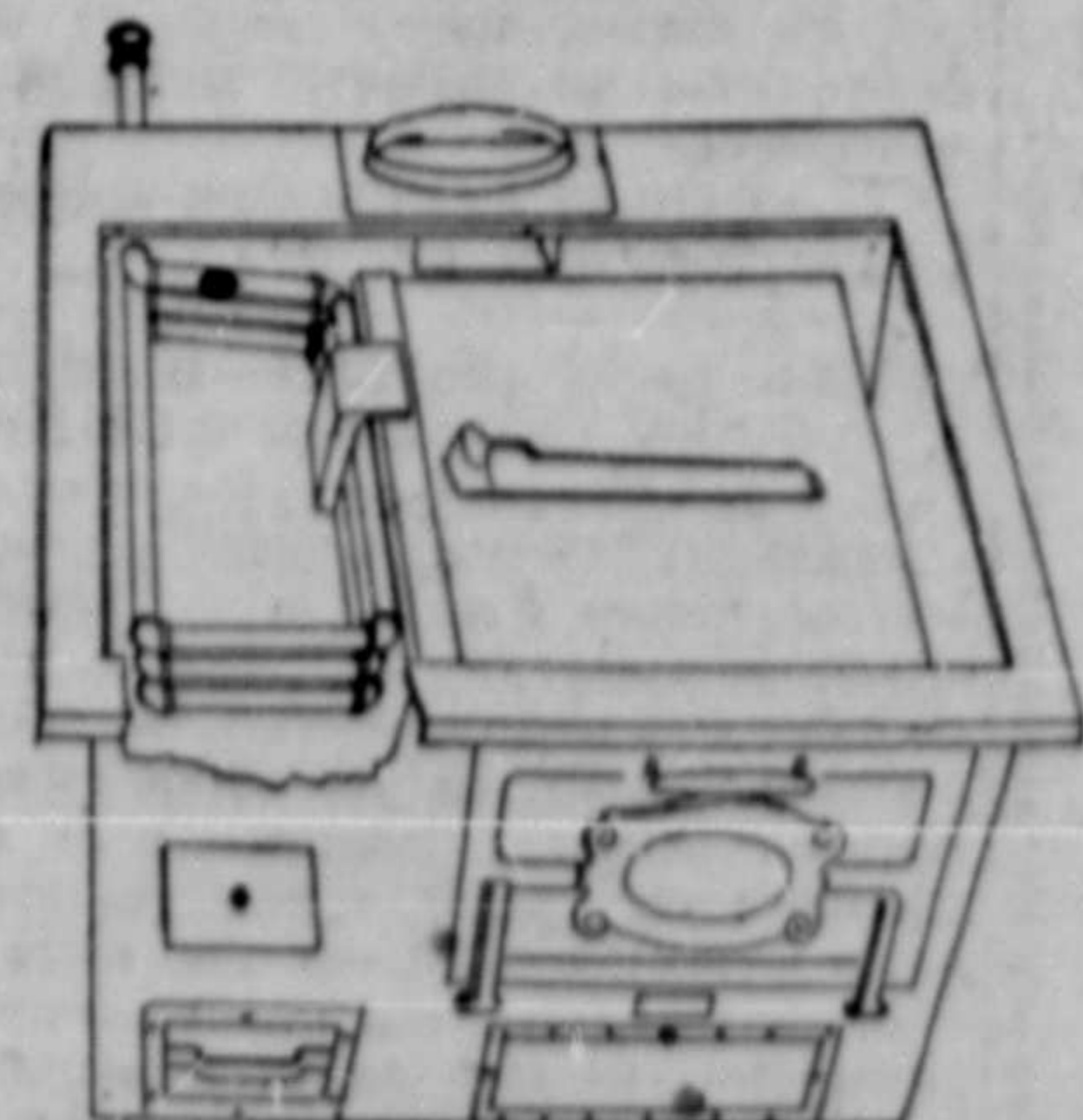
In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country, but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.
