## HUNS LAUNCH ATTACK NORTH OF ARRAS

### STIFF FIGHTING ON ELEVEN-MILE FRONT--NO MORE WOODEN SHIPS TO BE BUILT

#### GERMANS START ANOTHER OFFENSIVE NORTH OF ARRAS

SOME GROUND GAINED IN INITIAL ATTACK IN ATTEMPT TO WIDEN SALIENT DRIVEN INTO ALLIES' LINES--FIGHTING STILL IN PROGRESS--FRENCH SUCCESSFUL IN REPULSING HUN ATTACKS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
War Correspondents' Headquarters in France, April 10.—Sunday night and Monday the enemy's guns were firing heavily along parts of our line, and this morning south of the Somme this bombardment continued. It is almost beyond doubt preparatory to another phase of the German offensive, in which they may again attempt to drive a wedge between the British and French. They have still large concentrations of troops north and south of the river and as the days pass they are bringing more guns into position. It is quite possible they will make another attempt to turn our defences around Arras, while at the same time striking hard at Amiens, hoping by success south of the Somme to make our positions untenable from Albert, above the valley of the Ancre.

**North of Arras.**  
With the British Armies in France, April 10.—The Germans today delivered a heavy attack against the British on an eleven-mile front between Givenisny and Labasse and northeastward to Fleurbaix near Armentieres. The enemy apparently gained a foothold in some of the advanced positions.

**Enemy Gains.**  
London, April 10.—In their new attack on the British lines between Labasse and Armentieres the Germans today gained ground in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle, Fouquison and Carboneux Farm.

**French Repulse Attacks.**  
Paris, April 10.—North of Arras the enemy artillery violently shelled our positions at several places in the region of Haazard. In Sauterre our fire prevented a German attack from approaching from his lines. We repulsed an enemy attempt west of Noyon in the sector of Rearment.

**Berlin Claims.**  
Berlin, April 10.—North of Labasse Canal we penetrated into the English and Portuguese positions. Attacking from the north and east German troops today climbed the steep slopes on the heights east of Coucy Lechatteau and captured by storm strongly fortified enemy positions. Query and Londricourt were taken and Coucy Lechatteau fell early this morning.

#### SUCCESSFUL BRITISH ACTION IN PALESTINE

London, April 9.—An official statement, issued at the War Office, regarding British operations in Palestine, says:  
"Our raiding operations east of the Jordan, directed against the Hedjaz Railway, were successfully accomplished, and our troops commenced their retirement toward Es-Salt. Several miles of the railway track, with culverts and an important bridge, were effectively demolished.  
"The enemy offered stubborn resistance in prepared positions in and about the village of Amman, in which direction our attack was not pressed, and a small Turkish force which attacked our rear guard April 4 was easily repulsed.  
"In the course of operations east of the Jordan between March 25 and April 1, seven hundred prisoners were taken by us and also four guns, several machine guns and a number of motor lorries.  
"West of the Jordan encounters have taken place east of the Tel Keramramleh Railway, in the vicinity of Shunet, Nafukh and Khan el Haramiyeh."

**SAYS GLORIOUS HOPES ARE NOW PERMISSIBLE**  
Paris, April 9.—"We can henceforward regard the future with tranquility," was the confident statement General Foch made to Rene Renoult, President of the Army Committee, who accompanied Premier Clemenceau to the front day before yesterday.  
General Foch even went farther according to Renoult, and asserted that as things now stand the most glorious hopes are permissible.  
Premier Clemenceau also expresses himself as completely satisfied with the prospect and this feeling is everywhere here. Critics agree in regarding the present pause in the battle as merely the lull before the coming storm.

General Dumas, commanding the French armies in the north, has signed the following proclamation in Amiens:  
"The dangers which have been announced to you do not threaten you for the moment. The military authorities give you that assurance. You see them in your midst. Warning will be given in case of peril. Keep confidence in France's hour."

**LOCATION OF LONG RANGE GUN IS DISCOVERED**  
(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, April 10.—The German long-range gun which has been located in Crepy-En-Laonnois, it was announced here today. French artillery and aviators are bombarding it continuously.

#### LABOR REQUESTS ENQUIRY INTO DRYDOCK AFFAIRS

Last night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council was one of the most interesting and besides dealing with matters of civic importance, also dealt with the matter of the idle drydock and the prejudice evinced against it in certain quarters, even unto the sending of His Majesty's ships to a foreign port, which is a matter of Dominion-wide importance.

The allegation made by Sir Robert Borden that it was because of the high rate of wages prevailing at Prince Rupert which was at the bottom of the sending of the cruiser to Seattle was bitterly resented by the labor unions here, and with very good reason, too, as such is not the case. It is the other way about, because the scale here is, if anything, under the rate prevailing in the south. A committee consisting of Messrs. R. J. T. Rose, W. E. Thompson, and J. Hammond was appointed last evening to wait upon the city council to request them to ask the federal government for a proper explanation of the statement of the premier's, and also an enquiry into the manner in which the costs against Prince Rupert drydock were piled

up, upon the last occasion. The labor unions here deny absolutely that the high rate of wages is any reason for the ship not coming here, and they are convinced that a studied and deliberate attempt is being made to further prejudice this port in this matter. On the last occasion one of H. M. ships visited here, Prince Rupert had machinists walking the streets idle, while other men were imported from Victoria, and in addition to their wages, were paid a bonus, along with living expenses of \$2.50 per day. Unnecessary overtime was common, and in one instance a janitor pulled down \$16 per day.

The Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council feel that they have been maligned by the statement issued by Sir Robert Borden, which would wrongly lead to the belief that Prince Rupert was a very costly place for labor compared with other ports, and they wish to have labor cleared from any such aspersions.

Aldermen Kirkpatrick, Barrie and Casey, the three nominees of the Council, were in attendance at last evening's meeting and several matters of civic importance were discussed at some length, of which more will be heard later.

#### W. F. O'CONNOR RESIGNS THROUGH INTERFERENCE

Ottawa, April 9.—It was learned here that W. F. O'Connor, cost of living commissioner, resigned his position because there were interferences with his control of the staff.

Mr. O'Connor's resignation was preceded by that of the deputy, J. O. Inlay, and the former's resignation was in support of Mr. Inlay's action with respect to a matter of administration of the duties of the commissioner's office. It is stated that Mr. O'Connor's views in support of Mr. Inlay being overborne by the minister, Mr. O'Connor felt that he could do nothing else but resign. It is stated that on his appointment as cost of living commissioner, Mr. O'Connor stipulated, and it was agreed that he should have full control of administration.

#### A SCRATCH ARMY FILLED THE GAP

London, April 9.—Remarkable incidents connected with the prolonged battle on the western front are becoming known. One of the most dramatic was an audacious and successful effort of a scratch battalion in closing a gap in the British line.

Major-Gen. Sandoman Carey, seeing this gap suddenly open, at once improvised a force to close the breach. It was a miscellaneous body, composed of mechanics, aerial artificers, signallers, machine-gunners, and men of the Labor Corps. For nearly six days this scratch force gallantly held its position on the left of the Fifth Army. The skill of its commander and the tenacity of the men composing it rendered invaluable service in a critical emergency.

#### ALLIES WANT NO GERMAN PEACE, SAYS LLOYD GEORGE

FATE OF PRUSSIANISM DEPENDS UPON PRESENT BATTLE—CRITICAL PERIOD NOW ON—CONSCRIPTION GOES WITH HOME RULE FOR IRELAND, WHICH CAUSES SENSATION IN HOUSE

#### BUILDING OF WOODEN SHIPS TO BE STOPPED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Victoria, April 9.—J. C. McIntosh, M. P., today wired from Ottawa to Hon. John Oliver that the Imperial Navy have advised the Canadian Government that the Admiralty refuses to further convoy wooden ships through the submarine zone because they are too slow. Mr. McIntosh therefore advises Premier Oliver that construction of further wooden vessels in B. C. will be stopped.

#### RED CROSS NOTES

#### RUSSIA MAY DECLARE WAR UPON JAPAN

Moscow, April 9.—Lenine in a speech here today, said that possibly Russia would have to declare war on Japan in connection with the landing of Japanese troops at Vladivostok.

London, April 10.—"As long as we have a ship afloat we will not accept a German peace," declared Premier Lloyd George in the British House of Commons. "If we win the present battle, the doom of Prussianism is sealed. We have now entered the most critical part of the war. There is a lull in the storm, but the hurricane is not yet over. The fate of the Empire, of Europe, and of liberty may depend upon the success with which the last German attack is resisted and countered. The enemy was seeking a decision this year, regardless of consequences. Having gained an initial success, he was preparing a greater attack, and it would be a fatal error to underestimate the gravity of the outlook."

#### The Final Call.

Leave to introduce the Man-Power Bill was carried in the House by a majority of 299 to 80, when Premier Lloyd George announced that the provisions of the bill would extend to Ireland. A final call was made by the Premier in a characteristic speech. The whole man-power of the Empire was required to win the war, and the decisive battle was now on.

This unexpected disclosure by the Premier caused a sensation in the House, and hostile comment from the Irish benches forecasted trouble to come. John Dillon denounced conscription as applied to Ireland, and said that the Irish convention had been a failure and that the constructive work must be done by the Cabinet.

**SELF RELIANCE**

In a recent interview with the Minister of Lands, which we published the other day, the Hon. T. D. Pattullo is reported as pointing out to the people of the southern part of the province that "whatever helps one portion of British Columbia helps the rest of the province, and at this time, when Prince Rupert has a magnificent drydock ready for operation, the more thickly populated cities of the south should lend a hand to help the northern part."

There is no doubt that were the criminal scandal of the idleness of Prince Rupert's plant voiced by the collective voice of this province, the sound thereof might travel much further than the lone voice of this city itself. But it looks as if there is still some that very interesting period when the lower coast cities begin to take a big brotherly interest in the progress of this city.

Any progress achieved by the city of Prince Rupert in the past has been in spite of, not because of the interest taken in its development by the larger and older established towns to the south. There is no doubt that the vision of the dweller of the large cities becomes circumscribed, and chiefly by their own boundaries at that. If there is anything coming to British Columbia, Vancouver wants it, and Victoria is jealous if she doesn't get it, never thinking for a minute whether Prince Rupert needs it worse than either of them. That was the condition of affairs with the shipbuilding contracts which came to this province. With this industry in progress at this port, it must of necessity react to the advantage of the other large cities. Prince Rupert at present is dependent upon the south for the greater part of her supplies, although how long this state of affairs may continue is another matter, and the busier Prince Rupert is, so much busier are the other large centres as well.

The warning uttered by the

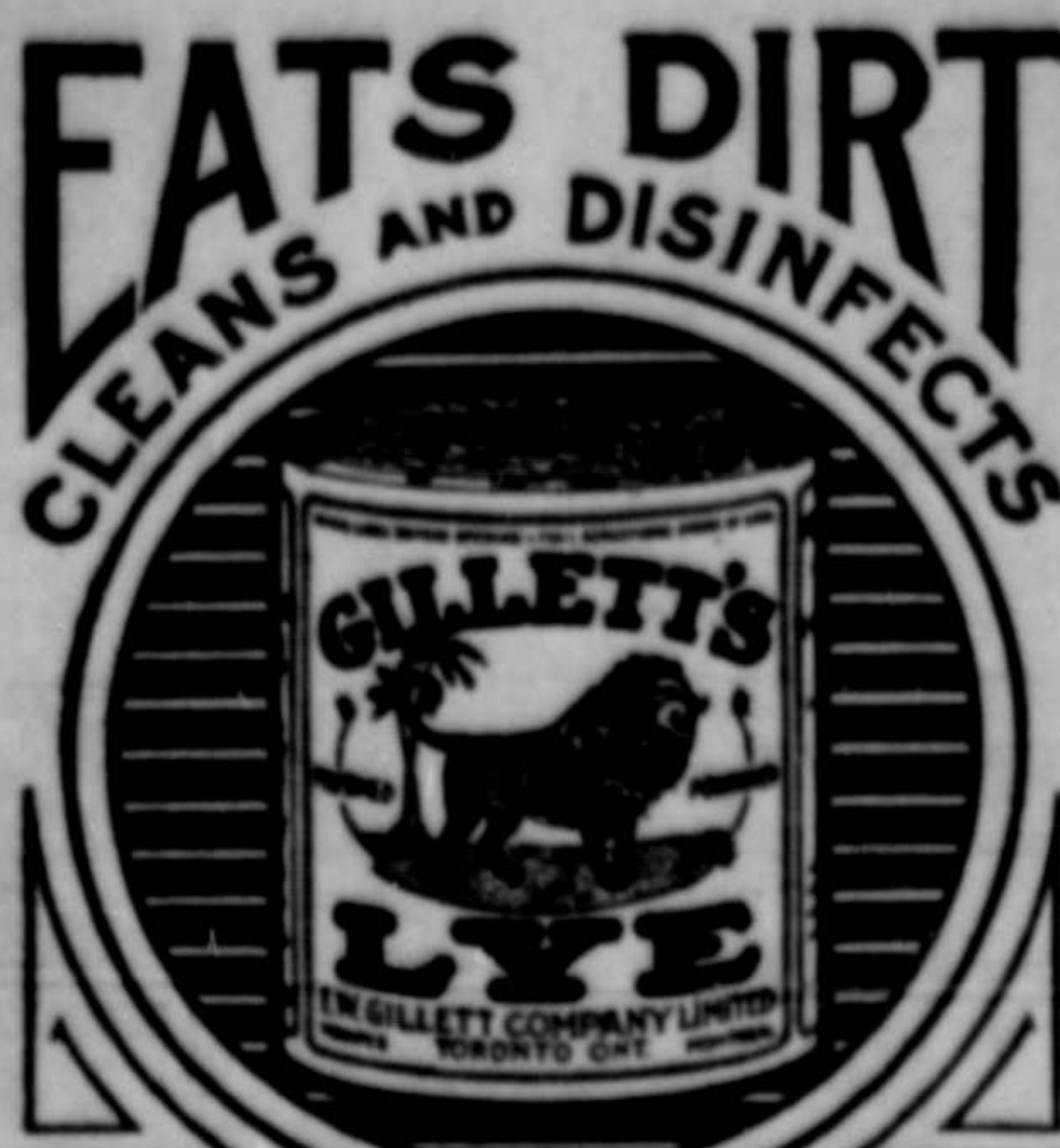
minister that the people of the north may eventually look to the east with the business hitherto done in the south is one which might well be taken to heart in the southern latitudes, as there may be more behind the words of the Hon. T. D. Pattullo than seems apparent at the present time.

**CRUEL REALITIES**

The absolute control of the situation by the allies which will result at the conclusion of hostilities is the cruelest of the stern realities which the Germans and their allies have to face. All over the world for a year or two the stringent conditions brought about by these four years of warfare are not going to let up in the slightest, until the supplies of food and other essentials becomes nearer to the normal. Such supplies as there are are going to be under the control of the allies through their command of the world's shipping.

Germany before the war imported some thirty per cent of her foodstuffs from overseas, and as an industrial country had also to import all her supplies of rubber, copper, cotton, lubricants, etc. These commodities, as well as the supplies of food will be as urgently required in the allied countries, and it stands to reason that they will see to it that their own countries are supplied first. Preference must of necessity be given to the countries of the allies, and this discrimination will be exercised as an economic factor, apart altogether from any matter of vindictiveness against the late enemy.

The soil of Germany is already exhausted through the lack of fertilizer. Her herds and flocks are depleted through the scarcity of fodder, and to make these good, importation of a large quantity of fertilizer will be necessary, and her replacements of livestock must come at the same time from overseas. With similar conditions existing in the countries of the allies, the state of Germany for years after the war will continue to be that of

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extreme poverty. There is nothing else for it, and the German people have only themselves to blame for this state of affairs.

The prospect for Germany for many years to come, with her shipping driven off the seas, her overseas markets gone, and lacking the wherewithal to supply the needs of even her own people, is not one to encourage her rulers, even at this present time. Already discredited in the eyes of the outside world, and with her armies beaten in the field, discredited among her own people, the government of Germany is in for a bad time. The prospect ahead is one that may well give Kaiser Wilhelm cause for wishing that he were someone else.

**CLASS ONE "B" MEN TO BE CALLED BY MAIL**

Ottawa, April 6.—Medical category "B" men under the Military Service Act will receive their notices to report for service by registered mail. In each case, the notice will come from the registrar of the military district in which the man resides.

As the men come within the scope of the proclamation calling out the first class under the act, it is pointed out, there is no necessity for a further proclamation.

### GERMAN CHANCELLOR SPEAKS OF THE GREAT MISERY STILL TO COME

Amsterdam, April 6.—Dr. Georg Michaelis, former imperial chancellor, on leaving to assume his post of president of Pomerania, made an address at Berlin. He said:

"If I were ever responsible again for the government I would decline to ask a war indemnity. Rather than see our people throw itself into the abyss of materialism, which would be the case if our war expenditures were defrayed by our enemies, we must teach our people to become simple, sober and economical.

"Our time of trial will not end with the termination of the war. Our misery will continue. We must bear it without murmuring. Poverty will be our cook. We must admit we, too, are guilty for this war, not in a political sense, for the emperor tried to maintain peace to the last minute, but circumstances have brought us trials which threaten to make money the master of the day. We must save the country from a surrender to materialism."

### THE MIGHTIEST EFFORT OF THE WHOLE WAR

Washington, April 6.—Renewal of the German assaults against the British and French lines in Picardy today indicated to military observers here that the Germans, having gathered strength during the lull of the last few days, might now be ready to launch their greatest effort. Some officers think the allied commanders realize that only the first phase of the gigantic battle has passed and that this probably accounts for the fact that no extensive counter movement has been undertaken as yet. It is pointed out that the previous record of the German high command argues against any possibility that it would be content with the minor strategic advantages already gained by their costly enterprise, or with the abandonment of its plans without further attempts to force apart the French and British armies. The battle of Verdun continued for months before the Germans admitted that their object was unattainable.

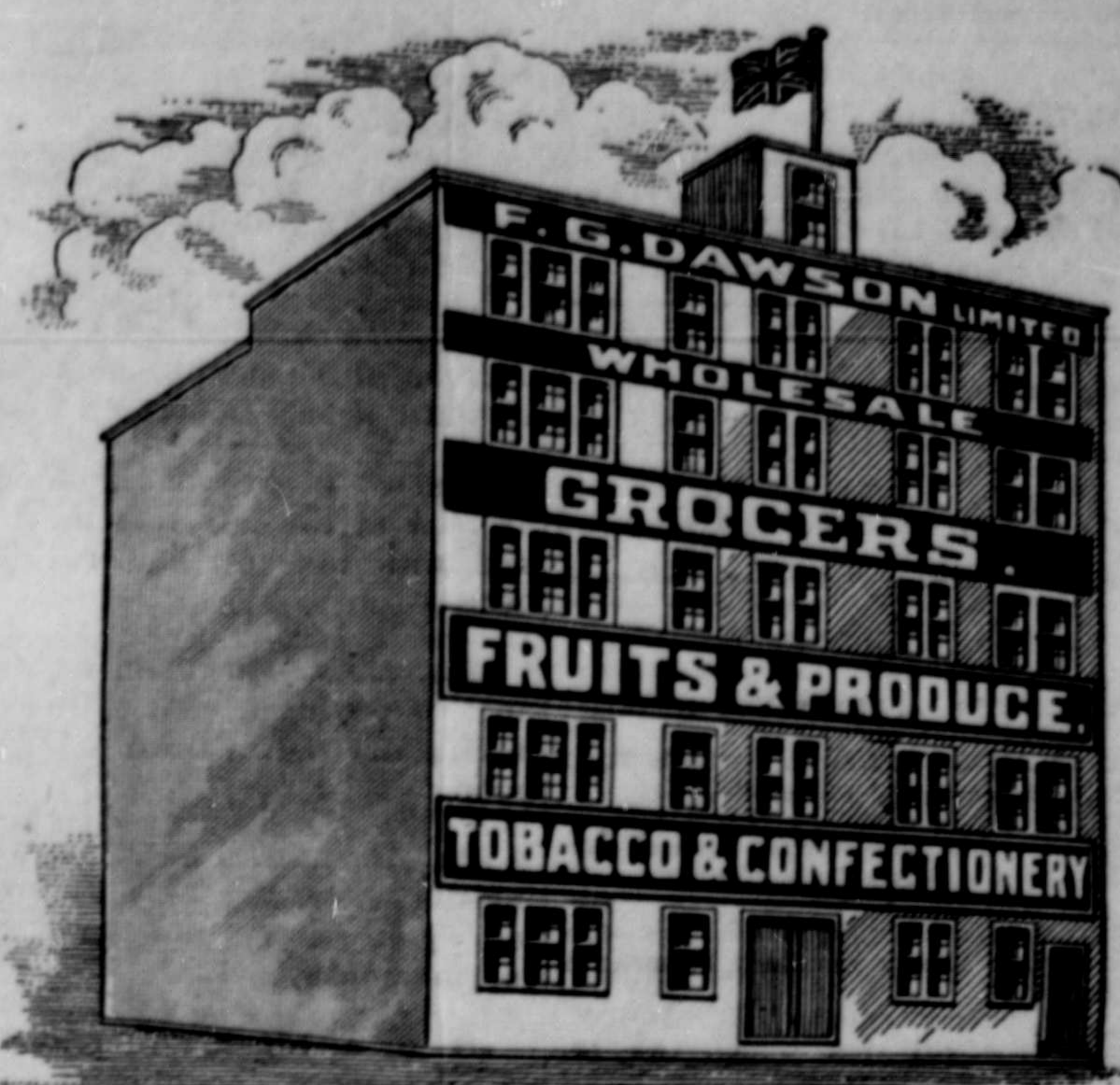

## Military Service Act

### Important Announcement to All EXEMPTED MEN and to the Public Generally

**I**N dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1 under the Military Service Act, it has occurred, as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption whose proper place is in the Army.

It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting. To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places.

### Exemptions Granted on False Grounds

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded.

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Military Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted men. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

### Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in their own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to keep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

### Citizens Urged to Assist

In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country, but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.

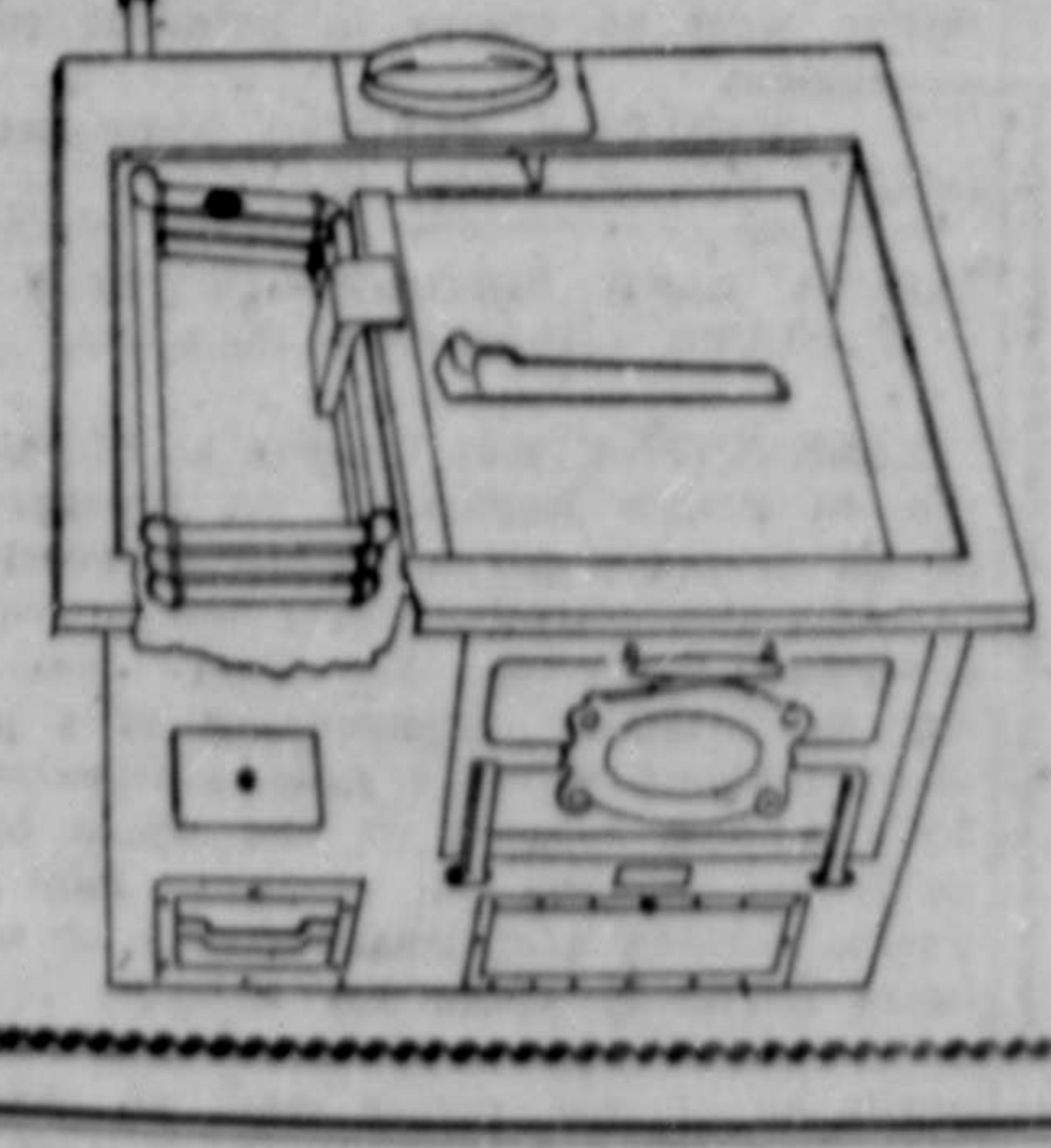
