## ALLIES AWAIT FURTHER HUN ONSLAUGHT

### SUSPENSION OF BATTLE MEANTIME -- MINOR OPERATIONS -- BIG BRITISH BUDGET

#### FURTHER ATTACKS EXPECTED BY GERMANS IN FLANDERS

POSITION OF ENEMY IS SUCH THAT FOR HIS OWN SAFETY HE MUST CONTINUE HIS ATTEMPTS—LULL IN FIGHTING MEANTIME—BOTH BRITISH AND FRENCH REPULSE LOCAL ATTACKS

(Special to The Daily News)  
Washington, April 23.—The enormous sacrifices made by Germany on the western front have been absolutely barren of results, says the War Department's weekly review of the military situation today, but should the present drive to the Channel ports fail, the strategists of the United States look for the enemy "to undertake a further, and even more powerful thrust." The German attack in the northern salient cannot be viewed as the final, nor even the most determined onslaught of the enemy.

**Suspension Only.**  
Paris, April 23.—The forty-eight-hour lull in the struggle along the Anglo-French fronts probably marks the suspension, rather than the end of the battle of Lys. The Germans must reconstitute their shattered divisions after their bloody defeat by the British before Mount Kemmel and St. Venant on the Givenchy front, but they have engaged themselves too deeply in the salient north of the La Bassée Canal not to continue in their attempts.

**Attacks Repulsed.**  
London, April 23.—A strong local attack by the Germans on the front north of Albert was repulsed after the enemy had captured one of the British advanced posts. The British advanced their lines slightly last night in local operations on both the principal battle fronts. Raids east of the Aisne river and near Rheims were repulsed by the French troops.

**British Capture Prisoners.**  
London, April 23.—The British troops have repulsed hostile raiding parties in the vicinity of Hamlet. North west of Festubert, the Germans under cover of a heavy bombardment captured one of the British advanced positions. In the Robecq sector, the British line was extended slightly, and some prisoners were captured. North and south of Lens, different points were also raided, when many prisoners and machine guns were captured.

#### IRISH LABOR PROTESTS AGAINST CONSCRIPTION

Dublin, Ireland, April 23.—The Labor men of Dublin will quit work today. A walkout is called for by the Trades Unions as a protest against the introduction of conscription to Ireland.

#### A RIFLE RANGE FOR THE CADETS

One of the important things for this country, and particularly for a community living on the fringe of things as the citizens of Prince Rupert are, was brought to the attention of the city council last evening by Principal Brady of the High School last evening, when he made a request to them for assistance. That is for the adequate teaching of the young idea how to shoot. One of the reasons of the existence of the Empire as it is today is that prominent characteristic of its citizens to be able to sit tight and shoot straight. And in a frontier country this is all the more important.

There has been some little difficulty in arranging for a suitable location for a miniature rifle range, but in the Exhibition building, this problem has been solved. The military authorities in Victoria have written several times to Principal Brady regarding this matter, and this year the Prince Rupert Cadet Corps have been asked to send teams to compete in the provincial "Wappinshaw" to use a good old Anglo-Saxon word. As fine training for the boys, Mr. Brady emphasized the importance of making them patient, watchful and careful, and for the training of the observation, rifle shooting was an admirable means. In addition the boys would receive first hand knowledge in the careful manipulation of firearms, for the preservation of their own lives and of those of others. Although the nation was at war, the military aspect of this training was of secondary importance. Such can be safely left to the military authorities. The training of the boys in the habits of carefulness would remain with them throughout their lives.

It is to be hoped that the City Council, as a quid pro quo, will obtain from the Cadets the use of the rifle range for one night a week. They might want a little practice themselves, and it is just possible that there are many citizens who feel the same way.

#### BUDGET INTRODUCED IN GREAT BRITAIN

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, April 23.—Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, introducing the budget in the House of Commons, announced that in the last year Great Britain had advanced £50,000,000 to its allies and the United States had advanced one billion pounds to the entente nations. "It is only necessary for us," he said, "to lean on the United States to the amount the other Allies lean on us. In other words, we are self-supporting."

The gross national debt at the end of the last year was £5,000,000,000, the Chancellor said. He proposed new taxation running well over sixty per cent. of the pre-war taxable revenue.

This budget presented by the Chancellor has the distinction of being the largest one ever presented to any parliament in the history of the whole world. Its total amount reached the stupendous figure of \$14,860,000,000. Of this amount about \$4,210,250,000 will be raised by taxation, and the remainder will be borrowed. The income tax, stamp duties, and the levies imposed upon spirits, beer and tobacco are to be raised, while a new tax will be imposed upon luxuries.

#### BRITISH PROGRESS IN THE DYE INDUSTRY

London, April 23.—Great Britain has been making great progress with the development of the dye industry, which before the war was entirely in the hands of Germans. British firms manufacturing dyes with the assistance of their clever chemists, promise to take up fully the dominating position in this industry formerly held by the enemy country. Great dye works are being built at Huddersfield.

#### BISHOP OF LONDON IS FOR CONSCRIPTION

London, April 23.—The Bishop of London has publicly announced himself a conscriptionist. He has intimated that the calling up notifications have been sent to all the clergy of the London diocese. Under the new act, the principle requiring observance is that one priest should be left for each parish.

#### NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

There was a quiet little meeting of the City Council last evening, when a lot of small detail work was got through. There was no real what might be called major operations. A petition was presented to the council for signature requesting that the government take action in having the \$100 fine imposed upon Captain Gillan for taking passengers to Graham Island without a passenger licence, remitted. The full details of the affair were presented, and if ever officialdom ran wild, and needed to be curbed strongly, it was shown up by the particulars given to the city council last evening. The mayor and city clerk will sign this petition along side of the seal of the city.

Principal J. C. Brady of the High School was graciously permitted to address the council, and his talk proved to be a request for help in the matter of lighting of the Exhibition Building, where the Cadets will drill. Mr. Brady is also hopeful of having a miniature rifle range installed there, which will be most satisfactory.

Whether the Sons of Canada should be given the power to exclude any citizen from the recreation ground on Dominion Day was thrashed out in detail. This society requested that they be given permission to use the people's park on that occasion when in conjunction with the other societies in town, they would arrange for a programme of sports. The question arose, were they going to charge an admission fee? If so, would this be charged for all day, or for part of the day, and for which part of the day.

Ald. Kirkpatrick was strongly against the citizens being excluded from the recreation ground by means of an admission fee, the more especially on the midsummer holiday, when the grounds might be used the most. Alderman Dybhavn pointed out that other societies received the same permission, so why not the Sons of Canada? There ought to be no discrimination. No permission was given, however, until the council hear just how the Sons of Canada Society intend to conduct their operations that day.

Then the city solicitor's report came up regarding Cow Bay, which brought forth questions from Ald. Casey regarding the intentions of his worship the mayor regarding waterfront for the city. He wondered what the city was going to get for the closing up of Cow Bay.

Winnipeg, April 20.—As a result of the huge grain acreage in the West, and favorable seeding conditions, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway today contracted for 50,000 grain doors, delivery to be completed September 1st. The Northwest Lumber Company of Edmonton handles the contract, which is said to be the largest single grain door order ever placed. It is made necessary by prospects of heavy grain traffic.

city, although when in Victoria lately, he had received very little encouragement in the matter. Still, he could feel it in his bones that the city would get some waterfront. He had no other authority for making such a statement, except that this idea was his own. The city always having been a third party in regard to Cow Bay, he thought that the present time would be a good one for representations to be made to the government regarding the matter before any decisions were arrived at.

Ald. McRae considered that a matter of ways and means such as this might be better discussed in committee, and moved accordingly. So the committee met in private after the council meeting ended.

This being about all the business, the mayor intimated that he would like the aldermen to be prepared to go out to the lake for the testing of the new machine there. The talk about a trip brought Alderman McMeekin to his feet asking what about that deputation going to Ottawa regarding the iron and steel industry. He had expected that Prince Rupert would be represented upon it, seeing that there was such a large quantity of iron lying around in this district. The mayor explained that on Tuesday of last week he had received word from Vancouver that the deputation from B. C. was leaving there last Thursday. This intimation, of course, did not give any time for a Prince Rupert delegate to be chosen and sent off by the Wednesday morning train, to connect up with the Vancouver party. So Prince Rupert with all its tremendous deposits of iron ore, is not represented on the delegation asking the Ottawa Government for the establishment of the iron and steel industry in this province.

Some other discussion threatened at this moment, which was choked off by the motion to adjourn.

#### PROGRESS DEPENDS UPON INCREASED PASSENGER SERVICE

The handicaps suffered by a comparatively new country like Central British Columbia, where practically all roads are by means of the sea, was brought to the attention of the City Council last evening. Some time ago, a prospecting party had occasion to do some work on their prospects on Graham Island. They brought up their plant and machinery to this port, but found on arrival here that where they wanted to go none of the steamers called, nor could, on account of the coast line. Neither was there a passenger launch available, as the passenger traffic is so spasmodic as not to warrant the taking out of a licence for this purpose. This party chartered the "Monarch," Captain Gillan, to take this material across to Cape Fife in the Queen Charlottes last September, and naturally the plant being no use without men to work it, three or four men had to accompany it, there being no other means of getting them there. The result was that the captain of the vessel was fined \$100 for carrying passengers without a licence, although his boat was chartered for the trip, and he collected no fares for the passengers.

A protest against this state of affairs is being made by this petition for the remittance of the fine imposed upon the captain, as it is considered that in a pioneer port in a pioneer country, some latitude ought to be permitted until conditions are such as to warrant a regular service by passenger boats. There was no question as to the safety of the passengers, nor the seaworthiness of the vessel. It is at all times admitted that the safety of the travelling public has to be regarded and is a first charge upon the powers that be, but there is little doubt as to the staunchness of the halibut fishing craft plying these waters, even if they be not licenced for passengers.

The state of affairs existing between this port and Stewart, and between Anyox and Alice Arm was instanced by Ald. Casey at the council meeting when the matter was under discussion, who considered that if the government is going to live strictly up to the regulations, it is not going to help the development of this district any. Besides retarding the proper development of the country, it makes much inconvenience for the inhabitants, as well as handicapping the merchants already established, greatly.

This is hardly a matter which should be permitted to remain as it is, and the present would seem to be a time when the action of the petitioners in this case ought to be followed up strongly by every association with any corporate voice. The suggestion of the mayor that the government ought to subsidize the kind of vessel they will permit to carry passengers is one that ought not to be lost sight of, as the operation of a vessel of this kind would not pay to operate otherwise.

**BOLSHEVIKI METHODS**

At the risk of the extreme penalty of the law, as promulgated by the Borden Government at Ottawa, we would like to divert attention for a few minutes from the all-important object of winning the war—even although this apparently be an offence—to some of the methods which the Borden Government consider to be necessary in connection therewith. On the 17th day of April a press dispatch was sent out from Ottawa, which has received considerable publicity, and it reads as follows: "New regulations governing the publication of statements, reports or opinions or the verbal expression of opinions which may lend or weaken or detract from the united effort of the people of Canada in the prosecution of the war, were promulgated last night in the form of an order-in-council which received the assent of the governor-general yesterday."

THE PURPOSE OF THE ORDER-IN-COUNCIL IS TO PREVENT CRITICISM of a kind that would divert attention from the object of winning the war. The provisions are made for the seizure, and destruction of presses, plant, machinery or material used in the publication of any matter, which, in the opinion of the Secretary of State, constitutes a hindrance to united action."

Clothed with a little brief authority, the Secretary of State has now got the power to effectively suppress any newspaper which dares to criticise the manner of the Borden Government. There are still one or two newspapers in Canada who have no particular love for Sir Robert Borden, politically, nor his henchmen either. And if they dare to divert attention from the winning of the war to the doings of the Borden Government they will become liable under these extraordinary powers assumed.

Should another J. Wesley Allison arise and attempt to get by with things which he ought not, or another Sir Joseph Flavelle realize eighty

per cent. upon his invested capital in one year, to direct attention to these things might embarrass the government, and might at the same time divert public attention some little from the winning of the war. Or at any rate, the secretary of state might think so, which would be all the same.

The speeches of the opposition members in Parliament, when they get after Sir Robert Borden, as Mr. Cannon did the other day when he told Sir Robert what the reasons were for the rioting in Quebec—by the way, did you read that speech in any of the Unionist newspapers?—these evidently must not be reprinted either. The doings in Parliament except they are in favor of the government must not be criticised. It might divert attention from winning the war.

Now that a Union Government is in power, the people must be kept thinking the same way. Nothing derogatory, no matter how much they may be, to the present administration must be mentioned. The spirit of Lenin and Trotsky would appear to have actuated those who arranged for this iniquitous order-in-council. It is the most reactionary piece of mis-doing that any government has undertaken for a century within the limits of the British Empire.

The free institutions which Britons prided themselves in, throughout the world, are endangered by this piece of business—it is not legislation. Free speech and the freedom of thought are among the things which even the Borden Government cannot kill no matter how many orders-in-council they pass.

Having taken this power, by the secret means of order-in-council, it will behoove the government to be very careful how they permit the Secretary of State to wield it. Otherwise they will have started something which will finish them before they are ready. There are limits to what a government can do, and get by with it, even with such a majority as the present one has.

### ANOTHER RUSSIAN UPRISING EXPECTED

New York, April 19.—Germany has less than six divisions (72,000 men) on the Russian front, according to semi-official reports received here today, while the invading army which captured Helsingfors consisted of about 40,000 troops. The other German forces operating in Russia number less than 100,000 men, it is authoritatively stated.

Since peace was declared between the Bolsheviks and Germany, more than 2,000,000 German and Austrian war prisoners have been released. On the other hand, officials here declare very few of the 2,000,000 Russian prisoners in Germany and Hungary have found their way back to their own country.

Thousands have died in prison camps, more than 4,000 graves being located at Brandenburg alone, while others impressed in Teuton industries, have small chance of being repatriated. The majority who have been allowed to return are totally incapacitated or permanently crippled, dispatches state.

From sources which can not be divulged, Kerensky government officials in this country have recently received reports of the growth of a counter revolutionary movement which threatens Bolshevik power. Only a decisive defeat to the Allies on the western front can prevent a Russian uprising, they declare.

### RAISE \$50,000,000 FOR THE RED CROSS

London, April 20.—The British Red Cross fund has reached £10,000,000. The King has written to the Times, which raised the fund, expressing his congratulations. The letter says in part:

"I am especially proud of the noble generosity displayed by Britons overseas. Nor can I forget the munificence with which the American Red Cross has supported the work of the British Red Cross, cementing still further the ties which unite the two countries."

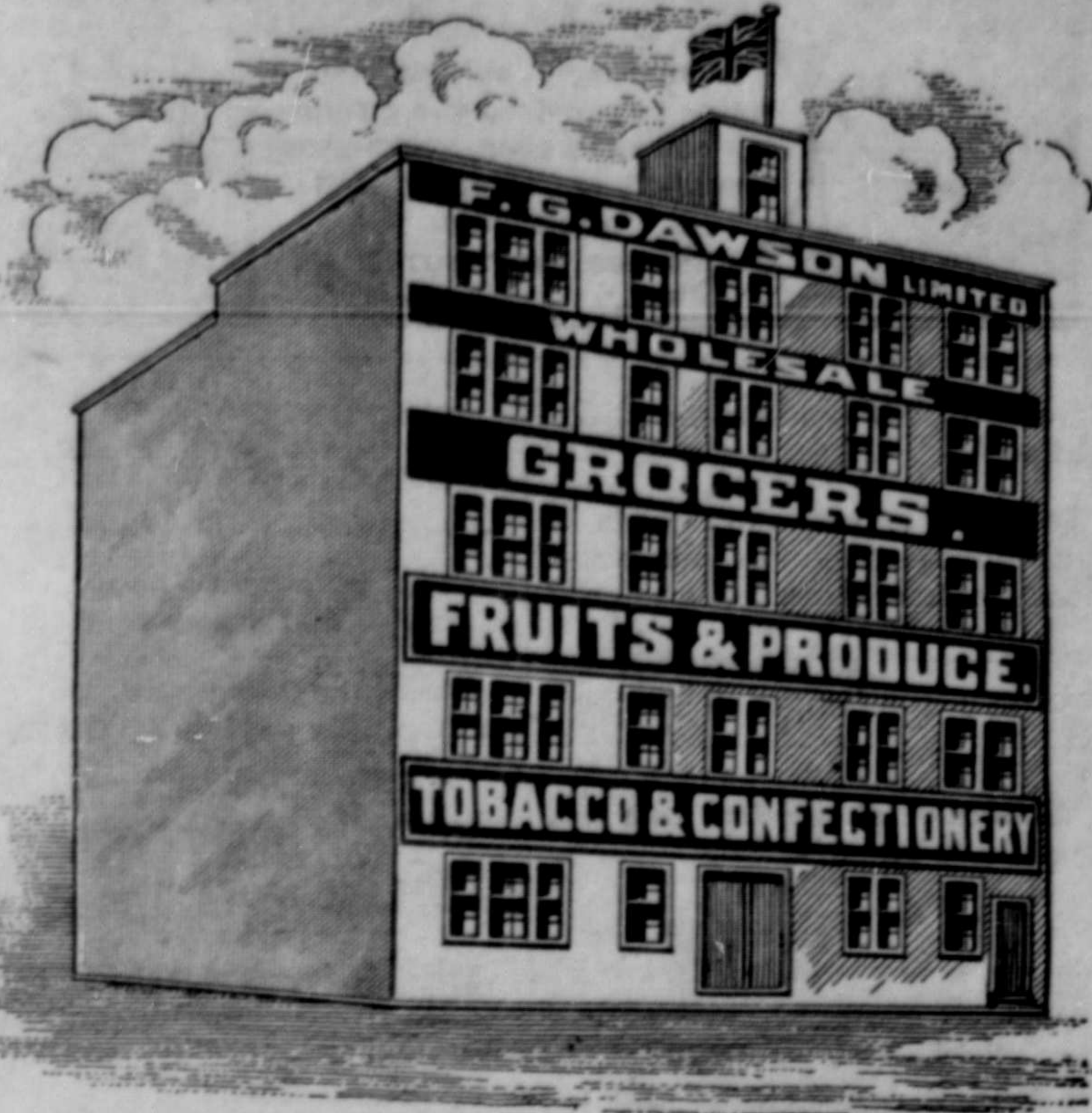

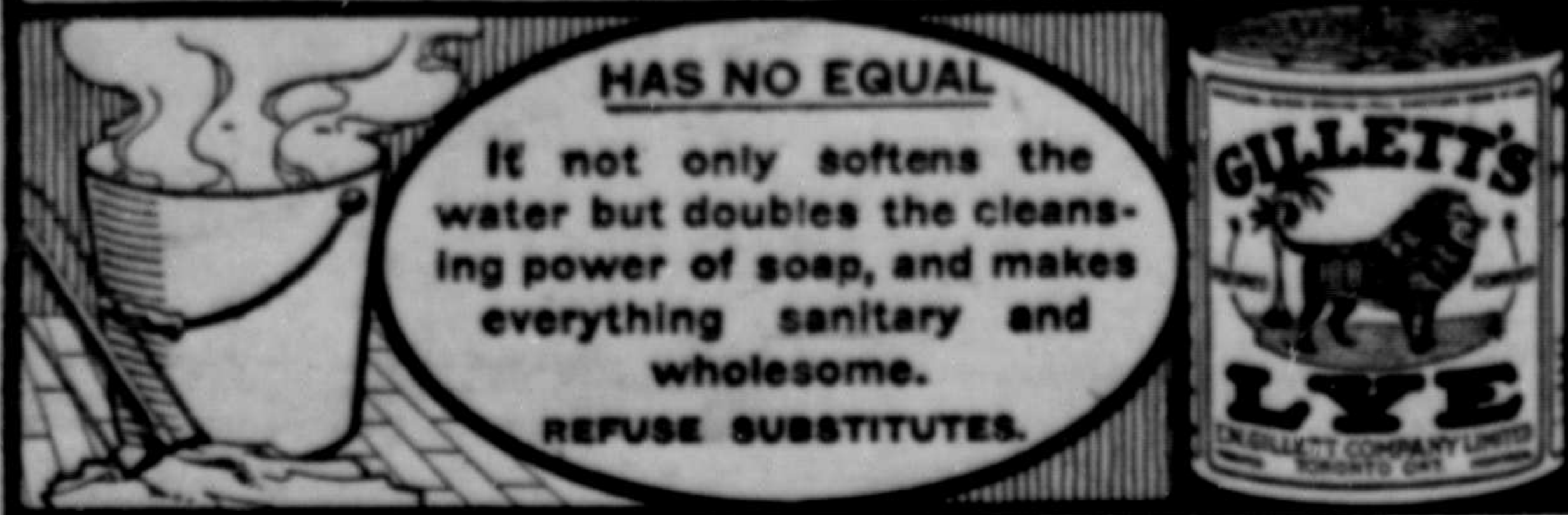

# Grow Your Own Vegetables

**CITY** people this year must help to grow their own food. Every pound of vegetables that can be produced in home gardens or vacant lots will be a positive addition to the supply of food. Moreover the cultivation of land in city, town and village will leave market gardeners and farmers free to grow wheat and other supplies for export.

It may be that the only contribution which you can make towards relieving the dire food needs of our Allies will be a vegetable garden. If 200,000 families in Canada would cultivate a garden of this kind it would mean a very important aggregate addition to our food supply.

In Montreal vegetables to the value of \$100,000 were grown on vacant lots last year. Calgary had over 1,100 lots under cultivation, covering an area of 200 acres. Splendid results were achieved in other cities.

There is even greater necessity for war gardens this year. Tremendous interest in the movement is reported from all parts of the Dominion. Are you a member of a vacant lot organization? If none exists in your community help to organize one.

Home garden and vacant lot cultivation is really needed and may truly be considered a patriotic service.

## Organized Efforts Will Bring Best Results

Decide here and now to have a war garden. Persuade your neighbours to do the same. All the tools necessary are a spade, rake and hoe. The cost of seeds is a trifle. Grow only standard vegetables such as potatoes, beans, peas, beets, carrots, parsnips, onions and lettuce.

By growing your own vegetables you can not only perform a patriotic duty, you can also help to control the high cost of living.
