THE UNIVERSE AT STAKE

Close contact with the Kaiser has unexpected effects. The All Highest is never weary of informing his hungry subjects and his battered legions that he is the most pacific and the least acquisitive of monarchs. and that it was merely a happy accident that when the Entente made their treacherous assault! on his dominions the Fatherland found itself able to employ about twice as many men and three times as much munitions as its assailants.

But we have Dr. Julius Vogel, Almoner to the All Highest. who gives quite a different version of war aims in the Berlin Lokalanzieger. Possibly he has been too busy to read his master's speeches, for this is what he says:

"The object for which this great war is fought is not Alsace-Lorraine, nor Belgium, nor the Freedom of the Seas. nor anything of the kind." These are only tactical objectives; the strategic objective is very wide indeed). "What is being fought for is the mastery of the universe."

The rival combatants are rapidly and roughly defined as follows: "The flaming greed of the hordes of Asia, the faithlessness and bitter revengeful. ness of the Latins; the envious hardness of a mercantile race subject to King Dollar, to the most brutal form of Mammonism, to the hideous beast. the path of which is strewn with human corpses."

In this adjectival and unnerwing combination, we seem to miss any reference to the British Empire. Japan, France, Italy and the United States are easily identified. This omission must be due to sheer inadequacy of epithet; that alone has prevented us from getting a really stunning verbal cameo of Britain and her company of nations.



H. M. S. Mary Rose left a Norwegian port in charge of a westbound convoy of merchant ships in the afternoon of October 16th. At dawn on the 17th flashes of gunfire were sighted astern. The captain of the Mary Rose, Lieut .-Commander Charles Fox, who was on the bridge at the time, remarked that he supposed it was a submarine shelling the convoy, and promptly turned his ship to investigate: all hands were called to action stations. The Mary Rose had increased to full speed. and in a short time three light cruisers were sighted coming towards them at high speed out of the morning mist; the Mary Rose promptly challenged, and, receiving no reply, opened fire with every gun that would bear at a range of about four miles. The German light cruisers appeared to have been nonplussed by this determined single - handed onslaught, as they did not return the fire until the range had closed to three miles. Then they opened fire, and the Mary Rose held gallently on through a barrage of bursting shells until only a mile separated her from the enemy. Up to this point the German marksmanship was poor, but as the British destroyer turned to bring her torpedo tubes to bear a salvo struck her, bursting in the engine-room, and leaving her disabled, a log on the water. All guns, with the exception of the after one, were out of action and their crews killed or wounded: but the after gun continued in action under the direction of Sub-DISTRICT OF Lieutenant Marsh, R. N. V. R., as long as the gun would bear. The captain came down from the wrecked bridge and passed aft, permission encouraging and cheering his deafened men. He stopped beside the wrecked remains of the midship gun, and shouted to the survivors of its crew-"God bless my heart, lads, get her going again; we're not done yet!"

The enemy were now pouring a concentrated fire into the motionless vessel. One of the boilers. struck by a shell, exploded, and through the inferno of escaping steam, smoke, and the vapour of bursting shell came that familiar, cheery voice--- "We're not done

The captain, first lieutenant, and gunner were lost with the ship, while a handful of survivors were picked up later.

(It may be recalled that on October 17 a convoy in the North Sea was attacked by German raiders. Two British destroyers. the Mary Rose and the Strongbow, were sunk, as also were five Norwegian, one Danish, and three Swedish vessels.)


