## HINDENBURG READY FOR ANOTHER ATTACK

### PRELIMINARY BOMBARDMENT IN PROGRESS AT AMIENS -- QUIET ELSEWHERE

#### ALLIES WAIT EXPECTANTLY HINDENBURG'S NEXT BLOW

**VIOLENT ARTILLERY BOMBARDMENT ON AMIENS FRONT  
FORESHADOWS FURTHER ATTACKS--WITH HIS DIVISIONS REFITTED, HE IS REPORTED READY ONCE  
MORE--AUSTRALIANS MAKE GAINS**

(Special to The Daily News.)

With the British Armies in France, May 9.—Hindenburg appears ready to strike again. Unless the signs of the times are wholly deceitful, the most violent artillery fire which is at present under way both north and south of the Avre River, on the Amiens front presages another attack in force.

From various sources it is known that the vast German machinery, composed of roads, railways, bridges, etc., stand ready to carry the great armies of troops, which stand ready, refitted and refreshed, awaiting the pulling of the trigger which will hurl them once more into the fray.

On this occasion, Hindenburg cannot be said to be in even as good a position as he was on March 21, when he started his great drive against the Cambrai salient. His troops then were wholly fresh, and doped with the infallibility of the German plans. They had a long winter's preparation in machinery, whereas this new drive must be undertaken with men doubtful of their own ability to win.

**Australian Gains.**

The Australian troops have again advanced north of the Somme, and at another point west of Morlancourt. At both places they made a gain of a few hundred yards.

**Americans Stronger.**

With the American Armies in France, May 9.—Except for artillery firing and patrolling, there is a little new activity in Picardy, but here the Americans are becoming stronger every day.

**Local Attacks.**

London, May 9.—The Germans yesterday attacked the British and French line between Laclutte and Ormezele. After heavy fighting in this sector, the enemy succeeded in entering the Allied front lines at certain points. South of Laclutte, the French troops advanced their lines during the night and captured a number of prisoners. Another great German attack is expected in the near future.

#### CLOSING AUSTRIAN PARLIAMENT MAY CAUSE REVOLT

Berne, May 9.—The Labor and Socialist organizations in Austria threaten to revolt against the action of the government in suspending parliament. The Swiss newspapers print a telegram from Vienna quoting their "social korrespondenz" to the effect that a committee of the German Socialist Deputies Club has denied issuing the manifesto to the working classes in regard to the government's action, in which the following declaration was made:

"If absolutism is re-established out of regard for Pan-Germanism, which is prolonging the war, the working classes will be forced to fight for their rights."

The manifesto concluded by exhorting the workers to hold themselves ready to fight, if necessary.

#### BELGIUM IS CRAMMED WITH GERMAN WOUNDED

Amsterdam, May 7.—Two hundred and sixty-five trains full of wounded soldiers returning to Germany from the battlefronts in Picardy and Flanders, says the newspapers Les Nouvelles of The Hague, were counted in the daytime of April 9, April 11 and April 12 on the Namur-Liege railway. The transports were so crowded that the Germans were even using open coal cars to carry the wounded.

Hospitals, convents, schools and factories in Belgium, the paper adds, are all packed with wounded.

#### TEUTONS WANT NEW ROUMANIAN KING

London, May 6.—The Teutonic powers, the correspondent of The London Daily Mail at Annemasse, France, claims to have learned on reliable information, have decided to dethrone King Ferdinand of Roumania and to install a ruler of their own choice. He says that Germany some time ago tried to get Count Czernin, then Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, to consent to such action, and that his subsequent removal from office has made an agreement possible.

### FOOD HOARDERS WILL BE DEALT WITH VERY SEVERELY

#### ANARCHY SPREADING THROUGH UKRAINA

London, May 9.—The whole of the Republic of Ukraina is now seething with anarchy against the despotic rule which the German military commanders have set up. This is the direct result of the action of the Germans in overthrowing the Ukraine government. An attempt was recently made upon the life of the premier, who, however, escaped with wounds.

The peasants, who form the greater proportion of the population, are much incensed against the Teutonic invaders, and many of the rifles and ammunition with which the whole country was stocked after the soldiers returned from the trenches, and which have been hidden away for safety, is now appearing again and being cleaned up ready for action. Outbreaks of a serious nature may be expected at any time against the German forces.

Mr. Morrison was in the transfer business here until some two years ago, when he proceeded to Alice Arm, where he has been since, until this happy occasion, and there are few who were here in the earlier days who did not know him.

#### GERMANY NOW FACE TO FACE WITH RUIN

Zurich, May 7.—A gloomy picture of Germany's finances is drawn by the Industrial Union of Saxony, one of the greatest industrial organizations in Germany, in a manifesto supporting the demand for indemnities. The statement says the war has added 14,800,000,000 marks to the peace expenditure of 4,800,000,000 marks. It continues:

"This total will absorb 60 per cent. of the whole national income. Capitalized at 5 per cent., the national debt would then amount to 392,000,000,000 marks or more than the entire pre-war wealth of Germany. Such a burden would completely paralyze production and all spirit of enterprise and completely ruin our economic life. Our foes are considerably better off in this respect. They need entertain no such apprehension, as their own countries and colonial possessions afford rich natural resources of valuable raw materials and millions of workers, while Germany is dependent upon her self, and even if she gained colonies she can not reckon on any immediate profit therefrom."

London, May 9.—In normal times, the attack such as that of General Maurice upon the veracity of Premier Lloyd George and Bonar Law, the leader of the House of Commons, would result in an immediate test of the government's strength. Gen. Maurice claims that misstatements were made by Premier Lloyd George to the country; that his figures as to the fighting strength of the British forces on the eve of the great battle in France on March 21 were not correct; and also that his statements as to the fighting strength of the forces in Mesopotamia were not correct. Needless to say, such statements coming from an ex-official of the War Office would tend to create a distinct feeling of distrust of the premier among a certain section of the community, were they permitted to go unchallenged.

Mr. Asquith moved for a division on the proposal of Chancellor Bonar Law to ask two judges to act as a court of honor to investigate the charges, preferring that this be carried out by a parliamentary committee. The government has decided to treat this motion as a vote of censure, and has called upon all its supporters to attend the House today for the division. This course of action leaves the matter of investigation open to the judgment of the House and apparently implies that the proposed enquiry, whether by the two judges or a parliamentary committee, is abandoned meantime, until the verdict of the House of Commons is given.

The decision of this vote will depend largely upon the action of the older Conservatives, who, while anxious enough to give the government a knock, do not wish to bring about a general election during the war, and prefer the present coalition government to the radical one which might result were this cabinet defeated.

General Maurice is the most talked of man in Great Britain at the present moment, and no attempt is being made by the London newspapers to conceal the gravity of the charges made by him against the premier and the chancellor. His striking personality and his splendid record add weight to his now famous letter. Both the premier and Mr. Bonar Law are anxious that the most searching enquiry be made into the circumstances. They are eager to meet the charges. Premier Lloyd George claims that his statements were based upon the figures given to him by the War Office itself, where General Maurice was until recently director of military operations.

### MORE CAMOUFLAGE

The Financial Post in a recent issue publishes a letter from "a millionaire and one of the largest investors in Canada" in which he portrays the imminence of disaster to the protectionist interests at the hands of the Unionist government or its component elements. His supposed apprehensions find expression thus:

"With Ontario and Quebec on opposite political sides, and the West now holding the balance of power, I am afraid many things may happen to the Eastern provinces. You have seen already what has been done to the C. P. R. My opinion is that the Western people will gladly wreck this property if they can see any advantage to themselves."

"With the present mix-up I am afraid there will be a sorry day for the Ontario manufacturers at no very distant date. Sir Robert Borden is premier on sufferance. He will be slaughtered whenever the party now in power at Ottawa think fit. He could only secure his position by sacrificing a lot of friends of the Conservative party to satisfy the renegade Liberals he took into the government."

The Winnipeg Free Press promptly seizes upon this proposition of alleged alarm, plays it up as a sign that Big Business is afraid of losing its grip at Ottawa, and makes it a text for a homily to the effect that the public may look with confidence to the government, or some section of it, to protect them against exploitation by the Big Business barons. The letter and the Free Press' treatment of it, are a bit of byplay for the benefit of the public. That the turn-coats who joined Sir Robert would knife him if the act seemed profitable there can be no doubt, despite the agreement they are declared to have signed to "stand pat" on the tariff question. But there is no prospect of profit for them in a new act of treason. If Sir Robert is at their mercy, they are equally without hope or chance save in association

with him. If they deposed him, whoever would survive the ensuing election, it would not be them. They must hang with him or hang by themselves. And the signs are that they appreciate the situation correctly and will stick strictly to the "safety first" policy. As to the fate that has befallen the C. P. R. under Unionist auspices, there is no hint in Lord Shaughnessy's report to the shareholders that the company has been brought to the verge of bankruptcy by the fifteen per cent. increase in freight and passenger rates. And as for the Big Business interests generally, they have obviously quite as little to fear at the hands of the combination they placed in power. The tariff on agricultural implements stands regardless of the world's need of food. Sir Joseph keeps his bacon profits and the munition contract jobbers keep their spoils. Bill and Dan are being relieved of their obligations and getting paid for the favor of letting the country foot the bills.

The Big Business crowd are not worrying over anything the political merger may do to them. They made it, own it, control it, and have only to say what they want. Our "millionaire" friend's pretended claim is only a bit of amateur camouflage which will deceive no one. Any doubt of its insincerity is set at rest by the Free Press' allusions to it. When the Free Press assures the public they are safe it may be taken that Sir Clifford and his friends have got their hooks fixed where they want them. What new raid is in contemplation now?—Bulletin.

### BIGGEST ELECTRIC VESSEL IN WORLD BUILT BY BRITAIN

London, May 6.—The first electrically propelled merchant ship ever built in England, and the largest electric vessel in the world, is now undergoing its finishing touches at a British shipyard, and will soon start on its first voyage. The vessel is designed on a system in which a

combination of steam and electricity is employed. The importance of this type of vessel under present conditions is its decreased coal consumption and larger cargo space.

### MANITOBA CITIES MUST STORE COAL —WHAT ABOUT B. C.?

Winnipeg, May 7.—T. R. Deacon, provincial fuel administrator here, declared that it is the duty of municipal governments to forestall famine in fuel during the coming winter. He asserted that municipalities must construct storage facilities and take whatever steps necessary to secure the immediate commencement of coal shipments from the western mines to the various towns and cities.

If the towns and cities and municipalities are unable to make the necessary financial arrangements, Mr. Deacon added, the Manitoba government is ready to come to their assistance.

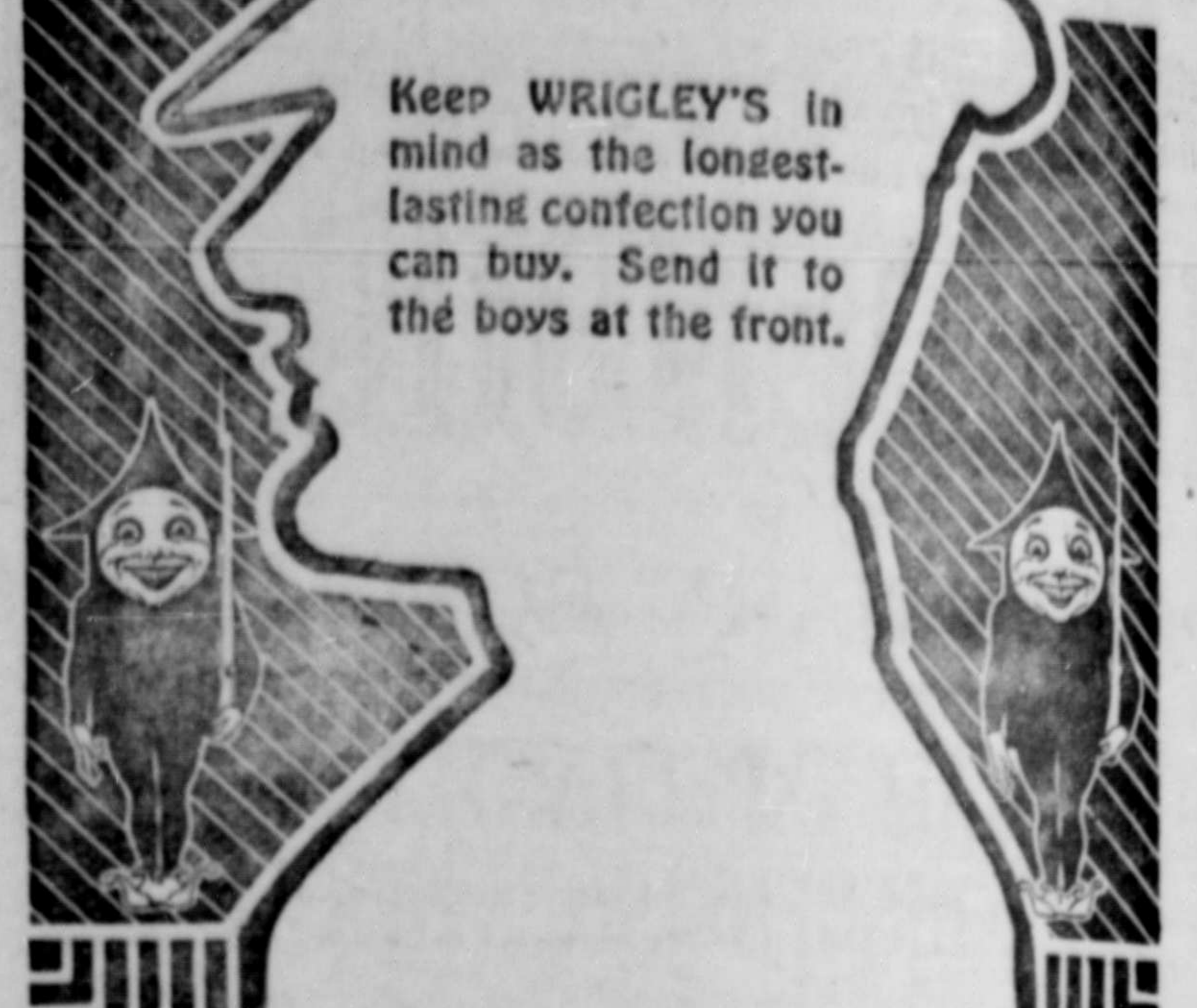

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## GERMANY A ROBBER STATE, SAYS BALFOUR

London, May 6.—"What is now more pressing required is that the fighting forces of the United States should be brought as speedily as possible into the field" said A. J. Balfour, the Foreign Secretary, in speaking at a luncheon to the American Labor delegation.

"The Germans' plan," continued Mr. Balfour, "is to shatter the British army before the American weight can be brought into the scale. The German inspired press has been instructed by its masters to show the utmost contempt for the American military effort. But the masters do not share that contempt. They are planning their whole campaign and are sacrificing men with reckless extravagance in order that the American help may arrive after their blow has been struck."

### More Camouflage

"They now almost cynically admit that the resolution of the Reichstag, of which we have heard so much, all the talk of no annexations and indemnities, of considering the wishes of subject populations, of spreading the principles of security and freedom throughout the world, was what we sometimes call camouflage."

"Germany now stands forth undisguised as a robber State," declared Mr. Balfour. "How is she going to carry out her robbery so far as her internal politics are concerned? Her methods are simple. If things are going wrong, or are not going as well as her optimists expected, then they tell the German public:

"You must fight on, because the powers against whom you are fighting desire nothing less, and will be content with nothing less, than the total destruction of your country."

### Will Prove Wrong.

"As the Germans have been proved hopelessly wrong in their estimates of the ideals, desires and determination of the American people," said Mr. Balfour, "so they will be proved wrong in their estimate as to the speed with which the Americans will be able to carry out their purpose and programme."

The thought uppermost in all British minds today is confidence that America will upset the German plans, that America will be able to send over her indomitable forces in a way which no German General Staff officer has ever calculated. It is men we need now."

The men want an advance from 50c per hour to 62½¢ with an eight-hour instead of a nine-hour day. The company offers 60c to take effect from the 1st of May. Meantime, the men are still out and the company's plant is tied up.

Private Arthur Davey, of a Yorkshire regiment, was home in England some few months ago from France, when he received the decoration of the Military Cross. Word has just been received by Mr. John E. Davey, of this city, his brother, that since the beginning of the German drive on March 21, he has been missing. He has disappeared, and is either killed or prisoner.
