## MANY SINN FEIN PLOTTERS ARE ARRESTED

### BRITISH AVIATORS BOMB GERMAN TOWNS -- HUNS ATTEMPT RAID ON LONDON

#### HUNDREDS OF SINN FEINERS ARRESTED THROUGHOUT IRELAND

**GOVERNMENT HAD EVIDENCE OF ALLEGED PRO-GERMAN PLOT AND ACTED SWIFTLY—SINN FEIN HEADQUARTERS RAIDED IN DUBLIN AND IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS WERE FOUND**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Dublin, May 20.—The Sinn Fein element throughout Ireland received a rude shock on Saturday morning, when concerted action was taken by the authorities, when hundreds of known Sinn Feiners were rounded up throughout the country. Twenty-three arrests were made in Dublin and reports of further arrests have been received from Galway, Cork, Sligo, Dundalk, Kesh, Skibereen, Kilkenny, Fultamore, Drogheda, Athlone, Westport and Roscommon. The prisoners taken were mostly men who were formerly imprisoned in connection with the 1916 rebellion.

of Irishmen for their own ends. "That we hereby call upon all loyal subjects of His Majesty in Ireland to aid in crushing such conspiracy. "That, as a means to this end we shall cause still further steps to be taken to facilitate and encourage voluntary enlistment in Ireland in His Majesty's forces in the hope that, without resort to compulsion the contribution of Ireland to these forces may be brought up to the proper strength and made to correspond to the contributions of other parts of the Empire."

#### CZECHS IN RUSSIA RESIST INVASION

Washington, May 20.—Czechs and Jugo-Slavs taken prisoner by the Russians while fighting with Austro-Hungarian armies have organized an army which is now resisting the Teutonic invasion of Russia, the Serbian legation here was informed today in a cablegram from London, quoting Lukuich, an officer of the army who has arrived here. Lukuich said part of the aeroplane had reached Japan and that the army had planned to land in the western front.

Germans' violence created deep feelings, Lukuich said, and the (the Red Guard) organized a force of intense pride to a country whose sons always distinguished themselves and fought with such heroic valor in the past in the same way as thousands of them are now fighting in this war.

#### HILL 44 HAD GREAT STRATEGIC IMPORTANCE

With the British Army in France, May 16.—An important section of high ground near the Weyerbeeke river, north of Kemmel, has been captured by the French in a strong attack. Both Hill 44 and Goddezone Farm, which lie between Laclytte and Vierstratt, were stormed and occupied, thereby giving the French positions which had been a bone of contention for many days.

The Germans also received a knock on the southern battlefield where they made a detour in an attempt to capture the defence on the elevation south of Maitly-Raineval. Here the enemy succeeded after hard fighting in obtaining a footing in the French front line at one place, but their success was short-lived for a prompt counter-attack drove them out, and besides their dead, they left more than 100 prisoners in the hands of the defenders.

The battle for Hill 44 was the outcome of the German attack on May 8. When the Germans assaulted, the Allies were holding the elevation. Bitter fighting ensued all day long, and the Germans in the course of time secured possession of the hill. The British immediately organized a counter-attack and forced the enemy out.

The next day the Germans again drove forward. They made such a heavy assault that they again captured the hill, which they held until Saturday.

#### ARTILLERY FIGHTING AND LOCAL RAIDS ARE REPORTED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, May 20.—The village of Ville-sur-Ancres, north of Morlancourt has been captured by the British and Australian troops. They made a successful raid during the night, during which they took three hundred and fifty prisoners and twenty machine guns. The German posts were also successfully raided southeast of Meteren, when heavy casualties were inflicted upon the garrison. General Haig's report reads: "We made a successful raid at Morlancourt, and in the sector south of Hullach this forenoon, taking a number of prisoners. In the Morlancourt raid, the Australians surprised the German garrison, capturing men and machine guns. The hostile artillery has been more active in the Villers-Brettonneux sector."

#### Berlin Says

Berlin, May 20.—West of Hullach, the British attacked with several companies, but were repulsed with heavy losses. Between Arras and Albert, the enemy was active and our batteries here were many times subject to a violent fire.

#### French Front

Paris, May 20.—There have been lively artillery actions north of the Avre river, and in the Champagne sector. French patrols captured prisoners between Lassigny and Noyon.

#### Italian Front

Rome, May 20.—The Austrians have made a third attempt to recapture Monte Corno, but have failed completely to make any headway. The Italians have also repulsed with heavy losses detachments of the enemy on Dosso Alto, and on the northern slopes of Altissimi Frensolio valley, also in the Asolone area.

#### In Trans-Caucasia

Moscow, May 20.—Turkish regulars and forces of the Kurd tribes advancing in Persia, have occupied Soujbulak and Ushnu, south of Lake Urmia. At Baku, on the Caspian Sea, according to dispatches received by the Moscow newspapers, the Musselmen and Bolshevik forces are engaged in a deadly conflict. Two thousand persons have been killed and three thousand wounded.

**ALLIED AVIATORS DROP TWENTY TONS OF EXPLOSIVES ON GERMAN AERODROMES, BILLETTS AND RAILWAY STATIONS—GERMAN AIRCRAFT CROSS ENGLISH COASTS MAKING FOR LONDON**

#### NO LIMIT TO U. S. EFFORT TO WIN WAR

New York, May 20.—Opening with a speech here on Saturday night the Red Cross drive for a second hundred million dollar War Fund, President Wilson announced the purpose of the United States to set no limits on its effort to win the war.

#### TRY TO MAKE AMIENS ANOTHER RHEIMS

On the French front in France, May 15.—The German artillery, under orders from the Prussian and Bavarian Crown Princes, is doing its utmost to turn Amiens into another Rheims. Picardy's Capital has already suffered terribly from this effort to carry out the German idea of striking terror into the Fatherland's enemies by the destruction of their most loved works of art, and every day adds to its suffering.

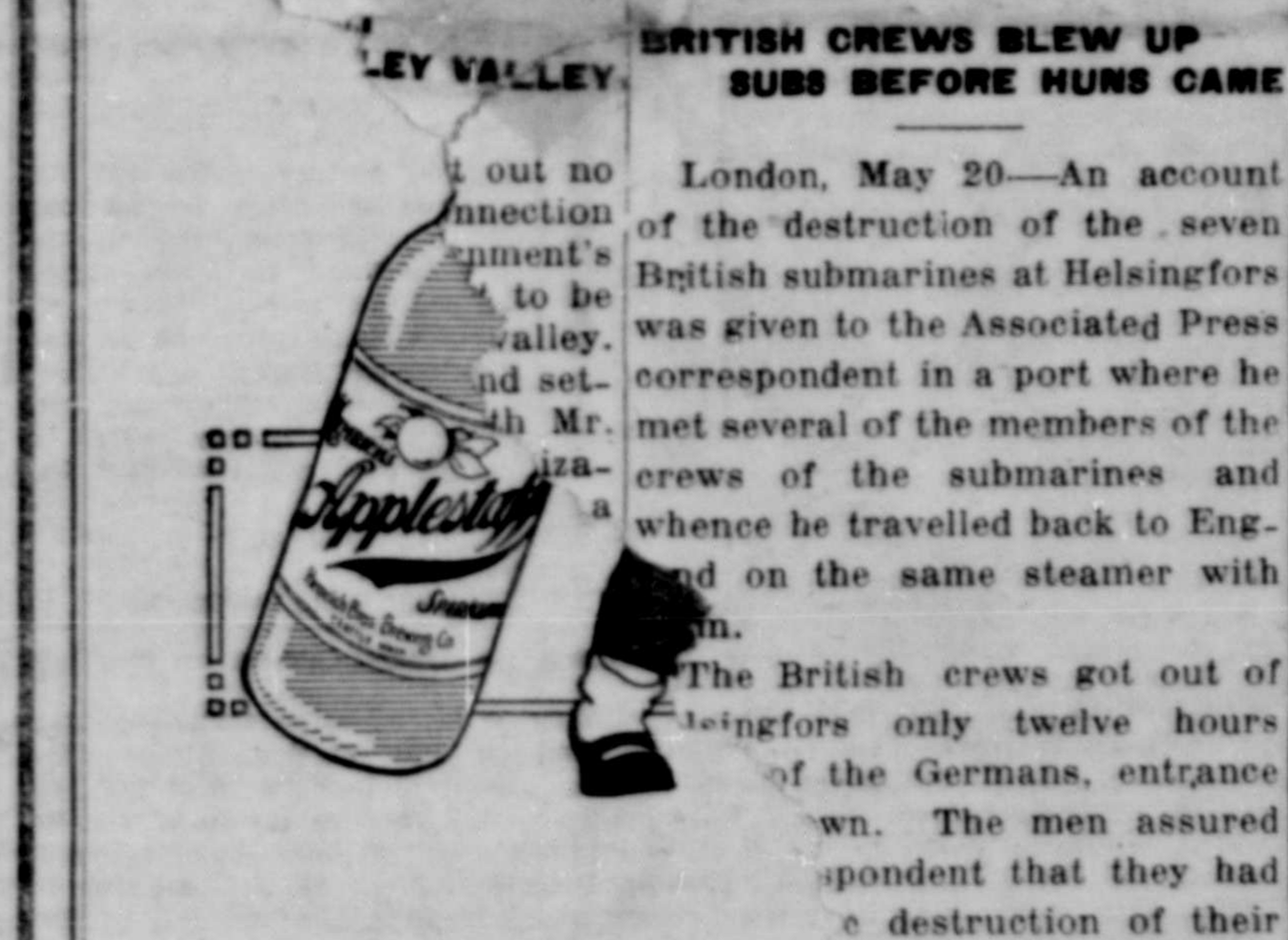
The correspondent today went over the abandoned city and observed the effects of the bombardment, which has turned parts of the town into heaps of ruins and killed 52 men civilians, 30 women and five children, besides wounding 62 men, 48 women and 19 children before the population had an opportunity to evacuate the place. Since the Germans have been within cannon shot of Amiens after their recent advance during the offensive, they have hurled no fewer than 5,800, mostly six-inch and eight-inch, shells into the city. Every indication points to a systematic effort to destroy the public buildings, as the cathedral has been struck by shells which have pierced the roofs and walls, and the object of firing incessantly upon the town cannot be explained except upon the assumption that it is carried out with the purely barbarous idea of the destruction of the beautiful objects it contains.

#### SOLDIERS' FAMILIES TO RETURN TO CANADA

London, May 20.—The Canadian military authorities on this side of the Atlantic are still urging the return to Canada of the wives and families of soldiers in the overseas force, and apparently the response to the advice is not so quick as the official mind desires. It is pointed out to the men and their wives that it may not be possible to accommodate the dependents of soldiers returning to Canada in the same ship as their military relatives during the period of the war. Moreover, when demobilization comes, the shipping arrangements will render such arrangement impossible. Consequently, the return of women and children remaining here at that period will be greatly retarded.

#### (Special to The Daily News)

London, May 20.—The allied aviators have been extremely active over the weekend, and have dropped twenty tons of bombs on the enemy aerodromes and billets at Tournai, Courtrai and Chaunes. A ton of high explosives was dropped on the railway station at Metz, doing considerable damage. Many trainloads of explosives, consisting of ammunition of the various kinds for the German troops at the front were being marshalled in the Metz junction yards, when this attack was made and some of them were hit. The railway stations at Chaunes, Haubordin, Douai, Marcoing and Peronne were also bombed with ten tons of explosives. Stations were demolished and the tracks were blown up in many cases, thus interfering with the enemy transportation, which was already none too good at the best. Thirty-two heavy guns were bombed at Metz and Thionville, and at Cologne thirty-three bombs were dropped on the railway station, factories and barracks.

In the air fighting which ensued during these operations, our fighting machines brought down nineteen hostile aeroplanes yesterday, and other four were forced to descend uncontrollable. Ten of our planes are missing.

#### The London Raid

London, May 20.—Different squadrons of hostile aircraft crossed the coasts of Kent and Essex shortly after eleven o'clock last evening, and proceeded on their way towards London. At midnight the raid was still in progress.

#### RUSSIANS RETAKE THE POST OF BAKU

Constantinople, May 20.—Russian Bolshevik troops reinforced from Turkestan and Astrakhan, have recaptured the port of Baku on the Caspian Sea. The Bolshevik force crossed the Caspian Sea on Russian gunboats and attacked the Musselmen, who, owing to lack of means of defence, were forced to abandon the town. The Bolshevik troops are vigorously continuing their attacks.

**THOSE FOOD REGULATIONS**

The period prescribed by Orders 30 and 31 of the Food Board for the return by householders to dealers of all sugar and flour in excess of "ordinary requirements" for fifteen days expired last week. From now on, according to the Orders, excess supplies are liable to be confiscated and their holders prosecuted. The public, we imagine, is awaiting the first prosecution under the new regulations with no little impatience and curiosity. It would like to know what is meant by "ordinary requirements," an elastic phrase which leaves a wide margin of doubt. These are extraordinary times and it is impossible to apply ordinary standard to them. Economic and social conditions are changing every week.

Can a judge determine what the term calls for? We doubt it. Our conviction is that in these latest regulations, as well as in many other ways, the Food Board is putting too much upon the public and not taking enough on itself. Where it undertakes to set severe penalties it surely ought to be explicit in its prescriptions. And it ought to be practical.

What food hoarding is being done in this Dominion today is in the primary agencies of food distribution. Let the Government regulate these—regulate the wheat situation at the mills, the sugar at the refineries, and the meat and dairy products in the packing houses—and half these regulations would be unnecessary. But if this remedy is considered too drastic let the Food Board put more reflection behind its regulations and more practicability in them.

**A GERMAN VIEWPOINT**

A report from the American correspondent with the French Army points out the Germans are methodically preparing for the resumption of their offensive on the western front. Indications are the next attack will be delivered mainly on the front from La Bassee to south of Amiens, which means, if true, that the British will again

be called upon to bear the brunt of the offensive. This forecast gains credence from the interview which The Politiken has had with a member of the Reichstag, who intimates the Germans still believe they can reach the English Channel and by doing so make peace negotiations possible. This member of the Reichstag says his country does not want the Briey and Longwy mine areas now, in fact, any new territory in the West. According to him, Germany will be satisfied with her conquests in the East and the return of her colonies.

The interview in The Politiken is interesting. It admits the German offensive in the West has, so far, proved a failure owing to the casualties sustained, and admits the German High Command is awaiting more artillery. It also admits the casualties throughout the war have reached a total of 3,000,000, which is a very conservative figure compared with some estimates. Where the member of the Reichstag is hopelessly astray in his calculations is the belief that it would be possible to start peace negotiations if the Germans reached the coast. It certainly would not with either Britain or America, and not with France unless her armies were destroyed.

The informant of the Danish newspaper takes a typically Teutonic view of the psychology of his enemies. He believes his country can impose its will on the English-speaking peoples just as it has done on Russia. It is but another indication of the viewpoint which bases its reliance on the power of the sword. It is well there should be such expositions of German aims from time to time. People are apt to forget Germany may be willing to abandon her claims in the West if she can secure time to develop her conquests in the East so that in the future, when she goes to war, she will be backed up by greater resources than ever in the past. Germany does not realize the Allies are fighting for Russia as well as for themselves, and that the outcome of

this war must decide the fate of Europe. Otherwise it will have been fought in vain.

**AERIAL MAIL SERVICE INAUGURATED IN U. S.**

Philadelphia, May 15.—Exactly one hour and thirty minutes after he left Belmont Park this morning, Lieut. Torry H. Webb landed at Bustleton with the first aerial mail delivery from New York. He was received by a civic committee and presented with a wrist watch. Lieut. Edgerton relieved him at the wheel and piloted the biplane on its second 140-mile lap to Washington, thus completing the New York-Philadelphia-Washington airplane mail service.

Webb's plane carried 182 pieces of mail, weighing in all 144 lbs. The historic event was witnessed by large crowds at Long Island and speeches were made by several port officials.

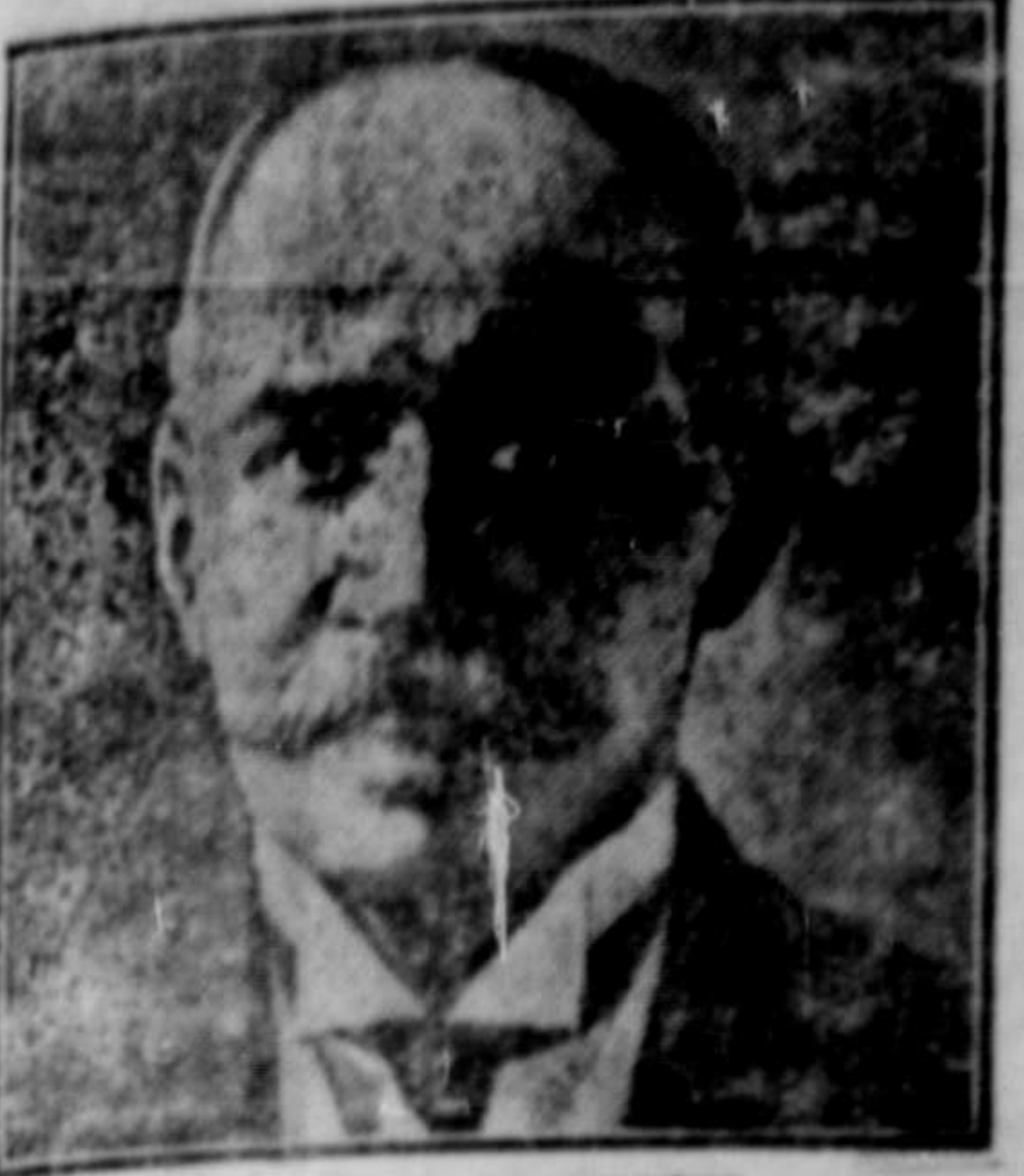

## DECLARES GERMANY WILL SEIZE HOLLAND

Rotterdam, May 16.—A row in Rotterdam between a German major and a Dutch landlady has caused some excitement. The major rented a high-class apartment with two other officers, for a month, and, having found cheaper quarters, decided to move out, which was against the laws of Holland. There ensued a terrible scene, when the officer shook his fist in the landlady's face, shouting:

"Damn you! We will teach you Dutch a lesson on August 1. That is the date, and you'd better keep it in mind."

When the landlady's husband asked for an explanation of this threat, having found her in hysterics, it was explained by the German officer; that August 1 was the day that Germany had decided on to take control of Holland, and advised him to treat German officers courteously and learn their language.

## ATHLETICS ARE NEEDED IF THEY DO COME HIGH

London, May 17.—The man who deliberately takes unnecessary exercise wastes an equivalent of food, according to Dr. Robert Hutchinson, a dietetic expert at the West London Hospital, and on this assumption he strongly objects to athletics during this present time of food scarcity. He believes that Britons can suffer ten per cent reduction in weight without endangering their health. Other dieticians express the opinion that the recent enormous consumption of fish and rabbits in this country, instead of the red beef of old England, is reducing the British waist line, but so far is making people healthier. Less exercise and more sleep is advocated by Dr. Hutchinson to retard the loss of weight.
