## WINNIPEG STRIKE GROWS STRONGER DAILY

TWELVE THOUSAND MEN NOW OUT--SHIPYARD WORKERS IN VICTORIA MAY GO

### GERMAN OFFENSIVE PLANS HAMPERED BY ALLIES' BLOWS

AT NUMEROUS POINTS, ENEMY HAS BEEN FORCED BACK TO NEW LINES AND HIS ARRANGEMENTS UPSET—RAIDS AND LOCAL ATTACKS STILL CONTINUE—  
ITALIAN SUCCESS.

(Special to The Daily News)  
London, May 23.—The German plans for the resumption of the offensive in France has been seriously hampered by the sudden blows of the allies here and there along the whole front. The Germans have been forced back at numerous points to new lines, which may be the more easily defended. The swift and sudden attacks made by the British and French forces on the Flanders front have apparently got upon the nerves of the German soldiers. They are unable to anticipate where the next blow will fall, and prisoners taken captive appear to be greatly relieved, when their anxieties are removed.

**Expected Soon.**  
Paris, May 23.—The German attack is expected soon, and will most probably take place in the Somme region near Albert, on the Aisne river. The German artillery batteries have been in constant action for so long here that the attack might be expected any time, but so far, the German general staff have not yet shown their hand.

**Berlin's Report.**  
Berlin, May 23.—Heavy artillery fighting is reported in an official statement received from General Headquarters today. The chief zones said to be under gun fire were the Kemmel district, both sides of the Lys, and between Arras and Albert.

**More Raids.**  
London, May 23.—The Germans attacked and attempted to raid the British positions near Mesnil but were repulsed. British forces carrying out a raid on the German positions around Hebuterne, inflicted very severe losses upon the enemy.

**Abandon Zeebrugge.**  
Berne, May 23.—The German naval authorities are preparing to abandon Zeebrugge and Ostend as naval bases because of the recent blockades effected by the British naval forces, and the constant harassing of the British bombing planes.

**Italian Success.**  
Rome, May 23.—The Italian troops on the mountains west of the Brenna river broke up many enemy attacks, especially on the slopes of Santo Rosso. On Monte Spinnocchia, west of the Piave, says an official statement, an Austrian position was destroyed, and fifty-three prisoners captured.

### MORE UNIONS JOIN WINNIPEG STRIKE

Winnipeg, May 23.—With twelve thousand men on strike, and more unions joining the walk-out hourly, conditions in Winnipeg are daily becoming more grave. In a cold drizzling rain, thousands walked to their work this morning. The Business Men's League has a thousand motors operated by the owners and volunteers free of expense for those who desire to ride, and a hundred licences were taken out in the rush hours for automobile hire cars.

### ARMENIANS WILL FIGHT TO DEATH

London, May 21.—It is learned from Armenian sources that everywhere in the Caucasus the Armenians are organizing in order to resist the attempted advance of the Turkish troops eastward. Telegraphic information from both Armenian and Turkish sources has announced from time to time that fighting has taken place between Armenian and Ottoman troops, and it appears clear that the Turkish march eastward has been considerably hindered.

In spite of enemy propaganda and betrayal by the Tartars, the Armenians are determined to fight to the death for their national cause and the defence of their country. At an enthusiastic meeting held at Tiflis, the President of the Armenian Assembly said:

"If we are to perish, let us perish with honor."

On the following day the Armenian trade unions passed a resolution that all able-bodied persons be enrolled, while the students and school boys also met and declared that the battlefield was the place where they would continue their studies.

### ALL SUBSTITUTES AT LEIPZIG FAIR

Washington, May 22.—Official despatches received today giving accounts of the great Leipzig Fair said that the fair was largely an exhibition of substitutes, especially in the metals sections, only the porcelain makers showing their old-time products. Dolls were shown with hair made of spun glass. Tea made from straw-berry leaves and herbs was exhibited, and said to have an excellent taste, but even five or six cups failed to produce the refreshing exhilaration of the real article. It has been named "German tea." Pepper was surprisingly well imitated, marmalades were made from vegetables instead of fruit. Soap was a combination of oil from berries and pumicestone, having effective cleansing qualities, but lacking the characteristic of a creamy lather. Two concentric rings with small springs between were offered for pneumatic bicycle tires, causing one correspondent to remark sorrowfully that "they are very serviceable on asphalt pavements, but are not exactly noiseless or easy riding."

### POLICE COMMISSION DISCUSS MANY THINGS

Idlers Had Better Look Out and Get Busy—Motor Speeding Is to be Restricted and Blind-Pigs Pinched.

The regular meeting of the Police Commission was called for yesterday afternoon, when many matters of public importance were discussed freely. Chief Vickers presented his report for the month of April, which showed that of the forty-two cases brought before the magistrate, thirty-four convictions had been obtained. The fines collected amounted to some \$808, of which \$400 was claimed by the Dominion.

The matter of salaries of the police force was brought up by Commissioner Macdonald. In view of the increased and continuously increasing cost of living, notwithstanding the increasing number of controllers, he moved that the three constables' salaries be increased to \$120 per month, to date from the 1st of May. This was agreed to.

Commissioner Macdonald also referred to a statement which had been made by one of the lawyers in town to the effect that he did not expect to get justice in the police court, or something of that kind. He intimated that it had been brought to his attention that cases sometimes are discussed in the police office with the magistrate before the case comes before the court, and that the outcome of the cases are practically decided before the trial.

"I don't believe it," interjected Mr. Peters. "I have occasion to go to the magistrate in all cases, and to give him details, but as far as discussing the case further, it is not so. If I or the chief, went to the magistrate behind the back of the other side and tried to influence his judgment, that would be wrong."

"I am informed that the result is known before some cases come into court," repeated Commissioner Macdonald. "I want this stopped, if it is going on."

"It is not going on," returned Mr. Peters. "I absolutely deny this statement. We have a highly honorable magistrate. I often speak to him about cases. I have occasion to do so, but not regarding the judgment."

"The police have to be protected from things of this kind," went on Commissioner Macdonald. "It is our duty. We will do ours, and others must do theirs."

"Then if you want to protect the police, the chief's private room ought to be restored. There is no place at present where I can discuss matters with him in privacy, since his room was taken over."

Protecting the police brought the query from Commissioner Hill as to why a charge had been altered this week from interfering with the police while on duty, to common assault, which was a very different thing. "There are doubtless a lot of men in this town prepared to take a wallop at the police for \$15," said Commissioner Hill. "They would also be quite pleased to take a wallop at the commissioners at the same price. Now I don't propose to take any wallop. We want no roughnecks in this town to get by." The details of the case then were given, which have already been published. There seemed to be some dubiety as to whether the police officers had freely agreed to reduce this charge. Commissioner Hill pointed out that assaults upon the police cannot be paid for by money, and suggested that no alteration be made in any such charge in future. ### BRITISH PRISONERS IN GERMANY GET HORRIBLE TREATMENT

London, May 23.—The Times gives prominence to further authenticated reports of atrocities, systematic tortures and cold-blooded murders of British prisoners in Germany, in which the sum total of the evidence is incredibly inhuman. There is an instance of a British soldier at Minden, who was deliberately shot dead because a dozen Britishers did not want to draw their ration of the filthy, undrinkable stuff served as coffee. At Merzenburg, a number of seriously wounded British soldiers were, after vain protests, forced to walk for twelve hours a day.

### Automobile Speeding.

Commissioner Hill brought up the matter of the excessive speed of automobiles in the city, particularly on 11th Avenue. The cars just toot when approaching the hill, and any children playing on the streets have just to fall off onto the muskies to get out of the way quick enough. Mayor McClymont agreed that the rate of speed by some of the business and professional men in the city was disgraceful. "There are no playgrounds," went on the mayor, "and the streets are the only places for the children to play, and some day there is something going to happen. However, I have certain proposals for the City Council to deal with."

The increasing automobile traffic up Fulton Street in the direction of Comox Avenue was also brought to the attention of the commission. After being silent for several months, the night was again full of noises between 10 p.m. and 2 a.m. Commissioner Macdonald moved that the Commission be supplied with a list showing the owners and occupiers of the houses on Comox. Commissioner Hill also moved that on any occasion when a conviction was obtained regarding the keeping of a disorderly house, that the owner and agent be prosecuted as well.

### Blind Pigs.

### HOW HOUSEKEEPERS MAY CUT DOWN COSTS

A meeting of the general committee of the publicity section of the Natural Resources Department organized by the Food Board in town, was held last evening in the Board of Trade rooms, Mr. D. G. Stewart, the district chairman, presiding. The chief matter which the meeting had before it was a letter from the mayor in which he brought up the matter of a cash and carry system or alternatively a plan of community delivery of goods from the retailers to the consumers, thereby cutting down the retailers' expenses considerably, and consequently, the costs of food to the consumer.

This is one of the things which has been engaging attention in many towns for some time past, and in some places instituted successfully. In Prince Rupert nearly every store possesses its own delivery car, and it is no uncommon sight to see several cars not fully laden covering practically the same route. It has been felt that this was an instance where economy might be practiced without decreasing efficiency, and at the same time releasing experienced drivers for more necessary employment.

It is also possible that the cash and carry system might be practiced in Prince Rupert very much more, which would help out considerably in the restricting of free deliveries to certain specified weights of goods. With the costs of delivery cut out, or largely reduced, it will be possible for the storekeeper to sell just so much cheaper, which the consumer will appreciate. And under the new system of licences, the storekeeper's books will be always available to be checked up, and in any case of undue profits being taken, the storekeeper is liable to lose his licence, and thus simply be put out of business.

The communication from the mayor will be discussed at a meeting of the retailers concerned to be called for next week. Mr. George Munro and Mr. H. Atkins were the representatives of the particular trades immediately concerned, and the further arrangements remain in their hands.

### OBJECT ATTAINED IN PALESTINE OPERATIONS

London, May 22.—Recent operations in Palestine and Mesopotamia are regarded as entirely successful by the British General Staff.

The main object of Gen. Allenby's operations in Palestine have been largely realized. His object was not merely to occupy a large territory east of the Jordan, but to draw Turkish troops from the south and so ease the situation for the Arabs. This has been done to a marked extent and the Arabs have taken full advantage of the opportunity by raiding the Hadjaz railway at various places until now the entire railway is virtually out of commission. The German troops still in the south have lost their artery of supplies and are living on dates and whatever else they can obtain locally.

In Mesopotamia, Gen. Marshall's operations have been equally successful, although the British columns are competing against nature as well as against the Turks, whose policy of running away increases the difficulty. Gen. Marshall has been successful in diverting a number of Turkish from the Caspian Sea enterprise.

## THE VITAL SPOT

In the early stages of the war much was said and written about the occupation of Berlin as the Allies' chief objective. Colonel Repington, then military critic of The London Times, predicted the capture of the German capital by the Russians by Christmas, 1914, while a noted British peer in a public speech gave a vivid picture of Allied cavalry prancing between the trees which line the imposing Unter Den Linden.

The occupation of Berlin in itself would not end the war. Probably no capital in Europe is less vital to the resisting power of the country of which it is the political centre. During the wars of Frederick the Great it was captured by the Russian but Frederick kept fighting and in the end was victorious. The backbone of Germany's military power is the Rhine, and the most vital part of that backbone is the northern district of German Lorraine. This is the source of probably two-thirds of Germany's supply of iron ore and if it were over-run by the Allies the enemy's power of resistance would be vastly impaired. It is true there are iron mines in Saxony and Silesia, but they do not produce more than a small proportion of the total requirements.

The Lorraine iron deposits are among the most extensive in the world, spreading along both sides of the boundary; so part of them are in France and part in German territory. For the time being, however, the Germans have all of them for their armies have been in occupation of the district between Longwy and Briey since the early days of the war. It was from that area that France obtained ninety per cent. of her iron and the German advance there crippled her enormously, compelling her to rely entirely upon imports from overseas.

The iron resources of Lorraine had a great deal to do with von Moltke's insistence upon the annexation of that province and Alsace in 1871. Contrary to the impression on neutral tonnage which would

sedulously cultivated by German publicists sentiment play no part in the project. Military and material considerations then, as now, determined Prussian policy. Germany will try to annex the iron fields of Briey and Longwy as she annexed those across the mountains in Lorraine forty-seven years ago.

It will be recalled that in the opening weeks of the war Joffre launched an offensive in Lorraine and penetrated some distance through the Vosges. His object evidently was to grasp the chief source of Germany's iron supply and thus impair her military effort. The offensive failed and in the rebound France lost her own supply. Some day, however, there may be another attempt and it will not fail. It is in the sector which is nearest to Metz that the chief American army has been stationed and it is not unlikely that if it should be necessary to carry the war into German territory the fresh new forces of the republic will play an important part in the programme. If the Rhine were forced in that region German resistance would quickly come to an end for the heart of Germany's industrial production would be in the Allies' power.

## GERMANY ALARMED AT SHIPPING PROSPECTS

London, May 22.—That German shipping circles are uneasy over the prospects for the reconstruction of the merchant fleet is indicated by the trend of recent comments in German newspapers. The taking over of the Dutch vessels and the proposed arrangements with Swedish owners are two bitter pills for Germany to swallow, while the loss of the dock property and buildings owned by the North German Lloyd and the Hamburg-American Line in New York and Baltimore has fairly staggered the shipping interests, as they can see that their foreign trade, and especially the highly lucrative passenger traffic across the Atlantic, has been placed in jeopardy.

# City and Town Labor Must Save The Food Situation

THE heart of the food production problem is labor, and the heart of the labor problem is the city dweller. City people must produce food if Canada is to do her full duty in support of our soldiers and Allies.

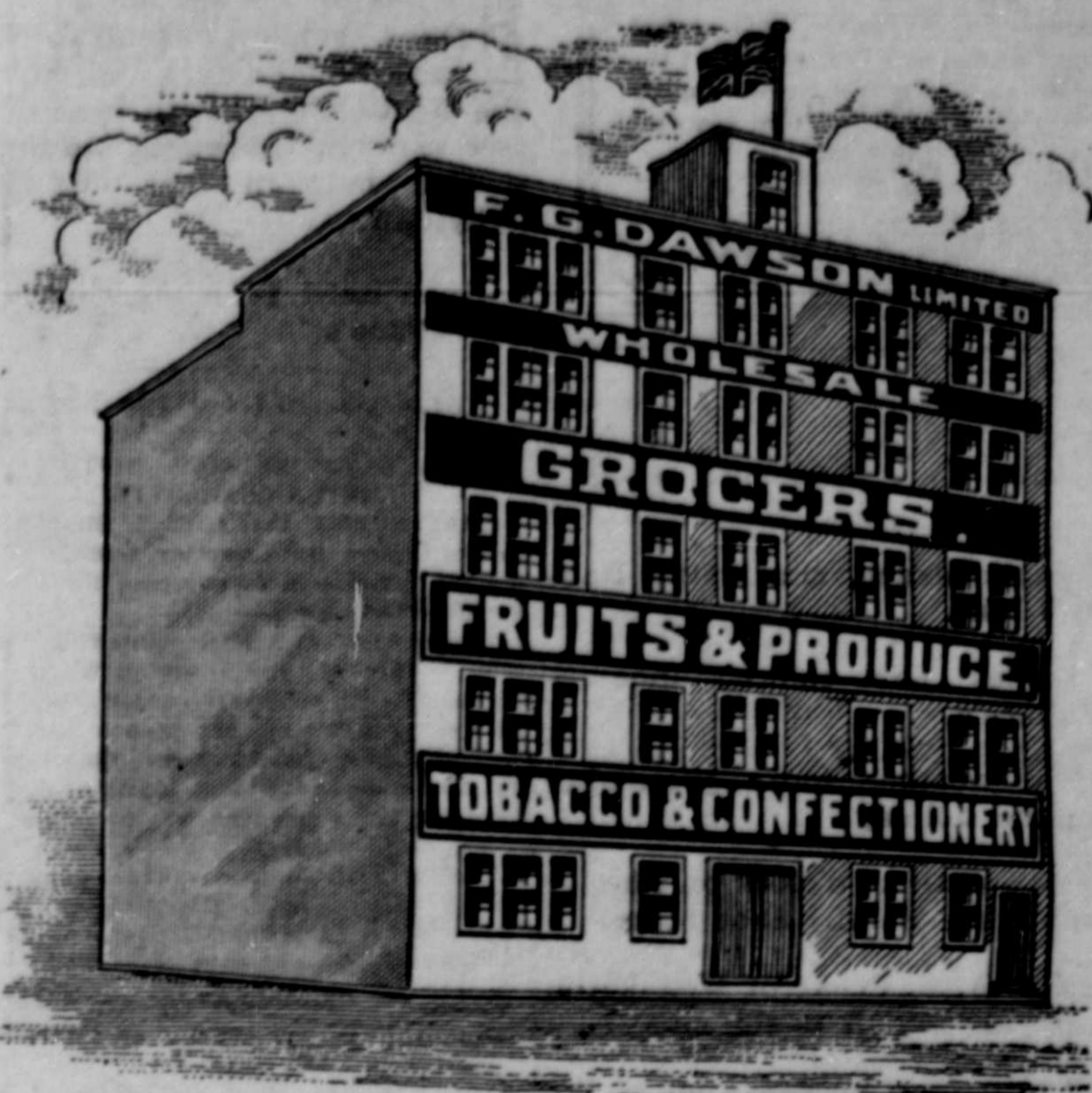

## PROCLAMATION

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern,—GREETING:

A proclamation calling for reports by the men comprised in the extension of Class 1, authorized by the regulations of 20th April, 1918, under The Military Service Act, 1917.

### AND WHEREAS

by the regulations approved by our Governor General of Canada in Council on the 20th day of April last, in the execution of the powers conferred by our War Measures Act, 1914, it is among other things in effect provided that Class I under our said Military Service Act, 1917, shall, in addition to the men included therein as in our said Act mentioned, include all men, who are by this our proclamation required to report as hereinafter described, and that all men included in the said Class I by virtue of the regulations aforesaid, shall report to the registrar or deputy registrar under our said Military Service Act, 1917, as required by proclamation, and shall be subject to military law as in such proclamation set out, and shall, in the event of their failing to report, be liable to the penalties specified in our said last mentioned Act and the regulations thereunder;

### AND WHEREAS

our Governor General of Canada in Council has determined to exercise the power so conferred to require the men of the age and description hereinafter specified, as authorized by the said regulations of 20th April last to report, and to subject them to military law at the time and in the manner by this our proclamation prescribed.

### Now, therefore, know ye

that we do hereby strictly command, require and enjoin that every man who is a British subject resident in Canada, not within any class of persons described in the exceptions mentioned in the schedule to our said Military Service Act, 1917, who has attained the age of nineteen years, but was born on or since the 15th day of October, 1907, and is unmarried or a widower without children, shall, on or before the first day of June, 1918, report in writing by registered post to the registrar or deputy registrar under our said Military Service Act, 1917, for the registry district within which he resides, his name in full, the date of his birth, and place of residence, giving his usual post office address; and that our loving subjects affected by our command and injunction aforesaid are especially charged not to fail, since not only do they owe their loyalty and allegiance to the Crown and the Empire, but moreover, lest any of our loving subjects should be ignorant of the consequences which will ensue if they fail to report within the time limited as aforesaid, we do hereby forewarn, and admonish them that any one by this our proclamation required to report who shall without reasonable excuse fail to report as aforesaid shall thereby commit an offence for which he shall be liable, on summary conviction, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years with hard labour, and he shall, nevertheless, if we so require, be compelled to serve immediately in our said Expeditionary Force.

Note: The men required to report by this proclamation should address their reports as follows:—

ONTARIO—To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, London, if they reside in the County of East, Kent, Lambton, Elgin, Middlesex, Oxford, Waterloo, Wellington, Perth, Huron, or Bruce.

To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Toronto, if they reside in the County of Lincoln, Welland, Haldimand, Norfolk, Brant, Wentworth, Halton, Peel, York, Ontario, Grey, Dufferin, Simcoe, or in the Districts of Muskoka, Parry Sound, Algoma, and Nipissing north of the Mattawa and French Rivers including the Townships of Ferris and Bonfield.

To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Kingston, if they reside in the County of Durham, Northumberland, Victoria, Peterborough, Hastings, Prince Edward, Lennox, Addington, Frontenac, Haliburton, Carleton, Dundas, Glengarry, Redfern, Russell, Stormont, Grenville, Lanark, Leeds, Prescott, or the District of Nipissing south of the Mattawa River exclusive of the Townships of Ferris and Bonfield.

To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Winnipeg, if they reside in the Districts of Kenora, Rainy River, or Thunder Bay.

QUEBEC—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Montreal, if they reside in the County of Jacques Cartier, Hochelaga, Laval, Vaudreuil, Soulanges, Napierville, Beauharnois, Chateauguy, Huntingdon, Laprairie, Argenteuil, Terrebonne, Two Mountains, Montcalm, L'Assomption, Joliette, Berthier, Maskinongé, St. Maurice, Three Rivers, St. John's, Berville, Missisquoi, Bromfield, Shefford, Rouville, Chambly, Vercheres, St. Hyacinthe, Bagot, Drummond, Rimouski, Yamaska, Nicolet, Arthabaska, Sherbrooke, and Stanstead.

To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Quebec, if they reside in the County of Wolfe, Richmond, Compton, Beaufort, Beloeil, Bonaventure, Dorchester, Gaspé, Kamouraska, Lévis, L'Islet, Champlain, Charlevoix, Chicoutimi, Montmorency, Quebec, Portneuf, Saguenay, Lotbinière, Montmagny, Matane, Megantic, Rimouski, and Temiscouata.

And we do hereby declare that all the men by this our proclamation required to report as aforesaid shall, from the date of this our proclamation, be deemed to be soldiers enlisted in the military forces of Canada and subject to military law for the duration of the present war and of demobilization thereafter unless sooner discharged; provided that every such man shall until the first day of June next be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay, and that thereafter every such man who shall have duly reported on or before the last mentioned day, as by this our proclamation required, shall be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay until the day upon which he shall be required to report for duty in the Canadian Expeditionary Force and be placed on active service. And we do hereby moreover notify and inform our loving subjects who are hereby required to report, that if, on or before the first day of June, 1918, they report, as by this our proclamation commanded and required, they will not be required to report for duty, or be placed upon active service as aforesaid until a day not earlier than the 1st day of July, 1918, which will, by our registrar or deputy registrar for the registry district in which they are hereby required to report, be notified to them in writing by registered post at their respective addresses as given in their reports, or at such substituted addresses as they may have respectively signified to our said registrar or deputy registrar; and we do hereby inform, forewarn and admonish the men hereby required to report that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient cause, fail to report for duty, at the time and place required by notice in writing so posted or as otherwise by law required he shall, be subject to the procedure, pains and penalties by law prescribed as against deserters.

Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice, rendering strict obedience to and compliance with all these our commands, directions and requirements, and governing themselves accordingly.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquess of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwicke, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter; One of Our Most Honourable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.
