What the Food Board Says.

"Food dealers, large and small, are being placed under ficence in Canada," says the Canada Food Board.

"How can that help me," asks the consumer naturally.

"Licencing keeps down profiteering. Every licencee is required at stated periods to make reports concerning his business. Most of these people are upright and patriotic; some, like Hamlet, are 'indifferent honest.'

"But the licence is the only way of catching the unscrupulous. It is the one weapon that in all the warring countries has been found to be the terror of the evildoer in business. If there is a suspicion of undue profit, an examination of the books will be ordered. The licence gives the power of the showdown. Licencing controls profits; with profits controlled, prices are only such things as will encourage production.

"If unfair profit is discovered the licence may be suspended or cancelled. And out the profiteer will have to go-for no licence, no business.

"Keeping down excessive profits is the surest way of checking the rising price of living in Canada. A fair profit must be allowed the middleman, as the chief distributor, in this vast land, or he will slide out of business. Then our last stage would be worse than our first, for it would mean starying in a land of plenty; we should have food in the Dominion without the necessary means of local distribution.' This is the idea of the Canada Food Board, and there are people in Canada who will not agree with this at all.

Money makes the mare go' No price of any commodity can be fixed steadily so long as the cost of labor cannot be fixed. It has been found that prices have at times had to be raised to be fair. Fixed prices must always be above the normal. If the price of wheat were fixed too low, production would drop andand the farmer would quit. If prices of some foods were too low to encourage production, they would disappear from the market. The burden would then fall upon the remaining food, and their price would go up. This is a fact in Canada today. The Ailies need food. Price fixing cannot win a vic-





PROCLAMATION

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern, -GREETING: A proclamation calling for reports by the men comprised in the extension of Class 1, authorized by the regulations of 20th April, 1918, under

Deputy Minister of Justice

The Military Service Act, 1917.

WHEREAS by our Proclamation seming date the 12th day o October, 1917, we did call out class our said Military Service Act and Proclamation defined or described as to the said class belonging, on active ervice in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the Defence of Canada cither in or beyond Canada, as we might in the command or direction of our mulitary forces thereafter order or

by the regulations approved by our Governor I April last, in the execution of the powers conferred by our War Measures Act, 1914. it is among other things in effect proviced that Class I under our said Military Service include all men, who are by this our proclamation recuired to report as hereinafter aforesaid, shall report to the registrar or deputy registrar under our said Military Service Act, 1917, as required by proclemation, and shall be subject to military law as in such proclamation set out, and shall, in the event of their failing to report, be liable to the penalties specified in our said last mentioned Act and the regulations

AND WHEREAS our Governor General of Canada in Council has determined to exercise the power so conferred to require the men of the age and description hereinafter specified, as authorized by the said regulations of 20th April last to report, and to subject them to military law at the time and in the manner by this our proclamatica prescribed.

Now, therefore, know ye that we do hereby strictly that every man who is a British subject resident in Canada, not within any class of persons described in the exceptions mentioned in the schedule Military Service Act, 1917, who has attained the age of nineteen years, but was born on or since the 13th day of October, 1897, and is unmarried or a widower without children, shall, on or before the first day of June, 1913, report in writing by registered post to the registrar or deputy registrar under our said Military Service Act, 1917, for the registry district within which he resides, his name in full, the date of his birth, and place of residence, giring his usual post office address; wherein our loving subjects affected by our command and injunction aforesaid are especially charged not to fail, since not only do their loyalty and allegiance By command, require and impose the obligation of careful and implicit obedience to these our strict commands and injunctions, but moreover, lest any of our loving subjects should be ignorant of the consequences which will ensue if they fail to report within the time limited as aforesaid, we do hereby forewarn, and admonish them that any one by this our proclamation required to report who shall without reasonable excuse fall to report as aforesaid shall thereby commit an offence for which he shall be liable, on summary conviction, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years with hard labour, and he shall, nevertheirs, if we so require, b compelled to serve immediately in our said Expeditionary Force.

And we do hereby declare that all the men by this our proclams that we do hereby tion required to report as aforesaid shall, from the date of this our proclamation, be deemed to be soldiers enlisted in the military lore of Canada and subject to military law for the duration of the present war and of demob ization thereafter unless sooner discharged; provided that every such man shall intil the first day June next be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay, and that ioned day, as by this our proclamation required, shall be deemed to be on leave a beence without pay until the day upon which he shall be required to report for duty in the Canadian Expeditionary Force and be piaced on active service. And we do hereby moreover notify and inform our loving subjects who are hereby required , that if, on or before the first day of June, 1918, they report, as by this our lamation commanded and enjoined, they will not be required to report for duty, or be placed upon active service as aforesaid until a day not earlier than the let day July, 1918, which will, by our registrer or deputy registrar for the registry district a which they are hereby required to report, be notified to them it writing by registers post at their respective addresses as given in their reports, or at such substitut addresses as they may have respectively signified to our said registrar or deputy registrar; and we do hereby inform, forewarn and admonish the men hereby required to report that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient cause, fail to report to futy, at the time and place required by notice in writing so posted or as otherwise by law required he shall, be subject to the procedure, pains and penalties by law prescribed as against deserters.

Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these present may converare hereby required to take notice, rendering strict obedience to and compliance with all these our commands, directions and requirements, and governing themselves nevordingly.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devoushire, of the Garter; One of Our Most Honograble Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; Governor General and Commander in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of OTTAWA, this FOURTH day of MAY in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the eighth year of Our Reign.
