Austria's Desperate Position.

(By Frank Fox) Count Czernin spoke brave words at Vienna on April 2nd. Austria, he said, would never, never desert Germany, and the two united would compel peace in the West. He condemned those people in Austria who were crying out for peace. They were foolish and despicable, and their attitude was prolonging the war.

Probably Prussia is demanding this sort of thing as part of the "political offensive" to supplement the present military offensive. The desperate position of the German Empire demands a very quick decision. a decision on "points" to use a phrase of the prize-ring, for, all the points are in favor of Germany so far. She knows however that a knock-out blow is inevitable in the near future and her only hope is to snatch a decision. Austria is compel-1 led to follow the Prussian lead. and possibly does hope seriously that the Grand Alliance will be bluffed into surrender. But the first big check to the Prussian arms will bring another cry from Austria, for truly the position of that country is desperate.

It is not only that Austria-Hungary suffers more cruelly from starvation, from exhaustion, than the German Empire; but she is faced also with domestic dissension of the most serious kind. Recent reports. coming through Switzerland, give clear and detailed accounts of the imminence of a revolutionary break-up of the Austrian Empire. 



RITISH SUB ENTERED HELIGOLAND HARBOR AND SANK U-BOAT

Washington, May 27 .- Though much has been told about the High Seas fleets, but little has been written-and less officially disclosed-about England's efficient submarine navy. 

MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917

UBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that by the effect of the regulations of the Governor General of Canada in Council of the 20th of April, 1918, and registered post, for which no Canada postage is required. the Proclamation of 4th May, 1918, recently published, every male British subject resident in Canada, till further notice. They must, however, notify the appropriate born on or since the 13th of October, 1897, who has attained or shall attain the age of 19 years and who is unmarried or a widower without children must, (unless he is within one of the classes of persons mentioned in the schedule of Exceptions to the Military Service Act) report as hereinafter directed on or before the 1st day of June, 1918, or within ten days after his 19th birthday, whichever date shall be the later.

Such report must be in writing and must give his name in full, the date of his birth and his place of residence and also his usual post office address.

The report must be addressed to the Registrar or Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act of the Registration District in which he resides (see below) and shall be sent by

Young men so reporting will not be placed on active service Registrar or Deputy Registrar of any change of residence

On receipt of the report an identification card will be forwarded by the Registrar which will protect the bearer from

Punctual compliance with these requirements is of great importance to those affected. Failure to report within the time limited will expose the delinquent to severe penalties and will in addition render him liable to immediate apprehension for Military Service.

ISSUED BY TIE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE MILITARY SERVICE BRANCH, this 15th day of May, 1918.
