SUBMARINES ARE BUSYING UNCLE SAM ON EASTERN COAST--FRANCE CHEERFUL

GERMANS HAVE GAINED NO GROUND SINCE YESTERDAY

REUTER'S CORRESPONDENT GIVES GOOD NEWS TO NERVOUS ONES--HEAVY FIGHTING STILL CONTINUES AT POINTS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 4.—Tonight's report is the most hopeful since the beginning of the big battle started by the Germans. Since Monday it has seemed that the Germans were determined to advance at all costs, and gain their objective. But today they are faced with the fact that they have not made any progress at any point. Reuter's correspondent with the French staff sends through to the world a very optimistic note.

Will the Allies Strike?

Paris, June 4.—Some of the leading Paris newspapers, well versed in the matter of the big offensive are declaring to the public that a big offensive on the part of the Allied armies is near at hand. These papers express the conviction that Generals Foch and Pétain, whose value as strategists has long been recognized, and who proved themselves good offensive men in the subordinate commands, will display some qualities now that so much is expected of them from the whole world.

CONVICT BATTALIONS LATEST IN GERMANY

Washington, June 4.—As an indication of the effort being made by Germany to meet the strain of her man-power, convict battalions are being formed, according to a despatch received by the State Department today, quoting a neutral newspaper. Other drastic measures are being taken, according to the article, including the stripping of munition factories of men and the substitution of women, children and prisoners of the garrisons along the Dutch frontier and from the Roumanian front to the west. The latter troops have been described as being unfit for intensive action, because of the "soft war" of recent months on the southern front.

PREMIER OLIVER SAYS C. N. R. ARBITRATION BOARD AWARD WRONG

Toronto, June 4.—That the award of \$10,800,000 made by the Arbitration Board to the Canadian Northern Railway is indefensible was the opinion expressed by the Hon. John Oliver, Premier of British Columbia. Mr. Oliver, accompanied by Mrs. Oliver, was at the King Edward Hotel, en route to Victoria.

"I do not think they are entitled to anything at all, much less something over \$10,000,000," said Mr. Oliver. "The value is not in the road."

ENEMY STOPPED ON THE FRONT FACING PARIS

Pivotal Points Scene of Hard Fighting for Position—Advance is Halted.

(Special to The Daily News.)

With the French Army in the field, June 4.—With every step taken by the Germans the resistance of the Allied armies is growing. All along the entire front facing Paris the reserves of the Allies are wending their way to the scene of the conflict and already their strength has been felt.

The Germans have crossed the Dormans-Rheims road along the eastern side of the salient. The town of Villeen Tardenois which was the object of a serious attack some days ago with large masses of German artillery has been evacuated. Engagements are reported to the southern end of the town.

The Germans have accentuated their movement to the south of the forest of Viller Cotterets and in the valley of the Orocq, and at the same time are attempting to push forward to the north, between the Aisne and Oise rivers. This is indicated clearly by their concentrations of troops, which are clearly discernible to the Allied aviators.

While the battle in the Marne region rages furiously there are indications that the enemy is at the end of his advance. Fresh French troops have taken their places in the battle line, according to official communications from General Headquarters today.

Guess Again.

The Germans claim that these troops which have been placed in these positions are the same ones which experienced some reverses at other points. They claim that they were not able to hold the places assigned to them.

French and British Gain.

Paris, June 4.—The battle in France was renewed with great intensity during the night and day. The Germans have been checked west of Soissons. In the region south of Ville en Tardenois the Franco-British maintained all their gains.

HUNS CAN'T EVEN REPORT ADVANCE ON BATTLE LINE

Air Service Absorbs all the Official Language from Enemy's Headquarters.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, June 4.—On the Marne battlefield between the Marne and the city of Rheims the situation as to the disposition of the troops remains unchanged. The railways of the Franco-British forces leading toward the battlefield and which were strongly congested by the movement of troops and of war material, were successfully bombed by squadrons from our aerial service. The enemy attempted to bring to the rescue different squadrons from behind the lines. The warfare in the air resulted in our bringing down over thirty of the enemy's airplanes.

London, May 31.—Sir Gilbert Parker, the author, has resigned his seat in parliament. It is understood that Sir William Weir, secretary of state for the air forces, will be the government candidate at a by-election in the Gravesend district to fill the vacancy. Sir Gilbert has been a member of parliament for Gravesend since 1900.

NEW YORK IS DRAWN NEARER TO THE ZONE OF WORLD WAR

ENEMY SUBMARINES SINK SHIPS NEAR COASTAL POINTS AND HIDE--S.S. CAROLINA TORPEDOED AND PASSENGERS ARE MISSING

(Special to The Daily News)

New York, June 4.—It has been definitely established that eight vessels have been sunk by two German super-submarines operating in the territory about seventy-five miles to the southeast of the highlands of New Jersey. Many smaller craft were included in the sinkings, and the steamship Carolina, which carried passengers to the number of two hundred and twenty. The crew consisted of about one hundred and thirty men. When the boat

was sunk, these with the passengers took to the lifeboats, since which, no information has been available.

Despatches also indicate that apparently the Hun is afraid to draw too near to Uncle Sam's seaboard, since not one transport has been attacked which has recently sailed from prominent ports. Effective measures are immediately being taken by the naval authorities to hunt out the monsters, that they may pay the penalty which they deserve.

STEWART NOTES

O. B. Bush of the Bush mine, has returned from a trip to the south, also H. McGuire, who is interested in mining properties on the Salmon river.

Road Foreman Frank Martin is getting his crew together preparatory to commencing the season's work, the initial undertaking being the installation of a new span in the Bear river bridge.

The Bunting Group of five claims adjoining the Bush mine has been bonded to R. K. Neill, a cash payment has been made and development work will start immediately.

T. McLeod of the Canadian Northern system, has spent a week in the neighborhood, he inspected the roadbed, wharf and other property of the Canadian North Eastern Ry., which although unused for the past few years is in excellent condition.

The development of two molybdenite properties is under way, the Fitzgerald brothers are at work on their claims across the Bear river pass, and J. W. Stewart is preparing a shipment of five tons of ore from the Gulch claim at the mouth of the river.

A successful concert and dance was held at the schoolhouse on the evening of Empire Day, under the auspices of the Juvenile Navy League, and supervised by Mrs. Fred Young and Mrs. Harry Gibson. A noteworthy feature of the entertainment was the rendering of a patriotic march and song by a bevy of young ladies representing the allied nations. A substantial sum was raised for the funds of the league.

SUBMARINE INSURANCE

The United States government insures vessels and cargoes passing through the submarine danger zone.

When this insurance was first instituted, the rate was six per cent. It came down by easy stages to three per cent., then to two per cent. Within the past few days it has been reduced to one and a half per cent.

The American government is not doing this business at a loss. As a matter of fact, there has been a rather handsome profit.

The lowering of the insurance rate is, therefore, an exact criterion of the extent to which the American government thinks the submarine peril has been overcome. And the American government is in a position to know.

Washington at present is willing to bet \$1,000 to \$1.50 that a vessel starting from New York will reach Liverpool safely. This gives a better idea of the situation than can be derived from any statement of the weekly or monthly loss.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS ENTERTAIN FRIENDS

There was a pleasant little gathering in the K. P. Hall last evening. The lodge after conferring degrees and transacting general business closed at about nine thirty and the room made ready for a social evening. Harvey's orchestra was present and added much to the pleasure of the occasion. The knights had invited a goodly number of guests, and their presence added in no small way to the festivities of the evening. The first part of the evening was given over to a short programme and then dancing was indulged in till a late hour. The general opinion expressed by those present was to the effect that the knights had made good as hosts.

THE POLICE COURT

There were a few cases to come up in the police court this morning. Some few of the cases had been held over for the holiday.

Lizzie Derrick, a native who arrived in the city on Sunday evening from Hazelton, was up in the court on a charge of intoxication. Mr. Harry Cromley, steward at the Empress Club, assured the court that he was kept busy with his duties which were listened to by the court. The decision finally rendered was to the effect that it might be possible to locate a more suitable job and hence one week was granted for this purpose.

Mr. Bets who was up about a week ago was again before the authorities. He produced a certificate from a local physician to the effect that his health would not permit of manual labor. This being the case one month was given to see if something suitable could not be found.

"TOO LATE!"

How long are the Allies to sit by and watch Germany win the war? For win the war she will if she establishes her domination of Russia, and the Allies are sitting by and watching her do it. How long are the Allies to go on delivering the next generation, the future of the world, bound hand and foot into Germany's prison-house? For if Germany controls Russia, then the future is hers. How long are the Allies to watch Germany making herself irresistible in the next war which she is already arranging? For irresistible she will be if the German Empire extends from the Baltic Sea to the Pacific Ocean.

"The war will be won in the west." But if it is won only in the west it will be lost. If it is won only in the west we shall have done nothing except check temporarily, at a terrible price, Germany's movement against France and Belgium, and we shall have handed over to her, with incredible generosity, the means to make certainly successful her next movement against France and Belgium—and England, and Canada, and Brazil, and the United States.

Two years and a half ago Mr. Lloyd George made that memorable complaint that in everything the Allies had done they had always been "too late." Are they to be too late again, and now fatally too late? Are they to be too late where tardiness is crucial and pivotal? Are they to wait while Germany swiftly molds the pliable mass of Russia into the new German Empire? Why, if they let her do that, Germany could actually afford to admit defeat on the western front, to let the Allies have nearly everything they wanted, Alsace-Lorraine included—even the Trentino; for in the next war she could take Alsace-Lorraine and the Trentino back again with hardly an effort. Next war? There would not be a next war; it would be not a war but a promenade of the one great world empire over the bodies of the democratic nations.

What does the rapidly pro-

gressing annexation of Russia mean to us? Is it merely one more country swallowed in the German maw, merely a larger Roumania or Belgium? No, it is something of vastly greater meaning. Russia within the German Empire, Russia even dominated from the outside by the German Empire, means the mightiest military empire the world has ever seen, an empire beside which the present German Empire will seem small and not very powerful by comparison. To what ends will the strength of that vaster empire be directed? To the same ends as those for which the strength of the present and lesser German Empire has been directed, and we have learned what they are in a terrible school. From Hamburg to Vladivostok the Hohenzollern mind will direct energies and powers fifty-fold what it has been able to direct in this war, direct them toward the conquest of the whole world from Hudson's Bay to Cape Horn, from Norway to the Cape of Good Hope, from Manchuria to Australia.

We must help Russia—not the Bolsheviks—because if we do not help Russia we, or at any rate our children, will be lost. And to help her we must cease to suspect each other, cease to say that we are the only one of the Allies whose motives are pure, when in fact we know nothing of the kind. This great emergency of the world, on which the future of everything we hold dear depends, is one to be dealt with by the tools at hand, whether American, British, French, Chinese, or Japanese, or all together.—New York Times.

Staffs Heavily Reduced by War

MORE than half the men in the banks of Canada are now on military service, and the number which remains is being steadily reduced.

Women clerks have been employed in thousands and have done splendidly, but they have not the experience of the men they replace. It would be out of the question to expect them to work as rapidly or with the same knowledge of banking as officers of many years training in the profession.

The drain upon the number of experienced officers has now reached a point where it is necessary to ask the public to take into consideration this decrease in efficiency, and to lighten, as far as they can, the burden thus thrown upon those left to run the business. Canada was never so busy as now and the volume of banking business is greater than ever before.

How the Public Can Help

Transact your banking business in the morning as far as possible, and as early as possible. Try to avoid a rush at closing time.

Do not draw any more cheques than are absolutely necessary. Instead of paying small accounts by cheque, draw the money in one amount and pay in cash.

Change in Banking Hours June 1st.

On and after June 1st banking hours will be: 9.30 to 2.30; Saturdays 9.30 to 12.00.

This arrangement will give the staff more time to complete the large amount of work which cannot be taken up until after the office is closed to the public.

Special Services Discontinued July 1st.

Certain services must of necessity be discontinued, for a time at least.

On July 1st banks will discontinue receiving payments for tax bills and the bills of gas, electric and other public service corporations.

The banks desire to render all essential services including many special ones arising out of the war. In order to do this they make this appeal for co-operation in the manner suggested above

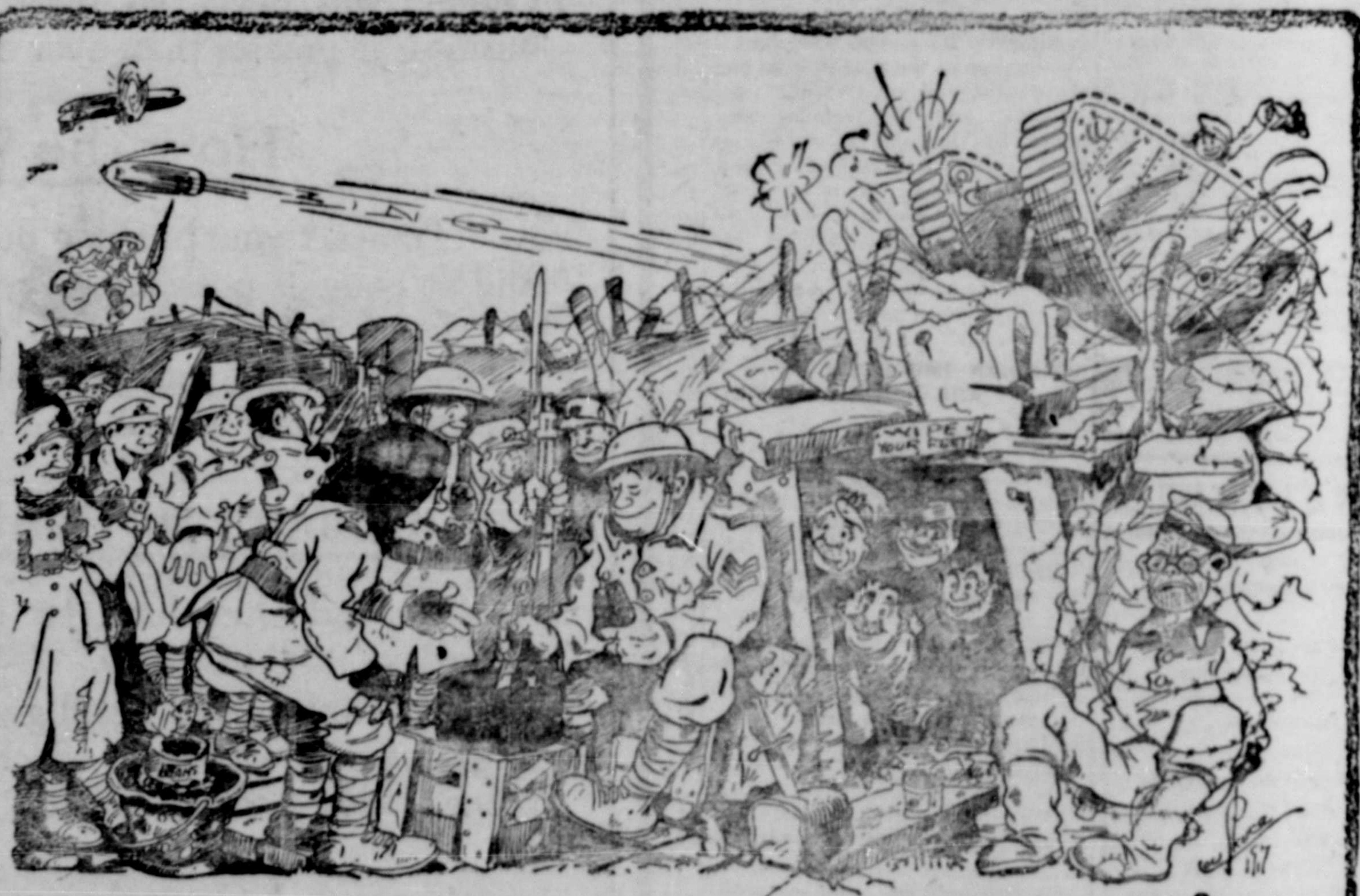
