## THE BIG GERMAN OFFENSIVE SEEMS OVER

### NO DELAY PERMITTED IN THE SENDING OF AMERICAN TROOPS AND MUNITION'S

#### ENEMY EFFORT SLACKENS ON THE WESTERN FRONT

COMPARATIVE QUIET PREVAILS AT ALL POINTS—GERMANS EXERT SOME PRESSURE ON THE WESTERN FLANK—GERMANS PAY FEARFUL PENALTY

(Special to The Daily News.)  
With the French Armies, June 6.—Two roads leave Chateau Thierry westward towards Paris. One is the main highway along the Marne, which is strongly held, and in any case could be covered from the south bank of the river. The other gateway is the upper road through the hilly country passing Montreuil Auxilions. On Monday the enemy made an attempt to debouch from Chateau Thierry by the latter way but was stopped short by the massed fire of the French batteries. Further to the north there is a noticeable slackening in the violence of the battle.

Yesterday's battle was the most equal seen in this stage of the offensive. We lost Flavorelles and won it again. This village had been before recaptured. We also regained Hill 136, to the west of Passy, and broke attacks against Corcy, Tresnes and Torcy.

**WEDDING BELLS**  
A quiet little wedding was solemnized yesterday afternoon in St. Andrew's Church. Mr. Arthur B. W. Wright, a returned soldier who is now located at Anyox, and Miss Della Hicks of Vancouver, who arrived on the boat yesterday morning, were quietly presented before the altar and took the marriage vows. The couple were supported by Mr. George Leek, one of the well known returned soldiers from the city, and Mrs. Gallaway of Anyox. The happy couple received the congratulations of friends and left on the boat last evening for Anyox where they will take up their residence.

Visitors in the city who have travelled extensively in the eastern part of Canada and the United States remarked that there seemed to be little evidence in Prince Rupert of a food shortage. In some places where they stopped they were unable to get anything but brown sugar, and in several places no white bread was in evidence at all. Sugar is retained in some places in a two-pound quantity, and then only is obtainable when purchased with a quantity of other groceries.

#### RUPERT IS BECOMING GREAT LUMBER CENTRE

During the past few weeks there has been considerable active development in the matter of the local lumber trade. For some time past there has been great activity on the Queen Charlotte Islands, and this opening up of these areas for the production of aeroplane spruce is making considerable difference to this centre.

In increasing quantities lumber is being handled at this junction and there bids fair to be a vast development in this connection in the near future.

As an indication of how the trade is growing a few figures may not be amiss. Since the 25th of May 36 carloads of aeroplane spruce have been shipped through this port, and soon there will be another large shipment ready. The tug Commodore left the Islands yesterday with a tow of about 395,000 feet of aeroplane lumber, which will be shipped over the railroad from here. In addition to this a scow arrived from Georgetown yesterday with 40,000, and one from Swanson Bay with 40,000, which has to be transferred here. Provision has been made by the Grand Trunk for the installation of additional machinery whereby this lumber may be handled and everything points to the anticipation of a good, brisk trade in the near future.

Mr. Thompson of the Munitions Board, who has the matter of transportation in hand, looks very encouragingly for a large amount of business in the line which has just been referred to. When the new mill begins operation which it is expected will be the case in a few days now, we may look for the employment of a large number of hands whose occupation will result because of this trade.

#### PRAIRIE CROPS

The reports from the prairies on the crop situation are very optimistic. In some quarters there have been light frosts, but these have not in any way interfered with the outlook and indications are that there will be a record crop.

The question of securing labor to put in the crop seemed at first one that would be hard to solve, but such large numbers of boys from the various schools in the country enlisted in a large measure. Most of the districts report a large increase in the acreage under cultivation, and favorable weather conditions prove favorable, much will be done to assist the Allies in the solution of their food problems.

#### PRESSURE BY GERMANS ON THE WESTERN FLANK

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, June 6.—The entire pressure of the enemy now appears to have been upon the western flank, where he is making the greatest of efforts to straighten out the bulge in his lines occasioned by the determined resistance of the Allies.

All of the efforts put forth by the Germans to advance in the French sectors have been repelled. Ground has been retaken by the French and prisoners gathered in.

#### NOT A SHIP DELAYED FOR WANT OF CREW

London, June 5.—The British and Foreign Sailors' Society held a meeting at Albert Hall last night on the occasion of the second anniversary of the Battle of Jutland. Field Marshal Haig sent this telegram:

"We rejoice in your gallant deeds. As on the seas, you never have failed us, so on the land our army will not fail you."

Admiral Viscount Jellicoe, addressing the meeting, paid a warm tribute to the work of the mercantile marine, saying that it was as a result of its efforts that Great Britain today was so well fed and clothed and enjoyed such comforts. Alluding to the submarine campaign, the admiral said the stories concerning sailors, both British and foreign, whose ships had been torpedoed who had been subjected to gunfire, abandoned to the sea or drowned intentionally by the enemy in the hope of destroying their morale seemed incredible. Yet never a man flinched. Never was a ship delayed for want of a crew. There was no parallel in the history of the sea for such murder, but the British sailor was unconquered. Each time his ship was torpedoed he went to sea again.

The Marquis of Crewe, who presided at the meeting, read a telegram from King George congratulating the society.

#### FOCH IN NO DOUBT AS TO THE RESULT

Paris, June 4.—The following story is told, illustrative of the confidence of the Allied generalissimo in his armies:

When General Foch recently visited Dunkirk, the mayor said to him:

"General, you saved Flanders in 1914. You won't leave it in danger in 1918?"

Foch replied: "When one remembers how we stopped the enemy four years ago, one must entertain no doubt—with the means we have at our disposal today."

#### THE GERMAN SUBS STILL PERSIST ON EAST COAST

TWO MORE SHIPS SUNK—TOTAL NOW STANDS AT THIRTEEN—SECRETARY DANIELS SAYS NO CHANGE MADE IN PLANS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Washington, June 6.—The sinking of the Norwegian steamer Gibs about forty miles off the Virginia coast yesterday afternoon was reported by the Navy Department. The crews were all rescued. The manner of attack is not described in the announcement nor is there any intelligence as to whether she was conveyed.

Secretary Daniels of the Navy Department, made an announcement today which will be reassuring to those who are worried over the success of the sub off the American coast. Among other

things he said: "Whatever the purpose of the submarine off the Atlantic coast, whatever the number of submarines which may hereafter come to American waters, there will be no check on the flow of men and munitions from this country to the scene of war in France."

**Two More Gone.**  
News of the fate of two more victims was made known yesterday. The "Richard Baird" was sunk by bombs, while the schooner Desause was found floating bottom upwards off the Delaware coast. The total now stands at thirteen.

#### FURLOUGHS CANCELLED BY FRENCH PREMIER

Paris, June 4.—The military critics, says a Havas Agency review today, still view the situation as serious but considers the signs increasingly reassuring. The most important development is regarded as the enemy's attempt to advance westward and push toward Paris, thus, it is considered, revealing his strategic intentions unmistakably.

In greeting a delegation of Socialist deputies, Premier Clemenceau voiced his absolute confidence in the issue of the present operations. He gave the deputies details which made an excellent impression.

Premier Clemenceau in his capacity of war minister, has issued an order suspending until further notice all furloughs and leaves of absence in the army.

#### BRIEF DESPATCHES

London, June 6.—In the repulse of the raid attempted by the enemy in the early morning in the neighborhood of Morlencourt, we were successful in the capture of twenty-two prisoners and three machine guns.

London, June 6.—Several persons were killed by an explosion, or were drowned, in the capsizing of a boat from the "Kenilworth Castle" which reached a London port today, in a crippled condition as the result of a collision.

Paris, June 6.—Three French aviators were killed at Alberon today when two airplanes collided.

Panama, June 6.—Dr. Raymond Valdez, president of the republic of Panama, is dead.

Indianapolis.—Charles Warren Fairbanks died last night.

Vancouver, June 6.—From reliable sources it is learned that there is no foundation for the rumor that there is a submarine base in the vicinity.

**THE IMMENSITY OF IT**

Prince Rupert these days is left in a quiet eddy of the great and turbulent world-stream, only tiny ripples reaching us of the mighty storms upheaving the rest of this planet. Fortunately so that we are so removed, for in the larger centres of population there is soul-tearing perplexity where the next bolt may fall. In London and in Paris they can hear on a clear day the murderous roar of the cannon at the front daily swirling out of existence thousands of human lives. Also, there is the constant bombing to tingle the nerves and keep minds fixed on the dire tragedies happening every moment. Even New York, far distant as it is from the seat of war, has this week had the great struggle brought to its very doors by the submarine activity just outside its harbor. In all the larger communities the war is the all-absorbing topic of all conversation. And very justly so from every point of view, for it is the greatest news event that has happened in human history. Its immensity staggers even the imagination, and reason balks in every effort to comprehend it. Take and try to analyse, for instance, one little fact, that there are today fifty millions of men under arms. Fifty millions! At a great review, or a famous football match or other great event, some few of us have seen fifty thousand people assembled at one time and in one place. Call up the picture of this in your mind, and resolutely command your mental faculties to multiply this picture to one of fifty million. Can it be done? And even though some super-brain among us be able to compass this there is still more to come. That fifty million of men on the fighting line has each behind him four other men, the workers, the railway builders, the freighters, the cooks and waiters and the great army of doctors and nurses. Altogether two hundred and fifty millions of men, or about three-quarters of the working population of the entire world,

have been withdrawn from peaceful productive industry for these years to engage in the destructive work of killing their kind. Even then the sum total is not reached, for behind these hundreds of millions of fighters and war workers are their families and the innumerable thinkers, hoppers, planners, demanders. No, the sum is far too hard for ordinary minds to puzzle out in all its ramifications. But, as an exercise of mental force, just try to visualize two hundred and fifty millions of men. The resulting picture cannot fail to be of interest.

**RANDOM BITS**

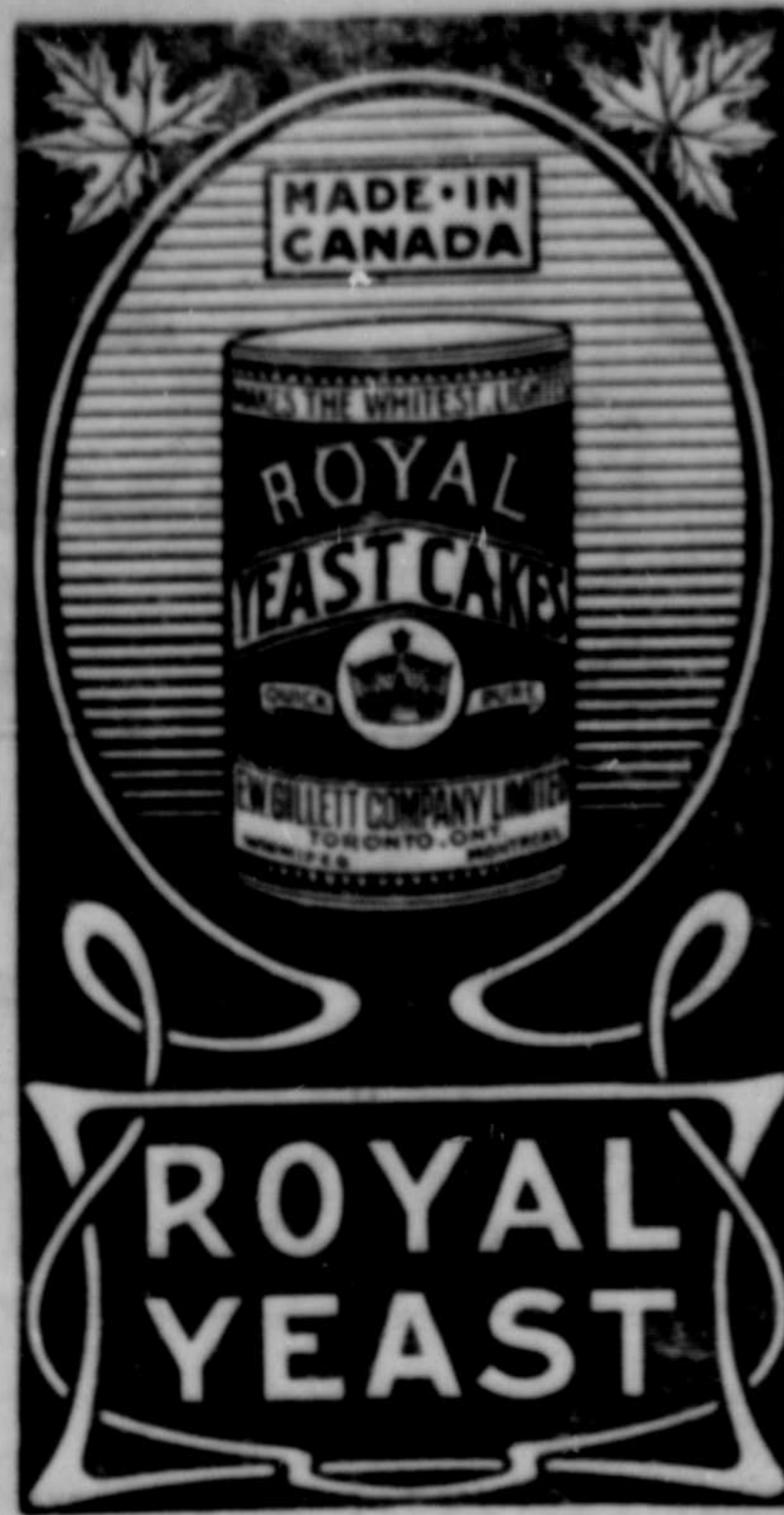
You're proud of your pals in the army, but what do your pals think of you?

If there is at any time a tendency towards pessimism in this country consider the bravery, the supreme confidence of France under fire and let us forge courageously ahead to the completion of our task.

Madame Schumann-Heink, the famous cantatrice, sang to an audience of 20,000 people at San Diego, Cal., on Sunday, at the municipal organ of that city. The occasion was a mass meeting held under the auspices of the American Red Cross, and when she had finished singing the diva gave a brief talk and made a stirring appeal for funds for the Red Cross. In the course of her address the singer announced that she expects to sail for France in the latter part of July as a Red Cross worker. She will be entirely at the disposal of the Red Cross and hopes to remain at the front for the duration of the war, she stated. During the recital a number of soldiers passed a collection plate, consisting of a huge American flag, and obtained over \$7,000 in donations.

**BRITISH HONOR AMERICANS**

Headquarters of the American troops with the British Army in France, June 4—The British Military Cross has been awarded to eleven American officers and



the Military Medal to four men. Most of the officers took part in the defense of the Luce Valley during the great German attack in March, being incorporated in the improvised army of Major-General Carey, which held back the Germans for six days after they had broken through the British line in the region of St. Quentin.

The four privates are cited for heroic conduct on the night of February 23rd. At great risk they removed a burning car of munitions from an ammunition dump and placed it under a stand-pipe, flooding the car and extinguishing the flames.

## ENEMY AVIATORS SHIRK FIGHTING

Canadian officers in the Royal Flying Corps who have just returned from the western front on their way home for a rest say that the British have held the supremacy in the air since August, 1917. Up till that time it was change and change about. Sometimes the Germans were supreme and then the British would take control for a time.

They say that the star flyers like Richthoven, who was killed recently, will always fight, but the average Hun aviator will only attack when he has the superiority of numbers or class of machine on his side. About one Hun out of ten will face a fight at the present time with the British fighting planes. Even when their cities have been attacked and their aerodromes bombed they have declined to climb up and fight.

One British pilot was so disgusted at the lack of pluck exhibited by the enemy airmen that he flew over a German aerodrome at a low altitude and fired his gun at the hangar to attract attention. He then dropped a parcel with the following message inside:

"If you won't come up here to fight, herewith one pair of boots for work on the ground."

Rising into the mist he waited for the inevitable curious party who came out of the shed to examine the parcel and then threw a bomb among them.

The British S. E. 5, which is the rival of the German Albatross battleplane, can climb 15,000 feet in fifteen minutes, travel at 140 miles, and dive at 250 miles an hour. According to the Canadian officers the British Government is building a new machine which is reported to be able to develop a speed of 165 miles, and climb 15,000 feet in eleven minutes. The German bombing machine, the Gotha, carries four guns against the three carried on the Handley Page machine. Most of the fighting takes place at an altitude from 15,000 to 20,000 feet, because the atmosphere is too cold for flying higher up.

## Invites the Co-Operation of the Public on Behalf of the Banks

### Staffs Heavily Reduced by War

**M**ORE than half the men in the banks of Canada are now on military service, and the number which remains is being steadily reduced.

Women clerks have been employed in thousands and have done splendidly, but they have not the experience of the men they replace. It would be out of the question to expect them to work as rapidly or with the same knowledge of banking as officers of many years training in the profession.

The drain upon the number of experienced officers has now reached a point where it is necessary to ask the public to take into consideration this decrease in efficiency, and to lighten, as far as they can, the burden thus thrown upon those left to run the business. Canada was never so busy as now and the volume of banking business is greater than ever before.

### How the Public Can Help

Transact your banking business in the morning as far as possible, and as early as possible. Try to avoid a rush at closing time.

Do not draw any more cheques than are absolutely necessary. Instead of paying small accounts by cheque, draw the money in one amount and pay in cash.

### Change in Banking Hours June 1st.

On and after June 1st banking hours will be: 9.30 to 2.30; Saturdays 9.30 to 12.00.

This arrangement will give the staff more time to complete the large amount of work which cannot be taken up until after the office is closed to the public.

### Special Services Discontinued July 1st.

Certain services must of necessity be discontinued, for a time at least.

On July 1st banks will discontinue receiving payments for tax bills and the bills of gas, electric and other public service corporations.

*The banks desire to render all essential services including many special ones arising out of the war. In order to do this they make this appeal for co-operation in the manner suggested above*

# Canada's Registration

## Its Purpose and Application

CANADA faces the gravest crisis in her history. Four years of war have taken from the Dominion a heavy toll in talent and labor, yet despite the shortage of man power, our Allies still depend on Canada to maintain her own

fighting forces at full strength and to increase her exports of food and war materials, so vital to them, and to the successful prosecution of the war.

Every ounce by which Canada can increase her food production and every ounce Canada can save in her food consumption is needed for export to the Allies.

Should the war continue for another year, food cards and a rationing system may have to be instituted. It is the duty of Canada to be prepared for whatever situation circumstances may force upon her.

It is quite probable that before the war is won our Government may have to place restrictions upon the occupations in which men and women may engage. In such an event the Government wishes to be in a position to render all possible assistance in keeping our population usefully and profitably employed.

## Registration Day, June 22nd

These conditions point to the necessity of Canada knowing the exact capabilities of her men and women at home.

All persons residing in Canada, male or female, British or alien of 16 years and over, will be required to register on June 22nd and truthfully answer the questions set forth upon the registration card.

It is not the Government's intention to conscript labour in any form, but to assist in directing it wisely, so that every available unit of

human energy may be utilized to the best advantage.

The information procured through registration will be used—as an aid to the Military Authorities in procuring the men necessary to maintain "Canada's First Line of Defence"—to mobilize all units of available labor in the Dominion and direct them from less essential to more essential occupations—to establish and intelligently administer a system of food rationing should that become necessary.
