# TWO CENT ADVANCE IN GAS TODAY

## SEARCH FOR LIARD RIVER PLACER GOLD IN FULL SWING

### No Explanation Given For Unexpected Boost In Motor Fuel Price

Managers of Oil Companies Can Give No Explanation of Instructions—Some Dealers See Sequel to Increase in Tax By B. C. Government

VANCOUVER, July 7.—The public of British Columbia received a jolt this morning by an unexpected advance of two cents per gallon in the price of gasoline. Advices from Eastern Canada are to the effect that the advance is confined to British Columbia. Some dealers here hold the theory that the rise is due to the effort on the part of oil companies to force the British Columbia government to take off the last two cent addition to the gasoline tax.

Local managers give no official explanation, stating that the increase results from orders from their various headquarters.

### SINKING OF SUBMARINE

French Undersea Craft Promethee Goes Down Today With 66 Men on Board

PARIS, July 7.—The French submarine Promethee, with 66 men on board, sank off Cherbourg Harbor today. Seven men were saved.

Included in the crew of the undersea craft were 17 engineers and workers not permanently assigned to the ship.

The Promethee was one of the newer submarines completed in 1930. She was 301 feet long.

### LITTLE BOY LOSES LIFE

18-Month Old Oddmund Hansen is Drowned in Shallow Ditch Near Home on Alfred Street

An inquest is to be held today before Deputy Coroner Lancaster into the death of eighteen-month old Oddmund Hansen, small son of Mr. and Mrs. Hanson, Alfred Street, who was drowned yesterday when he apparently fell head first into a ditch containing about a foot of water while playing near his home.

Supposedly about half an hour after the tragedy occurred, the little boy was found in the ditch by playmates who informed Mrs. J. K. Murray who, in turn, notified a doctor. Life was extinct on arrival at the scene of Dr. W. T. Kergin.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers. The little boy's father is a fisherman aboard the American halibut boat Wave which is now in port.

After the opening of the inquest before Deputy Coroner A. J. Lancaster, the jury proceeded to view the body and the scene of the drowning.

### REMO IS FERTILE

Is First Agricultural Centre Along Canadian National East of Prince Rupert

### Bottom Land

Garden Vegetables and Small Fruit, Particularly Strawberries, Do Well There

(By C. Lindstrom)

As one travels east on the Canadian National Railways from Prince Rupert, Remo is the first agricultural centre one comes to.

Remo is one of the first settlements on the lower Skeena River, having been first known as Bateman's Landing and later as Breckenridge during the steamboat days. Remo now boasts a school and a Farmers' Institute, there having been a post office there since the steamboat days.

Remo is located 85 miles east of Prince Rupert at the western end of the Lakelse Valley on the south side of the Skeena and at the mouth of the Zymacord River on the north side. The agricultural land is all river bottom land consisting of sandy loam.

All garden vegetables and small fruits do exceedingly well. The land being sub-irrigated, there is always plenty of moisture. Strawberries do exceptionally well. Apple and other fruit trees also do well.

The first planting of strawberries in Remo was made in the fall of 1906 from plants obtained from the old Thornhill place at Little Canyon and were put into the ground when there was about an inch of snow and they came through the winter in fine shape. Remo has enough snow to offset the winter frost, it being common for potatoes to lay in the ground all winter and grow the following spring.

### VANCOUVER PLANE BACK

Newspaper Ship Flew From Montreal to Vancouver In Three Days' Time

VANCOUVER, July 7.—The plane "Vancouver Sun" landed at Sea Island airport here at 1:10 yesterday afternoon after completing a trans-Canada flight from Montreal which was started by Pilots R. H. Storer and B. E. Ronald on Monday morning.

The plane stopped at Grand Forks Tuesday night.

### Preliminary Plans Made For Organization of Relief in City; Committee Decided On

Steps toward the establishment of a permanent public relief committee in Prince Rupert were taken at a meeting in the city council chamber last night of representatives of various organized bodies and societies of the city. After hearing several speakers deal with the present situation as regards distress among the unemployed and suggest possible methods of relief, the meeting decided to form a welfare committee of which Mayor C. H. Orme was named chairman and G. C. Mitchell, secretary, the mayor to add three further members to the committee. The immediate task of the committee will be to devise ways and means towards institution so far as possible of local relief measures and, in this connection, it will co-operate with all bodies desirous of assistance.

### BIG RUN OF FISH

Great Abundance of Salmon in Chignik Area of Alaska Reported by Commissioner O'Malley

JUNEAU, July 7.—Commissioner Henry O'Malley of the United States Bureau of Fisheries reports that Chignik is experiencing the greatest salmon run on record.

The commercial pack, to date, is 60,000 cases and the escapement to the spawning grounds is heavy.

Mr. O'Malley is on a tour of Alaska.

### CONFERENCE BEING HELD

Representatives of Striking Fishermen and Cannery Interests Getting Together Today

With the number of Indian gill-nets which has been in progress on the Skeena River for the past three weeks steadily increasing, representatives of the striking white and Japanese fishermen and of the cannery interests were scheduled to have a conference on the Skeena River today. It was hoped that some common ground in the situation might be arrived at as a result of the meeting.

It was reported this morning that 300 Indian gill-nets were now fishing on the Skeena River. The average catch per boat yesterday was twenty fish.

### PASSING OF PARTY MAN

Frank J. Mackenzie, Former Tor Organizer For British Columbia, Dies at New Westminster

NEW WESTMINSTER, July 7.—Francis James Anderson Mackenzie, aged 59, druggist and long prominent resident of the lower Fraser Valley, died at his home at White Rock last night.

The late Mr. Mackenzie was appointed provincial organizer for the Conservative party in 1931 but re-

ired because of ill-health a few months ago.

Born in Kincardine, Ont., April 14, 1875, Mr. Mackenzie represented Delta in the provincial legislature for 11 years from 1909.

The late Mr. Mackenzie came to British Columbia as a boy and was educated in the Victoria schools. He was a former president of the British Columbia Pharmaceutical Association and a former member of the Delta school board.

He entered politics in 1907 when he was an unsuccessful candidate for Delta seat in the Legislature. Two years later, however, he was successful.

He is survived by his widow (nee Esther Edge), one son and one daughter. He was an Anglican and made his home here.

### Thirty-One Miners From Tulsequah Transported By Air Into New Field

Party Headed By J. H. Eastman Beats "Stampede John" Stenbraten Into Scurvy Creek in Race Aboard Planes

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 7.—All but four of the party of thirty-five miners destined for the Liard River district in Northern British Columbia in search of placer gold have left their base at Tulsequah and are now scattered between Lake Atlin camp, Teslin Lake and Francis Lake. They were all transported by planes.

Detroit prospector-fliers, led by J. H. Eastman, gained at least temporary control of the reported rich gold strike on Scurvy Creek on the upper Liard River.

The Eastman party had its men picking at the coarse gold on the creek while "Stampede John" Stenbraten, veteran northern prospector, was still stranded at Carcross.

On Stenbraten's arrival at Carcross from Juneau he found the Canadian Airways Junkers plane, on which he had intended to fly to Scurvy Creek, tied up by charter with Eastman while his own American pilot, Verne Gorst, was prevented from doing commercial flying with his American plane in Canada by international regulations.

Stenbraten, however, made other arrangements for getting into the strike. The Eastman planes are making their base at Atlin.

Many other prospectors are making frantic efforts to get planes in order to join in the rush for the Scurvy Creek gold.

### LESS SUN AND RAIN

Weather For This Year and Last Compared in Compilation of Official Reports

So far this year there has been 198.6 hours of sunshine in Prince Rupert as compared with 408.2 hours in the first six months of 1931. Rainfall so far this year has reached a total of 44.77 inches as against 50.57 inches in the same period of last year.

LONDON, July 7.—The Prince of Wales, who has been suffering from a chill, continues to make good progress although he still remains abed.

### JAPANESE ARE FINED

Two Men Pleaded Guilty to Charges of Intimidation in Connection With Skeena River Strike

Pleading guilty to charges of intimidation in connection with alleged cutting of fishermen's nets during the gill-nets' strike on the Skeena River, Takeichi Uyeda and Ushikiku Mizobuchi, Japanese, before Stipendiary Magistrate H. F. MacLeod in provincial police court yesterday afternoon, were each fined \$50 with option of three months' imprisonment. The fines were paid in both cases. The two accused were also ordered to pay for a \$256 net.

Another Japanese, Magozi Murita, also charged with intimidation in the same connection, was brought in from the Skeena River early this morning by Sergeant W. J. Service and Constable Robert Gibson of the provincial police and is appearing before Magistrate MacLeod this afternoon for remand for eight days.
