Indeed, General Baron von Freytag-Loringhoven, the Deputy Chief of the German General Staff and the foremost military writer in Germany, discusses the present terrible condition as though it were normal and highly desirable. But Prussia's war maniacs suffer from an incurable inability to realize that the rest of the world is determined that there shall be no next war and that the present conflict will be continued until Germany has been placed in such a position that she will have neither the desire nor the power to precipitate another such horror upon civilization.

On this point the Allies are agreed and their determination is strengthened by the knowledge that on their side are forces which when brought to their maximum strength will be irresistible. Yesterday in an address in Schenectady, Secretary Lansing said that the present task "will not be left half done. We must not transmit to posterity a legacy of blood and misery."
