

RIOTERS ARE IN CONTROL OF VIENNA CITY

GERMAN TROOPS BEING RUSHED IN TO KEEP ORDER -- AUSTRIANS HUGE LOSSES

THOUSANDS OF AUSTRIANS TRAPPED ON PIAVE RIVER

THIRTY-SIX THOUSAND TROOPS CROSS THE RIVER, WHEN THE BRIDGES BEHIND THEM ARE CARRIED AWAY—HORRIFYING CARNAGE AS ALLIED GUNS POUND ENEMY RANKS

(Special to The Daily News)
At the Italian Army Headquarters, June 21.—British airmen report that twelve of the fourteen temporary bridges were flung across the Piave river by the enemy have been carried away. Trapped on the west bank of the river, neither able to retreat nor advance, the thousands of Austrians who crossed the river are subjected to an almost continual mauling and bombing by the Italian artillery and Allied aircraft. The Austrians thus caged in have a slight advantage in their defensive positions, and are yet too well supplied with ammunition to warrant a frontal attack, although there is every possibility that, with the exhaustion of their ammunition and food supplies, together with the pounding they are undergoing, they will eventually be compelled to lay down their arms, or sacrifice themselves in desperate assaults upon the Italian lines.

Terrible Carnage.
The enemy on the lower Piave have been pushed back until they hold but one-third of their original lines in the direction of Venice. The Austrian losses along the whole front have been very heavy. The ravines on the Piave Plateau and Mont Grappa are filled up with heaps of dead. On the Piave river front, the carnage is horrifying. The current of the stream is carrying away thousands of dead, together with broken barges and pontoons, and the other parts of the wrecked bridges downstream.

Enemy Positions Stormed.
Rome, June 21.—The French forces on the Asiago Plateau stormed the Austrian positions at Berigo and Pennar. Italian troops succeeded in capturing Montalunga. From Montella to the sea, the battle of the Piave river is continuing without pause, according to an announcement made by the Italian War Office last night. The Italians forced the invaders to withdraw their whole front north of the Monte Belluna railway. More than twelve hundred Austrian prisoners have been taken and numerous machine guns were captured.

POLICE ARREST GERMAN SUBJECT AT ANYOX
After being sentenced to six months' imprisonment in the Anxox Prison Farm in the Anyox district, Hans Grutzmacher, alias John Neilson, was brought to Anyox last evening by Constable [Name] on his way south. The prisoner has all these years passed himself off as a Dane, and got away with it. Now, however, it has been proved that he had served in the German navy, and was a proper German subject. He never repented himself as an alien enemy, and it was because of this that sentence was imposed.

GERMAN REGIMENTS RUSHED TO VIENNA TO QUELL RIOTS

(Special to The Daily News)
London, June 21.—Dispatches received here from Amsterdam state that Vienna is out on strike and the whole populace is in a great state of turmoil, rioting and causing great destruction to the property in the city. At the Vulcan Arsenal and the Warschawski Aeroplane works in Vienna alone there are a hundred thousand persons on strike. Twenty German regiments have been rushed to the Austrian capital to quell the disorders, which are rapidly spreading from Vienna itself to the surrounding districts.

According to advices received in Amsterdam from German sources, the mob broke into a number of bakeries, and stoned the residence of the Premier, and also one wing of the Hofburg Palace. With the arrival of the German troops it is probable that martial law will be declared, and the severest military measures taken to restore order. The burgomaster has decided to guarantee that the citizens would return to order of their own accord, provided that the government could increase the food supply even at high prices. He demanded that a supply of dried vegetables be placed at the disposal of the City Food Officials to make up for the lack of bread, but his request has been refused by the government officials. Further dispatches are awaited.

LITTLE FIGHTING ON THE WESTERN FRONT

London, June 21.—There is but little fighting in progress on the battle fronts in France and Belgium. Artillery duels continue to be violent on the various sectors. The French troops have been successful in forcing back the German lines northwest of Chateau Thierry in the Marne region, this time without the enemy offering any resistance.

GERMAN PLANES ATTACK A BRITISH SQUADRON

London, June 21.—A squadron of the British fleet, while engaged upon a reconnaissance north of Heligoland on June 12 was attacked by German aeroplanes. No hits were made by the enemy aviators, and one of the enemy seaplanes was destroyed by gunfire.

THE PROVINCIAL GOVT. KICKS THROUGH WITH \$300 FOR SALT LAKES

Probably not in all the history of agricultural and land legislation has anything taken place of more real importance than the legislation put through at the last session of the Provincial House.

SUB HUNTERS' SUCCESS ADMITTED BY GERMANS

London, June 21.—That the U-boats are unequal to the warfare against them was virtually admitted by Captain Persius, the naval critic of the Berliner Tageblatt, says a Rotterdam dispatch to the Daily Telegraph here. Captain Persius writes: "Every layman knows that U-boat losses are unfavorable, owing to the continually increasing sharpness and effectiveness of the defence measures of the enemy, which will perhaps increase as the war progresses."

LAND SETTLEMENT AREAS IN THE OMINECA COUNTRY WILL MAKE FOR PROGRESS

In company with the Minister of Agriculture, the Hon. Mr. Barrow, Mr. D. D. Munro, and Mr. M. H. Nelems, of the Land Settlement Board, and Mr. R. C. W. Lett, colonization agent of the G.T.P., Mr. Manson spent the last week in cruising the proposed settlement area in the Bulkley Valley from the hurricane deck of a cause. The minister and the other members of the party were more than pleased with the area delimited by Mr. Munro, of the Settlement Board, a week or two ago, and with the return of the minister and the members of the board to Victoria, the settlement area in the Bulkley Valley, and a second one in the vicinity of Vanderhoof in the Nechaco Valley, will be gazetted at once.

First-Class Land.

"The proposed area in the Bulkley valley," said Mr. Manson, "is on the north side of the Bulkley river from a point about a mile or two west from the town of Telkwa to a point about fourteen miles east. The area contains about fourteen thousand acres, which will be sufficient to accommodate seventy or eighty agriculturalists and their families. The lands is a rich loam with a good subsoil, well watered, and not heavily timbered. What timber there is is poplar, with a scattering of spruce, with areas of grass land from five to fifty acres intervening. The natural vegetation is very rank. The valley may well be described as the land of the peavine and the vetch. It promises to be an ideal area for the building up of a dairy industry."

What the Board is Doing.

Under the legislation of this session, for which no small credit belongs to Mr. Manson, drastic steps may be taken to bring all the land within such settlement areas as may be established, under production. Immediately the areas have been gazetted, four of the members of the Land Settlement Board will return to the north, two to work in each area, upon the appraisal of every parcel of land within that area, taking as a unit a quarter section. The appraisal complete, notice will be sent to the land owners intimating that unless they put their land under cultivation at once and do such improvements as may be prescribed by the regulations of the Board, they will be subject to a penalty tax of 5 per cent in addition to other taxes levied. They must also list their land with the Board at the appraised value, or if they are not satisfied with the appraised value then at their own valuation, which if higher than the appraised value will at once become the assessable value.

EVERYONE MUST REGISTER

Registration is compulsory under the regulations of the Canada Registration Board, which is fixed for June 22nd. As many as possible should take advantage of the permission given to register before the date fixed. The Red Cross hut on Third Avenue has been placed at the disposal of the Registration Board and will be open from 2 until 6 in the afternoon and from 7:30 until 9:30 in the evenings to accommodate those who wish to register.

Deputy registrars who will take registrations at their offices and include, John Matheson, Cold Storage; R. M. Walker, Seal Cove mill; J. L. Christie, Stewart & Mobley; John Barnsley, Union Steamship office; N. Abercombe, Rupert Marine Iron Works; John Dybhavn, and Fred Peters, City Hall.

Increased Production.

"It will be seen that the whole aim of the act is increased production," continued Mr. Manson, "and the bringing into cultivation of the lands that have been held so long by the present day holders, to whom they were sold by the old government. In all probability, the regulations as to improvements will be a good deal more stringent for the absentees than for the resident settlers, although the improvements required by the Board will almost of necessity require residence. Under the new policy, the work of construction of roads, and other public works will be greatly facilitated. The schooling of the children will be much less costly, and the social advantages which a modern agricultural community requires, and which today are altogether absent, will be made possible.

"The settlers in the interior," Mr. Manson went on, "are well pleased with the fact that at last something tangible seems to be about to happen and they are looking forward to the development which is long overdue. To those of our pioneer settlers who have been driven off the land because of existing conditions to pursue industrial occupations in the cities, an excellent opportunity offers to return to the agricultural life and have a part in the patriotic work of increasing food production within the Empire.

"These quarter sections will be placed on the market at a very reasonable price, and only a sufficient cash payment will be required to give the settler an interest in his new home, and after the initial payment, further instalments may not be required for two or three years. The Board will have a local representative in the district to locate incoming settlers, and to look after the interests of the ones that have arrived. The activities of the Land Settlement Board ought certainly to result in increased production from British Columbia."

BIG BUSINESS EXPECTED?
 Sir John Willison, the savant of protectionism, enthused the Canadian Manufacturers' Association with the argument that the war is costing the Canadian people such an enormous sum of money that they cannot hope to pay the debt unless they are also made to pay more for manufactured goods. "The lesson," he said, "to be drawn is that we must expand our industries to the greatest extent, raise as many new enterprises as possible to handle Canada's raw material, and get more settlers for the land;" all of which, of course, was to be done by hoisting the tariff—and, incidentally, the cost of living and producing wealth. There is nothing new in the argument, nor anything surprising in the hearty appreciation of the audience. But it might have occurred to Sir John that he was demanding precisely what the other spokesman for Big Business, Sir Thomas White, says is not to be done. New industries cannot be started and old ones expanded without getting people to invest money in them, and Sir Thomas has passed an order-in-council that stock cannot be sold without his august consent, backing it up with a public declaration that what he particularly intended to prevent was the investment of money in new enterprises. If we can't pay our war debt unless new industries are started, and if Sir Thomas won't allow them to be started, it is tolerably clear what is going to happen to the country. But perhaps Sir Thomas was only talking for effect, and while he suspends the powers of the provincial legislatures and refuses to allow school districts to borrow money to build school houses, he o.k.'s the applications of his Big Business friends when they want to sell a new issue of stock. Does the need of "conserving the money to help win the war" take second place to demands from the Manufacturers' Association? Either so or Sir John Willison was proposing the impossible, and ac-

coording to Big Business the country is headed for bankruptcy.—Edmonton Bulletin.

WHERE TO BEGIN
 Sir Thomas White, Canada's Finance Minister, asserts that Canadians are spending too much on luxuries and that extravagance must cease. We entirely agree with Mr. White. We therefore beg to move, seconded by the Finance Minister, that we begin the elimination of extravagance in Canada by cutting the number of highly paid ministers of the over-manned Borden government in two, and that a reduction be made of about one-quarter in the number of high-salaried government officials on the numerous commissions that are of no use except to provide fat berths for political favorites. After that is done, a start might be made on the expense accounts of certain government dignitaries, after which we could use the pruning knife on the governmental "joyrides" of Dominion and provincial cabinet ministers over to London and Paris. The people will be behind Mr. White in his demand for economy. There's so much scope for it in governmental circles.—The Calgary Canadian.

TO FIND OUT MEASURE OF CANADA'S STRENGTH

"THE GREAT DAY" AT DAWSON CITY

About the time you receive your copy of the Daily News this afternoon, all those readers who have re-cited themselves here from Dawson, Yukon Territory—and they still form a respectable number of our community—will recall this day as it was in the metropolis on the edge of the Arctic Circle—its brilliant sunshine, cloudless skies and flowers and flowers and flowers. "There are only three seasons here," remarked an old sourdough from way down south, "winter, summer and the Fourth of July."

So all old Dawsonites now in Rupert will recall with pleasant memories how, at this hour, they were planning for the great outing and ceremony of the Yukon year. Planning to take all the children and climb the mountain immediately back of Dawson, there on the summit as midnight struck to hear a "sermon on the Mount," to feast, to dance, to sing in one huge chorus that mingled with the music of the spheres.

Then a sudden hush, the faces of all the merry-makers turned to a point in the west like sun worshippers. The great red orb sinks lower and lower behind the distant mountains, with him the daylight departs. The crowd is tensely, breathlessly watching, waiting. But for a few moments only, and a new sun pops up at nearly the same place as the old one died away—a new sun with a face like that of a boy prepared by fond mother for school. All the brass bands roar out and gay shouts greet the finale of the miracle—the death of a day; the birth of a new day.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
 Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may joint residence, but each making necessary improvements, with respective claims.
 Pre-emptors must occupy improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not due to ill-health or other cause, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after that date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
