AUSTRIANS RECROSS THE PIAVE PELL MELL

ITALIANS IN PURSUIT KEEP THEM GOING -- STRIKERS IN VIENNA MAKE TROUBLE

AUSTRIAN RETREAT TURNED INTO A COMPLETE ROUT WITH TREMENDOUS LOSSES

BIG BOOTY FALLS INTO ITALIANS' HANDS OWING TO RAPIDITY OF AUSTRIAN FLIGHT--FORTY THOUSAND TROOPS CAPTURED, AND APPALLING NUMBERS KILLED--CAVALRY PURSUE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, June 25.—The retreat of the Austrian armies along the Piave river, which began under cover of darkness on Saturday night, has developed into a complete rout along the forty mile front of the river extending from Montello to the sea. So rapid is the backward movement of the enemy that they left huge quantities of guns and equipment behind them. They are being relentlessly pursued by the Italians, who have themselves crossed the Piave to its eastern bank. The annihilation of nine Austrian divisions (108,000 men) and the capture of 45,000 prisoners and enormous stores is reported today. Entire enemy regiments have been destroyed and fifteen divisions have been worn out in the San Dona de Piave region. The total Austrian losses are now placed at more than 200,000, according to a semi-official statement. The Italian losses in killed and wounded and captured will not exceed forty thousand.

Cavalry in Action.

Washington, June 25.—Along the course of the Piave river, the Italians have thrust back the invaders of their territory, until only small units remain on the western bank and across the stream. The Italians are keeping well upon the heels of the retreating enemy who are fleeing in disorder. Again the cavalry have been thrown into the fighting and are sorely pressing the enemy. Italian troops have crossed the Piave river and are keeping up the pursuit of the fleeing Austrians, preventing them from having any chance to reform their broken ranks. This precipitous retreat of such a large body of troops has thrown the whole Austrian rear into confusion, and their reserves have not waited to make a stand, or to cover the retreat of their comrades in the front lines.

A report from General Diaz, the commander, is to the effect that the Austrian losses in the retreat across the Piave include an appalling number of troops killed, more than forty thousand more captured, and an enormous amount of war booty.

Vienna's Announcement.

Vienna, June 25.—The War Office today announces the evacuation of Montello and the right bank of the Piave river by the Austrian troops.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

There was a very short meeting of the city council last evening. Several of the chairs which are usually occupied were vacant, and there was not very much business upon the agenda. First of all there was an application from Mr. E. Stilwell, asking permission to rent one of the cabins at Shawatlans during the summer months presumably for use when he goes out after these big trout. This was agreed to, at a nominal rent, the tenant to be held responsible for any loss occasioned by fire.

The interesting fact that the city possesses a vacuum cleaner was next elicited, and made public. Some of the worthy citizens impressed with the necessity of utilizing the most modern appliances, have been in the habit of borrowing this most useful weapon, and forgetting, or at least being dilatory in returning it to the civic headquarters. This is too bad, for these inconsiderable people have spoiled a good thing. Had we known such a thing existed, and had any necessity for it, we might have borrowed it ourselves once in a while and had the free use of it. Whereas, from now on, the city's vacuum cleaner will be under the charge of and be kept beneath the eagle eye of the city clerk, who will charge the sum of \$1 for the first forty-eight hours it is out of his possession and for every fraction of twenty-four hours thereafter. Now that we all know that the city has this thing for rent, and if the demand for it keeps up, a new line of industry is opened up for our civic authorities. As the business grows, we may look for the city to advertise in words something like this: "Clean your own upholstery and carpets with the city vacuum cleaner. Support civic enterprise," and so forth. Action of this sort should delight the hearts of the supporters of municipal ownership. If we can't swing a civic coal depot, or a municipal wharf, at any rate we have got a civic vacuum cleaner. Fine!

After hearing read the items in the warrant book for the month of May, showing the total expense to be \$16,786.56, the letter from the Minister of Lands, the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, enclosing the agreement come to between the Provincial Government and the G. T. P. regarding Cow Bay was again brought to the attention of the council. This had lain over for a week to give the aldermen an opportunity of examining it at their leisure. No further comment was made upon it, so it was ordered to be filed, to have it on record when any necessity should arise.

GERMANY PREPARES PEACE DRIVE AT RUSSIA'S EXPENSE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, June 25.—Germany is preparing for a vigorous peace move at the expense of Russia, the Government authorities here are convinced. To meet this anticipated move, a tremendous effort is being made to bring about unity of purpose between the United States, Great Britain and France. The need for some agreed policy is admitted. Germany, by launching her peace offensive, by offering to give up

Belgium, northern France and to make satisfactory settlements with Italy, provided she were allowed to expand in Russia, would confront the British and French governments with a very serious problem.

The time is now come, the allied diplomats say, when President Wilson, if he will not sanction Japanese intervention in Russia, must come forward with some alternative if Russia is to be saved.

SETTLERS POURING INTO LAKE DISTRICT IN OMINECA COUNTRY

Reports received here today from the Francois and Burns Lake districts in the Omineca country are to the effect that every train from the prairie provinces are bringing in many settlers looking for land. The last train brought in eighteen different parties, and some twenty more were expected to arrive by the next train. This lake district of Northern British Columbia, out of which flows the Bulkley river westwards, and the Nechaco river eastwards contains some of the finest land in the province, and splendid results have already been attained by the settlers already established.

At Burns Lake, there has been such a demand for information that it has been made necessary to open a Bureau of Information which will afford to all the prospective settlers what they desire in the way of knowledge of the surrounding country. These incomers into this comparatively new country are ready to purchase land when they see what suits them. They have the cash, and being practical farmers, their settling in this interior country should prove to be of the utmost benefit, not only to the province as a whole, but to the Omineca country and to the city of Prince Rupert. An ever-extending and developing hinterland will react upon the welfare of Prince Rupert just as the further progress of this city will help the interior country.

STRIKERS IN VIENNA CONFLICT WITH POLICE

Zurich, Switzerland, June 25.—One hundred and fifty thousand strikers in Vienna had another conflict with the police on Saturday night, according to a dispatch received here from Munich today. Shouting "down with Germany" large crowds again attempted to reach the German embassy, but were dispersed.

Information has also reached here to the effect that the railway men in Bessarabia have gone on strike, paralyzing that whole region. The Roumanians have also blown up many munition depots throughout the district.

LOCAL OPERATIONS ONLY ON THE WESTERN FRONT

GERMAN SUB GETS FIRST TROOPSHIP

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, June 25.—The German submarines' operations on this side of the Atlantic ocean have sunk their first troopship, according to an announcement made by the Navy Department here today. The British transport, under charter by the American government and bound to this country was destroyed on June 18 some seven hundred miles east of the Delaware coast, and sixty-seven of her crew are missing. There were no troops on board.

MINERS USE THE TIDES TO WASH PLACER GOLD

If you don't believe it, then take a trip out to Shuttle Island, just south of Moresby Island, in the Queen Charlotte group, and you will see for yourself how the incoming tide washes away the sand and leaves exposed the nuggets of gold, which the stakers of the claims there spend their spare time in picking up. Shuttle Island is only a small one, barely a mile across at any point. There is some good timber there, however, and at present a lumber camp is situated upon it, and between them, the men employed at this camp have the whole island staked out.

The camp cook and the cookee are the two who started in to find gold. They picked up nuggets on the beach. They panned some of the seashore sand and found some more, and they kept on panning. Logging spruce, however, being an essential industry, they cannot leave their jobs to go mining, so have only their spare time to pick up nuggets. However, to a certain extent they have solved the labor problem. At low tide they go down to the beach and dig a trench out as near to low water mark as they can get. The tide rises, washes away the sand and leaves the nuggets sticking out, where they are easily picked up.

There is a fine beach all around the island, and gold can be picked up at nearly any point. It is thought that this gold must have been washed down from some quartz ledge in the hill which rises to some elevation in the centre of the island. Some of the men in the lumber camp, when tired of picking up nuggets on the beach, are paying attention to the hill, where who knows what may be found?

BRITAIN AND STATES TREATY EXTENDED

With the United States Troops on the Marne, June 25.—American troops on the Marne front last night captured the north-western part of Belleau Wood. The American troops took this strategic point in the face of all the Germans. They captured some prisoners and took some five-inch guns.

French Front.

Paris, June 25.—A local operation enabled us to improve our position on the plateau north of La port, says the official War Office announcement tonight. We took one hundred and seventy prisoners. An enemy counter attack delivered immediately afterwards was repulsed.

Berlin's Report.

Berlin, June 25.—The German troops, in an attack on the trenches in Baldenuller region, occupied by the French and United States soldiers, inflicted heavy losses, according to an official communication from headquarters today. The German forces brought back prisoners.

TUG LORNE MAKES THE RECORD TOWING BOOMS

Vancouver, June 24.—The G. T. P. tug Lorne arrived in Howe Sound on Friday with what is said to be the biggest boom of logs ever handled in British Columbia. The booms consist of 1,600,000 feet of logs and is consigned to Mill Creek, where the timber will be ground into pulp.

The logs are in two rafts, one from the Queen Charlotte Islands and the other from Swanson Bay and they are constructed on what is known as the Davis system. This means that logs are piled up one on another and securely lashed until a big proportion of the boom is under water. In this case one raft is drawing forty feet of water and the other thirty feet. In addition to being a record tow for size, there is also a claim for long-distance towing, as very few booms of this size, if any, have been brought all the way from the Queen Charlotte Islands.

THE BASIS OF PROSPERITY

The arrangements made by the provincial government for community settlement in the Bulkley Valley, coupled with the fact of the great influx of prospective settlers, with cash in hand, into the Omineca country from the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan cannot fail to carry a great significance for we people living on this western edge of the continent. The prosperity of Prince Rupert, as a terminal city is intimately bound up with the progress of the development of the interior country. The possibilities of the vast hinterland, the potentialities of the rich valleys of the interior from a farming and ranching point of view have long been recognized by the people of this part of the province. The facts regarding Northern British Columbia are now appealing to the dwellers of the plains to the east of the Rocky Mountains, and in increasing numbers they are now coming here to see for themselves what British Columbia has to offer.

In the Lake districts, between Telkwa and Prince George, with the valleys of the Bulkley and the Nechaco rivers running west and east, the influx of prospective settlers has been so great that a bureau of information has had to be opened to afford authoritative information as to the lands available. The diversity of products which can be raised in this district is the chief attraction which brought the old settlers there. The immense amount of vegetation and natural grasses make it the more attractive for the prairie farmer, and for a time, until larger areas are cleared, mixed farming and stock raising are likely to be the chief development.

One of the oldest settlers at Francois Lake says that one of the finest features of this district is that there is practically no sickness among the people there. It is the healthiest country he has any knowledge of, and at that he has been over most of the seaports in

this hemisphere. With the settlers already in the lakes district enthusiastic and prosperous, and with something to show for their labors of the past years, there is every reason to believe that their enthusiasm will be contagious with the newcomers, and that this beautiful district will soon become the more thickly populated.

With the filling up of the community area near Telkwa, as well as the increasing settlement farther east, prospects for greater production will be very greatly enhanced, and important progress may be recorded in spite of and in part because of war conditions.

SPHAGNUM

The success which attended the efforts of those active members of the community of Sunday afternoon in gathering quantities of sphagnum moss is significant of what can be done in a material sense, of direct benefit to the boys at the front, by those of us who have not been called yet to place ourselves under direct military discipline. And it is as little as we can do.

The peculiarly absorbent quality of this moss, when dried, is such that makes it better than many bandages and cotton wool for dressing the wounds on the battlefield. Wounds dressed with moss enable the patient to travel a longer distance before requiring attention again, thus saving the time of the doctors and Red Cross staff within the battle zone.

This moss grows here thickly. It can be gathered by the fingers from the spongy bottomed hollows with which this part of the coast abounds. The moss is here. It is required for our boys in France. Are we going to give it to them to facilitate their recovery? The people of Prince Rupert have already answered "Yes."

When that car load of this sphagnum moss goes on its way across the continent to the Toronto laboratories from Rupert, it is to be hoped that those in control of the ship-

RUSSIAN WAR ORDERS NOW LIE FORGOTTEN

Montreal, June 21.—A veritable mountain of costly and rare steel materials, for which Canada is looking every day in vain, are lying idle on the docks and freight cars at Vancouver, said a Canadian war board official in an interview here today.

"About 50,000 tons of light rails, spikes, angle iron, spare parts of engines and cars have been lying in their present position for several months awaiting orders for transshipment to Russia. Russia has apparently forgotten the stuff while disputing over theories of state. The Canadian railway war board has known of the situation for months and has been awaiting action by the allied authorities in response to its representations, its interest lying in the fact that such valuable material is rusting away while it could be made use of by the Allies.

"Anyone who knows of the scarcity of steel materials for industrial purposes can imagine what these piles of steel products look like to the hungry eye of Canadian industry. It is easy enough to understand why cargoes may be allowed to rot and rust at wharves at Vladivostok, but why this should happen in Canada is beyond easy understanding," was the concluding comment of the war board official.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

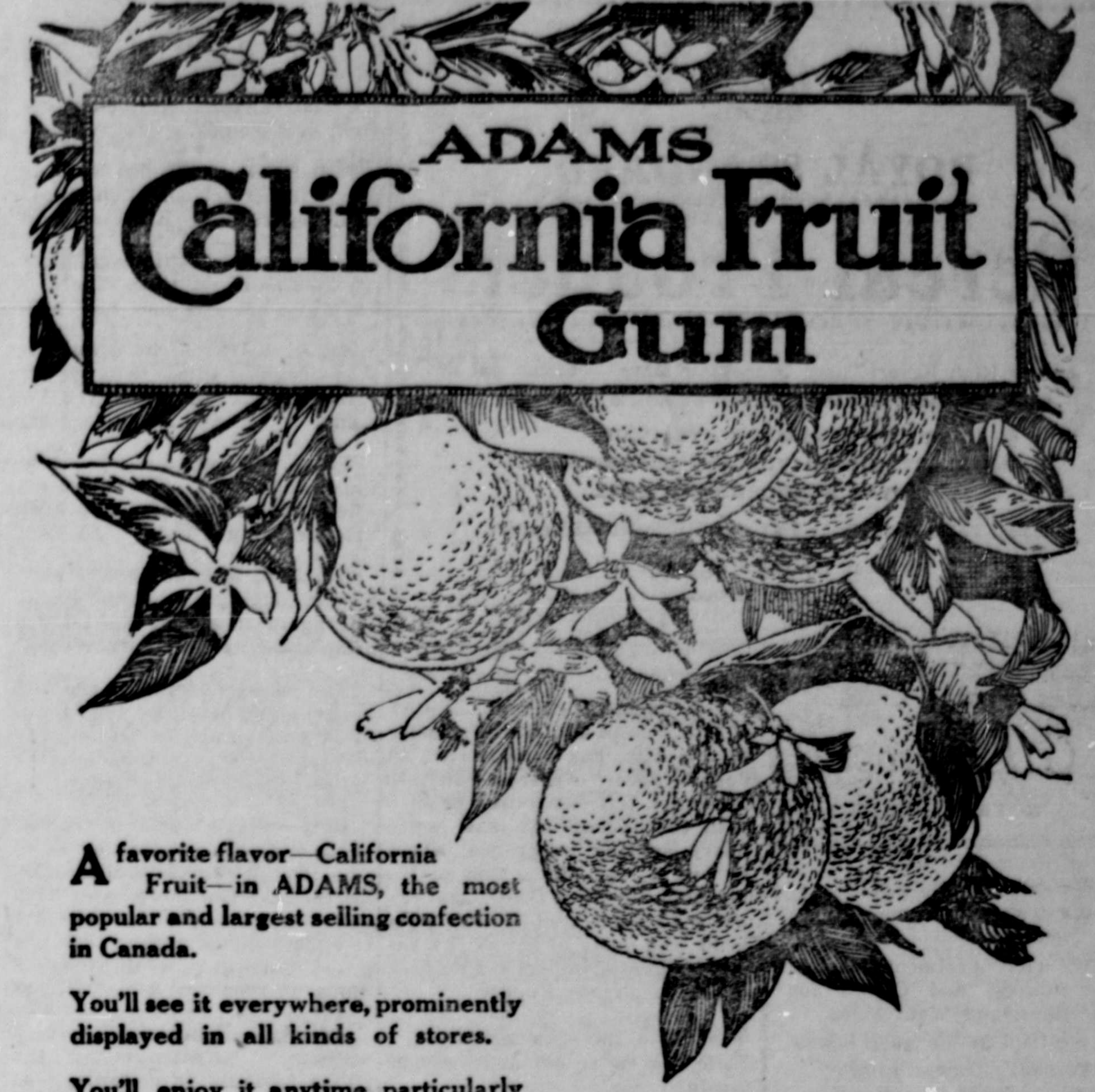
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to the value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements, or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, when improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without application, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will entitle them to, at the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, the allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the allotment is also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect of adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1918, any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
