AUSTRIANS CORNERED IN THE TRENTINO

ITALIANS GET TWO ENEMY ARMIES SURROUNDED — PIAVE CHOKED WITH DEAD

ALL ITALY JOYOUS AND ABLAZE WITH ENTHUSIASM OF VICTORY

GREAT SCENES WITNESSED THROUGHOUT COUNTRY WHEN NEWS OF VICTORY RECEIVED—ITALIAN NAVY AND MARINE BATTALIONS DO THEIR SHARE AT TAGLIAMENTO RIVER

Washington, June 26.—A great wave of war enthusiasm has swept over all Italy with the receipt of the information of the great victory on the Piave River. Every town and village throughout the country has had spontaneous celebrations of this great event, and in Rome, the utmost joyousness was in evidence.

The Italian navy effectively co-operated to defeat the Austrians by battering the enemy positions along the Tagliamento river with their big guns, doing extensive execution. The Marine battalions also on the upper Piave advanced quickly on the heels of the enemy and made important captures. The sudden crumpling up of their front line has completely demoralized the Austrian General Staff, who had made no preparations for such an eventuality. Complete confusion still characterizes the enemy front, and their retreat has been turned into a complete rout. The quantities of war material captured and the number of prisoners taken continues to increase daily, and this blow which has been struck at the Austrian power is deadly one.

More Gains.—The Italians have gained more ground in the Monte Grappa sector, and have taken many prisoners. The Italian troops on the Piave have also taken a large number more prisoners. The few remaining rear-guards of the Austrian forces which remained on the right bank of the river have been swept from their positions. The mobile Italian forces which crossed the river in pursuit of the fleeing enemy have inflicted tremendous losses upon the disorganized Austrian troops. Their pursuit is being continued, and further forces of Italian troops are crossing the Piave to their assistance in clearing up the Austrians. An announcement has been made that the troops of the United States will be in Italy early in July. General Diaz is being honored for his great victory.

London, June 26.—The Secretary for Ireland, speaking here last evening in the House of Commons, maintains that the Sinn Fein plot in Ireland was no bogus plot, and that it was seriously intended to injure the nation. He hoped to satisfy the House that the danger was real and imminent. Mr. Asquith appealed to the government to refer the matter to the conference of the Dominion premiers. Premier Lloyd George was also criticised by Sir Edward Carson.

GERMANY BOLSTERING UP TOTTERING AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

Rome, June 26.—The Germans are said to be thoroughly awake as to the probability of the complete collapse of the Austria-Hungarian government, which is already struggling with a half-starved and riotous people. The event of a complete Austrian rout at the hands of the Italians would be the finishing blow to the control of the present government. Realization of this fact is believed to have caused the German General Staff to practically suspend, if not abandon its great offensive in France, as has been evidenced by the comparative quiet there for the last week. German soldiers are now being rushed by

SUBSTITUTES FOR WHEAT MUST BE USED

Ottawa, June 26.—A greater use of substitutes for wheat flour must be used from now on throughout Canada, in order to release more wheat for overseas. Bakers, confectioners and the public generally will be effected by the order now issued by the Food Board of Canada. The rules for dealers state that after July 15th, substitutes must be used in the same proportion as flour.

MAJOR KIRKPATRICK WAS GERMAN PRISONER FOR TWENTY MONTHS

Major Arthur E. Kirkpatrick, general manager of the United States Fidelity and Guarantee Co. of Toronto, was in the city this morning on his return trip to the east. Major Kirkpatrick was with the Canadian Expeditionary Force at Ypres, and was one of those who were unfortunate enough to be taken prisoner by the Germans. He spent twenty months in a German prison camp.

Speaking of conditions in German prison camps, he said that all we read in the press with regard to these places was true, and not in the least overdrawn, as he knew from his own experience. It is almost inconceivable the depths to which German humanity and morality has sunk. The doctrines of von Bernhardi and Nietzsche seem to have been inculcated into their women folks, and to their nursing staffs as well.

RUPERT CAPUT DIED THIS MORNING AT OCEAN FALLS

Word has been received in town today of the death of Rupert Caput, one of Prince Rupert's boys, at Ocean Falls. On Sunday his brother John, who lives here, received word to come to Ocean Falls at once, as Rupert had been badly hurt, and he left by steamer that evening. Full details of the accident whereby Rupert received his injuries have not yet been received here, but it is thought to have had something to do with the mill where he was working. Rupert Caput had grown up in this city, and there are many who will remember him from his school days, when he used to deliver the Daily News. He was a smart kid in those days, and he carried his capability and reliability with him as he grew. Not yet out of his teens, the loss of Rupert Caput will be regretted by all who knew him.

Internal Disorders.

London, June 26.—The military situation in Austria is becoming a matter of secondary importance, being overshadowed by grave internal disorders and strikes and conflicts between civilians and the military. Not only have the big towns suddenly reduced their baggage ration, but the railroad transport has reached a crisis, resembling the situation in Russia prior to the revolution. Resentment and hatred against Germany is spreading, especially in Hungary.

21 DESTROYERS BOTTLED UP IN ZEEBRUGGE CANAL — BEING BOMBED DAILY

London, June 25.—Twenty-one German destroyers, a large number of submarines and numerous auxiliary craft are penned up in the Bruges Canal docks as the result of the recent British naval operations at Zeebrugge, the German submarine base on the Belgian coast. Thos. J. Macnamara, financial secretary of the Admiralty, made announcement in the House of Commons to this effect and said that the operations were more successful than at first had been supposed. He added that the German craft were now the subject of constant bombing.

TURKEY DEMANDS BLACK SEA FLEET

Athens, June 25.—A dispute has arisen between Turkey and Germany over possession of the Russian Black Sea fleet. Replying to deputations from the Turkish Navy League, which pointed out that Turkey had an incontestable claim to the fleet, Talaat Pasha, Grand Vizier, said the negotiations were proceeding between Germany and Russia for the handing of the fleet over to Germany, but that the Turkish Government had taken action with a view to acquiring the fleet.

TROLLERS CAN NOW USE MORE THAN THREE LINES

Ottawa, June 24.—The Naval Department yesterday announced that a new fishing regulation applicable to British Columbia has just been issued rescinding the previous rule that only three lines could be used on one boat in trolling for salmon. It has been found, stated an official of the Department, that with the better class of motor boats now being used it is possible to fish with more than three trolls and the old regulation therefore is rescinded. This method of fishing, it was stated, has come into favor recently and fish are being caught offshore before they enter the rivers and they are in prime condition. The fish thus caught are used largely in the fresh fish trade and the Department therefore wishes to encourage this method of fishing.

BIG GAINS IN NEW ADVANCE ALREADY MADE — FORCES OF ARCHDUKE JOSEF AND GENERAL WURM SURROUNDED — MUST SURRENDER OR BE ANNIHILATED — PIAVE CHOKED WITH DEAD

LOCAL FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT

Washington, June 26.—Further advances by the United States troops on Monday near Chaetau Thierry were reported by General Pershing yesterday. His report reads:—Local operations continued in Chaetau Thierry region, where we made further advances, capturing five machine guns, and other material.

Counter Attack Broken.

A counter attack made by the Germans near Tereq broke down with heavy losses under our rifle fire. As a result of a raid executed by the enemy against our troops in Lorraine, several of our men are missing.

Canadian Raid.

London, June 26.—Canadian troops raided the enemy trenches last night at Neuville Vitasse and brought back prisoners and machine guns, says yesterday's war office report. Hostile artillery has been active during the night near Villers Bretonneux and Morlan-court, gas shells being freely employed.

French Front.

Paris, June 26.—Between the Oise and the Aisne, many raids enabled us to take prisoners. Aerial activity was spirited south of the Aisne, where six enemy machines were brought down, or fell in a damaged condition. We dropped more than four tons of bombs upon the enemy aviation grounds.

DR. KUEHLMANN SAYS GERMANY AND BRITAIN OF SAME MIND RE PEACE

Amsterdam, June 26.—Dr. Kuehlmann, the Kaiser's Chancellor, speaking in the Reichstag, quotes a speech made by Mr. Asquith, and declares that Germany is of the same mind as Great Britain on the peace question.

MUNITIONS FOUND CONSIGNED TO SINN FEINER IN DUBLIN

London, June 26.—Large quantities of munitions have been found concealed among the general cargo of a coasting vessel running between here and Irish ports. The consignee of the ammunition was a brother of a prominent Sinn Feiner, and located in Dublin.

With the Italian Armies in the field, June 26.—In the mountain regions of the Trentino, the Italians have started another big counter offensive, and are now making gains. Large successes have already been made, despite strong resistance by the Austrian forces, according to authoritative reports received here. The armies under the command of the Archduke Josef and Gen. Wurm have been surrounded, and are now in such a position that they must surrender, or be annihilated.

Piave Choked With Dead.

Along the forty-mile front of the Piave river, the Austrian retreat is continuing, and the great importance and scope of the Italian victory grows hourly. The Piave river is choked with innumerable bodies of the enemy dead, and the debris of their equipment.

REAL PROGRESS

The reports of the recent conference of the stock raisers of this province of British Columbia, which was held at Kamloops recently shows how close an interest the present provincial government is taking in all that will tend towards greater development and production. The interest taken by the members of the government, individually and collectively, in everything that will tend towards the progress of the development of the resources of this part of the Dominion were never more marked than they are at this present time.

So far as the cattle and sheep men of British Columbia are concerned, they are finding in the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, and in the Hon. Mr. Barrow, the new minister of agriculture, the greatest assistance possible in the solving of the many problems connected with the creation of satisfactory range for their flocks and herds. What is wanted for the success of these industries is all year round pasture, and plenty of it.

At this conference of the stock raisers, the utmost enthusiasm was displayed by those most interested parties by the proposals of the two ministers in connection with the basic necessities of their business, in the avoidance of conflict in conditions as required for cattle raising and sheep raising.

The ministers of land and agriculture are working hand in hand regarding everything connected with their two departments so that everything possible may be accomplished at the earliest moment for the development of the land and its products. The ministers of the Cabinet are on the job.

A STATEMENT OF FACT

After an expedition up the Bulkley Valley, over a distance of some seventy miles from Hazelton, the editor of the Omineca Herald gives a fine description of what he saw, both visually and in his mind's

eye, which is well worth while. He says:—

The whole country at this time of year is one rolling mass of green, the shades varying according to the particular vegetation. Grain fields, just getting a nice start, on the hillsides and in the bottom lands, peavine and other rich pasture grasses wherever the land has not been cultivated; hay fields by the hundred acres, all looking healthy. SWIFT ACTION TAKEN BY NEW MINISTER RE LAND SETTLEMENT

Commenting upon the action of the provincial government, and particularly with regard to the activities of the Hon. Mr. Barrow, the new minister of agriculture, since the very day he was sworn in as minister, the Smithers Interior News asks the question, "What is pep?" Under that heading it has somewhat to say, as an instance of the manner in which the present government is going about its work. It says:—

The land settlement act under which a large tract of land in this district is being made available for actual settlers, passed the house at the end of last session. The Hon. Mr. Barrow was sworn in as minister of agriculture on a Wednesday. His first act that afternoon was a conference with the land settlement board. That night a representative of the board was on the way to this district to select the first areas for operation. In three weeks two areas approximately six miles square are thoroughly cruised and selected from a small empire. On June 7th Mr. Barrow arrived and on the 13th had inspected and approved both of the areas. Next day the members of the board left for Victoria to have the selection ratified by the whole board and the areas gazetted. The title-search had started by wire. No doubt these men accomplished all this under the stirring impulse of patriotism. But what is pep?

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land. Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may acquire land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, and be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANT'S ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

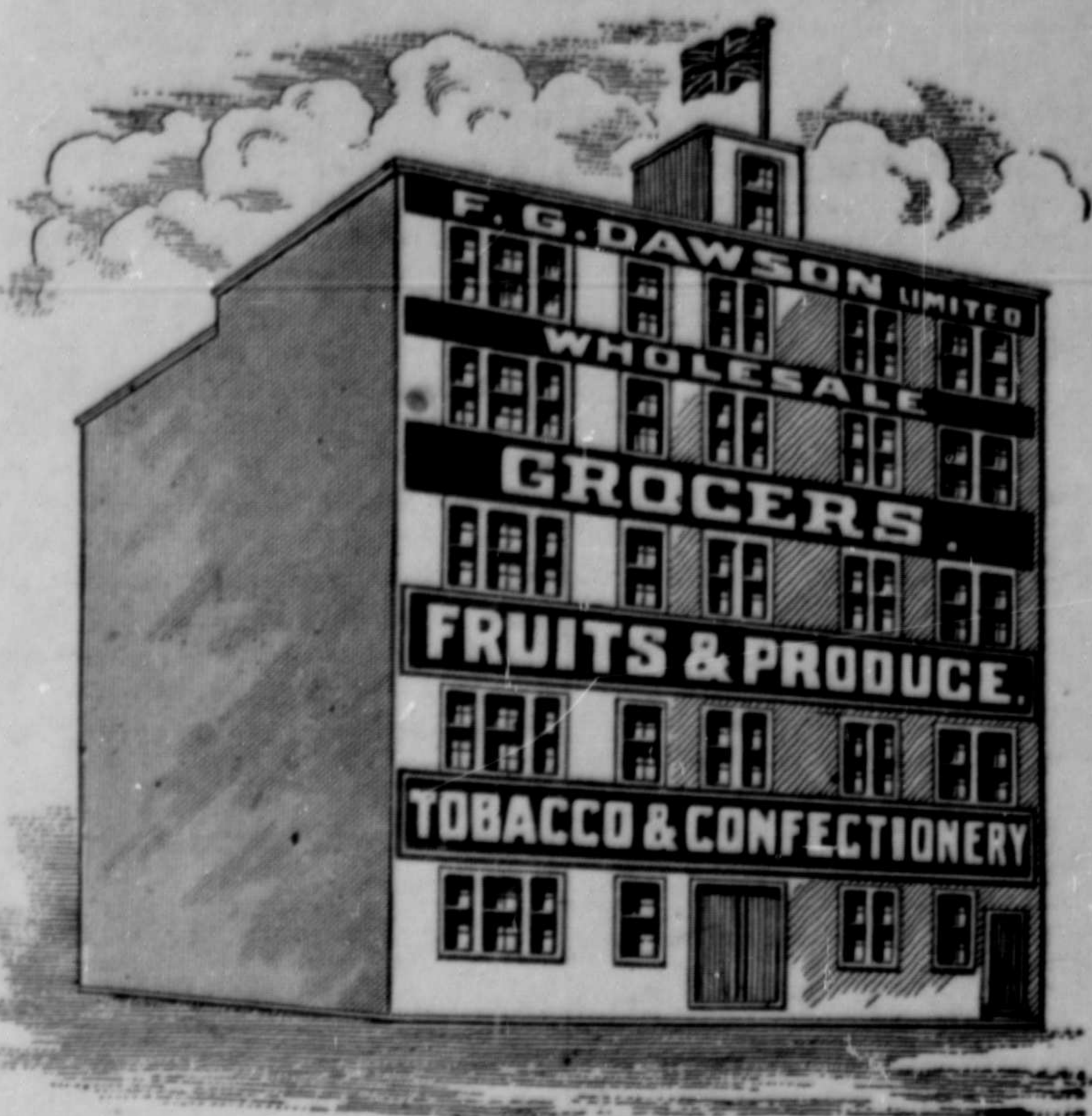
TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality.

The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

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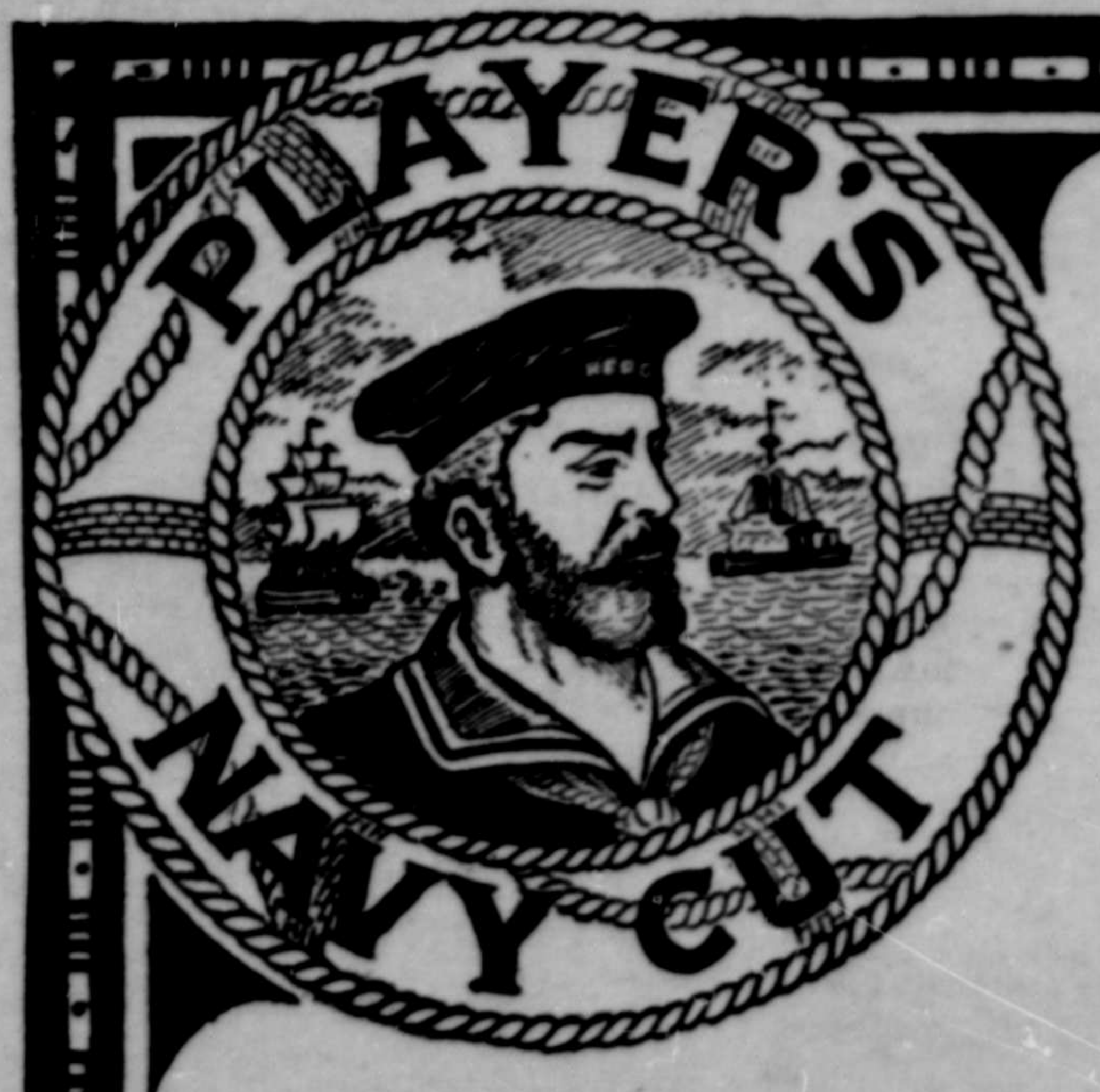
