KUEHLMAN UNCERTAIN GERMANY CAN WIN

AIR ATTACK ON RHINE TOWNS--EX-CZAR REPORTED KILLED--MORE PEACE TALK

KUEHLMANN PREDICTS IN REICHSTAG WAR MAY LAST THROUGH A FIFTH WINTER

GERMAN FOREIGN SECRETARY NOT CERTAIN GERMANY CAN WIN--STATEMENT CREATES BIG SENSATION IN THE REICHSTAG--GERMAN PRESS IGNORES AUSTRIAN DEFEAT

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, June 27.—The acknowledgment by Foreign Secretary Kuehlmann that Germany is certain of winning the war has caused further to be said in the Reichstag today. He says a dispatch from Zurich by the press says: "The German Foreign Secretary today said that the war will last through a fifth winter. His prediction that Germany will win has caused a sensation among the members of the Reichstag. In the debate which followed the Foreign Secretary's speech, stormy scenes were witnessed, the pan-Germanist speakers being constantly interrupted by the Left."

"The Least Said, . . ."
Geneva, June 27.—"La Suisse" says it learns that the Austrian defeat in Italy has caused profound dejection in Vienna, where demonstrations are taking place daily in the streets, and at Prague where the inhabitants are demanding peace. The German newspapers are scarcely mentioning the retreat of the Austrians. As an example, the Konstanz Zeitung asks: "Must German troops be continually diverted from the important western front to bolster up our weak allies?"

Mediation?
London, June 27.—Neutral leaders may seize upon the recent speeches of Foreign Secretary Balfour, and of Foreign Minister Kuehlmann as an excuse for proposing mediation, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Express today. It is understood that as a result of the Balfour and Kuehlmann speeches being considered as an invitation for neutral mediation, proposing an honorable peace, and the Queen of Holland, the Kings of Spain and Scandinavia, the President of Switzerland, or the governments of these countries may soon offer mediation. The neutral leaders have already conferred upon these subjects.

GERMAN CITIES AND TOWNS ON RHINE HEAVILY BOMBED

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 27.—The German cities and towns on the east side of the river Rhine have been subjected to many raids by the British aerial squadrons, according to a statement on aerial operations issued by the British War Office today. The statement reads: "On the morning of June 25, attacks were carried out by our bombing squadrons on the railway sidings and factories near Saarbrücken; the engine sheds and barracks at Offenburg, and the explosive factory and railway station at Karlsruhe. Many direct hits were observed on the engine sheds at Offenburg, and also on the barracks there. At Karlsruhe, two direct hits were observed on the engine sheds, and on the metal works where an explosion was caused."

U.S. TROOPS CAPTURE MANY MACHINE GUNS AT BELLEAU WOOD

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, June 26.—Consideration in Germany of legislation to prevent emigration after the war to evade payment of the heavy taxes that must then be levied, already is being considered, according to information reaching the State Department. Enactment of a law requiring persons liable to personal taxes to leave 20 per cent. of their taxable property in Germany in event of emigration has been proposed. The bill as drafted, according to The Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, provides that persons who have hitherto had their permanent residence in Germany shall be liable to payment of personal taxes and State and communal taxes for a period of five years after the conclusion of peace. The penalty for tax evasion through emigration is fixed at deprivation of nationality, which, however, can be restored later by voluntary payment of the taxes.

EX-PREMIER KERENSKY CROSSING ATLANTIC

London, June 27.—Alexander Kerensky, the former premier of Revolutionary Russia, who arrived in London several days ago, is now reported to be on his way to America. Officials here have denied that there was any political significance in his visit here, or in his proposed trip to the United States.

TWO BIG STEAMERS TORPEDOED FEW MILES WEST OF BRITISH ISLES

An Atlantic Port, June 27.—It is reported here that large steamships under British registry have been sunk by German submarines a few miles west of the British Isles. They are the Allan liner Pomeranian and the Medora, said to be under charter to the C. P. R. Sixty members of the crew of the Pomeranian have perished.

AUSTRIAN LOSSES PLACED AT QUARTER OF A MILLION

MORE PRISONERS CAPTURED IN CLEARING UP PIAVE BATTLEFIELD--TWENTY THOUSAND AUSTRIANS DROWNED IN PIAVE RIVER DURING RETREAT--BIG JOB COUNTING UP BOOTY

GOVERNMENT OF B. C. HELPS TO EXTEND MARKET FOR LUMBER

Steps Taken by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, to Secure Overseas Market for B. C. Products.

The great development of aeroplane spruce logging, the activity in the shipyards, and the prairie demand for B. C. lumber have kept the lumber mills of the province extremely busy during the last year or more. While spruce logging is plainly destined to become more and more extensive in the near future there have been elements of uncertainty in the other markets for general British Columbia lumber products which has naturally caused a good deal of concern to those interested. In connection with the large forest interests in the province lumber trade extension comes within the jurisdiction of the Minister of Lands, and Mr. Pattullo has been very carefully into this matter to see what steps could properly be taken to develop a wider business for British Columbia mills.

The Minister of Lands has come to the conclusion that there is danger in putting too many eggs into one basket through depending too much upon the prairie market to carry on British Columbia's lumbering industry. Attention has therefore been concentrated upon the possibilities of developing more trade with eastern Canada, and also securing for this province its full legitimate share in the business of supplying timber for reconstruction in Great Britain and France.

The British Ministry of Reconstruction has already elaborated extensive building plans, which will be put into effect just so soon as shipping is available. While the development of this overseas market is primarily the duty of the Dominion Department of Trade and Commerce, no steps have so far been taken to meet the competition of the United States lumber interests, who are already overens in Britain and France. British Columbia has, therefore, to be up and doing for herself. Her commissioner overseas will be Mr. L. B. Beale, of the Department in Victoria, who will leave shortly, and his investigations and reports will form the basis of action to be taken by the government to advance the interests of one of our basic industries.

With the Italian Armies in the Field, June 27.—The total Austrian losses during the last offensive which has culminated so disastrously for the enemy are now estimated in round numbers to be 250,000 men. Of this number twenty thousand must have been drowned in the swollen waters of the Piave river during the retreat, when the Austro-Hungarian forces were so badly disorganized. The booty falling into the hands of the Italians includes several hundred Austrian batteries, hundreds of machine guns and thousands of prisoners.

Big Statistics.
Rome, June 27.—An official statement issued by the War Office here reads that in clearing up the battlefields in the Piave region a few hundred additional prisoners have been captured. The complete recapture of all our artillery, arms and material has been accomplished. It is only after long statistical work that it will be possible to establish with any degree of accuracy the details of the enormous quantity of Austrian arms and material which now remains in our hands. Renewed activity is also reported from the Higher Alps.

Further Successes.
Striking northward into the Venetian mountains in conjunction with their counter offensive, the Italians have won initial success. The heavy concentrations of troops are aiding the Italians in this new phase of the fighting. On the Monte Grappa sector on the Asiago plateau, and in the Tonale Pass region, further Italian successes are also reported. The west bank of the Piave river has been entirely cleared up of the enemy, their last covering forces surrendering.

COMFORT

While it is true that there are many people who will kick at anything, no matter where they are, still, we have been impressed recently with the unanimity of opinion among Prince Rupert residents, old and new, no matter where they have been or where they go to, regarding the climate on this part of the coast. We are not speaking of this whole coast, but particularly of this part of it, adjacent to Prince Rupert. Visitors returning from the east feel glad when they can sniff the salt ozone laden air miles up the Skeena, and even visitors returning from the south, from Vancouver, or even Vancouver Island, find here a freshness, a something in the atmosphere which was lacking where they were.

Where mosquitos are practically unknown, where the breeze blows cool and even on the warmest day, which is never too warm, even at that, where dust storms never arise, where the cyclone never comes bringing destruction in its path, the visitor from across the mountains finds it pleasant to linger here, and the resident who has been away finds it pleasant to come back.

"Glad to get back," the phrase which practically always accompanies the first greetings of the returned citizen is no stock expression, nor meaningless. It can be uttered truly, so far as climatic conditions are concerned, in comparison with practically any other part of the Dominion. One only needs to go east, or south to appreciate what it really means to be able to remain cool during the hours of sunshine.

EDUCATION

One of the things which is taking up the attention of a great number of the thinking men and women throughout the British Empire in these days of national stress is the immediate future, and its problems. One of the most insistent of these problems goes under the comprehensive term of "reconstruction." That all

is not as it should be is recognized frankly on every hand, except the extreme Tories possibly, and some few of them are with us still. That the rising generation should be afforded more and better facilities for self expression than their fathers have had is the innate wish of every parent, and much effort has been directed towards that end. But not enough.

Speaking on the subject of "Democratic Ideals in Imperial Reconstruction," in the Caxton Hall in London recently, Mr. W. Clarke Dawson, one of the bright men in England, said: "All the resources of intellect in the nation must be discovered and developed. Many more students and those of the right type, must be sent to the institutions for higher education, and to the universities, and there must be more universities. It is bad national economy of the worst type to allow a boy who might be a skilful engineer, a doctor, or a chemist to remain a shop assistant, or a badly paid clerk, because his parents cannot afford to pay for his education, or the local education authority refuses to provide adequate facilities."

Mr. Dawson Clarke has struck the right note. This is extremely bad national economy, which everyone, whether directly interested in educational matters through their children or not will recognize. And this false economy is not confined to Great Britain or England alone. It is pointed out that as Germany has chosen "to educate a nation of fendishly expert materialists," the British system is to produce the finest type of manhood and womanhood. For after all, education is not merely the acquiring of knowledge, although that is a large part of it. The wise man said many years ago, "Wisdom is the principal thing, therefore get wisdom; and with all thy getting, get understanding." The truth of these words which have come down through the ages will stand forever, and that end should be the chief of our educational

HUNGER INSPIRES THE AUSTRIAN OFFENSIVE

Italian Army Headquarters, June 22.—That Austria's drive against Italy is positively "a hunger offensive" has been proved by new orders and addresses found upon prisoners. These were signed by officers ranging from Field Marshal Conrad von Hoetzendorff down to regimental commanders. One is issued by the commander of a famous regiment bearing the name of Archduke Charles. It says:—
 "Soldiers, remember the spoils we got last fall from the Italians. The sheep, cows, steers, warehouses full of good clothes and grocery stores full of wines, canned goods, flour and sugar. Think of your family. Think of the white bread you can win for all."

The correspondent has visited groups of hundreds of prisoners, all of whom are thin and weak. They say they had had little food for the past month and spoke with horror of winter months. A sample of their black bread showed that it was made of rye straw and potatoes.

Many of the prisoners have strong, well spiked shoes, but these, they claim, they made themselves or bought. Their clothes, however, are falling apart. Most of them have mere rags for shirts. The majority of the prisoners have money, but it is either in paper bills or iron medals for valor, some of them having two or three of them, but these decorations are of base metal and none are of gold or silver.

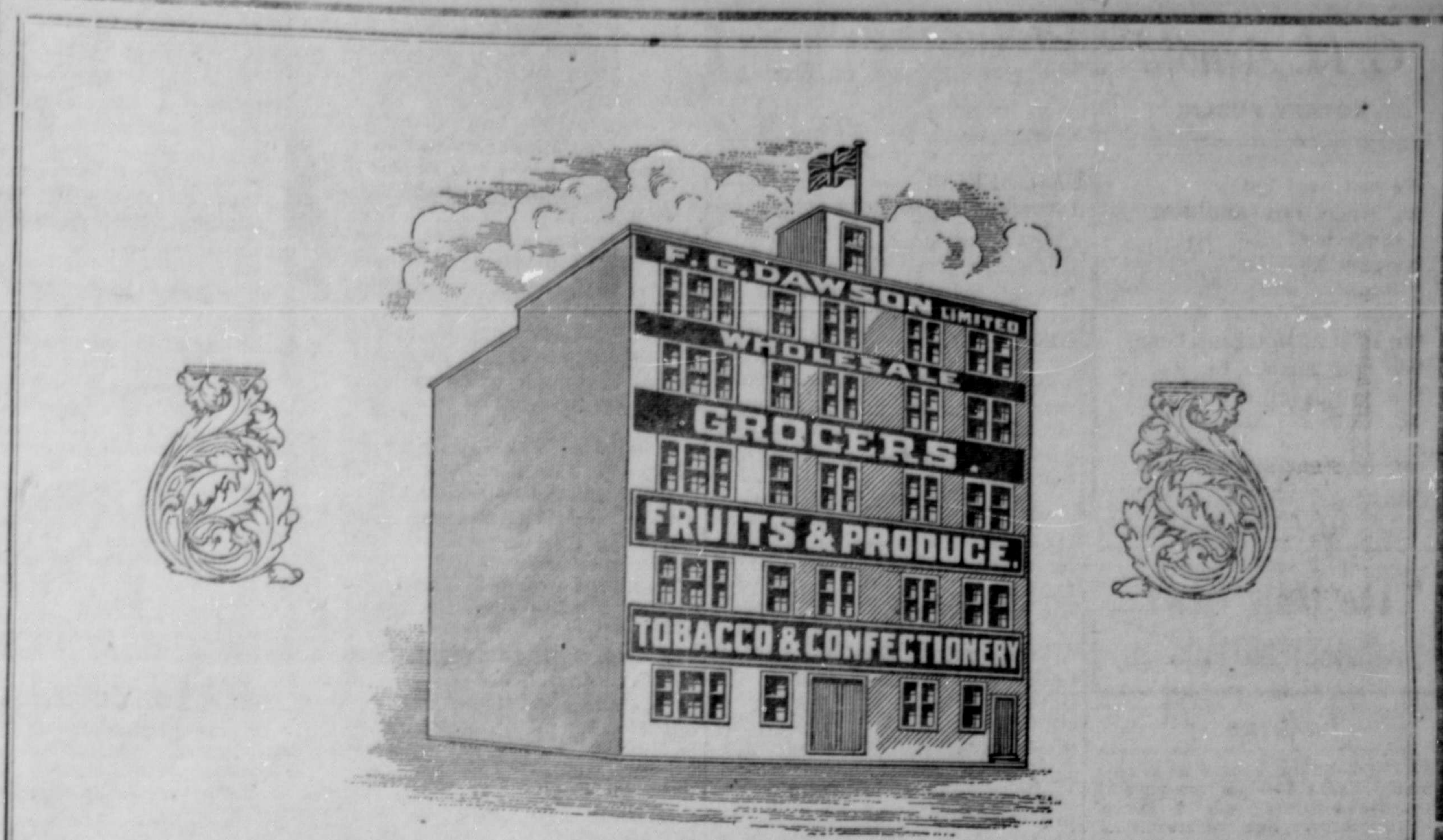
SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
 Pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
 Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
 Where a pre-emptor is occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
 Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements of record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
 Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
 Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
 For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

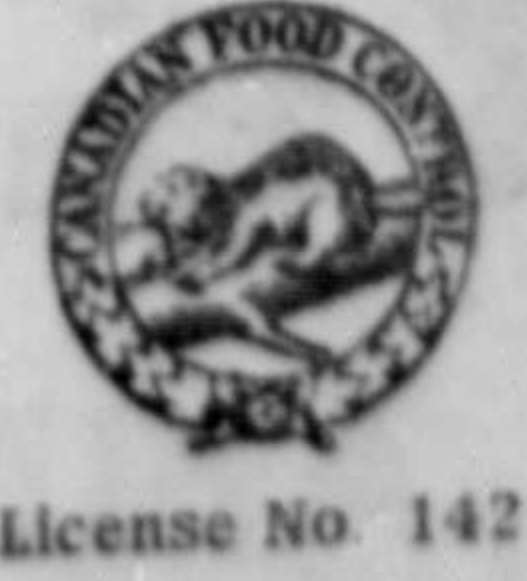
