KERENSKY DELIVERS SPEECH IN LONDON

ADDRESSES LABOR CONFERENCE--WESTERN FRONT IS QUIET--PARIS BOMBARDED

LITTLE FIGHTING TAKING PLACE ON WESTERN FRONT

PATROL ENGAGEMENTS RESULT IN LOSS TO ENEMY--ARTILLERY ACTIVE--BERLIN REPORTS NO CHANGE--THE ITALIANS GATHER IN MORE PRISONERS--BRITISH RAIDS SUCCESSFUL

(Special to The Daily News)
London, June 28.—The War Office communication issued last night reads as follows: "Casualties were inflicted upon the enemy during the night in patrol engagements in the neighborhood of Boyelles. There is nothing further to report, except artillery activity on both sides in certain sectors." The announcement also says: "There were no infantry actions. Artillery fire was intermittent on various sectors between the Oise and the Aisne. In the eastern theatre, the artillery activity of the enemy was spirited in the Mayadge sector."

Raid Successful.
London, June 28.—The British troops last night took strong German positions west of Vieux Berquin, east of Hazebrouck, capturing prisoners and machine guns.

More Prisoners for Italy.
Rome, June 28.—Several hundred additional prisoners were captured by the Italian forces engaged yesterday in clearing up the battleground along the Piave, over which the Austrian armies retreated so precipitately during the past few days.

Berlin's Report.
Berlin, June 28.—(Via London.) There is no change in the situation. Lively artillery activity has been displayed north of the Scarpe and on the Somme, west of Soissons and northwest of Rheims. During the night, artillery activity was increased on the western front between the Aisne and the Marne in connection with infantry reconnaissances on the east bank of the Meuse. We carried out a successful reconnaissance north of St. Mihiel, where a strong enemy attack was repulsed. Five aeroplanes were shot down out of an enemy bombing echelon, which during the last two days has raided Karlsruhe and Offenbourg, an industrial region of Lorraine. Yesterday our bombing squadron attacked Paris, and its railway junctions and aerodromes.

AUSTRIAN TROUBLES MAY PUT MONARCHY IN GREAT DANGER

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rotterdam, June 28.—The most serious factors in the Austrian dilemma may now become political and military, rather than purely economic. Although the latest problems may concern directly only a comparatively small circle of intrigues, the effect of their machinations will probably shake the foundations of the dual monarchy deeper than the food demonstrations, which were the first and most obvious signs of the latest upheaval.

NEW AUSTRIAN PREMIER KARL'S PARTICULAR FRIEND

(Special to The Daily News.)
Amsterdam, June 28.—Dispatches received here from Vienna say that Count Silva Tarocho, the Austrian minister of agriculture, and an intimate friend of the Emperor Charles, will probably be the next premier of Austria in succession to the Baron von Saydler.

LARGE LUMBER ORDERS RECEIVED FROM PRAIRIE

Winnipeg, June 26.—The largest orders of the year have been placed with Pacific coast lumbermen during the past five days by jobbers and wholesalers on the prairies as the result of the general rains. It is estimated that Winnipeg jobbers have ordered five million dollars' worth of heavy timber from the Pacific coast mills this week. Reports from dealers report that farmers all over the prairies are ordering in enormous quantities now that crop conditions are improved. Reports indicate the railways have plenty of cars just now on the coast to enable these orders to be filled promptly.

UKRAINE POSITION DOES NOT IMPROVE

Amsterdam, June 26.—The new government in the Ukraine has not succeeded to any notable extent in curbing the anarchic conditions prevalent there, says a Kiev despatch to the Berlin Tagliche Rundschau. On the contrary, adds the message, these conditions appear to have assumed menacing proportions recently in some districts. There are daily arrests of revolutionary Socialist agitators.

The activity of agitators who are planning a new revolution is perceptible in all districts, the advices continue, while the majority of the Ukrainians have no confidence in the new regime. The collection of foodstuffs, it is added, depends upon energetic measures in making seizures, as a dangerous propaganda is being carried on among the peasants to induce them to turn their grain into spirits by distilling it themselves.

REPORT OF EX-CZAR'S DEATH IS CONFIRMED BY UKRAINE BUREAU

Nicholas was Condemned to Death By Bolshevik Authorities, Then Taken Out and Shot.

(Special to The Daily News)
Geneva, June 28.—The Ukraine Bureau at Lausanne announced yesterday that it had received confirmation of the report that the Bolshevik authorities at Ykaterinburg had condemned Nicholas Romanoff, the former Russian Emperor, to death after a short trial, and then shot him.

TURKS HUMOROUS EVEN IN WAR TIME

Basle, Switzerland, June 26.—The Turkish newspaper Aati, a copy of which has been received here, in an article in which emphasis is laid upon the statement that Turkey's intervention in the war probably has prevented the Central Powers from being crushed, formulates conditions as representing public opinion as to what Turkey's peace terms should be.

The terms, the paper says, embrace the restitution of Iraq and Palestine, the re-establishment of Turkish supremacy in Egypt, the independence of Persia to be secured by the expulsion of the British; the Black Sea to become Turkish; with a Turkish prince in the Crimea; a German prince in Georgia, and an Austrian archduke in Armenia; Bulgaria to hold northern Dobrudja, but Constanza and Dedegatch to become free ports; Austria not to evacuate northern Italy until Turkey has recovered Cyrenaica.

CHINESE READY TO CO-OPERATE WITH JAPANESE IN SIBERIA

London, June 26.—Chinese soldiers are available for co-operation with the Japanese at Harbin and near the Siberian frontier and if necessary more will be sent, General Tuan Chi-Jui, the Chinese premier and war minister told the Peking correspondent of the Daily Mail. The premier added:

"The threatening situation on our frontier certainly demands safeguards. We do not want the Bolsheviks in China."

With reference to Chinese participation in the war on the European battlefield, the premier said: "I would like to help the Allies and would be glad to send 40,000 or 50,000 troops, but am prevented by financial difficulties and the activities of the provincial rebels."

ITALIANS REPULSE AUSTRIAN COUNTER ATTACK IN THE ALPS

Considerable Losses Inflicted upon Enemy and Hundreds of Prisoners Taken by The Italians.

(Special to The Daily News)
Rome, June 28.—In the mountain area, after an Italian raid has resulted in the capture of prisoners and machine guns, the Austrians retaliated by attacking the Italian advanced line in force. The enemy was repulsed with considerable losses. More than five hundred Austrian prisoners were taken.

GERMAN AEROPLANES RAID CITY OF PARIS

Penetrate Defences of City and Drop Bombs, Doing Some Material Damage.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, June 28.—Several squadrons of the enemy airships penetrated through the defences of the Paris district last night. The anti-aircraft batteries violently shelled them. Several bombs were dropped and material damage was done. There were few victims. The alarm sounded at 12 midnight, and the all-clear signal was heard at 12:30 a.m.

"THE MAID OF BELGIUM" AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

This is one of the biggest of the war photoplays and concerns a pretty Belgian girl whose memory has been destroyed by her sufferings in the destruction brought upon her country by the ruthless invader. She is brought to America by a kindly but childless American couple, and there her baby is born, whose father the mother has forgotten. The kindly woman who has cared for this waif of warfare wants to make her husband believe that the child is her own, but then complications ensue, and finally through a sudden shock, the mother's memory returns. The whole story is filled with dramatic incidents and thrills, and is crammed with suspense and surprise. The acting is superb, making this play a great attraction. There will also be a fine two-reel Fox comedy, of the kind which are so much appreciated.

ENTENTE PRISONERS PUT IN GERMAN TOWNS OPEN TO AIR ATTACKS

Geneva, June 26.—The Germans are massing more and more Allied prisoners, both officers and men, along the Rhine and in frontier towns, says The Lausanne Gazette. An Alsatian newspaper reports that five Allied prisoners were killed and six wounded during a recent air raid on Tricville, Germany.

KERENSKY HOPEFUL OF RUSSIA'S FUTURE

Says Russian People Will Never Abide by Brest-Litovsk Treaty Thrust on them By the Germans.

London, June 28.—"I bear witness that the Russian people will never recognize the Brest-Litovsk treaty with Germany, which hurls Germany into the abyss of annihilation," said Alexander Kerensky, the former Russian premier, in an address to the Labor conference which started here yesterday. In his address Kerensky said that Russia was bending beneath German insult, and bleeding at every pore, but still opposed the enemy invasion.

PRINCE RUPERT'S YOUNGEST VOLUNTEER KILLED IN ENGLAND

Jack Dowling, Who Left Here with First Contingent as Bugler, Killed in Aeroplane Accident.

A cable was received in town yesterday by Mr. F. W. Dowling, superintendent of the Government Telegraph Service, from London intimating the death of his son Jack in England in an aeroplane accident.

Everyone in town used to know Jack Dowling. He sailed from Prince Rupert on that memorable morning of the 6th of November, 1914, with the rest of the boys of the 30th Battalion. He was only sixteen then, being the bugler. After that, he was drafted into the 16th, and since then had put in twenty-seven months' service in France. Returning to England to join the Royal Naval Air Service, he was accepted as a lieutenant, and was just completing his training when this accident happened. He had three months' furlough coming to him and his parents were expecting to hear that he was on his way home, when the news came of his death. The details of the accident, of course, are not yet available here.

To Mr. and Mrs. Dowling the deepest sympathy of everyone who knew them, will go out.

LIVE WIRES

At the Labor Party conference which concludes a three-day session in London, England, today, a most imposing agenda had been prepared. There were twenty-seven resolutions on reconstruction proposed by the Executive, and among the suggestions are the gradual building up of a new social order founded on "The deliberately planned co-operation in production and distribution, the systematic approach to a healthy equality, the widest possible participation in power, both economic and political, and the general consciousness of consent which characterise a true democracy. To increase production, the elimination of inefficiency and waste more science and intelligence to every branch of the nation's work and the indispensable marshalling of the nation's resources so that each need is met in the order of and in proportion to its real national importance are urged. By legislation the Government should ensure to every adult worker of either sex on the very lowest statutory base a line of wages (to be revised with every substantial rise in prices) not less than enough to provide all the requirements of a full development of body, mind and character. The provision to be made on demobilization should be worked out in detail before the war ends, and published for mistakes to be rectified. The restoration of trade union conditions, the complete emancipation of women, and the repeal of D.O.R.A. are demanded, together with Home Rule for Ireland and separate legislative assemblies for Scotland, Wales, and even England, with autonomous administration in local matters, the present Parliament to be retained in the form of a Federal Assembly for the United Kingdom. It is suggested that the State should take over the whole function of life assurance. Another proposal is that of a "Peace Book," in which, in order to avoid confusion in the period of demobilization, the main outlines of policy should be definitely

formulated before the war ends so that they can publish for public criticism before being finally adopted by the Cabinet.

The example of Organized Labor in discussing such vital questions relating to the welfare of the community is one which might well be followed by that labor of all kinds which is as yet unorganized. Where else in Prince Rupert are such things publicly discussed unless in the Trades and Labor Council meetings?

QUEBEC LOYAL AND TRUE

A Toronto newspaper was astonished the other day to find that for some weeks past the province of Quebec was ahead of all the others in the matter of enrollment. The patriotic spirit which has been manifest of late amongst the young men of the University of Laval provoked the admiration of Parliament. The new spirit, as the statements of our Ontario confederates call it, is not, as a matter of fact, new. We have always affirmed that the French-Canadians were loyal to Canada and the Empire, and that they are amenable to the law. An irreconcilable hostility almost arose between the two races because our English fellow-citizens misunderstood the real sentiments of the province of Quebec. At the beginning of the war our province furnished a good number of volunteers, and generously contributed to all demands of the war. The French-Canadian ladies manifested an admirable zeal in the Red Cross, the Daughters of the Empire and the Aide la France. However, the sincere co-operation of our province remained misunderstood, for instead of appreciation the English provinces covered us with reproach, claiming that we had not done enough. The submission, however, with which the Province of Quebec accepted the amendments to the Military Law opened the eyes of our confederates of the other provinces and since then our compatriots have responded with alacrity to the appeal to arms and have made splendid soldiers.—La Patrie, Montreal.

BRITISH METHODS OF HUNTING HUN SUBS ARE SUCCESSFUL

London, June 25.—Interesting narratives from reliable sources completely refute the German assertion regarding ineffectiveness of depth charges and other British methods of destroying submarines.

One bright moonlight night a British patrol boat noticed a submarine half a mile distant apparently recharging her batteries. The captain immediately ordered full speed in the direction of the submarine, with the object of ramming her before she was able to submerge. The U-boat succeeded in submerging, but the patrol boat came up and dropped six depth charges and then fired a shell at the centre of the visible disturbance. Large quantities of oil came to the surface and cries for help were heard. Only one survivor was found.

Besides the case of the German submarine cruiser torpedoed by a British submarine near Cape St. Vincent, May 11, other instances have occurred.

A British submarine espied and charged and successfully rammed an enemy submarine. The British boat cut the enemy's plates and remained imbedded. Both craft endeavored to extricate themselves. The enemy, through using his ballast tanks, almost came to the surface, bringing the British submarine along. Then the U-boat drew away in great difficulty, apparently frantically endeavoring to keep afloat, but it subsequently sank.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

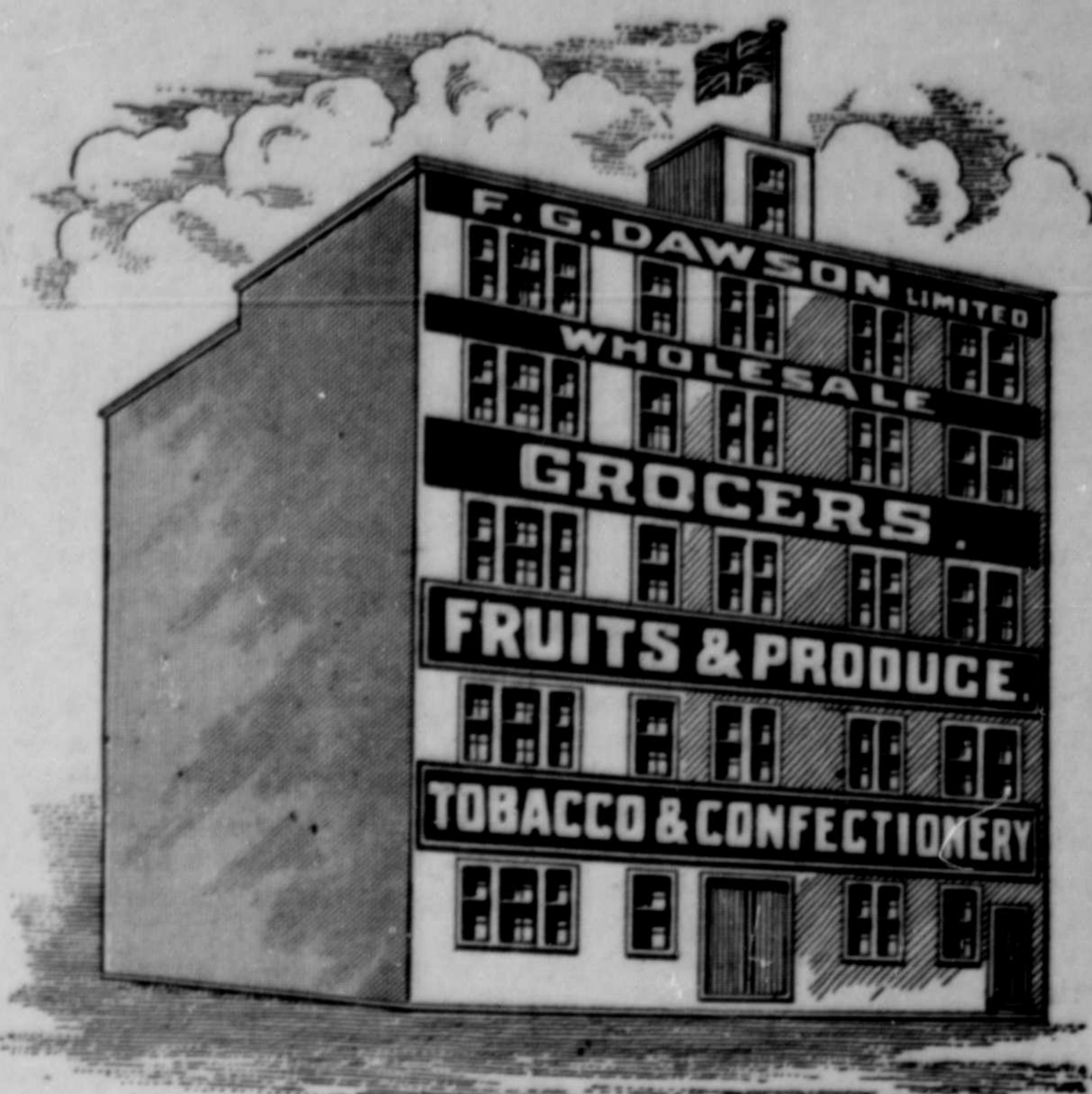
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
