ARTILLERY PREPARATION IN FLANDERS

GETTING READY FOR ANOTHER BIG PUSH — BRITISH RAIDING PARTIES ARE BUSY

TREMENDOUS BOMBARDMENT IN FLANDERS

The Concentration of British Batteries of Artillery in Flanders Exceeds Any Hitherto

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 31.—The concentration of artillery batteries on the British front is enormous. The Big guns are roaring on a thirty-three-mile front in Flanders. The rumble of the sound is plainly to be heard in London. British raiding forces are busy from Cambrai to the north of Ypres. The Germans are given no rest day or night. The British raiders show great enterprise and have got the enemy reduced to a very nervous condition.

French Front.

Paris, July 31.—Violent artillery duels took place on both the Aisne and Verdun fronts last night. A German surprise attack failed completely. The enemy troops were broken up and fled demoralized before they reached the French trenches. Many casualties were left on the ground. Almost no damage was done in the recent air raid. The German aeroplanes dropped bombs on the railway station and on military establishments, according to the Berlin statement.

Italian Front.

Rome, July 31.—Minor fighting resulted in our favor on the Trentino front. On the Julian front there was considerable aerial activity. Enemy machines were brought down.

Cruiser Sunk.

London, July 31.—The British cruiser Ariadne, 11,000 tons displacement, has been torpedoed and sunk. She was built in 1898. Thirty-eight men were lost.

Royal Inspection.

The King and Queen on Saturday inspected the American troops quartered at Camp Borden. The King was greatly pleased with the soldierly appearance of the men.

Italian Offensive.

Washington, July 31.—Italy now awaits for the United States to furnish money, fuel and munitions, before launching on another great offensive against the Austrians.

BLAMES THE GOVERNMENT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Drummondville, July 31.—At a meeting here last night, Mr. D. A. Lafortune, member for Montcalm, said that recruiting was stopped in Quebec. He blamed the Government for the lack of enthusiasm. Had the same measures been taken in Quebec to enlist recruits as in the other provinces, many more would have been got. Mr. Walter Mitchell, member of the Gouin Cabinet, comes out squarely against conscription. Mayor Martin of Montreal, accused the Government of insincerity. Cardinal Beaudry was also against the Military Service Bill. He took exception to the provision for the enforced service from the clergy.

KORNILOFF WILL SHOOT DESERTERS

Wholesale Executions Having Due Effect—Temper of the Retreating Armies Now Altered.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 31.—General Korniloff is dealing with the problem of deserters with an "iron hand," and is having deserters executed wholesale. The general has ordered that all officers and men be at their posts by August 14. Those failing to obey this order will be tried as traitors and shot.

The "Lord of Kronstadt," the leader of the recent revolt at Kronstadt, has surrendered to the Provisional Government. The temper of the retreating armies in Galicia has undergone a big change. The troops are now prepared to resist the Huns. The shock of the disaster has stirred the instincts of the nation. A movement to offset the German wedge is now under way.

IMPRISONMENT FOR ILLEGAL PROFITS

London, July 30.—Lord Rhonda, the food controller, outlining the policy he intends to follow to regulate food prices and eliminate profiteering, said he intended to fix prices of commodities of prime necessity over which he could obtain effective control, at all stages from the producer to the consumer. Every effort would be made to prevent speculation and unnecessary middlemen would be eliminated.

Where profits were made illegally, Lord Rhonda said, he would press for imprisonment in all cases of sufficient gravity. He proposed to eliminate profiteering by fixing prices on the basis of pre-war profits. All flour mills would be taken over and worked on the government account, the flour being delivered to bakers at a uniform price and the bakers being expected to sell loaves over the counter at a maximum of nine pence retail price and flour at a corresponding rate.

British wheat will be purchased by millers at prices determined by the government, these prices over the year averaging 72 shillings per quarter.

Dealers' and butchers' profits also would be controlled.

A feature of the economy campaign would be the establishment of communal kitchens.

TO COMMEMORATE THE DECLARATION OF WAR

At the meeting of the city council held last evening in the city hall, a communication was read from the premier which had been received from the prime minister regarding the commemoration of the declaration of war on August 4th. In order to show the unity of all parts of the Empire, it was recommended that at a public meeting of all the citizens, the following resolution be adopted: "That on this anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, this meeting of the citizens records its inflexible determination to continue to the victorious end, the struggle in maintenance of these ideals of liberty and justice, which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

A procession will be formed at the city hall on Saturday night, and it will march to the Westholme Theatre, headed by the band. To give everyone a chance to join in the procession, it was moved by Ald. McMeekin, and seconded by Ald. McRae, that it be recommended that all the stores close from 8 to 9 p.m. This motion was adopted.

THE SUPERINTENDENCE OF PUBLIC UTILITIES

At the meeting of the city council held last evening, a letter was read from Mr. D. R. Kennedy bearing his resignation as superintendent of utilities. Mr. Kennedy intimated that he intended to remain in the city and would be pleased to be called upon should necessity arise pending the appointment of his successor. His resignation was accepted by the council.

It was moved by Ald. McMeekin and seconded by Ald. Montgomery that the vacancy be advertised in the two local papers. The city clerk advised the council that an advertisement had already been placed with the Vancouver newspapers. This statement brought Ald. Casey to his feet. "It is not only Lieutenant Wood," he said, "that has the idea of discrimination against Prince Rupert. The question for the council should be 'will we advertise in the Vancouver newspapers?' instead of in the Prince Rupert papers." Ald. Casey thought that it was a poor policy to advertise in the south before having exhausted the local field. "But," said the mayor, "there is not more than one electrical engineer in the city just now." "You don't know who's here," retorted Ald. Casey. The motion for the local advertising was passed.

DOES NOT BELIEVE KITCHENER IS DEAD

London, July 30.—According to the Morning Post, Mrs. Parker, sister of Lord Kitchener, opening a charity fete at Hastings, said she did not share the general belief that her brother went down in the Hampshire. It was the first time she has publicly announced her opinion on the subject, but it is her firm belief he is still alive and would one day return. Ever since the loss of the Hampshire she has tried to find out what happened to her brother.

FRONTIERS IN RUSSIA ARE SEALED TIGHT

Only Holders of Diplomatic Passports Can Pass Boundary Embargo Placed on Imports.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 31.—The extraordinary Russian National Congress to be held in Moscow will be postponed owing to the desire of the Provisional Government to reconstruct the Cabinet. Stronger men will be admitted, including members of the constitutional party. Meantime the frontiers are tightly sealed. Only persons holding diplomatic passports can pass the boundary. An embargo has been placed on imports.

A WELCOME CLUB FOR THE SAILORS

The Returned Soldiers' rooms on Third Avenue have rapidly changed into one of the most comfortable little clubs that one could ever wish to see. The downstairs where the telephone exchange used to be is now suitably furnished and decorated for the reception of the sailors. Union Jacks and Canadian flags line both sides of the wall artistically draped by the ladies of the furnishing committee. The floor space has been divided off and room has been left for every form of amusement. There are card tables and there are also tables set apart for playing such games as dominoes, checkers, etc. A reading room has been provided and every sort of book and magazine is at the disposal of visitors. In the bookcase which stands in the corner of the reading room, there are to be found books by the greatest and best authors as well as books that deal on science and other theoretical subjects. A fine pool and billiard table has been set up at the back of the hall and is just right for making record shots, as there is lots of room to work the cue. There has been ample provision made for those who like music, for the soldiers have been good enough to get both a player piano and a gramophone.

The most unusual and perhaps the most useful feature of the whole thing is the lunch counter which will be open during the evening and will be carried on by the soldiers themselves. In the daytime the ladies will prepare everything ready to serve and the boys can easily do the rest themselves. Special thanks are due to Mrs. Dr. Eggert and the other members of the furnishing committee who have spared no effort to make these quarters the most attractive in the city.

JUNKERS TRY TO JUSTIFY MILITARISM

New Chancellor in Germany and Austrian Foreign Minister Show Germany to be an Illused Nation.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 31.—Germany's junkers are working hard with the German people to justify militarism. Dr. Michaelis, the new Chancellor, and the Austrian Foreign Minister, Czernin, have granted interviews to newspaper men. This "Peace Interview," as it is called by the London press, is an effort by the militarists to delude the German public further into the belief that Germany is beset by rapacious foes, who started the war to dismember Germany.

Dr. Michaelis drew a picture of an illused nation beset by cruel foes. He declared that conquest was the real aim of Great Britain. France he said was equally guilty. A parallel statement was made by the Foreign Minister of Austria.

Socialists Unfriendly.

Copenhagen, July 31.—The Austrian Socialists have never been friendly towards Germany. They condemn the U-boat plan, the purpose of which they aver was to gain after-war supremacy. The Huns are not yet ready to relinquish Belgium. Three German newspapers regard the retention of the little kingdom as necessary.

B. C. SCHOOL PUPILS PASS ENTRANCE EXAMS.

The results of the high school entrance examination, which was held on June 25, 26 and 27, at ninety-five different centres in the province, have been announced by the Department of Education. The total number of candidates was 3,698, out of which 2,627 were successful in passing. The honor of securing the first place rests with Mildred L. Gordon, of the Selkirk School, South Vancouver, who secured 864 marks out of the possible 1,100.

THE INCOME TAX

If the Income Tax proposed by the Minister of Finance made those who are profiting from the war contribute their proper proportion to its cost, the Victoria Times says, it would be a step in the right direction. It continues:

At this distance it does not appear to fill the bill in its relation to profiteering. It is the profiteer that the tax should be designed primarily to reach, and in that respect a distinction should be made as far as practicable in the incidence of the levy. The man who has suffered financially from the war should not be put in the same class as the man who has become a millionaire in the last three years. All, of course, must pay their share, but the state should see to it that no huge fortunes are raised upon the agony of the world.

Sir Thomas White is quoted as stating that when the present profits tax expires the income tax will take its place, and that he expects to raise a revenue of \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000, from the new taxation. As this is the revenue he is raising from the present war profits tax it would appear that he is doing little else than alter the form of taxation. Indeed, it is quite conceivable that profiteers in many instances will escape more easily under the income tax than they do under the war profits tax. A man who makes \$750,000 out of war contracts in a year, as Mr. Bailey of Hamilton did, will pay little more, if anything, under the income tax than he has been paying under the war profits tax. A levy of 25 per cent. on war incomes over \$100,000 falls very lightly, indeed, upon war profiteers operating on a large scale. Certainly they are being treated with tender consideration in comparison with the man of small income who has suffered from the war.

As we have frequently pointed out, Canada's war orders to date amount to \$1,500,000,000. The profits on this business aggregate hundreds of millions. It is upon these that special taxation whether in the form of a business tax or an income

tax should fall most heavily. The United States, which already has a federal income tax, is about to make a special levy on war profits which are estimated at \$5,000,000,000 annually. This is a sound distinction, and it should be made in Canada.

We must confess to being puzzled by Sir Thomas White's explanation of his reasons for refraining from imposing an income tax until now. He said he did not desire the country to be known as a country of heavy taxation, as this might effect immigration. But in that case why did Sir Thomas increase the customs taxation to the utmost limit? Why the stamp taxes and other duties? These taxes fall upon the average consumer, no matter how small his income, and they represent ninety per cent. of the taxation in force in this country.

STATE CONTROL

Three years ago the state should have gone into the munitions business on its own account. It should do so now. It has splendid plants at Winnipeg, Moncton and other points. The present Lord Rhonda, then D. A. Thomas, Lloyd George's representative in this country, strongly urged that these be converted into national munition factories. Instead of adopting his suggestion the Government handed the shops over to private firms, on the ground that it would be unfair for the state to enter into commerce with those who are profiting. There is not a munition factory being operated by the Canadian Government in Canada today. Not one is operated under Canadian Government control. This has no parallel in any other country which has been fighting for the last three years.

The proper organization of Canada for war would denote active Government participation in matters of this kind. Automatically it would control profiteering and save millions for demands now met by taxing the country as a whole directly and indirectly and by borrowing in the United States. It would involve greater Government control over the sour-

ces of food supply, the harvesting and distribution of grain and fish, transportation and all the other agencies which have been allowed to operate without co-operation and centralized direction. From some faint hearts and others with different motives we often hear it said that these things are impracticable. Why so? Is Canada a village? Is she so much weaker than New Zealand or Serbia or Belgium? Is she only a big shell? Surely not.—Ex.

WANTS TERRITORY AND INDEMNITIES

Copenhagen, July 27.—The Kreuz Zeitung of Berlin, organ of the Conservatives, declares that the speech before the Reichstag of Chancellor Michaelis did not signify acceptance of the formula of peace without annexations or indemnities, and that neither Field Marshal von Hindenburg nor Emperor William is minded to deprive himself of the fruits of victory by adherence to the surface meaning of the resolution adopted in the Reichstag.

More liberal newspapers, like the Vorwaerts and the Tageblatt, take issue with the Kreuz Zeitung and demand that the Chancellor make a clear and unequivocal declaration of his standpoint and disavow the Kreuz Zeitung's interpretation of his speech.

The Vorwaerts says it is impossible to dismiss the Kreuz Zeitung's article as if it were an expression of editorial opinion. It declares it is a document which can assume historical importance unless immediately and authoritatively disavowed.

Prof. Schaeffer, president of the annexationist independent committee of German peace, writes in the Tagliche Rundschau that the Reichstag decision is not binding upon the Government.

PORTUGUESE SOLDIERS IN THE TRENCHES

The Troops of Britain's Oldest Ally Give a Good Account of Themselves—Snipers of Fine Quality.

London.—The Press Association's special correspondent at War Correspondents' Headquarters in France, telegraphed yesterday afternoon, says:—
 In a general way there has been no particular outstanding incident in the warfare of the past week along the British front.
 The Portuguese troops, who are holding a part of the line which was the scene of one of our earliest offensive operations in 1915, have been giving a splendid account of themselves, and finely justify the high expectations of all our officers who have been associated with them.

The Germans have been bombarding and raiding their positions, presumably to test their strength. They have certainly inflicted casualties upon the troops of our oldest ally, but they have themselves paid a price in dead and wounded which should once again teach them the folly of the peculiarly Boche habit of holding an enemy too cheap.

I have seen a lot of the Portuguese soldiers, and can vouch for the excellent quality of their physique. They are largely drawn from the fishing classes, and are naturally resourceful as well as sturdy, keen of intelligence, and fiery of temperament.

If they have a military fault it is in being too venturesome. The difficulty is not to get them to go over the top, but to keep them

back. There are many good rifle shots amongst them, and their snipers are a source of great worry to the Huns.

Our Tommies, who are always candid critics, call them "Good old Portuguese," and this characteristic manner of expressing approbation is at least sincere.

What a cosmopolitan zone the British area is nowadays. On the roads and railways men from every continent in the world show the conscientious objectors that they are only too willing to do their share towards beating the Germans.

For example, I notice that the traffic control men along the Arras road are wearing nice white gloves as they dexterously check or wave on the endless stream of lorries, and cars, and despatch riders, and horse, foot, and guns. Let us hear no more of German thoroughness after this.

But to return to the fighting line. The little affair at Guillemont Farm in the small hours of yesterday morning is characteristic of the sort of activity which has gone on intermittently during the past week. The Huns may be thought to catch our men nodding in what has temporarily become a pretty quiet bit of the front. They put down a heavy bombardment with everything they could bring to bear, and pounded the trenches rather badly. Shortly before two o'clock they came over in considerable force, and got round the flanks of our position only to find that the garrison had withdrawn. Whilst they were beginning to try and consolidate their gains our men were upon them with bayonet and bomb, and there was a furious hand-to-hand fight.

In a few minutes all that remained of the invaders were two small parties in forward sap-heads. These held their ground for a little while, but by three o'clock the last of the enemy had been killed, wounded, captured, or driven out of line, leaving him nothing but his losses to show as the fruits of his enterprise.

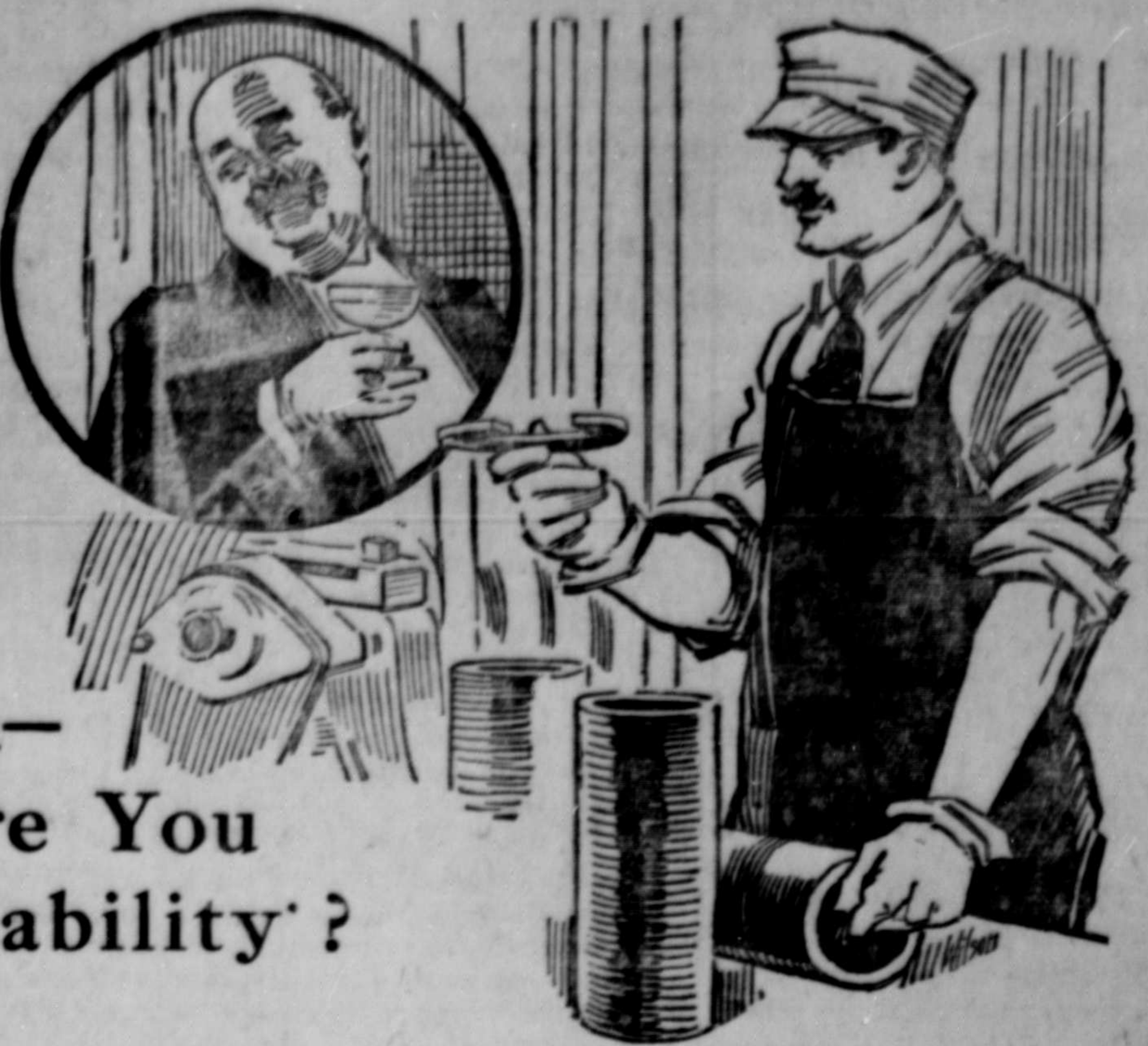

At the police court this morning, before Magistrate Carss, Frank Tomaszewsky, alias Frank Thomas, an alien enemy, was fined \$20 for failing to report.

The city council last evening agreed to pay the bill for the cost of the flooring of the old telephone building. This work was done by the Returned Soldiers Association who now have the use of the building. The value of the building has been enhanced by their labors.

The public utilities committee reported last night to the council that the offer from Mr. T. C. Duncan of \$650 for a slide valve engine be not accepted. It seems that six months ago it was recommended that this engine be sold, as it was disconnected from the hydro-electric plant. Now it seems to be a necessary adjunct of the plant.

WORK OF THE LAND SETTLEMENT BOARD

From all sections of British Columbia, the farming communities have given their unqualified approval to the new Land Settlement and Development Act, which is regarded as a great tribute to the present administration. The five members of this board, whose appointments were made last week, are all men with agricultural experience, and fit and proper persons to be entrusted with this most important piece of legislative machinery. Their first business session will be held on August 1.

The board aims at and will succeed in tapping the vast agricultural areas, which are at the present time either out of production or are yielding a very moderate return to the province in the way of much needed food-stuffs.

It will, moreover, stimulate the farmer to renewed efforts, who, despite many handicaps, has continually done his level best to heed with practical results the nation-wide exhortation for increased acreage. It is safe to predict that the complete operation of the Land Settlement and Development Act will usher in for the province of British Columbia an era of agricultural activity that will result in a fuller process of expansion and a more permanent realization of her unlimited rural potentialities.

Among the duties of the board will be the loaning of monies to farmers for agricultural improvements at low rates of interest. The board also has authority to undertake the development of schemes in different parts of the province with the one chief end in view of increasing agricultural production.

Tracts of land may also be taken over and improved, since not the least important provision in the terms of the act is its authority of its administrators to prepare in readiness for the agriculturist who is anxious to farm for immediate return on his labor. By the clearing of the land by the government, the months of weary toil without tangible recompense is thus spared the man who would be a producer. Reclamation and irrigation are also within the scope of the board's activities. The improvement of grazing lands will likewise be a great factor for the betterment of stock throughout the province. The returned soldier is also aided to the extent of \$500 in the purchase of land under the Act, in addition to the provision for the settler generally.

It is the intention of the minister of Agriculture, the Hon. John Oliver, to keep in close touch with the operation of the board in order that the best possible result may be obtained.
