BRITAIN WILL RETALIATE FOR HUN RAIDS

ADVANCE IS MAINTAINED ON WESTERN FRONT — COUNTER ATTACKS REPULSED

BRITISH GAINED ALL THEIR OBJECTIVES YESTERDAY

FIGHTING YESTERDAY EVENING WAS VERY SEVERE — MANY STRONG COUNTER ATTACKS WERE LAUNCHED UPON NEW BRITISH LINES IN VAIN ENDEAVOR BY THE ENEMY TO REGAIN LOST POSITIONS

(Special to The Daily News).
London, Sept. 28.—In yesterday's offensive we gained all our objectives, and were successful in capturing sixteen hundred and thirteen prisoners. Fighting on the battlefield last evening and during the night was extremely severe. The Germans made counter-attacks in great strength on the new British lines, extending from Tower Hamlets to the St. Quentin Road. Throughout the night, the whole Ypres sector was shrouded with artillery fire, trench mortars and grenade explosions. When morning broke, the British troops were still holding their positions. Four distinct counter attacks were made yesterday evening, and after a day of hard fighting, the British troops were incessantly driving back the attacking Germans.

Hun Planes Melp.
During yesterday's advance, strong opposition was encountered from the enemy's fighting machines. A great number of combats occurred at very low altitudes. The British machines were very active and dropped two tons of bombs upon the enemy's reserves. Altogether ten of the German aeroplanes were brought down in aerial fighting and five others by infantry fire. Thirteen British machines are missing.

French Front.
Paris, Sept. 28.—We repulsed attacks along the Chemin des Dames yesterday. Extremely heavy losses were inflicted upon the German attackers.

Italian Front.
Rome, Sept. 28.—Along the entire front, our gallant patrols caused much damage to the enemy and otherwise greatly harassed him. Prisoners have been taken in the Posifa region and great captures of arms and ammunition have been made on the entire front.

British Raids.
London, Sept. 28.—The British government has decided on systematic raiding of the German

cities in retaliation for the German air raids in England. Yesterday British aeroplanes dropped many tons of bombs on the German military establishments in Belgium.

The Battlefront.
A correspondent says the main battle in Belgium yesterday took place near Cameron House, south of the eastern extremity of the Polygon Wood, where the Australians were pressing the enemy hard. The situation today on the fighting front is virtually unchanged. Notwithstanding the extreme ferocity of the German counter attacks, the victorious British have been able to hold on to all their gains.

Russian Front.
Petrograd, Sept. 28.—General Tcheremisoff has been appointed commander-in-chief on the northern front. General Volestchenko succeeds the former as commander-in-chief on the southwestern front. In the region of Riga, south of the Pskoff road near Ellachi Castle, enemy reconnoitering parties have been repulsed. The fighting in the western and southwestern fronts has been limited to fusillades.

Lloyd George in France.
London, Sept. 28.—Premier Lloyd George left for France on Monday night to visit General Haig. Lieut.-General Bridges who accompanied Mr. Balfour on his mission to America, has lost his leg below the knee in consequence of a wound received in action.

A Narrow Escape.
London, Sept. 28.—A hospital in a southeastern suburb of London had a narrow escape during the German air raid on Tuesday night. The wrecking of the hospital and the destruction of the patients was only saved by an attendant who threw a bucket of water on the bomb.

Ships Sunk.
London, Sept. 28.—Thirteen British merchantmen of sixteen hundred tons and over, and two vessels of less tonnage were sunk by mines and submarines last week. Italy lost but one large vessel and six smaller craft.

The Thelma was in yesterday with 7,000 lbs. halibut; Alliance with 1,000; Margallice, 2,000; Caygeon, 3,000; Ringleader, 6,000; Mack, 3,000. The price realized was 15¢ cents. The Chief Zibassa also brought in 16,000 lbs. for the Gold Storage Co. Today, the Seymour is in with 35,000 lbs. halibut, and bidding is still in progress at time of writing.

In the Letter Box

The Bank of Montreal,

To the Mayor and Council,
City of Prince Rupert, B. C.
Dear Sirs:—We cannot allow to pass unchallenged the remarks attributed by the press to the chairman of the finance committee.

The city authorities are at liberty to withdraw the account from the bank and if they see fit, refuse to give any reason to the bank, but we strongly resent representations being made to the public that the services and advice given by the Bank of Montreal to the city were not of the best.

Following a certain transaction in New York early last year, Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, general manager of the bank wrote: "There is no city in the Dominion for whom we have done as much as the city of Prince Rupert and none that has showed so remarkable a lack of appreciation of our services and assistance."

We are treated now as then, with the same lack of consideration. Ordinarily business courtesy we think should have impelled the authorities to approach the bank, with which the city had been dealing for a number of years, and ascertain if the rates afforded by another bank would be met. Instead of that we are casually informed that the council has passed a resolution to withdraw the account and that the authorities are not called upon to give any explanation.

According to the press, the chairman of the finance committee stated that no bank would tender for the city's business and that the city treasurer's report showed that the city might save money by making the change. These statements are at variance. The treasurer could not submit a comparative statement without other figures. The treasurer's statement, however, shows that figures were submitted to him as coming from the Royal Bank. On

FRANCHISE BILL TO WIN ELECTIONS

Toronto, Sept. 27.—"The Canadian National Suffrage Association, which has local societies from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and which for the past thirty-five years has fought for the rights of equal franchise to women, wishes to protest most emphatically against the present so-called franchise bill. The correct name would be a disfranchise bill. Everybody knows that it is a win the election measure. It would be direct and at the same time more honest if the bill simply stated that all who did not pledge themselves to vote Conservative would be disfranchised. This might be satisfactory to some but it is not a Canadian-born woman's ideal of free government, nor can anyone who approves of this disfranchise bill claim to represent Canadian suffragettes."

This strong statement was given to the press last evening by Dr. Margaret Gordon in reply to Mrs. L. A. Hamilton, who recently declared that the Dominion franchise bill was most acceptable to the Canadian women interested in the suffrage. Dr. Gordon pointed out that she had been identified with the suffrage movement in Canada for the past thirty-five years, and was qualified, therefore, to speak upon the attitude of the Canadian National Suffrage Association. Mrs. Hamilton, if correctly quoted, did not represent the views of the Canadian National Suffrage Association.

Asked her opinion of the report published in the morning papers of Premier Borden's letter to Mrs. J. O. Perry of Vancouver promising women the vote, Dr. Gordon said: "Oh, that's nothing new. He has promised us that a dozen times. Why, only a few weeks ago, when we were meeting in Winnipeg, a message of a similar nature was read to the convention." She explained further that Premier Borden had told her and a deputation in Ottawa that the Federal franchise to women would follow automatically with the exercise of Provincial rights of this character.

EQUALITY

A little less than a year ago, Sir Robert Borden accompanied by Mr. R. B. Bennett passed through the country telling the people of the worth of National Service outside the army. The people were informed that service in the coal mines and in the wheat fields, in the factories and in the workshops was National Service, in many cases quite as valuable to the nation as service at the front. This was one point which was emphasized. The service was given by Canadians willingly, and thousands of Canadians who were born overseas gave that service willingly. They now find that the Government appreciates such service by betraying its compact with them when they came to this country.

The War Time Elections Act which has been introduced is despotic in its methods, unfair in detail and as un-British as any legislation that has been introduced since the time of Charles the First. The Government proceeds on the assumption that the vote is a privilege or a reward. It is no such thing. It is a right. The Government tears up the "scrap of paper" which it gave to thousands of good settlers in this country though they have carried out their part of the agreement.

It also proposes to enfranchise only women who are relatives of soldiers. The Government have conceded that women have the right to vote. Yet in this instance, the assumption on the part of the Government that the vote is a reward, a special privilege, is most marked. Sir Robert Borden has intimated that he will bring in a woman's suffrage bill after the election, if he is in power. He concedes the right of women to vote. Yet in this bill he denies that right to all those women who do not happen to have any male relatives in uniform. That is absolutely penalizing the other women in the country. Their right exists also.

It can only be assumed that the Government has introduced this legislation disenfranchising the foreign born Canadians because it believes that the

foreign born Canadians have faith in the British fair play methods of the Liberals, and that they will probably vote for the Liberal candidate at the coming election. There are thousands of Bohemians and Ruthenians in Canada and in the trenches, who have no devotion to a despotic administration which drove them to this country. They have been good Canadians, yet they are to be disgraced by the Canadian Government, and their nationality in this new, free country taken from them.

If these German-born or Austrian-born show any sympathy for the forces of autocracy in this struggle, they can be dealt with summarily and severely. Most of them have conducted themselves well. Most of them are not sympathetic with the Kaiser and his reign of terror. But the Canadian Government is doing everything it can to drive them to it. It says that this is only a war time measure. That is always the start. If this succeeds, the same Government, encouraged with success, will further limit the franchise. If the Government can disenfranchise in this manner, there is no good reason why it should not decide later on, to disenfranchise all who are not Tory, and enfranchise all who are Tory.

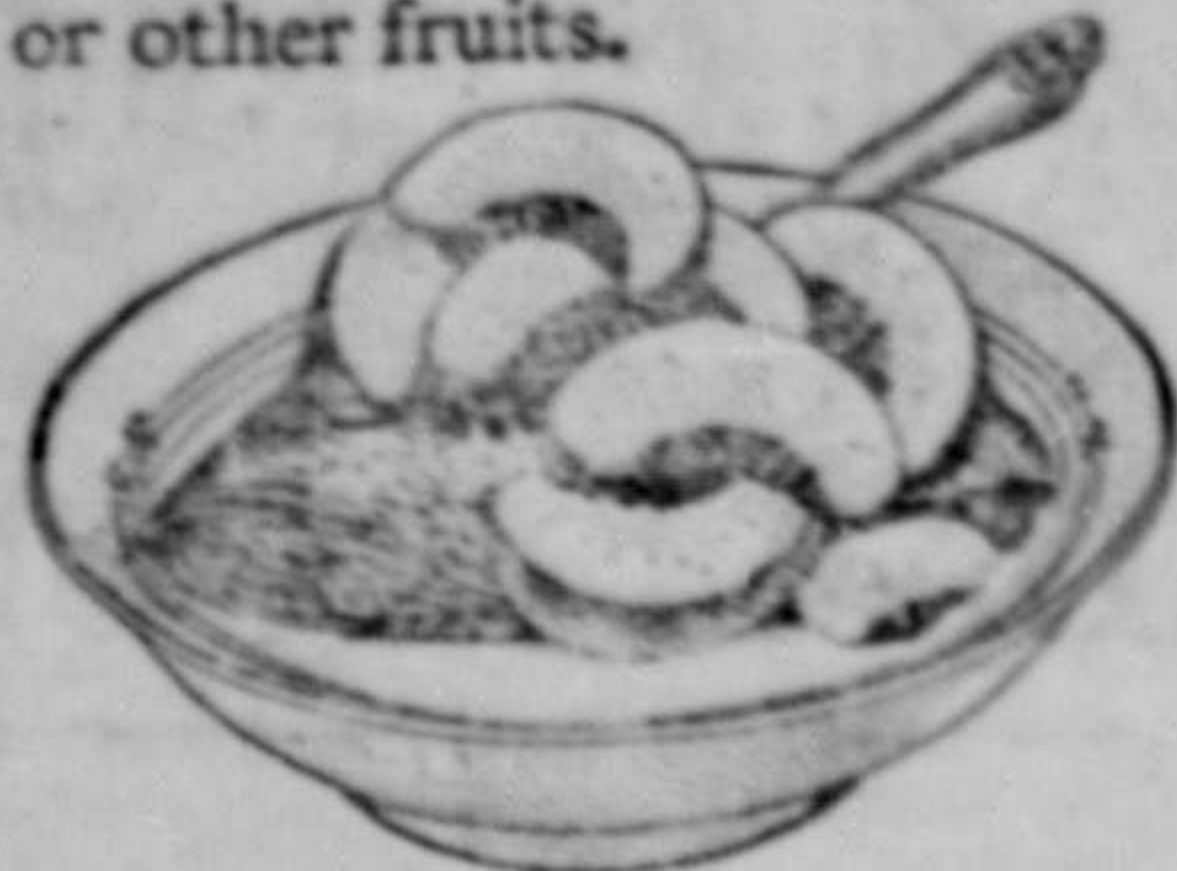
Sir Robert Borden would bring in a Woman Suffrage Act next session, but that will deprive the women of Canada from using their vote until five years hence. The women relatives of the soldiers have every right to vote. But not at the expense of every other woman in Canada.

Legislation of this kind does not tend to unity. It is dividing the people into different groups at a time when unity was never more essential. Whether Canada shall be divided or united, however, seems to be a matter of no moment to this Government.

"Can the leopard change his spots, or the Ethiopian his skin?" A rose by any other name would smell as sweet. A Conservative by any other name would act the same. And so forth ad libitum.

How to call a public meeting privately, and keep it private, is still a problem.

In the district in and around Toronto, feeling seems to be running high against Sir Joseph Flavelle, the real food controller of Canada. Even in his own home town of Toronto he is condemned, and by the Conservative Ward Associations, too. Even Conservatives can have too much of a good thing—for Sir Joseph.

We have been suffering from a scarcity of war news for the past three days owing to telegraph troubles, but the welcome information came through yesterday that the British advance on the west front was being resumed over a wide front east of Ypres. This is another forward step in the cutting off from the Belgian coast of the Huns.

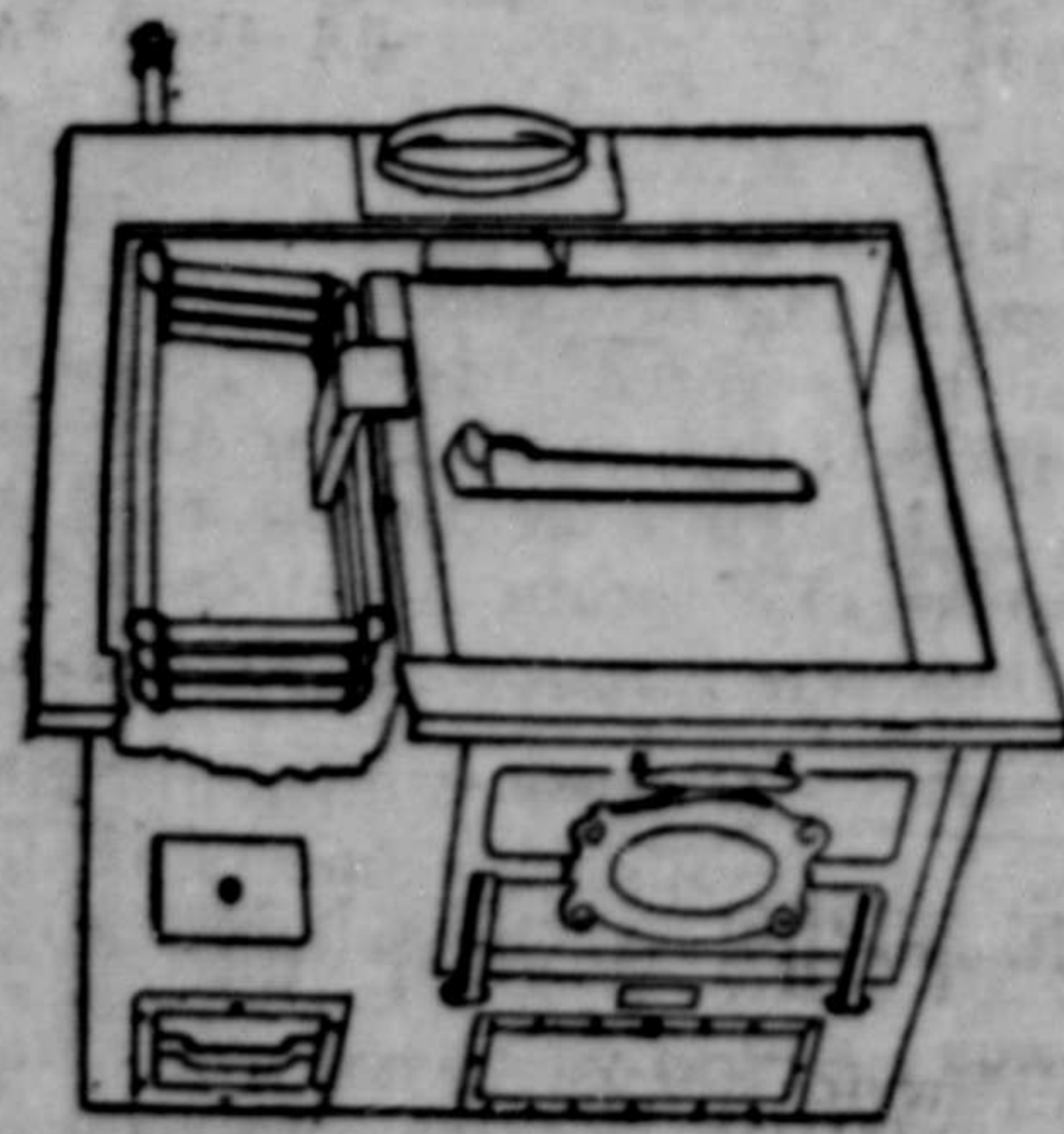

The play concerns one woman and two men, one of whom she marries, while at the same time continues to receive the attentions of the other. The rejected lover naturally develops into a villain, and the society woman's love of bridge lets her fall into his hands through a gambling debt. Thereupon complications ensue, from which the woman is saved by her husband, and by her own realization of the shams, bluffs, and hypocrisies of high society. The play has its many situations, and altogether is a drama of sound moral and artistic merit.
