## ITALIANS SUSTAIN VICIOUS HUN ATTACKS

### FURTHER PROGRESS IN FLANDERS--PRISONERS TAKEN--GROUND RECAPTURED

#### GERMANS EXERT TREMENDOUS PRESSURE ON ITALIAN ARMY

AUSTRO-GERMAN FORCES MASSED TO DRIVE ITALIANS ON TO THE PLAINS OF VENICE--POSITION CRITICAL--ITALIANS SUCCEED IN HOLDING MOUNTAIN PASSES AND HAVE THE ENEMY IN CHECK

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Rome, October 27.—Fighting is continuing with unabated violence both on the Carso and on the Isonzo fronts. The evacuation of the Bainsizza plateau was a strategic movement to prevent a turning movement by General Mackensen's forces who had advanced westwards in the valleys. The enemy is attacking the passes leading through the mountains to the plains of Venice in exceedingly great strength. The whole of the Austrian forces and innumerable divisions of German troops have been brought from the Russian front to face the Italians, who are now face to face with the concentrated forces of Austria and Germany.

**Battles in the Air.**  
Many thrilling fights have taken place in the air between the Italian and German aviators. Several machines on both sides have been brought down, although the superiority in the air remains with the Italians. Ten German machines have been captured by the Italian forces.

**Cadorna Ready.**  
General Cadorna has been prepared to meet the great Austro-German drive for weeks past, having received information of the enemy's intentions. Reports of the massing of the enemy troops was also reported by the Italian air service. British and French reinforcements have been pouring into Italy, together with artillery and machine guns. The British artillery has been of the most effective use in the defence of the passes, while most extensive use has been made by the Italians of the machine guns.

Both these gentlemen will spend several days in Vancouver, Victoria and other parts of the province, where they think their services will be helpful in the cause. The Hon. J. A. Calder, of Saskatchewan, is also expected to arrive in Vancouver shortly to assist the Hon. Martin Burrell.

The casket will be taken east for burial, and it is expected that Mrs. Angle will leave Prince Rupert and reside in the east in future.

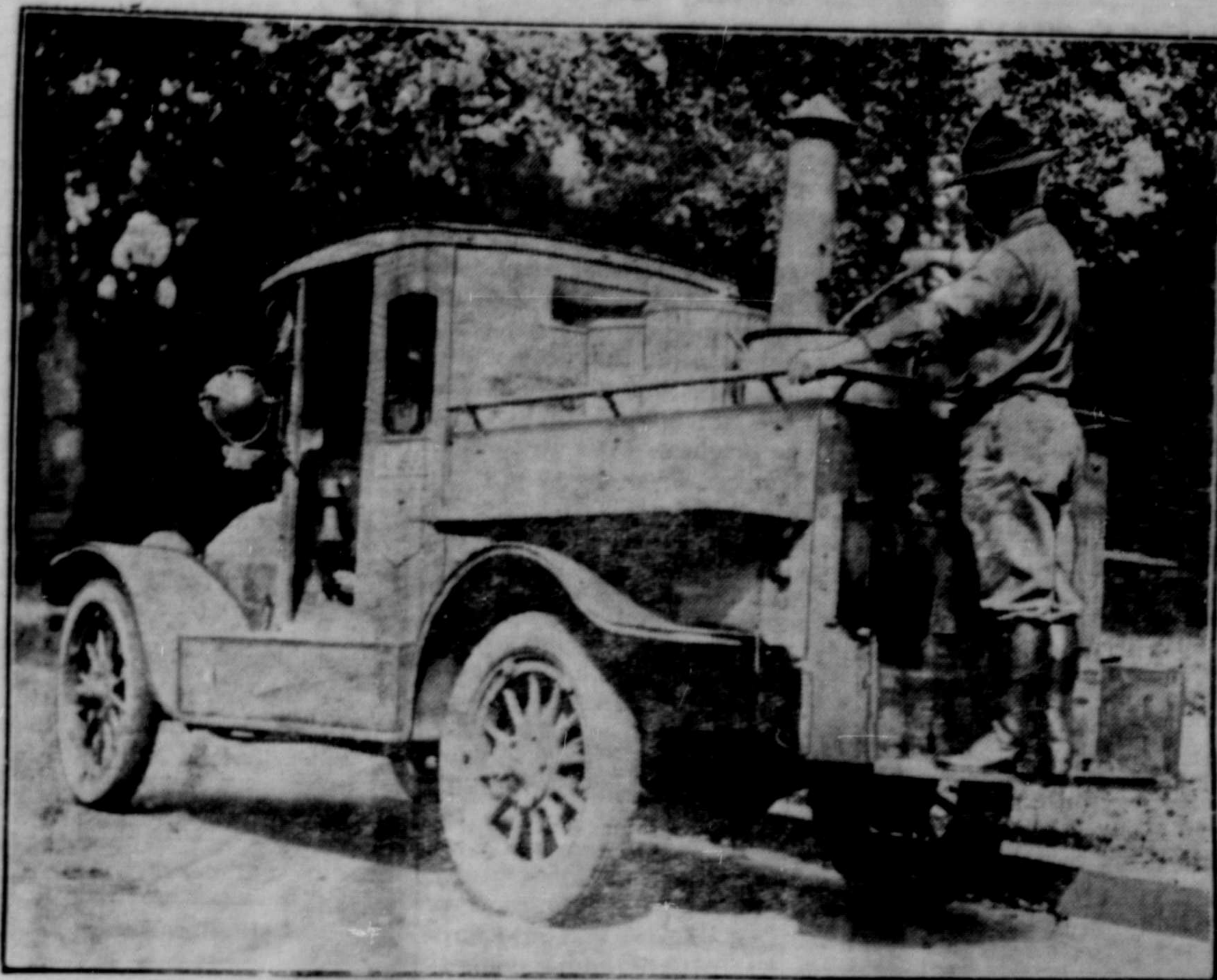
#### ACCIDENT TO THE TRANSMISSION LINE

#### FILLING COTS IN THE NATIONAL DORMITORY

How Borden Government Looks After Its Own—Good Berths for Good Tories.

Ottawa, October 23.—Premier Borden is reconstructing his cabinet as was expected and the party press is calling it fusion government. The cynical bystander, whose name is legion at the capital, labels it confusion. At all events Premier Borden's well meant efforts to be born again, as it were, have not caused his more or less faithful followers to let up in their wild scurry for cover. Nobody knows just how hard it is going to rain.

Within the last fortnight since Parliament prorogued, five Conservative members of Parliament have been provided with safe berths. A. C. Boyce has been given an \$8,000 a year job as Railway Commissioner. Clarence Jameson pulls down \$5,000 a year as a Civil Service Commissioner. Gerald Brabazon takes the position of Inspector of Storage Dams on the Ottawa River—largely an ornamental office, but Mr. Brabazon has to be appeased, because he was disappointed in his ambition to be a Senator. Frank Shepherd, of Nanaimo, who was morally certain to be defeated by Wm. Sloan, finds a safe harbor as Inspector of Dredging in British Columbia. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, gets a life insurance of six thousand dollars a year as Chairman of the Civil Service Commission, vice Dr. Adam Shortt the capable and non-partisan ex-chairman, who is shifted to the Board of Historical Documents—a very dusty pigeon-hole for the brilliant and public-spirited doctor.

In addition to Dr. Roche, five other cabinet ministers must be provided for to make way for the new "fusionist" members of the Government. Sir George Perley is booked as High Commissioner in London, where his aspirations to crown his career as a peer of the realm will be diligently cultivated. His place as cabinet minister without portfolio—the position he occupied before he became locum tenens as Overseas Minister of Militia—will probably be taken by the Hon. Frank Coch-

#### UNION GOVERNMENT IS WHAT THE PEOPLE ASKED

Winnipeg, Oct. 27.—"I believe in a Union Government at this juncture in our history. If I had not believed in a Union Government I would not have gone into it," declared Hon. T. A. Crerar, Minister of Agriculture, yesterday morning.

The new Minister was busy at the office of the United Grain Growers and said he had no time to talk. Asked concerning the election outlook, he said:

"The outlook should be the very best. The people of Canada have been asking for a Union Government for two years, and now they have one. Our policy is a win-the-war policy, combined with comprehensive domestic enterprise."

Mr. Crerar, who has expressed a desire to be rid of the hardships of an election contest and to seek refuge in the Senate. The Hon. George Foster is also slated for a cot in the national dormitory, the weather signs in North Toronto being distinctly unfavorable for the Minister of Trade and Commerce. The Hon. Thomas Crothers, who is to make room for "a real labor minister" will be satisfied with a judgeship.

The Hon. Martin Burrell, who finds the social life of Ottawa very attractive, will be given a snug little berth at the capital—something that will not take him away from the tango teas and the golf clubs—probably the Clerkship of the House of Commons, which carries with it five thousand dollars a year and as much ease and dignity as Mr. Burrell likes. Rumor assigns the position of Overseas Minister of Militia to Sir James Loughheed, whose title and wealth ought to do well in the English climate.

There are ten vacancies in the Senate, five of which are as good as filled now, Messrs. W. H. Wil- loughby, Schaffner, Col. J. D. Taylor, and Barnard being the names mentioned. These, with the seats in the Senate recently handed out to Messrs. Macdonald, Blain and Fisher, will make eight Conservative M. P.'s who have been lifted out of danger into the serene atmosphere of the Upper Chamber. (Continued on Page Two.)

#### ALLIES STRIKE ANOTHER BLOW NEAR TO YPRES

French Troops Waded Through Two Rivers—Hundreds of Prisoners Taken—Hun Attack Smashed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, October 29.—Further triumphs rested on the French troops on the Ypres-Dixmude road today after a powerful forward thrust deep into German-held territory. German troops were ready for an advance, but the preparatory cannonade of the French artillery, shattered their units and disorganized the German defensive machine. Despite resistance from the Germans the French troops swept on and over, suffering much less loss than the enemy who were mowed down in great numbers as they fought or fled. Further successes are reported from the Aisne front where the Germans were subjected to a furious attack and gave way, the French taking all their objectives, including highly fortified and bitterly-fought Froimont farm. The French troops forced a crossing of two rivers, wading through icy waters up to their shoulders, and then they captured the villages of Draibank, Paperoet Wood and a number of fortified farms.

**German Statement.**  
Berlin, Oct. 29.—An official statement of the operations on the west front issued here says that the German troops on the Aisne front were unable to save guns and war material in Pinon wood during the French attack, and withdrew behind the Oise-Aisne canal, southeast of Chavignon.

**British Front.**  
London, October 29.—On the Ypres front, Polderhoek Chateau, which the British entered yesterday, was in the hands of the Germans today. Fierce fighting is still in progress. Violent artillery engagements also continue near the southern border of Houthelst Wood and local engagements are numerous.

**Russian Front.**  
Petrograd, Oct. 29.—Preparations are being made in Helsingfors, the capital of Finland, for its evacuation. The Germans are said to be preparing for a descent upon Finland and profling by their propaganda, expect to be able with small forces to capture Russian troops without resistance, and also to cut the railway at Tornes, thus severing communication between Russia and Sweden.

**War Statistics.**  
London, Oct. 29.—The total number of killed in the war is placed at 9,750,000 and the number of wounded at 23,600,000.

**Hun Inferiority.**  
Amsterdam, Oct. 29.—General Arnhem, one of Germany's commanding generals, admits the inferiority of the Huns. He says that the British troops are three or four times more numerous than the Germans.

### "NO QUALMS"

Sir Joseph Flavelle says he considers the profit of \$1,400,000 made by his company in 1916 on a capital investment of \$1,500,000 quite legitimate, and he has no qualms of conscience over it. If he had said that he had no conscience and therefore could not be subject to qualms he would have been nearer the mark. If he had added that he could not see this war apart from its opportunities for private gain he would have scored a bull's-eye. For it would seem from Sir Joseph Flavelle's cynical admissions that he must be unable to grasp the fundamental issues of the war or to understand why millions of brave men are offering up their lives on the battlefield. The passion to make money must have blurred his vision and distorted his judgment. Ninety per cent. profit in 1916 and 120 per cent. in 1917, mostly out of the blood and sweat of the people of this country and its Allies! And he considers it quite legitimate and has no qualms of conscience!

It would be interesting to learn how many men in Canada share Sir Joseph Flavelle's state of mind; to what extent turgid materialism has dulled the moral perceptions of the inmates of the House of Commons; how far the soul of this Dominion has been debauched by greed. The Union Government should be able to furnish the information and to effect a partial reformation at least. By allowing Sir Joseph Flavelle \$150,000, or ten per cent. on the investment of \$1,500,000, and taking the four or five millions made over that amount in the last three years, it would help the country and Sir Joseph plainly is in need of a drastic corrective—besides teaching a striking object lesson. Any man who can consider such enormous profits made out of the agony of his country and its Allies as legitimate needs a more powerful force for good behind him than Sir Joseph appears to have had in the meet-

ings of the Quarterly Board. Sir Joseph Flavelle of course, must be removed from the chairmanship of the Imperial Munitions Board. His conception of legitimacy as applied to profiteering is a constant menace to the Allies' cause in the war.—Times.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS

"Hon. Arthur Meighen says the late Government had an excellent record. If we estimate the number of things it should have done but did not do by the number of things the new Government says it is going to do we find nothing but gross incompetency and neglect in the record the Hon. Arthur Meighen extolled. Incidentally, Mr. Meighen is not helping the new Government, of which he is a member, by trying to justify the old one. Moreover, he might profitably bear in mind that the Union Government will speedily follow the late Government into an unwept grave if it should fail to do what is expected of it."

Meantime, notwithstanding, or perhaps in spite of the efforts of the Fuel Controller, coal is still \$12 per ton for the average consumer in Prince Rupert and unscreened at that! Has anybody heard of anything being done regarding the cost of coal at the mine?

A correspondent to a southern contemporary says that there is no blinking the fact that the Flavelle-White combination is still supreme at Ottawa and that the Win-the-War movement is the severest indictment of the late Government. "This Union Government may be the best available meantime, but if it fails to curb the machinations of the Toronto group of financiers who have Canada by the pockets, it must surely be turned out neck and crop, and that can only be accomplished if enough of the right type of men are sent to Ottawa. If politicians of the type of H. S. Clements and H. J. Stevens are returned British Columbia will have failed in its duty to Canada." 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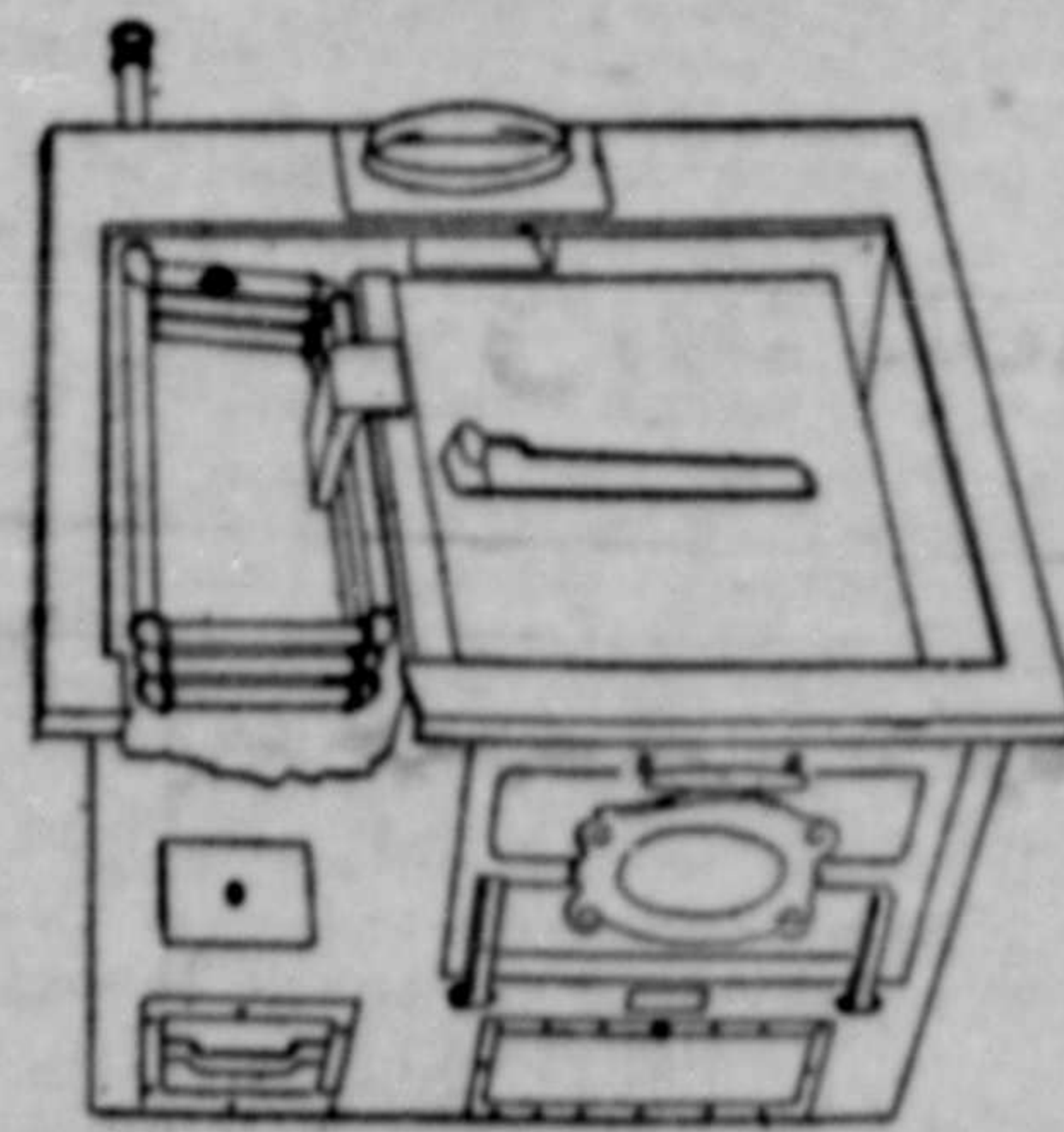
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
