HUNS REMOVE POPULATION OF CAMBRAI

THE CIVILIAN INHABITANTS BEING TAKEN FURTHER BEHIND THE FIRING LINE

EVACUATION OF CAMBRAI BY CIVILIANS

German Counter Attacks at Bourlon Fail, and are not Repeated—Much Traffic From Cambrai.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 27.—(British official.) On Sunday night, the enemy succeeded in pressing back our troops from portions of Bourlon, which we had entered. We got prisoners west of Bourlon today. Since that time, the enemy has not attempted any further attacks on Bourlon, since his failure yesterday. The situation remains unchanged.

At Cambrai.
A very large traffic is reported to be moving out of Cambrai in a southeasterly direction, which indicates that the civilian population of the city is being evacuated by the German authorities. No information has yet come to hand showing where these Belgian people are being taken to.

Franch Front.
Paris, Nov. 27.—(Official.) East of the Meuse yesterday, on a front of three and a half kilometres, we took the first and second German lines, some dug-outs, and over eight hundred prisoners.

Italian Front.
London, Nov. 27.—A correspondent writing from Italy says that he saw ranks of French and British infantry within sound of the battle on the Italian northern front.

Honor for Currie.
Paris, Nov. 27.—General Currie, commander of the Canadian army in France, has been awarded the Croix de Gurrie.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

There was a full attendance at the meeting of the City Council last evening, Mayor McCaffery presiding. The first matter to be dealt with was a letter from Mr. L. W. Patmore on behalf of Mr. Winter, who represents the bond holders of the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Co. Information was desired as to whether the city would do anything—either accept the offer made by the company in consideration of the Falls river power, or else submit the matter to arbitration. After some discussion, on the motion of Ald. McClymont, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn, the matter was laid over for a week.

Telephone Operators.
A report from the superintendent of utilities was received regarding increases in salary for the telephone exchange operators. A scale had been drawn up, which was approved of by the superintendent and by the operators, as follows:—First three months, \$40; second three months, \$50; next six months, \$55; next six months, \$62.50; next six months, \$66; third year, \$70; fourth year, \$72.50; supervisors, \$80. The operators will work seven hours per day.

Spoiled His Pants.
A report was received from the city solicitor regarding a claim from Mr. Wm. Sibbald for damages received owing to a fall caused by the absence of street lighting. The lights being out of commission owing to an accident, a tree having fallen over the transmission line, the city could not be held responsible. It was held that he should have taken a light as a matter of reasonable precaution. The fact of reasonable precaution not having been taken, in no wise makes the city liable.

The city solicitor had interviewed Mr. Sibbald, who did not claim great damages, but thought he should get something, as he was "shaken up somewhat, cut about the head, bruised down one side and had a black eye. He claims his wrist was sprained, his watch was broken and that his pants were spoiled." The report was filed.

Power and Light Rates.
Ald. Dybhavn gave notice that at the next meeting of the council he would introduce a bylaw fixing the rates for electric power and light.

Regarding the standing of the public utilities, Ald. Montgomery was anxious. It was coming near the end of the year and he thought it was time to get down to business. He wanted that report upon the utilities which was overdue. Ald. Dybhavn promised solemnly to have the report in next week, when the reason for the "deplorable state" of the utilities would be given in full.

Tenders.
For putting a tar and gravel roof upon the old telephone exchange now occupied by the Returned Soldiers Association, tenders were opened. Steen & Long will quoted \$186; H. C. Meiers quoted thirty-eight cents less, namely, \$185.62, and Henry Letourneau, \$148. The lowest tender was accepted.

Permission was accorded to the city clerk to call for tenders for printing the voters' lists.

The City Market.
Notice of motion was given by Ald. Casey regarding the city market. Next week he will move a resolution instructing the city clerk to prepare an amendment to the city market bylaw to prevent the market clerk from selling goods to the local dealers to sell over again to the public. TRAIL CITY COUNCIL TO ENTER LIBEL SUIT

Nelson, B. C., Nov. 24.—Trail city council has instructed the city clerk to enter suit for libel in connection with the publication of a Victoria dispatch stating that the 1,500 men went on strike at the Trail smelter as a protest against the enforcement of the Military Service Act, and that men were refusing to appear before the exemption board.

The district Associated Boards of Trade executive will meet at Trail on Friday with the object of bringing about a settlement of the hours' dispute. The men have issued a statement in which they deny they have broken their agreement with the company, and make a plea for the eight-hour day for the mechanics and yardmen for which they are fighting.

DR. LEW KERGIN BACK IN MESOPOTAMIA

Word has been received in town from Dr. Lew Kergin, who has now returned to Mesopotamia for another spell of duty there. He is stationed three miles from the ancient city of the Caliphs, Bagdad. When writing, he had been twice in the city, and expected to see something interesting, but was disappointed. The streets are just as narrow and as dirty as in any other Eastern city. In the bazaars, most of the stuff for sale could be bought in Bombay both better and cheaper. The only souvenirs of the place to be picked up are those which are acquired unconsciously, and got rid of at the first opportunity.

On the voyage out this time, Dr. Kergin voyaged via the Cape and visited Cape Town and Durban. It rained in Durban, worse than in Prince Rupert, but it had the decency to clear up after an hour or so. The quality of the Durban rain is such that no one stays out in it. Where the Doctor is now, the temperature is well over 100 in the shade, and he has almost forgotten what the gentle rain is like. He would appreciate some of the Prince Rupert cool, moist breezes very much, with a small percentage of raindrops.

THE ASSIZES

Mr. Justice Clement is expected to arrive in the city tomorrow morning by the Prince Rupert, to take the Assize Court, and the civil sittings, commencing upon Thursday.

There are four criminal cases coming up at this time. A charge of assault is laid against John May, also that of resisting arrest. Jim Loloff and Marengo Carlo will be charged with manslaughter arising out of an accident at Anxox when a work train was derailed. They will be defended by a Vancouver counsel, Mr. Arthur Fleishman. A charge of sedition is laid against Hugh Bruce, of Massett, and there will also be another case arising out of this one.

The civil sittings will follow, of which there are three on the calendar.

GOOD PROGRESS IN CLEARING THE TRACK

Through Communication With the East Hoped for in a Few Days—Work Being Pushed.

The work of clearing the track of the G. T. P. between Prince Rupert and Terrace is proceeding apace. The debris brought down by the slides which blocked the line is now almost all removed and now all that remains to be done practically is the repairs necessary, which were occasioned by the washouts of the track by the floods. There have been fairly extensive, but the repair work is being rapidly pushed forward, and by means of transfers across the dangerous parts, it was today possible to get into communication with the East.

Trains are running from Terrace to the east, and the only remaining difficulty lies between Salvus and Terrace. It is hoped that by Saturday or Sunday to have the track in such shape as to permit the through trains completing their journeys. The Skeena is still falling, although on the mountains where the water comes from, it is still raining.

The work of restoring the railroad track on this occasion has been extensive and difficult, but the officials of the G. T. P. have left nothing undone to have the through communication restored at the earliest possible moment.

THE SCHOOL BOARD

The regular meeting of the school board was held last evening in the city hall. Resignations were accepted from Miss McGregor, Mrs. Klower and Mr. C. A. Murray. It was also intimated that Miss E. Eason had verbally signified her intention of resigning her position, although this had not been received in writing. Arrangements for filling the vacant positions were made, and suitable teachers will be advertised for to fill the vacancies.

Mr. W. G. Oakley was appointed to be janitor at the Borden Street School. Mr. Lord, inspector of schools, met the members of the School Board at this meeting.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

It's not too late yet to buy a Victory Bond.

People are still grouching about weather. In Great Britain, they had snow last month, and it was cold enough there to grouse about.

Under the provisions of the War Time Election Act—a weapon forged expressly by the Borden Government to help their return somehow—there are some fifteen thousand soldiers who have no definite constituency to vote in. These fifteen thousand votes judiciously applied to the weak spots all over Canada are calculated to wipe out many close Liberal majorities. This is the Borden Government's idea of fairness.

Among the most gracious acts ever recorded in this city must be placed the voluntary withdrawal of Messrs. S. M. Newton and J. E. Merryfield, the legitimate and the illegitimate Conservatives. (For a certificate regarding this adjective see the Evening Empire of March 6, 1916). Now wasn't that a nice thing to do, in the interests of National Unity? The more so considering that our friend Joe never had any intention of running as a candidate. He knew better. And Sam, he daren't. He would lose his deposit! And all the time, the Tory representatives in the city corresponding with Colonel Peck! Since as far back as last June, too! Taken all round, such humility is most engaging.

The Duke of Wellington was a brave man. He was a soldier, whom his men swore by. In their gratitude, the British nation presented him with Apsley House in London. But the Duke has other ambitions too. He became a politician and was backed by the Conservatives of that day. He voted against the Reform Bill of 1828. And the great British public mobbed his fine house and left not one whole window. A horrible example of public ingratitude!

BERLIN MOB FIGHTS THE POLICE IN RIOTS

London, Nov. 23.—Serious rioting took place in Berlin last Sunday, according to dispatches received by the Wireless Press and the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam.

The message to the Exchange Telegraph Company says that the fighting between the mob and the police was very fierce, and that there was a heavy casualty list as the police used their firearms.

The Wireless Press says the military and police were called upon to oppose the progress of the Independent Socialist demonstrations. In the riotous scenes which followed, the police were forced to fire with their rifles and revolvers, and the organizers of the meeting responded with firearms and knives.

The German press, the dispatches say, have been forbidden to publish details of the affray. No newspapers have arrived in Amsterdam from Berlin.

FRENCH LINER SINKS GERMAN SUBMARINE

Paris, Nov. 23.—A German submarine was destroyed at the time the French steamship Medie, with a cargo of munitions, was torpedoed in the Western Mediterranean on September 23, with a loss of 250 lives, says the Journal. The liner Biskra was proceeding with a convoy of French and British steamers, among which was the Medie, leading the line. The Medie was torpedoed without warning before she was able to bring her guns to bear on the submarine. Apparently thinking that the ships were not armed, the submarine commander brought his boat slowly to the surface. The Biskra immediately opened fire at a distance of two miles. The second shot struck the submarine forward and low. An explosion followed. The submarine's stern shot up. The U-boat plunged to destruction as the Medie disappeared.

POINTS OF INTEREST FOR INTENDING VOTERS

There are many points about the Dominion elections act as affected by the war time elections act and the new provisions which will be applicable to the voting in the coming elections.

The following are some points which will be of interest to the voters in the coming federal election:—

Where provincial requirements as to residence cannot be applied at the time of making the lists the residential qualifications of voters is one year in the province and thirty days in the electoral district prior to the issuance of the writ of election.

Wives, widows, mothers, sisters and daughters of persons, male or female, alive or dead, who are serving or who have served outside of Canada in any of the military forces of Canada or Great Britain or within or without Canada in any of the naval forces, excepting such female relatives of persons who have ceased service in otherwise than an honorable manner are entitled to vote. No such relatives of persons who have joined the naval forces of Canada since the passing of the war time election act on September 20, 1917, will have the vote.

Lists to be Posted. Fifteen days before the polling day (Dec. 17) lists of the voters in each polling subdivision will be posted in said subdivision. The enumerators then sit two hours per day for ten days preceding polling day to revise the list, answer inquiries and execute transfers of votes of election officers and agents whose duties may take them away from the polling subdivision on election day. Up to five days before election the enumerator may upon the representation of any credible person add or strike off the lists any name.

There are no printed lists. On election day electors whose names are not on the lists may appear before the enumerator who sits within or near the polling place. If they are entitled to vote they are given certificates. Any person who is refused a certificate may demand and obtain a written refusal which entitles him to a ballot which is sealed in a non-velope and not counted excepting in case of a recount and then only upon proof of his right to vote. Votes of persons challenged are treated in the same manner. There is an enumerator in each

polling subdivision. Entirely new lists are being made out in Prince Rupert. The lists when completed will be posted outside the polling booths or outside the postoffice.

May be Sworn. Every person, whose name is on the list, can be sworn by candidate, agent, or elector, and if the oath is refused the voter loses the right to cast a vote in the election. The oath is:—

"You swear that you are legally qualified to vote at this election, that you are of the (male or female) sex, a British subject, resident of Canada, and of the full age of 21 years. (In case of a female voter the following is added): You do further swear that you are the (wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter as the case may be) of a person who is serving or has served without Canada in the military forces (or within or without Canada in the naval forces) of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war."

The following people are unqualified to vote:—

The judges of every court whose appointment rests with the governor-in-council;

Persons disenfranchised for corrupt practices under the act; Criminals, lunatics, inmates of poor houses and such institutions;

Any person who has applied for exemption from military service on conscientious grounds and who has not been discharged;

All Mennonites and Doukhobors excepting those who may be enlisted;

Every naturalized British subject who was born in an enemy country and naturalized subsequent to March, 1902, excepting those who have enlisted and served out of Canada in the Canadian or British armies, or in or without Canada in the navy; or have tried to enlist and been refused because medically unfit; or those who are grandparent, parents, sons, or brothers of such as who have so enlisted or tried to enlist; or those who are or have been during the present war members of the parliament of Canada of any province; or Syrians and Armenians who are Christians; or those who are females entitled to the vote through relationship to a soldier.

Every person who has been convicted of an offense against the military service act has no vote.

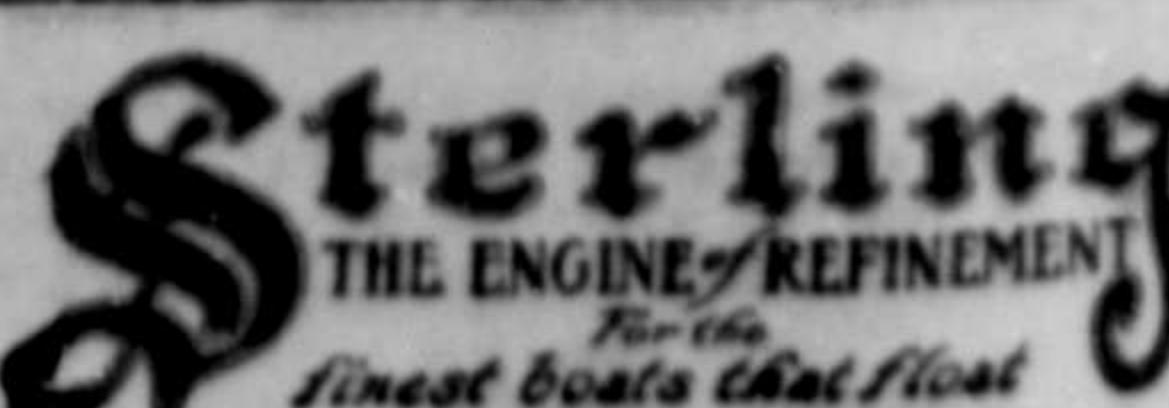

IN THE LETTER BOX

Dear Editor:—The Evening Empire seems to derive much needed consolation from the attitude of certain Liberals throughout Canada, but the Empire must bear in mind that those Liberals have taken their present stand only after long consultation with the Liberal leader, whose advice in every case was: "Obey your conscience." Sir Wilfrid Laurier never made use of the methods of coercion and that is one of the many reasons why he is so firmly enthroned in the affection of the Canadian people, and why he is invincible in the coming contest at the polls. The Empire must also observe, even from the columns of the "great" Canadian papers, that the only way the "Liberal" members of the present cabinet can get an attentive hearing in their respective constituencies is by denouncing the record of the Borden Government and upholding the long and honorable career of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The people can see how political affairs are shaping from the fact that out of nineteen acclamations eighteen are Liberal or Liberal Unionist. As to H. F. Gadsby, he spoke his true conviction a few days ago when he said: "The Borden Government is going into the fight with the cards stacked, and with a huge campaign fund obtained from the Canadian Northern steal, but they will find that all that amounts to no more than a doughnut against a landslide of public opinion."

Now Gadsby must write what the "great" Canadian papers will print. The Empire should not place too great confidence in the influence of a subsidized press. There was an election in New York City lately; there was also a fusion candidate, and he and his supporters insisted on being the only loyal people in the city of New York. The great papers of the city said that if Mitchell was not elected the city of New York would drop out of the war. The masses thought differently, however, and the "ultra loyalists" and the "great" papers were snowed under to the tune of 250,000. All this goes to show, Mr. Editor, that a man with a clear record cannot be beaten by such silly methods as are being used in this campaign. Let those who shout "treason" beware, lest they make things uncomfortable for themselves. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is calling the men to his cabinet already, as his election is assured. Thanks for the space in your valuable columns.

Then we both shall be happy again.


WESTHOLME THEATRE
