BRITISH AIRMEN BOMB CITY OF MANNHEIM

WESTERN FRONT REMAINS QUIET. GERMANS DELAY PEACE TERMS ONE DAY.

VICTORY CROWNS ITALIANS' EFFORTS ON MONTE ASOLONE

FURTHER DETAILS OF DARING ATTACK ON ENEMY GARRISON ON MOUNTAIN TOP—STRATEGIC POINTS CAPTURED AND ENEMY DRIVEN BACK—HUNS USE ASPHYXIATING GAS—ENORMOUS LOSSES

Rome, Dec. 27.—The gigantic efforts of the Italian soldiers have been crowned with success in driving the Hun back from the positions which he occupied, threatening the San Lorenza valley. The menace of the Austro-Germans breaking through on to the plains was too great to be permitted to continue.

A determined effort was made therefore to redeem the position. The first attack was in darkness at two o'clock in the morning, when a small detachment of the seventh infantry climbed Monte Asolone and made a furious charge on the sleeping garrison. For a time the little band was beyond the summit but was finally driven back by superior numbers.

The day attack began at 10 o'clock in the morning when the Alpi and Seventh regiments advanced on a three-mile front, having Asolone as its centre. The left and centre moved straight ahead while the right executed a turning movement which partially enveloped the enemy position on Asolone. The fighting was furious all through the day and into the darkness of the night, when the Italians had again mastered the strategic points of Asolone, and the enemy was pushed back for nearly a mile.

The enemy's efforts to cross the old Piave at the nearest point to Venice has been thrown back by Italian soldiers and marines. The enemy used armed flat boats carrying a storming party. The Italians landed a party from the fleet and engaged the enemy, driving him back and sinking one of his armed boats.

Glorious Page. Washington, Dec. 26.—Official despatches from Rome today give a detailed story of the fighting on Monte Asolone. They say:

"With the recapture of the positions on Monte Asolone the Italian soldiers have written a glorious page in the annals of this war. Their bravery has prevented the enemy from spreading his forces to the south and complete the surrounding of Monte Grappa. Our soldiers fought for several days under terrific artillery fire and against the deadly effects of asphyxiating gases. The enemy suffered enormous losses. It is calculated that in the actions at Beretta and Monte Asolone the

enemy has lost three divisions from the 26th of November to date. General Pfeffer, commander of the 4th enemy division, and the commanders of the 7th and 8th Austrian brigades have been seriously wounded."

A strong Teuton attack launched in the western sector of the Asiago plateau, especially at Buzo and Monte Valbella, resulted in the penetration of the Italian lines by a portion of the enemy, the war office also announced.

"Our artillery raked their advance, making heavy inroads upon them and they were forced to stop at our rear positions. Our troops counter attack is continuing satisfactorily."

Along the Piave at Vecchia, south of Gradenigo, detachments of Bersaglieri executed a surprise attack upon and drove back large parties of the enemy who had succeeded in passing the right bank of the river and who made a desperate attempt to retain their positions.

COAL SITUATION IN VANCOUVER IS SAME AS IN PRINCE RUPERT

Vancouver, Dec. 26.—Regarding the agitation that is going on and allegations to the effect that since the top price was placed on coal by Fuel Controller McGrath more screenings, or slack, than usual appears in the average coal delivery, coal men say "lump" coal is coal that has been screened and the slack taken from it, but, in screening, there always is a percentage of slack caused by breakage.

This is confirmed by N. Thompson, fuel controller for British Columbia, who is disposed to take little stock in the present agitation which accuses dealers of selling for "lump" coal, a coal that has a considerable percentage of slack.

"No consumer has made any complaints to me, and, until they do, I do not intend to bother about the matter," yesterday said Mr. Thompson.

No "Mine Run" Here.

Regarding the suggestion that some dealers might be selling mine run coal for lump, Mr. Thompson says no "mine run" coal comes here. It is all screened at the mine, and the coal which is being sold here now is screened once when taken off the scows. The difference between "nut" and "lump" coal which dealers used to advertise, says Mr. Thompson, is a myth so far as the fuel value is concerned. It is the same coal with the lump picked out, the smaller lump, or "nut" sacked.

Coal men are disposed to believe that the present agitation originated in the city hall and is for the purpose of giving Mayor McBeath another "war-cry" for his third-term aspirations. The subject of a civic coal yard was discussed some months ago by the mayor and others, but upon Fuel Controller Magrath coming here and establishing a maximum price the agitation for a civic coal plant died out.

GERMAN SPY CAPTURED ON THE MEXICAN BORDER

El Paso, Texas, Dec. 26.—Chas. H. Feige was shot and killed by United States army patrols when he attempted to cross the river to Mexico here late today. Feige was believed to have been a German spy and when his papers were examined a notebook, drawings and ground plans of troop camps, Fort Bliss and other fortifications near here, were found. He also carried a camera with him and was believed to have been obtaining military information for the use of enemy countries.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

On account of Monday evening being Christmas Eve, and the attention of the members of the city council being taken up with the affairs of that date, there was no meeting on Monday night, so the deferred meeting took place last evening. All the councillors were in their accustomed places but one.

The first business was the opening of tenders for the printing of the voters' list for the coming municipal election, which went to A. O. Franks for \$145. Then a report was read regarding the delay in the delivery of the long-expected valve for the hydro-electric department. The delay in getting this forward is accounted for by the difficulty in securing labor. Pattern makers have been scarce, scarcer than love or money, hence the delay.

Fall River Power.

Then came on a discussion of the securing for the city of the Falls River power, which meantime is in the possession of the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Co. His worship the mayor had drafted a letter to the Company offering again consideration of the sum of \$34,000 for the value of the improvements done on the property by the company, which would be of any use to the city, should they take it over. This \$34,000 payment was to be in the shape of city bonds. It was moved and seconded that the letter as written be sent. Several aldermen had some criticism to offer upon the wording of the letter. Ald. McRae pointed out that the interest on the bonds would amount to \$3,100 per year, which along with \$5,000 rent for the lease to the provincial government would make too great a charge upon the city, should such be paid before the power was developed. This charge would amount to 3-4 of a mill on the present assessment, which was quite a consideration.

Ald. Nelson was not in favor of paying the company anything for their rights. He was of the opinion that these rights would lapse anyway. The city should forget about this company when considering the proposition. He thought that there was very little risk of anyone else taking over this power.

Ald. McClymont, however, had heard that there was a pulp mill likely to start up should the Hydro-Electric Company quit. However, it was finally agreed that the letter be sent to the company, as this council did not see fit to have the negotiations broken off with the company.

A letter was then read from Halifax thanking the city for its contribution towards the relief of the citizens there in their recent trials.

The Deputy Minister of Agriculture also sent a letter to the city regarding the raising of pigs, or more politely, hogs, which was referred to the health committee, and the city solicitor for report.

The finance committee then presented the warrant book for signature, when Ald. Casey took exception to the large amount debited against the police department, which was \$1,080.20.

The city clerk then intimated that the date for nomination day for the candidates for the new council would be on the 14th of January, and the election on the 17th.

Ald. Nelson then brought up a resolution of which he had given notice, regarding Cow Bay, which he read. The mayor, however, informed him that the city council had no more to do with Cow Bay and the filling of it, or otherwise.

There was only comfortable moving room in the large hall and everyone seemed to be happy. Last evening there was a Christmas tree set in the middle of the great hall and the "piece de resistance" of the evening was a dance of the children around the tree. The ancient mythology of Scandinavia certainly had some justification in the gambols of the younger ones last evening.

The bylaw for the reduction of the number of aldermen from eight to four was the next business. The council went into committee to consider this bylaw. Ald. Montgomery in the chair. It was a piece of legislation ill becoming to a democratic city. "Where is the city in B. C. that has only four aldermen," he asked. "You can't find one." Then there was a deathly stillness for a minute. The question was put, and Alderman McClymont was the only supporter of Ald. Casey's motion. When the referendum is taken on this question on election day, therefore, the electors will have to choose between a council of eight, or a council of four.

The next matter was the tenders for the printing of the telephone directory. McRae Bros. tendered for \$127; A. O. Franks, \$127, and the News Job Press, \$125. It was awarded to the lowest tenderer.

The council then went into committee to consider the light and power rates bylaw.

ECLIPSE OF THE MOON

Tonight, however, there is every chance that the earth's shadow thrown on its satellite will be apparent to anyone who gazes upward. The moon is near to full and the weather is clear, too clear as some think, and at 10:50 tonight our old earth will interpose its bulk between the direct rays of the sun upon the moon. The hour being early, this phenomenon will be watched by many, both alone and in company. As an excuse, the eclipse of the moon has been used before by young folks for staying out late. It is not original, should it be used tonight. All the same, such is a stimulus to scientific observation.

MEDALS FOR BRAVERY

In one of the English newspapers recently received in the city, an interesting account is contained of honor done to Pte. Arthur Davey, and Pte. Joseph Davey, of the K. O. Y. L. I. These soldiers are both brothers of Mr. John Davey of Prince Rupert. In their home town of Denaby Main, near Sheffield, the two brothers were presented with gold watches and illuminated addresses in recognition of their gallantry in the field. Pte. Arthur Davey rescued a wounded comrade at great risk of his own life near Thiepval, while Pte. Joseph Davey also won the Military Medal for holding an advanced position for three hours against heavy odds during a counter attack at Fontaine.

PARTY GOVERNMENT

The hope has been expressed from time to time lately that the old party lines on which the Canadian political edifice has been based for years back, have been cleared away for all time by the election of the Union government. In this respect it is pointed out by the Victoria Times, a late Liberal and before the election a strongly Unionist paper, that undoubtedly the old party lines, based upon labels and political opportunism instead of upon principles and policies, have gone overboard. The process had been going on for some years in the purification of the country's public life, and it needed only a national crisis to finish it.

But there will be political parties until the world reaches perfection, and that goal is still somewhat remote. Political divisions arise from differences of opinion in regard to policies which in turn arise from differences in mental attributes, training, environment, heredity and other conditions. Whatever may be their names there will be conservative policies, liberal policies and other policies neither liberal nor conservative, simply because there will be conservative minds, liberal minds and extremist minds of various kinds.

The present Union Government would not last more than a very few months in time of peace, because it contains representatives of two hopelessly irreconcilable views on fiscal policy. There can be no compromise between the high protectionist group represented by Sir Thomas White and the free trade farmers of the West represented by Hon. T. A. Crerar. Both sides have agreed to shelve this and kindred subjects until the end of the war, but they will spring up immediately peace has returned, not out of general cussedness, but because they are vital in their bearing upon the progress and development of the Canadian West. One has only to remember the powerful interests and influences in the East benefited

by a high tariff to realize that they will fight with all their might any proposal for radical changes in the fiscal policy of Canada they have dictated so long. And every member of Parliament who represents a district which a high tariff has built up naturally will stand by them.

Moreover, the present Union Government might not be 'The' Union Government at all. Like the Asquith coalition, it might only be the first step towards a much more satisfactory combination; indeed, in all probability this will prove to be the case. If the Government should fail to achieve what is expected of it, or come within reasonable range of doing this, it will not command a majority in the House. The people want Union Government unquestionably, but they want an efficient Union Government and what is very much to the point they want members, whether on the Government side or the Opposition side, to keep a wary eye upon it.

Governments which arise from war conditions seldom survive the return of peace for any considerable period. This, of course, is inevitable, as they are the products of circumstances directly antagonistic to those of peace. For the same reason policies based upon abnormal conditions in most cases are upset when normal conditions come. Nevertheless, in regard to Canada, while it would be incorrect to say the election has forever obliterated political partyism, it certainly has created conditions out of which will arise, later on, parties divided by principles instead of by mere labels—the difference between Tweedledum and Tweedledee. The liberal policy of the future will be based largely upon the legitimate needs of the Canadian West, and it will be opposed to reactionary policies which owe their inspiration to special privilege interests centred in the East. All this is apart, of course, from the possibility of a cleavage on racial lines which, however, would not likely be a permanent development in any case.

The United States being an ally of Britain in the war is said to be responsible for the increased immigration prospects.

Notwithstanding the troubles with frozen pipes, and the large consumption of coal, some people say they like this kind of weather.

Bob-sleighting is one of the much-advertised winter sports in certain of the resorts in Switzerland—or rather it was, before the war. But for popularity of bob-sleights, these places have nothing on Prince Rupert.

The manufacture of rifles in the United States for Russia has been stopped by the British government. The reason given is that they are not needed. The remark speaks volumes.

The first striking act of the Union Government is to prohibit the import of intoxicating liquor into Canada. Some people are already wondering whether they do like the Union Government as well as they did two weeks ago.

Notwithstanding the apparent quietness prevailing in town this Christmas, the merchants mostly say that business has been good. Much better, in fact, than the last three. The Provincial Prohibition law is getting the credit.

With their biggest chemical factory in ruins and Krupp's works at Essen badly damaged by fire, the Germans are having some difficulty with munitions. Fighting with the other allies on the western front are many battalions of those races formerly under the dominion of the Central Powers. Poles are there by the regiment, and of the Slav races in Austria, further battalions are being organized, while Bohemians are numerous, even in the British ranks. If the thousands who would like to, only could get out of their present countries to join the allied armies they would willingly.

"Exhibit day by day and hour by hour the same courage a man shows upon the battlefield."

"No matter how long the struggle may last, await victory with strength and patience."

"If you are stricken in your dearest affections, bear your sorrow nobly, that your tears may be worthy of the hero whose death you mourn."
