## GERMAN CHANCELLOR ON ALLIED TERMS

### HAS TO BE SHOWN SOME MORE--BRITAIN REQUIRES LARGER QUANTITY WHEAT

#### ALLIES' PROPOSALS DO NOT SUIT GERMAN CHANCELLOR

BEFORE REICHSTAG, HERTLING COMMENTS UPON WAR AIMS. CLAIMS ALSACE AND LORRAINE WAS GERMAN TERRITORY IN 1870--WANTS TO PULL LION'S TEETH. DEMANDS NEW PROPOSALS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Berlin, Jan. 26.—Count von Hertling, the Imperial German Chancellor, in an address before the main committee of the Reichstag yesterday, said that the question of the limitation of armaments was one which was quite open for discussion. The chancellor added that the financial position of all European countries after the war would probably operate effectively for the solution of this problem.

**Alsace-Lorraine.**  
Von Hertling contended that the two provinces of Alsace and Lorraine were almost purely German territory, which had previously been severed from Germany by violence. When Germany in 1870 claimed that land "thus criminaly wrung from her, it was not the conquest of alien territory," the chancellor declared, "but what today is called disannexation."

**Freedom of the Seas.**  
There is no difference between Germany and President Wilson regarding the freedom of the seas, Hertling said. He added that the thorough freedom of navigation during times of war as well as in times of peace was one of Germany's main demands, it being eminently important for the future free navigation that Great Britain should be made to relinquish her strongly fortified positions of support on the international sailing routes, such as Gibraltar, Aden, Hong Kong, and the Falkland Islands.

**New Proposals.**  
The Chancellor said that the evacuation of Russian territory was a question which only concerned Russia and the Central Powers. He also demanded that the leaders of the nations at war with Germany set forth new proposals. The terms outlined by President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain contained certain principles which could be accepted by Germany, but the concrete proposals were unsatisfactory.

#### THE POLICE COURT

Before Magistrate Carss in the police court this morning, Mike Kelly was charged with doing wilful damage. He was fined \$5 and also to furnish bonds for \$200.

Another charge was laid against the same man, that of having opium in his possession. He was found guilty on this count also, and was fined \$50 or thirty days' imprisonment. The accused went to jail.

#### EXEMPTIONS FROM MILITARY SERVICE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, Jan. 26.—Disenfranchised Japanese residents of Canada, although naturalized, have been exempted from military service. The same order-in-council provides for the exemption of Indians in making the following amendments to the Military Service regulations.

"Any British subject, who, under the laws in force from time to time, is disqualified from voting in the Dominion elections, otherwise than under section 67 of the Dominion Elections Act, or the War Time Elections Act, shall be entitled to exemption from military service, unless he has, in fact, voted at the Dominion election, although disqualified at the time from so doing."

#### A FRIEND OF WOUNDED CANADIAN SOLDIERS

Mrs. Florence White, of Vancouver, has been appointed an official visitor for the Canadian Red Cross at No. 4 Canadian General Hospital, Basingstoke, England. If any of our readers hear that they have a friend in this hospital, and would care for direct news of him, Mrs. White will be glad to answer any enquiries upon receipt of a request to do so.

As there are over a thousand beds in this hospital, the patient may not be in the ward assigned to Mrs. White, still she would be glad to look him up. At present all the patients there are Canadians, and greatly appreciate gifts of magazines. The allowance per week of cigarettes is twenty per man, which does not go very far, and in hospital, the men only draw \$1.10 per week, which does not go very far to pay for extras, such as teas, smokes, outings, etc.

There are four men in one ward with no legs, and in four wards in one block, there are seventy men with but forty legs between them. These men cannot get about very much, and magazines and extra smokes help to pass the time, which often hangs wearily upon their hands. If, therefore, anyone would care to forward odd numbers of magazines and tobacco to Mrs. White, she will see to it that they are distributed.

#### BRITISH GENERALS RETAIN CONFIDENCE OF THE GOVERNMENT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 26.—Mr. A. Bonar Law, chancellor of the Imperial Exchequer and leader of the government in the House of Commons, replying to a cross-fire of questions yesterday in the House, declared that General Sir William Robertson, chief of the Imperial Staff, and Field Marshal Haig have the full confidence of the government and the war cabinet.

So far as he knew, no member of the government was behind the attacks which were being made against these generals in the press.

#### TO THE IMMORTAL MEMORY OF BURNS

In the St. Andrew's club rooms last evening, there was gathered together a notable assembly of Scotsmen and their friends to do honor to the memory of Scotia's national bard, Robert Burns. This is the ninth occasion on which the St. Andrew's Society in Prince Rupert have had a fitting celebration made of this national festival and the entertainment which was provided for member and guest last night, if like those of previous years, doubtless explained the great demand for tickets of admission.

Quite a number of guests were entertained last evening, there being representatives of the Sons of England, and the Sons of Canada Societies present, while Mr. J. C. Brady and Mr. Geo. M. Hanson, American Consul, respectively represented their own particular country.

Mr. S. D. Macdonald, president of the society, in a few introductory remarks, spoke felicitously to the occasion, and called upon the Rev. Dr. Grant to ask that a blessing be bestowed upon the board. Immediately thereafter, steaming and smoking lovelily, while the assembled company stood "in honor, that 'great chieftain o' the puddin' race,' the haggis, made his appearance. As a supper, what was provided left nothing to be desired, taking into consideration the necessity for obeying the Prohibition Act. After the loyal toast of "The King," that of the "Immortal Memory" was proposed by the president, to which the Rev. Dr. Grant responded. His was the beginning of a number of speeches, each of which was better than the other, partly grave, and partly gay, but all thoroughly acceptable. Dr. Grant drew attention to the ideals of Robert Burns, who was really a rebel against the conditions of his time. A man of the broadest sympathies, with the capacity of expressing that which was in him, he had left his mark even upon succeeding generations.

The speeches of the evening were interspersed with songs written by the poet, and among the vocalists were Messrs. R. Dowther and Sinclair, Mr. Davies at the piano accompanied by Messrs. McMillan and McKay with violins, and Mr. T. McEekin with mandolin, discoursed sweet music at intervals.

"The land we live in" was a toast which was vociferously responded to by the whole company in singing the "Maple Leaf" and by Mr. A. M. Manson, M. P. P., in a characteristic speech. #### JAPANESE WILL KEEP ORDER IN THE FAR EAST

Tokio, Jan. 26.—"Japan holds herself responsible for the maintenance of peace in this part of the world, and consequently in the event that peace is being endangered to the inevitable detriment of our interests, the government of Japan will not hesitate for a moment to take the proper measures."

Thus Count Terauchi, the premier of Japan, spoke at the opening of the Diet yesterday in referring to the internal disorders in Russia spreading to the Russian possessions in eastern Asia.

and the influx of new settlers from the old mother country and also from the stricken countries in Europe, that Canada, with all its great potential wealth, should do its duty by these people, our brethren, and its duty to democracy, was essential. Canada's opportunity was coming.

Mayor McClymont's name was also coupled with that of Mr. Manson. "The land we live in" was not one to be ashamed of," he said. He insisted upon the necessity for the greater education of the rising generation.

Mr. Hanson instanced in past history the friendly actions which had characterized the relations existing between the United States and Britain, and the incidents he instanced were well chosen.

Mr. Brady, in his response to a toast to "The Lassies" quoted his authorities for what he had to say. Were Mr. Brady's speech printed, and were he running for any public office it would get him every woman's vote in town. He considered, however, that the bachelor of today would have a much more difficult task with the women of this generation. "Tam o' Shanter," one of the greatest narrative poems ever written, without which no Burns' night would be complete, was recited by Mr. D. Thomson, after which the "Kindred Societies" was pledged. #### ALLIES MUST HAVE 75,000,000 BUSHELS MORE WHEAT THIS YEAR

BRITISH FOOD CONTROLLER, LORD RHONDDA, CABLES MR. H. HOOVER THAT UNLESS THIS EXTRA QUANTITY BE SENT OVERSEAS THE PEOPLE COULD NOT BE ASSURED OF ENOUGH FOOD TO WIN THE WAR

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, January 26.—Mr. Herbert Hoover, the food controller here, has received a cable from Lord Rhondda, the British Food Controller, saying that unless the United States are able to send to the allies in Europe seventy-five million bushels more wheat than has been exported up to January

1st, the people of Great Britain and the allied countries could not be assured of sufficient quantities of food to enable them to carry on their part of the work of winning the war.

President Wilson is taking the matter up, and will make an appeal to the people of the United States today.

#### FIRST MEETING OF NEW POLICE COMMISSION

The first meeting of the lately elected police commission was formally held yesterday afternoon in the city hall. Mayor McClymont is chairman, and Messrs. S. D. Macdonald and Geo. Hill constitute the commissioners.

The annual report of the chief of police was received and dealt with. This report showed that the sum of \$3,261.00 had been collected in fines during the year. Three hundred and forty-three cases had been dealt with, out of which there had been 314 convictions secured, 7 withdrawals, and 25 dismissals.

Several other matters of policy were taken up, such as gambling, the conducting of cabarets, and the other matters pertaining to the orderly conduct of the city, which might necessitate police supervision.

London, Jan. 25.—At a Zionist meeting today, it was announced that Great Britain would in a few weeks allow a Jewish committee to go to Palestine to prepare for the establishment of a Jewish nation. The commission will be followed by a staff of technical experts, engineers, architects and town planners. It is not the intention of the Zionist mission to create in Palestine a group of international financiers to exploit the country and the Arab proletariat, but to place on land, which will be purchased, the Jewish proletariat, who, it is hoped, will work in harmony with the Arabs.

#### TO PREVENT THE SHORTAGE OF BAIT

Yesterday afternoon, Mayor McClymont received a deputation from the Independent Boat Owners Association regarding the bait question, which is such a vital one for the fishermen on this coast. A proposal was put forward that either the city or the government should make use of Pearl Harbor, which lies up the coast between here and Port Simpson, for the storage of herring alive. The proposal is to put a barricade of some kind at the mouth of this harbor into which the herring caught by seine could be placed. This is already a favorite place for the herring to spawn, and they go there in large quantities for this purpose. Once in the harbor, it is proposed to keep them there, and, when required, they could easily be caught and sold to the fishermen. Fresh bait is much better than frozen, and by this means, so long as the herring are available, it is thought to relieve the pressure upon the freezing plants for about the space of four or five months.

The matter of the placing of the small chicken halibut, weighing under six pounds, which are at present classed as second-class fish, and for which only half price is given, upon the city market for public sale, was also taken up.

A meeting will be called for next week of the Board of Trade, the Fishermen's Union and the Independent Boat Owners' Association to discuss these and kindred matters pertaining to the big industry of Prince Rupert.

**WHAT GERMANY WANTS**

Now that the Germans have shown their hand in the demanding of the Baltic provinces of Russia, the Bolshevik government will either have to give in or fight. Germany is not content with what Russian territory she occupies at present, and that is quite a large area, but she wants practically all the seaboard which the Russians possess fronting upon the Baltic. They threaten to occupy the city of Reval, right in the Gulf of Finland, whence they could menace Petrograd at will. The fallacy of trusting the German government, ever so little is now clearly exposed to even the Bolsheviks. In honesty to themselves, and to the peoples of these provinces, the Bolsheviks cannot agree to the Prussian proposals.

Had the wishes of the peoples of these provinces been taken, and had they been willing to go under the iron rule of the Prussians, instead of that of the Russian government, doubtless, according to their previous statements, the Bolsheviks would have had no objections. The will of the people is the basis for government, as recognized by the Bolsheviks. But Germany will not do this. She would take these populous provinces whether the inhabitants thereof like it or no. The design of the German now being clear, even to the greatest dreamer among the Russians of the freedom of nationalities, the next move is up to the agile Trotsky.

**REVOLUTION**

The example set by the Russians is now being followed by the Austrians, and it would seem as if the Russians had started something the end whereof is not yet. Some seventy years ago the spirit of unrest passed over Europe, and spread from country to country. There was revolutionary trouble in Hungary, Germany and in Great Britain and France, and at that time Russia was seething, as it has been

ever since. How history repeats itself is shown by the spread of the same spirit now, starting in Russia last year, and now evidenced in Austria-Hungary and in Spain. It is safe to say that the same spirit of rebellion will always exist so long as the free development of that which lies in them is denied to mankind.

In the uprising in Vienna hopes can only be expressed for success, and the doing away with an effete monarchical system, which has not kept pace with modern development. The national aspirations of the five or six peoples who constitute the Austro-Hungarian Empire must be given an outlet, and the longer that outlet is denied, the greater will be the force of the explosion when it does come.

The Slovenes, the Croats, the Bohemians, and the Hungarians all have at different times made a bid for their independence from the power of Austria, but on each occasion, their demands have been refused, while the Ruthenians, of which there are many settlements in Canada, are part and parcel of the Ukrainian people, with whom they will sooner or later be joined. The holding together of these diverse races under one central government is apparently proving too much for the young Emperor Karl, and even as in Russia, the power of the monarch must become vested in the people.

**A HANDFUL**

Co-incident with the information of the revolution in Austria comes the news of a retreat of the Austro-German forces on the northern Italian front in the mountains. Suppressing insurrections at home and maintaining an offensive at the front is proving apparently too much for the armed strength of the forces at the command of the Emperor Karl. Even supposing that affairs in the dual monarchy do go the same way as they did in Russia, one thing may be counted upon and that is that there will be no fraternizing between the allied troops and those of the Central Empires, similar to what took

place on the Russian front during this past year.

Kaiser Wilhelm has been warned in the Reichstag that the conditions of Germany is little better than that of Austria. If Herr Schiedmann knows what he is talking about, and he usually does, then the Emperor William has a pretty handful to deal with. Trouble with his own troops on the Eastern front, trying to help his brother emperor in Austria, and with an ever-growing menace on the Western front will prove to be a greater task than one poor emperor, even if he be Wilhelm, can long survive.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Five thousand million dollars' worth of allied shipping has been destroyed by the U-boat campaign instituted by Germany, according to their own calculations. When peace terms come to be considered, this will doubtless come under the heading of "reparation." Reparation for the material damage done to the wealth of the world will keep the Germans hustling for the next generation.

## GERMANY AFRAID FOR THE NEXT GENERATION

London, Jan. 24.—Nothing is causing Germany greater anxiety at the present moment than the decline in the number of children. On the one hand millions of young men and boys are being killed, wounded or permanently incapacitated for useful work in the future, while on the other there is a steady decrease in the birth rate. There is no new development, for it was apparent and was recognized before the war, but it is obviously more serious now, and it is necessary to find a corrective. What these means are is sufficiently well known, but whether they will effect their purpose remains to be seen.

The falling off in the birth rate is greatest in the large towns. It is very noticeable, for example, in Dresden.

It is interesting to note that whereas up to October, 1915, the number of births in Dresden was regularly in excess of the number of deaths, there has been an excess of births over deaths since then in two months only—namely, May and September, 1916. In all the other months the number of deaths was larger than the number of births.

It would be easy to prove by an examination of statistics in other German towns that what is happening in Dresden is happening elsewhere. Prussia and Central Germany are the only places where the decline in the birth rate is less ominous and are those where strong religious influences exist to combat it, as the Roman Catholic districts of West Germany and the Polish Provinces of Prussia, where the population is largely Roman Catholic. Naturally the hard winter is having a disastrous effect on the population, the elderly people enfeebled by inadequate food.

### SERBIA TEMPTED WITH OFFERS OF PEACE

Washington, Jan. 23.—Germany has made "tempting inducements" to Serbia, in a fruitless attempt to secure a separate peace, it was authoritatively learned in diplomatic circles today.

Concessions virtually amounting to fulfillment of Serbia's war aims have been made by Austria-Hungary, and even Bulgaria has modified her demands—but the overtures have been disdainfully ignored by King Peter's countryless nation, it was stated.

The cost of meat is the heavy item in the food bill.

Poultry and Eggs will help take the place of meat.

The food that goes to the garbage pail from the average table will provide one-third the feed for a flock of 8 to 10 hens.

Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.

A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

### How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

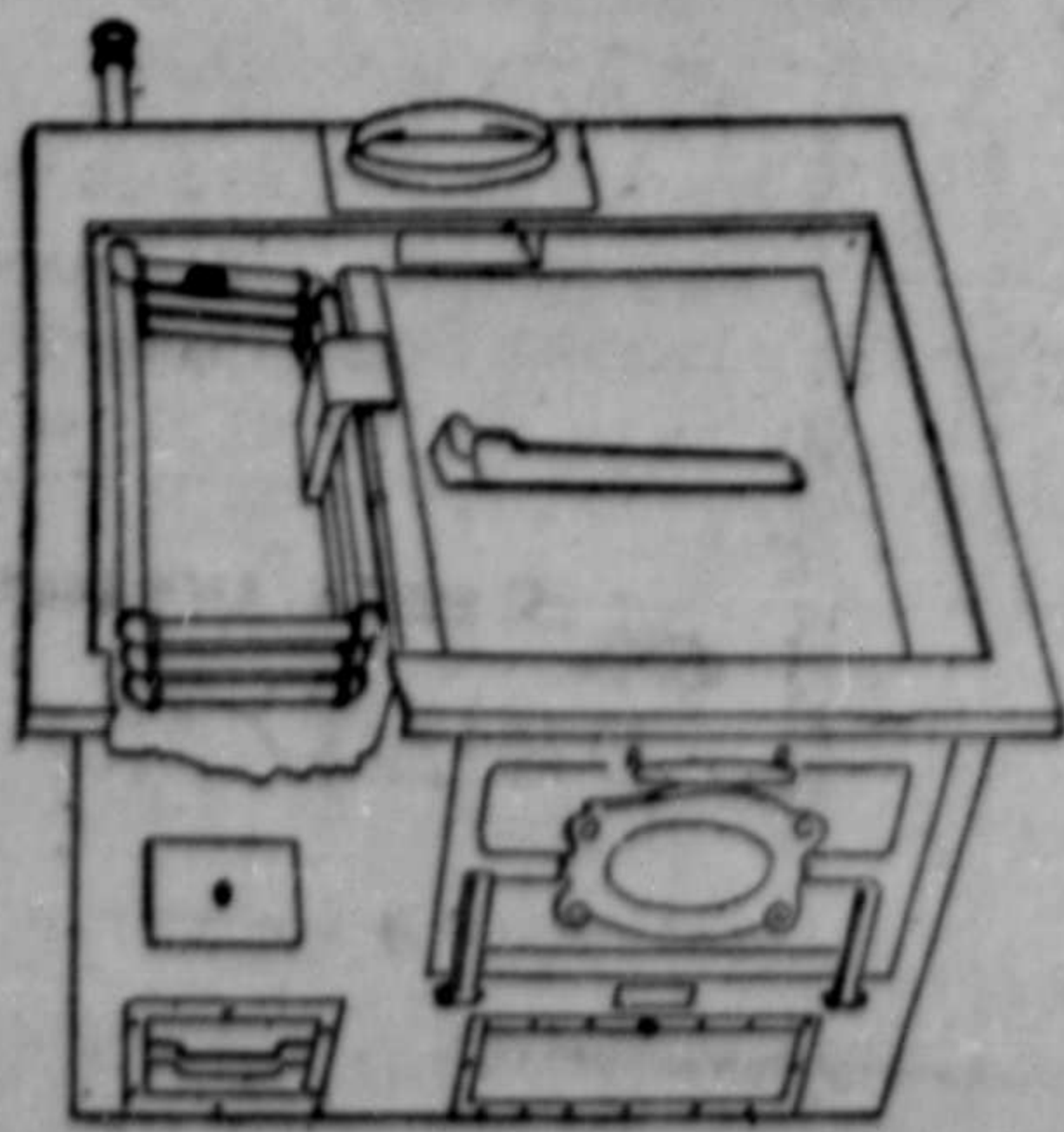

SENTENCED TO SIX HOURS IN JAIL
